1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Good evening,
2 ladies and gentlemen. I'd like to call the
3 meeting to order with the Pledge of
4 Allegiance.

5 (The Pledge of Allegiance was
6 recited.)

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Roll call,
8 please, Marylynn.

9 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
10 Avvisato is absent. Councilman Butler?

11 MR. BUTLER: Here.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?

13 MR. FEBBO: Here.

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

15 MR. HOOVER: Present.

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
17 Lettieri?

18 MR. LETTIERI: Present.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?

20 MR. NOTARI: Present.

21 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Here. Once
23 again, ladies and gentlemen, welcome to the
24 Old Forge Borough work session. Tonight is
25 Tuesday, July 5, 2022. I apologize for

1 being a little bit late on the start of the
2 meeting. We had an executive session this
3 evening requiring a personnel matter.

4 The purpose of tonight's meeting is
5 we're going to go through our department
6 heads, see what they have for our upcoming
7 meeting, which will be Tuesday, July 19th.
8 We'll hear from our borough manager,
9 solicitor. We'll go down the table, hear
10 from our mayor and our other members.

11 There's a public sign-in sheet. The
12 chief asked in the beginning. If anyone
13 would like to speak we'll give you a few
14 moments at the end of the meeting.

15 The first department head we'll go
16 with is DPW manager, Joe Lenceski. Joe,
17 anything for the upcoming meeting, the
18 agenda?

19 MR. LENCESKI: No.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Does anybody
21 have any questions of the DPW manager?
22 Thanks, Joe.

23 Zoning officer/code enforcement
24 officer, Chris Hart, anything for the
25 upcoming meeting, the agenda?

1 MR. HART: Nothing for the agenda.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
3 any questions for the zoning officer?

4 Thanks, Chris.

5 Engineer, Dave Lopatka, anything
6 coming up for our July meeting?

7 MR. LOPATKA: Yes. The Hickory
8 Street project I'm getting pricing on. I
9 sent it out to, like, eight contractors.
10 That should be back by the end of the week
11 or the beginning of next week. I'll have
12 those prices by next meeting.

13 Apache Drive was also sent out to a
14 bunch of contractors. I'll have those bids
15 back the same day as the Hickory Street
16 bids.

17 Then Dunn Avenue, just quickly, I
18 know we talked about just doing the
19 intersection. I sent that out to a
20 contractor just to kind of get a rough
21 estimate as to what the cost would be, and
22 that cost came back somewhere around \$50,000
23 to do that whole intersection, put the pipe
24 in. So I guess you guys need to tell me if
25 you want to put that out to bid, if you're

1 all right with that. That number, we have
2 to bid it. I just got that number just to
3 see around where the cost would be.

4 MR. HOOVER: It's up to everybody
5 else, if they want to do it. I think it's
6 the best spot.

7 MR. NOTARI: I agree.

8 MR. HOOVER: People are using the
9 other streets and there's kids on those
10 other streets. At least if we fix that it
11 will be reasonable.

12 MR. LOPATKA: It's ready to go out
13 to bid. I just wanted to make sure you guys
14 were good with that number. That's around
15 where it's going to come back.

16 MR. HOOVER: I thought it was going
17 to be more because it's such a small
18 project. That's fine.

19 MR. NOTARI: So we need to put it
20 out to bid at the next meeting? Is that the
21 proper procedure?

22 MR. LOPATKA: I'll have it ready.
23 If you guys want to vote on it, it can go
24 right out.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Put it on the

1 agenda.

2 MR. NOTARI: Dunn Avenue, the
3 project the county did on Dunn Avenue a
4 couple years ago, the sewer project, it's no
5 more than four or five years. Right?

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Across Main
7 Street.

8 MR. NOTARI: Yes, but Dunn Avenue
9 was paved from Sampson down to Main Street.
10 Right?

11 MR. LOPATKA: You're talking the
12 other side of Dunn, where we did the sewer
13 project?

14 MR. HOOVER: No, Sampson down to
15 Main Avenue.

16 MR. NOTARI: That was paved. That's
17 a mess.

18 MR. HOOVER: It didn't hold up.

19 MR. NOTARI: It's a county project.
20 Mare, can we contact the county economic
21 development and -- I don't want to say
22 question it, but just see if there was any
23 kind of insurance on that in terms of --
24 it's a mess. From Sampson Street to Main
25 Street on Dunn Avenue. From Eigen's house

1 to Main Street.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm pretty
3 sure it was the same project at Sampson
4 Street that was tied in from Dunn to Goose
5 Alley, going all the way down.

6 MR. NOTARI: All the way down to the
7 river. Part of the problem we had with the
8 railroad. Right?

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: It was
10 definitely part of that project. I just
11 don't know --

12 ATTY. RINALDI: I remember Harold
13 Ash going after them and after them to come
14 back and fix it.

15 MR. LOPATKA: It was probably more
16 than a couple years. I'll bet it's probably
17 seven or eight years ago.

18 ATTY. RINALDI: The county did that
19 project, and we were having Harold to get
20 them to pave it right.

21 MR. NOTARI: I feel like the project
22 probably started seven or eight years ago,
23 but by the time it was completed. Maybe we
24 can get some help to have that fixed because
25 that's another road in town that really is a

1 mess. High traffic. You know we're going
2 to fix the intersection up near the housing
3 project and everybody's going to come back
4 at us why we didn't fix the whole street.
5 Thank you.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone else
7 have any questions for Dave? Dave, anything
8 else?

9 MR. LOPATKA: No.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thank you.
11 Chief Dubernas, anything for the coming
12 meeting, the agenda?

13 CHIEF DUBERNAS: No.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
15 any questions for the chief? Thanks, Chief.

16 CHIEF DUBERNAS: If I can have a
17 five, ten minute executive.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Sure.
19 Assistant Fire Chief Bill Stull, anything
20 for the agenda or the upcoming meeting?

21 MR. STULL: No.

22 MR. NOTARI: Do you have a timeline
23 on your building of when it will be
24 completed?

25 MR. STULL: The new part where the

1 apparatus is going to be will be done by
2 October 1st. Then stage two they're saying
3 February.

4 MR. NOTARI: Looking good.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody else
6 have any questions for Bill? Thank you,
7 Bill.

8 Attorney Rinaldi, anything for the
9 upcoming meeting or the agenda?

10 ATTY. RINALDI: I don't think
11 anything that needs passage, but I'll
12 probably have updated info. Dave's working
13 on Angela and Pittston and the pit property.

14 You need two alternate planning
15 members. I'm assuming, Marylynn, you
16 already got that list for the meeting. You
17 still need two planning members. We're
18 meeting before them, so I'm just letting you
19 now there's two alternates that need to be
20 appointed.

21 MR. NOTARI: We didn't appoint an
22 alternate at the last meeting?

23 ATTY. RINALDI: No, you didn't last
24 meeting.

25 MR. HART: We did. We appointed

1 Dave Fife as an alternate.

2 ATTY. RINALDI: So there's one
3 alternate. The police contract and civil
4 service, they're kind of working in tandem.
5 That's all I have. So I don't know if
6 there's anything on the agenda for passage
7 right now.

8 MR. LOPATKA: The school district
9 plan has to go in front of the planning
10 commission.

11 ATTY. RINALDI: Right. We're going
12 to have to do the work, I'm assuming.

13 MR. LOPATKA: That will be done the
14 beginning of next week.

15 ATTY. RINALDI: That's all I have.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
17 any questions for the solicitor?

18 MR. HOOVER: Did the police get the
19 police contract?

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: I sent it to you
21 guys.

22 ATTY. RINALDI: I sent it to
23 Marylynn to make sure everybody goes over
24 it.

25 MR. HOOVER: All right.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone else
2 have any questions for the solicitor? Thank
3 you, Bill.

4 Borough manager, Marylynn, anything
5 for the meeting or the agenda?

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: I'd like to bring
7 something up possibly for the agenda.
8 Lackawanna County has been suggesting that
9 municipalities hire a consulting firm to
10 help everyone with guidelines to the ARPA,
11 American Rescue Plan money for spending,
12 because it's very tedious and it's very
13 strict how you can spend it. They have a
14 consulting firm that they have been working
15 with, and they sent out information to all
16 the counties that they work with suggesting
17 that we hire probably the same one or
18 somebody similar to that.

19 So I'd like to look into that and
20 see about doing the same or something very
21 similar.

22 MR. HOOVER: Who's the firm?

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: It doesn't have to
24 be that one but I'd like to see someone.

25 MR. NOTARI: That would be

1 considered professional services, where we
2 could just get bids or just appoint somebody
3 in terms of instead of advertising for --
4 okay.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else?

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: That's all.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
8 questions for Marylynn? Thanks, Marylynn.

9 Before we go down the table we'll go
10 into public comment. Mark Carey?

11 MR. CAREY: I'm here following up to
12 the meeting I was at on the 21st regarding
13 the water coming down to the cemetery and
14 flooding the cemetery where my family is
15 buried. I want to thank Councilman Hoover,
16 Dave, Joe for meeting me that following
17 Friday, the 24th, with Jimmy Scavo from the
18 cemetery association, and Tony DeLuca was
19 there, too, a neighbor who was taking care
20 of the grounds up until recently.

21 We see where the problem starts. It
22 was draining right into that drain off of
23 Smith and feeding into the drain that's in
24 the cemetery. So I talked to Jim from the
25 association. He doesn't know where or when

1 that occurred. There's some easements. On
2 the 28th, I believe, I spoke with Marylynn
3 and asked if the borough has an easement to
4 drain the water from the street into that
5 drain in the cemetery, and I don't believe
6 there is.

7 So my comment is what is being done
8 and how can we stop that water from flooding
9 the cemetery? What time frame are we
10 looking to correct that? I'm taking steps
11 now to have a company come in to address the
12 issue with those headstones of family
13 members that are tipping and paying that
14 expense, and I want to make sure that things
15 are being taken and not further occurring
16 again.

17 But I appreciate the help I'm
18 getting from members of council and others.
19 I just want to know what is the time frame?
20 Where do you stand at this point?

21 MR. LOPATKA: After we met out there
22 I did download some mapping. I kind of took
23 a look at what was draining there, what the
24 old borough drainage areas are to each of
25 those two inlets in the cemetery. There's

1 probably about 40 acres that drain to that
2 one particular area, whether it's the one in
3 the cemetery or the one on the road. We are
4 looking at trying to figure out how we can
5 get it out of there. It's not a simple fix
6 because that area in particular basically is
7 like a bathtub with no outlets.

8 So, you know, I've been looking at
9 it and some of the fixes would -- the
10 biggest issue is if we put a gravity system.
11 A gravity system, you're probably going to
12 be 15, 20 feet deep trying to get it out of
13 there just because everywhere around there
14 it all goes uphill. So if you're going
15 downhill with a pipe and uphill with your
16 grade everything starts to get really deep
17 to get it out of there gravity wise.

18 I was talking with them. That was
19 one of the reasons we were a little bit
20 late. I was trying to explain to them what
21 the issue is and some possible remedies,
22 whether it be pumping it out of there or
23 however it needs to happen.

24 MR. CAREY: I know there's only one
25 drain on that side gate. There's that other

1 drain in front of DeLuca's property. That's
2 the only drain that's there that --

3 MR. LOPATKA: But that one ties into
4 the sanitary and you're not allowed to do
5 that. We'd have to run it by them, but
6 they're probably not going to let us take 40
7 acres of drainage area and dump it into a
8 combined system.

9 MR. CAREY: That road declines, and
10 when you get by that gate it's very gradual
11 and then goes back as you're going towards
12 the Salavanti property. There's actually a
13 bowl, in a sense. It's very gradual.
14 That's why that water ponds.

15 MR. LOPATKA: That whole area
16 everything's low. It comes to that one
17 spot. This spot right here is the lowest
18 spot in this whole area, so all this water
19 drains down to one location.

20 MR. CAREY: At that last meeting
21 that Tuesday that I was here, that following
22 day -- I think it was Wednesday night, the
23 22nd, it rained. Joe, you said you were
24 there that night. It wasn't a massive storm
25 or situation where it rained for days. It

1 was a quick storm. And we saw what happened
2 in a light storm. You cannot even walk into
3 that area where my parents and my family
4 members are buried because of the water
5 being so high. That's the problem.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Joe, the drain
7 that's on Smith Street, that's tied into the
8 drain in the cemetery. So what happens if
9 we, on Smith Street, cut our drain and
10 then --

11 MR. LOPATKA: If you block the drain
12 it's going to fill the inlet up and it's
13 going to fill that area up.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So, Dave --

15 MR. LOPATKA: You can plug that pipe
16 that goes into the cemetery, but the inlet's
17 only two feet deep. So it's not going to
18 handle a lot of water. It's going to fill
19 up in the street, and if you get enough of
20 it it's probably going to overflow into the
21 cemetery anyway.

22 MR. CAREY: Years ago it was never
23 affecting the cemetery to that extent. I
24 don't know what occurred, but they reopened
25 that road after they did the road. They

1 redid it a second time. I remember they
2 re-opened that section to prevent that water
3 from ponding. It's a big puddle. That pond
4 has been displaced into the cemetery.

5 MR. NOTARI: Well, I don't agree
6 with that. I don't think it's been
7 displaced. I think that pond needed to be
8 fixed and it was a poor fix. This was it.
9 There's always been water in that section of
10 the cemetery.

11 MR. CAREY: Not like it is now,
12 though.

13 MR. NOTARI: I'm going to disagree.

14 ATTY. RINALDI: Did you say there's
15 another catch basin?

16 MR. LOPATKA: No, it drains back
17 into the manhole in the cemetery.

18 ATTY. RINALDI: Where's the one that
19 goes to the sewer, combined sewer?

20 MR. LOPATKA: That's across the
21 street, up the street a little.

22 ATTY. RINALDI: There's a catch
23 basin in front of Deluca's. That goes to
24 where?

25 MR. LOPATKA: The sewer.

1 ATTY. RINALDI: Where is the sewer
2 at?

3 MR. LOPATKA: It's actually on the
4 opposite side of the road. It runs up the
5 middle of the road, towards the cemetery.

6 ATTY. RINALDI: So it comes up Smith
7 Street. It goes around the corner to
8 Hoover?

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: No, it goes
10 down, to the left of the Salavanti property.

11 MR. LOPATKA: No, it goes out
12 towards Moosic Road.

13 ATTY. RINALDI: Maybe we can try to
14 utilize that one.

15 MR. LOPATKA: I don't know how big
16 the sewer pipe is. Then if you dump it in
17 there you're adding a lot of extra water
18 that goes into the treatment plant. So that
19 might be the issue.

20 MR. CAREY: I'm just looking for
21 help because of the impact on my family.

22 MR. LOPATKA: It's not an easy fix.

23 MR. NOTARI: Not a cheap fix either.

24 MR. CAREY: I'm doing work down
25 there and I just want it to be right, to be

1 nice.

2 MR. NOTARI: Understood.

3 MR. CAREY: I appreciate everybody's
4 help on it.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Dave, how soon
6 until we have an answer?

7 MR. NOTARI: I would say Dave, come
8 up with options for us and price it.

9 MR. LOPATKA: I'll get you pricing.

10 MR. CAREY: I know this isn't going
11 to happen overnight, it's not going to
12 happen in a week. I know that.

13 MR. LOPATKA: I'll figure out a
14 couple different options.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Sounds good.
16 Anything else? Thank you.

17 Mrs. Strazik?

18 MS. STRAZIK: I have the same
19 concern. I spoke with two gentlemen
20 Thursday who were at my house. They said
21 they were putting a bid in. I said I know
22 the plan says near my mailbox. I said it's
23 not going to work. I got water Friday with
24 that storm. What did it rain, ten minutes?
25 But when it comes down like that I got

1 water. Cuts right across the middle of my
2 driveway. I've lived there 50 years, I know
3 where it comes from.

4 So my question is if it's further
5 away from the other storm drains isn't that
6 a different price? Wouldn't that be more?
7 Wouldn't the price be higher?

8 MR. LOPATKA: I'm not sure which
9 storm drain you mean.

10 MR. HOOVER: Apache Drive.

11 MS. STRAZIK: There's a storm drain
12 right at the edge of my property.

13 MR. LOPATKA: If we just put one in
14 on the opposite side of your driveway?

15 MS. STRAZIK: No, the middle of my
16 driveway. From what I understand, the plan
17 is you want to put it by my mailbox.

18 MR. LOPATKA: Well, I'm actually
19 putting in two. One prior to because water
20 comes down Apache in this direction and one
21 over here. The water bypasses Cheyenne.

22 MS. STRAZIK: The water I get comes
23 from the opposite side of the street. It
24 doesn't come from my side.

25 MR. LOPATKA: So no water runs down

1 your side of the street?

2 MS. STRAZIK: Yes, but that storm
3 drain handles that. The water that I get is
4 coming from across the street, right in the
5 center of my driveway.

6 MR. LOPATKA: We can revise it, add
7 another one, but then you might have to bid
8 it. You're probably going to have to bid
9 it.

10 MR. HOOVER: Who did you send down
11 to do it?

12 MR. LOPATKA: I sent it out to,
13 like, eight contractors.

14 MR. BUTLER: Instead of putting one
15 by the mailbox, why don't you just slide it
16 down to the middle of her driveway.

17 MR. LOPATKA: You're saying it comes
18 straight across to the middle of your
19 driveway? We can slide it down, yeah. All
20 I can do is look at it the way the contour
21 is, the water runs.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Dave, is this
23 where you're talking about putting it? In
24 front of the mailbox, right there? It might
25 be coming across the middle. I'm not sure.

1 It's not coming across the middle in this
2 video, but maybe in the heavy rain.

3 MR. BUTLER: There's one already on
4 the other side of her driveway.

5 MR. LOPATKA: We'll slide it over.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Is Cheyenne
7 directly across the street from you?

8 MS. STRAZIK: Yes, and I don't get
9 any water from there.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So you think
11 you need one in the middle of your driveway?

12 MR. LOPATKA: I'll slide it down.

13 MR. HOOVER: It's the crown in the
14 road.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Dave, when we
16 put in the new storm drain is it going to
17 tie into the one that's going to the right
18 of her house?

19 MR. LOPATKA: Yes.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So the answer
21 for Mrs. Strazik is it's put out to bid.
22 We're waiting to hear back?

23 MR. LOPATKA: Yes.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We should get
25 those back how long?

1 MR. LOPATKA: I'll have them next
2 week.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Once the bids
4 come back and we approve them how long do
5 you feel? They would start immediately.
6 Right?

7 MR. LOPATKA: They could. Whoever
8 is the low bidder. We'd give them notice to
9 proceed right away.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Right now
11 we're waiting on bids to come back.
12 Anything else?

13 MS. STRAZIK: No.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We're going to
15 go down the table. Mayor, anything?

16 MAYOR LEGG: I do have something. I
17 mentioned a couple months ago about doing
18 something in the borough in memory of Glynn
19 Lunney, who was the NASA coordinator when we
20 landed on the moon. I met with some people.
21 Council seemed like they were receptive but
22 it kind of died, so I kind of ran with the
23 football myself. I met with a couple
24 people.

25 One is a gentleman by the name of

1 Dale Mikolaczyk. You know him as Rusty
2 Fender. He had connections with PennDOT. I
3 wanted a statue. What we came up with is to
4 designate a portion of Main Street, from
5 Sussex Street to Mary Street. Dale got
6 permission from PennDOT. We sat down, and
7 all it's going to entail is seven signs
8 underneath the current street signs. All we
9 need is council's permission. He's been in
10 contact with Channel 16, 22, 28. He's got
11 connections all over the place. He did
12 about six months' work in, like, three
13 weeks.

14 Like I said, it's seven little
15 street signs from Sussex Street to Mary
16 Street, and we're going to designate it --
17 not rename it, designate it Glynn Lunney
18 Way. There will be no cost to the borough.
19 Rusty and I have taken it upon ourselves.
20 We have a group of about seven or eight
21 people, we worked on this.

22 So I would like to put that for a
23 vote on the agenda next month.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bill, is that
25 something that has to go to a vote?

1 ATTY. RINALDI: You want to just
2 make it an honorary street, so they don't
3 have to change --

4 MAYOR LEGG: We're going to
5 designate a portion of Main Street Glynn
6 Lunney way.

7 ATTY. RINALDI: Do you want people's
8 addresses changed?

9 MAYOR LEGG: No, just a little thing
10 under there that they know Glynn Lunney was
11 from Old Forge.

12 MR. NOTARI: I did some
13 investigating, too, at the time, and, Bill,
14 those markers, a person has to be deceased
15 for five years. I thought a good place for
16 the marker would be on Main Street where
17 Goose Alley is because that's where he grew
18 up, according to the research that I had
19 done.

20 MAYOR LEGG: I thought his homestead
21 was where former mayor Turquato's business
22 is. I could be wrong.

23 MR. NOTARI: I know when I looked it
24 up it was Goose Alley.

25 MR. LETTIERI: You did bring that up

1 last time, but actually I would think that
2 would be nice because it would give a
3 historical -- a story about him on that.

4 MR. NOTARI: The only thing is you
5 have to wait until he's dead five years. He
6 just died a year and a half ago.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We can still
8 do the street. We'll put that on the
9 agenda.

10 MAYOR LEGG: That's all I have.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Councilman
12 Febbo?

13 MR. FEBBO: One thing. Lonesome
14 Road flooding. We mentioned that getting
15 that done down there is not the Army Corps
16 of Engineers but FEMA and PEMA has to be
17 contacted?

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bill, PEMA and
19 FEMA for Lonesome Road?

20 ATTY. RINALDI: Well, Lonesome Road,
21 the flooding is all covered by -- well, DEP
22 administers it for the feds.

23 MR. LOPATKA: Yeah.

24 ATTY. RINALDI: Can't touch anything
25 down there. They did all that restoration

1 work from the last flood.

2 MR. FEBBO: Can we check into who we
3 have to contact to see about doing some
4 flood control down there? All the
5 businesses that I contacted are reluctant to
6 do any improving on their property, cleaning
7 up messes -- the junkyard cars, diners or
8 whatever -- until the problem is resolved
9 with flooding. The only time we talk about
10 that is when it gets flooded again. It's an
11 ongoing eyesore that we see coming into the
12 community, and the only way it's going to be
13 resolved is if we address the flooding.

14 Again, that being said, whoever we
15 have to contact, who has to make that
16 contact for us? Bill, you?

17 ATTY. RINALDI: Probably Dave.

18 MR. LOPATKA: I can call DEP to see
19 what the process is.

20 MR. FEBBO: This is an election
21 year. Perhaps we can get some financial
22 help with that getting done.

23 MR. LOPATKA: I think ultimately it
24 would fall on the Army Corps. I'll make the
25 phone calls. We can see what the process

1 is.

2 MR. FEBBO: Get back to me on that,
3 then I can follow up. I do want to get it
4 done.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Councilman
6 Notari?

7 MR. NOTARI: Nothing.

8 MR. LETTIERI: I'd just like to
9 thank Joe for taking charge with that check
10 list. Thanks, Joe. I really appreciate
11 what you did. That helps everyone. I think
12 we'll get a little more progress on that.

13 The other thing I would hope that we
14 can get resolved, on the contract. If we
15 could penalize them for next week, because
16 we really didn't have an answer on that, on
17 the contract. I don't know who'd have to
18 look at that, the allocations.

19 MR. LOPATKA: I'll do that.

20 MR. LETTIERI: That's it.

21 MR. BUTLER: I'm good.

22 MR. HOOVER: I just want everybody
23 to look at the police contract. Bill sent
24 it to everybody. It's red lined, all the
25 changes we made. Take a look at it. I'd

1 like to meet with them as soon as we can, if
2 it's okay, Chief.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I looked at
4 it. I'm good to send it back whenever
5 everybody else is. Whenever you guys are
6 ready to send it back once you look at it,
7 if you haven't already, I'm good. We'll
8 just forward it right back to them.
9 Anything else, Councilman Hoover?

10 MR. HOOVER: That's it.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The only thing
12 I have is the chief asked for a brief
13 executive tonight after the meeting. Other
14 than that, I don't have any other items.

15 At this time the chair would
16 entertain a motion to adjourn.

17 MR. BRIMEYER: I just had a concern
18 about the project next to my house. Is it
19 county or borough?

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: County.

21 MR. BRIMEYER: When I called them
22 today over issues I had they said it's
23 borough.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: What's the
25 issues?

1 MR. BRIMEYER: Garbage coming from
2 them into my yard. I probably wouldn't be
3 so upset, but I was out there two and a half
4 hours yesterday.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Is the garbage
6 coming from the properties on the housing?

7 MR. BRIMEYER: From 523 Kohler
8 Avenue. They set off probably a thousand
9 dollars worth of fireworks last night. All
10 the residue just blows right into my yard
11 along with the rest of their garbage. So I
12 get to pick it up, I get to put it in a \$2
13 sticker on a bag. They get their garbage
14 picked for free courtesy of the taxpayer.

15 I called -- the first one I called
16 was county housing. He told me that I was
17 copping an attitude with him. He said he's
18 only there 8:00 to 3:30. Anything after
19 that I should call the police. I said don't
20 you think our police have something more
21 important to do than these phone calls?
22 Like, that could be corrected easily.

23 He goes well, I can't help it, and
24 he says I don't really like your tone.

25 I said my tone? I've been here for

1 27 years. I pay my taxes. They don't pay
2 taxes over there. I said I'm just tired of
3 all the garbage going in my yard, and I got
4 to continually clean it up. I said they
5 don't take care of the properties. You go
6 down the street they have piles of garbage
7 that I don't know how anybody can generate
8 in a week. I don't know if they have people
9 coming and dumping their garbage there also.

10 I mentioned flat screen TVs. There
11 had to be four of them on Dunn Avenue two
12 years ago, and naturally they weren't picked
13 up. They sat there about six weeks. They
14 started doing work on Dunn Avenue, I had to
15 take a detour around Kohler, and there's all
16 the flat screen TVs in the woods. There's a
17 car in the woods, and he goes well, the
18 person who bought that property is
19 responsible for all of that, to clean it up.

20 I said so I can throw my garbage in
21 their yard and you're responsible for the
22 cleanup? What if I took my garbage and
23 threw it in somebody else's yard. I'd get
24 nailed with a littering fine. Right now
25 there's an 80-year-old lady who lives in the

1 unit next to this, the 500 unit. She's over
2 there picking up garbage. They make fun of
3 her because she believes in God. I have
4 pictures in my phone to show you. It's a
5 disgrace what they do to the place.

6 But they pushed everything back on
7 you guys in the borough and the Old Forge
8 Police Department. I even called the county
9 commissioners office and I asked to speak to
10 one of the commissioners, and she said
11 nobody's in the office right now, but, she
12 said, I know what you mean. I live in
13 Dickson City and my husband has to pick up
14 the garbage all the time and we don't
15 complain. Then she says hang on, I got to
16 answer the phone. I waited about five
17 seconds and she hung up on me.

18 But they're basically pushing
19 everything off on the borough and saying
20 that it's a police matter after 3:30. Last
21 year they started an auto repair business
22 out front. The music was so bad I couldn't
23 hear my TV six feet in front of me on the
24 other side of my house. I called the cops,
25 they came up. They do a great job, but I

1 don't feel I should be bugging the cops over
2 stupid stuff like that. They have more
3 important things to do in town. Couple
4 years ago I had 13 golf balls in my yard
5 because somebody thought my pool was the
6 18th hole. I had dents in my siding, stuff
7 stolen out of my yard. Every year it's
8 something different. An ongoing battle
9 there.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm not
11 exactly sure what issues you're talking
12 about. Some of those do sound like they
13 would be a police issue. If things like
14 that are happening that's a police matter.
15 If their garbage isn't getting picked up,
16 then that's the county's issue because then
17 they have to pick their garbage up on a
18 scheduled basis.

19 If there's people out front with an
20 auto body shop working on their cars.

21 MR. BRIMEYER: Right on Dunn Avenue.

22 MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: If they're
23 harassing a lady, that's a police issue.
24 I'm sure some of those issues also fall
25 under zoning that Chris can go up there and

1 then he would contact them and say they have
2 to clean this property up, or some of those
3 other issues like you're saying which could
4 be a police matter. Call the police and
5 they would come up and handle those.

6 MR. BRIMEYER: It's not the garbage
7 that they pick up in the bags, it's the
8 garbage that they don't take care of waiting
9 for the county to pick it up.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That would be
11 a zoning issue.

12 MR. BRIMEYER: I'm the guy raking
13 all the grass off the storm drain so Dunn
14 Avenue doesn't turn into a river. They're
15 blowing the grass right into Church Street.
16 So I asked the county workers when you cut
17 it blow it inward, because the guys on
18 motorcycles, driving on grass is like ice on
19 a motorcycle. So try to keep the grass off
20 the road.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If they're
22 blowing grass into the street that's a
23 zoning issue. If you contact the zoning
24 officer he'll call them and tell them when
25 they're cleaning their property they can't

1 clean it that way. The county could be
2 cited just like anybody else.

3 MR. HART: Yes. I spoke to them
4 today.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We'd cite them
6 just like we would cite a resident.

7 MR. BRIMEYER: They're pushing
8 everything off on you. The thing they're
9 responsible for is 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

10 MR. NOTARI: Who did you speak with
11 at the housing authority?

12 MR. BRIMEYER: He didn't give me his
13 name. He said he's the new manager there.
14 He's only there about a month.

15 MR. NOTARI: You didn't call the
16 county housing authority.

17 MR. BRIMEYER: No. Officer Buggy
18 had given me the number to call.

19 MR. NOTARI: I will call Pat Padula
20 tomorrow at housing.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We'll have
22 Chris call him.

23 MR. BRIMEYER: We talked about
24 trying to get a basketball thing there.
25 Maybe we can get a blacktop pad for the

1 kids. Just trying to be a friendly
2 neighbor, but nothing ever comes back the
3 other way from their end. When you call
4 they don't want to take responsibility for
5 it and they're blaming the borough. They're
6 saying it's not their responsibility. Call
7 the police after 3:30. He said I'm only
8 here about a month.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Depending on
10 the issue, it can be a police matter 24
11 hours a day, depending on what occurred. I
12 would say use your best judgment on who to
13 call, but if it's some of those issues you
14 can call the zoning officer, call the chief,
15 call the police department in general, and
16 then also call the county. We're going to
17 make those calls.

18 Okay. At this time the chair would
19 entertain a motion to adjourn.

20 MR. HOOVER: I'll make that motion.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: By Councilman
22 Hoover. All in favor?

23 (Unanimous. Meeting adjourned.)
