Grace to Mary.

MR. ZUPON: Also I have another problem on Main Street.

MR. SEMENZA: To make it a one way?

MR. ZUPON: Technically it's still a
one way in your book.

MR. SEMENZA: I understand that.

Chief, what was your finding on making it a one way, that we didn't know it was a one way?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I had it the opposite way, coming from Mary to -- and they were saying most of the issues by church, church hours. When I came through there it was right during the prime of church and I didn't see no issue. They wanted no parking on the east side of the road. I forget her name. They didn't want to make it one way. They wanted to keep it the way it is. They just wanted no parking. I was there on Sunday, there was no issue.

MR. ZUPON: It's during night.

Every night of the week there's something going on.

MR. SEMENZA: Bill, can this be

changed right here, right now?

ATTY. RINALDI: No. If we changed it I have a resolution somewhere. It had to happen after we codified it.

MR. SEMENZA: George Street, south from Mary to Henderson.

ATTY. RINALDI: There was an old version and Paul took and ran through it all.

MR. SEMENZA: Bill, what do we do about this?

ATTY. RINALDI: Let me look it up.

I'm going to try and find it.

MR. SEMENZA: Lawrence and George and Church streets. I mean, as Mike is stating, it's actually illegal -- people are driving illegal on it right now if they're going the opposite way. Could that just not be logged into this book?

ATTY. RINALDI: I know Lawrence and Henderson sound familiar. I'll look it up. I'll be able to tell you the year we passed the resolution and the ordinance. Maybe it got lost somewhere.

MR. SEMENZA: I think the ordinance

is just not put into the book by mistake.

MR. FEBBO: So we want to consider changing it back to one way? Put signs up to make it legal one way?

ATTY. RINALDI: Let me find out the way it's supposed to be. Maybe there's an ordinance that we passed that just didn't get into the book.

MR. FEBBO: Do we want to revert back to making it a one way to eliminate the problem there?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bill, I think it was the chairman's question, too. If the street right now is marked as a two way but it's a one way is it an illegal marked street?

ATTY. RINALDI: I don't know. This is what the code book says.

MR. SEMENZA: It's saying it's still a one way on the code book.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I don't want to see anyone get hit, hurt or anything, but God forbid if somebody does and it happens on an illegally marked street. It's like double jeopardy.

MR. BIERYLA: On E code, when you go in there our code is written in black.

There is also supplemental that's written in red, that if we passed a resolution that didn't get put in we need to tell them that that resolution has passed and it needs to get put in the book and replace it. So I don't know if maybe that's what happened with that street. The time frame I'm not too sure about.

MAYOR MULKERIN: There's other streets that we have done in the past few years. Bill, if the -- what factors into making a street a one way? If the chief gives us a study is that the final? Or can council just decide to make it one way?

MR. SEMENZA: We can just decide.

ATTY. RINALDI: You have to have some basis.

MAYOR MULKERIN: The chief's looking at it one way. I mean, I know when I pick up my kids from CCD it's a madhouse. Junior basketball, madhouse. Various meetings throughout. It's a busy street.

MR. SEMENZA: Which way is supposed

to be one way?

MR. ZUPON: From Grace.

MR. SEMENZA: Not much traffic comes up, though. Basically, people cutting off people and stuff, a one way is not going to solve your issue.

MR. ZUPON: If you make it one way you're not going to have cars coming -- if you're parked --

MR. SEMENZA: I'm just saying strictly the traffic flow is off of Grace.

MR. ZUPON: Down to Marion. If you correct it back to that you won't have the problem with people trying to zip in between people as they're coming up the other way and kids crossing the street, worrying about looking both ways.

MR. SEMENZA: But a one way is not going to be a determining factor. It's not going to stop the issue of cars going around people.

MAYOR MULKERIN: Chief, aside from pictures what goes into your traffic studies? You look at accident history?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Video. They wanted

to keep it both ways. They just wanted no parking.

MAYOR MULKERIN: I think Bill's going to look into, first, whether the ordinance is even on the books.

MR. SEMENZA: When was that a one-way street last?

MAYOR MULKERIN: About eight years.

MR. SEMENZA: We'll look into that.

MR. ZUPON: Paul, there's a manhole right around Arcaro & Genell's. It's loose.

MR. SEMENZA: That would be the state, wouldn't it?

MR. PAPI: If it's our manhole lid it's ours.

MR. SEMENZA: Richard Snider?

MR. SNIDER: Good evening. Just a little bit of a concern about abandoned cars. I spoke to the zoning officer little over a year ago when the old Mac's Cafe burned. I live right across the street. It did take a while. He explained to me about removing the rubble. They did. Cars wouldn't be able to park there. Well, they removed a lot of cars.

Since then a lot of cars have come back. These people are dropping them off, 10:00 at night. I got pictures of all this. I got one where it's a trailer, part of it's parked in the road. Very difficult for me to back out of my driveway. These cars are just left. They got flat tires, windows broken out, parts missing, and they don't seem to care. I know Bobby Ferri owns the property. It's a mess. It looks terrible.

MR. SEMENZA: I drove by there this morning. I looked and I said there's an awful lot of cars there. I remember when we talked about this at a meeting quite some time back that we said that he was going to start removing them little by little.

MR. SNYDER: He moved a lot of cars out of there once the bar was torn down but there's been a lot more. I got pictures here.

MR. FEBBO: Steve and I were looking at that. He has followed up on that. Bobby Ferri is a car dealer. He's been using that probably as a holding tank for his car lot. I think Steve already cited him.

MR. BIERYLA: Bobby Ferri, Jr. is not the owner, it's his father.

MR. FEBBO: He's chasing it down to get the owner. You're right, cars don't belong there. He is on that.

MR. BIERYLA: Bobby, Sr. He's already gotten two letters. He removed some of them, but then I think Bobby, Jr. throws them back in there.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: So what were your instructions to him?

MR. BIERYLA: To remove them. I have the letters that I sent. So he's in the process of -- there's not going to be no more letters.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So according to the borough zoning code you're following the right steps and procedures?

MR. BIERYLA: Right.

MR. SEMENZA: I apologize to you. I hope we get it cleaned up sooner than you wish.

Joan Wilk?

MS. WILK: Before I ask a question here, Mr. Ferret, Mr. Rinaldi abstained from

voting. You guys under Robert's Rules?
Under Robert's Rules, when you abstain you
must state why you're abstaining from
voting. Read the book.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do you want to know why I abstained?

MS. WILK: When you're abstaining on a vote you should say I'm abstaining for these reasons. Council just lets it go.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do you want to know why I abstained? I didn't have time to review it.

MS. WILK: That's all you had to say. Every meeting I come to Mr. Ferrett abstains, never says why he abstains. You need to say it if you're under Robert's Rules. Let's be a little professional.

I'll not a professional.

Mr. Brown.

MR. BROWN: Ms. Wilk.

MS. WILK: This doesn't look good.

Tired of seeing negativity in Old Forge. I

was born, I was raised here, went to school

here, left here, came back. You know. But

this is not good. You and I both know there

has been issues over the years at 172 Church Street. Parties that were hosted by you, ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades.

MR. BROWN: Before we go on, attorney Rinaldi --

MS. WILK: I'm still speaking. Let me speak. Mr. Semenza, I'm asking for the floor.

MR. SEMENZA: Go ahead.

MS. WILK: Now, I remember one specific -- and how I know 172, my mother's relatives used to own that house.

MR. BROWN: You must be family.

It's been in my family for a long time.

MS. WILK: Well, I was born and raised on Winter Street. I know what I'm talking about. You were raided one time, apparently never -- it was a coverup. Christmas formal, the police chief tried to get a warrant to go in there.

MR. BROWN: Jay, did you try to get a warrant to go in?

MS. WILK: I'm not done. The DA didn't give it to him because he needed probable cause. But yet there was kids

outside were picked up for drinking coming out of your place. Neighbors complained. I know what I'm talking about, you know what I'm talking about.

MR. BROWN: Ms. Wilk, I'm glad you came here. I'm glad you came to discuss that. I'm glad you feel that whatever is going on, the coverup in this town, I'm glad you came here to discuss it.

Chief Jason Dubernas, have you referred an investigation to the DA's office?

MS. WILK: The first time they raided that house it was washed under the rug.

MR. BROWN: Chief Dubernas, have you referred anything to the DA's office currently?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yes.

MR. BROWN: Good. There's a neutral party. The neutral party will rule. I am a strong believer. I put my faith in the judicial system. If I did something wrong I will be charged with it. Until then --

MS. WILK: You got away with it.

MS. WILK: I said it was raided once and it was covered up. And it's a known fact here in this town about that, and don't tell me you didn't hear about it.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: I didn't.

That's why I just asked Chief Dubernas.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Where was it covered up at?

MS. WILK: The very first time. You weren't even in charge at that time.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I was officer in charge of that one.

MS. WILK: The second one you were for the Christmas party, but the very first one in yesteryears you were not. Somebody else was in charge.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: My other question, because Ms. Wilk said it, did you ever try to obtain a warrant?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: When I was officer in charge for the instance I believe she's talking about the DA's office wouldn't approve a warrant for the residence.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?

MS. WILK: And you also made a

statement in the paper that you didn't know anything about it? You're chair of the --

MR. SEMENZA: I didn't know anything about charges being brought to the district attorney's office.

MS. WILK: You're chair.

MS. SEMENZA: I'm the chair of what?

MS. WILK: You're the chairman of council. Why weren't you informed?

MR. SEMENZA: Because I don't run the police department. That's the mayor's job.

MS. WILK: But you're still chairman of council.

MR. SEMENZA: But I have nothing to do with the police department. I have nothing to do with the police department. I don't want to know anything about the police department. It's not my business.

MS. WILK: It certainly is. That's why you're in office. Anything with this borough is your business.

MR. SEMENZA: I understand what you're saying, but the police department is run by the mayor. If there's an active

investigation I have no business being involved in it.

MR. BROWN: Does anybody else in here -- to Ms. Wilk, again to satisfy you and anybody else, anyone at council table, any members of council, the police department, the mayor, like I said, I commend Jay for sending that report. I strongly believe in the judicial system and I believe that it will play out the way it plays out. If I did something wrong I will be charged. If I didn't do anything wrong I won't be charged, and I will ask for a pubic apology from yourself, Ms. Wilk, for making these false statements.

MS. WILK: What false statements? I just read whatever's in the paper.

MR. BROWN: Don't believe everything that's put in the paper.

MS. WILK: I do believe what's in the paper. I believe reporters don't put unnecessary stuff in the paper.

MR. BROWN: What does the headline say? Councilman may have been. You never stated may have. You accused me for being

there. That's illegal. I can come after you for a lawsuit. The paper was smart enough to put that in there.

MS. WILK: I asked you about this. What is this?

MR. BROWN: It's a newspaper article.

MS. WILK: You were coming out from the back yard, according to this.

MR. BROWN: Like I said, the judicial system will play out. It will prevail. I'm a strong believer in it.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Ms. Wilk, I'd like to add this as well. I sat as chairman for two years, and anything that has to do with council and the borough, council handles borough business. When it comes to the police department -- and you can even ask our solicitor -- the mayor overseas the police department. Council has no authority over the police department.

MS. WILK: You hire policemen, don't you?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We do, but we have no authority over the police

department. They are not subject to give us any type of investigating information, finding information. That's against the law.

So as Chairman Semenza stated, he is not supposed to have any knowledge of anything, neither are any of us. It's all the mayor, the chief of police --

MR. BROWN: I would encourage anybody that has any questions to contact Bob. Jay, have you spoke to the mayor about this at all?

MR. BROWN: Pertaining to anything specific, have you spoken to the mayor about it? Because in that article it seems like the mayor knew more than myself and more than anybody else.

So if anybody has any questions, I would encourage them to speak to the mayor. He's in charge of the police department. It's seems from that article and that standpoint that the mayor knew what was going on. So if anybody has any questions

or anyone in the community has any questions

I would refer them to talk to Mayor Bob

Mulkerin.

MAYOR MULKERIN: I was asked very specifically was I aware of the incident, when was I notified, have I seen the police report, and the reporter asked if he could get a copy of the police report.

MR. BROWN: So like I said, if anybody else has any questions I refer to the mayor. I think he knows more about the situation than anybody.

MR. SEMENZA: We'll move on to the next person. Rachel?

MS. HARDING: My name is Rachel Harding. I live at 208 West Mary Street. I'm here because I have a problem with someone trapping my cats. What it is is just like in every small town there's a problem with stray and feral cats here in Old Forge. So I decided to try and do something about it.

What I was doing was any of those stay or feral cats in my neighborhood or coming through my yard I was taking to Nay

Aug and having them spayed or neutered and they give them shots and then releasing them. However, once you do that they kind of become a little colony and you're kind of responsible if they need some kind of veterinary care or antibiotics. They would have to be trapped again, because they're really not too friendly, and then be taken for vet care. I was taking care of six cats in my neighborhood.

My neighbor, who happens to be an Old Forge police officer, didn't like the cats coming through her yard or maybe defecating or urinating in her yard so she had put out traps. Now, she knew what I was doing with the cats. Taking care of them, feeding them, getting them fixed, just to prevent any more kittens or 300 cats in the neighborhood.

So after January 31st, it was, I went out to let my dog out. I see her in the back yard in a bathrobe. I thought it was strange. So when she went in the house I looked and there was a trap. So three days later three of my cats are missing. On

the third day when I noticed that they were missing, I was actually home and working second shift that day, I saw a borough truck pull up and the borough worker got out with an empty trap and put it back into her yard with a towel over it where she had been trapping.

So my thing is I was told that the cats were released behind Ace Hardware.

Now, you know where Ace Hardware is. Not very far. Half a block. Cats never came back. I just want to know what happened to my cats. I don't really think they were left there. If she had a problem, maybe she could have just brought them to me or came to me, you know, instead of taking these cats that I paid my money for to take care of and get fixed and just disposing them wherever. I don't know.

MAYOR MULKERIN: Nice to meet you.

I spoke with you numerous times. I believe
I mentioned to Mr. Febbo, who is head of the
environmental committee, about the T&R
program that you have mentioned in our
discussions and I did get some literature.

I think I spoke to a couple councilmen about it, just about the ideas you have regarding the program separate from your incident.

MS. HARDING: I just want to know where the cats are. I just don't think that they were left there because they would have come right back. It's been a year I was taking care of them, they know where to get food, water, shelter.

MR. SEMENZA: Do you have to have some kind of certain facility set up for them? Like, homes for them like dog coops or whatever? You say you had six or seven cats?

MS. HARDING: There was six cats.

In my back yard I have a shed.

MR. SEMENZA: I don't know the rules or anything.

MS. HARDING: In that shed in the wintertime I have Styrofoam boxes that are heated and hay, electric water dish, and they get food every morning and evening from me.

MR. FEBBO: What are you doing about keeping them on your own property?

MS. HARDING: Well, they do have a litter box in there, but I cannot keep --

MR. FEBBO: Do you keep them fenced in?

MS. HARDING: I do have a fence around three-quarters of my property. Part of it is privacy fence but a chain link they can just jump right over.

on the phone and I did try to help. I live in the same exact neighborhood, around the corner and up the street from you. I think part of the problem is -- and I do applaud what you do, but at the same time when you have the cats that you're saying you're taking care of and they're on the property, they're not. They go to all the neighbors' properties and they do their business or whatever you'd like to say on their outdoor patio furniture and on their porches and all that type of stuff.

Then I have to hear all the complaints from the people who say you're doing that and you're taking care of that portion of it but they're not staying on

your property. They're all over the neighborhood.

I know that you're angry with Kim, who either is the person who lives there and I think you believe she is the person responsible, but due to complaints that I've had from so many other people I would say it could been at least 20 people who may have been responsible for trying to remove the cats. There's more of a problem than what you're saying.

ATTY. RINALDI: Are the six cats your cats, that you keep them and house and feed them? Or are they not your cats? I'm missing this.

MS. HARDING: Well, do I own them?

ATTY. RINALDI: If they're your cats
you're responsible for them.

MS. HARDING: They were coming in my yard. I didn't want a million kittens.

There were nine kittens in my yard last year which I actually raised up until they were old enough to be adopted out. With the help of different non-profit organizations I found homes for all nine. But I didn't want

nine more kittens. That's why I went out and did this my own money, to try and fix the problem. I don't want 30 cats in my yard, no. It's not their fault they're out there. It's the people who rent apartments and I'm moving out so I leave it there.

ATTY. RINALDI: But if you're feeding them and housing them I think they are your cats. It gets to be a point where okay, it's your cat. Then if it's showing up on different neighbors' yards that's a problem. I don't know if you're telling me they're wild cats or if they're your cats just wandering around the neighborhood. You're housing them and feeding them.

MS. HARDING: Well, I don't keep them in there. They just go in to eat and come back out and come and go as they please. They're not really mine.

ATTY. RINALDI: I think you're going to have to keep them on your property. If you're going to take care of them you're going to have to keep them on your property.

MR. SEMENZA: Do we know who it is?

MAYOR MULKERIN: Yes. We know cats

were removed from the property. The cats were removed from the property.

MR. SEMENZA: So you know where they were put?

MAYOR MULKERIN: Supposedly behind Ace Hardware. It's not illegal to trap cats. The officer trapped the cat, the employee that they speak of thought -- he was trying to help out. He removed the cats. He's an animal lover. He didn't think he was doing anything wrong. Took them down the street to the abandoned warehouse, thinking that's okay. In hindsight it's not.

MS. BARTOLETTI: And there was a reason why.

MAYOR MULKERIN: It was a personnel issue that was discussed with the police, it was a personnel issue that was discussed with Marylynn and she addressed it. The employee feels terrible. He does feel terrible. He's an animal lover. He thought he was doing the right thing, taking them down the hill and putting it -- now, in speaking with Rachel, you know, the cats

didn't come back. There's three.

That's when we started talking about

-- I got that packet sent to me. I spoke
with Lou about -- you know, I understand
what happened happened, but after reading
that there was a lot good in that packet.
There's a lot of good information. Maybe we
can focus on a solution.

There are other boroughs that are doing programs. Every town has a feral cat issue. We're no different. What they're doing, the T&R, tries its best to control the issue. I actually spoke to the director of Griffen Pond to learn more about it. He addressed it with me, too. He said there's definitely benefits.

Some boroughs have their own traps.

They put them in neighborhoods and they'll
work with individuals to trap and release.

MR. BIERYLA: According to our ordinance your cats are a nuisance to the neighborhood because all four-legged animals need to be leashed the same as a dog. So by you doing that and if the cat is going up and causing a nuisance to somebody else's

property -- in the ordinance it says four-legged animals.

On the other hand, you're saying that it was the employee or the officer. There's two other people in that neighborhood, their cats got out of their house, they haven't been seen since. There was another trap that was picked up down on Henderson Street.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I have a police report. The guy said he had a trap stolen out of his back yard. It was a Griffen Pond trap.

MR. BIERYLA: There's other people in that neighborhood and over by Mr. Brown's house. They have people that are over there. There's other people that are down on Shawnee that have it. So a lot of people just get disgusted. You don't hear about it.

MR. MAYOR: That's an environmental issue.

MS. CORDIANO: After the meeting Lou and I can speak with you and exchange phone numbers and reach out to the neighborhoods

you've done this with.

MR. FEBBO: My daughter lives in Philly. She belongs to a cat rescue. She's out a couple nights a week.

We have a problem. They are nuisance cats. It's not just the police officer that's complaining about it. The whole neighborhood is. You only hear one thing.

MS. HARDING: My neighbors will actually feed them for me if I'm not home.

I just want to educate the people in town.

I have traps, I can help them, show them. I just want to help. I don't want this to become a thing where the cats are hurt or whatever.

MR. FEBBO: What is your solution that we can come up with to help eliminate the problem so these cats aren't all over the neighborhood doing their things? How do we confine them or keep them under control so that they don't -- once you get it done do you move them on? Are you going to send them off someplace else?

MS. HARDING: You really can't.
