1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Good evening,
2 ladies and gentlemen. I'd like to call the
3 meeting to order. I'm going to ask the
4 Honorable George Seig to lead us in the
5 Pledge of Allegiance, please.

6 (The Pledge of Allegiance was
7 recited.)

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Roll call,
9 please, Marylynn.

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

11 MR. BUTLER: Here.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
13 Chickey?

14 MS. CHICKEY: Here.

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
16 Komensky?

17 MR. KOMENSKY: Here.

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
19 Lettieri?

20 MR. LETTIERI: Present.

21 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Nese?

22 MR. NESE: Here.

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Here. Once
25 again, ladies and gentlemen, welcome to the

1 regular meeting of the Old Forge Borough.
2 Tonight is Tuesday, July 14, 2026. The
3 purpose of our meeting will be to go through
4 a few housekeeping motions and then we'll
5 hear from our department heads.

6 We have a public sign-in sheet. The
7 chief has that at his table. If anyone
8 would like to address us we'll give you a
9 few moments at the end of the meeting.

10 We'll then go down the table and
11 hear from our borough manager, solicitor and
12 our elected officials.

13 Before we do that we're going to
14 move one item on the agenda up. We have a
15 vacant council seat on the Old Forge
16 Borough. We had a resignation, and borough
17 code states that you have 30 days to fill
18 the vacant seat. Our borough manager and
19 our solicitor legally advertised in the
20 Scranton Times and we accepted applications
21 up until last Friday at 4 p.m. We held
22 interviews this evening. We had three
23 applicants, for public knowledge. Our one
24 applicant was Devon Brown, our second
25 applicant was Raymond Talipski, and our

1 third applicant was Alicia Hudak. Mrs.
2 Hudak notified our borough manager and she
3 requested that she did not want an
4 interview, so we interviewed Mr. Brown and
5 Mr. Talipski.

6 At this time the chair is -- this is
7 just going to be a motion to open up
8 nominations.

9 MR. KOMENSKY: I'll make that
10 motion.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We have a
12 motion on the floor to open up nominations
13 for the vacant seat on Old Forge Borough
14 Council by Councilman Komensky. All in
15 favor?

16 (Unanimous.)

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Nominations
18 are now open. Any member is allowed to say
19 one of the two names.

20 MR. KOMENSKY: Mr. Chairman, I'll
21 nominate Ray Talipski.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We have one
23 nomination for Ray Talipski. Any other
24 nominations?

25 MS. CHICKEY: Mr. Chairman, I'll

1 nominate Devon Brown.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We have a
3 nomination for Devon Brown. Those are the
4 only two applicants, so when I ask Marylynn
5 to call roll call I'll just say name the
6 person that you would be voting for. Roll
7 call, please, Marylynn.

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

9 MR. BUTLER: Devon Brown.

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
11 Chickey?

12 MS. CHICKEY: Devon Brown.

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
14 Komensky?

15 MR. KOMENSKY: Talipski?

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
17 Lettieri?

18 MR. LETTIERI: Devon Brown.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Nese?

20 MR. NESE: Talipski.

21 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Devon Brown.

23 Mr. Brown, congratulations. If you would
24 come up Mr. Seig will swear you in.

25 MAGISTRATE SEIG: It really is a

1 pleasure all the time to be asked to swear
2 in members, including the mayor. I don't
3 believe I've missed any one of you here. I
4 believe I've sworn you all in. I am
5 dedicated to this community and I will not
6 budge from that. It has always been an
7 honor to swear you in.

8 (The oath of office was
9 administered.)

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Before we move
11 forward I'd like to say thank you to all the
12 applicants who applied for the position. We
13 appreciate you taking the time and the
14 effort. Mr. Talipski, thank you, and
15 Mrs. Hudak. I don't think she's in the
16 audience but I'll thank her.

17 Mr. Seig, thank you once again for
18 attending and holding the swearing-in
19 ceremony.

20 Just for public knowledge, council
21 had a brief executive session prior to this
22 meeting. We had a personnel issue our
23 solicitor had to advise us with. We're
24 going to now break into another executive
25 session on another personnel matter. We

1 might be a few moments, so we're going to
2 apologize now. We will be back.

3 (A recess was taken at this time.)

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Ladies and
5 gentlemen, good evening once again. Let us
6 apologize for that executive session. We're
7 going to be back in business. We're going
8 to begin the meeting. We're going to turn
9 it over to the mayor. He has two
10 proclamations he wants to present to the
11 public first.

12 MAYOR LEGG: Thank you. Mr. and
13 Mrs. Mattei, would you come up to the
14 podium, please. For those of you who don't
15 know these two people, Fiore and his lovely
16 wife, Trisha, he is a Vietnam veteran. He's
17 been involved with the American Legion for
18 years and years and years. The last eight
19 and a half years I've had the pleasure of
20 joining him in the Memorial Day celebration
21 and the Veteran's Day celebration. He is a
22 staunch Old Forger, he's an outstanding
23 citizen, and I have a little something I
24 would like to present to you, if I may.

25 "This award is presented to Fiore

1 Mattei in recognition of his many years of
2 participation in the Memorial Day and
3 Veteran's Day celebrations. Thank you for
4 all you do."

5 MR. MATTEI: Thank you.

6 MAYOR LEGG: Rose and Marylou, come
7 up to the podium, please. I think you all
8 know Rose Moretti Graham and Marylou Moretti
9 Lloyd. They are the owners and proprietors
10 of Romar Dance Studio, and they just
11 celebrated their 50th year. They've had
12 hundreds, maybe thousands of young people go
13 through there in that period of time, and at
14 the end of the year, I believe it's in May,
15 they always have a nice show and people talk
16 about it for days after. I have a little
17 something for you.

18 "This award is present to Rose
19 Moretti Graham and Marylou Moretti Lloyd in
20 recognition of your 50 years in dance
21 instruction."

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI:

23 Congratulations again, girls. We're going
24 to continue with the meeting. We're going
25 to move into our first housekeeping motion.

1 This is going to be a motion to approve the
2 minutes from the prior meeting.

3 MR. KOMENSKY: I'll make that
4 motion.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion by
6 Councilman Komensky.

7 MR. BUTLER: I'll second it.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by
9 Councilman Butler. On the question? Public
10 input? Roll call, please.

11 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

22 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
24 Chickey?

25 MS. CHICKEY: Yes.

1 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
2 Komensky?

3 MR. KOMENSKY: Yes.

14 head, DPW manager, Joe Lenceski. Good
15 evening. Other than your report, anything
16 for the meeting this evening?

17 MR. LENCESKI: Nothing.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So any of the
19 members have any questions for Joe?

20 MR. NESE: I just want to say thank
21 you to everybody who helped out cleaning up
22 for the 250 celebration, everything you guys
23 did, the overtime. I know you're not there
24 on overtime because you're there. People
25 appreciate it.

1 MR. LENCESKI: Thank you.

2 MS. CHICKEY: Second that, and for
3 hanging that sign outside, that banner five
4 million times.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Joe, amazing
6 job, as always. You and the department. I
7 have a lot I'm going to say about that after
8 the meeting, when it comes my time to go
9 down the table. Great job. Any members
10 have any questions for Joe? Joe, thank you
11 very much.

12 Engineer, Dave Johns. Good evening.
13 Anything other than your report for the
14 meeting this evening?

15 MR. JOHNS: No items.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do any of the
17 members have any questions for the engineer?

18 MS. CHICKEY: I do.

19 MR. KOMENSKY: Did you submit the
20 paving stuff?

21 MR. JOHNS: I'm requesting another
22 meeting with the paving committee. We have
23 all the documents we had talked about, we
24 have -- we categorized all the streets by
25 level of deficiency, and we'd like to share

1 that with the paving committee.

2 MR. KOMENSKY: Okay. So you're
3 giving Marylynn --

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That was also
5 going to be one of my questions. I know you
6 were on vacation last week. I know we had
7 one meeting between this one. I know we had
8 moved this meeting. What's the earliest you
9 would be available for a paving committee
10 meeting?

11 MR. JOHNS: Early next week.
12 Monday, Tuesday.

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Morning?
14 Afternoon?

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Next Tuesday
16 anytime.

17 MS. CHICKEY: Anytime after 2:30.
18 Is that okay?

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Dave, we're
20 going to talk to Marylynn tonight after the
21 meeting, we'll give her a time, and then
22 we'll have her contact you and set it up for
23 Tuesday.

24 MR. KOMENSKY: Dave, I'm going to
25 talk to Marylynn. I want to have a

1 discussion about the DPW complex. Maybe we
2 can fit that in Tuesday, before. So I'll
3 talk to Marylynn and she'll get a hold of
4 you.

5 MR. BROWN: Now, Mare, I think you
6 informed me the Main Street, you're working
7 on that?

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: That's going to
9 come up later on under new business.

10 MR. NESE: Dave, Marylynn has been
11 keeping us informed about the park. You
12 don't have any concerns with these change
13 orders, plans that you want to make us aware
14 of? We're working toward getting those
15 done?

16 MR. JOHNS: I think all of the
17 changes we've requested, so they're not
18 change orders like there's unforeseen
19 conditions. They're change orders that
20 there are additional items that weren't
21 included in the original contract that, to
22 put very simply, are going to make the parks
23 that much better. So we discussed them with
24 the contractor, we vetted the contractor for
25 his pricing, and I think Marylynn has them

1 on the agenda.

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: They're not for
3 tonight because we still need to have
4 another meeting about it, but we're going to
5 pass it on the August work session. We're
6 going to make that a special meeting to be
7 able to vote on it.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other
9 members have any questions for Dave?

10 Police chief, Jason Dubernas, good
11 evening. Anything for the meeting other
12 than your report?

13 CHIEF DUBERNAS: The only thing,
14 update you on the three cadets that
15 graduated last Thursday. They took their
16 test today, they passed, so the process now
17 is starting with MPOETC. I just have to
18 wait for them to send me the letter, then I
19 can start the process of doing all the
20 paperwork on them. The other two have been
21 on the road for the last two weeks training.
22 You'll see them out and about.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else?

24 CHIEF DUBERNAS: The only other
25 thing, I've been up to Millard and Broadhead

1 Street multiple times. I'm not sure what
2 they're really looking for up there. You
3 can't go more than 15, 20 miles an hour on
4 that street.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Fifteen mile
6 an hour and a stop sign?

7 CHIEF DUBERNAS: It's just the
8 neighbors that live there. They all
9 complain about each other. We've been there
10 for neighbor disputes for the last two
11 weeks, who's blocking whose sidewalks,
12 putting bins in their parking spots. That's
13 all it is. It's all neighbors complaining
14 against each other.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Could we just
16 make borough streets 15 miles an hour in the
17 borough instead of picking out and deciding
18 which ones --

19 ATTY. RINALDI: We talked about that
20 once before.

21 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Then we have to go
22 and buy all new signs. It would cost the
23 borough a ton of money because in the
24 ordinance it's all 25 miles an hour.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Just a

1 question.

2 CHIEF DUBERNAS: That's all I have.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do any of the
4 members have any questions for the chief?

5 MR. KOMENSKY: Chief, how are you
6 doing with the grant? Pretty good with it?

7 CHIEF DUBERNAS: I got an e-mail.
8 It was submitted and accepted.

9 MR. KOMENSKY: Thanks for all your
10 work on that.

11 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Marylynn, she had
12 to answer all the questions.

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any of the
14 other members have any questions for the
15 chief? Thank you, Chief.

16 Fire chief, Mark Tagliaterra. Good
17 evening. Do you have anything for the
18 meeting this evening?

19 MR. TAGLIATERRA: I wish I knew what
20 was on the report. Billy put the report in
21 because he's on vacation. The only thing I
22 have -- and I'm not sure if it was on the
23 report or not. The department ran 33 calls
24 for June. We started this month off like a
25 ball of fire, 18 runs in four days, starting

1 with a structure fire and ending with a
2 structure fire. So year to date we have 240
3 runs so far. We're probably going to end up
4 before council before --

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You were over
6 450 or 465 last year. Correct? Around
7 there? Do any members have any questions
8 for the fire chief?

9 MR. BROWN: Chief, in the report
10 does that have response time, run time, too,
11 or --

12 MR. TAGLIATERRA: I don't know what
13 Billy has in his report.

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: We get separate
15 ones from Pennsylvania Ambulance. They come
16 in directly, so they'll be in the packet.

17 MR. TAGLIATERRA: Anything that
18 Billy did here is fire department only. The
19 ambulance will be separate from us.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any of the
21 other members have any questions for the
22 fire chief? Thank you, Chief.

23 Attorney Rinaldi, good evening.
24 Anything for the meeting other than your
25 report?

1 ATTY. RINALDI: No. Everything else
2 we can cover in executive.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do any of the
4 members have any questions for the
5 solicitor?

6 MR. KOMENSKY: I have a few
7 questions but they're litigation related.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other
9 members? Thank you, Bill.

10 Borough manager, Marylynn. Good
11 evening. Anything for the meeting other
12 than all of your reports?

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: Anyone have any
14 questions on the financial reports?
15 Nothing? Okay. I have a couple other
16 things. I just want to thank everyone who
17 helped with the America 250 celebration.
18 Thank you to council for going along with my
19 idea way back when. This started last
20 October with forming a new committee. So
21 thank you for that. Special thank you to
22 the subcommittee, the police department, the
23 DPW, the fire department, all my staff.
24 Thank you. Mostly, thanks to Mike and
25 Beaver and Benny for all the time and effort

1 that everyone put in. We all know what it
2 took to put together and thank you so much.

3 The summer camp is well underway.
4 It was last week and this week. There are
5 225 children signed up. We've had a lot of
6 donations of food and special items like
7 that. I'll talk about that at our next
8 meeting, when it's complete.

9 We talked about change orders for
10 Cobalt, so I'm just going to put them on the
11 record of what we'll be dealing with. It's
12 a retaining wall, that the cost on it would
13 be \$10,950 in addition to the asphalt, which
14 is \$2,203.28, and the painting of all the
15 courts is \$62,445. Just so everyone is
16 aware of that portion.

17 The senior center officially opened
18 last week. We had the ladies who play
19 Mahjong in, so they were the first ones to
20 use it. We are currently waiting on the
21 Lackawanna County Area Agency on Aging to
22 begin helping us to set up meals and
23 activities, which will be very new for Old
24 Forge Borough.

25 CDBG, Community Development Block

1 Grant, we need a project. I'm going to ask
2 one of our committees if we can get together
3 and put something on paper because our
4 representative will be coming to our August
5 18th meeting, giving his speech and asking
6 for our future projects. The deadline has
7 passed for two of those.

8 I'm going to request a sewer
9 committee meeting, hopefully next week. We
10 have a few items we need to discuss.

11 What Mike and Jason mentioned
12 before, we applied for a grant through the
13 Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and
14 Delinquency. The grant is called Safety and
15 Surveillance Modernization Initiative in the
16 amount of \$232,057. So, Jay, thank you for
17 your help, and to our grant writers who were
18 a help as well. That's all I have.

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do any of the
20 members have any questions for the borough
21 manager? Okay. Before we go into new
22 business we'll go to public comment.
23 Anybody on the public comment sheet?
24 Christine Gogas. How can we help you?

25 MS. GOGAS: Thank you for having me.

1 I became an Old Forge resident two and a
2 half years ago. I bought a home on Church
3 Street. I love my home. I did not know
4 when I bought my home that there was a
5 colony of feral cats next door. I do
6 believe some people in the borough are aware
7 of this. There were 32 cats last year.
8 Most of them either have died or whatever
9 came of them, people picked them up.

10 This year it is just as bad, if not
11 worse. There are at least three litters of
12 babies who are sick. They are literally
13 full of maggots and they are dying all over
14 the property right next to me. They are
15 coming on my property, they are defecating
16 on my property. I came out my kitchen door
17 to go to work a week ago and there was a
18 pile of cat crap. I had to clean it up.
19 There was maggots in it.

20 I'm a taxpayer, I'm a homeowner. My
21 neighbors -- I can't even tell you anybody
22 except for my one neighbor. I keep to
23 myself. I do not cause trouble. The cops
24 have never been to my home, they'll never be
25 to my home. I have grandchildren who come

1 to my house. It's not fair that my grand
2 babies can't play in my yard because of
3 this.

4 MS. CHICKEY: What was your address
5 again?

6 MS. GOGAS: It's 311 Church.

7 MS. CHICKEY: So this is 310?

8 CHIEF DUBERNAS: No, 315. I know
9 the zoning officer, Dan, was out there the
10 other night.

11 MS. CHICKEY: I reached out to him
12 because I got a message from somebody.

13 CHIEF DUBERNAS: He was there
14 Thursday night. You might want to reach out
15 to him for more answers.

16 MS. GOGAS: The T&R did come and she
17 trapped. This past week I've had five or
18 six ladies give up a whole night to sit with
19 these traps. They did catch some of them,
20 but now they're finding them dead. It's not
21 okay.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Two ways --
23 and I'll let Marylynn jump in after me.
24 One, we could contact our part-time zoning
25 officer. He was there, like the chief said.

1 We can find out if he cited anyone, if he
2 documented anything.

3 Second thing is once we hire a full
4 time zoning officer Marylynn could also
5 instruct that person to go to that house and
6 start the process of the documentation of
7 taking care of the problem.

8 Third, we also have a trap and
9 release program.

10 MS. GOGAS: I'm working with a team
11 already. I'm with them since last year.

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That's the
13 third option.

14 MS. GOGAS: There's no vouchers.
15 They don't have the funding to take them.
16 Now they're asking for donations from the
17 community, which I absolutely will donate
18 something. But they're not my cats.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: We usually have
20 vouchers and stuff. We don't have any right
21 now. We do provide that service. But do
22 you know if somebody in the neighborhood is
23 actually feeding them?

24 MS. GOGAS: Absolutely. The people
25 next door to me. The house on the corner of

1 Tanya and Church. It is her. The T&R
2 ladies did tell them they had to seal a
3 basement window because the cats go in and
4 out of there. So they did seal that. She
5 also told them that they cannot feed these
6 cats anymore. Saturday night I witnessed
7 him open the door and a bunch of cats ran
8 out. I can't tell you how many. The stink,
9 when it's warm I can't even sit in my yard.
10 It's that putrid.

11 Anyway, a bunch of the cats ran out
12 with him and he puts plates of food down
13 Saturday night. I watched him do it. I do
14 have pictures. I did try to work with the
15 last zoning officer on this. I e-mailed
16 him, I called him, I sent him videos,
17 pictures. When nothing changed I got angry
18 and I said now I know why the people that
19 owned house prior to me put it on the market
20 in the winter. I bought my house in the
21 winter. Had I had any idea I never would
22 have bought my home. Never. Who wants to
23 live next door to that? If you guys would
24 just take a ride you would see. They don't
25 maintain the property either. Is it even

1 fit for human habitat? Especially if all
2 these cats are going in this basement. Now
3 they're in a crawl space. Are they dying
4 down there?

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That is what
6 the part-time zoning officer and full time
7 zoning officer will determine when they go
8 to the property and assess it.

9 MS. CHICKEY: Can you call the
10 animal control?

11 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Griffen Pond? We
12 can reach out to the Humane Society, Marci.

13 MS. GOGAS: She can come talk to me.

14 MS. CHICKEY: This is like they are
15 hoarding the cats.

16 MS. GOGAS: These cats have been
17 there over a year. I live next door. I see
18 it every day, I smell it every day. They're
19 on my property every day. I'm not the only
20 one. There's a really nice young couple
21 that bought a home on Tanya Drive. They
22 have a beautiful deck. She said we can't
23 even use our deck, it stinks so bad. So
24 it's not just me. The T&R ladies took a
25 dead cat out of the pool over a block on

1 Church Street while they were there trying
2 to trap over this weekend. So it's not just
3 me, the neighbor next door being impacted,
4 it's the neighborhood.

5 People, I think, are afraid to step
6 up, but somebody has to be the voice. So
7 here I am. I thank you guys for letting me
8 speak.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Guy Ferret?

10 MR. FERRET: My concern is I want to
11 bring up to you guys and our police chief
12 how the process might take place. Maybe
13 it's something going on. Other boroughs,
14 towns you see on the news and the paper
15 about the scooters and E-bikes. I'm sure
16 maybe anybody might have gotten complaints.
17 When you drive around town you might see it
18 yourself.

19 On my street -- and everybody knows
20 where I live. Devon is right around the
21 corner. He might be a witness, too, but not
22 as much as me. My biggest concern even
23 without kids is what I've been seeing in the
24 last four to five weeks. E-scooters,
25 they're not registered for the street. Am I

1 correct, Chief?

2 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Correct. We're in
3 the process. We're going to try to
4 duplicate the one Blakely has. We had
5 accidents with them and everything.

6 MR. FERRET: Something's going to
7 happen before it's too late. But that's
8 good news, you got the ball rolling on it.
9 However you come up with it, it's a warning
10 or a citation right off the bat.

11 CHIEF DUBERNAS: They've been
12 getting warnings. The parents are worse.

13 MR. FERRETT: What are you going to
14 do? It's the summer, they want to ride
15 their bikes instead of sitting on the
16 phones. That's a great thing, but they have
17 to do it with respect to the drivers on the
18 road because they don't belong there.

19 With that being said, I'm glad
20 there's something in the future and in the
21 process. I just happen to be, about two
22 weeks ago, coming out of my house and
23 leaving to go running around and the girl on
24 the corner has two young kids and that's
25 where six or seven congregate, between the

1 scooters and the e-bikes. So the two kids
2 came up wearing helmets on e-bikes, and they
3 go pretty good. Twenty-five or 30 miles an
4 hour.

5 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Maybe more.

6 MR. FERRETT: So they came by me,
7 but what was a little disheartening is one
8 of our officers came around Church Street
9 and followed them right to where the church
10 is and my uncle that passed lives. So the
11 two e-bikes go through the stop sign. They
12 don't acknowledge the stop sign like our
13 vehicles do. So the same officer with the
14 windows tinted -- I can't tell you who it
15 is. It was a Blazer or Bronco -- Explorer.
16 So now he's following them, and I go out in
17 the street and I'm looking, to go up to the
18 next stop sign where Jimmy Williams lives.

19 So without any ordinance or anything
20 as we speak I would think that the officer
21 should have caught up with them and tried to
22 say listen, guys, you're going too fast and
23 you don't belong on the street. When they
24 made the right on Stuart I don't know if
25 that took place. I only could witness the

1 first block of Vine and the second block of
2 Vine.

3 But the point I'm getting at, even
4 though there's nothing in black and white
5 there is no ordinance that's being serviced.
6 This officer, in my eyes, should have at
7 least pulled up and told them something.

8 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Give me the day of
9 the week and time, I can look it up.

10 MR. FERRET: It was evening. You
11 don't have to mention names. I've seen that
12 a number of times but that was the one that
13 really bothered me, that the officer came
14 down Church, made a left, followed them.
15 They had the chance to stop the two kids.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any chance you
17 caught the car number on the side of the
18 vehicle?

19 MR. FERRET: No. All I know is it
20 was a Blazer.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If you could
22 give him the time and date he can find it
23 out on the schedule.

24 MR. FERRET: It was 7:00, 7:30. All
25 the windows were tinted. That's all I want

1 to bring up. As long as there's something
2 in the making that we're going to get this
3 taken care of. The young kids out and about
4 with school out and the girl on the corner,
5 her two boys, there's seven, eight. They
6 fly around that corner. It's so dangerous.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: It's a very
8 dangerous situation for people driving.
9 It's dangerous all together. We agree with
10 you 100 percent.

11 MR. FERRET: Is it the kid's fault
12 or the driver obeying the law? But the kids
13 could cause something like this. On my
14 street it just -- I'm on a daily basis with
15 the kids.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: It's all over.

17 MR. FERRET: You get it cleared up
18 ASAP.

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: What the chief
20 said. Our solicitor already has it. We
21 discussed it last month. We asked Bill to
22 get a copy of it. If we have to we're just
23 going to mimic it with our borough so we can
24 protect and prevent children from --

25 MR. FERRET: Something's going to

1 happen.

2 MS. CHICKEY: I saw two kids
3 piggyback, no helmets.

4 MR. FERRET: Thank you for your
5 time.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Kathy McGary.

7 MS. MCCAWLEY: I'm just here to see
8 what the status is on the Jeffers wall.

9 MS. BARTOLETTI: I apologize. I got
10 your two messages and the phone number was
11 wrong on them. I didn't have a chance to
12 get back to you. The permit for Mr. Jeffers
13 has been reviewed.

14 MR. JOHNS: So there were drawings
15 submitted for the retaining wall. I had a
16 comment on the drawing. It seemed like it
17 wasn't a full design. I provided that
18 comment letter back to the borough.

19 MS. MCGARY: So it's in the process?

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: It's in the
21 process. It's definitely in the process.
22 So as soon as there's a design that Dave is
23 comfortable with, then the actual permit
24 will be given to him. He did go through the
25 permitting process. We're making sure

1 everything is good because of the
2 circumstances of the wall. As soon as Dave
3 is good with it.

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: It sound to me
5 that the engineer wants the wall constructed
6 and re-enforced a little bit better than the
7 current plans. Correct?

8 MR. JOHNS: So to get into the weeds
9 a little bit, the type of block that they're
10 proposing I've used before. It's an
11 adequate block. It's a bigger block. But
12 the fact is the drawings said tieback.
13 There's a tieback system that holds the
14 wall. Geogrid. That geogrid was indicated
15 on the drawing but said designed by
16 engineer, and I wasn't satisfied by that.
17 So I said that we should see that design.

18 MS. MCGARY: So after you get the
19 permit you'll give me a call?

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: Absolutely.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Before we go
22 into new business would any other members of
23 the public like to address us?

24 MR. TAGLIATERRA: Addressing of
25 Keyser Avenue and Oak Street and the Taylor

1 line. We had a call during the week for a
2 water leak at 259 -- they gave the address
3 as South Keyser, which puts it down towards
4 Mowry Street. The only thing that set me
5 off, they said it was the attorneys' office.
6 So I knew the attorneys' office was the
7 corner of Sibley. So that's where I went
8 and I had the engine come up to Sibley.
9 That's where it was.

10 When I asked the person on site, I
11 said what address did you give? She said
12 259 South Keyser Avenue. I said that's not
13 your address. You're technically on North
14 Keyser Avenue.

15 So is there any way we can look into
16 please getting that readdressed so we don't
17 have this issue for an ambulance call or
18 fire call? From Oak Street to the Taylor
19 line should be North Keyser Avenue.

20 CHIEF DUBERNAS: We've been dealing
21 with it. They all got letters that says
22 their address is North Keyser Avenue. Their
23 response was their deed says South Keyser
24 Avenue. So they're refusing to change it.
25 We sent them all letters. The only one

1 that's correct is the 100 block.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Is there
3 anything the borough can do or is it the
4 responsibility of the homeowner?

5 ATTY. RINALDI: It's the homeowner
6 and 911.

7 MR. BROWN: Last time this was
8 addressed they recommended planning and land
9 use. They're the ones that assign the
10 numbers. So within economic development --

11 CHIEF DUBERNAS: The numbers are
12 correct. It's just the orientation. Comm
13 center has the letter. The people calling
14 are still saying South Keyser. If it's
15 something serious a lot of times they'll
16 dispatch Taylor Police because they think
17 it's a Taylor address. The 300 block of
18 South Keyser is actually Taylor and then it
19 comes to us. Instead of changing the
20 orientation they just changed it to South
21 Keyser all the way to Sibley, down to the
22 rear of Keyser, which is the old Diamond
23 Club. That's the only block that shows
24 North Keyser. So Gilchrist, the Diamond
25 Club or Stocky's property are the only ones

1 that come up 105 or 107 North Keyser.
2 Anything above that CDL trucking place is a
3 South Keyser address.

4 MR. BROWN: You can't GIS the map.
5 They're the ones that put the addresses
6 on --

7 MR. FERRET: Taylor is 18517, Old
8 Forge is 18518.

9 CHIEF DUBERNAS: If they say South
10 Keyser Avenue it gets dispatched to Taylor.
11 There's no 200 block of South Keyser Avenue,
12 Taylor.

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Chief, how
14 many houses are on there? Four? Five?

15 CHIEF DUBERNAS: I think 17 total.
16 White Hall Mortgage, Back Road. I think
17 there's six on one side, eight on the other,
18 then the attorneys' office, then four and
19 three on the other side. People call and
20 say we're not changing our address. Our
21 deed says South Keyser.

22 MR. BROWN: Now, if we call the
23 recorder of deeds and asked her to update
24 the deed to the correct address they're not
25 changing their address. If we update their

1 deed what would be the process to -- say a
2 quitclaim deed. If there is some incorrect
3 hindrance on the deed what would be the
4 process?

5 ATTY. RINALDI: The owner of the
6 house would have to actually do a new deed
7 for his property. You're talking about the
8 address they list. That would be the
9 assessor's office. You have to go to the
10 assessor's and sign a form as the owner
11 saying my address is listed wrong. Their
12 deed is their description written probably
13 50, 60 years ago.

14 MR. BROWN: The police department
15 tried mapping GIS. Apparently that hasn't
16 worked. Maybe if we reached out to Evie
17 Rafalko along with the assessor's and say
18 let's all work together on updating this to
19 satisfy them, do whatever needs to be done
20 to correct the irregularities on their deed,
21 ensuring that that information is provided
22 accurately on the GIS.

23 ATTY. RINALDI: You can't change
24 deeds on your own. The owner of the
25 property has to say I want a new deed.

1 They'll have to get a surveyor to say
2 something different than what they have
3 currently.

4 MR. BROWN: Right. We get the 17
5 residents together, because there's
6 obviously a public safety issue here, and we
7 get them into this room right here and we're
8 going to say we're going to straighten this
9 out here and now. The residents are going
10 off their deed, which is a piece of paper
11 describing their plot plan as this, which
12 it's technically not. So we need the
13 recorder to straighten that out. Then she
14 would give that to the assessor within 30
15 days. So maybe we can get a meeting
16 together with these property owners, 17 of
17 them, with the recorder and Pat Tobin.

18 ATTY. RINALDI: You can try.

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Instead of
20 asking the owners to go up to the
21 recorder's, ask the homeowners to come here
22 and bring the recorder of deeds to them.

23 MR. BROWN: Correct.

24 ATTY. RINALDI: That's fine with me.
25 That's up to them. Mapping is mapping.

1 MR. BROWN: Public safety.

2 MR. KOMENSKY: I'll call Pat Tobin,
3 find out what the process is.

4 MR. BROWN: We can get the property
5 owners in here, we will do something.

6 MR. KOMENSKY: I'll call Pat before
7 he goes to work in the morning. He can meet
8 Jason and me here. We'll tell him what
9 issues we're having.

10 MR. TAGLIATERRA: I will sit down
11 with Larry and see if there's a way of maybe
12 putting an alias address on them, so if they
13 say they're on South Keyser they're Old
14 Forge. I don't know, multiple addresses.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Chief Tag, why
16 don't we let you contact the office, we'll
17 let Councilman Komensky contact Pat Tobin,
18 set up a meeting, like Councilman Brown
19 said. We'll try and get everybody in the
20 same room.

21 MR. BROWN: Everybody okay with a
22 two week follow up? The 28th.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else,
24 Chief?

25 MR. TAGLIATERRA: No.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Before we move
2 into new business, any other members of the
3 public like to address us? Okay. We're
4 going to move into new business. I'm going
5 to ask everyone to bear with us. We have a
6 lot of items on the agenda. We're going to
7 have to add a few, too. We're going to
8 start slow, just continue.

9 First item on the agenda in new
10 business, we've already filled it, the
11 vacant seat on Old Forge Council.

12 Item number two is an appointment of
13 code enforcement and zoning officer, full
14 time, for the Old Forge Borough. For public
15 knowledge and for the record, we had a
16 resignation of our former code
17 enforcement/zoning officer, Michael
18 Sokolowski. Then, under the permission of
19 council, Marylynn and our solicitor
20 advertised to accept applications. Those
21 applications were legally advertised in the
22 Scranton Times and the advertisement was
23 legally advertised in the Scranton Times to
24 accept applications due until Friday, June
25 19, 2026. Up until that date we received

1 three applications. We received an
2 application from Frank Lia, we received a
3 second application from Benjamin Pritchky,
4 and we received a third application from Pat
5 Collins.

6 The job start date that council came
7 up with will be this Monday, July 20th. The
8 salary for the position will be \$45,000 plus
9 benefits. Marylynn, benefit package is
10 health, eyes, dental?

11 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. There is
12 retirement.

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else?

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: No.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else
16 for the motion? At this time out of the
17 three applicants -- this is just going to be
18 a motion to open up nominations. The chair
19 is going to entertain a motion to open up
20 nominations, and any member of council can
21 say any three of those names.

22 MR. KOMENSKY: I'll make a motion to
23 open up nominations.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: By Councilman
25 Komensky. All in favor?

1 (Unanimous.)

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Nominations
3 are now open.

4 MS. CHICKEY: I'd like to nominate
5 Benny Pritchky.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We have one
7 nomination for Ben Pritchky. Are there any
8 other members who would like to make a
9 nomination?

10 MR. LETTIERI: I'd like to nominate
11 Frank Lia.

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We have a
13 second nomination for Frank Lia. Any other
14 members who would like to make a nomination?

15 MR. BUTLER: I'd like to nominate
16 Pat Collins.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We have a
18 third nomination for Pat Collins. There are
19 no more names for nominations, so at this
20 time the chair is going to ask to close
21 nominations.

22 MR. KOMENSKY: I'll make that
23 motion.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion by
25 Councilman Komensky. All in favor? This is

1 just to close nominations.

2 (Unanimous.)

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Nominations
4 are now closed. I'm going to ask Marylynn
5 to call roll call. At that time any member
6 of council is able to say the name of one of
7 those three nominated. Roll call, please,
8 Marylynn.

9 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

10 MR. BUTLER: Pat Collins.

11 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
12 Chickey?

13 MS. CHICKEY: Benny Pritchky.

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
15 Komensky?

16 MR. KOMENSKY: Pritchky.

17 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
18 Lettieri?

19 MR. LETTIERI: Frank Lia.

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Nese?

21 MR. NESE: Pritchky.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Brown?

23 MR. BROWN: Benny Pritchky.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Benny

1 Pritchyk. I'd like to thank everyone who
2 put their applications in. Mr. Lia, thank
3 you, thank you to Mr. Collins, and thank you
4 to Mr. Pritchyk and also congratulations.
5 Ben, if you could get in contact with
6 Marylynn this week. As we stated in the
7 motion the start date will be this Monday.
8 Marylynn is finished with the park program
9 this week, so she'll set a meeting up for
10 you for Monday and she'll call you in and
11 she'll start the process.

12 At this time we're going to move
13 into item number three. The chair is going
14 to entertain a motion to accept the settling
15 of a lawsuit of a part-time police officer.

16 MR. KOMENSKY: I'll make that
17 motion.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion by
19 Councilman Komensky.

20 MR. NESE: I'll second that.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by
22 Councilman Nese. On the question? Public
23 input? Roll call, please.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

25 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

1 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
2 Chickey?

3 MS. CHICKEY: Yes.

4 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
5 Komensky?

6 MR. KOMENSKY: Yes.

7 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
8 Lettieri?

9 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Nese?

11 MR. NESE: Yes.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Brown?

13 MR. BROWN: Yes.

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. This is
16 going to be added to the agenda. It is
17 going to be a motion to add. The chair is
18 going to entertain a motion to add the
19 acceptance of the resignation of a part-time
20 police officer. This is just to add to the
21 agenda.

22 MR. BUTLER: I'll make that motion.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion by
24 Councilman Butler.

25 MR. KOMENSKY: Second.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by
2 Councilman Komensky. On the question?
3 Public input? Roll call, please.

4 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

5 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
7 Chickey?

8 MS. CHICKEY: Yes.

9 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
10 Komensky?

11 MR. KOMENSKY: Yes.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
13 Lettieri?

14 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Nese?

16 MR. NESE: Yes.

17 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Brown?

18 MR. BROWN: Yes.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. Item 3B,
21 this is now going to be a motion to approve
22 the resignation letter of a part-time police
23 officer.

24 MR. BUTLER: I'll make that motion.

25 MR. KOMENSKY: Motion by Councilman

1 Komensky.

2 MR. BUTLER: I'll second it.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by
4 Councilman Butler. On the question? Public
5 input? Roll call, please.

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

7 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
9 Chickey?

10 MS. CHICKEY: Yes.

11 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
12 Komensky?

13 MR. KOMENSKY: Yes.

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
15 Lettieri?

16 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

17 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Nese?

18 MR. NESE: Yes.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Brown?

20 MR. BROWN: Yes.

21 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. Item
23 number four is going to be a motion to hire
24 a full time police officer from the
25 certified civil service list. The officer's

1 name is Thomas Sherwood. Motion to higher
2 Thomas Sherwood to the Old Forge Police
3 Department as a full time Old Forge police
4 officer.

5 MR. BUTLER: I'll make that motion.

6 MR. LETTIERI: I'll second it.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion by
8 Councilman Butler, seconded by Councilman
9 Lettieri. On the question? Public input?
10 Roll call, please.

11 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

12 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
14 Chickey?

15 MS. CHICKEY: Yes.

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
17 Komensky?

18 MR. KOMENSKY: Yes.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
20 Lettieri?

21 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Nese?

23 MR. NESE: Yes.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Brown?

25 MR. BROWN: Yes.

1 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
2 Rinaldi?

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. Item
4 number five I'm going to read and then I'm
5 going to let Marylynn explain it for a
6 minute. Motion to approve payment
7 application number five for Hoffman
8 Electrical Contractors.

9 MS. BARTOLETTI: So this is payment
10 application number five for Hoffman, which
11 is the contractor doing the lighting at
12 Marion Street Park, and the payment
13 application for tonight is \$5,018.18. That
14 is the balance. It's final.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Item number
16 five, motion to approve payment application
17 number five.

18 MR. KOMENSKY: I'll make that
19 motion.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion by
21 Councilman Komensky.

22 MS. CHICKEY: I'll second it.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by
24 Councilwoman Chickey. On the question?

2 site a couple times. They were very

19 Be it further resolved that the

21 Bartoletti, Borough Manager, and Russell
22 Rinaldi, Council President, as the officials
23 to execute all documents and agreements
24 between the borough of Old Forge and the
25 Commonwealth Financing Authority to

1 facilitate and assist in obtaining the
2 requested grant."

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion to
4 approve?

6 that I have for new business. Do any of the
7 members have anything before we go down?
8 Mayor Legg, any comment before we adjourn?

9 MAYOR LEGG: Thank you, first of
10 all, congratulations, Mr. Brown, and
11 congratulations, Mr. Pritchyk. Councilman
12 Butler, Councilman Komensky, Ben, Marylynn,
13 again, excellent job. Excellent job. I
14 have a person busting my chops every day for
15 eight and a half years why doesn't the
16 borough do this, why don't we do that. That
17 Monday morning after the celebration he came
18 running up to me and shook my hand and said
19 it was a great job. You guys did a
20 fantastic job. That's all I have.

21 MR. NESE: Benny, congratulations.
22 I look forward to working with you.

23 Devon, congratulations. I look
24 forward to working with you as well.

25 The 250 celebration, everybody that

1 was involved, everybody that came a couple
2 days before, like me, I'm so proud to have
3 been a part of that. I remember the
4 centennial celebration the town had in '99
5 as a kid. I was nine years old. I remember
6 it. I hope that there was kids there like
7 me that are going to remember that because
8 I'm going to remember it. I was proud to
9 work with each and every one of you guys
10 every day I was here. Good luck to you
11 both.

12 MR. BROWN: I'd just like to thank
13 all of council for tonight. I appreciate
14 everyone, and I look forward to working with
15 not only you guys as colleagues, the borough
16 administration, staff, the community as
17 well.

18 Congratulations on the 250. I know
19 all of the borough staff, council members
20 planned it and worked hard and it was a
21 beautiful day. Thank you.

22 MR. KOMENSKY: So I'd like to
23 congratulate Devon. I look forward to
24 working with you.

25 Benny, congratulations. I look

1 forward to working with you.

2 I'd like to thank everybody else who
3 applied, whether it was for a council
4 position or for code enforcement officer.
5 Not an easy decision to make, but
6 unfortunately here's where we're at.

7 So I have a laundry list. I can sit
8 here and speak all day about the 250
9 celebration. It was a pet peeve of ours
10 going back to October, since Marylynn said.
11 We couldn't have asked for better weather,
12 better people. It was just unbelievable.
13 I'm glad I listened to my two colleagues who
14 got me to walk in the parade. It was
15 probably the most excitement I've had in
16 many years. I lead a boring life. It was
17 very exciting to see the smiles on the kids
18 and it was just amazing.

19 So first of all, I would like to
20 thank the Old Forge Borough Council for
21 funding the celebration because it started
22 there. If we didn't have the funds to fund
23 this celebration. So I appreciate everybody
24 sitting at this table, some people who are
25 not here, for agreeing to this project that

1 we had.

2 I'd like to thank the Old Forge
3 School District, the board of education,
4 their management, staff for allowing us with
5 open arms to use the stadium. They were
6 very accommodating and they didn't stop us
7 from having this pipe dream coming to
8 reality. It really worked. The vendors,
9 the bands. I mean, a great bunch of people
10 to work with. Lackawanna County, who we got
11 the bandstand from. Whoever showed up and
12 walked in the parade, drove a car in the
13 parade.

14 The chief, I don't know if I'll ever
15 ask you again to invite all the fire trucks.
16 I can't thank you guys enough. It was very
17 nice. We can't thank you enough for having
18 them. It was great to see them out.

19 Chief and the police department,
20 everybody went out of their way. I can't
21 tell you how proud I was when I saw those
22 two cars coming up the road, and you know
23 that was a pet peeve of mine. I thank you
24 for that.

25 But lastly, for everybody that

1 attended, called, those kids going down that
2 slide, even the two big kids that went down
3 late at night. It was just a great day.
4 Proud to be an Old Forger. I can sit here
5 and say the sky is no limit. We are going
6 to convene the 250 celebration committee
7 next week to try and finish up. We have
8 some thank yous to do and we'll have some
9 discussions on what we're going to do for
10 251. We have big shoes to fill.

11 I'm just proud. That day I was on
12 Main Street I was proud. I have to stop
13 now. Thank you very much to everyone.
14 Thank you, thank you, thank you.

15 MR. LETTIERI: First off, I'd like
16 to congratulate Benny, Devon on your new
17 appointments. Also thank Frank, Pat, Ray,
18 Alicia for their interest in the borough. I
19 want to give kudos to all you guys. Mark,
20 yourself, the fire department, Bill Stull
21 for letting me ride shotgun in the parade.
22 Chief, working with you that day and Joe,
23 the DPW, it was pretty awesome. Special
24 thanks, obviously, to Marylynn and the
25 committee. Mr. Butler, Mr. Pritchuk,

1 everyone, Mr. Komensky. You did a wonderful
2 job. Everything was great, I heard.
3 Everything was good. People want to do it
4 every year now. So thank you guys.
5 Appreciate it.

6 MR. BUTLER: Congratulate Devon and
7 Benny on their appointments. Two good
8 people. Also for the 250th celebration. I
9 wouldn't even know where to start. Actually
10 I do know where to start. I'll start right
11 down at the end of the table. She's the one
12 that started the whole thing rolling. She
13 brought it up to us and we just kind of ran
14 with it. It turned out it was a really,
15 really good thing. Got a little shaky early
16 on in the morning because it was raining. I
17 remember telling Marylynn I said you're like
18 a long-tailed cat in room full of rocking
19 chairs. The rain stopped at 1:00.

20 I mean, nothing was greater than to
21 see all those people there and having such a
22 good time. Brought me back to the old days
23 when you used to have the carnival.

24 So like I said, they say it takes a
25 village. It took a village to pull it off.

1 It wasn't just basically us three. We had
2 the subcommittee and the fire department,
3 the police department. There was so much to
4 do. But every part of that day was great,
5 from the parade to the fireworks. It was
6 tremendous. I thank everybody that was
7 involved. I had a great time.

8 MS. CHICKEY: Always a tough time
9 for me after all that, but I want to say
10 congratulations to Devon Brown. Welcome
11 aboard, welcome back. Congratulations to
12 Benny Pritchyk. I know you can do this.

13 The 250 year celebration is probably
14 one of the best things that I've seen since
15 I was a kid, since '76. I was six years
16 old. I was glad when I could help when I
17 did. I enjoyed it so much, and everybody
18 here, the police department, chief, chief,
19 Joe, everybody. It was just so nice to see.
20 That day I don't think anything could bring
21 you down. If it did --

22 MR. KOMENSKY: We weren't going to
23 let it.

24 MS. CHICKEY: And that drone show, I
25 was crying. It was beautiful. So,

1 Marylynn, thank you for all your sacrifices,
2 and Mike and Beaver and Benny. I mean,
3 looking at it from my perspective of from
4 somebody else's eyes that saw all the work
5 that went into it from the fire department,
6 the DPW, and it just looked so flawless. I
7 was just glad to be a part of it.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Well said.

9 MR. KOMENSKY: I just want to say
10 thank you to everybody because the comments
11 really mean a lot. I know they mean a lot
12 to Marylynn. I can't even look at her right
13 now.

14 But what I would like to say is I
15 was there late that night. Was it 1:00?
16 And I'm still there. He said to me aren't
17 you going home? I just walked around the
18 stadium in awe that night.

19 What I wanted to say is as soon as I
20 get the pictures and the video of the drone
21 show, which what I was able to do is I got
22 the original sound bite that we played on
23 stage that night and I got it put on the
24 video. So it will be like you were there.
25 As soon as I get all that I'll show it to

1 you. Thank you for all the comments. It
2 really means a lot.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay. First
4 of all, I'd like to say well said by every
5 member up here. It's nice to hear all the
6 members express their appreciation, their
7 gratitude and their good comments and
8 thoughts for the celebration. It's nice to
9 hear them congratulate the people who were
10 awarded either the hired position tonight or
11 the applicants. It's just nice to see that
12 the members of the council appreciate the
13 public, the public appreciates the members
14 of council. So that's what it's about to
15 me.

16 But I would like to start off with a
17 couple things. My first congratulation is
18 going to be to Councilman Brown. Devon,
19 congratulations. I worked with you for four
20 years in your first term, 2014 to 2018. I
21 look forward to working with you again as
22 well and continue to work with our current
23 members. I feel we have a good team. I
24 felt we had a good team before as well. I
25 feel like we can continue keep moving the

1 borough forward, we can continue helping out
2 our community and our residents, our
3 children, and I feel that we can all keep
4 going forward and I feel you're going to be
5 an asset to that, along with everyone who is
6 currently here.

7 Congratulations to Benny Pritchuk on
8 your appointment to the zoning department.
9 Ben, as you know because you sat here for a
10 few months prior with us, as time goes on
11 that department is going to be a really busy
12 area. I have full confidence in you and I'm
13 sure you're going to fulfill it. We're here
14 to help you with whatever you need.
15 Marylynn is here, the borough council is
16 here. We really need you to hit the ground
17 running and I firmly believe you will do
18 that. I'm happy with my decision.

19 I'd like to thank the other two
20 applicants as well. I know I already said
21 it. Mr. Lia and Mr. Collins. I thank them
22 for putting in. I thank the other
23 applicants again for putting in for our
24 borough council seat, Mrs. Hudak and
25 Mr. Talipski. It's not an easy job

1 decision. I know I love it, I know we all
2 love it. I commend anyone who puts their
3 name in and runs for the seat or be
4 appointed to the seat and sit here fulfill
5 the duties of it.

6 I'd like to congratulate Officer
7 Sherwood as our newly appointed full time
8 police officer. Officer Sherwood's been
9 here with us a number of years, correct, as
10 a part-time officer? I think you hired him
11 back in maybe '16.

12 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Earlier than that.

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Well,
14 congratulations to him. He's definitely
15 fulfilled his duty and earned his time, so
16 I'm very happy with council's decision.

17 Congratulations to the two
18 recipients of Mayor Legg's proclamations.
19 Both well deserved. Mayor, I know I've said
20 this a lot. You've been doing this now for
21 maybe a little over nine months. Correct?
22 Almost a year? It's nice to see that you
23 recognize people from our public, our
24 community who deserve it. It's nice to see
25 that they appreciate it. It's a really nice

1 thing you do and I know you're going to
2 continue doing it. I'd like to see you move
3 forward.

4 With the 250 year celebration I'm
5 going to just take some time. I know you
6 probably read it when I posted it on
7 Facebook. I wrote something up basically
8 from myself but from all of us, and I wrote
9 it to the people who participated and the
10 people who organized it, the people who
11 worked it. I'm just going to read it for a
12 few moments and it's going to offer all my
13 thanks and my praise to everybody.

14 So first and foremost, I want to
15 thank -- I made it from the borough council.
16 I spoke for all of us.

17 "To the events committee, we send
18 our deepest gratitude for the commitment to
19 the committee members whose hard work,
20 vision and countless hours made this
21 celebration a reality. Thank you to former
22 councilman Benny Pritchky, Councilman Andy
23 Butler, Councilman Mike Komensky, and the
24 master behind it all from start to finish,
25 our borough manager, Marylynn Bartoletti.

1 Your commitment to our community and your
2 tireless efforts brought pride to our
3 borough and every corner of Old Forge.

4 To our borough officials, a special
5 thank you to Mayor Robert Legg for bringing
6 George Washington to life, Char Chickey as
7 our Statue of Liberty, Councilman Mario
8 Nese, Council Vice-President Michael
9 Lettieri, and myself. Your participation,
10 dedication and leadership set the tone for a
11 patriotic and memorial day. Great job to
12 all of you. Thank you very much.

13 To the 2026 event subcommittee,
14 thank you to Gina Dominick, Tracy Krasulski,
15 former councilwoman Jenna Jones-Shotwell,
16 former councilwoman Allison McCawley, Adam
17 Chase for your creativity, planning and
18 support. You're appreciated more than you
19 know.

20 To the borough staff and to our
21 departments. Department of public works,
22 DPW. Joseph Lenceski, our manager, and our
23 DPW staff, Bob Resio and Mike Reuther. So
24 you, Mike and Bob, you guys were there from
25 start to finish. You did a great job. I

1 know you did stuff also leading up to,
2 during it and after it. Great job. In the
3 weeks leading up to the event and all day
4 during it you ensured the borough shined for
5 the American milestone.

6 To our public safety departments,
7 Old Forge Police, Old Forge Fire and all our
8 EMS workers, thank you for your
9 professionalism, protection and presence.
10 To leading the parade with lights and
11 sirens, to working the entire event, keeping
12 our families safe, your service embodies the
13 very freedom we celebrate. We are grateful
14 for your dedication and duty and your pride
15 in this community.

16 To the borough secretaries and

18 scenes that made the celebration seamless.
19 We appreciate your daily commitment to Old
20 Forge."

21 Sandy, I thank you as well. You
22 guys worked the stands for the church. Nice
23 to see you.

24 "To All members of the Old Forge VFW
25 Post 4054, thank you for your continued

1 service and for standing with us to honor
2 America. We appreciate your time and
3 support at all of our events throughout the
4 year.

5 To our schools and students, thank
6 you to the Old Forge School District for
7 providing the grounds of Veterans Memorial
8 Football Stadium to host this event. All
9 Old Forge elementary and high school
10 students who participated in the parade,
11 including our cheerleaders, marching units
12 and the Old Forge High School band. You
13 made us proud and you showed the future of
14 Old Forge is bright.

16 participants, owners and drivers of the
17 classic and antique cars in the parade,

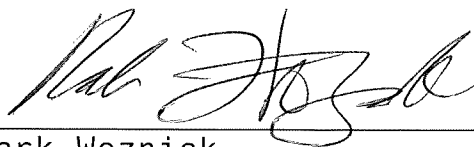
