1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Once again,
2 ladies and gentlemen, good evening. Welcome
3 to the work session of the Old Forge
4 Borough. Tonight is Tuesday, June 2, 2026.
5 The purpose of our meeting will be to set
6 our agenda for our regular meeting coming up
7 in two weeks, which will be Tuesday, June
8 16, 2026.

9 Tonight we'll hear from our
10 department heads, we'll go down the table
11 and we'll hear from our mayor and our
12 elected officials, our borough manager and
13 our solicitor.

14 I have a public sign-in sheet here.
15 We have a few names on it already. If
16 anyone else would like to sign it, at the
17 end of the meeting we'll give a few moments
18 to address us.

19 With that said, our one department
20 head, Joseph Lenceski, is not here tonight.
21 His daughter is graduating, so he was
22 involved in the parade.

23 Our chief of police was also
24 involved in the parade. I think he's going
25 to be coming a little later. We'll call

1 him.

2 We'll go to our engineer, Dave
3 Johns. Dave, good evening. Do you have
4 anything for our meeting tonight or for the
5 upcoming agenda?

6 MR. JOHNS: No, I have nothing for
7 the agenda. Just to give you a brief
8 update, and Marylynn knows, the projects at
9 the park are moving forward. We've been
10 meeting with the contractor to go over any
11 issues that we're having, and it's been well
12 received by the contractor and the projects
13 are moving right along.

14 Then on top of that, at council's
15 direction we're taking a look at the
16 roadways. We're developing a list and also
17 making recommendations to council as far as
18 roadways that are defective. So we're
19 taking a look at that as well. So we should
20 have that shortly.

21 Then on top of that, last, but not
22 least, the MS4, we're working through that
23 and hope to have an update next week.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay.
25 Anything else, Dave?

1 MR. JOHNS: I think I said enough.

2 Thank you.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do any of the
4 members of council have any questions for
5 Dave?

6 MR. NESE: So you were able to get
7 some of that MS4 from --

8 MR. JOHNS: Correct.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other
10 members have any questions?

11 MS. CHICKEY: I know you were going,
12 the day after we met, to look at Bennett
13 Street. Did you find the cones?

14 MR. JOHNS: I did. I found the
15 cones, yeah.

16 MS. CHICKEY: So you see what we're
17 talking about there.

18 MR. JOHNS: I do, and I see that
19 it's an issue with water rushing down to
20 Milwaukee.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other of
22 the members have any questions for Dave?
23 David, thank you.

24 Chief, good evening. Anything for
25 the meeting this evening or for the upcoming

1 agenda?

2 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yeah. Just if
3 everybody's available on Monday, the 15th,
4 to interview a couple part-timers so we can
5 hire them the 16th.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: What time, 5
7 p.m.?

8 CHIEF DUBERNAS: That works for me.
9 Then I would like to have an executive after
10 the meeting on several topics.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: This evening?

12 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yes.

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else,
14 Chief?

15 CHIEF DUBERNAS: That's it.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do any of the
17 members have any questions for the chief?

18 MR. KOMENSKY: Chief, I have a copy
19 of the Blakely ordinance for the E-bikes.
20 I'm going to give it to you and Bill. You
21 guys look at it and come back to us with a
22 proposal or what you think we should do for
23 the meeting, and then we can add it to the
24 agenda for next month or whenever.

25 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Perfect.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do any of the
2 other members have any questions for the
3 chief? Thank you, Chief.

4 Bill Stull, assistant fire chief,
5 good evening. Anything for the meeting
6 tonight or our upcoming agenda?

7 MR. STULL: Couple things. Getting
8 phone calls over at the fire station
9 regarding our life safety inspections to do.
10 Usually it goes through Mike, but since he's
11 not here is there a way we just keep doing
12 them as we were?

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bill, is it
14 okay if the fire department keeps doing
15 them?

16 ATTY. RINALDI: How were you doing
17 it before? Mike would schedule it. Right?

18 MR. STULL: Yes. The guy from West
19 Brewing down on Moosic Road called.

20 ATTY. RINALDI: If he wants to
21 invite you in on your own, but you can't do
22 much more until we get a code enforcement
23 officer. You can explain that to the
24 person. Say I'm happy to do an inspection
25 but you have to ask me for it.

1 MR. STULL: He asked, so we're going
2 to schedule him for this week. But do you
3 still want me to send my reports to Mike?

4 ATTY. RINALDI: You can send it to
5 the borough.

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: Copy it to me.

7 MR. STULL: What about the occupancy
8 permits? I know we sign off on the fire
9 department side that we did the life safety
10 inspection, that there were no follow-ups or
11 anything, they don't have any violations.
12 We always send that to Mike. But in the
13 interim who is going to issue an occupancy
14 permit?

15 ATTY. RINALDI: Hopefully somebody
16 will be appointed soon.

17 MR. STULL: That was one of his
18 questions to me. I said we don't do that.
19 We just sign off on the fire department side
20 that our life safety inspection was good.
21 Then I give it to Mike and code enforcement
22 will issue it.

23 MR. KOMENSKY: Correct me if I'm
24 wrong --

25 ATTY. RINALDI: It kind of depends

1 on what other inspections needed to be done
2 that Mike would handle.

3 MR. KOMENSKY: So they do theirs.
4 Joe technically has to do his, then he would
5 send that out to Mike for Mike to issue.
6 Correct?

7 ATTY. RINALDI: He has one
8 component, he has a component. It all comes
9 here to make sure all the other boxes are
10 checked. So they can operate.

11 MR. STULL: That's all I have.

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thanks, Bill.
13 Do any of the members have any questions for
14 Bill Stull? Thanks, Bill.

15 Attorney Rinaldi, anything for the
16 meeting tonight or for the upcoming agenda?

17 ATTY. RINALDI: Agenda wise, it
18 depends on what council does tonight with
19 regards to appointments and the garbage bid.
20 We're running out of time, so that's going
21 to have to be done at the next meeting.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else?

23 ATTY. RINALDI: And I need an
24 executive session.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do any of the

1 members have any questions for the
2 solicitor? Thank you, Bill.

3 Borough manager, Marylynn, good
4 evening. Anything for this evening or the
5 upcoming agenda?

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: Bill mentioned the
7 garbage contract bids, and we have two for
8 tonight. So I guess later in the meeting
9 we'll be opening these. I really don't have
10 anything else for tonight.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do any of the
12 members have any questions for the borough
13 manager? Thank you, Mare. Would you like
14 to do the bids now, before public comment?

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Whatever you guys
16 want.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay.

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: Our first one is
19 from J.P. Mascaro and Sons. So option one
20 is a three year contract, and the total bid
21 for the three year contract is \$2,107,968,
22 and it does have a four and five year
23 option.

24 The alternative is option two, which
25 is a five year contract, and the total for

1 the five year contract is \$3,728,460.

2 The second bid is from Casella, and
3 the first option is a three year contract.
4 For three years the total bid is \$2,671,277.
5 There's an option for year four and five.

6 Then the second is option two, which
7 is a five year contract, and the total bid
8 for the five year contract is \$4,465,693.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We only have
10 two?

11 MS. BARTOLETTI: Two. Correct.

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I see members
13 from J.P. Mascaro. If you would like to
14 come to the podium.

15 MR. DEGENNARO: My name is Sal
16 DeGannaro. I'm general council for J.P.
17 Mascaro and Sons. I just want to tell you I
18 have with me here this evening Sam
19 Augustine, he's director of sales and
20 marketing for over 45 years, and our two
21 local supervisors, Mike Plisko, who is our
22 general manager and supervisor, services
23 you, and a gentleman that really is in this
24 borough regularly, Mike, our marketing
25 officer.

1 So we're pleased to be here. Before
2 I talk about our company I just want to say
3 I've done hundreds of meetings. I've never
4 seen a parade where council goes out. You
5 should really be proud of your community and
6 yourselves. This is like a little piece of
7 America. I wish the whole country could see
8 because it really is patriotic.

9 As to the bid, I've been with this
10 company 35 years. I came here in 1980 in
11 law school. A friend of mine took me to one
12 of your pizza places. I came to work for
13 Mascaro, I came up here in 1991 and 1992 and
14 was pleased to see us have this contract. I
15 think pretty much every term we've been the
16 successful bidder. We really value our
17 relationship here with you folks. We look
18 at it as a partnership and I'm delighted to
19 see we're low bid.

20 I can tell you these are really
21 challenging times for our industry. It
22 continues to be so. We've gotten contracts
23 where we've been the only bidder. You have
24 two bidders here. We certainly put the best
25 foot forward. I know the price has gone up,

1 but your price was pre-Covid. Things
2 continue to rise and we've put in a
3 responsible bid. I'm pleased we're low
4 bidder.

5 I can also just point out to you in
6 many of these communities I go almost
7 without fail, just like your community.
8 They lock in for the five years. So we'll
9 be here in two weeks to answer any questions
10 and would hope you consider awarding the
11 five year contract. I know our bid's in
12 order. I'm sure your solicitor will tell
13 you that. We look forward to continuing to
14 serve the borough. I'm happy to answer any
15 questions.

16 I want to thank you for the
17 opportunity to continue to bid and serve
18 your community.

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do any of the
20 members have any questions?

21 MR. KOMENSKY: I don't have any
22 right now.

23 MR. NESE: Not today.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: There's no one
25 in the audience from Casella, is there?

1 Before we go down the table we'll go to
2 public comment. First on the list, Mike
3 Martinelli. Good evening.

4 MR. MARTINELLI: Good evening. I
5 just wanted to stop up here and talk about a
6 few things that are happening in town. For
7 those who don't know me, my name is Michael
8 Martinelli. A lot of you on council I know
9 my entire life. Councilman Nese I've known
10 since I was five years old.

11 Before I start I just want to point
12 out that Councilman Nese was at the little
13 legal on Sunday from 9:00 in the morning
14 until 6:00 at night helping with our opening
15 day. I think that kind of leads into what I
16 want to talk about briefly. It's just the
17 connection between the little league,
18 between the borough. Just the town coming
19 together. The gentleman that just spoke as
20 an outsider of the town, that's what people
21 see. So they see the community and they see
22 everyone working together.

23 I think in the last few years the
24 little league and the borough were not on
25 good terms, and that's been no one's fault

1 here. But I want to be that bridge to the
2 little league and the borough and the school
3 and just the community in general. There's
4 a lot of things that we can work on and do
5 to get to where we want to get to. I know
6 Councilman Nese was at the little league
7 ceremony we had before opening day on
8 Sunday, and my biggest thing for the little
9 league is that we start working on
10 developing the kids so they're ready for the
11 next level.

12 You'll see in the last 20 years
13 there's certain pockets of kids -- the
14 basketball team this year at the varsity
15 level was outstanding. You'll see pockets
16 of kids that three or four years ago were
17 outstanding little leaguers, but then you
18 have these lulls. That shouldn't be
19 happening here. Sports are the backbone of
20 this community. Whether people like that or
21 not it's true. I don't think anybody here
22 would disagree with that.

23 But I want to make sure that the
24 borough and the little league are working
25 together to make it the best experience for

1 the kids.

2 Tonight I know I'm here to set up
3 meetings in the future and come to meetings
4 and talk about different plans, but I just
5 wanted to introduce myself and get to know
6 you guys and just say we're excited to work
7 together.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mike, we
9 appreciate it. The only thing I have is
10 borough council -- and stop me if I'm wrong.
11 Borough council definitely will work with
12 the little league or any other organization
13 in town, especially if it has to do with
14 children. We're always looking to work with
15 any of them. But we do appreciate you
16 coming because we do need to get a little
17 bit closer with you guys.

18 The park down there and Pagnotti
19 Park, hundreds of kids go down there every
20 year, whether it's for sports or tournaments
21 or just to go and hang out, get together,
22 socialize, whatever. So it's good that the
23 council and the little league and the people
24 in charge of the community parks are working
25 on the same page. I know we look forward to

it and it sounds like you guys do, too. So I'm really happy about that. Thank you. I appreciate your time.

Next we have Taurie Colosi.

MS. COLOSI: I have been -- I was living in Old Forge for nearly three years. I lived at 946 Wood Street. I had been calling the zoning officer for, like, three weeks to get him to try to come out and check out our house. It's absolutely out of code. I have evidence here. I have plenty of evidence also on my phone. This was laying in our closet. This is all black mold. As we were moving stuff out --

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Are you a
tenant?

MS. COLOSI: I had to leave. I left the 31st. What happened was who owned that house, he passed away last year, and this new company took over. They're called Stone Gate Company. They came and did a walk through, they saw all this stuff. We even put a request, a maintenance request for them to come out.

Last week, when we were having these

1 conversations, I had called the borough. I
2 was talking to everybody there. I left
3 seven voice mails for Mike, the zoning
4 officer. Then I spoke with the lady. I
5 don't know who's the head of the office. I
6 called them and she told me he wasn't in.
7 So I ended up calling Mr. Bill, the fire
8 department, because I wasn't sure what to do
9 at this point because I'm sure you saw my
10 little baby out there. She was born into
11 that house. I've been sick. Mentally, too.
12 It does that to you, too. Physically sick,
13 throwing up. I had quite a few hospital
14 stays. So I was really concerned.

15 As I was moving more and more stuff
16 out, because we had to a demolish the back
17 closet because of the mold and everything,
18 all our stuff had mold on it. It's just
19 bad. We sprayed that with bleach, it grew
20 back, and we were finding more and more and
21 more as we left. So that broke my heart to
22 hear.

23 I'm no longer a tenant but I do
24 still have the key. I was to move out by
25 the 31st because I was not renewing my

1 lease. I was living there for three years.
2 It's just very much not up to code
3 whatsoever. I'm afraid they're going to
4 move somebody in that's going to live in
5 that house and experience everything that I
6 experienced in that house with also my
7 mental health, because I'm pretty sure -- it
8 was getting to the point where I was having
9 the runs so bad that I was actually pooping
10 out my entire depression pill. It would
11 move through my body in four hours. I had a
12 colonoscopy last week. Everything's okay.
13 They said they can't test for mold
14 poisoning.

15 I can show you the pictures that I
16 have. It's extremely bad. I don't think
17 it's up to code. I just don't know who else
18 to contact. That's why I reached out to
19 Bill. Bill was so nice to listen to me and
20 my entire story. They also have a daughter
21 upstairs. They've lived there for eight
22 years, I believe. She has, like, a feeding
23 tube.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: How many
25 apartments in the building?

1 MS. COLOSI: We're in the basement
2 unit. It only has one meter. It's
3 literally a mother/daughter house. There's
4 very small, thin plywood that covered the
5 door that would go into the basement and
6 they made that into a door. So it's only us
7 in the basement and them upstairs.

8 MR. NESE: What was the address?

9 MS. COLOSI: 946 Wood Street.
10 That's here in Old Forge. It's apartment B.
11 I also have another daughter who comes and
12 goes. She's with me all summer. I get her
13 on breaks from school, and my baby. That's
14 who I'm really the most worried about. She
15 was born in that house.

16 In the room specifically that we
17 started finding -- found this on the bottom.
18 That's all black mold there. A lot of
19 clothing that we had to throw away.

20 MR. NESE: Sorry you're going
21 through that.

22 MS. COLOSI: We moved.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bill, although
24 we don't have a full time code enforcement
25 officer could the part-time code enforcement

1 officer go up with the fire department for a
2 life inspection?

3 ATTY. RINALDI: If the landlord lets
4 them in.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If you have
6 any photos -- I don't think we want you to
7 leave anything with mold. If you want to
8 leave photos. At your discretion you can
9 leave them with the borough manager, and if
10 we could get for temporary, while we have
11 our part-time code enforcement, if we can
12 get him and Bill in contact, Bill Stull, if
13 they can get a hold of the property manager.
14 If you can get permission you can go up
15 there until we get a full time code
16 enforcement officer, which is probably, I'm
17 going to say, within the next three weeks.
18 So if you have any other documentation or
19 photos you would like to drop off you can
20 come here Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 4
21 p.m. and drop them off. We'll get somebody
22 up there as soon as we can.

23 MS. COLOSI: Because I'm worried for
24 the family upstairs. Also during the walk
25 through on Saturday they were, like, oh,

1 yeah, we were well aware of all this damage,
2 well aware of the mold, well aware of
3 everything. My husband asked him then why
4 didn't you guys do anything. I even put a
5 maintenance request in for the mold and
6 everything and they never responded to that
7 as well. It's really bad there.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We're going to
9 try.

10 MS. COLOSI: Thank you very, very
11 much for your time.

12 MR. KOMENSKY: Chief Stull, do you
13 have any information from the landlord?

14 MR. STULL: No.

15 MS. COLOSI: I'll give it to you.

16 MR. STULL: Previously Mike
17 Sokolowski, he would -- before it was rented
18 he started doing life safety inspections on
19 them. So that would have been another one
20 that we would have hit prior to them renting
21 it out.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Before someone
23 went in, possible by seeing --

24 MR. STULL: He was setting that all
25 up. Actually we had quite a few of them in

1 town.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: It's a good
3 plan and definitely a great way to combat it
4 and keep an eye on what's going on and see
5 it firsthand before somebody moves in.

6 Before we go down the table does
7 anyone else from the public want to speak?

8 Bill, if we were to gain access to
9 the property with the owner's permission and
10 they did find mold and other things of
11 concern are we able to make them possibly
12 fix it?

13 ATTY. RINALDI: You can by our code,
14 and if it's that bad he can actually condemn
15 it. Tell him he can't have tenants there.
16 It depends on what he finds.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay, we'll go
18 down the table before we adjourn and we'll
19 hear from Mayor Legg.

20 MAYOR LEGG: I have nothing.

21 MR. NESE: Just real quick, Mike, I
22 did get to spend this past Sunday with the
23 little league, and it was really good to see
24 the kids in the community enjoying the park.
25 Especially from a different chair now. I

1 think it should be on the forefront of all
2 our minds to make sure that that park stays
3 in very good condition.

4 The other thing I wanted to mention,
5 and this kind of touches you, Chief, those
6 E-bikes are out of control.

7 CHIEF DUBERNAS: I chased them out
8 of the park before I came to the parade.

9 MR. NESE: I definitely think
10 council should look at what Councilman
11 Komensky has from Blakely Borough and we
12 should consider it immediately.

13 The other members of the public who
14 came out here tonight, thank you. I really
15 appreciate it. It means a lot when people
16 come and talk to us. Thank you.

17 MR. KOMENSKY: Chief, just to go
18 back to what everybody's talking about, I do
19 have the Blakely Borough E-bike ordinance
20 which I'm going to give to you. If you can
21 work with Bill, see what you want to do with
22 it.

23 I also have told Bill the ordinance
24 regarding when someone vacates an apartment
25 building, that we make sure that they get

1 inspected prior to. So I'm going to give
2 the both of those to you. If you would look
3 at them and give us some information on what
4 we can possibly do. I think it would be a
5 good program. When somebody's out of an
6 apartment go in and inspect it before
7 somebody goes in.

8 MS. CHICKEY: How about prior to
9 that, too, when they go into the apartment?
10 Because if we don't inspect it, it's not up
11 to par and the landlord doesn't take care of
12 it. Right?

13 MR. KOMENSKY: We can put in there
14 that should happen.

15 The other thing is, Mike, I'm glad
16 you came to today. Yes, we were kind of at
17 a crossroads with the little league. So I'm
18 glad. I think it's a breath of fresh air
19 that we were all looking for. So thank you
20 very much for investing in our kids and
21 doing what is right. We'll work with you
22 the best we can. Thank you very much for
23 coming in. We appreciate that.

24 MS. CHICKEY: Again, I'd like to
25 thank you for coming out. It takes a lot to

1 do that. You did a good job. We hope that
2 we can rectify that. I hope your issues are
3 taken care of.

4 And thank you guys for coming out
5 and talking to the borough. My kids are
6 grown now and it's been -- Old Forge has
7 always been a great place. During the time
8 I was there so many more parents were
9 involved in everything. So I hope you
10 continue that because it seems like you guys
11 are doing a great job so far.
12 Unfortunately, I couldn't be there. But
13 congratulations.

14 MR. BUTLER: I'd just like to thank
15 Ms. Colosi for coming in and bringing this
16 to our attention because I wish that more
17 people would come in and bring these things
18 to our attention. It's kind of a pet peeve
19 of mine. I want to thank you for coming in.

20 I'd also like to thank Mike and Matt
21 for coming in. Anything for the little
22 league. That was always my priority from
23 day one. I'm glad there's a changing of the
24 guard, as they say, and hopefully this will
25 lead to bigger and better things.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I only have
2 two things. First item I have is just for
3 public information. Council held an
4 executive session last Monday, on May 26th,
5 for personnel reasons.

6 The second thing I have is to touch
7 base on the resignation of our code
8 enforcement/zoning officer. Our next
9 meeting is going to fall before two weeks of
10 our application process. If Marylynn puts
11 it out tomorrow and we advertise for the
12 position in two weeks, I'm looking at the
13 calendar, the last application would come
14 the 17th. Our next voting meeting is the
15 16th. How would you like to handle that?
16 Would you like to take applications until
17 the 19th, a Friday? Then maybe instead of
18 rushing it into the paper tomorrow we get it
19 in Thursday or Friday and have it in two
20 weeks. Then if you want, we'd have to have
21 a special meeting on the 23rd.

22 MR. KOMENSKY: So leave the regular
23 meeting where it's at.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Or do you want
25 to move the regular meeting ahead? Because

1 we would give Marylynn time to get the ad
2 out to accept applications. Let's say she
3 gets it out Thursday. So they would be out
4 until the 19th. That's two weeks and one
5 day. Then we would come in on the 23rd
6 because our regular --

7 MR. BUTLER: Regular meeting is the
8 16th.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We're not
10 going to have time to vote on it. Even a
11 week further. Are you okay with that?

12 MR. KOMENSKY: Yes.

13 MR. BUTLER: That would be a big gap
14 between that meeting, the 16th, and the
15 first meeting of the following month. So it
16 would actually close the gap.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So accept
18 applications until the 19th, interview on
19 the 22nd, and put it before the board on the
20 23rd?

21 MS. CHICKEY: Yes.

22 MR. NESE: I'm good.

23 MR. KOMENSKY: Yes.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: At this time I

1 don't have anything. The chair would
2 entertain a motion to adjourn.

3 MR. KOMENSKY: So moved.

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: By Councilman
5 Komensky. All in favor?

6 (Unanimous. Meeting adjourned.)
