1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Good evening,
2 ladies and gentlemen. Welcome to the Old
3 Forge Borough work session. I'd like to
4 call the meeting to order with the Pledge of
5 Allegiance.

6 (The Pledge of Allegiance was
7 recited.)

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Once again,
9 welcome to tonight's Old Forge Borough work
10 session. Tonight is Tuesday, March 2nd.
11 We'll set the agenda for the regular meeting
12 Tuesday, March 18th. We'll hear from our
13 department heads, we'll hear from our
14 borough manager, our mayor, we'll hear from
15 our council members. At the end, if anybody
16 from the public would like to address us,
17 we'll hear from them as well.

18 With that being said, Marylynn, roll
19 call, please.

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
21 Avvisato?

22 MS. AVVISATO: Here.

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?

24 MR. FEBBO: Present.

25 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

1 MR. HOOVER: Present.

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman

3 Lettieri?

4 MR. LETTIERI: Present.

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?

6 MR. NOTARI: Present.

7 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

8 MR. RINALDI: Here.

9 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Semenza
10 is absent.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Let's begin
12 with Paul Papi. Anything for the agenda
13 coming up from the code and zoning
14 enforcement department?

15 MR. PAPI: No, Russ, but I have a
16 planning commission next week. If there's
17 anything from that I'll let you guys know.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Does anybody
19 have any questions for Paul?

20 MR. HOOVER: Paul, is that next
21 Tuesday?

22 MR. PAPI: Yeah.

23 MR. NOTARI: Paul, have we been able
24 to set up a zoning meeting?

25 MR. PAPI: Yes. We're all set for

1 Pat Revello.

2 MR. NOTARI: Excellent. Thank you.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other
4 questions for Paul? Thank you, Paul.

5 Joe Lenceski, DPW manager, anything
6 for the agenda coming up?

7 MR. LENCESKI: I do. I have a
8 proposal from ETE Truck Equipment to change
9 the Stanley Zach truck that we have into a
10 packer. Right now our red packer, 2010, is
11 down. It couldn't get inspected because the
12 frame is cracked. This past year, in June,
13 I did get a price from Mid-Atlantic to put a
14 body on that.

15 After I did get the price on that we
16 hired a welder to fix the body, patch the
17 spots on the packer itself. Since that time
18 we had more rust, more holes in it, and then
19 it wouldn't get inspected by Triple City
20 Mack when it was time to inspect it. The
21 frame was cracked. I tried to get a price
22 off ETE to fix it and they weren't
23 interested.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: The 2003.

25 MR. LENCESKI: Correct. Now, the

1 Stanley Zachor truck, correct me if Im
2 wrong, Marylynn, that's a 2010. That truck
3 hasn't been used much. It's a side loader
4 recycling truck that doesn't compact, which
5 is very difficult for us having to go to
6 Wilkes-Barre to dump it. Paper fills up on
7 recycling dates, newspaper. It fills up in
8 two hours. With the commingle, bottles,
9 cans we can get a day with it. The packers,
10 they full up -- it takes three days to fill
11 the whole entire we can fill into one
12 recycling truck, the 2018.

13 And right now, just for efficiency,
14 I want to suggest that we look into
15 transferring that Stanley Zachor truck into
16 a compact body on it.

17 MR. FEBBO: Did you say you got a
18 price on that?

19 MR. LENCESKI: Yes, I do. It's
20 \$81,587. Now, the time the red packer went
21 down I did get a proposal on a truck. That
22 was a little over \$200,000 for a brand new
23 truck.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: I'd like to
25 interject a little bit since Joe's on this

1 right now. That truck was paid for
2 completely by a DEP grant, so you have to
3 have permission from DEP to do anything with
4 those types of purchases. So this year
5 there are no DEP grants. The money was
6 taken out of the budget, but it should be
7 back next year.

8 So what they said we can do is, if
9 the borough actually goes forward with
10 this -- they do like the plan, so if we do
11 go forward and we pay it, then when their
12 grant round is opened up again we'll be able
13 to apply for the grant to reimburse us with
14 the money we put out now except for ten
15 percent.

16 MR. FEBBO: So we're borrowing money
17 off ourselves and we'll get reimbursed next
18 year.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

20 MR. NOTARI: Just so I understand,
21 it's going to be \$81,000 to retrofit this
22 truck or \$200,000 to purchase a new one?

23 MR. LENCESKI: Correct.

24 ATTY. RINALDI: Is it a recycling
25 truck or garbage truck or general utility

1 truck after it's done?

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: It's a packer. A
3 giant size packer.

4 MR. FEBBO: It will be a packer,
5 Bill.

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: It needs a CDL
7 driver.

8 MR. FEBBO: Can we go forward with
9 it? Do we have the \$81,000 to put into it?

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

11 MR. HOOVER: If we're going to get
12 reimbursed 90 percent next year, I mean, as
13 long as we get something in writing that
14 we're going to get reimbursed.

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Well, it's for a
16 grant round, and if it's not next year it
17 will be the year after. But DEP, as I said,
18 they do like the project. They do like how
19 we do everything here because we are one of
20 the top recyclers in Lackawanna County. We
21 always do very well with their grants.

22 What they like most about it is
23 we're taking a truck that really isn't used
24 at all and we're going to make it very
25 useful. So they're kind of thrilled with

1 the fact that we thought about doing
2 something like that.

3 MR. FEBBO: That being said, do we
4 have a time factor? Can we go with this
5 immediately, at the next meeting?

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

7 MR. FEBBO: Joe, are the
8 arrangements made to get it in there if and
9 when we could? Or Marylynn, I guess, are
10 you making the arrangements to get the truck
11 in to get it transferred over?

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: As long as
13 everyone's on the same page with this we'll
14 take care of making all the arrangements
15 starting tomorrow so there's no lost time.

16 MR. FEBBO: So what you need is just
17 a general acknowledgment from council and
18 vote on it at the next meeting? But right
19 now for you to go ahead, just an approval
20 from us verbally?

21 ATTY. RINALDI: She can prepare the
22 paperwork and you can approve it at the
23 meeting.

24 MR. FEBBO: Well, I'm all for it.

25 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

1 MR. NOTARI: I have no problem.

2 MR. LENCESKI: I want council to
3 know the efficiency of these trucks, though.
4 For our DPW riding around in their F-450s,
5 every time they fill that truck, like, on
6 Morton Street, for example, they may fill
7 their truck halfway through the run. Now
8 they have to drive back to the borough
9 building and dump in the compactor. When we
10 had both trucks on the road we were able to
11 finish the route in half the amount of time,
12 not to mention when our DPW is dumping,
13 they're dumping at their waist instead of
14 lifting over their heads to dump into the
15 back of the truck. So manpower-wise,
16 labor-wise it's more efficient and it's less
17 strain on any of the employees dumping over
18 their heads.

19 MR. FEBBO: Which is why with the
20 approval get it fixed as fast you can and
21 make the contact and get it done.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mare, quick
23 question. Weren't we discussing this about
24 a month ago? Is this what you were
25 explaining about a month ago?

1 MR. BARTOLETTI: Absolutely. We
2 couldn't do anything until we got all the
3 approvals and I was finally able to speak to
4 our representative. As I said, he likes the
5 idea and he gave us the go ahead. Even
6 though we have the truck, as long as they
7 were paid for by a grant from DEP they still
8 are technically kind of like the owner of
9 the truck. So at the end of the life of the
10 truck, for example, the one that we have
11 right now that's very old, the 2003, if you
12 scrap it they get 90 percent of the money as
13 long as it's over a hundred dollars. If you
14 scrap it, you sell it, no matter what you
15 do. So they ask you to basically use them
16 until they absolutely have no more use or
17 you give it to a different municipality. So
18 if you gift it to another municipality, then
19 you owe DEP nothing.

20 MR. FEBBO: The packing unit that
21 we're going to look at, is it brand new?

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Like the rest
24 of council, I'm okay with it, too. I like
25 the idea.

1 MR. HOOVER: I'm good.

2 MR. LENCESKI: Now, the 2010 Stanley
3 Zach truck, we'll call it, that only has
4 39,000 miles on it, 1,500 hours. So it's
5 relatively new for a diesel engine. So
6 we're not just wasting money throwing it
7 into a dinosaur. Even though the age, the
8 year, it's an older truck, it's never been
9 run because it's not efficient.

10 MR. FEBBO: Diesels are made to go a
11 couple hundred thousand miles. As long as
12 the frame and everything else, the
13 structure, the truck is in good shape we're
14 in good shape with it.

15 MR. LENCESKI: I just had it
16 inspected last month and we didn't have to
17 do anything to it.

18 MR. FEBBO: With the equipment that
19 we have, unfortunately rust gets to it
20 before it's --

21 MS. BARTOLETTI: The good thing for
22 our recycling trucks, basically, is that
23 they are all kept in the garage. So this
24 truck has been really --

25 MR. HOOVER: What are we going to do

1 with the back of the truck we're taking off?

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: They're going to
3 recycle that, and that's built into the cost
4 of the truck. What they'll do is they'll
5 junk it and whatever they do with it. But
6 the cost of getting rid of it is going to
7 offset the cost of uninstalling it, I guess.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Joe, anything
9 else?

10 MR. LENCESKI: No, that's all.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
12 any questions for Joe? Mare and Joe,
13 thanks. Good work on the research, the info
14 on that, too.

15 Dave Lopatka, engineer's report?

16 MR. LOPATKA: I have nothing for the
17 agenda. I can give an update on the
18 building.

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Please.

20 MR. LOPATKA: We had a meeting this
21 morning. Everything at this point is moving
22 forward. We have a couple meetings I have
23 to get set up with Marylynn. We're trying
24 to get the security stuff to Bill. I didn't
25 hear from him today, so I'll try him again

1 tomorrow.

2 I don't know if anybody was at the
3 building, but they opened up the back where
4 a elevator is going. The whole front is
5 out, most of the windows. That whole
6 section is out, soon to be rebuilt with the
7 windows. I mean, everything seems to be
8 moving pretty smooth right now. We're still
9 on schedule. Everything is going pretty
10 well at this point.

11 MR. FEBBO: Dave, do we have a
12 problem with that being cracked and broken?

13 MR. LOPATKA: With the back wall?
14 Well, when they opened that up I did receive
15 an RFI from them. I had my structural guy
16 go down and look at it. So what we're going
17 to do there is we're going to end up having
18 to take some of that block out. I don't
19 know who put it in, but there's pieces of
20 cinderblock in there and then there's parge
21 slapped in there with concrete. I don't
22 know what they did. I don't even know how
23 they built it. But we're going to get that
24 fixed in the back.

25 Some of that has to be torn out.

1 We're putting a new door in there anyway.
2 That portion is coming out between the old
3 garage door and the new door that's going
4 in. We do have to fix some of that.

5 MR. FEBBO: Is there going to be a
6 cost?

7 MR. LOPATKA: Yeah, I'm sure. They
8 have to put new block in there. So, yeah,
9 there's going to be a change order they're
10 supposed to be getting me on that.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else,
12 Dave?

13 MR. LOPATKA: No, not at this time.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone have
15 any questions for Dave? Thanks, Dave.

16 Chief Dubernas, anything for the
17 agenda coming up?

18 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Just one item. We
19 need to pass a resolution for us to be part
20 of the Lackawanna County Drug Task Force.
21 We do it every year so our officers can get
22 reimbursed from the county through the task
23 force.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bill, you'll
25 have that ready for next meeting?

1 ATTY. RINALDI: I haven't even seen
2 it. Did you send it to me?

3 MS. BARTOLETTI: No. We'll get it
4 to you tomorrow.

5 ATTY. RINALDI: All right.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else?

7 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Nothing.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thanks, Chief.
9 Anybody have any questions for the chief?
10 Thanks, Chief.

11 Bill, solicitor, anything coming up
12 for us?

13 ATTY. RINALDI: I sent the proposed
14 deed over to the school district, so I guess
15 I'm just waiting for that, even though you
16 approved everything for the sale. They have
17 it, they were going to review it. Their
18 attorney is going to take it to their board
19 to review. We're still in litigation with
20 Mr. Gleason. There's something on the 8th
21 for his unemployment claim coming up.

22 Still awaiting a project description
23 from council for Project 70, so unless I get
24 something before the meeting I don't have
25 that.

1 Also, an answer on the Saint
2 Lawrence option. That clock is ticking, 90
3 days.

4 The zoning change, we'll see what
5 happens at the next planning commission
6 meeting on Tuesday in terms of that zoning
7 change that's pending. I think he had to
8 pay his fee and show up.

9 Otherwise, I sent Marylynn a garbage
10 fee bid and a recycling bid to maybe put
11 those out, so they're drafted. I think
12 that's it. That's all I have. So the
13 garbage bid and recycling bid, you might be
14 able to put those out for bid so they come
15 back in April, which gives us plenty of time
16 before the contract expires.

17 MR. FEBBO: On the Project 70, what
18 exactly is it that we're waiting for or we
19 need to do?

20 ATTY. RINALDI: Letter to the
21 director explaining the reasoning for
22 disposing of the property, a detailed public
23 comment on disposition, including where and
24 how the plan was proposed to the community,
25 proposed replacement parcel, which is

1 appraisal of a new parcel, survey of a new
2 parcel, which I'm assuming nobody's buying a
3 new parcel. So we have to stick in there
4 that we're asking not to purchase a new
5 parcel. We want to do this with the money.
6 Then I can draft legislation, the deed and
7 the replacement deed for the replacement
8 property. That's what we have.

9 MR. FEBBO: So will we need an
10 executive meeting to discuss all these items
11 individually?

12 ATTY. RINALDI: I thought you guys
13 were going to have a recreation committee
14 meeting to decide what you wanted to do so I
15 could put it together.

16 MR. NOTARI: Michael and myself and
17 Bobby, we've met, and it's probably
18 something we need to discuss with the rest
19 of council in executive just to see what our
20 ideas are because this involves real estate.
21 So even five or ten minutes after we can
22 discuss that. If that's all right.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Let's have one
24 after the meeting.

25 MR. FEBBO: Bill, each one of those

1 items that you mentioned that has to be
2 addressed, let's do that tonight, on Project
3 70.

4 ATTY. RINALDI: Well, yeah, if you
5 guys come up with a condition. We have to
6 schedule the meeting but we can do that.
7 That's no problem -- a hearing.

8 MR. FEBBO: Let's set an executive
9 session again on what the items are, then
10 each one of us can go away with potential
11 questions that we need to bring to the next
12 meeting that we have and come up with an
13 answer to what they're looking for. That
14 sound reasonable and possible and logical?

15 ATTY. RINALDI: I'm just keeping it
16 on my list because I'm waiting for you
17 guys --

18 MR. NOTARI: We can discuss it in
19 executive.

20 MR. FEBBO: Let's move forward with
21 that.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else,
23 Bill?

24 ATTY. RINALDI: No, that's all I
25 have. I mean, I think we're waiting on

1 Marylynn for the police contract issues to
2 be resolved. That's it.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay. Anyone
4 have any questions for Bill?

5 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Attorney Rinaldi,
6 the motion I sent you --

7 ATTY. RINALDI: I got it on my
8 calendar.

9 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Jonathan Petrowski
10 is handling it from the DA's office. He
11 doesn't see any issue with it as long as the
12 executor has all his stuff done in the
13 background.

14 ATTY. RINALDI: Okay. I have it
15 right here.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thanks, Chief.
17 Any other questions for Bill? Thanks; Bill.

18 Marylynn, anything coming up on your
19 side?

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: I know we said
21 about an executive, so that's great. Also,
22 I'd like to have a personnel committee
23 meeting.

24 And just a reminder to everyone that
25 Lucile is officially retired as of February

1 23rd. Will they have to accept that at the
2 next meeting?

3 ATTY. RINALDI: Yes.

4 MS. BARTOLETTI: That will be on the
5 agenda for you to vote on.

6 I don't know how we can do this, but
7 there were a lot of trash problems this week
8 and they are not due to Mascaro. They were
9 due to people not using stickers and having
10 lots of trash out. So some way if we can
11 remind people they must use stickers. Their
12 bags all must have stickers on them. Maybe
13 we can come up with a way to do something
14 like that.

15 MR. HOOVER: Who makes our stickers?

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: ABK.

17 MR. HOOVER: A lot of people are
18 complaining they're not sticking to the
19 bags.

20 MS. AVVISATO: It's cold.

21 MS. BARTOLETTI: We try to tell them
22 to fold it like a flag around the -- if they
23 have bags with handles. That's something I
24 can definitely look into, trying to change
25 or whatever. I think that's it, other than

1 personnel meeting and executive. I think
2 that's all I have to talk about.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have
4 any questions for Marylynn? Thanks, Mare.

5 Rick, before I go down the screen to
6 council members and the mayor, anybody from
7 the public sign in?

8 MR. NOTARI: Looks like we only have
9 Keith Malinowski on a call. I'm not sure if
10 he wants to speak.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do you want to
12 say anything for the meeting?

13 MR. MALINOWSKI: No, thank you.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mare, any
15 e-mails?

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: No, there is not.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We'll go down
18 the screen. Mayor Legg, anything for the
19 agenda or anything to address?

20 MAYOR LEGG: No, I'm good. It's
21 nice to finally see everybody's face.
22 Everybody stay warm. It's colder than a
23 witch's elbow.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Councilman
25 Febbo?

1 MR. FEBBO: No, I'm good.

2 MR. LETTIERI: No, I'm good, Russ.

3 MR. NOTARI: I have nothing, Mr.

4 Chairman.

5 MS. AVVISATO: I'm good, Russ.

6 Thank you.

7 MR. HOOVER: Does anybody want to
8 start a tar sealing program this year?

9 MR. NOTARI: Good idea.

10 MR. HOOVER: A lot of these streets
11 could use tar sealing, where we get a
12 contractor come in. I think it was last
13 year we had a bid under \$20,000?

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

15 MR. HOOVER: We can get something in
16 here to do that. Also, there's a lot of
17 areas in town where the roads aren't that
18 bad but there's areas on the road. Like
19 Dunn Avenue up here. There's about a 40
20 foot by the width of the road large square
21 were it's nothing but potholes. If we can
22 get a contractor over the summer and have
23 him go in there and just do a 40 by 40 cut.
24 I know there's other areas in town that we
25 can probably do this to rather than paving

1 the whole road. And Mare said we have it in
2 our budget to do. We can do it under liquid
3 fuels.

4 MR. NOTARI: Maybe Joe can get us a
5 list, and any council members that see areas
6 we can put that. I know liquid fuels was
7 just announced yesterday for the coming
8 year. I think we're getting about \$260,000.
9 When that comes in I'm not sure. I'm sure
10 Marylynn knows.

11 MS. BARTOLETTI: The end of March.

12 MR. HOOVER: Between those two
13 things, I think it would be a good idea
14 rather than doing a whole paving program
15 this year.

16 MS. AVVISATO: That's a good idea.

17 MR. NOTARI: I like that idea,
18 Jimmy.

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That sounds
20 good.

21 MR. HOOVER: There's a lot of roads,
22 like a 20 by 20 patch just to get us
23 through. Plus, with the crack sealing maybe
24 we can get double out of the road.

25 MR. FEBBO: Buy us some time.

1 MR. HOOVER: We can put it out for
2 bid or just get a small contractor that does
3 small paving like that guy from Taylor,
4 Conte. He'll take care of it.

5 MR. FEBBO: Give him a list of
6 streets, let him go out and see what has to
7 be patched and what has to be tarred.

8 MR. LENCESKI: I will come up with a
9 list by our next meeting. Maybe the top ten
10 or top 20 worst areas of the town, the DPW
11 workers, because like Councilman Hoover,
12 they're obviously walking the streets also
13 while recycling, picking yard waste and
14 ashes. I'll promise you guys I'll have that
15 prior to next meeting to look at.

16 MR. HOOVER: I think this has been
17 going on since October, that we want to meet
18 with this inspection company to see exactly
19 what they do when they go out there. I
20 think once we meet face to face, I think we
21 have to invite them to a meeting -- because
22 there's a lot of cuts in town that I don't
23 think are being compacted properly by the
24 utility companies. I know it's winter, but
25 I'd like to sit and talk with them and see

1 what they have to say about what they do,
2 what we're paying for.

3 MR. NOTARI: Maybe Marylynn can
4 invite them to the April work session.

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: Okay.

6 MR. NOTARI: I'm hoping we can meet
7 next meeting in person. It's up to
8 everybody else. That will get us back on
9 track.

10 MR. FEBBO: Joe, did you say that
11 somebody took care of Keyser Avenue, patched
12 that hole in the road?

13 MR. LENCESKI: Yes. With the
14 direction of Councilman Hoover I got in
15 touch with Terry McHenry with the state, and
16 he said he was going to take care of it.

17 MR. FEBBO: I hope he didn't do it
18 already because it's there again. I came by
19 there about 4:00 and the hole is there.
20 Terrible.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else,
22 Councilman Hoover?

23 MR. HOOVER: No, that's it.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I don't have
25 anything. I'm going to discuss in executive

1 one personnel issue. I don't have anything
2 else.

3 So if there's nothing else, the
4 chair would call for a motion to adjourn the
5 work session.

6 MS. AVVISATO: I'll make that
7 motion.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion by
9 Councilwoman Avvisato. All in favor?

10 (Unanimous. Meeting adjourned.)
