MR. TERMINI: Chuck Termini.

T-e-r-m-i-n-i. 738 Moosic Road. I'm actually here today in protest of that went on in Mariotti's, behind our homes.

We lived on 738 now for almost 20 years. And we have an empty lot behind us, as most of you who live here know. I put a message out in the middle of the night. My son coming home, took him over 40 minutes to get home, which would typically, from the exit, getting off the exit.

And the reason being is that 11:30, 12:00, 1:00 in the morning, Mariotti decided to let their property be used for this Camp Bisco four-day big concert event up at Montage, where it probably had close to a thousand cars in our back yards.

Just when I asked, I called into Marylynn here and Marylynn had no idea about it. When I saw Councilman Rinaldi and Semenza, asked them, did you know anything about it? Didn't know anything about it.

Nobody in this town knew anything about it. First off, they never got a permit to do that. Okay? If it was us, there's a noise ordinance. It's late at night.

They were bussing these people in 24

hours a day. They never got any kind of conditional use permit. They used that area as a staging area, traffic problems. I'm just going to give you a list of problems.

Environmental hazards. These people went to the bathroom out there. They were in our woods going to the bathroom. You had to worry about oil leaking into the ground from their cars, gas leaking in the ground from their cars.

They weren't supposed to sleep there and they weren't supposed to be there overnight. Yet, you had probably close to a thousand people out there for four days, coming and going 24 hours a day, bussing it in like it's some kind of project here in our town.

It's horrible. I got video. I can send it to everyone, if you'd like. I got video of every car. They're New York, New Jersey, California, Massachusettes.

They don't care about our town. We do.

And we don't sell out for them to use a piece of land as a parking lot that's not even there for a parking lot.

Other than the environmental hazards, we had non-compliance. We had no compliance of any kind of noise ordinance. 3:00 in the morning, blasting

music out there.

They were told they weren't supposed to sleep out there. They were sleeping in the cars, on hoods, on the ground, trash everywhere.

7 in the morning -- I don't know if I'm allowed to say this. But, at 7 in the morning, they're waiting for buses yet because they were picked up from 1:00 in the morning.

They were out there chanting, and we have video of it. And excuse my language. I won't say the word. They used the word, the four-letter word. F this shit. I have to tell you what it is. And they're out there chanting that until theses buses were able to get them out of there.

People roaming through our woods, walking up our streets. Let me just give you a couple things. They jeopardized our safety and our security.

We couldn't leave our kids out in our own backyard because I'm afraid, and I have an inground pool, worried about, A, them bathing in it, because that's what they do in the mountain, they bathe in it.

It was all over the news last year.

And then our kids, our kids are not safe. I could not leave my kids to play out in that backyard. How do I know when these guys who are on hallucinogens

and everything else and every kind of drug you can imagine that are OD-ing and dying up there all weekend long, aren't going to be here in our town. They're still wandering around.

I still see people wandering around out there, up and down the streets that you never see here before. One guy was naked out in the parking lot, changing his clothes. We have video to show you.

You know, the cops were paid. They didn't know anything about it. Cops were out there. We were having to spend our tax dollars to sit there and secure it.

Moosic cops were out there. Neither police department knew a thing about it. At 1:00 in the morning, these guys tried to sneak these people in, in and out for 24 hours a day.

If nothing more, you know, I wanted to give you a couple excerpts from the paper. Here there was one guy, he was reported missing in our area here in Scranton.

He was missing for three days. He actually slept for three days. That's where he was. They found him. He slept for three days, because they also arrested another guy here that was through this area.

Several people from bringing hundreds and hundreds of pounds of hallucinogens into the area and drugs into the area for this stupid concert. I'm one for a concert, not against a concert.

But you know what, that stuff stays up there on the mountain, not in our town. If anything, I want to ask that you to pass an ordinance tonight that we don't have Peach Fest out there. We don't have anything else with Mariotti's property out there, doing this stuff illegally.

CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Chuck, as you know, you saw myself and Councilman Rinaldi out there.

MR. TERMINI: Yes, I did.

CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: I stayed there until the general manager of Live Nation to come down and speak with me personally.

He assured me that he had a contract, like, you know, with Mariotti's, that they were in hopes to have it done before the morning. Couldn't quarantee it.

He was being brutally honest with me. He told me that there would be a clean-up crew coming the day they leave, it will be cleaned up, which it has been. I'm sure you notice.

Our police force was not paid for by your

tax dollars. Our police force was paid for by Live Nation. They came in and we gave them a dollar amount. They paid us ex-amount of dollars for the police service in the Borough.

I don't know about Moosic or whatever.

Just giving you some facts I know. Everything you said, I understand and I get. And, you know, I don't want it in my backyard either.

As far as passing an ordinance tonight, it's not as easy as that. Councilman Lenceski has been researching over the past couple days, ordinances for mass gatherings.

We are going to look into it and do something like that. We don't want that kind of stuff happening again.

MR. TERMINI: I appreciate that.

CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Over the past days,
like I told the rest of the Council, I was down there
quite a bit. I was in contact with the Mariotti's on a
daily basis and, you know, just to make sure that
everything was going, you know, to be done the right
way, like clean up and whatever.

It was there. It happened. Boy, let me tell you something, I wish it didn't. I know you wish it didn't also.

Our zoning officer had given them a verbal warning because, for a written warning, by the time they got it, it would have been over and done with.

Steve, do you want to speak real quick on

Steve, do you want to speak real quick on the verbal warning? You could.

MR. BIERYLA: Yes. I contacted our solicitor because I had no idea that this was happening. It was Friday at quarter after 1 when I was notified.

There was already a thousand cars there and hardly any people. Our solicitor and myself went over the ordinances. And it comes out that the permit from Mariotti's is for Mariotti Building Products.

So, if Mariotti Building Products wishes to hold an auction on their site, they can, but it's not for public parking.

And, so, I verbally, because written was kind of like useless, because it was going to be over and done with by Monday, I verbally told the Mariotti's that your permit is for your Mariotti Building Products, not Live Nation.

So, no more mass parking unless you're holding something there for Mariotti Building Products.

And he said it was the biggest mistake he

You 13 understand what I mean? 14 MR. TERMINI: Okay. 15 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: When I did speak with 16 Mike Mariotti, I know him for a long time, since we 17 were children, he's very sorry that this and, you know, 18 I mean, I'm sorry that it happened. You know, guys --19 MR. TERMINI: You guys can only do what 20 you know about. You can't do anything if you don't 21 know about it. 22 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Where is the Chief? 23 Chief, what time did you find out about this happening? 24 When we were first CHIEF DUBERNAS: 25

notified on Tuesday, they said it was only going to be an alternate lot, like, there might not even be cars there.

All of a sudden, on Wednesday afternoon,

All of a sudden, on Wednesday afternoon, they said, no, it was a secondary lot and I'm scrambling to get cops to try to -- because of the residents.

Because they provide their own security and their own traffic. That's what they said, there was people with event parking.

They supplied all that. They only wanted our presence there. So, at 4:00 on a Wednesday afternoon, these guys are coming at midnight, and I'm scrambling to get cops to try to go there for at night and they end up paying the Borough for our services and our vehicles.

MR. TERMINI: I got to tell you one other, their security was two kids that probably don't even live around here, that travel with roadies with them all around.

CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Out of New York State, City, I'm sorry.

MR. TERMINI: They weren't adults. They were young kids, standing at a gate, one kid at each gate. That was it. That's not security, on my part,

when there's hundreds of people who are using my backyard as their bathroom, our woods as their bathroom.

Their Arizona Ice Tea bottles were all over the place with urine in them. We have video of garbage and trash in our yards, everything along the lines.

CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: I can tell you one thing, we're going to do our best to try to put an ordinance in place that will stop some stuff like this from happening Or at least control it a lot better.

MR. TERMINI: The other thing, Live

Nation had it on their site now, all a sudden, Mariotti

parking lot B or whatever it was called is on their

website now. That's a place to park, on the Live

Nation website.

CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: I can almost, I'm not going to say I could speak for Michael Mariotti, but I could almost speak and say that --

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You mean for future concerts?

MR. TERMINI: For this concert. That was an area, that's where you have to go. You have to report to this lot.

And now we made their Live Nation website

for a lot, a lot that's not a lot for them. 1 2 CHIEF DUBERNAS: They changed that on Wednesday afternoon. They said that was alternate, 3 that was secondary lot. Stadium, Rocky Glenn and some other places weren't even -- came to Old Forge. 5 said they would probably not even use Mariotti. All of 6 a sudden, on Wednesday afternoon --7 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: One other thing I can talk about. I did contact the County about Camp Bisco 9 up there. 1.0 And everybody knows what Camp Bisco is 11 about. It's a nuisance. It's been banned in New York. 12 The County, unfortunately, has a five-year contract 13 with them. I believe this is year three. 14 Councilman Notari. 15 MR. NOTARI: Yes. 16 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Another two years. 17 don't know if there's something that could be done in 18 the meantime, because it does cause problems. 19 I mean, somebody was killed, God rest his 20 soul, on Birney Avenue. And there's some drugs being 21 brought in the area. 22 MR. TERMINI: It said in the paper 23 hundreds and hundreds of pounds -- guys were arrested 24

with hundreds and hundreds of pounds of what they call

hallucinogens.

I have kids that work for the ice cream place up there in Montage. And, you know, they're watching people O.D. right in front of them, fall on the floor. People are calling for Narcan. You know what I mean? You name it. I mean, it's just not good.

CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Right. I agree.

MS. PEPERNO: Lisa Peperno,

P-e-p-e-r-n-o. Quarry Road, Old Forge, right across from Mariotti Lumber.

Hi. I did call Chief Dubernas. I did call the gentleman, our officers. I'm with Carol Traeger, my neighbor, right across from Mariotti's.

I did call the police because there were people wandering down our road, parking behind my neighbors, who are EMTs. And I knew they were at work, so I called the officers.

It was a New York plate. I gave the plate number. I'm working in my garage. And this woman walks right up on my property into my garage, right up to me.

I called your officers, Chief Dubernas.

The one officer was very nice. I saw where the young lady went. They did check the plate out. And the other officer told me don't make a big deal about it,

MS. PEPERNO: Why can't you do it that way? In terms of commercial, anything over 50 cars of what is already allotted zoned for that property, you need a permit.

And especially if you are within say 500 yards of a residential area with more than three tax paying property owners within the vicinity.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: All I'm saying is, what happened down there this past weekend --

MS. PEPERNO: Can't happen. 1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I would never do 2 this, because this isn't my forte or my line of work. 3 But with the mountain being so close and what happened 4 down there today, to a developer who wants to come into 5 the Borough of Old Forge, buy a hundred acres of land, 6 year after year, venue after venue, and charge the 7 people who run that 25,000 a concert, to park people in 8 my parking lot, that I came to the Borough, I got 9 rezoned, I put all the parking spots in, I put all the 10 commodes and I have everything set in place, so for the 11 next 25 years, I can sign a contract with those people 12 up there and let you park in my lot. 13 I might have spent 150,000 one shot. 14 Now I'm collecting 300,000 a year, It's all done. 15 150,000 a year. So, our largest properties in town only have one ingress and egress. So, if you have multiple ones, in case of a catastrophe, bus flips over or there's a riot, how do the people get into the riot if

the bus flips over and there's one way in the place? 1 Excuse me. Being Moosic MS. TRAEGER: 2 Road is a state road, shouldn't PennDOT have known 3 about the traffic? MR. LENCESKI: I'm saying, where it was located, there was only one way into the property. So, 6 if we wrote up an ordinance that multiple ingress and 7 egress, that property is out of the picture. 8 ATTORNEY RINALDI: You'd have to change 9 your zoning.
