1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Good evening,  
2 ladies and gentlemen. I'd like to call the  
3 meeting to order with the Pledge of  
4 Allegiance.

5 (The Pledge of Allegiance was  
6 recited.)

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Roll call,  
8 please, Marylynn.

9 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman  
10 Mikolaczyk?

11 MR. MIKOLACZYK: Here.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman  
13 McCawley?

14 MS. MCCAWLEY: Here.

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman  
16 Komensky?

17 MR. KOMENSKY: Here.

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Lettieri  
19 is absent. Councilman Butler?

20 MR. BUTLER: Here.

21 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

22 MR. HOOVER: Present.

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Here. Once  
25 again, ladies and gentlemen, welcome to the

1 work session of Old Forge Borough. Tonight  
2 is Tuesday, August 5, 2025. The purpose of  
3 our meeting will be to set the agenda for  
4 our regular meeting, which will be Tuesday,  
5 August 19, 2025. We will hear from our  
6 department heads, we'll hear from our chief  
7 of police, and we'll go down the table and  
8 hear from our mayor, council members,  
9 borough manager and solicitor.

10 There is a public sign-in sheet. If  
11 anyone from the public would like to address  
12 us we'll give you a few moments at the end.

13 With that said, we're going to move  
14 into our first department head. Our DPW  
15 manager, Joseph Lenceski, is absent, so  
16 we'll move to our code enforcement/zoning  
17 officer, Mike Sokolowski. Mike, good  
18 evening. Anything for the meeting tonight  
19 or for the upcoming agenda?

20 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: A couple things for  
21 tonight. The property behind Arcaro &  
22 Genell's, I got a couple pictures that they  
23 sent. As far as the garbage, there is an  
24 ordinance that they're supposed to have  
25 their garbage picked up and recycling by

1 themselves, not as far as the borough. So  
2 that I'm going to send to him.

3 And as far as the lighting that  
4 reflects from their building to the church  
5 building, I'm going to look into that also.  
6 I'm working on that right now.

7 I had a lot of complaints, too,  
8 about the car in the yard behind Salerno's,  
9 on First Street. Talarico's yard. I don't  
10 know if everybody's familiar with that.

11 MAYOR LEGG: The Volkswagon?

12 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes. He was  
13 supposed to come here tonight. He didn't  
14 show up. Multiple calls on this for him to  
15 get rid of that. He was supposed to come  
16 tonight. He didn't show up.

17 MR. BUTLER: Flower pot.

18 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: That's what he's  
19 saying. Planter, lawn art. Whatever you  
20 want to call it.

21 MR. BUTLER: People complained about  
22 this?

23 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mike, we'll  
25 have to look into it. Does it have an

1 engine or anything in it?

2 MR. BUTLER: No.

3 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: It's full of dirt.

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So it doesn't  
5 have an engine, a gasoline tank, no wiring?

6 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Nothing.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So it's just a  
8 shell?

9 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: It's a shell. They  
10 filled it with dirt.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So it's  
12 like --

13 MR. BUTLER: Decoration.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So there's  
15 nothing dangerous in it? Fluids?

16 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: No.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: And it's  
18 filled with what?

19 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Dirt, plants.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Rocks. So  
21 it's just like a planter.

22 MR. BUTLER: Planter car.

23 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: But I've had calls  
24 on it saying that it's --

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bill, I've

1           only seen -- if you drive through the  
2           country they're all over the place. Is it,  
3           like, allowed there or is there an ordinance  
4           that supports it or doesn't go against it?

5                    ATTY. RINALDI: It depends on how he  
6           wants to interpret it.

7                    MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mike, did you  
8           look through the ordinances?

9                    MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yeah.

10                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Does it fall  
11           under abandoned vehicle?

12                   MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yeah, well, it's  
13           not licensed, it's not registered, but  
14           honestly that's where I left it. I don't  
15           know how to interpret the rest of the --

16                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Did you look  
17           into any other surrounding communities? For  
18           instance, if you go out to the country,  
19           like, maybe somewhere in Luzerne, Mountain  
20           Top, Snake Road, Coxtan Road, up that way to  
21           see what their ordinance is on these? Did  
22           you do any of that?

23                   MR. SOKOLOWSKI: No.

24                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm going to  
25           look into it, too. This is the first I'm

1 hearing about it when you showed it to us.  
2 Maybe if there's something that we can go  
3 off of from what they have. Also, we have  
4 to use what we have. But I'm just saying to  
5 find some type of another --

6 MR. HOOVER: What's stopping anybody  
7 from putting a car in their front yard?  
8 These people are doing it. It's abandoned.

9 MS. BARTOLETTI: Jay, when you look  
10 up abandoned vehicle as the police chief  
11 what makes it abandoned?

12 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Not registered in  
13 the state of Pennsylvania.

14 MR. HOOVER: Right around the corner  
15 we're having problems with Caputo. He's  
16 going crazy getting all his cars registered  
17 so they can sit there. They have motors,  
18 they have --

19 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Technically  
20 Caputo's run.

21 MR. HOOVER: This doesn't. It's a  
22 piece of metal.

23 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Or a piece of farm  
24 equipment, old hay wagons that people  
25 decorate in the fall with pumpkins and corn

1 stalks. I don't know. It's a shell of --

2 MR. HOOVER: What does our ordinance  
3 say? Is it in our ordinance?

4 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Not for something  
5 like that. It's for a car that's not  
6 registered and not licensed, not inspected.

7 MR. HOOVER: Abandoned car.

8 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Is it?

9 MR. BUTLER: Technically it's not  
10 abandoned because it doesn't run.

11 MR. HOOVER: It doesn't run. If it  
12 ran --

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: This is going  
14 to be a trick question. Chief, if this car  
15 had an engine, a gasoline tank, it was  
16 registered and inspected could it sit in his  
17 yard with all the dirt, plants and rocks in  
18 it?

19 CHIEF DUBERNAS: If it's registered  
20 and titled by the state, yeah, but --

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If you have a  
22 registered vehicle, licensed and insured  
23 could you fill it up with dirt on your lawn?

24 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Look what Mr.  
25 Caputo's doing. He's registering the cars

1 just so they can sit there.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm saying  
3 he'd be able to just park it and throw dirt  
4 in it if he wants. It's his car. If that's  
5 what you want to do to it.

6 CHIEF DUBERNAS: That's what  
7 Mr. Caputo's doing. He's registering all  
8 his cars and he's allowed to keep them on  
9 his property.

10 MR. BUTLER: I'd have a bigger issue  
11 with a car that has a gas tank with gas in  
12 it as opposed to something like this. It's  
13 more like a yard decoration than anything  
14 else.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yeah, I would  
16 consider that, too.

17 CHIEF DUBERNAS: The question is  
18 why?

19 MR. KOMENSKY: What were the  
20 complaints?

21 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: People just saying  
22 why is this car in the middle of his yard?  
23 Abandoned car in the yard.

24 MR. BUTLER: Technically it's not  
25 really abandoned because it doesn't run.

1 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Ornamental  
2 decoration.

3 MR. BUTLER: Like Jason said, I've  
4 seen a lot of people with tractors and stuff  
5 in their yards that they decorate. There's  
6 a tractor on East Morton Street for that  
7 matter. It's sitting in some guy's yard.

8 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Farm tractor.

9 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Ornamental  
10 decoration.

11 MR. BUTLER: Because it's really  
12 old.

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: There's a  
14 tractor on East Morton Street?

15 MR. BUTLER: Not, like, on the road  
16 but it's in somebody's yard.

17 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Right as you come  
18 out of Alirosa Lane. The first left, look  
19 right across.

20 MR. BUTLER: The people that had the  
21 ducks and chickens.

22 MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: Is it mobile?

23 CHIEF DUBERNAS: I don't think so.  
24 He put Christmas lights on it, Halloween  
25 lights, 4th of July, red, white and blue

1 it's lit up.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So is that an  
3 abandoned vehicle?

4 CHIEF DUBERNAS: It's farm  
5 equipment. You don't register farm  
6 equipment.

7 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: A tractor, lawn  
8 tractors.

9 MR. BUTLER: Like electric bikes  
10 with no license. Those people are out of  
11 control. They're all over the place. They  
12 don't stop for stop signs, nothing because  
13 they're technically not a vehicle.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Why don't we  
15 look and see what other towns have as  
16 ordinances.

17 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I'll call.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm just  
19 saying just get an idea.

20 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I don't know if  
21 it's considered a vehicle that's abandoned.  
22 Jay said it doesn't have an engine.

23 ATTY. RINALDI: You can look at 189  
24 and 247 and make a determination.

25 MS. BARTOLETTI: You guys have not

1 had any comments on it, council members?  
2 I've had so many. People are, like, what is  
3 that? Why is it there? How could that be  
4 allowed? I can't believe that none of you  
5 have been bothered by it.

6 ATTY. RINALDI: And 229, too.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So 189 and 247  
8 and 229?

9 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Look at the borough  
10 code under rubbish. It's rusted and  
11 everything.

12 MR. KOMENSKY: That's the bigger  
13 problem, people complaining.

14 MR. BUTLER: I don't know how you're  
15 going to keep rust off.

16 MS. MCCAWLEY: "Junk vehicle:  
17 Rusted or jagged metal or protruding from  
18 the body of vehicle, broken glass or  
19 windows, leaking any fluids, storage or  
20 placement of vehicle on concrete blocks or  
21 similar, harboring rodents, insects or other  
22 pests."

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mike, let's  
24 look at those three the solicitor just asked  
25 you to look at, then if you could -- I'm

1 going to also try and find one, too, and see  
2 if you can see some from neighboring  
3 boroughs, what they do or how they handle  
4 it.

5 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: All right.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else?

7 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: That's it.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any members  
9 have any questions for Mike?

10 MR. KOMENSKY: Could you update us  
11 on Amity?

12 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes. Two weeks ago  
13 they were there and they cleaned out  
14 whatever they had there as far as the feces  
15 and all that. The demo for the rest, the  
16 lady, she went in for surgery. She has  
17 breast cancer. She went in this past week.  
18 They're going to start demo on the  
19 structural part of the house. The  
20 sheetrock, flooring.

21 As far as getting rid of all of the  
22 waste, I called the landfill. It's not a  
23 problem. It's not considered hazardous  
24 waste. So John, I talked to him. He said  
25 it's not a problem. Any construction waste

1 or that waste is not hazardous. They said a  
2 couple weeks they'll start on the rest of  
3 it.

4 MR. HOOVER: Who's telling them what  
5 to do on the inside?

6 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: It's up to them. I  
7 mean, ripping out whatever.

8 MS. MCCAWLEY: They hire a  
9 contractor or anything?

10 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: No. She said she  
11 can't work. Financially they can't have it.

12 MR. HOOVER: What I'm getting at is  
13 how do they know what walls or if they have  
14 to rip any walls down or doors of anything  
15 like that? They did take some doors off.

16 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: They did.

17 MR. HOOVER: But if there's  
18 something that has to be done --

19 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Once they rip all  
20 the sheetrock out and the flooring and  
21 everything myself, Bill, Joe Supulski, I'll  
22 take someone with me to do an inspection.  
23 Once it's ripped out. Once they clean up  
24 whatever they have to do and take out  
25 whatever's damaged, then we will go in and

1 say hey, we'll know what rest has to come  
2 out.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other  
4 members have any questions for Mike?

5 MR. MIKOLACZYK: Dave Snyder at the  
6 Taylor post office, he lives on Clark  
7 Street. There is an abandoned mobile home  
8 with a collapsed landing gear, flat tires,  
9 and it's spray painted abandoned. That's  
10 the dead end section of Clark.

11 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: We have that.

12 MR. MIKOLACZYK: Also the blighted  
13 property at Railroad and Marion. That's  
14 with all the garbage on the side. Right  
15 next to Railroad Street that runs parallel  
16 to Old Forge High School.

17 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I know.

18 MR. MIKOLACZYK: Are we going to do  
19 something?

20 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: That's the one on  
21 the corner. I've been there a dozen times  
22 already. I cite them, I call them. They  
23 live in New York, the owners. Then they  
24 send somebody to clean up. But it's a  
25 constant battle.

1 MR. MIKOLACZYK: Two different  
2 people in two different weeks -- of course,  
3 I'm the target now. But this is an  
4 interesting question. Two different people  
5 in two different weeks asked -- they're the  
6 owners of a fully paid residential house in  
7 Old Forge. They own a home. One's going to  
8 be out of the country, the other's going to  
9 be out of the state for months at a time.

10 Is it legal in this town for them to  
11 operate an Airbnb while they're gone?  
12 They'd have to sublet the thing.

13 MR. BUTLER: You need a license to  
14 do that. I don't think you can just say  
15 rent my house.

16 MR. MIKOLACZYK: This is long term.  
17 I was wondering if there's, like, a sublet  
18 clause. They do it in some smaller towns.  
19 Third party, like a rental, long term. So  
20 we say no on that. Right?

21 MR. BUTLER: Well, I guess we can  
22 look into it first. I don't know what  
23 exactly is the stipulation.

24 MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: Airbnbs in the  
25 borough of Old Forge are only allowed in

1 commercial zoned areas.

2 MR. MIKOLACZYK: Is that right?

3 MS. BARTOLETTI: I think that was  
4 something that's being updated in our zoning  
5 that we're working on that has not  
6 technically been updated yet.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm going to  
8 go on the record and say there's probably a  
9 few in this town that are not being followed  
10 correctly. They're operating in residential  
11 neighborhoods. They're not allowed -- we  
12 already looked into it. That's on the table  
13 with our landlord rental. It's not allowed  
14 in a residential neighborhood.

15 MR. MIKOLACZYK: It's not allowed in  
16 a residential area.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Residential  
18 zone.

19 MR. MIKOLACZYK: So that's a  
20 commercial type of transaction.

21 MR. BUTLER: Like a hotel.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You have to be  
23 in a commercial zone.

24 MR. MIKOLACZYK: It's a great  
25 question from two people. They just wanted

1 to know. So it's better to have them ask  
2 than just to do it.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We definitely  
4 have to look into that and get on top of it  
5 because they are in town.

6 MR. BUTLER: Mike just asked,  
7 whatever we were talking about, this lady on  
8 Ripple Street. Can we give her a warning or  
9 something that she has to knock this house  
10 down?

11 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: They have a demo.  
12 They applied for it. He said a couple  
13 weeks. Actually they're going to build a  
14 house on that property. They have the  
15 permits. They're sitting here two years.  
16 He applied for the demo permit, so couple  
17 weeks.

18 MR. BUTLER: The other thing was --  
19 and it pertains to everybody in this room.  
20 Please do something with Stocky. Please.  
21 Get a judge's something. Something. I'm  
22 tired of getting phone calls, I'm tired of  
23 getting videos. It's ridiculous already.  
24 The guy is doing stuff down there he  
25 shouldn't be doing. It can't be that hard

1 to stop him. It's absolutely insane. We're  
2 just letting it go. There's got to be  
3 something we can do. We have a judge's  
4 decree.

5 MR. MIKOLACZYK: I'm getting the  
6 videos now all times of day saying there's  
7 hammering, banging, welding.

8 MR. BUTLER: It's not exactly  
9 there's a machine running. If there's a  
10 machine running that's a different story.  
11 Somebody's down there. Maybe they're buying  
12 one or whatever. But he's still got the  
13 tires there, he's still got engine parts  
14 there, he's still got this and that there.  
15 Come on, what are we doing here?

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mike said he  
17 was there.

18 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I was there last  
19 week.

20 MR. BUTLER: I was on the phone the  
21 other day for two hours. It's not only her.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mike, you said  
23 you were there?

24 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I was there last  
25 week twice. Joe Lenceski and I were there

1 the second time. I have a report here of  
2 what I saw, what was going on. I'm just  
3 about finished up with it. I'll send it to  
4 Bill and hopefully we'll get it to the  
5 judge.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Did you find  
7 violations?

8 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So you have  
10 the report. You went there last week and  
11 found additional violations or more current  
12 violations?

13 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Current. What he  
14 said he'd clean up he did not. He moved  
15 stuff around, he organized. It's clean --

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So you went  
17 there, you documented it, you're going to  
18 put it all together?

19 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes, I'm working on  
20 it.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So you're going  
22 to give it to Bill?

23 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes. I'll get it  
24 all finalized, exactly what I have. I have  
25 pictures.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You obviously  
2 made him aware of it -- not Bill, Stocky.  
3 You made him aware of it?

4 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Is there  
6 anything out of the violations that you  
7 found that you could fine him for now or  
8 stop him or shut him down for? I don't mean  
9 the whole operation, I mean stop him from  
10 what he's doing with these.

11 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: The way I look at  
12 it, every time I go there they're working on  
13 equipment in the furthest back part of the  
14 property which is closest to the neighbors'  
15 houses. I said why can't you work --

16 MR. HOOVER: On Pagnotti's property?

17 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Gilchrist. I said  
18 why can't you work up in front, all the way  
19 up in front where there would be less noise?  
20 He didn't want to go for it. In my opinion  
21 I think he's just doing it for spite.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The stuff he's  
23 doing in the back, was he doing it legally?

24 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: He's cleaning up.  
25 He's cleaning the machines.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Doing it  
2 legally? So do that up front.

3 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Right. The  
4 equipment that he's fixing to --

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Because if you  
6 saw him doing something against the code or  
7 the ordinance --

8 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: He still has parts  
9 there, he still has tires, there's equipment  
10 there that's definitely inoperable.

11 MR. HOOVER: So this is a report  
12 that you're doing. July 3rd was the  
13 deadline.

14 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes.

15 MR. HOOVER: All right. So it took  
16 us a while to get there.

17 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Couple weeks.

18 MR. BUTLER: He missed the deadline?  
19 Why can't we fine him because he missed the  
20 deadline?

21 MR. KOMENSKY: Did anyone read his  
22 lawyer's report and Bill's report? Because  
23 it's pretty clear that, like, we're talking  
24 oranges and, like, watermelons.

25 MR. BUTLER: What he's saying is

1 completely different than what's been going  
2 on.

3 MR. HOOVER: That's why Mike had to  
4 go and look at it. So Bill said just go  
5 look at it to see what runs, what doesn't  
6 run, what he's doing wrong, the whole bit,  
7 which is what he did. The judge obviously  
8 said fine, you're going to make a report,  
9 see what has to be done. Next hearing for  
10 this is December 9th. So now you have a  
11 report. Maybe you should give that to Bill,  
12 Bill will give it to Nealon, Nealon will say  
13 you know what? I'll squeeze him in in  
14 October. Because the people are aggravated,  
15 the board is aggravated. Everybody's  
16 aggravated. Nothing's been done. I'm here  
17 seven years, Russell's been here a lot  
18 longer. So everybody knows what's going on  
19 up there. They do what they want.

20 The guy that bought Chris Goetz'  
21 house, I see him every day walking. Friday  
22 was the first day he told me if I knew that  
23 was in my back yard I wouldn't have bought  
24 this house. He spent \$500,000 for that  
25 house.

1 MR. BUTLER: There's other people  
2 that want to get out, too.

3 MR. HOOVER: The guy at the end of  
4 the street just sold his house. It's just  
5 that it's the legal system. What are you  
6 going to do.

7 MR. KOMENSKY: It's just like --  
8 it's not even apples and apples. If it was  
9 ninety percent you wouldn't be here having  
10 this conversation. But it's, like, his  
11 lawyer's saying the whole thing is done. It  
12 should be signed off. I don't know what  
13 planet they're on, but it's certainly not  
14 this one.

15 MR. BUTLER: He moved stuff from his  
16 property to Gilchrist's property.

17 MR. KOMENSKY: The tires are still  
18 there.

19 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Stacked up.

20 MR. KOMENSKY: I asked Mike one day  
21 last week -- Mike was working on his report.  
22 He was telling me.

23 MR. BUTLER: I don't care how neat  
24 everything is. Parts are not supposed to be  
25 there. Its only supposed to be running

1 equipment. That's what it should be. All  
2 the tires should be gone, the engine parts  
3 should be gone, the transmission parts  
4 should be gone, the rear ends should be  
5 gone. All that stuff should be gone. He's  
6 taking parts out of there and then selling  
7 them.

8 And every time he's taking  
9 something -- I know for a fact he's not  
10 having any kind of a containment system or  
11 whatever when he's taking an engine out or  
12 he's taking a transmission out. All that  
13 fluid is going into the ground. That should  
14 be a no-no in itself.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You're right.

16 MR. BUTLER: He's not catching the  
17 oil, the transmission fluid, not catching  
18 the hydraulic fluid. He's not catching any  
19 of that stuff.

20 MR. MIKOLACZYK: You need  
21 containment for that.

22 MR. HOOVER: Nothing against what  
23 Bill has been doing the last seven years  
24 that I'm here, but should we have hired  
25 someone that specifically does this with

1 Bill's help?

2 MR. BUTLER: That's what I said from  
3 the get-go. We should have had an  
4 environmental lawyer, somebody that knows --

5 MR. HOOVER: Nothing against Bill.  
6 Bill has done -- I think Bill has done a  
7 good job with it. It's just the neighbors.

8 MR. KOMENSKY: Can we discuss this  
9 in executive?

10 ATTY. RINALDI: Yes.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other  
12 members have any questions for Mike?  
13 Thanks, Mike.

14 Chief of Police, Jason Dubernas.  
15 Good evening, Chief. Welcome back from  
16 vacation. Anything for the meeting tonight  
17 or for the upcoming agenda?

18 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Two things. One  
19 might be an agenda item for you guys. So  
20 first, some of you guys were here, some  
21 weren't. A lady's been calling myself and  
22 the mayor. We're back to the 303 South  
23 Keyser and Sibley issue again.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Flower Street?

25 CHIEF DUBERNAS: No, the corner

1 house at North Keyser and Sibley. The  
2 mobile home. We asked people that live  
3 there to change their address to 929 Sibley.  
4 No problem, they did that. It shows 929  
5 South. The lady that lives at 303 South  
6 Keyser, she lives actually down by the  
7 firehouse. So now they're starting to  
8 remodel and do some things here and there  
9 and every time she goes to get a delivery  
10 the delivery is going back to Sibley Avenue.

11 So I'm not sure if it's on our end  
12 because it's going back to the 2017 911  
13 system, the fire department. They all know  
14 that 303 South Keyser is down by  
15 Eagle-McLure and there is no more 303 South  
16 Keyser up by the Back Road Pub. It's now  
17 929 Sibley for addressing purposes. But  
18 their deeds still say 303 South Keyser on  
19 both places and the house they knocked down  
20 next to it says 307 South Keyser.

21 The question is, is it our  
22 responsibility to send, like, a letter to --  
23 she's saying it's GPS, Tom Tom, Garmin,  
24 Apple, Google Maps to rectify this address.  
25 She puts the 303 Milwaukee because on Google

1 Maps, if you look at her house it says  
2 Milwaukee Avenue right in front of her  
3 house. You type in 303 Milwaukee it shows  
4 down by Preate's Winery.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: 303 South  
6 Keyser comes up right behind the baseball  
7 field on Google Maps.

8 CHIEF DUBERNAS: 303 South Keyser  
9 shows up in Taylor.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: This one here  
11 is on the corner of Reese --

12 CHIEF DUBERNAS: The other one that  
13 she has the issue with is at the corner of  
14 Sibley and Keyser.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: But she's  
16 trying to get deliveries to 303 South Keyser  
17 and they're going down Sibley?

18 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Correct.

19 MR. BUTLER: Keyser ends at Oak  
20 Street. Right?

21 CHIEF DUBERNAS: So North Keyser for  
22 Old Forge goes from Oak Street to Taylor  
23 Borough, but all the houses are addressed  
24 from Taylor down, so Agway in Taylor is 360.  
25 So they all come down the hill. That's why

1           you can go all the way down to -- Gilchrist  
2           Trucking is 105. So it's 105, 200, 300 all  
3           the way to Taylor. They all thought that it  
4           was Taylor when they did addressing X amount  
5           of years ago. From 2017, when this all came  
6           about, we rectified -- us, the fire  
7           department, EMS and the 911 system. God  
8           forbid there was ever an issue. We haven't  
9           had any issues until two weeks ago she  
10          starting to get things.

11                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Google Maps  
12          takes you to the correct address, Apple Maps  
13          takes you to Sibley, and Jimmy just said  
14          Wayz takes you to Sibley.

15                   CHIEF DUBERNAS: So I wasn't sure if  
16          that's our responsibility. If we try to  
17          rectify it -- and both addresses are  
18          technically on a state roadway.

19                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: How does she  
20          get her mail? Does she get her mail  
21          correctly?

22                   CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yes, when it's her  
23          original mailman. When it's not her  
24          original mailman her mail goes up to Sibley  
25          Avenue and she gets their mail. We even

1           tried to send them to the postal inspector.  
2           Even though your deed is at South Keyser  
3           your address is North Keyser. So if you  
4           call for an emergency you need to say North  
5           Keyser.

6                     MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: Did she go to  
7           the post office and tell them this?

8                     CHIEF DUBERNAS: She went to the  
9           post office. That's how we got the address  
10          changed to 929. The front of her house  
11          actually faces Sibley Avenue and not Keyser  
12          Avenue.

13                    MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bill, is there  
14          anything we do on our end?

15                    ATTY. RINALDI: As long as it's  
16          registered with the post office and comm  
17          center, I don't know where else --

18                    MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm not sure  
19          how we can make one of the -- I just Googled  
20          it. It came up both. Came up at the right  
21          spot. It says South Keyser or Milwaukee on  
22          Google.

23                    MS. MCCAWLEY: Apple Map you can  
24          report an issue. I don't know if she's done  
25          that.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: She would have  
2 to do that.

3 MR. MIKOLACZYK: You can do that in  
4 all the apps.

5 MR. BROWN: Can we maybe reach out  
6 to Lackawanna County planning department for  
7 mapping and GIS?

8 CHIEF DUBERNAS: The county got a  
9 letter saying that this is what the address  
10 needs to be.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I would try  
12 that.

13 MR. BROWN: Actual planning, when  
14 they do the assessment and everything. I  
15 would maybe reach out to them.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Chief, maybe  
17 she goes on Apple Maps to report the issue  
18 because she might have to enter personal  
19 information or something. They have to do  
20 it. Then ask her to check back with you in  
21 a couple weeks, see how it worked out or if  
22 you find anything out.

23 CHIEF DUBERNAS: The other thing is  
24 last meeting Ms. Wenzler was here about the  
25 speed limit signs in the new development.

1 So today I spent most of the day driving up  
2 and down almost every street in the borough  
3 of Old Forge and there's no speed limit  
4 signs on hardly any streets.

5 That being said, under the  
6 Pennsylvania vehicle code for residential  
7 issue every street in the borough of Old  
8 Forge is 25 miles an hour. So it's up to  
9 the council, borough township, supervisors  
10 to readdress speed limits.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Individually,  
12 per street, if we want?

13 ATTY. RINALDI: In your ordinance  
14 you say it's this unless posted otherwise.

15 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Under the ordinance  
16 there's only, like, 20 streets.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I remember you  
18 brought this up to us when I brought it up  
19 to you. The gentleman on Howard Street  
20 asked for a speed limit sign and you said  
21 it's 25. Should I put 25 on? You said  
22 unless you want it lower.

23 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Unless council  
24 addresses it, all streets municipal of Old  
25 Forge are 15 miles an hour or otherwise

1           because that's up to you guys to readdress  
2           that. Under the state, under residential  
3           roads that are not posted it's 25.

4                     MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Is she looking  
5           for it to be lowered?

6                     CHIEF DUBERNAS: She wanted it 15.

7                     MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: And posted?  
8           You did a traffic study?

9                     CHIEF DUBERNAS: I didn't do a  
10          traffic study. I just rode around. None of  
11          the streets are posted. The only one that  
12          technically has speed limit signs on them  
13          are the state highways. Main Street, Oak  
14          Street, Keyser, Milwaukee.

15                    MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: This would be  
16          my thought.

17                    CHIEF DUBERNAS: You're having the  
18          same speed on Oak Street, Main Street and  
19          some on Milwaukee Avenue as a residential  
20          street. Going 25, technically people are  
21          really doing 35.

22                    MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You're saying  
23          that we should lower the residential  
24          neighborhood?

25                    CHIEF DUBERNAS: Absolutely.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm fine with  
2 that.

3 MR. KOMENSKY: Just do it once for  
4 every street.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Except for  
6 state roadways.

7 MR. MIKOLACZYK: PennDOT's default  
8 is 25.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Why don't we  
10 just make the ordinance in town. We can  
11 adjust the ordinance in town to 15 for every  
12 residential street. Then if there is  
13 residents who come to us and ask for a speed  
14 limit sign, then I'd have no problem.

15 CHIEF DUBERNAS: If I saw a dozen  
16 speed limit signs that's a lot. None of  
17 them are posted because it's a residential  
18 area.

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Once we went  
20 to comment with you I was going to ask you  
21 about the stop signs on Howard Street and  
22 the speed limit signs because you were going  
23 to do --

24 CHIEF DUBERNAS: I was there today.  
25 There's two stop signs. I'm not sure where

1           they're looking for a stop sign because if  
2           you go up Howard Street all the way to the  
3           end there's no stop sign, but when you come  
4           out of Holly Ridge there's stop signs  
5           entering Tinsdale, Howard, and then when you  
6           go back to Main Street there's two stop  
7           signs. So for only on one block -- so they  
8           want to put a stop sign for only one house?

9           MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: No, the guy  
10          was asking for a stop sign on Howard and  
11          Tinsdale. Both ways.

12          CHIEF DUBERNAS: There is a stop  
13          sign. When you go across Tinsdale there's a  
14          stop sign at each end.

15          MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Going from  
16          Main Street to Howard. Not going left and  
17          right, going in.

18          MR. BUTLER: He wants a stop sign at  
19          the corner of Tinsdale and Howard.

20          MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Stop sign  
21          would be on Howard Street.

22          CHIEF DUBERNAS: That's only for one  
23          house on the right hand side. Then you have  
24          a stop sign for Holly Ridge that's there  
25          now.

1 MR. BUTLER: No, I'm talking about  
2 when you turn off Main Street into Howard  
3 and you're going on Howard. When you hit  
4 Tinsdale there's a stop sign right there on  
5 Howard, which is a main drag.

6 MR. KOMENSKY: There's only one  
7 house there.

8 CHIEF DUBERNAS: He wants a stop  
9 sign because of the speed. That doesn't  
10 make sense.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You  
12 recommended it to us. I just asked you to  
13 look at it.

14 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Then on the other  
15 road coming up Forge Street you have two  
16 houses -- three houses. There's nobody on  
17 the other side of the railroad tracks and  
18 woods. I'm not sure if he's saying once the  
19 traffic starts coming back and forth for  
20 Holly Ridge. That's trying to use a stop  
21 sign for a speed device.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: No, he was  
23 saying that he was looking for a children at  
24 play sign, speed limit sign and a stop sign.

25 CHIEF DUBERNAS: I think Joe has

1                   them.

2                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So if we're  
3 going to change the ordinance down to 15  
4 miles an hour maybe we can put a 15 mile an  
5 hour speed limit sign and a children at play  
6 sign, see how that works out. Maybe the  
7 residents there will say well, traffic is  
8 good. We don't need a stop sign. Then  
9 we're going to ask Bill to adjust the  
10 ordinance.

11                   ATTY. RINALDI: So 15 miles an hour  
12 on all borough streets?

13                   CHIEF DUBERNAS: All residential  
14 streets.

15                   ATTY. RINALDI: How are you going to  
16 be able to determine what the zoning  
17 district is when you pull somebody over?  
18 It's either borough streets or --

19                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I said  
20 residential. Just borough streets 15 miles  
21 an hour. Then we can put a 15 mile an hour  
22 down there. People from the borough want 15  
23 miles an hour on their street, come to us  
24 and ask us and we'll vote on it. I'll vote  
25 for it.

1                   ATTY. RINALDI: Anybody want to  
2 drive it for a day or two? Because 15 is  
3 pretty slow.

4                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If you think  
5 it should be 15 I think we could make it 15.  
6 We'll vote on it, see if it goes through.

7                   MR. HOOVER: A lot of electric  
8 bikes, too.

9                   CHIEF DUBERNAS: We just got new  
10 case law on all of it. Pretty much every  
11 one of them has to be registered. No  
12 sidewalks.

13                   MR. KOMENSKY: They can't ride on  
14 the sidewalks?

15                   CHIEF DUBERNAS: No, and only  
16 operated by certain age kids. You don't  
17 have to pass an ordinance because under the  
18 vehicle code they have to have certain  
19 criteria. I know Clarks Summit, the  
20 ordinance they have they're not supposed to  
21 be on sidewalks and have it registered with  
22 the borough.

23                   MR. KOMENSKY: Could you put a  
24 posting on the police Facebook?

25                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Maybe we

1 should get a few signs made up, put them  
2 around town about the motorized bikes.

3 MR. KOMENSKY: Just put the message  
4 board out.

5 CHIEF DUBERNAS: We can do that or  
6 post it on our Facebook page.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: And if we get  
8 a few signs made up and put them around town  
9 so people see them.

10 CHIEF DUBERNAS: A lot of them are  
11 in the park.

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Put a couple  
13 signs around the areas you think a lot of  
14 them are. There's going to be a lot around  
15 the school, there's a lot around the park,  
16 on Main Street, kids going up and down.

17 MR. BUTLER: Isn't there a sign at  
18 the park that says no bikes allowed inside  
19 the park?

20 CHIEF DUBERNAS: They're supposed to  
21 go in the park and put them in bike racks.  
22 They moved the bike racks. Years ago they  
23 were on the outside.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Because people  
25 steal the bikes.

1 MR. BUTLER: Even if they put them  
2 right inside the entrances so you don't take  
3 them, right inside the park.

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Facebook posts  
5 and a few signs. Ask Joe to get a couple  
6 signs made up and some 15 mile an hour  
7 signs. Chief, anything else?

8 CHIEF DUBERNAS: That's it.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other  
10 members have any questions for the chief?

11 MR. MIKOLACZYK: The enforcement --  
12 the person contacted me, the gentleman who  
13 was very vocal here last time about East  
14 Morton, the four way stop. Are we looking  
15 into that?

16 CHIEF DUBERNAS: We've been there a  
17 couple times.

18 MR. BUTLER: I've seen them there.  
19 They stopped a couple people.

20 MR. MIKOLACZYK: Bonnie and Joe  
21 Haluska, they would like to help out if we  
22 don't have the yearly mass casualty risk  
23 assessment.

24 MR. KOMENSKY: It's done.

25 MR. MIKOLACZYK: I'm just addressing

1 this. She said nothing's ever done.

2 MR. KOMENSKY: It's done through the  
3 county, state support, FEMA, PEMA, all that.

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other  
5 members have any questions for the chief?  
6 Thanks, Chief.

7 Assistant fire chief, Bill Stull,  
8 good evening. Anything for this evening or  
9 the upcoming agenda?

10 MR. STULL: One thing. The corn  
11 hole tournament, that got moved from June.  
12 It's going to be Sunday, the 24th of August.  
13 Not going to be at Revello's. It's going to  
14 be at the fire station. We're just  
15 wondering if we could borrow the sign  
16 boards.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Absolutely.  
18 Get in touch with the chief. No members  
19 have any problem. Right? Okay. Anybody  
20 have any questions for the assistant fire  
21 chief? Thanks, Bill.

22 Attorney Rinaldi, solicitor's  
23 report. Anything for the meeting tonight or  
24 for the upcoming agenda?

25 ATTY. RINALDI: So for the upcoming

1 agenda, the planning commission recommended  
2 new SALDO fees, so I can put together a  
3 resolution for that for the next meeting.

4 Has any decision been made on the  
5 skill games?

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Amount of  
7 machines? I don't think we came to a final  
8 number. Me personally, if any of the  
9 members remember, I said up to five. That's  
10 what I always said.

11 MR. HOOVER: I said four but I'm  
12 okay with five.

13 MS. MCCAWLEY: I'm good.

14 ATTY. RINALDI: And the other  
15 changes are okay?

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Are you aware  
17 of --

18 MR. MIKOLACZYK: Yes, five is good.

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Five for a  
20 max.

21 MR. BUTLER: I just don't want kids  
22 in there.

23 ATTY. RINALDI: And they're only  
24 allowed in anyplace that can serve liquor.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You need a

1           liquor license.

2                   ATTY. RINALDI: Thirty seats or more  
3 or do you want six packs to have it, too?

4                   MR. BUTLER: Anybody that sells  
5 liquor.

6                   MS. BARTOLETTI: So you're going to  
7 allow up to five even in a six-pack place?

8                   MR. BUTLER: Yes, unless you want to  
9 make it less. I don't care.

10                   ATTY. RINALDI: Also in any  
11 non-profit establishments that are voluntary  
12 emergency services, fire, ambulance, et  
13 cetera. How many do you want to allow  
14 there?

15                   MR. HOOVER: Bill, how many do you  
16 have in your firehouse?

17                   MR. STULL: Three. Probably two of  
18 them are going to get ousted.

19                   MR. KOMENSKY: But that's not to say  
20 you're not going to get two other ones.

21                   MR. STULL: We don't need them.

22                   MR. HOOVER: Where is there just a  
23 six-pack place?

24                   MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Convenient stores.

25                   CHIEF DUBERNAS: Convenient, Ari's

1 and the Sunoco.

2 MR. HOOVER: You can buy a case of  
3 beer there.

4 CHIEF DUBERNAS: No.

5 ATTY. RINALDI: So I have restaurant  
6 liquor, retail dispenser, hotel liquor, club  
7 liquor, limited winery. All those can have  
8 up to five machines. Right?

9 MR. HOOVER: What's the average now?

10 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Ari's has, I think,  
11 six.

12 MR. HOOVER: What about the  
13 Convenient on Main Ave?

14 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I'm not sure. They  
15 have quite a few. The one on Lonesome Road  
16 I think had seven or eight.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Who's at nine?

18 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Might be the one on  
19 Lonesome -- or Moosic Road.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Didn't  
21 somebody have 11?

22 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I think that might  
23 be the Convenient on Moosic Road, the  
24 laundromat and the beer store. It's all  
25 combined total in the whole building.

1 MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: I know there  
2 was an 11 somewhere. There was a nine, too.

3 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Nine at that  
4 Convenient, the beer store had two.

5 MR. BUTLER: I think we can lower  
6 the number.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Want to go  
8 four?

9 MR. BUTLER: Three or four is good  
10 for me. Four is even pushing it. I'd  
11 rather see three.

12 MR. MIKOLACZYK: Should be three.

13 MR. KOMENSKY: Four.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'll go to  
15 three, too. Three or four. Either way.

16 MR. HOOVER: I'm good with three.

17 MR. BUTLER: I'm good with three.

18 MS. MCCAWLEY: Three.

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Three around  
20 the house. If you don't have a liquor  
21 license --

22 MR. KOMENSKY: Is it in the  
23 laundromat or do they have it separate?

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Three for  
25 non-profit, three for liquor licensed

1 establishments. Okay.

2 ATTY. RINALDI: This is your  
3 original ordinance from back in the '80s and  
4 '90s. There's an application that has a  
5 name and address, age and date, place of  
6 birth of the applicant, if they have any  
7 prior convictions, place where the machine  
8 or device is supposed to be operated,  
9 description of the machine covered. No  
10 licenses issued unless the person is 21  
11 years of age or over, and the chief of  
12 police and the code enforcement officer do  
13 the inspections. That's there. We didn't  
14 change that. Do you want it changed now?

15 MR. BROWN: Are there certain  
16 suppliers that are regulated or associated  
17 with the department of gaming right now with  
18 the machines that may be out there?

19 ATTY. RINALDI: Well, one of the  
20 exceptions is you're a licensed facility  
21 under the gaming act.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You're talking  
23 about a certain style of machine.

24 MR. BROWN: There are vendors that  
25 are partners with the department of gaming.

1           The budget obviously is not passed, the  
2           state budget. This is one of the caveats.  
3           They want the gaming control board to  
4           oversee them. Supposedly from just  
5           listening to the sessions there are vendors  
6           that are partnered with the gaming control  
7           board who are in line for the potential of  
8           this bill passing and falling under the  
9           realm and be inspected by the gaming  
10          control. So are there vendors out there, is  
11          what I'm asking?

12                    ATTY. RINALDI: I'm only dealing  
13                    with skilled games as the cases are pending.  
14                    The way they're defined.

15                    MR. BROWN: You're saying it's  
16                    regulated by the chief and code enforcement.

17                    ATTY. RINALDI: That's for any kind.  
18                    A juke box, pinball machine, cigarette  
19                    machine. That was your ordinance. I didn't  
20                    change that. I think years ago you used to  
21                    collect fees from the vendors. I don't  
22                    think there's too many pinballs and juke  
23                    boxes anymore.

24                    MR. HOOVER: I'm thinking a bigger  
25                    establishment with a building with machines

1 in it.

2 MR. BROWN: So my thing was is this  
3 the inspector? Is there any, like, not  
4 preference, but are you going by -- what are  
5 you going by when inspecting? That's all  
6 I'm asking.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Right now  
8 we'll be going by our ordinance unless the  
9 state passes something that supercedes it,  
10 which could always happen.

11 ATTY. RINALDI: Yes. Well, right  
12 now there's a case pending on whether  
13 they're legal or illegal. So depending on  
14 what -- you're saying we're going to treat  
15 them as if they're legal if they're in these  
16 locations. That's what your ordinance is  
17 going to say.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Then the state  
19 might pass another law that says they are or  
20 aren't correct?

21 ATTY. RINALDI: Or the Supreme Court  
22 could rule and say hey, they're gambling  
23 devices.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So they're not  
25 going to supercede our ordinance regardless.

1                   ATTY. RINALDI: Yeah, because our  
2 ordinance covers if it's an illegal gambling  
3 device regardless of what it is.

4                   So wasn't it a hundred dollar fee  
5 per location for those licenses? What kind  
6 of fee do you guys want to have? They're a  
7 year license for a hundred dollars.

8                   MR. KOMENSKY: Per machine?

9                   ATTY. RINALDI: No, it was --

10                  MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Per  
11 establishment.

12                  MR. KOMENSKY: So if they have three  
13 it's a hundred, if they've got two it's a  
14 hundred?

15                  ATTY. RINALDI: Well, it's whatever  
16 you guys want. I think that's what they  
17 used to be.

18                  MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We just passed  
19 the gaming fee ordinance -- or we updated it  
20 about a year and a half ago. I thought  
21 everything was at 25.

22                  MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Per machine. I'm  
23 not sure.

24                  MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm not  
25 certain. I'm pretty sure I remember we did

1 that.

2 ATTY. RINALDI: That would be a  
3 resolution.

4 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I'll have to look.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Go with three  
6 machines for everything? Liquor license  
7 only and non-profits.

8 ATTY. RINALDI: Liquor license and  
9 anything that is defined under the borough  
10 code as a volunteer, emergency services,  
11 fire company, ambulance. Covers everything.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: This is going to  
13 pertain to everyone who has it now. No  
14 one's going to be able to come back and say  
15 we're grandfathered in?

16 ATTY. RINALDI: No, they're not  
17 grandfathered.

18 MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: Anything else?

19 ATTY. RINALDI: No. No minors can  
20 play and no monetary payouts may be made  
21 through electronic means and may not be made  
22 by cash by personnel. I don't know how they  
23 pay them out now.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: It's tickets  
25 now.

1                   ATTY. RINALDI: Only electronic.

2                   Nobody can use cash. That's covered.

3                   Another ordinance for speed limits.  
4                   That's two ordinances, one resolution, and I  
5                   think that's all for the agenda.

6                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any members  
7                   have any questions for the solicitor?

8                   MR. MIKOLACZYK: Assessed a hundred  
9                   dollars per establishment?

10                  MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: It's a gaming  
11                  license fee. We updated our ordinances  
12                  about year and a half ago. Might be a  
13                  little longer. Councilman Notari was here,  
14                  if I remember correctly, because he had some  
15                  questions about it.

16                  MR. MIKOLACZYK: Is it a hundred?  
17                  Or was it 25 before?

18                  MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm pretty  
19                  sure that we voted on 25. Mike's going to  
20                  get a copy for us to be correct. It was 25  
21                  per establishment, not machine. Overall.  
22                  Mike, if you can find that ordinance for us.  
23                  Any members have any questions for the  
24                  solicitor?

25                  ATTY. RINALDI: I can go over the

1 rest if you're having an executive session.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay.

3 Marylynn Bartoletti, borough manager. Good  
4 evening, Marylynn. Anything for this  
5 evening or the upcoming agenda?

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. So on the  
7 meeting on the 19th that we have coming up,  
8 at 6:00 we have a representative from  
9 PennDOT coming in to discuss a bridge  
10 replacement. It's a hearing for them. It's  
11 for replacement that's going to happen in  
12 the spring of 2028. They need to come in  
13 and discuss it in advance. It's for the  
14 concrete bridge that carries Milwaukee  
15 Avenue over Saint John's Creek. That's in  
16 2028, so we have some time. So they're  
17 going to be at a meeting on the 19th at  
18 6:00.

19 Then at 7:00 we have Joe Rovinski  
20 from the county coming to discuss some CDBG  
21 funds that we have that we need to spend.  
22 He comes every year to do his little speech.  
23 But we have \$141,083 to spend. So by then  
24 we basically have to have a plan for how  
25 we'd like to spend it. The past few years

1 we've been putting our money together and  
2 doing bigger projects and for this year  
3 they're not allowing it.

4 MR. HOOVER: What did we use that  
5 money for last year?

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: First the elevator,  
7 then the senior center. We're pretty much  
8 even once the senior center is done, but now  
9 we're going to have this money, the  
10 \$141,083. As I said, usually what we would  
11 do is we'd put a couple of years of money  
12 together to do a bigger project and this  
13 year they're not allowing that.

14 So we have to come up with a project  
15 that fits all their criteria but is only  
16 this much money. It's not a huge project.  
17 So I'll give you some ideas that we can  
18 possibly use this money towards and we can  
19 give them our answers. But he's coming on  
20 the 19th as well.

21 Just an update on the playground  
22 equipment that we have coming in. Some of  
23 it's being shipped out next week, and one  
24 big piece of equipment that we wanted to  
25 purchase, there's been a lot of confusion

1 with trying to get it ordered because  
2 somehow they lost our order a couple times.  
3 So back and forth telling them how  
4 disappointed we are they decided to give us  
5 a very large discount off our apparatus that  
6 we're getting. They're giving us an \$18,000  
7 discount. So I'm kind of happy about that.

8 So for the agenda for the next  
9 meeting we're going to have a payment to  
10 American Asphalt for \$20,950. This is  
11 actually for the work that was done on  
12 Edgewood Drive.

13 I just want to do a quick synopsis  
14 on the camp, since I did give you these  
15 details. I just want do some thank yous.  
16 So first ones are Sandy, Joanne, Mike, Joe,  
17 Ann Marie and Jason. Thank you very much  
18 for all the efforts that you put in to help  
19 with the camp. Mike Komensky, Allison  
20 McCawley for stopping in, for donating food  
21 items. Bill Stull and Stull for coming and  
22 bringing the fire truck and being so nice to  
23 all of the kids and giving them hats and all  
24 that stuff. The kids loved it. Kim  
25 Buggy-Davies and Tom Sherwood, and, of

1 course, Jason and Dave Kimball for bringing  
2 some of the police vehicles to camp and  
3 letting the kids sit in the police car and  
4 the UTV vehicle. Another day that was big  
5 for the kids. They loved it. Pat and  
6 Heather Revello for donating large amounts  
7 of pizza to the camp. T-shirts in 24 for  
8 donating popsicles. Old Forge Elementary  
9 PTO for donating Domino's pizza. Volunteers  
10 who showed a lot to help, Megan Dibilio,  
11 Kelsey Renzi, Michelle Bilski, Lisa Nee and  
12 Jenna Shotwell.

13 And I just want to mention my staff  
14 members. Kaitlin Piza was the supervisor,  
15 and I had 18 kids who actually were  
16 fantastic. Gabby Chullo, T.J. DiMattia,  
17 Tori DiMattia, Leah Domiano, Joey Dominic,  
18 Nick Salerno, Matthew Tucker, Morgan  
19 Fanning, D.J. Fox, Mia Fox, Stephanie  
20 Kucharski, Jake Lucarelli, Reilly Schmidt,  
21 Collin Mulkerin, Luke Oliveri, Cameron  
22 Parker, Caroline Revello, and Robbie  
23 Solfanelli.

24 So there was 18 of them, and in the  
25 past we've had a lot more. I have to just

1 say these kids were fantastic. I have no  
2 complaints for anything as far as the staff  
3 and the volunteers for camp. Everyone was  
4 really fantastic and it was a huge help to  
5 make it successful and I just wanted to  
6 thank all of those people in public.

7 MR. HOOVER: I think we should put  
8 an article in the paper, put all those names  
9 in the paper.

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: We could.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Facebook page.  
12 Put it on that, too. Right?

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: I was planning on  
14 putting a little something on that just to  
15 have a final --

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The paper is  
17 nice, too.

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. I have a  
19 request that keeps finding it's way back to  
20 me, and it's Oak Street and Marion Street  
21 intersection. I don't know if you want to  
22 revisit that again.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Street light?

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Whatever. It's so  
25 dangerous pulling out there. There's so

1 many near misses. PennDOT said no.

2 MR. MIKOLACZYK: Jason and I did the  
3 thing with getting the solar panel light  
4 back. This is going back a year and a half.  
5 I guess that's not the cure all.

6 CHIEF DUBERNAS: They told us move  
7 the sight back 120 feet and we did that.

8 MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: We asked Dave,  
9 the engineer, about a year and a half ago to  
10 do a traffic study over there. We wanted to  
11 put in a three-way streetlight. PennDOT  
12 told us that the traffic wasn't significant  
13 enough.

14 MR. MIKOLACZYK: It's probably not.  
15 That still needs SR, state roads, involved,  
16 so they're probably going to say no.

17 CHIEF DUBERNAS: They did.  
18 Technically that's not a school zone there  
19 because the school is actually the Marion  
20 Street address and not the Oak Street  
21 address.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I would love  
23 to revisit it.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: I think we really  
25 need to. All there is is a stop sign and

1                   you can't see.

2                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: It's murder  
3 getting out of there.

4                   MS. BARTOLETTI: If we can do some  
5 further discussion about that, and those who  
6 complained to me about it I think would  
7 appreciate it.

8                   MR. KOMENSKY: Do you have a traffic  
9 study that you can make available?

10                  MS. BARTOLETTI: Sure. I'm sure I  
11 have it in the office.

12                  MR. BUTLER: Talking about Marion  
13 Street and Oak Street, those two telephone  
14 poles on the corner.

15                  CHIEF DUBERNAS: We complained about  
16 that for months now.

17                  MR. BUTLER: At least if the dirt  
18 wasn't there.

19                  MR. MIKOLACZYK: That's a different  
20 contractor that comes back and cleans that  
21 up. Just like with the water company.  
22 Somebody else, the contractor that does the  
23 utility service cuts, they're going to come  
24 back and take that clean dirt and probably  
25 patch around. It's not whoever put it

1           there. It's not the same company on that  
2           deal anywhere in the state.

3                   MR. BUTLER: I think the company's  
4           from Jersey.

5                   MR. MIKOLACZYK: Probably was. It  
6           takes forever to get them back.

7                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Chief, did you  
8           contact them or did Joe?

9                   CHIEF DUBERNAS: Joe did.

10                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else?

11                   MS. BARTOLETTI: I have a note  
12           here -- and I wasn't sure if I was going to  
13           say it. But I know that Dale is new and a  
14           lot of people are contacting him about  
15           different things. I think it's so  
16           disappointing that people make comments  
17           saying that nothing ever gets done. I just  
18           find that rude, disappointing and almost a  
19           slap in the face to who everyone sits here  
20           because I think, really, the team here as a  
21           whole puts such an effort into really  
22           helping everyone and putting time into every  
23           complaint that people have.

24                   So when a comment is thrown out  
25           there by -- and I know you mentioned the

1 person's name -- I feel like sometimes you  
2 bend over backwards for people and they  
3 still make a comment like that and I just  
4 find it very disappointing.

5 MR. MIKOLACZYK: I'm the new target  
6 and they're going to tell me all these  
7 things fell on deaf ears. So I'm going to  
8 tell you what you need to know and not what  
9 you want to hear.

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: It's very  
11 disappointing to hear.

12 MR. MIKOLACZYK: I told Chairman  
13 Rinaldi it's not the fact that nothing gets  
14 done here. I tell people everything gets  
15 done here. The fact is that there's not a  
16 lot of information that gets out there on  
17 what's being done. That's the problem.  
18 Nobody gets the information out that this is  
19 coming up.

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: We meet twice a  
21 month and look at the amount of people that  
22 are here.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We're never  
24 going to satisfy everybody. We can sit here  
25 and -- Marylynn, by no means do I disagree

1 with you. I hear comments 20 times a day,  
2 every day from all different people. You've  
3 got to take into consideration the people  
4 telling you. Some of the people, they don't  
5 have the right information. Most of the  
6 people I talk to, if you give them the  
7 information, oh, okay. Well, I didn't know  
8 that. Then you still have some people, the  
9 same thing, and that's just going to happen.  
10 I think we have to just take it on the  
11 shoulder sometimes. There's nothing wrong  
12 with standing up and defending ourselves. I  
13 know I do for myself and anyone who sits  
14 here.

15 But it could be a little upsetting  
16 and it hurts to hear it sometimes, but, I  
17 mean, we do a good job. We try and get as  
18 much things done as we could get done. It  
19 does take time for some things. A lot of  
20 people don't understand. Certain things  
21 take longer than others.

22 MR. MIKOLACZYK: Certain things are  
23 not going to get done. I tell the people  
24 this is not going to happen.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: There's just

1           some things that might not get done if  
2           there's a bigger issue. Some things are out  
3           of our hands. But I agree with you. We can  
4           do our best to get the information out as  
5           best as possible through ourselves or  
6           through our website. I try to encourage  
7           people to come here all the time. I  
8           encourage them on Facebook, through  
9           messages. You try and get them to come here  
10          because that's the best.

11                   MR. MIKOLACZYK: And I'm just  
12          pointing out the things with my whopping 18  
13          days in politics. This is the messages that  
14          I get. Drake's Lane flooding, what's going  
15          to be done. There's a lot of stuff nobody  
16          ever knows about these things. So that's  
17          why I put that there from a professional  
18          engineering and a professional geological  
19          standpoint and tell them what's being done.  
20          So you're not going to please everybody.  
21          Nothing gets done in this town. A lot of  
22          stuff gets done. Maybe a lot information  
23          doesn't get out on what's being done, but a  
24          lot of stuff, these things are being  
25          addressed.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone have  
2 any questions for Marylynn?

3 MR. KOMENSKY: I'd just like to  
4 comment about the park. I think to your  
5 point the staff seemed very engaged this  
6 year. The kids seemed to be having fun.  
7 For me, seeing the smiles on the kids faces  
8 couple days I was there was absolutely  
9 joyful. Everybody that helped, thank you,  
10 thank you. I think it was a success. I  
11 heard a lot of comments from parents the one  
12 day that I was there when they were coming  
13 to pick up their kids.

14 So I think it was great and I think  
15 everyone deserves a well done on that.  
16 Thank you.

17 MR. BUTLER: I heard nothing but  
18 good things.

19 MR RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other  
20 members have anything?

21 MR. HOOVER: Thanks, Marylynn.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone from  
23 the public like to address us before we go  
24 down the table? We'll start with Mayor  
25 Legg. First of all, very happy to see you.

1 Happy you're doing well. You look great. I  
2 did see you the other day walking down the  
3 road.

4 I also want to add this. The chief  
5 of police kept us updated with your status.

6 MR. BUTLER: Every day.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Multiple times  
8 a day. He kept texting us and telling us  
9 and making us aware. You were really on top  
10 of it. At least twice a day. I'm glad  
11 you're doing well. Glad to see you're  
12 healthy and glad you're here. So anything  
13 for this evening?

14 MAYOR LEGG: Two things other than  
15 thank you for your care and concern.  
16 Council really did it right this time  
17 appointing this gentleman here. I've known  
18 him for a while. I worked very closely with  
19 him on the Glynn Lunney project. He got  
20 something done at PennDOT in a little over a  
21 week that would have taken all us a year, if  
22 we would have accomplished it at all. He  
23 wants to serve our community. Like I said,  
24 one of the smartest people I know. I look  
25 forward to working with him. Good job.

1                   Last thing is that gentleman on my  
2 left, I've been getting a lot of calls the  
3 last couple weeks on properties and what  
4 have you, and I think Mike Sokolowski has  
5 ESPN or something because before I even call  
6 him he's already got a handle on the  
7 project. I can't emphasize what a great job  
8 he does. I keep telling him when you see me  
9 coming go in your office, lock the door and  
10 hide behind the desk, because every time I  
11 say Mike, you got a minute, it's always a  
12 problem. He takes it on and he gets things  
13 done. Great job that he does and I've got  
14 to commend him. That's all.

15                   MR. MIKOLACZYK: I've got three  
16 quick questions. The Drake's Lane flooding.  
17 Is that -- the three inlets on Morris  
18 Avenue, down on the left side, is that going  
19 to be a reality or is that just a pitch  
20 that's out there?

21                   MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That was our  
22 DPW manager Joe Lenceski's idea.

23                   MR. MIKOLACZYK: It's a good idea.  
24 The two inlets at the bottom act with  
25 reverse back pressure and that's why nothing

1 drains.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: He has five  
3 inlets planned.

4 MR. MIKOLACZYK: From Eisenhower  
5 down the hill?

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Lenape and  
7 George.

8 MR. MIKOLACZYK: That will aid the  
9 retention time at the bottom.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Then one in the  
11 middle of George, like in front of the  
12 house, and three on Morris. Two on one  
13 side, one on the other. That was his idea.  
14 I think Joe -- I know Marylynn -- did he get  
15 quotes to you or is he waiting for us to  
16 give him the go ahead?

17 MS. BARTOLETTI: I don't think he  
18 came up with something yet.

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That was all  
20 his idea. When we had some of the neighbors  
21 come over a year ago that's what Joe came up  
22 with it.

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: It was Joe also  
24 working with Dave and also with Mike Ford,  
25 who does that work, and Earthworks.

1 MR. MIKOLACZYK: Second thing,  
2 there's three inlets, storm drains at Amity  
3 and Winter. A couple of them are clogged  
4 with grass clippings and anti-skid. We just  
5 need to vacuum those out.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Joe will go  
7 and check them out.

8 MR. MIKOLACZYK: And the Ann  
9 Smicherko -- the safety island, is that  
10 going to happen?

11 MR. BUTLER: We were there the other  
12 day.

13 MR. MIKOLACZYK: We're looking into  
14 that. Right?

15 MR. HOOVER: I put some yellow marks  
16 on the road and, if anything, we should just  
17 box that off where we're going to put some  
18 yellow lines down for now. I don't want to  
19 get involved with putting curbs and an  
20 island in if it's not going to work.

21 MR. MIKOLACZYK: Is that necessary?  
22 I don't see it as being necessary.

23 MR. HOOVER: Maybe put some yellow  
24 marks there just to force the buses to stop.

25 MR. MIKOLACZYK: This is a fatality

1 in the making. I don't see it as a big  
2 deal.

3 MR. HOOVER: She's always on the  
4 porch.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: It all began  
6 the same time last year. We invited all the  
7 members over. Jimmy went, I went, and Dave  
8 came up with two ideas, the island and he  
9 came up with one off to the side. No  
10 island. It would be our property off of  
11 that lot. So that would be another idea.

12 MR. HOOVER: The road is 28 feet.  
13 So if you go from the curb out 20 for two  
14 cars, if you go over there -- and I came by  
15 there just now. There's three cars parked  
16 in front of that house. If those cars are  
17 normally parked there you still need 20  
18 feet. You have to let a bus through there  
19 during the day. Then you have to go on the  
20 other side and get 20 feet away from  
21 Doreen's driveway, which has a big U on it.

22 MR. BUTLER: The girl where the  
23 house burned down.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: To get a  
25 better idea, if you want we can ask Dave to

1 a meeting -- we'll set the meeting up. I'd  
2 like to be over there, too. She was looking  
3 for a streetlight. It was always dark on  
4 one end, but that's ordered.

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: That's already been  
6 ordered.

7 MR. HOOVER: They're going to work  
8 on it the 18th or 19th of this month.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We're going to  
10 install the telephone pole with a  
11 streetlight on it. When you come more  
12 towards the intersection from Amity to  
13 Winter it's a little bit darker. So if  
14 you're going from Winter into Amity, on  
15 Winter, it's around that intersection it's  
16 dark. There's one light on the side. They  
17 were looking for one on the side of Winter  
18 where she lives. The telephone pole is  
19 almost in her yard, Joe said.

20 MR. MIKOLACZYK: Paving. With all  
21 the traffic I got two e-mails from one  
22 person from Coxtan Road in Connell's Patch.  
23 Was there ever any talk of paving between  
24 where the residences end, where the paving,  
25 the asphalt ends up the hill toward Pagnotti

1 Park?

2 MR. BUTLER: It's not our property.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We did discuss  
4 that.

5 MR. MIKOLACZYK: That's why they  
6 contacted me. I'm not saying, again, it  
7 fell on deaf ears. If you look at the  
8 Pagnotti Park with all the local traffic as  
9 of late in that area.

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: So the road that  
11 goes up the hill and takes you to the park,  
12 it's lease to the borough. So the borough  
13 technically can't use any of our liquid  
14 fuels because it's not an actual borough  
15 road.

16 MR. MIKOLACZYK: It's leased.

17 MS. BARTOLETTI: What we have looked  
18 into and we've been working on with Dave --  
19 and we have a grant application in -- is to  
20 open up different entrances into Pagnotti  
21 Park. So there's a lot in the works.  
22 There's a grant that's pending and it's to  
23 open up two different access points into  
24 Pagnotti. So that would get some work and  
25 they're trying to widen it, but it's never

1 going to be something that's actually  
2 physically on our liquid fuels usage list  
3 because we don't own it.

4 MR. MIKOLACZYK: Not talking about  
5 paving the parking areas. With all the  
6 traffic through there and the asphalt ends  
7 at the last house that's a pretty good  
8 question to bring up.

9 MS. BARTOLETTI: We had people  
10 actually ask where that asphalt ends, as you  
11 pointed out, going all the way in, but  
12 there's a section in there that actually  
13 belongs to Duryea.

14 MR. MIKOLACZYK: There's a house  
15 back in there that is Duryea.

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: Shortly after that  
17 entrance to Pagnotti Park, that turns into  
18 Duryea.

19 MR. HOOVER: We paved that road  
20 about two years ago, and we even tried to  
21 get the millings going up that hill and we  
22 couldn't even do that. We don't own the  
23 road.

24 MR. MIKOLACZYK: There's the answer.  
25 No one knows that.

1 MS. BARTOLETTI: It got oiled a  
2 month ago.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Councilman  
4 Komensky?

5 MR. KOMENSKY: I would just like to  
6 echo your comments. Mayor, welcome back.  
7 Glad you're doing well. It's great to see  
8 you back. Keep up the fight.

9 Other than that, I don't have  
10 anything else.

11 MR. BUTLER: Two things. Welcome  
12 the Mayor back. Nice to see you, Bob.

13 Also, DEP down at the Lackawanna  
14 River project, did we hear anything on that?

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: No. They said  
16 they were going to contact us.

17 MR. BUTLER: We should get a hold of  
18 them. It's already August. You're going to  
19 wait until when?

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: They were  
21 going to contact us around the end of July,  
22 around this time.

23 CHIEF DUBERNAS: River is low.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Let's reach  
25 out to them. Marylynn, do you want to reach

1 out to them?

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: Sure.

3 MS. MCCAWLEY: Welcome back, Mayor.  
4 Just a reminder Prince of Peace Parish has  
5 their chicken barbecue on Sunday. That's  
6 it.

7 MR. HOOVER: Up on Edgewood Drive,  
8 right before you get to the intersection  
9 there's a bad asphalt cut in the road, four  
10 by ten. I painted it out in white the other  
11 day. He's also complaining about the dip in  
12 the road. That's not going to be taken care  
13 of. It's about four by ten. If we can have  
14 Russo & DeMaio, when they're in town, to  
15 take care of it for us. It's just where the  
16 seams are. It seems to be wearing away.  
17 Someone threw tar on it and it looks like  
18 the tar is starting to go down. It's  
19 deteriorating.

20 Mike, that brick house on Oak  
21 Street?

22 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I called him last  
23 week again. They didn't settle yet.

24 MR. HOOVER: All right. That's all.

25 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I call once a month

1 on that. Just an update. I'll keep  
2 checking.

3 MR. HOOVER: Okay.

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I've got  
5 three. Mike, last meeting we talked or the  
6 meeting before. Do we still need a member  
7 for the zoning board? Are we vacant one  
8 seat?

9 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes. We need one  
10 and possibly an alternate also.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do we have to  
12 run an ad for that?

13 ATTY. RINALDI: That's up to you  
14 guys.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We ran an ad  
16 last time, didn't we? Do you want to run an  
17 ad for next meeting, members? Then we'll  
18 appoint somebody.

19 Second thing is, Mike, I know I  
20 discussed it a few times. Part-time zoning  
21 officer. Again, I know you do a great job,  
22 as the mayor said. I know you were saying  
23 you could use a little help. Correct?

24 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Could we run

1 an ad? Get that ad out and get some people  
2 in to interview for that.

3 MR. HOOVER: With experience,  
4 preferably.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm in  
6 agreement, so however you want to run the  
7 ad. I would definitely like to get some  
8 experience in there.

9 The last thing I have, Marylynn, the  
10 park program. Great job with it. I'm  
11 sitting here with you now since you started  
12 the park program, and every year I know we  
13 discuss it. I know some people -- I know  
14 people want it longer. Sometimes you can't  
15 make it longer. Two weeks, I think, is  
16 perfect.

17 But I got a lot of great compliments  
18 on it. You guys ran that summer park  
19 program Facebook page.

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: Myself and Kaitlin.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: A lot of  
22 updates telling what people were doing.  
23 Talking to a lot of parents. People were  
24 super excited about the great job. Everyone  
25 complimented as well. People were talking

1 about the police being there. They loved  
2 the presence of that, the firemen. They  
3 were crawling around the vehicles, the fire  
4 truck, the UTV vehicle. It was a great  
5 program to have. I know you put a lot of  
6 work into it and I know all those people you  
7 named put a lot work into it, too. But I  
8 know you're at the helm of it. It was a  
9 really great job. Once again, it's the  
10 20 --

11 MS. BARTOLETTI: This was my 20th  
12 year.

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Great job,  
14 Mare. I don't have anything else. We're  
15 going to break into a brief executive  
16 session for two items, so at this time the  
17 chair would entertain a motion to adjourn.

18 MR. KOMENSKY: So moved.

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: By Councilman  
20 Komensky. All in favor?

21 (Unanimous. Meeting adjourned.)
