1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Good evening,
2 ladies and gentlemen. I'd like to call the
3 meeting to order with the Pledge of
4 Allegiance, please.

5 (The Pledge of Allegiance was
6 recited.)

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Roll call,
8 please.

9 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman

1 is Tuesday, October 17, 2023. First of all,
2 I'd like to apologize. We had an executive
3 session. It ran a little bit long. Thank

11 department we'll go into is DPW manager,

12 Joseph Lenceski. We have Joe's report. Any

13 members have any questions for Joe?

14 MR. NOTARI: What you were taking

15 care of on Main Street the other day, was

16 that a lot of work?

17 MR. LENCESKI: No.

18 MR. NOTARI: There was dirt spilled

19 in front of Melucci's house.

20 MR. LENCESKI: They were working on

21 the parking lot down on Sampson.

22 MR. NOTARI: The dirt came out of

23 the truck?

24 MR. LENCESKI: Yeah.

25 MR. NOTARI: Thanks for getting on

1 that. Appreciate it.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody else
3 have any questions for Joe? Joe, anything
4 to add?

5 MR. LENCESKI: Nothing.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thank you.
7 Zoning code enforcement officer, Mike
8 Sokolowski. We have Mike's report. Does
9 anybody have any questions for Mike? Mike,
10 anything to add?

11 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: No, I have nothing.

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thank you,
13 Mike. Dave Lopatka, our engineer, is absent
14 this evening. The fourth department head is
15 Chief Dubernas. Anybody have any questions
16 for the police chief?

17 CHIEF DUBERNAS: I have nothing to
18 add.

19 MR. NOTARI: I just want to let you
20 know I got a note from one of the school
21 directors thanking the police department for
22 their work with the threat.

23 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Which one?

24 MR. NOTARI: The first one. Two of
25 the officers at the school, they did a

1 fantastic job, from what I was told. So
2 nice work.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other
4 questions for Chief Dubernas?

5 MR. BUTLER: Jay, I was talking with
6 Mike about 602 Maple. He said there's two
7 dogs locked in the house by themselves. Can
8 the police do anything about it?

9 CHIEF DUBERNAS: That's Boyko. Did
10 the humane society ever come down?

11 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: They never came
12 back. They called once and they say they
13 couldn't get here -- whenever. I've been
14 back there multiple times and someone is
15 going in and out of the house. I talked to
16 two neighbors. They said someone does come
17 in and out. I called SPCA and Griffen Pond
18 three times.

19 CHIEF DUBERNAS: I'll make a phone
20 call tomorrow.

21 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: No one lives there.
22 According to the neighbors the guy comes in
23 and out. I left multiple warning messages
24 in the mailbox and it's gone every day when
25 I go back. Somebody's coming in and out of

1 there.

2 MR. BUTLER: He's not going to pay
3 any attention.

4 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: He hasn't called me
5 back.

6 MR. BUTLER: There's no water, no
7 electricity.

8 CHIEF DUBERNAS: I'll make a phone
9 call tomorrow morning.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other
11 questions for Chief Dubernas? Chief,
12 anything to add?

13 CHIEF DUBERNAS: No.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thank you.
15 Assistant Fire Chief Bill Stull, anything
16 for the meeting?

17 MR. STULL: No, nothing.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone have
19 any questions for Bill? Thank you, Bill.

20 Attorney Rinaldi, solicitor's
21 report.

22 ATTY. RINALDI: Other than what's on
23 the agenda, just a reminder Thursday is the
24 comprehensive plan meeting here at 6:30, and
25 I need you to set a date for a public

1 hearing on a liquor license proposed
2 transfer.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That will be
4 on the agenda. Anyone have any questions
5 for the solicitor? Thanks, Bill.

6 Borough manager, Marylynn
7 Bartoletti?

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: First, do any of
9 you have any questions on any of my
10 financial reports? No? Okay. I'll have a
11 couple items on the agenda. I'll go through
12 them. Just to remind you that we did change
13 our work session to November 8th. That's
14 it.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone have
16 any questions for the borough manager?
17 Thanks, Marylynn.

18 We'll go to public comment. First
19 on public comment is Ross Merieski?

20 MR. MERIESKI: I just came to point
21 something out. You guys paved Sonny Drive
22 in the Heights section. It was great. It
23 needed it. But I was wondering -- all the
24 equipment was there. I live on Mowry
25 Street, which is cater-corner to it, and

1 every resident wants a nice paved road in
2 front of their house. But the very end of
3 Maury Street, the last 85 to 100 feet, is in
4 such disrepair. I talked to my neighbors
5 and we all say it's beating the hell out of
6 our suspensions. I have some pictures here
7 if you'd like to see. I just wanted to
8 bring it to your attention. I know
9 nothing's going to be done immediately. The
10 pictures don't do it justice. It looks like
11 it was a layover years ago. Just the last
12 hundred feet of it in front of Krenitsky's
13 house.

14 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Spring and Mowry.

15 MR. HOOVER: I'll go up and take a
16 look at it tomorrow. It's completed for
17 this year. I have about six new streets
18 already.

19 MR. MERIESKI: If you can check it
20 out.

21 MR. HOOVER: We'll look at it.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Maria Walsh,
23 Dave Svedaba? Before you begin, I made
24 counsel aware how you contacted me a few
25 weeks ago and I gave them a little bit of

1 your concerns. I asked you to come before
2 us because I'm sure you have more questions.
3 So I'd rather you come forward and ask us.

4 MS. WALSH: I know it's very busy
5 tonight. Pride Mobility on Wood Street.
6 When this all happened a lot of things were
7 promised and supposed to happen and some of
8 them never were followed through, I'm going
9 to say, from the borough.

10 One of them is, for example, the
11 barbed wire fencing which is around the
12 trailers, and I have even from meetings from
13 before this here where it was even said that
14 it's an inner fence and this should be an
15 outer fence, which is not the case. Anybody
16 can just walk in there and just can come up
17 there if they want.

18 It was noted that there should be
19 signs posted every 75 feet or less, barbed
20 wire fence. I mean, we live across from it.
21 I don't see any signs. I feel like somebody
22 should follow up on that and it never
23 happened.

24 There was supposed to be the outer
25 fence, which is 90 percent, I'm going to

1 say, done. However, the one area where the
2 trailers are they had that emergency exit
3 for emergencies only. Not really the case
4 either. We have photos where trucks go in
5 there when they can't go in the other way.
6 So I don't know if an it's emergency.

7 But also, we're looking at the
8 barbed wire fence and the trailers because
9 there's nicer fence which should have a gate
10 in that area than on the outside so you
11 don't look at the barbed wire and it's not
12 accessible for anybody just to walk in.
13 It's not there. It even in the plan, the
14 original one, that there should be another
15 gate so you're not getting to the barbed
16 wire fence. I just would hope that since
17 there was something that they should be
18 doing somebody would follow up and make sure
19 they do.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Our zoning
21 officer was writing down some of the items
22 you were saying, but if you have a list of
23 them, items that you want him to check out,
24 you give him the list and he'll go through
25 it. He'll also work with the solicitor to

1 go through it and go through the plans and
2 then also with our engineer to make sure
3 what they did and didn't do. He can go up
4 there, he can start checking it out to make
5 sure what's done, what's not done, what
6 needs to be done.

7 MS. WALSH: Then the other part maybe
8 a few might remember. The trucks is one
9 thing, no trucks on Wood Street. We have
10 the sign coming up Dick Street, trucks
11 cannot turn. I remember I looked up, it was
12 noted as there's no trucks allowed. We
13 called the police once three years ago,
14 there was nothing they could do because it's
15 not in the ordinance. I don't know. But we
16 have a sign there but it's not noted in the
17 ordinance is not allowed for trucks, which
18 causes trucks, again, they have been coming
19 up Pride, making a left and coming down
20 Wood, we have them coming up Dick and going
21 down Wood Street. Again, it was promised
22 would not be the case. But police can't do
23 anything because it's not in the ordinance.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So you're
25 saying that the road has signage on it

1 that's saying no trucks allowed?

2 MR. SVEDABA: Yeah, when you come up
3 Dick Street.

4 MS. WALSH: When come up Dick and
5 you make a left, it says right on the corner
6 no trucks allowed. The sign was, when we
7 bought the house seven years ago, there, but
8 I remember it said no trucks allowed. At
9 one point at night we called actually police
10 because we stopped and we were so angry, and
11 there was nothing he could do.

12 CHIEF DUBERNAS: It used to say no
13 trucks, go to delivery. Trucks going to
14 Topps would be able to use that road because
15 Drake/Dick Street was used as a designated
16 truck route. It still is to go to Golden
17 Technology.

18 MS. WALSH: Even in the meetings
19 afterwards it was discussed that we're going
20 to make sure it's going to get changed in
21 the ordinance and I don't believe it ever
22 happened. It was always discussed that
23 Pride is going to have a sign when they're
24 coming out of there or in between, when they
25 drive out, that there would be a sign no

1 left turn for the truck driver, which,
2 again --

3 MR. SVEDABA: Takes them out to
4 York.

5 MS. WALSH: Review again because we
6 were promised no trucks.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Whatever your
8 concerns are or questions, if you could
9 leave us with a copy or get us a copy.
10 We'll give it to the zoning officer and to
11 the solicitor.

12 MS. WALSH: My last question is that
13 they have -- like, 6:00 we have an alarm
14 coming off because whatever --

15 MR. SVEDABA: The yard jockeying
16 trucks.

17 MS. WALSH: They start at 6 a.m.
18 and back up and it wakes us all up because
19 it's so loud when they back up, the beeping.

20 MR. SVEDABA: You can be two streets
21 down below us and still here it.

22 MS. WALSH: So I call the police
23 every time when it is happening so we have
24 it documented? It's not supposed to --

25 MR. SVEDABA: We were told 7 a.m.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yeah, 7 a.m.

2 MS. WALSH: No, 5:30 in the
3 wintertime a lot of times because they clean
4 the snow away. I don't know what. And it's
5 loud. Really loud.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We can have
7 the zoning officer stop up there and notify
8 them that they're not allowed to start until
9 7:00.

10 MS. WALSH: We're fed up waiting and
11 being patient. It's just annoying.

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Whatever items
13 you have you think should be corrected, let
14 us know and we'll get a move on it.

15 Ann Monicelli?

16 MS. MONICELLI: First of all, I want
17 to thank our new zoning officer for getting
18 the ball rolling. Two down, one more to go.
19 The stucco house.

20 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Trying. Still
21 can't find the owner. He passed away.

22 MS. MONICELLI: I want to thank the
23 mayor for coming down to see my back yard.
24 Okay, I guess I'm done -- one more thing. I
25 can't stand weeds this high. Can't you do

1 anything? Welcome to Lackawanna County and
2 the weeds are this high. Now, the railroad
3 isn't going to come and clean them. From
4 Duryea up. There's a beautiful sign,
5 welcome to Lackawanna County, but right
6 along the tracks they're taller than me.
7 Somebody was already there because the
8 bottom part is cleaned, but they left the
9 rest of them hanging.

10 MR. LENCESKI: I stopped state
11 workers when they were cutting weeds on the
12 side of our road. They told me that the
13 state subbed it out. They got rid of that
14 crew. They don't spray for weeds any longer
15 and they don't cut. They had some equipment
16 parked on Sibley and they're dinosaurs.

17 MS. MONICELLI: So why can't the
18 borough do that? All you need is one of
19 those long things.

20 MR. LENCESKI: Right now I am a man
21 down.

22 MS. MONICELLI: So I didn't get any
23 good answers from anybody tonight.
24 Michelle, when I was here last month I don't
25 think anybody knows about -- now, you have

1 to remember when you evacuated our whole
2 block. Tell them a little bit about what
3 happened that night. Something about we had
4 the end of a hurricane and we thought some
5 of the rocks and stone were going to fall.

6 MS. AVVISATO: Right.

7 MS. MONICELLI: So we were
8 evacuated. Thank God for Jimmy. My husband
9 just came home from the hospital. He
10 brought us up to his mother's. But if it
11 wasn't for you. You're the one that
12 evacuated.

13 MS. AVVISATO: Yeah. Thanks.

14 MS. MONICELLI: I don't think they
15 know any of this.

16 MS. AVVISATO: They are here.

17 MS. MONICELLI: Okay.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Before we move
19 into new business, anyone for public comment
20 like to address us?

21 MR. ZUKAUSKAS: Two properties have
22 been demolished. I think one of them at one
23 time belonged to you. It's beautiful now.
24 They're planting on that one side, the other
25 one's down. It is really great. We really

1 appreciate that.

2 The other thing I just want to
3 mention, I'm trying to get the bus stop put
4 back. There used to be one in front of the
5 borough building. So I called COLTS and
6 they say they're going to get going. I told
7 them we have a new borough building. How
8 nice a bus stop would be right in front of
9 our borough building.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The bus stop
11 is still there. You're talking about a
12 new --

13 MR. HOOVER: Is there any reason the
14 bus stop isn't there?

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: We're not finished
16 with the front of the building yet. Before
17 we started we asked them to take it away and
18 we're not ready to have it put back yet.

19 MR. ZUKAUSKAS: I'll call them back.
20 Thank you.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone else
22 from the public before we go to into new
23 business?

24 MS. PIKARSKI: Anything new?

25 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: We have a court

1 hearing November 16th.

2 MR. HOOVER: Does he have any plans
3 in for this?

4 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: Nothing.

5 MR. HOOVER: He didn't submit any
6 plans yet?

7 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: No. From what I
8 understand Dave Cherundolo left him also,
9 his lawyer. He's looking for another
10 lawyer.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone else
12 from the public?

13 MR. ZUKAUSKAS: Talking about the
14 fence people, is that business open now?
15 What is the status of the fence business on
16 Moosic Road?

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That business
18 should be shut down.

19 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: They're not
20 operating.

21 MS. PIKARSKI: They are.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: She told us
23 she had seen them at times operating but
24 they should not be. We asked her if she
25 sees them to give our zoning officer a call

1 and he'll go down. We have to catch them in
2 the act. We're trying.

3 MR. SOKOLOWSKI: We have a hearing
4 on the 16th at the magistrate.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone else?
6 Okay. We're going to move into new
7 business. Marylynn, first item to take us
8 through would be the CDBG resolution for the
9 senior center renovation.

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: So the resolution
11 is for \$144,633, and it is to be put toward
12 the renovations that we'll be doing.

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: With that
14 said, the chair would entertain a motion to
15 approve that CDBG resolution.

16 MR. HOOVER: Where are we with that
17 with the plans?

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: This is what we've
19 been waiting for.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The chair
21 would entertain a motion to approve.

22 MR. NOTARI: I'll make the motion.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion by
24 Councilman Notari.

25 MS. AVVISATO: I'll second it.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by
2 Councilman Butler. On the question?

3 MR. NOTARI: Is this our 2023
4 allotment?

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: This is our 2023
6 allotment, and we do have money that's there
7 already that we haven't used yet. So
8 they're all put together.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: On the
10 question? Public input? Roll call, please.

11 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
12 Avvisato?

13 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

15 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

17 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
19 Lettieri?

20 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

21 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?

22 MR. NOTARI: Yes.

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. Second
25 item is a motion to approve a period of

1 probation for a DPW employee, which would be
2 our DPW employee Danny Smallacombe. He's
3 our newest hire. By requirement he's
4 supposed to have his CDL. He had a certain
5 amount of period to get that. He has not
6 obtained that yet. He's been in contact
7 with our borough manager. The process is
8 taking a little bit longer than usual. In
9 the past we've approved these for them when
10 they come and ask us. He asked for an
11 additional six months.

12 So the chair would entertain a
13 motion to approve a six month probation
14 period for DPW employee Danny Smallacombe to
15 achieve his CDL license.

16 MS. AVVISATO: I'll make that
17 motion.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion by
19 Councilwoman Avvisato.

20 MR. NOTARI: I'll second that.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by
22 Councilman Notari. On the question? Public
23 input? Roll call, please.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
25 Avvisato?

1 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

3 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

4 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

5 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman

7 Lettieri?

8 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

9 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?

10 MR. NOTARI: Yes.

11 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. Third

13 item is payment to Leeward Construction.

14 Marylynn, if you can walk us through that.

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Payment for Leeward
16 Construction in the amount of \$59,488.21.

17 MR. HOOVER: This is for the balance
18 of Sonny Drive. The water company put a
19 water main up the road have. The road had
20 to be reconstructed. There wasn't enough
21 base in the road. The borough had to pay to
22 put base on the road and the water company
23 came in and gave us a check to overlay the
24 road. It was in conjunction with them.

25 MR. NOTARI: I'm make that motion.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion by
2 Councilman Notari.

3 MR. HOOVER: I'll second it.

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by
5 Councilman Hoover. On the question? Public
6 input? Roll call, please.

7 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
8 Avvisato?

9 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

11 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

13 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
15 Lettieri?

16 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

17 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?

18 MR. NOTARI: Yes.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. Fourth
21 item is a payment to Pennsy Supply.

22 Marylynn, once again.

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: This is for our
24 paving project that we're just completing,
25 and the total due at this time is

1 \$607,492.70.

2 MR. HOOVER: That was to do seven
3 streets in the borough. Next year we're
4 hoping to have a little bit more money to do
5 more roads.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The chair
7 would entertain a motion.

8 MR. HOOVER: I'll make that motion.

9 MR. BUTLER: Second.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion by
11 Councilman Hoover, seconded by Councilman
12 Butler. On the question? Public input?
13 Roll call, please.

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
15 Avvisato?

16 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

17 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

18 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

20 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

21 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
22 Lettieri?

23 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?

25 MR. NOTARI: Yes.

1 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. Our
3 fifth item is going to be a resolution for
4 retention of a third-party agency for UCC
5 code enforcement. Before we get to the
6 motion, council would like to ask both
7 companies -- we have Mr. Marino and his
8 brother from NEIC and we have Mr. Hudak from
9 BIU. The solicitor had a question about
10 some of the fee schedules and fees
11 themselves.

12 ATTY. RINALDI: So the first item,
13 one proposal is for one year and one
14 proposal was for three years. So I think
15 council has some questions on that.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Council
17 discussed it and we would like a two year.

18 MR. MARINO: We would agree to that.

19 MR. HUDAK: Fine.

20 ATTY. RINALDI: Second was there's
21 two sets of fee schedules. If we're going
22 to adopt one fee schedule for the borough, I
23 think there was some consensus it would be
24 NEIC's fee schedule. It would be a ten
25 percent -- you have a blank for

1 administration fee. It would be a ten
2 percent administration fee plus the 450 fee.
3 That's agreeable to both?

4 Then BIU, if you were going to abide
5 by that fee schedule you would have to agree
6 to amend your contract to 30 percent versus
7 40 percent.

8 MR. HUDAK: If you're calling for
9 ten percent, that has nothing to do with us.
10 That's what the borough decides on. Your
11 administration fee is adopted by the
12 borough. We can collect that on your behalf
13 but we don't get any of that money.

14 ATTY. RINALDI: So the only other
15 thing to sync the two is that your contract
16 proposal is 40 percent of your fee schedule
17 attached, where theirs is 30 percent of the
18 fee schedule attached. So there was a
19 question how to marry up so there's one fee
20 schedule.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So the
22 information that the solicitor obtained from
23 both of you through e-mail was you're both
24 in agreement to use the NEIC fee schedule,
25 and then the borough was going to attach the

1 ten percent administrative fee.

2 ATTY. RINALDI: Then the only thing
3 left is if you're going to appoint two their
4 agreement says you get 40 percent of the
5 fee, but I think you agreed to say 30
6 percent, John.

7 MR. MARINO: Yes.

8 ATTY. RINALDI: You're at 30
9 percent.

10 MR. HUDAK: But ten percent goes to
11 the borough.

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. So does
13 council have any questions for either of the
14 companies?

15 MR. HOOVER: We just want to make
16 sure that both companies know if you
17 definitely want to create a committee about
18 the vacant houses. I'd like to continue
19 that vacant house project with both of you.
20 Like, set up a meeting with both of you. If
21 we have 20 of them, split them up, ten and
22 ten. But I definitely want to get that
23 vacant housing going. Before the end of the
24 year set a meeting up with the both of you.
25 I can be here or whatever committee is going

1 to be there and get this ball rolling. I
2 don't want them to sit like these houses did
3 down there for so long.

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: And both
5 companies provide that service. Correct?
6 Okay. Any other questions from any of the
7 members?

8 So my final question before we go
9 into the motion, Mr. Marino and Mr. Marino,
10 you're satisfied with the questions we asked
11 and you're ready to move forward to make a
12 motion?

13 MR. MARINO: Yes, absolutely.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mr. Hudak,
15 you're satisfied with the questions we asked
16 and ready to move forward with the motion?

17 MR. HUDAK: That's correct.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Before we move
19 forward, one more time. Do any members have
20 any questions? Okay. The chair is open for
21 entertainment of a motion to hire a company
22 or multiple companies.

23 MR. NOTARI: I'd like to make a
24 motion to higher multiple companies, BIU and
25 NEIC, in regard to third-party inspectors.

1 MR. HOOVER: I'll second that.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion on the
3 floor by Councilman Notari to hire both

2 would entertain a motion to adopt a
3 resolution of the Borough of Old Forge,
4 Lackawanna County, Pennsylvania adopting the
5 fee schedule of NEIC fees for the
6 administration and enforcement of the
7 provisions of the Pennsylvania Construction
8 Code Act. The chair would entertain a
9 motion to adopt that resolution.

10 MR. HOOVER: I'll make that motion.

11 MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: Motion by
12 Councilman Hoover.

13 MS. AVVISATO: I'll second it.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by
15 Councilwoman Avvisato. On the question?
16 Public input? Roll call, please.

17 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
18 Avvisato?

19 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

21 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

23 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
25 Lettieri?

1 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?

3 MR. NOTARI: Yes.

4 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. The next
6 item under new business is going to be a
7 resolution to appoint an alternate member to
8 the planning commission. At this time the
9 chair would entertain a motion for the
10 resolution for appointment of one alternate
11 planning member to the Old Forge Borough
12 Planning Commission for the term of four
13 years.

14 MR. HOOVER: I make a motion for JP
15 Gutoeski to be an alternate member of the
16 planning commission.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion for JP
18 Gutoeski by Councilman Hoover.

19 MR. NOTARI: Second.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by
21 Councilman Notari. On the question? Public
22 input? Roll call, please.

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
24 Avvisato?

25 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

1 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

2 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

3 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

4 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman

6 Lettieri?

7 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

15 Lackawanna County Reinvestment Grant. It
16 has a \$5,000 match, which is a small grant.
17 We have to pass a resolution.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The chair
19 would entertain a motion to pass a
20 resolution for the grant application.
21 "Whereas, the applicant desires to apply to
22 the County of Lackawanna for a Community
23 Reinvestment Grant for the purpose of
24 carrying out this project.

25 Whereas, the program manual includes

1 a document entitled Terms and Conditions of
2 Grant, and an application form for a section
3 entitled Section 5, Certification and
4 Acceptance."

5 MR. NOTARI: I'll make that motion.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion by
7 Councilman Notari.

8 MS. AVVISATO: I'll second that.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by
10 Councilwoman Avvisato. On the question?
11 Public input? Roll call, please.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
13 Avvisato?

14 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

16 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

17 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

18 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman

21 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. Jeff

1 Casella, if you'd like to come forward.
2 We're going to put a motion on the floor
3 that you and the Felittese Association
4 requested. Do you want to speak first? Real
5 quick, Mr. Casella and Mr. Terruso, they
6 represent the Felittese organization in
7 Pennsylvania. They came to us two times in
8 the past. The most recent at our last
9 meeting. They asked the borough to become a
10 sister city to Felitto, Italy, where Felitto
11 does hold a festival like our festival that
12 the Felittese holds on Third Street. They
13 do the whole procession as far as the mass,
14 the carrying of Our Lady of Constantinople,
15 the parade and a festival for a number of
16 days.

17 MR. CASELLA: Theirs is a little bit
18 more elaborate than ours.

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: They came to
20 us and asked us if we could do a resolution
21 so we can become a sister city with them.

22 At this time we're going to start
23 the process. That's what the motion is
24 going to be for. Mr. Casella has a lot of
25 the members who belong to the organization

1 in Felitto right now waiting for him to go
2 live on his phone, which I'm going to guess
3 would be on Facebook. They just want to
4 hear a couple seconds of us reading the
5 motion and hearing the vote.

6 So the whole room is going to be
7 live on Facebook. If anybody does not want
8 to be live or open to the public right now,
9 we just want to give you the opportunity in
10 case you don't want to be on camera.

11 MR. CASELLA: First, we just wanted
12 to thank the borough for giving us this
13 opportunity. In the late 1800s, early
14 1900s, when the people from Fellito, with
15 nothing more than a new pair of shoes over
16 their shoulders, walked the 72 miles from
17 Fellito to Naples to come to America, and
18 they all settled pretty much in the Old
19 Forge general area. The only reason they
20 had new shoes over their shoulders was so
21 that they had shoes to walk to get on the
22 boat.

23 It's a big tradition in Felitto
24 itself. Our Lady of Constantinople, as
25 President Rinaldi said. It's celebrated in

1 Old Forge and Felitto at the same time, the
2 same weekends. Theirs is bigger, of course,
3 but it's basically the same deal.

4 Next year, we were already informed
5 that the priest Don Dominico Sorrenti of
6 Felitto is going to be coming here for our
7 Felittese festival and he's going to be part
8 of the procession.

9 Also, my cousin, who is the mayor of
10 Felitto, he is also going to be hoping to
11 come over here as part of the delegation or
12 come over here in September as well and be
13 part of the procession. Next year, for
14 reasons, they will not have the festival on
15 the 8th. The last couple times they had it
16 on the 8th strange things happened to
17 statue. So they decided they will not have
18 it on the 8th anymore, and ever since they
19 stopped doing that they haven't had any
20 problems at all.

21 So other than that, if you guys want
22 to present it.

23 MR. TERRUSO: I agree with
24 everything that he said. He did all the
25 legwork on this.

1 MR. RUSSELL RIANLDI: Okay. With
2 that said, the chair is going to entertain a
3 motion to begin the process of a resolution
4 to become a sister city relationship with
5 Felitto, Italy.

6 MR. BUTLER: I'll make that motion.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion on the
8 floor by Councilman Butler.

9 MS. AVVISATO: I'll second it.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by
11 Councilwoman Avvisato. On the question?
12 Public input? Roll call, please.

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
14 Avvisato?

15 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Butler?

17 MR. BUTLER: Yes.

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

19 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
21 Lettieri?

22 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?

24 MR. NOTARI: Yes.

25 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes. Thanks,
2 gentlemen.

3 MR. CASELLA: This is presented to
4 the borough of Old Forge commemorating this.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Tell them we
6 said thank you.

7 Last item under new business is
8 going to be a motion to set a public hearing
9 for the transfer of a liquor license located
10 at 107 North Keyser Avenue, Unit Two, on
11 November 8th, 6 p.m.

12 MR. NOTARI: I'll make that motion.

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Motion by
14 Councilman Notari.

15 MR. BUTLER: I'll second it.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Seconded by
17 Councilman Butler. On the question? Public
18 input? Roll call, please.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
20 Avvisato?

21 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.
