paving project this year, that we take a look at Smith Street between Hoover and Smull. It's the side of the Old Forge cemetery right in front of Mr. Terruso's house, Mr. Mancuso's house, Mr. Bellenzeni's house, Mr. Cordino, Mr. DeLuca. That section there is torn up pretty good.

MR. FERRETT: I plan on putting under new business a program for paving.

You will get a slip, every councilman will get a slip, and Smith Street is on the agenda.

MR. NOTARI: Thank you very much.

Also, I believe we all received a letter from the county regarding a municipal arts grant. A \$500 grant that the county gives out to every municipality. You just have to apply for it. So if anybody has any ideas. I have some ideas. I received the letter at home, actually, maybe last week of January. I'll forward it to you tomorrow from work just so you see it. If anybody has any ideas. Maybe use it for the summer program.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Is that the one I used in the past?

MR. NOTARI: Yeah, the \$500 one. I thought I'd bring it up. That's all.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Two items just to update council. From the sewer department committee, we met -- me, Chairman Semenza, Councilman Notari -- and our recommendation would be to take a look at somebody to upgrade the computer system in the sewer agency.

Then I met with Lucille on Friday.

I asked her to contact Chairman Semenza just to get his input and see how he wanted to take it, what direction. So he contacted Ron D'Eliseo. He's going to meet us here Tuesday at 10 a.m. for a sewer committee meeting just to give us some information on how we could upgrade the system, if he could, and what he'll be doing to it, how he could make it better for the department. So that's from the sewer committee. After Tuesday of this week I'll have more.

Also, from the long-range planning committee, I'm going to wait until Councilman Febbo gets back, and I'm going to

contact Councilman Brown to see if we can set up a meeting. But I'll wait until Councilman Febbo gets back. I think early March.

MAYOR MULKERIN: Next week.

MR. SEMENZA: If I can just echo off what Councilman Rinaldi said, Ron D'Eliseo with Computer Visionaries, he does computer work for the Lower Lackawanna Valley Authority's computer system. So we thought maybe we'd get him in to see if maybe we can help out with Lucille making it more user friendly or something. We don't know.

MR. FERRETT: The only thing I'd like to say is under new business I'd like to put a motion on the floor about a paving program for the year 2017. So I'll wait until new business comes in and I'll bring that up and everything.

Hearing what the sewer committee has to say and everything, I had the opportunity of talking with Councilman Lenceski and everything, and I'm just wondering whether council might take it into consideration that at one time in the past when the sewer

authority was first established and everything, that there was a commission, the way that's supposed to be brought up and everything and I think, according to Councilman Lenceski, it's in our code book. Correct?

MR. LENCESKI: Yes. It's 70-1.

MR. FERRETT: I'm just wondering if the sewer committee would like to look into that and see what they think and how they feel about the whole subject.

MR RUSSELL RINALDI: Joe, are you talking about under the ordinance that it states about a board of directors?

MR. FERRETT: Well, not a board of directors. It's like an authority that overlooks everything. They'll answer to council. It's a good way and a good system to have a check and balance on the whole situation. Somebody's got to be accountable for everything that's going on. All these outstanding bills that should never have been there.

MR. LENCESKI: 70-1: "Sewer collection hearing board established

4/21/88. The purpose of the board, three council members, is to hear" -- and this is a second thing. This is the sewer collection hearing board but I'll get to the sewer commission after that.

"The purpose of the board, three council members, is to hear requests from these who are in arrears with payments of their Old Forge Borough Sewer Agency bills and to establish affordable payment plans for people with special financial needs."

That's one thing that I don't think we've done since 1988. You've been handling that.

ATTY. RINALDI: There was one at one point because there was some payment plans that were worked out. I remember when Donny Vender was here there was a meeting, and I think Tony Pero was on it. They set payment plans up for people. So there used to be. I think when they left nobody reappointed them.

MR. NOTARI: Is that the sewer committee?

ATTY, RINALDI: No.

MR. NOTARI: So that's a separate

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three council members?

MR. LENCESKI: Yes.

ATTY. RINALDI: There was activity maybe five, six years ago.

MR. LENCESKI: And the sewer commission membership: "The Old Forge Borough Sewer Commission shall consist of seven members. Said members shall be residents of the borough of Old Forge duly appointed by the Old Forge Borough Council."

Duties and responsibilities, 73-5:

"It shall be the purpose of the commission
to monitor sanitary storm sewer
construction, determine problem sewer areas,
hear citizens' complaints regarding sewers,
make recommendations to borough council
concerning future development and expansion
of the existing sewer system, and advise the
borough council regarding collection of
sewer rentals."

MR. NOTARI: Would that be like a planning commission or zoning board, same type of --

ATTY. RINALDI: No. That's something you guys enacted probably when

they were laying out the sewers.

MR. LENCESKI: 1986.

MS. YEAGER: There was supposed to be a commission and council said no. They wanted the sewer agency under the control of council. Because I remember the ordinance, and this was never done. I think it was three councilmen and four other people. I don't remember. But council wanted the agency under council. That was the choice. Commission or under council.

MR. LENCESKI: Seven members' terms of office: "Each commission shall be appointed for terms of five years. The terms of office, however, shall be set so initially there shall be two three-year terms, two four-year terms, and three five-year terms."

MR. FERRETT: I think it's in the best interest there's a commission that's actually involved because the recommendations made for future development in the town and everything can be made by this commission. Council has to act on it anyhow no matter how you look at it.

MS. YEAGER: Under council or a commission, doesn't matter. That's council's decision.

MR. NOTARI: The way I'm listening to it you're going to be under council because the commission is just going to make recommendations.

MR. SEMENZA: That's all they are.

MR. NOTARI: It's not necessarily something that council would have to accept.

MR. SEMENZA: I would almost think, though -- I don't know so much by a lot of the wording in it --

MR. LENCESKI: At least I think we should discuss this and maybe work on it the next work session, maybe bring it to a vote in March. But at least it's something that we should all know about, take into consideration.

MR. SEMENZA: Can a copy of that ordinance go in everybody's packet so they can review it for next month?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. If somebody wants it sooner they can always come up and get it. Anything else, Joe?

MR. FERRETT: No.

MR. LENCESKI: I don't have anything tonight. I just want to tell the public that the finance committee did meet on the 16th and we talked about the paving program, the building, funding for the building, Street Scape, the RCAP grant and the Multi-Mobile grant. That's all I have.

MR. SEMENZA: Thanks. Myself,
Marylynn, I was contacted by an electrician,
actually, and had told me there is something
out there for LED lighting or lighting for,
like, the monument, for flagpoles, for any
kind of -- all the equipment and everything
is free. You just have to have somebody
install it. Do you know anything about
that?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No.

MR. SEMENZA: Can we look into it, maybe?

MR. BIERYLA: We can probably get that from the sales rep for All Phase. The salesmen is naturally going to see it before the electrician gets it. Unless you tell somebody at the counter you're not going to

know about it.

MAYOR MULKERIN: I'll send it to you, Mare.

MR. SEMENZA: Bob will get you the info. I don't have anything else, so at this time I'm going to go to public comment. Larry Enderline?

MR. ENDERLINE: Good evening. Larry Enderline, 324 Milwaukee Avenue. I'm here tonight representing the fire department, Old Forge Hose & Engine, the ladder company. On behalf of Chief Tag and Chief Stull, they told me I could ask about the budget and stuff. You already answered that. The last check was coming.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

MR. ENDERLINE: The reason is we really rely on that money. Mr. Notari, you mentioned tonight about us having reports and stuff like that. It's very expense to run a fire department.

MR. NOTARI: I understand that, and I hope you realize it's very expensive to run a borough as well.

MR. ENDERLINE: I do.

MR. NOTARI: I think it's not out of our purview to ask for that report. MR. ENDERLINE: We are part of the

Understood.

MR. ENDERLINE: Like I tried to stress, me and Mr. Semenza had a discussion the other night and Mr. Brown, I spoke with Mr. Febbo. We're here for you. I don't know if you realize that.

I very well realize that, and I hope you realize that we're here for the people of this borough.

So are we.

MR. NOTARI: And we have to make sure that that money is spent the right way.

So are we.

MR. NOTARI: We're not questioning anything -- I'm not questioning anything. I would just like to see where that money is

> MR. ENDERLINE: In the past --

MS. BARTOLETTI: That basically is the only money that the borough spends that we have no idea how it's actually spent. We

have no accountability for that money when we're audited. It is in the borough code that we are entitled to it.

MR. ENDERLINE: That's not a problem.

MR. NOTARI: I'm not questioning -I'm not even saying there's any kind of
improprieties. Just trying to keep us safe
as well.

MR. ENDERLINE: I understand. I really do.

MR. SEMENZA: I believe this is not the first time we're asking for it, either. I believe we asked before.

MR. ENDERLINE: It's not difficult to do that. I also -- in the past we've said come over, come to meetings, after what was going on last couple years. Come to meetings, see what we do to see what kind of money we have. We even said come on calls with us. You're welcome.

MR. NOTARI: I'd like to do that, actually. I've never been in that area of the building.

MR. ENDERLINE: I asked Mr. Brown

several times if you're here, you see us pulling out, jump on. We've been really busy the last 14 hours. We're tired. We went to Duryea, left Duryea, came here, went over there.

MR. SEMENZA: Our hats are off to you for that. Don't let just anybody on your trucks. Only people that are covered by insurance.

MR. ENDERLINE: Another thing was with the parking over here. This has just come up many times in the past and it's an issue again. I spoke to you over the phone. When we put this addition on Old Forge Hose & Engine paid to have the monument moved forward and we paid to have that pavement, that parking lot put in so we'd have somewhere to park when we're here and we have a call. Then over the years we all left -- a bunch of us left for issues, and when we came back there was handicap parking and borough business, which I understand, we understand, but --

MR. SEMENZA: I read through the whole lease. I don't see anything about the

parking lot.

MR. ENDERLINE: Well, yeah. I spoke with our attorney. It was a poorly written lease.

MR. SEMENZA: Very poor. I didn't see a lot of things in the lease.

MR. ENDERLINE: Me being a realtor and stuff and a landlord over the years that's a very poorly written lease.

MR. FERRETT: When we get a new building there will be plenty of parking.

MR. ENDERLINE: Earlier tonight you mentioned about parking. Let's get that done. Try to solve that problem, if we can.

MR. NOTARI: The problem is there's not enough parking for your members when there's a call?

MR. ENDERLINE: When there's a call it's very difficult. Not all the time but sometimes, and a lot of things been said and we're going to be ticketed and this is going to happen and we're going to be towed and stuff.

MR. SEMENZA: If you're parking in a handicap parking spot, first of all, that's

illegal there.

MR. ENDERLINE: I know that.

MR. SEMENZA: There's no exceptions.

MR. ENDERLINE: Well, like I said to you on the phone you want us to spend an extra 30 to 40 seconds, which maybe doesn't seem like a lot of time to you, to go and try to find somewhere to park down here or across the street?

MR. SEMENZA: I understand what you're saying, but I'm just saying --

MR. NOTARI: We don't make that law either.

MR. SEMENZA: I didn't make the law.

I understand that.

MR. ENDERLINE: Plus keep in mind -and this has also been brought up several
times. We have those two handicap spots
there, which are needed. Now we have
elderly people and whoever, whatever the
age, getting out of their car and walking
across the busted driveway that we're trying
to deal with how many years.

MR. SEMENZA: Well, the busted driveway, if you look at your lease you're

responsible for all repairs.

MR. ENDERLINE: Well, a couple years back, when I first came back, Donny Vender was still on council, we brought it up, and Donny Vender mentioned to me why don't you go down where they're putting in a new beer distributor. They're going to be pouring concrete on Saturday. See if they'll help you out.

So I went down there and spoke to the foreman. They were going to give us all the trucks we needed. I spoke to Ron Gallagher. He was going to put it in labor free. Then Larry Semenza found out about it, who do I think I am, and put a stop to it and it never got done. We were going to have a free driveway put in.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I don't think that was the case. I think the case was that part of the problem now is the way the drainage system was. It was just going to be laid in again with no one making a design or anything as far as how is that going to not happen again. Right now there's that opening. I don't know what you call that.

saying he said it or didn't say it. I'm just saying that's hard for me to believe, and if he was here saying that about you, I would say the same thing to him. It's hard for me to believe that Larry Enderline would not want to get the driveway paved, especially if you're two active, dedicated, devoted volunteer firemen. He's not anymore. He was, and you currently are.

So, I mean, that's just me. I mean, that's just my take on it.

MR. NOTARI: Larry, how many parking spots are you looking for?

MR. ENDERLINE: Only, I mean --

MR. NOTARI: Obviously it's only when there's a call. So how many? Ten? Twelve?

MR. ENDERLINE: Between the two departments we may get three guys on a call. You may have --

MR. SEMENZA: How many guys today were on the call?

MR. ENDERLINE: Between the two departments, probably ten to 12 parking spots.

MR. SEMENZA: How many guys were out on the call today?

MR. ENDERLINE: Today we had eight.

The last company had eight and the engine company only had two or three. It varies.

MR. ENDERLINE: We were in Duryea.

If I wasn't in Duryea, myself and Mike, we would have been already in Wilkes-Barre, working. We wouldn't have been here. We would have come up.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Are all the people here members of your --

MR. ENDERLINE: Yeah, these are all the ladder company. We still have several more. We have about 12 active people. I mean, is there anything we can do right now? Obviously you don't want us parking in the handicapped.

MR. SEMENZA: Larry, the problem is 7:00 at night, 8:00 at night, when people are parking in the handicapped parking spot, people are parking ten feet off the corner of the thing. The line of sight on Main

Street you can't see. A young kid or older person it's tough, especially when you have a vehicle pulling out of them parking spots with no regard to any traffic on the road.

I was the result of that two nights ago when I almost got hit with my five-year-old son in the car, and I was pretty upset about it. You know. Me and you spoke about it.

But not once when I spoke with you -- it was everybody against me. It was not once I apologize. They were parked in the parking spot illegally. They backed out, almost hit me, didn't stop, took right off. Not once did you say I apologize, Bob. I'll talk to the person. And I know exactly who it was and I know who was at the fire department. I'm getting riled up here now because when I had my five-year-old son in the car and I almost got hit by a truck backing out of that spot that was illegally parked -- it shouldn't have happened.

MR. ENDERLINE: Well, he wasn't illegally parked.

MR. SEMENZA: Oh, he wasn't?

MR. ENDERLINE: He wasn't in the

handicapped spot.

MR. SEMENZA: He wasn't? Okay, because when I came back by he was.

UNKNOWN SPEAKER: The way you were driving you shouldn't have a child in the car.

MR. SEMENZA: The way I was driving?
Who are you? Don't you come in here and try
to tell me the way I drive. Were you there?
Did you see me driving?

UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Yes, sir.

MR. SEMENZA: You did? Okay, then file a complaint with the police department about how I drive because I wasn't driving fast at all. The gentleman next to you backed out into the road and almost hit me with no regard to traffic or anybody in the street.

Chief, you know it happens way too often. Everybody parks in that parking spot.

MR. ENDERLINE: They said you carried on.

MR. SEMENZA: Carried on? No, I'm carrying on now.

MR. SEMENZA: You were not there, you don't know what was said.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You said you believe your guys. I'm not saying your guys are lying or not. I wasn't there.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: It's a handicap pot. Don't park there.

MR. ENDERLINE: None of our guys will park in that handicap spot anymore.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: No offense to you, these guys here, I never see them parked in it. It's always your red Dodge that's parked in it.

MR. SEMENZA: Thank you, Chief.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: So don't go
pointing fingers, saying it's your other
firefighters. It's not. It's your red
Dodge. On Saturdays, Sundays, nights,
mornings it's always your red Dodge or
Mr. Coles' van. So don't go pointing
fingers at any of your firemen. You want to
start something? It's your red Dodge.
Point the finger at yourself. It's going to

get towed if it's parked there. It's a legitimate handicap sign. The truck's getting towed. You'll pay Schuback's or Old Forge Gulf. Whatever it is, the day of the week, your truck's getting towed out of there. It's not Bertowsky, it's not Piasecki, it's not Halfpenny. It's your red Dodge pickup. It's simple. Don't park there. I don't know what to tell you.

MR. ENDERLINE: I won't.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: It's that simple.

Do not park in a legitimate handicap spot because, guess what, if you had a business, if you had a handicap spot and somebody else was parked there you'd be complaining to us just like we're complaining to you.

Keep your members out of the parking spot. Never mind your members, keep yourself out of the parking spot. It's that simple. Keep it out or it's getting towed at your cost. I'm done with the baby games of who said Bobby Semenza said this or Larry Enderline did this. It's your responsibility to keep your own truck out of there.

MR. ENDERLINE: I didn't want to bring that up tonight. I thought we dealt with that, you and I, over the phone. Okay. There's no parking in the handicap. It is what it is. We park wherever.

MR. NOTARI: How many spots do we have behind the building?

MAYOR MULKERIN: There's not too many.

MR. NOTARI: Eight? What about during non-working hours?

MR. ENDERLINE: Are there hours we park in the handicap --

CHIEF DUBERNAS: No.

MR. NOTARI: You can't park in a handicap spot. That's not our law, that's the state law.

MR. ENDERLINE: Mr. Semenza, when you and I were on the phone the other day, after our conversation didn't you say to me if there's a fire --

MR. SEMENZA: No, I said -- you said if there's a structure these are your words. If there's a structure fire I'll park wherever I need to, and I said I understand

that sometimes you did that and sometimes it happened but it's still not right.

MR. ENDERLINE: I know it's not right. I'm not arguing that.

MR. SEMENZA: I just said I understood. I didn't say that you can park there. That's not my call, Larry. That's not my call. I'm just insulted that the way that it went down.

MR. ENDERLINE: In the past we were told by other council members that aren't here now -- Donny Vender was one of them --

MR. SEMENZA: Listen --

MR. ENDERLINE: I'm just saying.

MR. SEMENZA: Larry, it doesn't matter who told you. Jason Dubernas can tell you to park in that parking spot.
Guess what? It's still illegal. The state police can drive by and give you a fine for parking in that spot. You can't park in that spot. Any other cop in the department can give you a fine for parking in that spot.

One other thing, Marylynn. Since the renovations for the borough building are

going to be done soon, I'd like you to write a letter to -- I don't know if it's your department or the other department, about the garage downstairs. The equipment and everything they have down there that we need removed as soon as they could. Thank you. Anything else?

MR. ENDERLINE: Nope, I guess not.

Well, yeah, I guess, yeah, if I can stay
here. This is what I mean when I make
comments to several people that it seems
like we have -- I feel as though we have no
support from you people. Now, you just
threw us out of that basement --

MR. SEMENZA: We're doing a whole renovation to the basement. The police department is going down there. We have the design and everything. Our engineer has a full design of the whole basement. I'm just saying that off the top of my head because you guys were here. I'm not saying get your stuff out now, but in due time it's going to have to be moved. The police department is going to be the whole basement. I mean, I just thought about it. I figured let's get

a formal letter out to so you have it and you know so it can be removed when you find a place for it. I don't know if that stuff can go upstairs.

MR. ENDERLINE: As far as me parking there, I park there a lot because people in the past have said as long as there's no business hours here we can.

MR. SEMENZA: Right, but you know what, a handicap parking spot isn't just for this building. They can get out there and walk to Ray's Supermarket.

MR. ENDERLINE: I have people telling me it's okay to park there.

MR. SEMENZA: It's not for an Old Forge Borough Building, it's a handicap spot. They can get out and walk up the street, walk to Ray's, go sit in Burger King for 20 minutes. It doesn't mean you have to be in the borough building. They can go in the manor for the afternoon.

MR. ENDERLINE: Okay. That's just not for the borough building?

MR. SEMENZA: No. No handicap spot is designated for anything. Correct?

MS. BARTOLETTI: When we put handicap signs at a person's property, they have a doctor's note that they need a handicap spot -- say, for example, at my house. If somebody is visiting my neighbor and they're handicapped they can park in that spot. It's not specifically mine. It's for anyone who is handicapped.

MR. ENDERLINE: Okay. People screaming, I didn't want that.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?

MR. ENDERLINE: No, I guess not.

MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Larry.

MR. MENDOLA: My name is Matthew

from Mendola & Associates. We're here

Other than that, if the engineer tells us that we don't have -- that we overshot the thing, that the paving committee will have to get back together and make its decision just where they want to go.

MR. SEMENZA: Okay. Public input?

MR. NOTARI: Wait. I mean, I probably would like more time to go out and look at it, but like just off the top of my head I'm looking at Vine Street, Church Street, Maple Street, which I'm sure they all need to be paved, but Church Street from Oak Street to Maple I think is really in bad shape. Is it not?
