1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Good evening,
2 ladies and gentlemen. I'd like to call the
3 meeting to order with the Pledge of
4 Allegiance.

5 (The Pledge of Allegiance was
6 recited.)

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Roll call,
8 please, Mare.

9 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
10 Shotwell is absent. Councilman Komensky?

11 MR. KOMENSKY: Present.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari
13 is sent. Councilman Butler?

14 MR. BUTLER: Here.

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
16 Avvisato is absent. Councilman Hoover?

17 MR. HOOVER: Present.

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Here. Once
20 again, ladies and gentlemen, welcome to the
21 work session of the Old Forge Borough.
22 Tonight is Tuesday, June 4th. The purpose
23 of our meeting is to set up our agenda for
24 our regular meeting which will be Tuesday,
25 June 18th. We'll hear from our department

1 heads, we'll hear from our public sign-in
2 sheet. Joe has it. If anyone from the
3 public would like to sign in and address us
4 at the end of the meeting we'll give you a
5 few minutes.

6 We'll go down the table and hear
7 from our mayor, borough manager, solicitor
8 and members of council.

9 With that said, we're going to move
10 into our first department head, our DPW
11 manager, Joseph Lenceski. Joe, good
12 evening. Anything for the agenda or the
13 meeting coming up?

14 MR. LENCESKI: Nothing for the
15 agenda.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
17 any questions for Joe? Thanks, Joe.

18 Code enforcement/zoning officer,
19 Mike Sokolowski. Michael, anything for the
20 meeting or the agenda coming up?

21 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: No, I have nothing
22 for the agenda.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything for
24 tonight?

25 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: No.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
2 any questions for Mike? Thanks, Mike.

3 Dave Lopatka, engineer, anything for
4 the meeting or the agenda coming up?

5 MR. LOPATKA: No.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
7 any questions for David?

8 MR. KOMENSKY: Dave, did you look at
9 that?

10 MR. LOPATKA: What's that?

11 MR. KOMENSKY: The stuff we talked
12 about yesterday.

13 MR. LOPATKA: Oh, yeah. I actually
14 already had it done, so what I'm going to do
15 tomorrow is I'm going to put bid sheets
16 together for each of them separately and
17 then I'll send them out tomorrow. I wanted
18 to put a bid sheet with quantity on it. I
19 have them but I just have to put it
20 together. I'll send it out to three or four
21 of them, the pavers.

22 MR. HOOVER: Do we have to go over
23 the paving program?

24 MR. LOPATKA: Do we have to go over
25 it? No. I just wanted to make sure I had

1 the right numbers. The ones that you had
2 for the other ones were the ones that
3 weren't going on.

4 MR. KOMENSKY: Jim, are we going to
5 wait until we see --

6 MR. HOOVER: It's going to be
7 added. We're going to do these. These two
8 streets we have to do, so it doesn't matter.

9 MR. LOPATKA: One thing that we
10 might want to think about is because you're
11 only allowed a certain percentage of what
12 you're paving. If you don't get it, like if
13 bids come too high or something and you want
14 to add them later it's there, like, ten
15 percent of the bid --

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: Ten percent.

17 MR. LOPATKA: Which I would think
18 would probably be okay.

19 MR. HOOVER: I think we're going to
20 have to take one or two streets off of that
21 list. I don't think we're going to have --
22 we only have the money that Marylynn said.
23 That's why I wanted to go over it one more
24 time, or send me what you have.

25 MR. LOPATKA: All right.

1 MR. HOOVER: I mean, it's probably
2 the same thing that I have here.

3 MR. LOPATKA: Well, I have the plan.
4 Go right off the plan which streets.

5 MR. HOOVER: All right.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mare, how much
7 do we have, roughly?

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: What was it, Jimmy,
9 did I tell you?

10 MR. HOOVER: About \$800,000,
11 roughly, give or take a couple dollars each
12 way. The nine streets that I had originally
13 down here, but then I think we added one or
14 two more streets because of the ten percent
15 thing. It was 760 without the add on.

16 MR. LOPATKA: Yeah. So the
17 estimates were based off of last year's bid.

18 MR. HOOVER: So we're going to have
19 to see how the bids come in.

20 MR. LOPATKA: Yeah, and you may have
21 to take one off.

22 MR. HOOVER: Or maybe we add one.

23 MR. LOPATKA: Again, the most you
24 can add is ten percent of what the total is,
25 too.

1 MR. HOOVER: That's why I want to
2 make sure we have enough streets down,
3 closer to the \$800,000 with the streets.
4 Hopefully they'll be under \$20,000.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Does he need
6 to meet with you before you get the package
7 ready or --

8 MR. LOPATKA: No, I have them ready.
9 I'll give you an e-mail.

10 MR. HOOVER: Send me an e-mail and
11 then next year we'll discuss maybe a loan
12 next year and really kicking it in the butt.

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: Remember that when
14 we decide to do it, PIB loans like we did in
15 past, seven months out. So we really should
16 start thinking about that now and working on
17 it now so that we'll be prepared for it.
18 That's how long it takes to get approved.

19 MR. HOOVER: The other streets I
20 have come to 1.7.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mare, what do
22 you need from us?

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: I guess maybe you
24 would probably need to approve it at a
25 meeting that we're going to enter into a

1 contract with them, put together the streets
2 that we would be interested in doing so I
3 can send a packet out to the state, and then
4 they would take some photographs.

5 MR. LOPATKA: Then maybe with the
6 streets probably a cost estimate to back up
7 your numbers.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Let me ask you
9 a question. Bill, if we went off of the
10 streets that Jimmy already has with the cost
11 estimate is that the one you would want to
12 go off of?

13 MR. HOOVER: Well, I want to look at
14 them again. I mean, it comes to 1.708.

15 MR. LOPATKA: That was everything,
16 including some of the stuff from last year.

17 MR. HOOVER: Those things we missed
18 last year we couldn't do. There's some wide
19 streets in here like Bennett Street, 346.
20 Morton Street, 284. There's some big
21 numbered streets in here that have to be
22 done.

23 MR. KOMENSKY: If we went off that
24 list that jimmy has right now we could
25 change the streets. Yes? As long as the

1 amount stays the same.

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: Probably by next
3 meeting I'll be able to tell you exactly
4 what we need to --

5 MR. KOMENSKY: At least we would
6 know which way to go.

7 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

8 MR. HOOVER: I'd like to sit and go
9 through it with Joe and Mike.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So if we had
11 it ready for July would that be enough time,
12 for the July meeting?

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: That keeps us on
14 the clock with --

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Well, it would
16 give Jimmy enough time with Dave, give you
17 enough time. Then, Bill, how much time
18 would you need? You would just need to get
19 it in the paper. Right?

20 ATTY. RINALDI: Usually 60 days.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So our
22 mid-July meeting we should be good. All
23 right.

24 MR. HOOVER: One more thing. I
25 don't know if we want to do this. These

1 pickleball courts, there's only a few people
2 that have asked me about them. We were
3 going to put them up at the tennis court
4 because people don't use the tennis courts.
5 We were going to use one tennis court as the
6 tennis court, and then the other tennis
7 court we were going to put three pickleball
8 courts in that. Dave put the bid out and it
9 came to \$21,000. I can't believe it.

10 MR. LOPATKA: Twenty-one or 23.

11 MR. HOOVER: Twenty-three thousand
12 for three pickleball courts to paint. I
13 can't believe it's that much.

14 MR. LOPATKA: Well, that's to paint,
15 some crack fixing, installing the posts,
16 installing everything.

17 MR. HOOVER: We have the stuff that
18 we bought to do it. Shall we do it?

19 MR. LOPATKA: I mean, at that
20 price --

21 MR. HOOVER: Do you think it's
22 reasonable?

23 MR. LOPATKA: Well --

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: The problem is at
25 that price --

1 MR. HOOVER: We have to bid. We
2 have to go for bid with it.

3 MS. BARTOLETTI: The price is over.

4 MR. LOPATKA: I don't think that
5 there's a ton of people that do them. It's
6 kind of a specialized thing, that whole
7 process.

8 MR. HOOVER: I mean, I think once we
9 get them, people see that we got them people
10 are going to use them.

11 MR. LOPATKA: I think people will
12 use them, definitely. I mean, I know
13 Dunmore wants to put them in. Wherever you
14 go --

15 MR. HOOVER: There's people in my
16 neighborhood that go to Blakely to play
17 every day.

18 MR. LOPATKA: Wherever you go you
19 see pickleball courts.

20 ATTY. RINALDI: There's two that
21 just went in at the Lace Works over the
22 weekend.

23 MR. LOPATKA: Everybody wants them.
24 It's the new craze.

25 MR. HOOVER: Do you want to put two

1 in and get it under?

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: I think the problem
3 is it's going to be pretty much the same no
4 matter what because they still have to fix
5 the cracks, go over it, paint it. We
6 already have the equipment for the poles.
7 That's not part of it. So I think instead
8 of doing two or three, it's still the whole
9 surface.

10 MR. HOOVER: Let's put it out to
11 bid. I think we should put it out for bid.
12 I don't know how everybody else feels.

13 MR. LOPATKA: The only other option
14 is I can call and we can say is this your
15 best, your lowest that you can do.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Let's put it
17 out for bid. If it comes back and we change
18 our mind, we change our mind.

19 MR. LOPATKA: The other thing is
20 they're not local people. There down around
21 Allentown. They're figuring in traveling,
22 they're figuring to get access in there.
23 It's not just going and painting them.
24 There's always, like, little things.

25 MR. BUTLER: Is everybody that has

1 these -- that puts them in, are they all
2 using the same company?

3 MR. LOPATKA: No, this is a company
4 that I was doing a project down on lower
5 Marion, handicapped. I talked to the guy,
6 he was saying they're coming to the Poconos
7 to put pickleball courts in and they have a
8 company that just does pickleball courts and
9 tennis courts. I said well, give me a
10 price.

11 MR. HOOVER: There's a guy on Mine
12 Street in Old Forge. I don't know who the
13 guy is. I only met him online. He gave me
14 a price of \$32,000. That was back a while.
15 The first bid I got on them.

16 MR. BUTLER: Find out who they use
17 and how much it cost.

18 MR. HOOVER: Blakely Borough, I know
19 they just put a couple up there. He gave me
20 the guy's name. He said I'm booked. I just
21 can't do them. He was honest with me.

22 MR. LOPATKA: Where was he from?

23 MR. HOOVER: Down the line
24 someplace.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: He's booked

1 and all he does is pickleball courts?

2 MR. HOOVER: No, he does other
3 things, too. Another guy told me he'd meet
4 me there, he never came.

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: Dave, the threshold
6 was increased, so the threshold to have to
7 do sealed bids is \$23,200 and this bid is
8 just under that. So we would have to have
9 three quotes --

10 MR. LOPATKA: Let me do a little
11 research, see if I can get it out to a
12 couple other people and get three quotes.

13 ATTY. RINALDI: I texted my brother,
14 who did it and what it cost.

15 MR. LOPATKA: If you can give me his
16 name and then I'll -- at least we'll have
17 three numbers, then.

18 MR. HOOVER: That's all I have.

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other
20 questions for David? Dave, anything else?

21 MR. LOPATKA: No.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Assistant fire
23 chief, Bill Stull. Bill, good evening.
24 Anything for the meeting or for the agenda
25 coming up?

1 MR. STULL: Yes. For the meeting,
2 our cornhole tournament is Sunday, June
3 30th. We'll be asking council for us to be
4 able to shut down East Grace Street between
5 Fallon and South Main again.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You'll
7 coordinate that with the chief.

8 MR. STULL: Yeah.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You obviously
10 have our permission, but you'll coordinate
11 that with the chief.

12 MR. STULL: Yeah, I have to get a
13 hold of him. I need a couple closure signs.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else,
15 Bill?

16 MR. STULL: No, that's it.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
18 any questions for Bill? Thanks, Bill.
19 Attorney Rinaldi, anything for the meeting
20 or the agenda?

21 ATTY. RINALDI: Nothing for the
22 meeting, nothing for the agenda. Just to
23 request a brief executive to go over our
24 response.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Tonight?

1 ATTY. RINALDI: Yes.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay. Anybody
3 have any questions for the solicitor?

4 Thanks, Bill.

5 Borough manager, Marylynn, anything
6 for the meeting or the agenda coming up? I
7 just have something to put on possibly the
8 agenda, and it's the Regional Storm Water
9 Initiative that we have been invited to join
10 with the city of Scranton and some of the
11 other local municipalities. We have not
12 gotten back to them with a yes or a no.

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Just put it on
14 the agenda for the June meeting?

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. I sent
16 e-mails. You can read them to know exactly
17 what's it's about.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I remember
19 what it is. I don't have my e-mail on me.
20 Excuse me. But was there any other boroughs
21 already signed on?

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

23 MR. LOPATKA: Yeah, there's a bunch.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Taylor, Moosic,
25 Dunmore, Dickson City, South Abington.

1 MR. KOMENSKY: They're already
2 signed on?

3 MS. BARTOLETTI: They're signed on,
4 but the thing is if you signed on now you
5 can get out of it. It's not to the point
6 yet that once you're in you can't get out.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So just on the
8 agenda for that night, Bill, would it just
9 be a vote or would we have to write a
10 resolution for it?

11 ATTY. RINALDI: It would be a
12 resolution for it, yeah. Maybe I'll just
13 make sure that you got a good escape clause
14 and you're not stuck with anything.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Right, in case
16 we do want to come out of it. Could you
17 have it ready for next meeting, Bill?

18 ATTY. RINALDI: Yeah. Just very
19 vague. In other words, you're committing to
20 cooperate but it doesn't say how. I don't
21 know if they mean your money or what. So
22 I'll just say cooperate, input, nothing
23 financial, you can opt out if you want.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay. Mare,
25 anything else for the meeting?

1 MS. BARTOLETTI: No, that's all.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
3 any questions for Marylynn? Thank you,
4 Marylynn.

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: You're welcome.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Before we go
7 down the table I'll go into public comment.
8 James Pon? How are you, James? Step up to
9 the podium.

10 MR. PON: I live at 703 Fallon
11 Street. A couple years ago my neighbor and
12 them guys, Lester Gryzbowski, he passed
13 away. So (inaudible) moved in. Meanest,
14 nastiest people in the world. They pretty
15 much call the cops on me every other day for
16 no reason. Cops show up, they laugh, they
17 leave.

18 So anyway, the reason I'm here is I
19 came before the Memorial Day weekend. I
20 wanted to see if there's some way the alley
21 behind my house, if I had to try just the
22 one entrance to the alley from Henderson
23 Street, is there somehow I could get a
24 permit or something to close that entrance?
25 Because we use the alley. My back yard and

1 his back yard touches the alley. But only
2 two days a year, Memorial Day weekend and
3 4th of July weekend is when he parks back
4 there. We set up cornhole things, kids run
5 around, and he comes that way every 20
6 minutes just so we move -- just to ruin our
7 fun when there's two other entrances he can
8 come to get to his house.

9 So I'm just here, I want to do
10 everything right. I don't want to get -- is
11 there any way for somehow to just block the
12 Henderson entrance to that alley?

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You're talking
14 about -- is it on the side of Julie
15 Ardito's?

16 MR. PON: Yes.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: And the
18 alleyway would be in between Main and
19 Fallon?

20 MR. PON: Yes.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: And you're on
22 the corner?

23 MR. PON: I'm on the corner.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So going down
25 Fallon, make a left on Henderson -- right

1 onto Henderson?

2 MR. PON: I'm right there on that
3 corner. But you can't come down Henderson.
4 It's a one way facing Main.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I know. Go
6 down Fallon, make a right.

7 MR. PON: If you were to go that
8 way, you make a right. I'm right there on
9 the corner, that house. The big white
10 house.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Would they be
12 able to put a request in to close the road
13 off there?

14 ATTY. RINALDI: Is this the alley
15 that runs parallel to South Main?

16 MR. PON: Yes.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yeah, it's in
18 between Fallon and Main, on the side by
19 Julie Ardito's parking lot there.

20 MR. PON: Yes.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: It stays the
22 same way for Fallon and Main.

23 MR. PON: Just for the day, July
24 6th.

25 ATTY. RINALDI: Yeah. Get with the

1 chief.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That's not a
3 problem. Now, the only thing is you
4 wouldn't be able -- I mean, the assistant
5 fire chief is here. You wouldn't be able
6 to -- you could put -- Bill, a barrier.
7 Something, God forbid, if they had to get
8 through, it had to be moved.

9 MR. PON: We move it every 20
10 minutes, like I said, because he drives
11 through on purpose.

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You wouldn't
13 be able to put a solid structure there.

14 MR. PON: No worries.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If you come to
16 us the day --

17 MR. PON: July 6th. It will be a
18 4th of July party because 4th of July is on
19 a Thursday.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bill, should
21 we have him send something to Marylynn in
22 writing?

23 ATTY. RINALDI: Yeah, like what
24 hours.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If you could

1 send it, type it up or e-mail, address it to
2 the borough manager, have it in writing, all
3 the details, your name, address,
4 information, the day you're looking, the
5 time so that she could coordinate with the
6 chief. Then we have the chief contacted,
7 the chief will get in contact with the fire
8 department just so everybody has all the
9 information, same date, same time, location.
10 God forbid, anything --

11 MR. PON: Like I said, it wasn't
12 much of a worry too much because there's two
13 other entrances to get to that alley.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Just so the
15 fire chief and assistant fire chief sit down
16 with the police chief just to make sure when
17 you do block it off it's done correctly.
18 That's all.

19 MR. PON: Would I get, like, a
20 physical piece of permit-type deal? We
21 always use two garbage pails, put a rope or
22 something, hang the permit for people to
23 see. Because this guy's going to tell me
24 you have to move your stuff. I know he is.
25 So I don't want to argue all day long with

1 this guy.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We can give
3 you the police horses.

4 MR. PON: I'll look official then.
5 Right?

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You're going
7 to have our permission after you take the
8 right steps.

9 MR. PON: I want to do it the right
10 way.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: And if that
12 guy does cause trouble you just call the
13 chief of police and the chief would come
14 down and tell him he's approved for this, we
15 allowed him to do it.

16 MR. PON: My main issue is I feel
17 bad for the cops. They come every hour at
18 my parties, and they know when they come
19 there you're not doing what this guy -- I'm
20 telling you guys. They hate, like,
21 everybody in the world. I don't get these
22 people. They're brand new. They don't know
23 any of us, all my neighbors. But my buddy
24 Mike was a fireman in Old Forge and he's,
25 like, what's up with that guy? He says good

1 morning and he gives him the dirtiest look.
2 These people are just mad and they're brand
3 new to the neighborhood. They're just nasty
4 to everybody. They're constantly calling
5 the police on me, and the cops come and why
6 am I here? Because they're my neighbors.
7 That's why you're here.

8 MR. HOOVER: Invite them to the
9 party.

10 MR. PON: I do. That's the funniest
11 thing, man, I do, and they don't show up. I
12 don't get it. It's every house on my block
13 is in my back yard that day. We're all
14 hanging go out, having a good time. You're
15 all invited, July 6th, by the way.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Just do that.
17 Just get her an e-mail just so she can --

18 MR. PON: I'll have my kid send the
19 e-mail. I'll need the e-mail address.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We'll gladly
21 give it to you.

22 MR. PON: Phenomenal. Thanks so
23 much.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Have a good
25 evening. Anyone else from the public before

1 we start going down the table? Mayor Legg,
2 anything before we adjourn?

3 MAYOR LEGG: Thank you,
4 Mr. Chairman. The only thing I have is to
5 follow up with the chief kind of on the
6 schedule a little bit. But we would have
7 recorded the Click It or Ticket for last
8 week and the rest of this week. I don't
9 have any statistics about who got cited, who
10 didn't, but I'm pretty sure in two weeks he
11 will have that information for you. That is
12 all I have. Thank you.

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You're
14 welcome. Councilman Komensky?

15 MR. KOMENSKY: Nothing.

16 MR. BUTLER: Nothing.

17 MR. HOOVER: Dave, two things real
18 quick. Josephine Street came out very well,
19 by the way. I wasn't able to attend the
20 last meeting. Just so happens I drove by
21 the next day, on a Sunday, I drove by and
22 she was standing in the driveway. You think
23 she'd waive to me? I waived, I rolled the
24 window down.

25 MR. LOPATKA: She called me a couple

1 days in advance, when is the paving? I said
2 I'll call you when they're going to pave. I
3 had just gotten an e-mail from Linde stating
4 that they'll be there within a week. So I
5 said let me know exactly the day you'll be
6 there so I can call this lady and make sure
7 that everything is okay.

8 MR. HOOVER: Stafurski's down there.

9 MR. LOPATKA: Stafurski was the one
10 that did the paving.

11 MR. HOOVER: The survey for DPW
12 garage, don't forget.

13 ATTY. RINALDI: The DPW garage, show
14 the whole subdivision.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I have no
16 items. At this time the chair would
17 entertain a motion to adjourn.

18 MR. KOMENSKY: I'll make that
19 motion.

20 MR. PON: What's the rule about
21 fireworks?

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: As far as
23 lighting them off?

24 MR. PON: Yes.

25 ATTY. RINALDI: We follow the state

1 law. Probably a distance requirement per
2 state law, things like that.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The chief's
4 going to contact you anyway. Double-check
5 with him on it. He'll be able to help you
6 with the state law better. Then also the
7 assistant fire chief, he'll get you a copy
8 of the fire code as well just so you have
9 all the information. Anything else?

10 MR. PON: No.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion on the
12 floor by Councilman Komensky. All in favor?
