MR. LENCESKI: It's working perfect.

MR. NOTARI: Are we going to get it sealed, the pave cut --

MR. LENCESKI: What we have to do, I got some prices of a paving vendor to do restoration like American Water Company has come in. There's a lot of patches that they -- we had one do all of our sewer work and they're not properly putting them back together. We need to bring somebody in to come back in for restoration of the blacktop, do a better job.

MR. NOTARI: Probably get that done by the winter?

MR. LENCESKI: Definitely. I want to put a list together and present it to

drains everywhere. Just when you get an overwhelming surge of water when it rains four inches. There's a lot of places in town that fall victim to that. I don't know, putting a drain in there, I don't think that's the answer for that situation. It's a bad situation.

MS. STRAZIK: Three times since last meeting my garage was flooded because of that rain. The drain is past my house. We need one before the house.

MS. AVVISATO: Can we put a storm drain there?

MR. LENCESKI: Sure.

MS. AVVISATO: She gets flooded all the time.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If we put the storm drain in -- you said there's one 50 feet from the house. If we put one in closer to the house is it tying in to that one that's 50 feet and going down the same stretch of road?

MR. HOOVER: Is the water coming from Grace Street?

MR. LENCESKI: I'll have to double

check. I don't think it's coming in that direction. They're all coming up and going towards the school.

MS. STRAZIK: I'm the lowest spot.

It comes both ways, but that drain handles it coming from the school. Like I said,

Cheyenne, those two drains. But Apache comes down. There's only one other drain at the top of the hill on Apache Drive, so all of Apache Drive comes down directly and crosses in front of my driveway.

MR. LENCESKI: Get Dave up there and look at it.

MR. FEBBO: Make sure she's home when you do.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Let's look and see if we can pinpoint a drain closer.

MR. FEBBO: Give Joe your number.

You call her, Joe, please.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody else have any other questions for Joe? Thanks, Joe.

Chris Hart, zoning/code enforcement officer. We all have his report. Anyone have any questions for him?

MR. NOTARI: No questions, but,
Chris, excellent job. The list of permits
is bigger than I've ever seen in my -however long I'm here, four or five years.
So it's good to know that the people in town
know that we have somebody on the job that's
doing the job. I appreciate the work.

MR. HART: Thank you.

MR. FEBBO: On Main Street, too.

MR. LETTIERI: What did we find out about the roosters?

MR. HART: I'm going over there with Liz. Two of them don't speak English, so I'm going over with her to translate for me.

The other one by Miles Park, she's actually trying to rehome it. I just spoke with her yesterday, actually. She didn't know. She had chickens and the one turned into a rooster.

MR. LETTIERI: So the code enforcement, they can't have them?

MR. HART: You can't have a rooster.

You can have chickens but you cannot have a rooster. It's a nuisance. Noise.

MR. HART: The other two, I'm trying to get them home during the day to meet up with them.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other questions for Chris? Thanks, Chris.

Engineer's report, Dave Lopatka. We have your report. Anything to add?

MR. LOPATKA: Give you an update. The majority of the inside has been done. Ι know they put carpet down in the main entry, that whole area. A lot of the inside is done. Couple of things that were added in the police area. There's a door with special -- it has to swing both ways where There's that and some electric the cell is. and communications stuff that needs to be added to what was going to be a cell and is now an interview room. It wasn't included before. They're updating that.

They're supposed to start the stucco this week. They haven't done that. Mostly the outside is what needs to be finished.

The paving in the back, the elevator has to be done. I know me and Marylynn called

Comcast because they need an active phone number to get the elevator to operate properly and get it approved by code. So that's in the process.

MS. BARTOLETTI: We've been back and forth a couple times.

MR. LOPATKA: And the blue stone, they've called. We're at the time frame where they had given us eight to ten weeks, and we're at that time frame. They're hoping to have it any day. As soon as that comes they can finish that. Hopefully the stuff gets done. I know they started grading everything outside. They put down a bunch of topsoil, getting ready to seed that. Kind of waiting to seed that until they get the stone work and stuff.

It looks a lot better outside now that they got some of that grading done.

MR. NOTARI: What's our time frame?

MR. LOPATKA: He didn't give me a final time frame, but we do have some -- there were some changes, especially a couple on the slate tonight. One is that additional stucco for the other pieces that

weren't getting stuccoed, and then the other change was the store front in front of the senior center. Sooner the better so we can get all that stuff ordered and moving.

I know we talked about this. I don't think we necessarily need the store front for the senior center to be completed prior to moving in, so I'm hoping we can get the stucco and blue stone up so they can finalize everything outside. The inside's mostly done other than a couple wires and some of that stuff in the police area.

MR. NOTARI: November 1st?

MR. LOPATKA: Hopefully soon. A lot of things have been changed since it's been going.

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$  LOPATKA: I would love for it to be finished myself.

MR. NOTARI: I'm sure. I know you're putting a lot of work in. So with all the add-ons, what is the date that they should be complete? Like, when does it run over where we start penalizing them?

I'll have them.

I know I was supposed to have them. I'm a little short handed at the office. Probably within the next two weeks.

MR. NOTARI: I'd like to get that done before the spring.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody else have any questions for Dave? Thanks, Dave.

Police Chief Dubernas, we have his report. Chief, anything to add?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: No. I just have an update on the mayor. I got a text from his daughter. He's up and alert. Several stiches and he's going to go for x-rays of his ankle. He's conscious and alert, talking to them.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone from the public doesn't know, the mayor was involved in a motorcycle accident tonight coming to the meeting on the corner of Keyser and Oak.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: The only other thing, too, I just got another e-mail from Alex from the DA's office. This Friday night we'll be participating in a countywide saturation patrol, and we also got more

money for buckle up/car seat enforcement.

So if you see cars from out of town in town on Friday night that's why. PSP, the entire county's involved in it. You might see cars from Archbald here, state police cars back and forth from Jessup.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: All marked?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: No. The drug

enforcement guys will be out, everybody will

be out. That's it.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have any questions for the chief?

MR. NOTARI: Chief, are we partaking in that new county police training program?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: The one that actually starts this Friday? Yeah, I got two officers going Friday and four on Monday.

MR. NOTARI: The other thing, football game night parking. There's nothing we can do for this year and I don't even know for the future, but just can we have our patrols keep an eye on things, make sure there's cars legally parked?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I know they issued

a pile of parking tickets at the last two home games.

MR. NOTARI: I don't know if I want to go that far as to tell them to ticket everybody, but I know there was a car in a driveway that led to another problem, and the property where Anthony Cusumano lives, behind him. There was a truck parked behind his driveway and he couldn't get out. It wasn't that he was blocked in, but the way traffic was he couldn't back out of his driveway. Just keep an eye on things or maybe early, before the game starts. That's all I have.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody else have any questions for the chief? Thank you, Chief.

Assistant Fire Chief Stull, anything to report on?

MR. STULL: No.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have any questions for the fire chief? Thanks, Bill.

Attorney Rinaldi, solicitor's report.

ATTY. RINALDI: So on the agenda tonight you have the ordinance for the no parking on Main Street, and that's going to be the easterly side of South Main Street, 20 feet north of the driveway entranceway for the property located at 825 South Main Street.

Also, there is a contract that we discussed with Urban Research and Development Corp. to update our comprehensive plan, our subdivision ordinance, and there's an addition on there to also do the subdivision and land development ordinance as an option for an extra \$8,700.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I only have that on mine. That's the one we wrote.

That's the one Bill's going to --

ATTY. RINALDI: It's in everybody's packet. So, I mean, my suggestion is they're here already doing your zoning, and your subdivision works hand-in-hand with that. For the extra \$8,700 I would include that option, get it all done, because your zoning ordinance, I think, goes back to '93.

The Unimac tax assessment appeal has been agreed to by the school district and the tax assessor's office. Our position's always been if the school district's happy, the borough is happy because they get the majority of the tax. I did get the final draft version, and really the only change is from the last stipulation it went up another \$5,000 to a total assessment of \$400,000.

The school is going to pass it tomorrow night. There was a hearing scheduled on the 9th of September that was continued because they agreed to it the day before and everybody needed time to have their respective bodies approve it. So we're doing it tonight, the school district is doing it tomorrow night.

So the building value is \$370,000, the land value is \$30,000. That's \$400,000 which if you multiply by the common level ratio, which I think is probably six-something at this time, you're looking at a value of three point some million dollars for the property.

The sewer ordinance is pretty much

self-explanatory.

I did get a back and forth from the school district. They want to walk the property line to see what they're getting.

We don't want them to think they're getting the whole pit. We're still waiting on them, which we'll have to reapprove the subdivision again because it expired now.

It's over 90 days. Then we can transfer it to the school district. We already voted to give it to them. For whatever reason, they were rethinking that option. That's all I have.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone have any questions for the solicitor? Thanks, Bill.

Marylynn, borough manager's report.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Okay. My first item is the financial reports. Does anyone have any questions on any of them? All right.

On the agenda tonight I have listed to purchase a DPW truck, and it is part of the 2021 budget. Do you want the figures now or when we're going to vote on it?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If you have them now.

MR. FEBBO: On the dump truck?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. So the truck chassis portion is \$40,471.20, the body portion, which is done at a different place, is \$39,387.18, which gives a total of \$79,858.38. It is budgeted.

MR. HOOVER: Which one is this replacing? Or just a new one?

MS. BARTOLETTI: It's an additional one.

MR. FEBBO: I want to thank you for budgeting that. We have quite the fleet of vehicles. Best maintained fleet in the area as far as new. Joe has them kept up to date and running. You see our trucks out there, they're always clean, as is the DPW facility. A new truck at this time is very handy. We also want to consider perhaps, down the road another pickup truck.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Right now, no.
We'll see. We're going to be working on the budget again. But I think this is what we need right now.

MR. FEBBO: We'll take the dump truck right now, especially with the winter coming in.

MS. BARTOLETTI: The other thing that you're going to vote on tonight are CDBG funds for 2021. It's \$139,992. You just have to do a resolution for it. At some point we will decide on a project to be able to use this and other funds that we have, but for now we're just voting to accept it.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Does this fall under item nine, resolution nine?

MS. BARTOLETTI: I put it as number 13.

ATTY. RINALDI: It's 14 on your list.

MS. BARTOLETTI: And then items one and two under new business, they're the MMOs, minimum municipal obligations for two of the pensions. The fist one listed is the police pension, and the amount for 2022 is \$31,887.

And for the non-union administrative pension, which is item number two, is

\$14,986.

MR. NOTARI: The CDBG funds, is that for 2022 or this year?

MS. BARTOLETTI: 2021. Then also under new business you can see there are several payment applications and change orders, but all of you have all the information on that. If anyone has any questions myself or Dave can answer them.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have any questions for the borough manager?

Thanks, Mare.

We're going to go to public comment right now. First is Dave Marhelski.

MR. MARHELSKI: I was just wondering if the borough manager had come up with any recommendation on storm drains for Lori Lane, Kelly Drive and Mowry Street? The borough engineer, did he come up with any recommendations since the last time I spoke with him with the water runoff?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You said the borough manager. Dave, remember on Keyser Avenue, down the bottom, across the street. In front of Mucciolo's house.

MR. LOPATKA: I didn't get down there when it was raining anyway. I'll get down there.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Didn't we have to contact PennDOT on that?

MR. LOPATKA: State road. Only something they're going to be able to do. We can probably do it. You have to get permits for it.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We would need their permission first. Correct?

MR. LOPATKA: Permit.

MR. NOTARI: Joe, can you and Dave put that on the top of the list? We've been trying to deal with this now for too many months. You're afraid it's going to pool and ice?

MR. MARHELSKI: Well, it does. When you get that big storm and the car comes by it's like a lake.

MR. NOTARI: It's not flowing across the street enough?

MR. MARHELSKI: There's not enough to go across the street. They have the storm drain on Mucciolo's side. There's

none on Bubernak, Kelly, Mowry.

MR. NOTARI: I drove by during the big storm and there was a ton of water there, but I just thought it wasn't getting across the street.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We'll get him up there. Dave Cushner?

MR. CUSHNER: For zoning, okay, my wife and I recently had a privacy fence installed on one side of our property, and there comes a time to have it sealed with a preservative. Do we have the right to go over onto the neighbor's side and seal the fence if I do it myself or if I have somebody do it?

MR. HART: I'll give her a call tomorrow. I'm sure she won't have an issue.

MR. CUSHNER: I don't know when we're going to do it, but when the time comes.

MR. HART: I'll give her a call tomorrow.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bill, if it's his fence, it's permitted, it's properly installed, and he wants to seal coat his

side. He'd have to go on their property.

If there was an issue with her letting him
on the property, is there any way he can get

ATTY. RINALDI: It's her property.

I would think she'd want the fence to look
nice.

on the property with some type of authority?

MR. CUSHNER: I doesn't enhance her side very much. It enhances our property.

And I always thought as long as you don't damage somebody's property you can go over and seal it.

MR. HART: The fence is directly on the line. I'll speak with her. Just let me know when you're doing it and I'll explain to her, let her know what's going on.

MRS. CUSHNER: She was already told by the fence man that she can't be shoving dirt up against the fence. I want to know how far I can put my fence up.

MR. HART: Six feet.

MRS. CUSHNER: No, from the street back.

MR. HART: It's 25 feet back off the center line. You can't put the fence all

the way to the street. I'll stop up tomorrow. I'm almost positive it's right at -- and you're pretty much maxed out there.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: He can stop up. Show him where you want to put it, let him measure it.

MR. HART: I know it is. Might be able to get another foot or two.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: He'll be able to tell you after you tell him what you want and let him look at it.

MRS. CUSHNER: I have a question with -- I lived in the heights all my life and I never seen it turn into crap.

Nobody's taking care of their property. We got people up there that only cut their grass once a year.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do you have addresses?

MR. HART: They were all notified.

MRS. CUSHNER: And I also want an answer on the lady that opened up a grocery store on Gaylord Street.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I don't know

what you're talking about.

MR. HART: The lady that has a yard sale. I guess she's been doing it on Saturdays, twice a month. Every time I go by she's gone, closed up. But I guess she's a coupon lady. So she buys --

MRS. CUSHNER: She lives on Morton Street. Why is she coming up to the heights? A store up in the heights.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Whose property is she doing it on?

MR. HART: I don't know the house, but there's never anybody there during the week when I go there.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: She has two houses?

MRS. CUSHNER: She sets up her table, unloads her SUV, everything's brand new, and the people line up from Bennett Street all the way to Franklin. You can't even get through the street. I have to put cones out in our driveway.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: What days?
MR. CUSHNER: Saturday.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Call the police on

Saturday.

MRS. CUSHNER: Some of your police officers have a problem with oh, it's a yard sale, giving me a hard time. That lady brings stuff from a supermarket and setting up a table.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If you notice someone parking illegally call the police.

They'll go up. Chris knows that they've been doing it on Saturdays. We'll have Chris drive up there and speak to her while it's going on so we can get some answers.

MR. HART: I'll go up Saturday morning.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If they're blocking your driveway you call the police department. They'll send the cops up.

Chris will go up while she's there.

MR. NOTARI: Can you give your name and address for the record?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Dave Cushner.

MR. CUSHNER: 1212 Bennett Street.

MRS. CUSHNER: She belongs up the Circle Drive-in.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We'll find

## out. Robert Hughes?

MR. HUGHES: Chief, I'm going to quote you on an article on Monday, June 21, 2021, that you were in the paper, okay, and it states here that "Old Forge Police Chief Jason Dubernas said he started looking into the body cameras in the past month and is currently obtaining quotes for them, and he intends to add both body cameras and in-rear cameras in the vehicles and this is the wave of the future." Did you do that?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: We're in the process of it. As a matter of fact, there's going to be a resolution tonight for a grant. We're trying to get body cameras and in-car cameras.

MR. HUGHES: My next question is how -- when body cameras work and you as the chief approach a citizen that camera automatically kicks on?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: It all depends on how they're all set up. It all depends on the situation. Sometimes they're activated with the emergency lights, sometimes they're activated when a taser is deployed or a

weapon is drawn from a holster. It all depends.

MR. HUGHES: How about if you were speaking to one of your officers? Would that be recorded?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: No.

MR. HUGHES: Why not?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: We're just having a conversation. It's only for when we have calls and that.

MR. HUGHES: The reason why I'm bringing this up, you know -- I'm bringing to your attention there's a lawsuit filed right now against the borough with Larry Rossi that a prior chief of police has got one of your officers jammed up and being sued.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I'm very well aware of it.

MR. HUGHES: Why wouldn't you want a camera when you're talking to an officer to record what was going on? Wouldn't that be the right way to do it?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bob, do you mean if he's talking to his own officers or

the officers are there taking the incident report?

MR. HUGHES: No, I'm saying if he's talking to one of his officers. I think personally a body camera should be recording at all times. The reason why I say that is because of this lawsuit that was just filed against your borough.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If the officer had a body camera on that day it would have been recorded.

MR. HUGHES: You're contradicting yourself now. He just said it wouldn't be recorded.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: If Kim was talking to somebody the body camera would have been on.

MR. HUGHES: I'm not saying Kim.

I'm saying if you were talking to Kim would
your conversation be recorded?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: If we were both on the same incident? Yes, it would have been on.

MR. HUGHES: And how about in your building?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: No.

MR. HUGHES: Why is that? Because right now that poor girl is jammed up because of the prior chief of police that told her what to do, which was wrong.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I can't get into the lawsuit.

MR. HUGHES: I'm not telling you to get into it. I'm saying I personally feel as a taxpayer --

CHIEF DUBERNAS: That's your opinion.

MR. HUGHES: It is. I'd like to know how them body cameras are going to work.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I can't discuss that right now.

MR. HUGHES: Why not?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Because we have legal accusations against the borough and a police officer working here.

MR. HUGHES: No, I'm talking about your body cameras.

MR. NOTARI: Mr. Hughes, if I could, that's going to be a policy that's going to

have to be develop between the mayor and the police chief once those cameras are purchased. So once those cameras are purchased I'm sure the chief and the mayor will discuss how they're going to be deployed. So that's something for the future.

MR. HUGHES: Now, the next question is I made it my point to go up to Walter Stocki's property. I met a guy named Brian, he took me around the whole property. have pictures for next month for you. seen where they're cleaning up the area. tractor-trailer came there today. cutting parts up and everything and putting everything on tractor-trailers.

I will say this, there's oil spilled behind Gilchrist Trucking and all the equipment is behind Gilchrist Trucking.

So my question is, first of all, the trucks that are on Keyser Avenue that looks like a shit house, that's not Walter Stocki's trucks. I was told today they're Casey-Kassa's. So my question is, Chris, did Casey-Kassa come to you and ask you to

park those trucks there?

MR. HART: I was up there for two and a half hours this afternoon after you were there. I got all the information and the details that I need and I'll proceed forward with the actions that need to be taken.

MR. HUGHES: Do you understand one thing, though? This council didn't vote on it, as far as I'm concerned, and I don't know if zoning gave permission for his trucks to be there. But I'm going to tell you something, you go down this side of Keyser Avenue it's beautiful with George Dunbar's place, and you go up there it looks like a shit house. I'm going to be honest with you.

MR. HART: I'm aware of it, but it's also been going on for years --

MR. HUGHES: This is my point. When these vehicles were being moved up there why didn't the zoning or why didn't, like, president of council or somebody say wait a minute, get the police up there to stop them from doing what they're doing? Why couldn't

you put a cease and desist order up there?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The police
have been up there numerous times stopping
vehicles.

MR. HUGHES: No, I'm talking about when he brought all the machinery up there.

MR. HOOVER: This is going on six years.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: It's in court, Bob.

MR. HUGHES: I'm talking about Casey-Kassa.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: All the land right now is tied into a court.

MR. HUGHES: Bill's doing a good job. My next question now, the palm reader down here in Old Forge, next to my cousin's house, they made two passages with a lawnmower. There's still two campers there and an old, old beat up car in that yard. How can we get that out of there and clean that yard up the right way?

MR. HART: I got in touch with the owner's daughter. Everything's going to be taken care of. The guy that owns the

building is living out in New Jersey. have been saying they're going to do it. Same thing with by your house. They tell me they're going to do something and they don't do it I have to take them to court. That's it. But it's a process.

MR. HUGHES: But it's been going on quite some time now.

MS. AVVISATO: He was just aware of it.

MR. HART: I took the proper steps to take care of it.

MR. HUGHES: What about him moving the camper and what about moving the car?

MR. HART: The judge --

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bob, that's part of the process. He's going to give them the proper time to do it. If they don't, then he takes them to court. Then the magistrate decides. He's been taking action about six weeks now, since George first came and brought it to our attention.

Ken Barnanski?

MR. BARNANSKI: Ken Barnanski, 1039 Spring Street. I had one issue, but

listening to the people here I think I have a second. First about the Heights. I remember -- and it's nothing against the chief because he hasn't been here that long. But I remember there used to be daily patrols. I won't say a couple hours apart, but there were patrols going around to the streets.

I for the past I don't know how many years haven't seen that. I think with some of the clientele up there and with the issues that some of the people are facing we should have more patrols to look for stuff like this. That's my opinion. I don't know whether they do it in other parts of the town or not. I'm retired and this stuff goes on from morning until evening and there's nobody taking any part in patrolling, as far as I know. Am I wrong, Chief?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: What kind of stuff goes on? What do you mean this stuff goes on from morning to evening?

MR. BARNANSKI: Well, that's what I wanted to address. Speeding, number one, on

Spring Street. It's terrible. I've addressed this for a number of years with various police chiefs and other people that were on boards or other people that I know, can something be done about this. And it was always well, we can't do that because we have no way of enforcing it because you need what is it, 50 feet, Chief?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: But we have VASCAR

lines in front of your house now. We have

ENRAM --

MR. BARNANSKI: However, what good is it to have the lines when there's nobody there to watch if they're speeding or not? That's my point. I said park in my driveway, and the response was from the police officer if I parked in your driveway and I go after somebody I could get hit by somebody coming down the road. I said that's what I'm trying to tell you. I have to pull out of my driveway. My next-door neighbor has to pull out of his driveway. Across the street, two people. We have been many times almost hit by vehicles because of the speeding.

There are no sidewalks on that lower part of Spring Street. People walk their dogs, they walk with their kids, going by themselves. Any time of day you can see cars. Naturally it's more so towards quitting time or going to work and so forth. But this is all day long.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: This is the first time I'm hearing about Spring Street speeding, anything. I'm just saying, now that you said it we'll ask the chief, have him send the police up there a little bit more.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I know my guys patrol up there.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We'll ask him now to send them up.

MR. BARNANSKI: The other issue, the road itself. To me it's in bad shape. I talked to Papi a number of years ago. He said the engineer said there was nothing wrong with it.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We're doing a paving program this March --

MR. HOOVER: Early next year.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We're going to be going around this year and next year -- more this year so we can get quotes. We'll send the DPW manager up.

MR. HOOVER: I'll go up.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Councilman Hoover and myself, we'll take a look at the road. The engineer then looks at the road, they discuss it with the DPW manager, and then we decide which roads we're going to put on the list. We'll make sure they look at the whole road this time.

Mike?

MR. CROSSIN: Mike Crossin, 216 East Morton Street. I have a question. The Old Forge Borough has a website. Correct?

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: Yes.

MR. CROSSIN: Now, I checked this yesterday and today and there was not an agenda published on the website.

MS. BARTOLETTI: If you asked when you came in I would have told you they were right there. There's about 15 of them sitting in front of Chris. Our website is in the process of being rebuilt right now,

parts.

MR. CROSSIN: Yeah. Technically, though --

ATTY. RINALDI: The agenda was added to tonight, yes. The items that came up.

MR. CROSSIN: So they should not vote. Otherwise, they would be violating this amendment to the Sunshine Act by committing the crime.

ATTY. RINALDI: It won't be a crime, it will be a violation of the Sunshine Act.

MR. CROSSIN: Well, I mean, they do get prosecuted for violating the Sunshine Act.

ATTY. RINALDI: They can be fined. Somebody can file a suit and fine them.

MR. CROSSIN: In county court.

ATTY. RINALDI: Yes.

MR. CROSSIN: And what would happen?

ATTY. RINALDI: The judge would make a determination. It's up to the judge what the curative amendment is.

MR. CROSSIN: I think that if you people want to be transparent with the taxpayers in this community that they should

follow the new law and that this agenda should be published on your website 24 hours ahead of time so that the taxpayers of this town could see what's going to be voted on, not to have it sprung up at the last second and ask for public input when you're mentioning the vote to pass this agenda item. That's wrong.

And you as the solicitor, it's your obligation to inform this council, who employs you, to give them that advice. Now, should they vote on this item tonight?

ATTY. RINALDI: We can hold off on -- well, there's only two additions tonight. The rest of the agenda was published -- the problem is we're in transition between a borough building and a website. This isn't our borough building. We can't post it here. We can have it available at the borough building.

MR. CROSSIN: It doesn't matter where you're at. The law is the law. It states what you should do. Whether you're working out of a garage somewhere or --

ATTY. RINALDI: And we're working to

comply. This isn't our building to post things on.

MR. CROSSIN: That's not an excuse, working to comply. The law is the law. It was passed by the legislature, it was enacted on August 29th, and you should be following that law. So by letting these people vote tonight, these council members vote, they're committing a crime.

MR. NOTARI: Was the agenda available at the borough building upon request?

MS. BARTOLETTI: If anyone asked for it, yes.

MR. CROSSIN: That's not what the law states must be done. You should look at the law. I'll hand you this paper I have in my hand.

MR. NOTARI: I don't disagree with you. However, I'm sure there is a spirit of the law, and I think the spirit of the law we are following.

MR. CROSSIN: I don't think so.

You've always never been transparent with anything on your agenda. In fact, you've

never had an agenda that anybody -- the public came in to this prior to tonight there was no agenda for them, and I've been here a number of times.

MS. BARTOLETTI: They're always right here on the table. Always right there.

ATTY. RINALDI: We always have an agenda.

MR. NOTARI: Mr. Crossin, I'm going to tell you this, I know since I'm on council they're always available because I know I made a stink about it going to meetings before I was on council, that maybe the agenda wasn't available.

MR. CROSSIN: Well, now it's the law and you should follow the law.

MR. NOTARI: I agree, we should follow the law. I don't disagree with you.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mike, at any time in the past 24 hours did you call the borough and request an agenda?

MR. CROSSIN: No. I did what the law said you're supposed to do.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm just

asking if you tried to get an agenda within the past 24 hours and you were refused?

MR. CROSSIN: No, I'm just going by what is stated here in the bill what you're supposed to do.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay, anything else?

MR. CROSSIN: No.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Before we go into new business we'll go down the table, see if any council members have anything they'd like to add. Councilman Febbo?

MR. FEBBO: No, I'm good.

MR. NOTARI: I'd just like to mention that the LHVA, Lackawanna Heritage Trial, they have put together a proposal for the extension of the trail from Taylor into Pittston that they're going to start moving forward in terms of getting approvals and trying to acquire land. I thought with us approving a planning/zoning update later in this meeting that maybe we would like to bring the LHVA in to update us on their plan.

I spoke with one of the

representatives there. They're willing to come in to meet with council. They're not yet ready to make this plan public, but they would like to met with council to explain what their ideas are and possibly take some ideas from us.

So I'm hoping that before our next information meeting, our next work session that someone can come down from the LHVA and address us. So I'd like to make that arrangement if council agrees with that.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I think it's a good idea. You make the arrangement, I'll be here.

Councilman Lettieri?

MR. LETTIERI: I have nothing.

MR. KOMENSKY: I have nothing.

MS. AVVISATO: I have nothing.

MR. HOOVER: Nothing.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay. Before we go into new business council is going to break into an executive session for a five or ten minute recess.

(A brief recess was taken at this time.)

MR. CROSSIN: That's not what the law says. It has to be publicly published on your website and you're trying to circumvent the law. Now, you're advising them in violation of the law. You should step down from your position because you're not fulfilling your obligation as solicitor.

ATT. RINALDI: I'm advising them that we don't have the website running, so --

MR. CROSSIN: Doesn't matter --2 ATTY. RINALDI: It's published at 3 the borough building, which is open to the public. 4 MR. CROSSIN: Then you should have 5 6 published it in the paper. 7 ATTY.
