11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have  
12 any questions for Joe?

13 MR. BUTLER: Was it you guys that  
14 were cutting that tree up? The one that  
15 fell. Somebody cut it up. Right next to my  
16 house, there. It fell out of Taroli's when  
17 we got all that wet snow. It fell where I  
18 cut the grass down that strip all way the  
19 down to Joe McAndrew's. All the wood is  
20 sitting there. But somebody cut it up  
21 today.

22 MR. LENCESKI: Wasn't us.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other  
24 members have any questions for Joe? Thank  
25 you, Joe.

1 Mike Sokolowski, code  
2 enforcement/zoning officer. Good evening,  
3 Mike.

4 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Evening.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything for  
6 the meeting other than the report?

7 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: No.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any members  
9 have any questions for Mike?

10 MR. KOMENSKY: Mike, thank you very  
11 much for the list of condemned houses and  
12 all the work you put in on that. I  
13 appreciate that.

14 MAYOR LEGG: Good job, Mike.

15 MR. KOMENSKY: I have just two  
16 questions. It appears that maybe Oak Street  
17 is possibly winding down?

18 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: That's what the  
19 lawyer said. He left me a message last  
20 week.

21 MR. KOMENSKY: Good news. Then the  
22 guy with the trailer on --

23 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I called him, never  
24 got a return call. I'll follow up on that.

25 MR. KOMENSKY: Like we did the other

1                   guy. Thank you very much. Appreciate your  
2                   hard work on that.

3                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other  
4                   members have any questions for Mike?

5                   MR. BUTLER: Mike, I wanted to thank  
6                   you because I know I've been busting your  
7                   chops meeting after meeting with these  
8                   condemned houses. You did a great job.

9                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thank you,  
10                  Michael.

11                  Dave Lopatka, engineer, anything for  
12                  the meeting tonight?

13                  MR. LOPATKA: I have nothing,  
14                  really, for the meeting. We did do a final  
15                  inspection at Pagnotti last week, last  
16                  Thursday. Couple minor punch list items. I  
17                  have them listed on the report. They're  
18                  minor things that they're going to get  
19                  cleaned up. I approved their pay  
20                  application to Marylynn. They did a good  
21                  job.

22                  I also met over there two days prior  
23                  with Aris and the engineers helping us with  
24                  the electrical and water and stuff just to  
25                  have them take a look at what was installed

1 and what we need to make sure we add it to  
2 the second phase. There isn't a lot of  
3 additional stuff. One or two things we  
4 pointed out with regard to what was  
5 installed. There were a bunch of spare  
6 breakers that were required in the box that  
7 weren't there. That ended up being a punch  
8 list item and a couple other minor things.

9 Other than that I don't really have  
10 that much. I guess to go over MS4 stuff a  
11 little bit, we did have an inspection with  
12 the EPA yesterday. Last week or the week  
13 before they sent an e-mail out requesting a  
14 bunch of information from the borough. I  
15 provided them everything that we had. The  
16 ordinances, inspection stuff. A bunch of  
17 ordinance stuff we passed back in 2020 as  
18 part of the stuff they were looking for. We  
19 actually went out and looked at a couple  
20 basins that the borough owns. We kind of  
21 went over that stuff.

22 Also, as part of that -- and this  
23 has been going for the last couple months.  
24 I've been putting together your new MS4  
25 permit application in addition to your plume

1 reduction plan. I sent Marylynn, yesterday,  
2 the ad. So it has to be advertised, the  
3 PRP. It has to be advertised and there's a  
4 30 day public comment period that we have to  
5 document any questions that come in to the  
6 borough and address them however they need  
7 to be if they need to be included in the  
8 final application that we have to put in  
9 after that 30 day period.

10 So she has the PRP posted on the  
11 website, and the ad is going to be in this  
12 week?

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

14 MR. LOPATKA: Starting on Friday,  
15 the 18th, and it will go to May 19th. That  
16 30 day period after we just have to answer  
17 any questions that come up from the public,  
18 and then we'll make the submission for your  
19 new permit.

20 EPA has a number of other items that  
21 they requested from us. Get that within the  
22 next seven days.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else?

24 MR. LOPATKA: That's all.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any members

1 have any questions for Dave?

2 MR. BUTLER: Can we get estimates  
3 for the sod up there early? Because come  
4 fall these guys are going to be busy and  
5 that sod has to go in in the fall down  
6 Pagnotti.

7 MR. LOPATKA: The sod likely -- the  
8 project will be starting in June. I mean,  
9 all you really have to do is water it heavy  
10 for the first two or three weeks for the  
11 roots to take. I actually specked a certain  
12 sod. I think Rick had mentioned a couple  
13 companies that somebody he knew or something  
14 at one time had a field done. I actually  
15 called the company. I think they're down  
16 towards Philadelphia. It's just a sod farm.  
17 They make the sod that we specked for the  
18 field. So really the sod, it's really two  
19 weeks to a month where you have to water it  
20 heavy for the roots to take and it will be  
21 fine after that.

22 MR. BUTLER: But let's bid, get the  
23 bids early.

24 MR. LOPATKA: It's going out to bid  
25 in probably two to three weeks. I have to

1 go back to the -- that's why I brought them  
2 up here the other day, to make sure it's  
3 taken care of with regards to the  
4 irrigation. The controls and all that  
5 stuff. I actually talk to him earlier  
6 today. He should have that for me by the  
7 end of the week or sometime early next week.  
8 The rest we have ready to go. Once I get  
9 this information it will go out to bid  
10 probably in the next two or three weeks.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other  
12 members have any questions for Dave? Dave,  
13 one question. Any update on the guardrail  
14 on Howard Street?

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: I have that. The  
16 work is going to be done on April 22nd.

17 MR. LOPATKA: There was some  
18 confusion on there the way that they sent it  
19 out. I know Marylynn had to go on and  
20 accept it, and then they sent an e-mail  
21 saying they changed their system. So I  
22 think there was a little confusion.

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: I just called and  
24 said what are we doing.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Good. Thank

1                   you, David.

2                   Police Chief, Jason Dubernas, good  
3 evening, Chief. Anything for the meeting?

4                   CHIEF DUBERNAS: Just to let you  
5 know that the sign's up on the side of the  
6 building.

7                   The only other thing, after the  
8 meeting I'd like to have a two minute  
9 executive.

10                  MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay. Any  
11 members have any questions for the chief?

12                  MR. KOMENSKY: Thanks for the work  
13 on the sign, Chief. Looks really nice.

14                  MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: Thank you,  
15 Chief.

16                  Assistant fire chief, Bill Stull.  
17 Good evening, Bill.

18                  MR. STULL: The only thing I have is  
19 I just want to thank Chief Dubernas and the  
20 police department for putting up the signs  
21 for our training last week. So that worked  
22 out pretty good. Plus the letters we sent  
23 out and whatever we put on social media. So  
24 I don't think we had any complaints. That's  
25 all I have.

1           MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That training  
2 that you put on, it was really interesting.  
3 I only saw what you posted on Facebook, but  
4 how many towns were involved?

5           MR. STULL: There was Taylor, Old  
6 Forge, Moosic, Avoca and Duryea. I think we  
7 had 28 guys for the two days. It was really  
8 nice because this gives the firefighters a  
9 very real flashover, the simulator. They  
10 put OSB inside of it. It's a controlled  
11 situation. They put a burn barrel in there,  
12 they starve it for oxygen, then they slowly  
13 open the doors on it and let it flash and  
14 then shut the doors again. They teach the  
15 firefighters how to use a hose line to back  
16 down the flames and everything before it  
17 really flashes. It's pretty good.

18           They left here Tuesday and went up  
19 to Dickson City. They use it up there.  
20 Then they're going to Mount Pocono.

21           MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Good.  
22 Anything else?

23           MR. STULL: That's it.

24           MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any members  
25 have any questions for the assistant fire

1 chief? Thank you, Bill.

2 Attorney Rinaldi, good evening.

3 Anything for the meeting?

4 ATTY. RINALDI: I have nothing, but  
5 I think -- do you have a subdivision plan?

6 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: There may be a  
8 subdivision plan for approval, final.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any members  
10 have any questions for the solicitor?

11 MR. HOOVER: What do we have to do  
12 to get that skill games going again to bring  
13 it up front? We have to pick a number on  
14 how many machines we want in each building.

15 ATTY. RINALDI: That was the one  
16 thing. You kicked around some illegal and  
17 changing the ordinance so they're legal up  
18 to a certain number and in certain places.

19 MR. HOOVER: That only have liquor  
20 licenses. I'd like to get the ball rolling  
21 on that for next meeting. We can think  
22 about how many machines we want in each  
23 building.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So not to cut  
25 Councilman Hoover off, but so we would have

1 to get together on our end and give you the  
2 requirements we want, the way we want them?

3 ATTY. RINALDI: Well, amended.

4 MR. HOOVER: Mike, how many  
5 buildings actually have them? Not places,  
6 establishments? Fifteen?

7 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: You mean convenient  
8 stores?

9 MR. HOOVER: Fifteen stores?

10 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Probably something  
11 like that. I'm not positive.

12 MS. SHOTWELL: You have that list.  
13 Right.

14 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I do.

15 MS. SHOTWELL: Could you send that  
16 to us?

17 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I'll get that out.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mike, if you  
19 wouldn't mind, since that list is there any  
20 new places? I know of one. I know Turkey  
21 Hill added two. I don't know of anywhere  
22 else, though.

23 MS. SHOTWELL: West Mary Street.

24 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: The old GI's.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Even if you

1 have to go around one more time.

2 MS. SHOTWELL: Mucciolo's is now --

3 MR. HOOVER: How about the place  
4 across the street?

5 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: They didn't come in  
6 yet. They never came back to me.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: They were  
8 moving stuff in there today. We watched  
9 them about an hour ago.

10 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Unless they're  
11 coming to planning again.

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You can stop  
13 over there tomorrow because we watched them  
14 for at least a half an hour, 45 minutes.  
15 They were carrying all kind of things.  
16 Wood, carrying an easel, cardboard boxes,  
17 shelving. They were constant for 45  
18 minutes. I don't see them over there now,  
19 but if you could stop over there tomorrow  
20 and find out. Especially if they haven't  
21 been to planning yet.

22 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: They were but  
23 they --

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So if they  
25 came and were told what they needed to do,

1 never came back but started doing what they  
2 wanted to that's an issue.

3 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: They never came  
4 back.

5 MR. HOOVER: Right now the number is  
6 zero.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Quick rundown,  
8 what did they exactly want to do over there?

9 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: First they said it  
10 was a smoke shop. First thing was games.  
11 They want to put games.

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Did they  
13 mention how many? So just smoke shop and  
14 games?

15 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do we have  
17 their name?

18 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I have something in  
19 there, yes.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Are they from  
21 Old Forge? No?

22 MR. STULL: No.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I haven't  
24 heard anybody who wanted to do anything. I  
25 wasn't sure. So if you can stop over there

1 tomorrow, find out what they were doing,  
2 notify them what they shouldn't be doing.

3 MR. STULL: One question. I know  
4 they're moving in before the occupancy  
5 permit is signed off by the fire department,  
6 that we need to do an inspection. The one  
7 on Lonesome Road, that transport guy. The  
8 old Blooming Idiots. He's been in there  
9 since shortly after Christmas or before  
10 Christmas, even.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Probably been  
12 in there at least two, three months.

13 MR. STULL: So my question is how  
14 did they get in there if we don't issue them  
15 an occupancy permit to do what they're  
16 doing?

17 MR. KOMENSKY: Mike, did they come  
18 to planning?

19 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes. Emmett has  
20 those.

21 MR. STULL: So when they came to  
22 planning we pretty much told them what they  
23 needed. One of the things was the HOP and  
24 everything else down there. They said they  
25 weren't doing any renovations or anything in

1           there, but they moved completely in there  
2           doing work. I know the fire department  
3           hasn't been down there since it was Blooming  
4           Idiots.

5                     But I just wanted to know how  
6           they're getting in there without us signing  
7           off on it.

8                     MR. BUTLER: Could it be the  
9           planning commission is telling them to do  
10          this?

11                    MR. SOKOLOWSKI: No. The guy told  
12          me he was moving his equipment in there and  
13          just getting set up, his equipment. I told  
14          him not to operate.

15                    MR. HOOVER: They always push it to  
16          the max.

17                    MR. SOKOLOWSKI: There's no  
18          construction or nothing. He brought his  
19          plans.

20                    MR. KOMENSKY: I guess as long as  
21          everybody agrees, Mike, you and Billy are  
22          going to have to go down there. Billy needs  
23          to get that occupancy permit signed.

24                    MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Emmett, are  
25          you here for them tonight?

1 MR. MANCINELLI: I am not, but we  
2 are working on that project. So we were at  
3 planning maybe December, January, I can't  
4 quite remember, and we submitted plans to  
5 the engineer, Mike. They were under review.  
6 We had a couple waivers. I was not aware  
7 that they're in there.

8 The only thing we were doing on the  
9 plan is we've applied to PennDOT, we've  
10 gotten three comments sent on to the owners,  
11 and then PennDOT wants a letter of intent on  
12 what they plan on doing. The property was  
13 Track Faster Corporation or something, so  
14 they want to know who is able to sign  
15 legally for the corporation for the permit  
16 application. So I sent all that stuff over  
17 to the owner. I'm waiting for that. Then  
18 they also wanted the deed, which we have.

19 Some of the comments that we  
20 discussed at planning were about the  
21 connection to the sewer. So we were able to  
22 reach out to the sewer authority to get a  
23 copy of paid bills. I think January or  
24 something. That was about evidence of  
25 connection to the sewer.



1 not supposed to be without the permit.

2 MR. MANCINELLI: Just for the record  
3 we submitted application for a change in use  
4 and land development.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Everything is  
6 applied for but there's no permit granted  
7 yet.

8 MR. MANCINELLI: Nothing's been  
9 approved.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You think he's  
11 operating.

12 MR. STULL: They're definitely doing  
13 stuff in there.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I've seen  
15 them, too. If you and Mike go down there  
16 and find out exactly what's going on and  
17 instruct them on what they can and cannot  
18 do.

19 MR. STULL: So technically they need  
20 an occupancy permit to be operating down  
21 there.

22 MS. SHOTWELL: To operate a  
23 business, not to be there. They're there,  
24 you're repainting your new business.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If they're

1 open for business --

2 MR. STULL: They're operating.  
3 Definitely operating.

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If they're  
5 cleaning up stuff you don't need it, but if  
6 you're conducting business, yes, you need  
7 it.

8 MR. HOOVER: The other building on  
9 Lonesome Road, do they have an occupancy  
10 permit? The Millwright building, Master  
11 Millwright, do they have an occupancy  
12 permit? They're going to town down there.  
13 So we better find out what's going on with  
14 that. They owe engineering fees on that.  
15 They're working down there every day. It's  
16 a huge building.

17 MS. SHOTWELL: It's, like, a year.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: They were  
19 working in the old building.

20 MR. HOOVER: They don't want to pay  
21 the engineering fees.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mike, you have  
23 to go down there, too.

24 MR. LOPATKA: That was approved last  
25 year.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: How long has  
2 it been constructed? At least six months.

3 MR. KOMENSKY: That would be BIU.  
4 Right? So did Joe give them an occupancy  
5 permit?

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: No, the occupancy  
7 permit is on hold.

8 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: He has to pay the  
9 fee before we give him one.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: As of right  
11 now we have across the street, the old  
12 Blooming Idiots and Master Millwright.

13 MR. STULL: So Master Millwright,  
14 their new building, we did do the inspection  
15 on that on the fire side, and I believe we  
16 signed off on the occupancy permit to you.  
17 The fire department did. So once it's  
18 signed off by the fire department we give it  
19 to you. That's just giving our blessing  
20 that we're done on our side and we inspected  
21 it. The new building.

22 MR. HOOVER: We have to make sure  
23 they know just because they're getting an  
24 occupancy permit off the fire department --

25 MS. BARTOLETTI: They're very clear.

1 MR. STULL: When the fire department  
2 signs off on the occupancy permit that only  
3 goes to Mike. Nobody else. That's telling  
4 Mike the fire department is done with it.  
5 We don't give --

6 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Also when BIU signs  
7 off it comes to me. It doesn't go to them.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mike, if you  
9 can stop down there as well.

10 Borough manager, Marylynn  
11 Bartoletti, good evening. Anything for the  
12 meeting?

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: So my first  
14 question is does anyone have any questions  
15 on any of the financial reports of the  
16 borough? No? Okay.

17 So tonight on the agenda we have two  
18 resolutions, and the first one I just want  
19 to give you a little information on so it  
20 will be easier when we pass it. So  
21 resolution number 17 is to apply for a DCNR  
22 grant for Pagnotti Park, and it is called  
23 the Entrance Enhancement Phase I. So we are  
24 applying for this grant, and it's through  
25 myself, Dave and our grant writers. We've

1           been working on this, and it is basically to  
2           try to construct a bridge, a walking bridge,  
3           which we've been discussing for a very long  
4           time.

5                     The grant is through the Department  
6           of Conservation and Natural Resources, and  
7           it is a cash match type of grant. So the  
8           total of the grant that we are applying for  
9           is \$432,533, and the borough's portion of  
10          that would be \$216,266.96. So we will vote  
11          on that in a little bit, but I just wanted  
12          to give you a little bit of information on  
13          it. Does anyone have any questions on that?

14                    Then the next item on the agenda is  
15          resolution number 18, but it is to adjust  
16          resolution number 16 of 2024. It is for an  
17          LSA grant that I had applied for, and we put  
18          it under safety. So it came back to us that  
19          they want us to change the name. We had to  
20          adjust some of what we were asking for. So  
21          now it's going to go from being called  
22          safety equipment to purchase of new  
23          vehicles. Anyone have any questions on  
24          that?

25                    Then the next item is just the

1 invoice for Linde Corporation, and that's  
2 for the work at Pagnotti.

3 So Dave had started to tell you  
4 about the meeting that we had yesterday with  
5 EPA, and one thing I just wanted to ask  
6 council, I think that it might be beneficial  
7 for us to add to our committee list or add  
8 MS4 to our committee list since it's  
9 something that each year gets bigger and  
10 bigger, and it's something that I think  
11 council really needs to be much more  
12 involved in. So I don't know if you would  
13 like to add it to a committee that's already  
14 on our list or if you would like to create a  
15 new committee.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Would you  
17 rather create a new committee?

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: I would. I would  
19 like it to be -- and we can really call it  
20 MS4 Committee. Because there's so much  
21 involvement with EPA and DEP it's much more  
22 than just Dave and myself and Joe meeting  
23 with these people. Like, council members  
24 will be getting pulled in and be more  
25 involved in it because there's so many

1 stipulations that they are putting on us and  
2 it's all going to come to you guys anyway.  
3 So I think it's better to be involved from  
4 the very beginning. So whoever you guys  
5 want to put on it.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We can discuss  
7 it.

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: I think that would  
9 be something really good.

10 MR. HOOVER: I'd like to chair that  
11 committee.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: That would be good.

13 MR. LOPATKA: Just from my side --  
14 and I had mentioned to Marylynn and maybe  
15 even Joe -- that committee likely should  
16 have myself and Joe at some of these  
17 meetings that you guys have so that I can  
18 kind of explain to you some of the stuff  
19 that's required on the borough side, and  
20 then there's some stuff that the DPW needs  
21 to do with regard to training and some other  
22 things.

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: It's just something  
24 that's getting really, really, really big,  
25 and doing it from the ground level I think

1 would be much more beneficial. I think,  
2 Jimmy, you went to the one meeting that we  
3 had with the city of Scranton about joining  
4 with them. It all kind of goes hand in  
5 hand. That's all I have.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any members  
7 have any questions for Marylynn?

8 MR. KOMENSKY: How about the senior  
9 center?

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: The senior center  
11 is moving along. It's coming along very  
12 well. I need Dave after the meeting because  
13 there's a couple things that we had picked  
14 out -- flooring, for example -- that is no  
15 longer available, so they brought some  
16 samples in. But I think it's moving along  
17 very well.

18 MR. LOPATKA: We had a job meeting  
19 two weeks ago. Some of that information was  
20 put together. We actually did a little walk  
21 through. There was a couple other minor  
22 items they needed an answer on that I  
23 believe we answered at that meeting. The  
24 architect was there and was actually doing a  
25 good job keeping, like, any submittals that

1           come in taken care of. So it's kind of  
2           eliminated Marylynn from being building  
3           inspector and contractor.

4                       MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other  
5           members have any questions?

6                       MR. HOOVER: Mare, I got a call from  
7           Lou Febbo and I had called Dave about it  
8           last week and he happened to be down at  
9           Linde's. I met him down there. I went to  
10          see Lou to see what the problem was. Across  
11          the street from his house is an old swale  
12          that has never been cleaned out. At the  
13          intersection there's a pipe that goes  
14          underground just the other side of the road.

15                      MR. LOPATKA: It actually goes  
16          parallel down his driveway. It goes into  
17          his property and then the water continues  
18          beyond there.

19                      MR. HOOVER: It continues down and  
20          goes into the field. He asked if we can  
21          clean that culvert out, that swale. It's  
22          all overgrown with trees and bushes and  
23          twigs. He said if we can clean that out,  
24          maybe get the vac truck there and clean that  
25          pipe out as a temporary fix, eventually

1            maybe put a pipe in there. Like Dave said,  
2            we'd still have to get the pipe down to  
3            Milwaukee Avenue. But where do you go from  
4            there? Then it's across the street to Saint  
5            John's Creek. That's another story. Right  
6            now the crews can do it or --

7            MS. BARTOLETTI: It's across Angela  
8            Drive?

9            MR. HOOVER: The pipe goes  
10           underground. It's filled. It overflows the  
11           intersection and then goes on his property.  
12           Maybe this week we'll take a look at it,  
13           walk it and we can solve this little bit of  
14           a problem for him.

15           MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Before we go  
16           into new business we'll go to public  
17           comment. Mr. Kania?

18           MR. KANIA: Good evening. My reason  
19           for being here tonight is to offer thanks.  
20           I spoke to you last week regarding the raw  
21           sewage problem. I spoke about it at the  
22           February meeting. I just want to publically  
23           thank Joe Lencieski and Mike Sokolwski for  
24           their intervention with the property owner.  
25           We finally got that squared away. A big

1           thank you.

2                       And along with your advice for me to  
3           submit a bid for repair of the sidewalk and  
4           wall, that's been submitted. I appreciate  
5           your consideration. Thank you.

6                       MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Emmett  
7           Mancinelli?

8                       MR. MANCINELLI: I'm good. I got  
9           what I needed.

10                      MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mike, will we  
11           have to approve that tonight?

12                      MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes.

13                      MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay. We'll  
14           move into new business. First item under  
15           new business, item one will be resolution  
16           number 17, motion to approve for a DCNR  
17           grant for the Pagnotti Park entrance named  
18           Entrance Enhancement Phase I for  
19           \$432,533.92. That's a cash match grant?

20                      MS. BARTOLETTI: It is. So the  
21           match would be \$216,266.96.

22                      MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The chair  
23           would entertain a motion to approve.

24                      MR. KOMENSKY: I'll make that  
25           motion.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion by  
2 Councilman Komensky.

3 MR. LETTIERI: I'll second it.

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by

1                   ATTY. RINALDI: This has to do with  
2 his court case, so everything's done.

3                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You've  
4 reviewed it and everything is good?

5                   ATTY. RINALDI: Yes.

6                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion on the  
7 floor to approve the final approval for  
8 Emlaw.

9                   MR. BUTLER: I'll make the motion.

10                  MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion by  
11 Councilman Butler.

12                  MR. HOOVER: I'll second it.

13                  MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by  
14 Councilman Hoover. On the question? Public  
15 input? Roll call, please.

7 I look forward to the next recipient.

8 MR. KOMENSKY: First thing, I would  
9 like to thank the historical society for  
10 their open house over the weekend. I  
11 visited there and it was nice to see a lot  
12 of the old artifacts. Brought back a lot of  
13 memories. So it was great.

14 The second thing I want to talk  
15 about is as we have all seen the past week,  
16 the violence at the governor's mansion in  
17 Harrisburg. I mean, horrible. Thank God.  
18 It doesn't matter what side of the aisle you  
19 sit on, this violence has to stop. I,  
20 myself, will not condone this type of  
21 violence, and I know everyone sitting at  
22 this table doesn't. Somehow it has to stop.  
23 Then to hear the comments that the gentleman  
24 said about using a hammer is, like,  
25 unbelievable.

1                   So I just want to say I'm glad that  
2                   the governor and his family are doing well,  
3                   but if you think of it in the back of your  
4                   mind it's just like the White House is the  
5                   people's house, the governor's mansion is  
6                   the people of Pennsylvania's house. So it's  
7                   kind of an attack on each and every one of  
8                   us. We should all be offended. I'm just  
9                   glad the governor and his family are doing  
10                  well, and I would hope throughout a lot of  
11                  intervention this stuff stops.

12                  The last thing I do want to say is I  
13                  hope everybody -- my colleagues, the staff  
14                  and every resident in the borough -- has a  
15                  very happy Easter and enjoys time with  
16                  family. That's all.

17                  MR. LETTIERI: Bobby,  
18                  congratulations again.

19                  MR. BUTLER: Just another kudo out  
20                  to my old teammate, Bobby Legg. Keep them  
21                  coming every week. I mean, it should be  
22                  like an ongoing thing because this town is  
23                  full of people that have really done a lot  
24                  for the town. Congratulations, Bobby. Well  
25                  deserved. But I kind of like it.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: It's great. I  
2 agree with you. Great job.

3 MS. MCCAWLEY: Echoing everybody  
4 else, great job on the proclamation.  
5 Congratulations, Mr. Gillette. Happy  
6 Easter.

7 MR. HOOVER: Bob, congratulations,  
8 you and your wife. What you do for the  
9 borough is amazing. That's all I have.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: It's tough  
11 going last because everything else is said.  
12 But just for the record, Mayor, great job  
13 again. I think like everybody else. I know  
14 I received a lot of feedback last month, I'm  
15 sure we all did, when you started it. A lot  
16 of people said this should be ongoing. I  
17 would say this is something the mayor  
18 started. I don't want council to take  
19 credit for it. I said he's involved with  
20 it. He does the proclamations, he calls in  
21 who he thinks. So I trust your judgment. I  
22 hope you continue to do it. Again, like  
23 everyone else said, I think it's a great  
24 thing.

25 Congratulations to you and your

1 family again. It's well deserved. You do a  
2 lot for our community, for the people of Old  
3 Forge. It definitely doesn't go unnoticed.

4 Just real quick, I would said a  
5 little bit of what Councilman Komensky said  
6 already. You put it perfectly and touched  
7 on it completely, but I also am very happy,  
8 I'm sure we all are that sit at this table,  
9 that the governor's family is safe and thank  
10 God that it wasn't worse. They caught it in  
11 time. Thank God they caught the gentleman  
12 who did it. It's definitely no way to act  
13 towards anybody, whether you're a public  
14 official or just a citizen in the country or  
15 a human being in the world. Acts of  
16 violence like that are completely condemned  
17 by, I would say, all of us who sit here and  
18 all of the people in the world. So I'm  
19 happy that the governor and his family are  
20 safe.

21 A very happy Easter to everyone in  
22 the borough and everyone at the table and in  
23 the room. We hope you all have a safe,  
24 health, happy holiday with your family.

25 Council had a quick executive

1 session earlier this evening from 6:00 to  
2 7:00 and we're going to have another quick  
3 one.

4 If the members don't have anything  
5 else the chair would entertain a motion to  
6 adjourn.

7 MR. KOMENSKY: So movement.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: By Councilman  
9 Komensky. All in favor?

10 (Unanimous. Meeting adjourned.)
