1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Good evening,
2 ladies and gentlemen. I'd like to call the
3 meeting to order with the Pledge of
4 Allegiance.

5 (The Pledge of Allegiance was
6 recited.)

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Roll call,
8 please, Marylynn.

2 Borough Council meeting. The purpose of
3 tonight's meeting is we're going to go
4 through a few housekeeping motions, we're
5 going to hear reports from our department
6 heads.

9 we'll give you a few minutes at the end of
10 the meeting. We'll hear from our council

18 Councilman Komensky. On the question?
19 Public input? Roll call, please.

20 ATTY. RINALDI: Ms. Shotwell?

21 MS. SHOTWELL: Yes.

22 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Komensky?

23 MR. KOMENSKY: Yes.

24 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Butler?

25 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

1 ATTY. RINALDI: Ms. Avvisato?

2 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

3 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Hoover?

4 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

5 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Rinaldi?

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. Item
7 six, if council is okay with it we're going
8 to move the resignation of Councilman Notari
9 up to that number. Council okay if we move
10 that motion up? Okay. I'll read the motion
11 as stated. This is dated Friday, July 19,
12 2024.

13 "Dear Council President Rinaldi, it
14 is with regret that I offer my resignation
15 as borough councilman. For the better part
16 of eight years it has been my honor and
17 privilege to serve the good people of Old
18 Forge. I have worked for them and
19 represented all of them to the best of my
20 ability.

21 Last weekend my statement on social
22 media fell short of my best. There is no
23 place in our society to support violence. I
24 regret my actions and I regret placing our
25 beloved borough and community in a negative

1 light.

2 I apologize to all of the residents
3 of Old Forge and to the community at large.
4 I will strive to be a better person and a
5 better leader for those that continue to
6 support me.

7 Sincerely, Rick Notari, Councilman,
8 July 19, 2024."

9 At this time the chair would
10 entertain a motion to accept Councilman
11 Notari's resignation from the Old Forge
12 Borough.

13 MR. HOOVER: I'd like to make a
14 motion to accept Rick Notari's resignation.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We have a
16 motion on the floor by Councilman Hoover.

17 MR. BUTLER: I'll second it.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We have a
19 second by Councilman Butler. On the
20 question? Public comment? Roll call,
21 please.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
23 Shotwell?

24 MS. SHOTWELL: Yes.

25 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman

1 Komensky?

2 MR. KOMENSKY: Yes.

3 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

4 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman

6 Avvisato?

7 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

9 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. We're

12 going to move into our department heads.

13 Our first report will be our DPW manager,

14 Joseph Lenceski. Joe, good evening.

15 MR. LENCESKI: Good evening.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything for

17 the meeting?

18 MR. LENCESKI: Nothing for the

19 meeting.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have

21 any questions for the DPW manager?

22 MR. HOOVER: Joe, I'd like to thank

23 you for the quick response to the storm

24 damage last week. Your guys were out in a

25 half-hour to get those trees removed.

1 MR. LENCESKI: Thank you.

2 MR. HOOVER: You and your crew.

3 MR. KOMENSKY: I'd like to echo off
4 Jimmy's comments. I had to call Joe the
5 other night, we had water problems, and in a
6 matter of minutes he was calling me back and
7 taking care of them. Joe, thank you again
8 and your guys that night, too.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: As always,
10 good job. You and your crew. Anybody else
11 for Joe? Many thanks, Joe.

12 Mike Sokolowski, zoning/code
13 enforcement officer, anything for the
14 meeting?

15 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I have nothing for
16 the meeting.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
18 any questions for Michael? Thank you,
19 Michael.

20 Engineer, Dave Lopatka. Dave,
21 anything for the meeting?

22 MR. LOPATKA: That may be on there.

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: I have it on the
24 agenda.

25 MR. LOPATKA: Just the paving

1 project. We have the bids, we've reviewed
2 them, provided a letter recommending award.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
4 any questions for David?

5 MR. LOPATKA: Well, it's not a bid.
6 We issued that to American, but they also
7 were the low bidder on the overall project.
8 So I'm assuming they're just going to lump
9 it into the whole thing.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other
11 questions for David? Thanks, David.

12 Police chief, Jason Dubernas, is
13 absent, on vacation.

14 Assistant fire chief, Bill Stull,
15 anything for the meeting?

16 MR. STULL: No. Just one thing.
17 Holly Ridge Estates, we started doing our
18 inspections down there. Units three, four,
19 five, six and seven were done about two
20 weeks ago, both inspections and preplans,
21 and the other day we were down there for
22 units eight and nine. Both preplans and
23 inspection were done on that. So I believe
24 from the 1st of August they should be
25 starting to be rented out down there.

1 MS. SHOTWELL: Is there occupancy --

2 ATTY. RINALDI: We're waiting on
3 Dave's letter.

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: According to
5 the fire department they're ready.

6 MR. STULL: Yes, on our end.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Dave has a lot
8 to handle on his end, but up to fire code
9 there.

10 MR. STULL: Yes.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay.
12 Anything else, Bill?

13 MR. STULL: No.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone have
15 any questions for Bill? Thank you, Bill.

16 Attorney Rinaldi, anything for the
17 meeting.

18 ATTY. RINALDI: Nothing other than
19 what's in my report.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
21 any questions for the solicitor? Thank you,
22 Bill.

23 Borough manager, Marylynn?

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Does anyone have
25 any questions on any financial reports?

1 Okay. Just one thing. The PIB loan that
2 we're working on for next year, I'm working
3 on the whole package right now. So it will
4 be ready for August to be on the agenda to
5 be voted on. That's all.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
7 any questions for Marylynn? Thank you,
8 Marylynn.

9 Public comment sheet, George
10 Kollonige?

11 MR. KOLLONIGE: I spoke to
12 Mr. Sokolowski a few times and I've gotten
13 no real response to my problem. I spoke to
14 Representative Haddock's office and they got
15 the same response I got.

16 I've got some neighbors that -- I
17 live in a crap hole. I'd like to say what I
18 really feel about it. I have pictures here
19 if you'd like to see them. My address is
20 110 Thomas Street. The one home I'm
21 speaking about backs into my home. It comes
22 off of Sussex. Another one comes off of Oak
23 that comes into the side of my home. I
24 mean, it's really disgusting. This is the
25 view from my kitchen window, what I look at

1 when I'm doing dishes and everything. This
2 is the other yard. That is all overgrown
3 bushes. The one groomed is my yard. It's
4 terrible. That's coming from my back yard
5 looking at it and that's what's coming into
6 my yard. That's their fence all around,
7 too.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mike, is there
9 homeowners --

10 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: They abandoned the
11 house.

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The house is
13 abandoned?

14 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes. Now, I spoke
15 with the property manager. I gave him all
16 the information, what needs to be done, and
17 they still haven't gotten back.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Have we cited
19 them?

20 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: No. This is going
21 on probably about three weeks now, four
22 weeks.

23 MR. KOLLONIGE: Four, five weeks.
24 Then you were there once before.

25 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Right, before that.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So the house
2 is abandoned. Nobody's living there. But
3 you have contacted the property manager?

4 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Notified them?

6 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Yes.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Told them what
8 needs to be done, they still haven't taken
9 care of it?

10 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: No.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Have you
12 contacted them back to ask them why they
13 haven't --

14 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: I was on vacation
15 prior to that week and now this is the week
16 after. So it's another week.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bill,
18 according to the ticket book he has he can
19 cite them. Correct?

20 ATTY. RINALDI: What's the issue?

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Overgrown
22 trees.

23 ATTY. RINALDI: We have an ordinance
24 for weeds.

25 MR. HOOVER: I'd cite them.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yeah, I would
2 cite them. Now, the process would be?

3 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: It's going to be
4 finding out who's the owner, go to the
5 magistrate. It's probably going to be --

6 MR. KOLLONIGE: Whatever. They're
7 not moving now.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Is the house
9 in any condition to be condemned?

10 MR. KOLLONIGE: Yeah, I think it is
11 condemned.

12 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: It is.

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Who condemned
14 it?

15 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: The bank, whoever
16 has it.

17 MR. KOLLONIGE: Do you remember the
18 stink house where they found all the dead
19 animals? That's the house.

20 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: But there were
21 people living in it.

22 MS. SHOTWELL: After it was
23 condemned?

24 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Well, I don't know.

25 MR. HOOVER: We have to cite them.

1 Cite them, we'll go to the magistrate. That
2 will take a while.

3 MR. KOLLONIGE: Nothing going on
4 now, and you can see it growing into my
5 yard. Thank you.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Joan Wilk?

7 MS. WILK: I'm glad that Mr. Notari
8 was smart enough to resign his position.
9 We're on international news all the ways
10 down to Kentucky. It really was disgusting.
11 You don't like a guy, you don't wish he was
12 shot, amen.

13 Now, being the position is open,
14 rumor's going around that Mike Lettieri
15 might take that position. I hope he
16 doesn't, because if he didn't learn his
17 lesson when he was running for office and
18 was thrown under the bus by his so-called
19 friends -- I hope Mike is smart enough not
20 to take that because come November he's
21 going to have to rerun for that council
22 seat.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Well, I didn't
24 hear any rumors of anybody who wanted it so
25 far.

1 MS. WILK: Well, I'm just saying
2 what's going around. I hope Mike is smart
3 enough not to take it.

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The process is
5 tonight we have to make a motion and we have
6 to set an advertisement date.

7 MS. WILK: Mr. Rinaldi, you're
8 talking to an old politician. I know the
9 rules and regulations. And I'm not trying
10 to be sarcastic, but when you pick up the
11 news and you're down -- they're talking
12 about Old Forge in a little dinky town down
13 in Kentucky, come on. I knew his sarcasm
14 would get him in trouble one day, but that's
15 a Notari thing. I thank you for your time.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thank you,
17 Mrs. Wilk. Mark Polster?

18 MR. POLSTER: I'm here to echo the
19 flooding on Drake's Lane. We live at 161
20 Drake's Lane. As you know, that's one of
21 your problem spots in the borough. We just
22 really want to put forth the voice that the
23 water is a big problem.

24 Back in 2021 it was waist deep, in
25 August. Just this year at 12 feet

1 encroachment during the flooding onto the
2 property. It's backing up the sewer, it's
3 backing up the drains. We know that you've
4 been studying this project for 21 years now,
5 and we just ask for more urgency in this
6 matter. If you can please do what you can
7 in your power. Help your DPW. They've been
8 knocking on our doors for shovels and rakes
9 to clean out these drains in the middle of
10 the night. So you're not only helping us,
11 you're helping them, and I thank you for
12 your time and we appreciate it.

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thanks, Mark.
14 Wendy?

15 MS. DONNINI: It's my first meeting.
16 I'm a resident five years. I'm also someone
17 who lives on Drake's Lane, just a few houses
18 down from my neighbor. We've been talking
19 collectively about what we can do to bring
20 this to the forefront. We all have photos
21 of the flooding, and the one thing that I
22 noticed this most recent event is the road
23 never gets blocked off and people inevitably
24 try to drive through it. There is always
25 someone in a pickup truck who wants to go

1 through it as fast as they can, and when
2 they do there's typically a smaller vehicle
3 on the other side and they get overtaken by
4 the water and the car stalls. Then they end
5 up having to be towed.

6 I feel like there should be more
7 attention paid to this particular location,
8 since it is an issue, to prevent the people
9 from coming through because they wash all of
10 that debris up onto people's homes, their
11 lawns, cars, and it just keeps happening.
12 In the five years that I've been there I've
13 seen it really, really bad on three
14 occasions. I have photos, I have videos.

15 Again, I go with Mark's statements
16 and wonder at what point are we going to
17 talk about addressing the problem. I know
18 it's a lot of money, but it's one of several
19 areas that is a problem in the borough. But
20 I'd like to find out at what point we can
21 expect something to happen.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Dave, give us
23 an update?

24 MR. LOPATKA: Yeah. I did get down
25 there. I actually started putting together

1 a drainage map so I can see where all the
2 water is coming from, then we'll come up
3 with some kind of solution. I know right
4 now there's two inlets on that section of
5 road.

6 MS. DONNINI: There's three. We get
7 from up at the housing complex because
8 there's one up there, so all the water comes
9 down, goes around.

10 MR. LOPATKA: There's two right on
11 Drake's Lane in that low spot. They tie
12 into the sanitary system. They're not big
13 pipes. So I did take pictures of those and
14 I did drive around to figure out exactly
15 what's coming there. So I have a map put
16 together on that side. I didn't really
17 design anything yet. I am working on it.

18 MS. DONNINI: I try to keep the
19 drains clean. I walk it with my dog every
20 day picking up trash when we know it's going
21 to rain. So let's make sure that at least
22 the drain is clean so the water can get
23 through, but it still keeps --

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If you ever
25 notice a drain clogged, dirty and clogged,

1 call the borough and we'll come down.

2 MS. DONNINI: Anybody who's impacted
3 by it we're out there.

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If you do
5 notice it prior to a storm or anything. I
6 mean, Joe goes around and checks them
7 anyway, but if you notice it before he drove
8 past it or got to it just call the borough
9 building and we'll go right down and clean
10 it.

11 MS. DONNINI: We're supposed to get
12 some severe weather tomorrow. It's when it
13 comes down hard and fast.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That's why,
15 Dave, if we could try and at least expedite
16 the plan, see how we could do some type of
17 work down there to help.

18 MS. DONNINI: Any attention we can
19 get on the problem would be wonderful.
20 Thank you.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Victoria
22 Popple?

23 MS. POPPLE: I came here to comment
24 on Mr. Notari's comment online, but I am
25 surprised and actually happy that he did the

1 right thing, and for that I do give him all
2 the respect for doing the right because I
3 feel as though that him to remain on council
4 would have given us a blighted image
5 throughout the town, the county, the state,
6 and apparently quite a few other states.
7 But he did the right thing, and I applaud
8 all of you for accepting the resignation.
9 He did the right thing. I am very
10 surprised.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If anyone
12 didn't sign and would like to address us you
13 can come forward.

14 MR. YATSIK: Pete Yatsik. I kind of
15 supporting Donald Trump. We went to the
16 same college. He's older than me.

17 This is a serious matter. You make
18 comments like that -- I've known Mr. Notari
19 for a while. I think what we have to do
20 right now is exercise some forgiveness and
21 empathic support and compassion to Rick
22 Notari. Saw a lot of good things, but
23 sometimes there are unforgivable things, to
24 say something like that.

25 I want to say thank you to each and

1 every one of you for making our Constitution
2 work and taking time out to do that. Thumbs
3 up for our military. I don't know, this
4 country's gone haywire. I published an
5 article at Columbia University about
6 polarization. We're right, they're wrong.
7 We need common ground.

8 There's a concept known as zero sum
9 gain. For me to win, you must lose. Tip
10 O'Neill and Ronald Regan got things done
11 even though they disagreed.

12 That said, Vicky had a nice
13 conversation with the Lackawanna County an
14 hour before I called. Nice lady. I called
15 an hour later. Pat McKenna -- I was a
16 journalist, WBRE. The way I was treated by
17 Pat McKenna -- you guys are Facebook friends
18 with me. Read how I was treated. Very
19 converse the way Vicky was treated. He was
20 editor of the Scranton Times. I didn't
21 identify myself but I let him know that I
22 was a reporter.

23 The reason I'm saying we have to
24 exercise empathic support, forgiveness and
25 compassion to Rick Notari, I am an Ivy

1 League trained psychologist. This is more
2 of Luzerne and Lackawanna County. There's
3 just hatred out there that can't be
4 tolerated anymore. We have a reputation for
5 nepotism more so of political patronage. I
6 just want to know who hired Pat McKenna and
7 Nick Notari, if it was based on meritocracy
8 or was it this concept of political
9 patronage or nepotism. We have to get
10 together, guys. Thank you.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Before we go
12 on with the agenda would any other members
13 of the public like to address us who didn't
14 sign in?

15 MS. HERRON: Debbie Herron. So
16 everybody is condemning, criticizing and
17 whatnot, and I do agree that it is nice that
18 he did step down, but it wasn't all that
19 crazy. Everybody has a right to their
20 opinion, and we all know in this town,
21 because we're a small town, everything goes
22 around like wildfire. So, like, this will
23 die just like everything else died.

24 So I just believe that hey, he's a
25 guy, he's made a mistake and that's it.

1 That's my opinion. Everybody is just, like,
2 cutting him down and saying all these bad
3 things about him, and it's not you guys so
4 much or anybody else here, but it's in
5 general. I mean, how many times in our
6 lives have we made a comment and then gone
7 back to it and said oh, God, I shouldn't
8 have said that.

9 So that's all I wanted to say
10 because, like, he's only human. Yeah, I
11 feel bad for the guy personally. The
12 comment was uncalled for. But again, who
13 knows what he was doing that night when he
14 was making that comment. Thanks.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other
16 members of the public like to speak before
17 we move on? Thank you. We are going to
18 move on to new business. The chair is going
19 to make a motion to award the paving
20 contract. Mare, can you just go over the
21 companies and the numbers?

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: So the low bidder
23 is American Asphalt. Their base bid was
24 \$613,046. The alternate, one alternate, and
25 it's \$51,420, for a total of the \$664,466.

1 MR. HOOVER: I'll make the motion.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion by
3 Councilman Hoover to accept the paving
4 contract from American Asphalt in the amount
5 of \$664,466.

6 MS. AVVISATO: I'll second it.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by
8 Councilwoman Avvisato. On the question?
9 Public input?

10 MS. DONNINI: Where is that? Is it
11 a particular area?

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: What roads are
13 we paving?

14 MS. DONNINI: Yeah, in general.

15 MR. HOOVER: There's about eight
16 streets in the borough that we're paving.
17 We had work on a couple streets with the
18 utility company. They did some work in the
19 road and they're going to restore the cuts
20 and we're going to pave it. There's the
21 street down near the cemetery. We have a
22 list of about 15 streets. We're only
23 allowed so much money every year, so we had
24 to cut it back.

25 American Asphalt did some work for

1 us last year. They did a very good job.
2 What we estimated and what we bid was a
3 little bit cheaper, so we were able to do
4 two or three more streets. But we have
5 streets that all council and I know Joe
6 every year get a list of them. Next year
7 it's going to be a lot more. We're going to
8 try to get another loan for it. We pick the
9 worst streets in Old Forge and we kind of
10 put them together.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If you'd like
12 a copy you can contact the borough tomorrow
13 and we can get you a copy.

14 Okay. Public input? Roll call,
15 please.

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
17 Shotwell?

18 MS. SHOTWELL: Yes.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
20 Komensky?

21 MR. KOMENSKY: Yes.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

23 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
25 Avvisato?

1 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

3 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

4 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. The next

6 motion is going to be just a motion to add
7 to the agenda. We have to make a motion to
8 add to advertise to fill the vacancy of the
9 Old Forge Borough. This is just to add. We
10 have to fill -- by law the seat has to be
11 filled within 30 days. So we have to
12 advertise to do that. So this is just a
13 motion to add to the agenda.

14 MR. BUTLER: I'll make that motion.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: By Councilman
16 Butler.

17 MR. KOMENSKY: I'll second it.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by
19 Councilman Komenski. On the question?
20 Public input? Roll call, please.

21 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
22 Shotwell?

23 MS. SHOTWELL: Yes.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
25 Komensky?

1 MR. KOMENSKY: Yes.

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

3 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

4 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman

5 Avvisato?

6 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

7 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

8 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

9 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. Next

11 item is going to be a motion to approve
12 Marylynn to advertise to fill the vacancy on
13 council. Council will advertise, will take
14 applications. Anybody who is a resident of
15 the borough and is 18 years and older can
16 apply. We're going to do interviews about
17 an hour before our regular meeting in
18 August, which would be August 20th. So it
19 will be a few days before. By that meeting
20 we'll have the seat filled.

21 So this is going to be a motion to
22 let Marylynn advertise for that.

23 MS. AVVISATO: I'll make that
24 motion.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: By

1 Councilwoman Avvisato.

2 MR. BUTLER: I'll second it.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by
4 Councilman Butler. On the question? Public
5 input? Roll call, please.

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
7 Shotwell?

8 MS. SHOTWELL: Yes.

9 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
10 Komensky?

11 MR. KOMENSKY: Yes.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

13 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
15 Avvisato?

16 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

17 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

18 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. We have
21 no more items under new business. We'll go
22 down the table and see if the mayor or any
23 of the members have anything to add before
24 we adjourn. Mayor Legg?

25 MAYOR LEGG: Mr. Chairman, you did a

1 good thing. The young lady and the
2 gentleman came with a problem on Drake's
3 Lane and you immediately pointed to Dave. I
4 think Dave has an engineering degree. Three
5 weeks ago there was flooding on Moosic Road
6 and we had a group of people with an iPad
7 for about 20, 25 minutes coming up with
8 solutions. I remember chuckling to myself
9 wow, there's a borough engineer. Let him
10 handle it, let Joe handle it. I don't have
11 an engineering degree and I don't think
12 anybody else up here has one. We have to
13 start utilizing the people that we pay. Let
14 them do their job. We could have saved 20,
15 25 minutes. They didn't have a solution.
16 Maybe they think they did.

17 Dave, I apologize if you sat there
18 like a bump on a log. It should have been
19 turned over to you immediately. That's all.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Councilwoman
21 Jones-Shotwell?

22 MS. SHOTWELL: I would just like to
23 take a moment to talk about Councilman
24 Notari's resignation. I've known Rick for
25 most of his life. I think that Mr. Notari

1 is a person of great character that made a
2 big mistake. I think you would be hard
3 pressed to find many people who have done
4 more for the people of this community than
5 Rick Notari. For the past three decades
6 he's given of himself and his time to be an
7 active member of this community, a member of
8 Snow Forge, a volunteer coach, and an
9 organizer of more fundraisers to help people
10 in this town than I can think of.

11 Somebody's sick and needs a fundraiser to
12 benefit them, Rick's the first guy to step
13 in.

14 I know that he is upset with himself
15 and I wish this didn't happen. I know he
16 wishes it didn't happen. But I echo what
17 Pete said, that maybe it's time to look at
18 him more of a human who deserves forgiveness
19 and just move forward, because he's
20 deserving of a little bit of grace. I think
21 it was an isolated incident by a very good
22 man, and I for one am grateful for his
23 service. Thank you.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Councilman
25 Komensky?

1 MR. KOMENSKY: Just really a brief
2 comment. As a nation we have faced many
3 unsettling events and polarizing issues in
4 recent years. During these difficult times
5 we must remain steadfast. We must follow
6 the golden rule of treating each other with
7 respect, fairness, trust and care.

8 This moment is no different.
9 Violent political rhetoric and actions all
10 become too common and they really have no
11 place in our democracy. Let us please
12 continue to uphold and support each other
13 with compassion and understanding. We are
14 always stronger and better when we stand
15 united. Thank you.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Councilman
17 Butler?

18 MR. BUTLER: I'd like to thank Rick
19 for his service. He really did do a lot for
20 this town. Just a bad, bad situation. But
21 I don't think it reflects on his character
22 at all. What he said is not who he is. So
23 that's all I have.

24 MS. AVVISATO: I would just like to
25 wish Ricky well. I know him a long time as

1 well. He did a lot for our community. It
2 was just a shame, what happened. He knows
3 that. So I just wish him well. Thank you.

4 MR. HOOVER: I echo what everybody
5 said, but, you know, I know Ricky a long
6 time. It was a mistake. He didn't mean to
7 do it. Some of these people are going to
8 realize what Ricky meant to this borough.
9 He's a good guy, he made a mistake. He did
10 a lot for the borough.

11 On another note, I have a pet peeve.
12 The Nelavankos are sitting in the back.
13 With Emlaw, what's the story, Bill?

14 ATTY. RINALDI: Call me tomorrow. I
15 have a date for you.

16 MR. HOOVER: I'm trying. That's all
17 I have.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay. Before
19 we adjourn I'd like to offer some comment as
20 well. We all know what happened. We all
21 read and saw and heard about the social
22 media post. Everyone sitting at this table
23 signed a letter and statement. We all
24 condemned him for that. We condemn any
25 violence, as we stated in the statement,

1 regardless of who makes it.

2 To echo some of everyone's words up
3 here, but Councilman Komensky, violence
4 is -- there's not a place for it anywhere in
5 the world and there never should be.

6 To talk a little bit about Rick,
7 this is my 17th year. He was here --
8 actually, this August would have been his
9 eighth year. He was appointed after
10 Councilwoman Stone resigned. So this would
11 be his eighth year.

12 Rick Notari's a human being like the
13 rest of us. We've all made mistakes in the
14 past, we've all said things we regret. Some
15 worse than others, some not as worse. But
16 he did a lot of good things while he served
17 with the borough. I mean, I was here with
18 him on a lot of good decisions he made
19 whether it was for public safety and police,
20 whether it was for our borough and parks,
21 whether it was for our youth, our seniors.
22 I mean, he was involved in a lot of
23 important decisions. He supported a lot of
24 important decisions and he helped move a lot
25 of those important decisions forward, and it

1 brought a lot of good to the town, to the
2 people, to the youth and community as a
3 whole.

4 Again, Mr. Notary is wrong for his
5 words. I think in his letter he expressed
6 that pretty well and pretty openly and
7 pretty honestly. He expressed them to us as
8 well when we met with him. I think he's 100
9 percent sorry. I think if I he could he
10 would take it back. Obviously he can't. In
11 his resignation, as he stated, he's going to
12 do his best to be a better person and he's
13 going to do his best to move on with his
14 life and help the people in any way. I'm
15 sure he still would.

16 He's an Old Forge guy. I think he
17 really cares and loves the town. Again, was
18 he wrong? Yes. But, I mean, I wouldn't
19 want his last thing to be just remember the
20 one bad thing he said for a lot of the good
21 that he did. I've been here to witness, the
22 other members who are sitting here with us
23 have been witness to it, and the members of
24 the public who haven't been here in the past
25 and the members who have.

1 So you could like him, you could
2 hate him, you could love him. I mean, he
3 was wrong in what he did, but I'd just like
4 to -- I wouldn't want him to end on just
5 that one bad note.

6 That's all I have. If anyone has
7 anything else before we adjourn, so be it.
8 If not, the chair would entertain a motion
9 to adjourn.

10 MS. SHOTWELL: I'll make that.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: By
12 Councilwoman Jones-Shotwell. All in favor?

13 (Unanimous. Meeting adjourned.)
