MS. BARTOLETTI: The first bid is Garrett's Auto Sales. He is bidding on the Scag Turf Tiger for \$325.

MR. FEBBO: Yes.

they're definitely different because normally the sewer agency things never come to the general side.

MR. NOTARI: Who does that purchasing for the sewer agency?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Lucille.

MR. PAPI: I tell her what I need, a purchase order, then I go down and get it and I give her the receipts.

MR. NOTARI: It's going to be fall soon. The leaf truck will normally run
Thursdays and Fridays starting, like, end of September?

MR. PAPI: Yes. Just as soon as the leaves start piling up. As soon as they start raking them up.

MR. NOTARI: For my own information.

Normally at the end of the week you do it.

Right?

MR. PAPI: Normally Thursday and Friday.

MR. NOTARI: One other thing. I was asked by the Department of Environmental Sustainability at the county if we would be interested in hosting a tire recycling site

for the down valley. I know we typically take our tires to Taylor.

MR. PAPI: Once a year they have that.

MR. NOTARI: We're coming up on that once a year. September 13th through the 16th.

MR. SEMENZA: Great idea.

MS. BARTOLETTI: There are other municipalities. I'd rather pass it on to them this time because we do --

MR. PAPI: We do the cleanup every year.

MS. BARTOLETTI: But the TV recycling situation really took a toll on the DPW and the department. This isn't something every borough needs to do. You have to collect money and the whole bit. It's not that they just drop off.

MR. NOTARI: We would have to collect money. It's \$3 a tire, or \$5 a tire with a rim on it.

MR. PAPI: I think it's a different price for car tires and truck tires.

MR. NOTARI: It's a dollar or two

more.

MR. FEBBO: How long of a period of time are we talking about?

MR. NOTARI: It could be one day for three or four hours. I mean, just something to think about. She would like to know ASAP. I think we can --

MR. SEMENZA: That's up to everybody else. I like the idea. We can even possibly ask Passariello or somebody to borrow a dumpster or donate a dumpster to the borough. That's up to council. I like the idea.

MR. FEBBO: Would the county provide us with dumpsters?

MR. NOTARI: No. The county will want us to deliver the tires in our vehicles to the site probably Monday, September 18th, which is at the Lackawanna County Recycling Center. They get tractor-trailers that they're loaded into.

MR. SEMENZA: So we would just go dump them somewhere. I don't like the idea.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I just think that because we have one of the smaller DPW

get bids because he didn't want to give her a bid before that. He was doing the wall. I gave her five different contractors for her sidewalk, and I said if he doesn't want to put it in, then you're going to say you want your sidewalk done. So I got five different contractors. Get bids from all five. If you choose to do it, do it. If not, then let me know, let him know so he can put the wall in.

MR. NOTARI: So he's waiting to put that wall in until she puts in new sidewalks?

MR. BIERYLA: Whether it's going to be good financially for her or not.

MR. NOTARI: That's all.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else? Thanks, Steve. Dave, engineers report, please.

MR. LOPATKA: I'm going to pass these out. Engineer's report. It's actually for July and basically up to date today. Old Forge paving project, I had forwarded an agreement to Marylynn, who got it signed by everybody that had to sign it. Forwarded it to Pennsy, got it back from

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Pennsy. So everything was taken care of there. They actually provided all the documents for bonding and they started work yesterday on the paving project.

Old Forge Borough Building master plan, I don't know if you guys met with Marylynn yet with regard to the different options that were out there. But once you do, we'll set a meeting up to discuss the next step with the architect.

Burger King, Jones Street, Sussex Street, Stuart separation project, I received a call after we had a meeting out on the site from Jim Backus, who is at Burger King, to propose purchasing all materials, inlets, manholes and pipes for the project with Old Forge completing installation. There's a cost estimate included on the second sheet, I believe, of It comes out to your packet there. somewhere around a little over \$10,000 for the materials for the plan that we had proposed, and then the rest of it -- I mean, if you guys agree to it as to how he wants to do this we're ready to basically put it

out to bid for the construction portion.

East Grace Street, Main Street, Bob, you were going to call the sewer department and set something up with Stacchiotti.

MR. SEMENZA: I did. I talked to

MR. LOPATKA: I don't know if that's Stacchiotti's pipe.

MR. SEMENZA: I don't know if he ever got in touch with him or not. I never talked to him about it. Paul, will you try and make contact with --

MR. PAPI: I haven't seen him in months.

MR. NOTARI: He works crazy hours.

I've spoken to him. He is on board with us.

MR. PAPI: Mike Ford, yesterday, put the locater on his hose and shot it in the sewer line all the way to Galetti's driveway, and you can see the readings down on the road how deep it is except he hit a wall. There might be a cap at the end of the line. So he's got to camera it now.

MR. LOPATKA: When the surveyors are out there they come -- well, even when we

walked it we couldn't find a manhole from
the end of Grace Street all the way to Main
Street. The one on Main Street is the
parallel line that runs down Main Street.

MR. SEMENZA: That's got to be what, 400, 500 feet?

MR. LOPATKA: That doesn't even go that way. It only goes straight down Main Street. Somewhere in the middle --

MR. FEBBO: There has to be a sewer line in there.

MR. LOPATKA: There's a line but it may just end. It may be capped somewhere.

There's no manhole that we could find. We used --

MR. FEBBO: Revello would have to be on that line somewhere.

MR. PAPI: You would think. I know they don't go out the back.

MR. LOPATKA: They have to be on that line somehow. I'm assuming it may go up further or they're on a line that goes down and turns down Fallon. I don't know. I think this is in last month's report. They went out and did the location so we get

1	a depth. Now we need to actually camera it
2	to find out where it goes and what it does.
3	MR. FEBBO: What's the depth of
4	that?
5	MR. PAPI: Six or seven feet. It
6	starts out six foot-four and goes up to
7	seven foot-seven.
8	MR. FEBBO: We may have the depth in
9	front of Stacchiotti's. So you need to
10	camera that to see why we have a blockage.
11	MR. LOPATKA: See where it stops.
12	MR. PAPI: It's either the end of
13	the line or a manhole.
14	MR. SEMENZA: I wonder where Revello
15	comes out, if it comes out on Main Street or
16	out the back.
17	MR. LOPATKA: It can't go to Main
18	Street. There's a pretty good drop in grade
19	there. The restaurant probably goes out
20	there.
21	MR. PAPI: Let's hope he's not tied
22	into Stacchiotti.
23	MR. FEBBO: So we're going to camera
24	that?
25	MR. PAPI: Yeah, we're going to

camera Grace Street.

MR. SEMENZA: We'll try and get in touch with Stacchiotti and --

 $\label{eq:mr.see} \mbox{MR. FEBBO: I'll see if I can chase} \\ \mbox{him down myself.}$

MR. LOPATKA: That's kind of where we're at with that. We need to know where those inverts are before determining whether or not we can get in the pipe. Plus, we need to know -- we couldn't shoot anything upstream because there's nothing upstream to shoot. The easiest way to do it was to send the locater through the pipe and have him mark it every so often. We had him mark a depth on the road. We shoot that, then we'll have a good idea. That's East Grace Street.

Then the DPW storm water issue, we need to get together on that. I'll give you a call.

MR. PAPI: We got a price from Earth Works of \$6,400.

MR. SEMENZA: To run a pipe to Saint John's Creek?

MR. PAPI: To install two catch

cost, it's somebody to go out and survey it to produce a map that you can put the easement on.

MR. SEMENZA: It needs to be done.

One way or the other we have to get it done.

I think it's in the best interest to have

Dave go out and survey it.

MR. FEBBO: Plus it's keeping us from grading it, doing everything on DPW property. It should have been done already.

ATTY. RINALDI: Do you still have the estimate for Fred Street?

MR. LOPATKA: Yes.

MR. SEMENZA: Joe?

MR. FERRETT: Dave, the paving project, we already started the paving project. You know that very well. You know that I called you about a change order about five other streets that have to be put on. I happened to look at Cherry Lane yesterday, when they were down there, and today I was down on First Street and I was talking to the foreman down there, Dave, and one of the questions I asked him was has our engineer been around, and he says no, there hasn't

been anybody around.

MR. LOPATKA: My guy was there all day yesterday. They weren't there today because they're just milling today. My guy was there yesterday. We have all the slips. We were there when they were paving. But for us to stand there and just watch them mill, I mean, we have them milling the rest of the week. They aren't paving anything. Then my guy's going to meet their foreman out there to mark out where we need base replacement done.

MR. FERRETT: That's not what I'm concerned. The point that I'm really getting to is the fact that let's take Cherry Lane last Monday, when they first started. According to your report and everything you have Cherry Lane noted as 550 square yards of base repair that has to be done, which is \$18.60 a square yard. You also have on Cherry Lane the 550 square yards to be done by wearing course at \$6.15 a square yard.

My question to you is this, when I was down there they went to work and they

overlaid the whole street. They didn't go
to work and put base repair or nothing
whatsoever. So the question is I don't
understand what kind of overlay did they
put? Did they use the wearing course? Did
they use binder?

All I understand is that it was done in reference to a binder coat being put down and the regular coat thing would be put on later.

So my question to you is this, if the base repair wasn't done on those 550 square yards are we going to save any money by them just overlaying the area?

MR. LOPATKA: I will find out exactly what they did. I wasn't there. I didn't read the report yet. My guy puts a report together every time he's out there. I'll find out.

MR. FERRETT: Well, that's the basic reason why I asked was our engineer around checking on this to make sure everything is being done. Now the question is --

MR. LOPATKA: I'm sure he was out there when they paved, so I'll be able to --

MR. FERRETT: I understand that, but I also look at the report and everything that you got 8,820 square yards that have to be done. It's very possible that if you're doing this on 550 yards, what else could be done with the remainder of the square yardage? That's how much money that we can be saving.

MR. LOPATKA: I'll find out exactly what they did. I'll get you the information. Anytime they're paving or doing paving I'll have somebody out there. When they're just milling it doesn't make sense for me or for the borough to have somebody out there.

MR. FERRETT: It's not the question of checking on the milling or nothing, it's the question of knowing that base repair wasn't being done on this, overlay was being done. That means there's got to be a saving in dollars and cents.

MR. LOPATKA: I'll find out exactly what was done and I'll let you know. We will know what was paved and what base replacement was done and we'll have

roads that he wants to add. At the time we didn't even have a contract yet with Pennsy. We can't do a change order until --

MR. SEMENZA: Listen, I don't think any roads should be added unless all council knows about it, first and foremost.

We didn't do a change I know which ones he told me he

MR. SEMENZA: Okay, I understand the committee talked about it, but this is a paving project that all council voted on. think you should let all council know if you're changing and adding roads to this

Well, the basic reason for that, Bobby, is the fact that the bid

MR. SEMENZA: I understand that, but I think you should let all council know that you're adding roads to the project.

ATTY. RINALDI: You're going to have to approve the change orders.

MR. SEMENZA: Before he calls I think we should be informed. Correct?

MR. NOTARI: I would like to be.

MR. LENCESKI: We can still vote.

MR. LOPATKA: I told him we need to wait and see if anything starts going over or if we're under or kind of on the right level. When it comes time we can talk about that.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have anything else for Dave?

ATTY. RINALDI: Before you adjourn, make a decision on item three so he knows if he's doing a bid package.

MR. LOPATKA: That's with regard to Jim Backus and Burger King purchasing all the materials.

MR. FERRETT: Dave, by the way, that's another question I wanted to ask you. How is it that you said in your report that Burger King is willing to purchase all the material, all the inlets and manholes and pipes and everything for that project, yet

when you look at your project description there's nothing on there on the line. The report you gave us there was \$55 a lineal foot, 125 square yards, and it was 11,000-some dollars.

MR. LOPATKA: Wait, I'm not sure what you're --

ATTY, RINALDI: Two sheets.

MR. LOPATKA: One of them just breaks out items, the other one is the overall cost estimate we did first time. So materials are broken down on the second page. Third page is the overall cost estimate I gave you the first time. If you look at the cost, they're on page two, for the materials, those material costs are to purchase each of those items directly from Central Clay. I talked to Central Clay. I got those numbers right from Central Clay for their cost to purchase each of those items.

Now, the third sheet, our cost estimate includes -- why the cost per item is higher is because that's a completed place cost. That cost for each of those

inlets. On the first sheet it's maybe a thousand dollars, on the second sheet it's \$2,500, it's because that's their laborer cost to dig the ditch, put it back together, put asphalt back down. It's a completed place price, our cost estimate. The first one, materials, is straight purchasing.

MR. NOTARI: The cost on page three, did that go down \$10,000?

MR. LOPATKA: Yes, at a minimum, because if -- even if the company isn't buying you might get better numbers just for labor. So there's potential that number could come down even more than that.

MR. FERRETT: You need a motion on that?

MR. LOPATKA: We need a motion if you guys want to approve whether or not you want him to purchase the materials. So you guys put out to bid the labor and installation. His cost for materials is -- I mean, this is just an estimate, too. I don't know if it's going to be less than that or more. But this is an approximate cost that I have right from Central Clay.

MR. SEMENZA: So our bid would still be -- we have to put a bid out for how much?

MR. LOPATKA: Your bid would be basically for the installation of the plans we have. So what we would do is basically put a bid out for labor and construction costs. Page three was everything in the beginning.

Now, on page two I just broke out what the cost of those items and materials are.

MR. SEMENZA: Do you have a rough cost estimate for labor? Just deduct it.

MR. LOPATKA: Right.

MR. FEBBO: This is to go right to Main Street from Sussex Street, Meade?

MR. LOPATKA: Well, the sewer goes directly to Sussex Street, if we can get that there. The storm will go all the way to Main.

MR. SEMENZA: When me and you spoke you said that the cost of the labor could go down some, possibly. So it's not just subtracting the 55,814 from the 10,686.

MR. LOPATKA: Well, no. Obviously

our 55 or whatever the number is, the cost estimate based off of past history. So, I mean, depending on who bids on it, you know, those numbers could change, especially if they're not going to be purchasing the materials.

MR. FEBBO: How much leeway --

MR. LOPATKA: We have a contingency in there all the time of, like, ten percent anyway. I mean, it could fluctuate either way, depending on --

MR. SEMENZA: The \$40,000 for labor is a lot of money.

MR. LOPATKA: That could come down.

MR. LENCESKI: If we chose to do this project it would come out of the sewer authority?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Is this entire project considered a sewer project?

MR. LOPATKA: It's a separation, yes.

MR. SEMENZA: Everything is up and up, though? I know summer is almost over.

I'm asking the mayor and the chief can we put a cop down there?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Sure.

MAYOR MULKERIN: When we have availability.

MR. SEMENZA: So we don't have part-time cops --

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I could have.

They're there tonight because of the game.

MR. SEMENZA: I get it, but, listen, the park is open, there's kids down there.

Things go on down there. I don't know how the rest of council feels, but the safety of the children.

MAYOR MULKERIN: We're not

scheduling part-time people. We do have the bike schedule still. When the officers are on, when they're not on a call they're down there. We just don't schedule, aside from the bikes, a specific officer down there, especially if there's no events. Now, when there's people, there's no events -- like, lately there's been some activity down there, that the basketball courts are being heavily used, I know the officers have gone down because people have let me know that there's been a lot -- like, if the park is empty it's really not going to have --

MR. FEBBO: Where are we with the camera system?

MR. SEMENZA: Cameras don't stop somebody from doing something, but cops present at that park will stop kids from doing bad things.

MS. BARTOLETTI: The main damage we have had is inside the men's room and inside the ladies room, you would never have cameras in there, and under the pavilion.

The table that Paul brought up, the table was broken to use as a ramp for a scooter.

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MS. BARTOLETTI: I've talked to three different people coming to give me price quotes. I haven't heard back. But it's something that definitely will get done. Fortunately they took care of themselves. They posted themselves on U-Tube and Snap Chat doing what they were doing.

MR. SEMENZA: I have a 12-year-old son that goes to the park by himself. Nobody else at his table has their child at the park by himself. My kid's old enough to be at the park by himself. He's seen -- he came to me and said I've seen there's drugs, I think there's somebody doing drugs. My opinion, it was a drug deal. I think there's somebody doing drugs, he said. Ι said you need to call me immediately so we can call the cops. That's why I'm saying let's put a cop there. How many cops on the roster?

MAYOR MULKERIN: Seventeen.

MR. SEMENZA: How many cops are on a

day?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Seven.

MAYOR MULKERIN: Why would we schedule an officer --

MR. SEMENZA: You're right.

MAYOR MULKERIN: If the park is empty why would we schedule an officer?

MR. SEMENZA: The park's not always empty, Bob. The park isn't empty.

MAYOR MULKERIN: We can't ever gauge when the people are going to be there. So if there's nobody there --

MR. SEMENZA: No wonder why the drugs are so bad in this town.

MAYOR MULKERIN: -- then we're wasting officers at the park.

MR. SEMENZA: I want them out of there.

MAYOR MULKERIN: When we know there's events we schedule. We make sure the officers go. When the park is being used, when the basketball courts are busy, I know I call the officers and say there's 30 people down there, stop by. I mean --

MR. SEMENZA: I get it. Even when we say there's events, put an officer down there, are they down there the whole time?

the housing authority cancelled because his children were in from Europe.

MR. RUSSICK: We keep on talking about those roads down there. If any people who make those decisions up in Dunmore had any type of vested interest, family or whatever, they would probably be fixed. It's a sin. It's not fair.

At the last meeting there was mention that there was a call made to Martina Washington in Philadelphia, she didn't return the phone call. That itself shouldn't deter us from getting in touch with Philadelphia because we're not getting any results from Dunmore. You've got to go one step further. Even if you have to get in touch with the IG. Make it happen. Those people shouldn't have to suffer down there with those roads. It's a disgrace, really.

There was a discussion here about the police, and I understand shorthanded and so on, but I can tell you I live at a dangerous intersection and it's getting worse. There's cars flying through there.

They don't even slow down. It's scary. I have to watch three avenues of egress.

In saying that, I've come close many times of being hit. Put your hand on their wallet.

My point is this, once the word gets around people listen. Now with school starting up that's a shortcut. They don't stop. Stop means stop, it doesn't mean roll through, doesn't mean going through 30 miles an hour. So I bring it out again. I brought it out many, many times.

It was said from people at the table you got to catch them first. How do you catch them? By being there. Maybe we can get, like, a detail, one officer, and just various parts of town. Once the word gets around people pay attention.

MAYOR MULKERIN: Regarding that, the Buckle Up grant, how many citations did we issue when we had that and what was the period?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: The last one was a hundred-some citations. This last month alone we wrote 83 citations plus an

additional 50-some for the check point.

MAYOR MULKERIN: My intersection is bad, there's so many.

MR. SEMENZA: My street they fly down. Shortcut from the high school to Drake's Lane.

MR. RUSSICK: We have these yield signs out here. In Honesdale they don't have these signs in the middle of the road. Now they have signs with solar powered yellow lights. You walk up there and hit the button, those lights start flashing. If you're interested I'll stop in the borough building up there in Honesdale and find out exactly what they did. Thank you.
