1	MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Good evening,
2	ladies and gentlemen. I'd like to call the
3	meeting to order with the Pledge of
4	Allegiance.

again, ladies and gentlemen, welcome to tonight's meeting of the Old Forge Borough work session for Tuesday, September 7, 2021. The purpose of our meeting is we'll go to our department heads, we'll go down the table, hear from our council.

There's a public sign-in sheet if anyone from the public would like to address us at the end of the meeting.

We'll hear from our mayor, our solicitor and our borough manager.

We'll start off with -- and he's not here this evening -- our street commissioner. Joe said he was attending somewhere else tonight. So we'll send Joe an e-mail and we'll see if he has anything for the agenda coming up.

We'll go to our code enforcement office, zoning officer, Chris Hart.

Anything for the agenda?

MR. HART: No, nothing at this time, unless you guys have anything you want to ask me about.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have any questions for the zoning officer?

One. I noticed a sign on the corner of Dunn and Main Street and I saw the sign permit in your report. There's a business there? What is that?

MR. HART: That is Melucci. Ricky's daughter-in-law. That went through planning and everything, the sign permit is done.

MR. NOTARI: What kind of business

MR. HART: She's a nutritionist. It's only one on one. It was approved,

MR. NOTARI: The sign doesn't

MR. HART: No, it was set back

MR. FEBBO: Chief, do you want to fill him in on the Fallon Street episode? I will.

MR. NOTARI: Chris, I talked to one of the pharmacists at CVS. They talked to

MR. HART: Friday it's being done. I got the phone call today. All of Main Street. I spoke with Chris Gilchrist,

Dunkin Donuts, Dollar General, the empty
lot, CVS, Frank Serafini. He did his over
the weekend for me. The old UPS. That was
done. There's a restaurant going in there
in the future, within the next two months.
The old Medicine Shoppe is supposed to be
done as well.

MR. NOTARI: That's a Gilchrist property.

MR. HART: The beer distributor, I notified them. They're a little tough to deal with. Then Convenient, where Michelle is, they keep telling me it's clean, it's spotless. So I am hoping within the next two weeks all of Main Street should be cleaned up and we can move forward.

MR. NOTARI: Thank you very much.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thanks, Chris.

Anyone have anything for Chris? Thanks,

Chris.

Dave Lopatka, engineer, anything for the agenda?

MR. LOPATKA: Nothing for the agenda.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything to

update us on?

MR. LOPATKA: Still waiting for the blue stone. I did submit the change order for the front stucco. So that's something that you guys need to discuss, I guess, so we can kind of get that moving if you want to do that.

MR. NOTARI: What needs to get moving besides the stone?

MR. LOPATKA: That change order for the stucco in front. I think the majority of the inside is in pretty good shape.

There's a couple items the chief brought up that we had to make a couple changes on.

The one door into the cell had to be swinging out, so we're trying to make an adjustment on that. There was some issues with code just flipping the door around and opening it out. Couple other things.

There's the floor or something, there was some electrical and communication stuff that he wanted in the interview room that wasn't proposed there initially.

MR. NOTARI: So is the plan to move everybody into the remodeled inside even if

the outside isn't done yet?

MS. BARTOLETTI: That was not my plan. I would rather have it all done, then once it's complete -- because right now it's considered still in the hands of the contractor. So I really didn't want to have to move into there and still have it as being under control of the contractor. I would rather do everything all at one time in case there are problems.

MR. LOPATKA: I'm going to have a meeting with him next week and get a final schedule.

MR. NOTARI: I would like, for our next meeting, to have a schedule in hand because I believe -- and you tell me if I'm wrong. They had a date that they needed to be done by. I know some of the change orders added some time to that date. Are we past that date, the new date with the change orders?

MR. LOPATKA: We're probably getting close, yes. I'll verify it with them. I'll go over it with them.

MR. NOTARI: I mean, I realize we're

waiting on the blue stone, but we have to find it somewhere, and if that's the contractor's cost, that's the contractor's cost. They bid on this project knowing full well -- maybe not knowing full well that they might have problems getting supplies, but this project needs to be done. We need to push this onto the contractor and say, you know, we're already in September. I know I joked with you all spring about mid-July, but we are now way past mid-July.

MR. LOPATKA: Agreed.

MR. FEBBO: What about the exterior colors?

MR. LOPATKA: That's all been done.

MR. FEBBO: But it hasn't been put on. Right? The white's not the color.

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, it's gray.

MR. LOPATKA: They actually painted all the way around to where they were. They need to get the front done.

MR. NOTARI: And the water problems we had two weeks ago?

MR. LOPATKA: The big water problem wasn't their fault. It was in an area that

they hadn't touched. What they did find out, there was an old cap on a sewer that must have rusted, and when the sewer backed up it blew the cap right off. They found the cap. We had their plumber fix that issue.

MR. FEBBO: That was the basement.

MR. LOPATKA: It wasn't part of their contract. Some of the issues they had in the front of the building were because the windows weren't flashed yet. So the windows are getting flashed. Once the finish coat goes on we'll be okay. But the issue in the basement was not part of their contract.

MR. FEBBO: That was there since they built the building.

MR. NOTARI: I guess I misunderstood the panic.

MR. LOPATKA: There were a couple areas that were leaking that we had them fix. There were a couple ceiling tiles we had them fix. Most of that, there was one or two roof leaks that we had to fix. But the issues on the front of the building were

MR. LOPATKA: I don't have them done. We talked about putting it off until February.

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$ HOOVER: I'd like to see what it's going to cost.

MR. LOPATKA: I have a map put together. We'll get them measured and I'll get you a cost.

MR. FEBBO: Are we cutting back on the number of streets?

MR. HOOVER: We're going to look at the streets that we have. There's 15 of them on that list. So depending on how much money we have, we'll send it to everybody, have them pick out the top streets for whatever, a million, 1.1 million, somewhere around there, million dollars, see how far it's going to go.

MS. BARTOLETTI: There's a lot of places that Joe keeps coming across that need either a storm drain or catch basins fixed, repaired, redone. If they're going to be paved we should probably have them rebuilt sometime soon. We could use liquid fuels money for that as well.

MR. HOOVER: We can pick the streets that we want to do and then have Joe go in and do those. A million dollars with the price of asphalt isn't going to go far.

MR. FEBBO: How much did blacktop go up from last year?

MR. LOPATKA: At one point it was \$80 a barrel for oil, which is probably double.

MR. HOOVER: Last time we had a meeting it was 69 and it's gone up to 83 now.

MR. LOPATKA: The cost is all related to oil.

MR. HOOVER: There's two huge streets they want to do. One is Dunn Avenue and one is Bennett or Franklin. Spring?

That may take the whole thing of just those two long streets, and they're wide. So I don't know.

MR. LOPATKA: We'll get them measured.

MR. HOOVER: Joe wants to get that pipeline on that one side, that one intersection, one side to the other, in case

we want to do the sewer project.

MR. FEBBO: That's two, three years in the making.

MR. HOOVER: If we decide to do that road we should get that pipe on the other side of the intersection so we don't have to dig it up again. See what happens.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: Anything else?

MR. LOPATKA: No, that's it.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone else for Dave? Thanks, Dave.

Chief, anything coming up for the agenda?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: The only thing is -- I'm not sure of her last name. But the lady and her mom that was here that couldn't make up their mind on the sign. They still can't make up their mind on the sign. They want to block the whole street for their whole family.

MS. AVVISATO: She said she's going to let it go.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I told her the best bet was to have the handicap right in front of the house. She don't want people parking

on the bridge because her family can't park there.

MS. AVVISATO: We discussed it.

She's going to let it go. She'll tell you.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone have any questions for the chief?

MR. NOTARI: I got a call today that there's a 9/11 service on Saturday at the Peckville Assembly of God Church. They're going to have a parade on route 6, I think. They wanted to invite the police chief and somebody from the fire department with a fire truck to participate. So I'll let Bill or Tag know.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I'll try and get a car there.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thanks, Chief.
Bill, anything on the solicitor's end?

ATTY. RINALDI: With that update I'm only going to do an ordinance for no parking on 825 South Main Street. We'll remove the other one. That will be on the agenda.

I've not heard anything back from the school district yet since my last report.

I think I'll have a settlement proposal on the Unimac property. The school district finally came to an agreement with the owners and it increased from the last settlement by an assessed value of \$20,000. So I'll have that in writing. You can approved that. There was supposed to be a hearing on Thursday at ten and that was just continued.

MR. NOTARI: There's an additional business moving into the Unimac, by the way, according to our planning minutes. Jet Pools. That's a pretty big business.

ATTY. RINALDI: If you guys are okay with it I'll put on the agenda and get the contract for the Urban Research and Development Corporation. He met with us, gave us the proposal. I'll get his contract and see what we can do with the fees on it. If somebody wants to look at that proposal, see what services you may not want or want we can check that off as well. I think that's all I have.

MR. HOOVER: What about that shutoff notice?

ATTY. RINALDI: That's part of your updated amendment to the sewer ordinance. I have it probably 80 percent complete. I'll circulate that to everybody. That's all I have.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have any questions for Bill? Thanks, Bill.

Marylynn?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Okay. Dave mentioned change orders. We're going to have change order number 31 and 32. You'll be able to read through it. We will also probably have a payment application by then.

We will have a CDBG resolution to the 2021 fund which will be \$139,998.

We advertised for the open DPW position, so we can possibly interview before the next meeting, possibly hire at the next meeting.

And I just wanted to remind that we had discussed the intersection of Oak Street and Marion.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I haven't heard nothing back. I'll send the gentleman another e-mail.

building.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone have any questions for Marylynn? Thanks,

Marylynn. Before we go down the table I'll go into public comment. Adeline?

MS. STRAZIK: I'm requesting a storm drain in front of my driveway. I live on Apache. Initially when they paved the street we requested storm drains, which they put three storm drains in but they put them past my house and the rain comes right down. I'm right across from Cheyenne, so I get Cheyenne and I get all of Apache and the drains are past my house. Right at the edge of my property. So if I can have a storm drain in front of my driveway. I've been flooded the last two rains and we're getting rain tomorrow. I can't put any more drains.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We'll give the message to the DPW manager, Joe, and he'll come by tomorrow and take a look.

MS. STRAZIK: I hope he comes when it's raining.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Rain or no rain, he'll come by. He's the one we send

out to go look at the streets. We'll give him the message tomorrow. He's not here tonight.

MS. STRAZIK: The water is actually eating away the pavement. We also have a curb at the edge of our driveway that's blacktop, and where the curbs meet it's actually missing blacktop because the water's just eating it away.

MR. FEBBO: Are you getting water in your basement?

MS. STRAZIK: Oh, yeah.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Is it that bituminous curbing?

MS. STRAZIK: Well, when we had the driveway done we actually had a curb on the end about this high. When they paved the street we asked them put the road in so it would go to the other side of the street.

Naturally that didn't happen. So when they paved the road, then we only had about this much of cement. So then they came and put blacktop over it.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So the paving company removed the curb? Okay.

ATTY. RINALDI: That wasn't our paving job. We haven't paved that.

MS. STRAZIK: I know we paid the first time. I don't know if that's the last time it was paved.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We'll send

Joe. We'll find out if that was our curb or

not. Louis?

MR. PETTINATO: I just wanted to ask where we were with that property at 201 Main Street, the nuisance property.

MR. HART: I mean, there hasn't been any complaints or reports right now. As you're aware, with him just passing and everything it's being transferred to his daughter. She's in the process of doing other things with the property, which is beneficial to you guys. Put it that way. You're aware of what the outcome is going to be. Now it's just be patient about a month or so and it's all going to work out.

MR. PETTINATO: Only because the last time we were here we were at 21 days and the cars are still against George's property. There's no fence, nothing.

MR. HART: Like I said, we went to the property owner. I'm just waiting.

MR. PETTINATO: There's been a gray car -- I know I have a picture. It's been there at least a month. More like two. And there's a brown SUV that's been parked there for a while. They're not moving. It's right down near the -- not past but right down near the no parking from here to corner.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Chief, could you check the gray car out first thing?

MR. PETTINATO: The batteries got taken care of. Appreciate that.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: What's the other car?

MR. PETTINATO: Brown SUV.

MR. JUROSKY: That Nissan has no inspection. That Subaru was towed to that spot and it hasn't moved in three months. We talked to the people who own it and they're mad because they're not fixing it.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone else from the public before I go down the table? Mayor?

MAYOR LEGG: I have nothing at this time. Thank you.

MR. FEBBO: Nothing.

MR. NOTARI: Marylynn, I'm just questioning whether you have been alerted to the fact the little league is going to hold a softball tournament at Pagnotti Park and possibly at Miles, too. I think the last weekend in September.

MS. BARTOLETTI: No.

MR. NOTARI: I told them once already to call you. I will tell them again.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Thank you.

MR. LETTIERI: Nothing.

MR. HOOVER: Nothing.

MS. AVVISATO: I'm good.

MR. KOMENSKY: One thing. I would just like to thank everybody for their help last week, from Marylynn to all the borough workers who were out. Didn't matter what time. Everybody stayed, got everything cleaned up, and everybody really worked as a team. I just wanted to make sure I pass that along. Everybody did a great job.

Thank you. That's all.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Also, Mike, to you as well because you were out with them, and the chief, Marylynn and the fire department, DPW workers.

My question, Dave -- and I don't even know if it's for you. Who could the borough contact -- or maybe Marylynn would know -- about that river on Lonesome Road? In the same spot it keeps overflowing and keeps hitting the same one business storm after storm after storm.

MR. KOMENSKY: I talked to Marylynn, probably on one of our rants during the rain storm. We're going to call Bridget to try to get a FEMA hazard mitigation grant to try to get the river cleaned up, dredged, whatever.

MR. HOOVER: Over by Panel Prints, too, way in the back. That's where that water came from, too.

MR. KOMENSKY: Bridget, Marty Flynn, try and get them, at least let them look at it now.

MR. LOPATKA: That would be more of

an Army Corps issue.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Who would we contact for that, too? Would that be them?

MR. LOPATKA: It might be FEMA, but the Army Corps would be the ones would do maybe the cleaning. To build it up the Army Corps has to do a study. When you build that up you constrict it, where it was flowing before. Now you could create a bigger issue downstream. So it would have to be studied by the Army Corps.

MR. KOMENSKY: Then the other thing, the problem up the Heights, which we talked to neighbors while we were there. They're telling us like just these past two rain storms is when that water has gone over. I actually was up in the woods that night with one of the neighbors, and we're going to get Chris, Joe, we're going to try to go up there some day and see if we can determine, number one, whose land it is, and what we can do to divert some of that water.

MR. HART: It's Pagnotti's land.

MR. KOMENSKY: There's a couple big holes up there. We think they can divert

the water and it won't come down. Couple mining holes, strip holes.

MR. NOTARI: Mike, while you're at that and possibly have Pagnottis on the call, the land that was just donated to the borough by Pagnottis next to Pagnotti Park, the water comes out of the woods there at times. It wasn't coming out during the rain storm, but after the rain storm, the next day it was coming like a river down through the parking lot and into the park. I think that's pretty much the same thing. The water's coming downhill.

MR. KOMENSKY: Looks like the kids are going up there with quads and they have it rutted out, where it used to go down into a strip mine the other way.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If no one has anything else, at this time the chair would entertain a motion to adjourn.

MR. NOTARI: I'll make that motion.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: By Councilman

Notari. All in favor?
