1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Good evening,
2 everyone. I'd like to call the meeting to
3 order with the Pledge of Allegiance.

4 (The Pledge of Allegiance was
5 recited.)

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Roll call,
7 please, Marylynn.

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
9 Avvisato is absent, Councilman Butler is
10 absent. Councilman Febbo?

11 MR. FEBBO: Here.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

13 MR. HOOVER: Here.

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Lettieri
15 is absent. Councilman Notari?

16 MR. NOTARI: Present.

17 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Here. Once
19 again, ladies and gentlemen, welcome to the
20 Old Forge Borough work session. Tonight is
21 Tuesday, August 1, 2023. The purpose of the
22 meeting will be to set our agenda for our
23 regular meeting which will be Tuesday,
24 August 15th. We'll go down the table, we'll
25 hear from our council members, our

1 department heads, our borough manager, our
2 chief of police. There's a public sign-in
3 sheet the chief has. If anybody would like
4 to address us at the end of the meeting
5 we'll answer your questions.

6 With that said, we'll begin with our
7 first department head. DPW Manager Joe
8 Lenceski is absent. We'll move right to the
9 code enforcement/zoning officer, Mike
10 Sokolowski. Anything for the upcoming
11 meeting?

12 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I have nothing
13 right now.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
15 any questions for Mike?

16 MR. NOTARI: Any updates on Moosic
17 Road, the Emlaw property?

18 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: They were supposed
19 to come the 27th to planning. Supposed to
20 bring Dave Cherundolo as his attorney.

21 MR. NOTARI: We haven't heard
22 anything from the conservation district at
23 all.

24 MR. LOPATKA: Nothing.

25 MR. HOOVER: They're not going to

1 come with a blank set of plans, are they?

2 MR. LOPATKA: They're coming to
3 planning, they should have a set of
4 something. Some kind of drawings. I mean,
5 I know the letter was sent by his attorney,
6 but I don't know if that resolved anything.

7 MR. NOTARI: I'm more concerned
8 about that water runoff more than anything
9 that seems to be increased since they've
10 moved the land around. Can we reach out
11 again to Jerry Styles, Dave?

12 MR. LOPATKA: I'll call him.

13 MR. NOTARI: If they don't have
14 concerns, then I'm not sure we have anything
15 that we can do at this point.

16 MR. LOPATKA: I know they had
17 concerns that it wasn't stabilized, and
18 that's probably half of the battle. I mean,
19 those weeds grew back but they don't really
20 do anything at the surface, where the water
21 runs. I'll give him a call.

22 MR. HOOVER: Just that house on Oak
23 Street. Take a peak at that. The Stocky
24 house.

25 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: They're remodeling

1 it. I stopped there.

2 MR. HOOVER: Why is the machine
3 there?

4 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I think they're
5 crushing the dumpster. They're dumping
6 everything out of the second floor, plaster
7 with the laths and everything, and just
8 crushing it.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other
10 questions for Mike? Thanks, Mike.

11 Dave Lopatka, engineer, anything for
12 the upcoming meeting or the agenda?

13 MR. LOPATKA: I do not have anything
14 for the agenda. We kind of talked. I did
15 run a number, a rough number, based off of
16 their unit cost. It would be about -- I
17 think it's, like, 5.8 or 6 percent increase
18 in overall --

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: South
20 Milwaukee?

21 MR. LOPATKA: Yeah.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: What we were
23 talking before about, South Milwaukee we're
24 paving from Main to West Morton. I drove
25 by. I thought we were paving the whole

1 thing.

2 MR. FEBBO: I didn't realize that
3 myself until I drove by it, too.

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Jimmy said
5 we're only paving there, so I asked Jimmy to
6 talk to Dave, see if we can get a cost to
7 finish it.

8 MR. LOPATKA: Marylynn, if she just
9 verifies what the total amount of the
10 increase should be.

11 MR. FEBBO: Being the hill's bad
12 itself, but the rest of the road is just as
13 bad.

14 Then the other part is how do you
15 tell people who live there we're going to do
16 here but not in front of your house? That
17 being said, do the whole road if we can
18 afford it.

19 MR. HOOVER: The reason I did it
20 that way was because I thought we'd get more
21 roads out of it. The road's not in terrible
22 shape, but if you want to do it we can do
23 it. I thought we'd be able to save some
24 money and do some other streets, but we can
25 do it. I had some complaints about the

1 pavers started milling. A couple residents
2 called me on Dunn Avenue, I met a couple of
3 them down there. They wanted me to take
4 more off the middle of the road because four
5 or five different times they just did gutter
6 milling. That's how that road got so high.
7 I called Dave, Dave called them and asked if
8 they could make another pass. They took two
9 and a half, three inches off the first time
10 in then center and they went back and took
11 another three inches off. The crown was
12 very high.

13 MR. LOPATKA: They cut that down.

14 MR. HOOVER: They took five and a
15 half, six inches off. The manhole is
16 sticking up about four inches. That manhole
17 wasn't even showing before. I think they're
18 doing well.

19 MR. NOTARI: Where are the millings
20 going? Are we keeping them?

21 MR. LOPATKA: Yeah. I had them
22 contact Joe.

23 MR. HOOVER: Joe put them down by
24 DPW someplace.

25 MR. LOPATKA: I gave the foreman

1 Joe's number.

2 MR. HOOVER: The alleyway behind
3 Dooley's, that looks good already. They did
4 Third Street.

5 MR. LOPATKA: They milled most of
6 them. The only thing I didn't see is the
7 road down next to the convenient store yet.
8 They were supposed to be doing some base
9 replacement today. I know they did the one
10 over on Kohler Avenue. Down at the bottom
11 of Kohler Avenue, too.

12 MR. NOTARI: Can you check with the
13 company tomorrow. I got some complaints
14 about they didn't finish -- Jimmy thinks
15 they're just going to sweep, tomorrow,
16 Kohler Avenue. There's, like, some clumps
17 on the road.

18 MR. HOOVER: They skipped the
19 intersection, and from the cars going by,
20 the hot stuff I told you about that they
21 didn't do and they did today, it's loose.
22 There's all loose stuff in the intersection.
23 So they just have to sweep it out before
24 they pave it.

25 MR. NOTARI: Dave, senior center?

1 MR. LOPATKA: I called -- I have to
2 call Joe. I did call Terry because Joe,
3 about three weeks ago, sent me -- they were
4 looking for a cost estimate. I talked to
5 the architect yesterday and told her please
6 get me a cost estimate and then I can start
7 hounding the county about getting this out
8 to bid. So she'll have that for me within
9 the next day or two and I will get it to
10 them and hopefully -- because they've had it
11 and I haven't heard anything on it, so I'll
12 call Joe, too, just to get an update.
13 That's, I think, one of the items that
14 they're still waiting for but I haven't
15 heard back on comments on the plans.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So we're
17 waiting to hear back from Potter?

18 MR. LOPATKA: Well, no -- well, two
19 things. Potter, she's going to get me the
20 cost estimate, but the plans that were
21 submitted to the county, the county doesn't
22 do the review. They send it to an
23 independent firm in Pittsburgh or someplace.
24 Whoever they use. They were supposed to get
25 me comments but I haven't gotten any

1 comments back yet. So that was a while ago.
2 About a month ago. So I'll call Joe just to
3 get an update on that side. In the meantime
4 I have her getting the cost estimate
5 finalized.

6 MR. FEBBO: It is exactly one year
7 that we're waiting. One year. That's a
8 long time.

9 MR. NOTARI: Storm water report?
10 Will we have any idea by the time our next
11 meeting rolls around? I asked that we have
12 some kind of idea for this meeting to
13 discuss --

14 MR. LOPATKA: So I did contact DEP
15 with regard to the updates that are coming
16 on the MS4 and he told me they're not out
17 yet, so he wouldn't share anything with me.
18 But from what I understand is they are going
19 to put the component in there for volume
20 control now, which will be -- the borough is
21 going to have to -- either you get into this
22 group and it's done as a group or you're
23 going to have to start adding basins on your
24 own to control --

25 MR. NOTARI: Which will cost us more

1 money.

2 MR. LOPATKA: It probably will be
3 pretty substantial. So my opinion is I
4 think it would be a good thing if you had
5 somebody overseeing it day to day. I can't
6 oversee it day to day. If that's out there
7 and you have a group looking at it and doing
8 all the steps that need to be done all the
9 time, then I think it would be beneficial.
10 But again, it all depends on the numbers.

11 MR. HOOVER: I think they're going
12 to be a little bit lenient if we're part of
13 that.

14 MR. LOPATKA: I think they'd be
15 quite a bit more lenient if you're a part of
16 a group.

17 MR. HOOVER: It's going to cost us
18 some money.

19 MR. LOPATKA: It's going to anyway.
20 In the long run it's probably going to cost
21 you more.

22 MR. LENCESKI: When do they need an
23 answer by?

24 MR. LOPATKA: I think they were
25 asking for an answer by, I think, the end of

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August.

MR. NOTARI: End of August. I think they said they were meeting in Taylor this week or next week.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We have to give them an answer next meeting.

MR. LOPATKA: At least sign the MOU. It's not anything that holds you to the fire but it at least gets them to the next step.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Then we'll have to discuss that.

MR. HOOVER: Dave, I got a text from Beaver. Adeline Strassick called and said they're paving her street only in front of her house. Just the intersection. She's afraid they're going to ruin the fact that drain is working good and hasn't gotten any water since they put it in. Are they going to put a crown back in the road? No, they took an inch and a half off.

MR. LOPATKA: They did not do top yet, so whatever they did was probably just scratch.

MR. HOOVER: Just an inch and a half.

1 MR. LOPATKA: They just milled it.
2 I'll talk to them about making sure they
3 taper it for the water.

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else?

5 MR. HOOVER: I talked to Kip today
6 from Leeward about Sonny Drive. He said
7 he'll have a price tomorrow. I said I need
8 a date. I'm hoping sometime in September.
9 The gas company's giving us \$80,000, we're
10 paying the difference. I think that's it.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else,
12 Dave?

13 MR. LOPATKA: No.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody else
15 have any questions for Dave? Thanks, Dave.

16 Chief Dubernas, anything for the
17 meeting or the agenda coming up?

18 CHIEF DUBERNAS: I have nothing for
19 the meeting. I'll fill you in on a couple
20 things. So I got some requests about making
21 some streets either one way or no parking on
22 one side because they like the idea of the
23 600 block of Hickory. One of the main
24 streets that they want to be addressed is
25 Edith Street from the 500, from Grace to

1 Mary. They'd like to make it a one way
2 going out. If you come from the school you
3 can go out to Mary or make it parking on one
4 side only because the street is only 26 and
5 a half feet wide. That's one of the
6 narrower streets in Old Forge.

7 MR. NOTARI: Is it the residents
8 making that request?

9 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yeah. If you ever
10 notice, sometimes Bobby, he parks his truck
11 in his front yard because if two people park
12 across the street from each other you'll
13 never get another car on that road, never
14 mind a piece of fire apparatus. So I'm
15 going to look at that.

16 I wasn't here last meeting, but that
17 Ida lady along with Gnall, Bledsoe and all
18 them regarding the property, I got some
19 information. The alleyway or the access
20 road that goes behind Ida's house and comes
21 to Rear Flower Street and Flower Street that
22 goes down to the Dunbar property, that's all
23 associated with the Dunbar property. Dunbar
24 actually has it blocked now because nobody's
25 supposed to be on it. Not even the kids. I

1 guess there was some damage done there. So
2 the only people that can be on it is all
3 them homes that are on Rear Flower Street
4 and the corner of Flower Street. They have
5 easements to be there. So it's Valerie and
6 then the middle house and then you have Ida,
7 and then Bledsoe's on the corner. We were
8 getting complaints that Bledsoe was putting
9 his truck across the road and not allowing
10 access to anywhere.

11 So when we were there Bledsoe had is
12 pickup truck across the road. He said he
13 was told he's allowed to do that. That's
14 not true.

15 MR. NOTARI: Across Flower Street?

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: From Dunbar's
17 property onto Keyser.

18 MR. LOPATKA: Dunbar owns that.

19 CHIEF DUBERNAS: That is Dunbar's
20 property. They have easements or something
21 for all those homes that are allowed to
22 access. They're not supposed to have it
23 blocked. But that Ida lady called up about
24 kids being there with the ATVs. The other
25 neighbors were calling because -- I think

1 it's Bledsoe on the corner or Gnull on the
2 corner was blocking with their pickup truck.
3 I finally got who owns what there, but try
4 to address it.

5 But the front of the property, I'm
6 not sure what the survey and everything is.

7 MR. LOPATKA: I have it. The
8 pavement tends to stray outside the
9 right-of-way in front of that lady's
10 property. So there is a paper street that
11 goes through there --

12 CHIEF DUBERNAS: There's also a
13 paper street that intersects there.

14 MR. LOPATKA: That's beyond her
15 property. So there's hedges on the one
16 side, and then I think it's 25 or 40 feet
17 over is where her property line goes.
18 There's a strip there that she doesn't own
19 that she probably thinks is part of her
20 front lawn, but it's technically not. It's
21 technically a part of this paper street.

22 So according to Bill, Bill said that
23 any people on either side of the road above
24 that paper alley technically have access to
25 that paper alley. Now, the other people on

1 Flower Street, like Bledsoe and some of the
2 other people, technically don't have access
3 to that.

4 CHIEF DUBERNAS: I was told there's
5 three or four, that they have access on that
6 dirt road so they can gain access to the
7 back of their property.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: There's, like,
9 mounds of dirt but it's past -- if they did
10 have easements they could still use that. I
11 saw that.

12 MR. LOPATKA: But the bottom line is
13 I don't know who paved the street or when it
14 was paved, but the street strays off of the
15 center of the right-of-way.

16 MR. NOTARI: Talking about Rear
17 Flower, now.

18 MR. LOPATKA: Her property line is
19 basically in the center of the pavement, but
20 the pavement's on her property. It's even
21 on the property next door to hers.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: The neighbors are
23 all fighting, and two of the neighbors keep
24 coming here basically demanding some
25 answers. We didn't have an answer. Then

1 the neighbors and the Mentzes are in
2 constant war and then there's kids involved.
3 So myself, Jason, Dave, Bill, we're trying
4 to come up with some sort of plan for this.
5 Trying to figure out what is what so if the
6 Mentzes are wrong, then they need to stop.
7 But the people who seem to want to use it
8 the most are Gnall and Bledsoe and they
9 don't live on this --

10 MR. LOPATKA: They wouldn't have
11 access.

12 MR. NOTARI: Since you're now saying
13 that that paper road is not borough
14 property -- or Bill is saying that -- and
15 it's the property of the people who live
16 there should the borough put a barricade up
17 at the end of Rear Flower Street so nobody
18 can access that property? Also, should we
19 put a barricade up at the end of Flower
20 Street so nobody can access Mr. Dunbar's
21 property?

22 MR. LOPATKA: That's a legal
23 question.

24 MR. NOTARI: I guess it's a question
25 for Bill.

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CHIEF DUBERNAS: A concrete barrier or something.

MR. NOTARI: Right, so the street ends. They can be wood or something.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I actually drove there so that I could understand it, and I'm turning down the road, and it's really tight, and I attempted to make the left to go up the little hill onto Keyser Avenue. That's where there was a black pickup truck blocking the road.

MR. NOTARI: Why don't we ask Bill more questions about barricades.

MR. LOPATKA: Technically the people who live on this road could walk down that right-of-way. What she thinks is her front lawn technically isn't. It's within that paper street.

MR. FEBBO: Get it surveyed.

MR. LOPATKA: We did. She's correct in the fact that her corner is in the middle of the road, but the road itself, the pavement itself isn't in the center of the right-of-way. So if it was, then her corner wouldn't be in the road, but it is.

1 MR. NOTARI: Going off past info on
2 paper roads, you have the middle of the
3 paper road. Her front lawn is in that
4 alley.

5 MR. FEBBO: We had it surveyed?

6 MR. NOTARI: We had to get answers
7 if she's right or not. She wasn't.

8 MR. FEBBO: So people still have
9 access to the parking lot. They still have
10 use to Sibley Avenue.

11 MR. LOPATKA: Well, yeah, and that's
12 more of a Bill question.

13 MR. NOTARI: He's going to say paper
14 alley and the properties that abut that
15 paper alley are the ones that have access to
16 it.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The other
18 piece would be from George's.

19 MR. FEBBO: No, the other road that
20 comes in.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other
22 items, Dave?

23 MR. LOPATKA: No.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Chief, any
25 other items for you?

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CHIEF DUBERNAS: No.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any questions for the chief? The only question I have is Edith possibly -- the neighbors are asking to make it a one way going south? Like, pulling out Mary, straight across?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: You would come up Grace, turn left, force all the cars to go out to Mary Street.

MR. FEBBO: No parking one side or just a one way street?

MR. NOTARI: I think regardless it has to be parking on one side.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: You can park both sides but they all have to face out if it's one way. That's going to be a tough one there. So many residents have so many cars.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If we put it on one side I don't think they're going to fit.

MS. BARTOLETTI: That's part of the problem having traffic both ways, because when there's cars here and cars here and two cars trying to pass.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: That's if they're

1 both on side of the road. Cars can only go
2 one way. They don't have to worry about
3 oncoming traffic.

4 MR. NOTARI: Do we have that same
5 problem on George Street, too?

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: George is a little
7 wider.

8 MR. FEBBO: If we make that a one
9 way street, parking on both sides can fire
10 trucks get down there?

11 MR. STULL: If you make parking on
12 one side, yes. Right now Grace Street is
13 tight. Even if you make it one way --

14 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Edith.

15 MR. STULL: Edith Street and George
16 Street. They're all tight.

17 MR. FEBBO: Even if it's one way,
18 parking on both sides, that still doesn't
19 help you.

20 MR. STULL: No. We can get through
21 but it's going to be real tight.

22 CHIEF DUBERNAS: We had that issue
23 on Church Street with that fire.

24 MR. FEBBO: So we still have a
25 problem. A safety problem.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If the fire
2 truck can't make it down there.

3 MR. STULL: It's real, real tight.
4 I know George is, Edith is.

5 CHIEF DUBERNAS: West Mary, too.

6 MR. FEBBO: You two guys get
7 together, take a look at that and come up
8 with suggestions on that.

9 MR. NOTARI: West Mary where?

10 CHIEF DUBERNAS: West Morton. They
11 said they have an issue when cars park on
12 that hill there.

13 MR. HOOVER: Can we park them at an
14 angle on one side?

15 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Diagonal parking?
16 One way diagonal parking?

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Let's look at
18 that, see if you can do it on the angle.
19 Then at least we don't take a lot of spots
20 away from them.

21 MR. STULL: We're no wider than the
22 recycling truck. Our biggest problem is the
23 outriggers.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Take a look.
25 If they were angled you could get those out

1 if parking was on one side and you bring the
2 truck down on the other side?

3 MR. STULL: You get a pickup truck,
4 crew cab, eight foot box on it, how long is
5 that? Got to be close to 18. So even if
6 you park it -- how wide is the road now?

7 CHIEF DUBERNAS: It's 26 and
8 something.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Let's look at
10 it both ways.

11 CHIEF DUBERNAS: That's it.

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
13 any questions for the chief? Thank you,
14 Chief. Marylynn?

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: So I would like to
16 try maybe to do something for the next
17 meeting about the backhoe. Everyone knows
18 the backhoe burned and it was almost 25
19 years old. The insurance company is giving
20 us \$19,000 for it, but new ones are quite a
21 bit more, obviously, than what was the
22 original cost when it was purchased way back
23 when.

24 We can attempt to do a grant on it.
25 The DPW uses it every week, basically.

1 That's what they load the yard waste and all
2 that stuff with. So if it's something we
3 wanted to try to move on, then we need to
4 discuss whether we want to do finance or
5 take some money from the SL account to
6 supplement what we don't get from the
7 insurance company.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do we have any
9 prices on new ones?

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: Oh, up to \$90,000.

11 MR. FEBBO: New or used?

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: New. I think this
13 one was purchased new and it lasted 25
14 years. So if we'd be so lucky to buy a new
15 one and have it last that long again that
16 would work out really well.

17 MR. FEBBO: You get prices? Is it
18 \$90,000?

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: We have several
20 different ones, yes. Some that are lower.
21 They just aren't as fancy. But the one
22 thing that we are changing, the one we have
23 now is not a four-wheel drive. We
24 definitely want one that's four-wheel drive.
25 That was one thing.

1 The other thing is recycling. So in
2 the past we used to make money on recycling,
3 and obviously over the past few years that
4 has disappeared. The company that we used
5 to take all of our recycling to started out
6 as Cartage and was changed to County Waste,
7 which was then sold to GFL, which was now
8 sold again to a company called Southfield.

9 So each time it changes they become
10 a little more difficult to use and they
11 become a little more expense. So Joe and
12 myself have been trying to find different
13 options, and one of the options that we've
14 come up with is going to Solomon, who is
15 back to a little company. We have been
16 taking some of our newspaper and cardboard
17 there and we actually do get a check from
18 them. We do get some money back which we
19 save on recycling.

20 I think it might be in our best
21 interest to change back to a company like
22 that, not a company that you're constantly
23 getting phone calls saying that our accounts
24 are past due, but the problem is this part
25 of your account was -- went with Cartage,

1 then this part is GFL, this part is County
2 waste. So I'm thinking Solomon might be the
3 best way to go. I'll have more information
4 at the next meeting and maybe at the
5 September meeting we can finalize it.

6 MR. NOTARI: A contract?

7 MS. BARTOLETTI: We have no contract
8 right now with any of these companies. The
9 contract expired, and with all the changes
10 and Covid and all that stuff we just never
11 entered into any type of agreement with
12 anyone. We go month to month. At this
13 point with GFL, which obviously just changed
14 over again, there wasn't really any type of
15 contract. It was just this is what we do.

16 MR. FEBBO: So in your opinion, if
17 we continue with this company that you're
18 dealing with right now it's not only a pain
19 in the butt, but time-wise for you guys in
20 the office --

21 MS. BARTOLETTI: It's a huge
22 company. They have departments all over the
23 place, and when you talk to somebody on
24 their accounting department today you may
25 never talk to that person again. It's

1 whoever answers the phone. They're really
2 all over the place. It's huge.

3 MR. FEBBO: So if we went with
4 Solomon that would be eliminated not only in
5 terms of the recycling being picked up but
6 also the clerical work and office work
7 required to keep up with it.

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: It is different.
9 It's just hard with a company that just
10 keeps getting sold and bought out and
11 changing hands. It's become very difficult.
12 Joe and I have been working on it several
13 months and we get to a point and then
14 there's another change and then we start all
15 over again and it's another change. So I
16 really do think it's in the best interest of
17 us to definitely look into changing.

18 MR. FEBBO: Tell us what makes it
19 easier for you.

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: I'm looking at
21 what's best for the borough so we can make a
22 few dollars. Right now we're paying
23 thousands of dollars a month for recycling,
24 and when you think about the big picture we
25 are demanded by DEP to recycle. It's

1 costing us thousand of dollars a month to
2 get rid of recycling when we used to get
3 paid.

4 MR. HOOVER: It was a pain in the
5 butt to go with the other companies because
6 they keep changing. Go with the local guy.

7 MS. BARTOLETTI: And realistically,
8 after everything happened with Covid and
9 with the change and with the world recycling
10 doesn't have the value it used to. So it's
11 basically more garbage. So one of the
12 recycling places that or guys bring some of
13 the stuff to they actually had a fire, and
14 what they would do is, because they weren't
15 functioning they would just take the stuff
16 and dump it anyway. So we're really paying
17 for the stuff to go into a landfill. It
18 makes no sense. At the next meeting when I
19 give you my financial report I can tell you
20 what we paid this year. It's a large
21 figure.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do you want to
23 give Solomon a try?

24 MR. FEBBO: Let her check it out.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else?

1 MS. BARTOLETTI: No.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
3 any questions for Marylynn?

4 MR. NOTARI: Can we put the
5 broadband agreement on the agenda for next
6 month or two weeks?

7 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. I'm glad you
8 brought it up.

9 MR. NOTARI: The secondary internet
10 company. They came in and gave a
11 presentation. It helps our residents. It
12 doesn't do anything for us. Might give us
13 another option for the internet here at the
14 borough. I believe they just wanted our
15 permission.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody else
17 have any questions for Marylynn? Thanks,
18 Mare.

19 Assistant Fire Chief Bill Stull,
20 anything for the meeting or the agenda?

21 MR. STULL: The only thing I have is
22 at the last work session you guys asked for
23 a document from all three fire departments
24 for the firefighters. I'm working with Bill
25 Rinaldi on that, so it's in his hands right

1 now. He's going to draft up a letter.

2 MR. FEBBO: Target date still
3 September?

4 MR. STULL: Not going to happen now.
5 Once we get the okay we still have to put
6 out applications and then do all the
7 interviews. I want to make sure we got the
8 blessing from council.

9 MR. FEBBO: You handle that on your
10 schedule, not ours.

11 MR. STULL: We'll take care of all
12 that.

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any questions
14 for Bill? Thank you, Bill. Anyone from the
15 public?

16 CHIEF DUBERNAS: No.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We'll go down
18 the table, see if anyone has anything to add
19 before we adjourn. Mayor Legg?

20 MAYOR LEGG: I just want to thank
21 Jimmy and council for paving that alley by
22 Doctor Dunay's office. When I was coming
23 here, people are so appreciative they were
24 throwing roses at my feet.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I drove through

1 there because when they called for my mother
2 today I was trying to get their fast and I
3 cut through the one side and all the
4 neighbors were lined in the alleyway. The
5 one lady saw me and she stopped me and said
6 oh, my God, tell council I said thank you
7 very much. There must have been 20
8 neighbors lined up the whole way, watching.
9 You're right, they were, like, cheering.
10 That's all.

11 MR. FEBBO: Two things. Grants.
12 Sam, he's been working with myself and
13 Beaver on two grants. One for the church
14 and one for the river. I think it's time
15 all council gets involved with the project.

16 Also, Mare, I'd like bring him in to
17 meet with you because he needs some numbers
18 or something to apply for grants. I'd like
19 to have him come in and meet with you and
20 all council get together so we're all on the
21 same page with that. There's grants out
22 there. Let's make it easier for everybody.
23 Instead use Sam, which we are not doing. We
24 voted on it and we talked about it but we're
25 still not making any headway.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do you want to
2 ask him to come to a meeting or do you want
3 to have a meeting with him?

4 MR. FEBBO: You first, Mare. The
5 other thing is where is our clock? When are
6 we going to get a clock out front?

7 MS. BARTOLETTI: When we figure out
8 how we're going to pay for it, where it's
9 going to go, that kind of stuff.

10 MR. FEBBO: I thought we had that
11 budgeted?

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: No.

13 MR. FEBBO: So we need to raise
14 funds for it?

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Well, there was
16 talk about asking for donations. There were
17 several different ideas but there was never
18 a final decision on it. I have a file full
19 off stuff on the clock in my office. Where
20 we were stuck is exactly where we were going
21 to put it. Were we going to move some of
22 the items that are outside now, but no
23 decision was made on that. So if you guys
24 come together and you want to decide some of
25 those things.

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MR. FEBBO: There's spots that we were thinking about that are not finalized. Point A or point B based on the engineer's studies?

MR. HOOVER: How much is the clock?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Thirty-five thousand. That's the basic one.

MR. LOPATKA: We did stub out -- there is a conduit for it somewhere out in front. We just stubbed something out of the building.

MR. FEBBO: I think we'll leave that up to you and Dave to decide a location for it.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Go outside, go across the street and look at the building.

MR. FEBBO: What about the veteran's monument out there that's falling apart? What are we going to do with that?

MS. BARTOLETTI: That's another thing. We talked about it but nobody's doing anything about it. We've gone through a lot of stuff the past couple years doing the building and the senior center and stuff. You talked about doing a wall. You

1 talked about taking that down, taking all
2 the names and making different layers and
3 stuff like that but we didn't follow up with
4 it. If we can come up with something let me
5 know. That's kind of above and beyond --

6 MR. NOTARI: I think we need to get
7 the senior center done first or make it part
8 of that project.

9 MR. FEBBO: Is it possible to make
10 it a one wall thing, a wrap around wall?

11 MR. LOPATKA: I'm sure you probably
12 could, yeah. You could probably put some
13 kind of a half-circle wall and just make it
14 bigger.

15 MR. HOOVER: A lot of names for a
16 half-circle.

17 MAYOR LEGG: I don't think you
18 should touch that veteran's memorial. I
19 really don't.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If we're going
21 to do anything to that -- change it, alter
22 it, remodel it, fix it -- is it up to us
23 solely or do we have to contact the veterans
24 and let them know what we're doing, what our
25 intentions are?

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MS. BARTOLETTI: The people whose names are on there paid for their bricks, but it was a project that was done -- it started before I came here. It was done by some of the names that are on there. So it wasn't really done by the veterans.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I don't want to go out of protocol. I don't want to disrespect them in any way. I want to make sure --

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Mayor Turquato and Councilman Scarnato.

MR. NOTARI: I'd like them and Dave to be involved. They're the ones who put it up.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I just want to make sure we do it the right way.

MR. FEBBO: Dave, could you take a look at that and come up with some rough ideas as to the best ways to utilize all the space and at the same time give it visibility and character?

MR. LOPATKA: Yeah. It is set back. It's hard to see unless you're coming this way.

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MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Lou, I think the way you said it.

MR. NOTARI: Is it an eyesore? How high is he making it? Even if it's six feet high, you're traveling north you're going to see the back of a wall.

MR. FEBBO: If you're not going -- I'm not saying we go all the way out to the street and block the visibility of cars coming up.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Keep it more closer to the steps. I'm going to take a look at it after the meeting.

MR. FEBBO: Sometimes we get in a stagnant area with different things. People ask me about it or, I'm sure, everybody. We don't have answers. We've been talking about that for a long time, the clock. A lot of people ask me where's our clock. Like we had that Doctor Marmo guy that wants to come in here and name the park.

MS. BARTOLETTI: One of the other things we discussed is taking that machine gun from in front of the building and seeing if we can relocate it at the football field,

1 since it's Veterans Stadium.

2 MR. NOTARI: I'd rather put it at
3 Miles Street Park. The stadium's open five
4 nights a year.

5 MAYOR LEGG: It's still Veterans
6 Stadium.

7 MR. NOTARI: It is, but, again
8 nobody's going to see it, the kids will be
9 hanging on it, playing on it.

10 MR. FEBBO: Again, food for thought
11 for everybody. If we all come up with
12 different ideas. Put your own thinking caps
13 on. If you guys have something from the
14 public that you think would be beneficial to
15 us we're all open to it. We all love
16 hearing public input. It is, after all, the
17 community building and everything else.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Councilman
19 Notari?

20 MR. NOTARI: I have nothing.

21 MR. HOOVER: Couple people in my
22 neighborhood that have asked me if we can
23 get a pickleball court somewhere in Old
24 Forge. I went to Marion Street Park.
25 There's two tennis courts. One is being

1 used and one isn't. I happened to look at
2 the one that isn't being used. There's no
3 net and people have masking tape down for
4 pickleball.

5 MR. LOPATKA: You can put two on one
6 tennis court.

7 MR. HOOVER: They're using that once
8 in a while. They go to Scranton to play
9 twice a week. I thought that maybe we can
10 use those two courts for two pickleball
11 courts. Put nets in and paint.

12 MR. NOTARI: Joe should be able to
13 do that.

14 MR. LOPATKA: I'll take a look at
15 the size.

16 MR. NOTARI: How about the
17 racquetball courts at Miles Street?

18 MR. LOPATKA: Might be the right
19 size.

20 MR. HOOVER: Dave, look at that.

21 MR. FEBBO: Put that on the agenda?

22 MR. HOOVER: Just do it. The second
23 thing is anybody else get calls about
24 Mascaro? There's a gentleman two houses
25 from me that put a chair out with five

1 stickers on it. A regular chair. It was
2 there three weeks before they took it. I
3 finally had to tell them. I stood outside
4 and I said there's a chair up there three
5 weeks. He said I was here last week and
6 didn't see it. They took his garbage right
7 next to it.

8 MR. NOTARI: Once in a while I get
9 the same type of call. I put three stickers
10 on it, they didn't take it.

11 MR. HOOVER: There's a house on
12 Eight Street, there's ten bags I counted
13 driving by, they all have stickers on them
14 and not one was taken.

15 MR. FEBBO: Did we get complaints
16 about the truck dropping juice all over the
17 road?

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: We had one truck
19 that sprayed paint of some sort all over a
20 car, then we had one that had kitty litter
21 all over Edith Street. There was another
22 one, I can't remember what it was, but they
23 complained about the gook coming out.
24 Mascaro said it's not the truck, it's what
25 the people are putting in. It squeezes and

1 all the junk comes out. They said people
2 are blaming it on the trucks. It's not the
3 trucks. The trucks are doing their job.
4 It's what the people are putting in the
5 bags.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Sam usually
7 gets right on them.

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: How does it become
9 their responsibility?

10 MR. FEBBO: They don't know what's
11 in the bags.

12 MR. NOTARI: They can also smash the
13 trash where they're not next to traffic.

14 MR. HOOVER: Last thing is there's
15 weeds at the curb on a lot of the streets.
16 Who is going to cut those weeds down? Some
17 of them are two feet high. Albion Street is
18 a mess.

19 MR. NOTARI: Is that the homeowner's
20 responsibility?

21 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The property
23 owners.

24 MR. FEBBO: Mike's overtaxed. We
25 talked about getting him help in the office.

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Anybody have any ideas --

MR. HOOVER: We already voted to put an ad in the paper. We have to talk about how we're going to word that.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Maybe personnel.

MR. HOOVER: Monday's good for you?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Whenever you want. That's it? I have no items.

So with that, the chair would entertain a motion to adjourn.

MR. NOTARI: Motion.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: By Councilman Notari. All in favor?

(Unanimous. Meeting adjourned.)
