

1 so we know what we're doing. Councilman  
2 Febbo, you and Bobby find out what you guys  
3 agree to, let's all read that, and by our  
4 next meeting can we all read that and have  
5 that --

6 MR. LENCESKI: I think we owe it to  
7 the public to do it.

8 MR. BROWN: But two things I'm going  
9 to request, if we can read the international  
10 property maintenance code for next meeting  
11 and if we could see what we want to do with  
12 it, and our backup plan is see if we want to  
13 shorten the amount of time for the  
14 citations. If we can have that for our next  
15 meeting. We can talk about it then. Are we  
16 all on the same page?

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I am.

18 MR. LENCESKI: I agree.

19 MS. CORDIANO: Yes.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm going to  
21 echo off Councilwoman Cordiano. This has  
22 been going on a lot longer than March of  
23 2016, and I sat here while it went on as  
24 well. So I have no problem reading that.  
25 Something needs to be done.

1 MS. CORDIANO: It's time we move  
2 forward. Good idea.

3 MR. BROWN: So next meeting, work  
4 session, international property maintenance  
5 code, and see if you want to shorten the  
6 days in the citation.

7 MR. LENCESKI: Look into a third  
8 party also.

9 MR. BROWN: Yeah, if you want.

10 MR. LENCESKI: Like Joe said, we  
11 can't hire a person part-time and expect  
12 them to take all these classes. How can we  
13 find someone, possibly, that knows all that  
14 information.

15 MR. BROWN: I just wanted to make  
16 sure we're all on the same page for next  
17 meeting.

18 MR. LENCESKI: I'm good with that.  
19 Anybody else?

20 MR. RUSSICK: Steve mentioned about  
21 an address on Keyser Avenue, was it?

22 MR. BIERYLA: 303.

23 MR. RUSSICK: Do you know you have  
24 two Center Streets in Old Forge? One on  
25 each side of the borough. You get a 911

1 call they can go to the wrong Center Street.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Emergency  
3 wise, do we know if they call those streets  
4 out? You would have to ask the chief of  
5 police that. I'm not sure.

6 Chief, quick question. Two Center  
7 Streets in Old Forge, one south and one  
8 north.

9 CHIEF DUBERNAS: One is downtown,  
10 middle of the town, the other one is -- I  
11 guess they call it Saint Lawrence Hill.

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So  
13 emergency-wise it's distinguished?

14 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yeah. The one off  
15 Oak Street, the 100 block. The one off of  
16 Drake Street, 400 block. I don't know where  
17 the other 200 and 300 block went. The other  
18 street we have a lot of problem with is  
19 Keyser Avenue. Pennsylvania Ambulance  
20 doesn't know that all the time. There's a  
21 couple streets that are a little off. When  
22 we train all the officers we tell them,  
23 especially our streets like Center, Drake  
24 Street, Drake's Lane.

25 MR. LENCESKI: Can you suggest a

1 fix, Bill?

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Are the police  
3 dispatched with every ambulance call?

4 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Not every call.

5 MR. LENCESKI: How do we fix that?

6 CHIEF DUBERNAS: We have to go back  
7 and adjust it.

8 MR. PAPI: The post office makes the  
9 final decision.

10 ATTY. RINALDI: To get them to  
11 change an address is like an act of God.

12 MR. RUSSICK: In Wayne County and  
13 Monroe County.

14 ATTY. RINALDI: It was the post  
15 office that did it.

16 CHIEF DUBERNAS: People have the  
17 number right on the mailbox.

18 MS. CORDIANO: This is a safety  
19 issue. An ambulance is being called to  
20 Center Street and the ambulance doesn't know  
21 where Center Street is even though the one  
22 Center Street is only the 100 block or  
23 whatever. What do we do to get this started  
24 if we want to try to put this through to the  
25 post office?

1 MR. LENCESKI: Could the public  
2 safety committee take care of that and maybe  
3 meet up before our next meeting and discuss  
4 that?

5 CHIEF DUBERNAS: The fire chief  
6 works at the comm center.

7 MAYOR MULKERIN: What I would  
8 suggest, maybe in the meantime maybe compile  
9 a list of what conflicting streets you have.  
10 Chief, get a list together, and then at the  
11 public safety meeting -- because the fire  
12 department, Tag from the comm center is  
13 there, Pennsylvania ambulance, we'll hit it  
14 from there.

15 MR. LENCESKI: Thank you, Steve.  
16 Mr. Notari, Lackawanna County.

17 MR. NOTARI: Good evening, everyone.  
18 Some information from the commissioners of  
19 Lackawanna County. There's a first  
20 responders safety training program for  
21 natural gas vehicles and natural gas  
22 stations set up for September 10th at the  
23 911 center.

24 Penn State extension is also  
25 offering a Serve Safe course for any of our

1 restaurants and food service industry people  
2 here in town and throughout the county  
3 August 1st and August 8th.

4 Prescription Drug Task Force  
5 prescription drug take back program is still  
6 in effect. Four drop off centers. One has  
7 been added at the Moscow Police Department.  
8 Also, you can drop them off at the  
9 Lackawanna County Courthouse, the city of  
10 Carbondale Police Department, and the South  
11 Abington Police Department.

12 Three-on-three basketball is July  
13 29th. The deadline for that to register is  
14 Monday.

15 Our last Family Fun Day is August  
16 7th at Covington Township. The last Art in  
17 the Park day is next Tuesday at Aylesworth  
18 Park. That's all.

19 MAYOR MULKERIN: The prescription  
20 drop off, there's none down valley?

21 MR. NOTARI: There's no down valley.  
22 I guess the closest is the courthouse or  
23 Moscow Police Department. I believe that is  
24 a program that is run by the district  
25 attorney and the drug and alcohol department

1 of the county. I think if we were  
2 interested in being a down valley drop off  
3 I'm sure they would take us. Thank you.

4 MR. LENCESKI: Solicitor Rinaldi?

5 ATTY. RINALDI: You have my report  
6 in front of you. The first item on the  
7 agenda tonight is to approve the road use  
8 agreement between PPL Utilities, Louis  
9 Ciuccio, Villa, Inc., and the borough of Old  
10 Forge. Payments were one dollar. The  
11 agreement calls for PPL to post a bond in  
12 the amount of \$231,000. I do have a copy of  
13 that bond. It's attached. The bond will  
14 stay in place for a one-year period from the  
15 date the agreement is signed. This is the  
16 final one. This covers any and all  
17 anticipated repairs for the road, which is  
18 Mountain Road, while they use it to install  
19 the new electrical lines on the top of  
20 Ransom Mountain.

21 The roads were inspected by their  
22 engineer, our engineer and Mr. Ciuccio's  
23 engineer on site. Everybody agreed what  
24 were currently the damages and the amount of  
25 bond that would be in place to correct any

1 additional work.

2 They have 60 days to complete  
3 completion of those repairs after their use  
4 of the road ceases or one year, whichever is  
5 shorter.

6 The only reason we're a party to  
7 this agreement is because in the event we  
8 take over the roads between now and  
9 completing the work we're included here as  
10 also an owner so that that bond will cover  
11 and protect the borough if they do any  
12 damage to the road if we take it over from  
13 Mr. Ciuccio.

14 MR. FEBBO: This does not exonerate  
15 him from any of the work that is not  
16 completed --

17 ATTY. RINALDI: This has nothing to  
18 do with Louis. This is all PPL Utilities  
19 because they're using that road to go up and  
20 down that mountain. They're using heavy  
21 equipment and it was just done, so everybody  
22 wanted to make sure that they don't ruin it.  
23 So the bond will cover actually the total  
24 construction cost of the road if they have  
25 to redo it. It's what it actually cost to



1 do Mountain Road. So they posted that bond.  
2 That bond is in place with the agreement.  
3 Mr. Ciuccio has signed and Villa has signed  
4 and the borough will be asked to sign. So  
5 I'm just asking for approval of the road use  
6 agreement for PPL Utilities between the  
7 borough and Villa, Inc. and Mr. Ciuccio.  
8 The original will be dropped off here for  
9 the president to sign and the secretary.

10 MR. LENCESKI: Since Bill just  
11 described that to us, at this time I'd like  
12 to entertain a motion to approve the road  
13 use agreement with PPL Electric Utilities.

14 MR. FEBBO: I'll make that motion.

15 MR. LENCESKI: By Mr. Febbo. Can I  
16 get a second?

17 MS. CORDIANO: I'll second it.

18 MR. LENCESKI: Second by  
19 Councilwoman Cordiano. Public input? Roll  
20 call.

21 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Brown?

22 MR. BROWN: Yes.

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman  
24 Cordiano?

25 MS. CORDIANO: Yes.

1 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?

2 MR. FEBBO: Yes.

3 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes.

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman

6 Lenceski?

7 MR. LENCESKI: Yes.

8 ATTY. RINALDI: If you go down my  
9 report, the two court cases there with  
10 Dunbar, he was asking for the court to order  
11 the borough to go out and inspect certain  
12 properties on, ironically, Keyser and  
13 Milwaukee. I think they're next door to  
14 each other but they have different  
15 addresses. I filed an objection on the  
16 borough's behalf and actually today I  
17 received a copy of the order from the judge  
18 that our objections were sustained and both  
19 of those suits were dismissed. So those  
20 suits are over.

21 I haven't heard anything from the  
22 police union with regard to our last meeting  
23 several months ago, personnel committee and  
24 the attorney for the police union. They  
25 were supposed to get back to us with what

1           their counteroffer was to our offer on the  
2           contract. We're still waiting to hear from  
3           them. That's it.

4           MR. FEBBO: What about Fred Street  
5           you have in here? That is an issue that is  
6           outstanding for a while. Should we not act?

7           MS. BARTOLETTI: That was updated.

8           ATTY. RINALDI: I think Dave gave  
9           everybody some options.

10          MR. FEBBO: What's our next step?  
11          We accepted the first option, I believe it  
12          was?

13          ATTY. RINALDI: I don't think you  
14          picked an option.

15          MR. LOPATKA: I recommended one  
16          option. Option one.

17          MR. FEBBO: I thought we accepted  
18          that.

19          MR. LOPATKA: I don't recall.

20          MR. FEBBO: Should we move forward?

21          ATTY. RINALDI: Anytime is your  
22          pleasure. He reviewed the original options,  
23          he went out there and did the work. It  
24          needs to be done. I know it's more than the  
25          30,000. I forget how much the cost estimate

1 was. It's something that can be done  
2 anytime. Sooner than later.

3 MR. FEBBO: Mare, any reason we  
4 should not bring it to the floor tonight?

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: No, not as far as  
6 financing. One way or another we'll have to  
7 find the money to get it done. But is  
8 everyone on the same page as what Dave spoke  
9 about?

10 MR. FEBBO: Dave, can you briefly  
11 bring us up to snuff again on what the  
12 option was that we --

13 MR. LOPATKA: I actually don't have  
14 it with me tonight. I don't know if Bill  
15 does.

16 ATTY. RINALDI: I might have. One  
17 second.

18 MR. LOPATKA: I know there were  
19 three options. The one that we kind of  
20 recommended was -- two of them had an  
21 extreme amount of fill involved, which we  
22 really didn't feel as though it was  
23 necessary. It would create more of an issue  
24 for some of the existing lots that are  
25 there. So we recommended the lot with the

1 least amount of fill, basically.

2 MR. FEBBO: I believe it was to go  
3 with the grade that we have there and bring  
4 utilities down to that first lot only that  
5 that gentleman that was here looking for.

6 MR. LOPATKA: Yes, and actually it  
7 wouldn't require a grinder pump on whatever  
8 lot was built. With any of the options  
9 you'd still have to pump sewage back up.

10 ATTY. RINALDI: Option one is  
11 approximately three to four of fill with a  
12 curbed roadway, two inlets, a dry well.  
13 That's the preferred option.

14 Two was consistent grade running to  
15 the end of the proposed cul-de-sac,  
16 approximately eight to nine feet of fill,  
17 concrete curb, catch basin, dry well and  
18 outfall.

19 Option three is similar to option  
20 two with regard to grades and eight to nine  
21 of fill, but instead of curbs storm water is  
22 collected in roadside swales and discharged  
23 into stone basin.

24 Option one would be the best option,  
25 do the smallest amount of fill required.

1 The roadway should have a cul-de-sac for  
2 turn arounds. There are three lots  
3 remaining to be developed and will require  
4 utilities to be extended to each. Sanitary  
5 sewer lines to these lots will have to be a  
6 low pressure system. Each lot is required  
7 to install a grinder pump. Other required  
8 utilities include gas, water, electric,  
9 telephone and cable.

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: If you plan on  
11 acting on that to do something on this, it's  
12 going to be a pretty high amount of money --

13 MR. LOPATKA: It's going to be over  
14 your requirement.

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: So I would suggest  
16 maybe working towards putting it out for  
17 bid.

18 MR. LOPATKA: We'd have to put a bid  
19 sheet together.

20 ATTY. RINALDI: If you wanted to  
21 move forward, instruct him to move  
22 forward --

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: I think it's the  
24 best way to go because it's going to be a  
25 process. It is going to have to be bid out.

1                   ATTY. RINALDI: So you can have him  
2 start putting together the bid package with  
3 the cost estimate. Just a motion to ask the  
4 engineer to prepare that package.

5                   MR. LENCESKI: At this time would  
6 anyone like to entertain that motion?

7                   MR. FEBBO: I'll make that motion.

8                   MR. LENCESKI: Motion by Mr. Febbo.  
9 Anyone like to second it?

10                  MS. CORDIANO: I'll second it.

11                  MR. LENCESKI: Seconded by  
12 Councilwoman Cordiano. Public input?

13                  MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: On the  
14 question, are we about to make a motion to  
15 have the engineer just prepare it or are we  
16 taking a motion right now with a dollar  
17 amount?

18                  MR. LENCESKI: No, to prepare it.

19                  MS. BARTOLETTI: Get it ready to put  
20 it out for bid.

21                  MR. LENCESKI: Public input? Roll  
22 call, please.

23                  MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Brown?

24                  MR. BROWN: Yes.

25                  MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman

1 Cordiano?

2 MS. CORDIANO: Yes.

3 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?

4 MR. FEBBO: Yes.

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes.

7 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman

8 Lenceski?

9 MR. LENCESKI: Yes. Any more  
10 questions for solicitor Rinaldi?

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bill, I know  
12 we said in the beginning there was a meeting  
13 and then we moved to something else. Just  
14 refresh my memory. Chairman Lenceski  
15 brought up about the sewer project at the  
16 end of Main Street, the Wentz project and  
17 Mr. Mazzeo's property.

18 If the borough, as we did, hired a  
19 company to go and fix our sewer line or our  
20 manhole, there, and they did damage a  
21 resident's property while doing it, am I to  
22 believe that it's now between the resident  
23 and the contractor to handle?

24 ATTY. RINALDI: Yeah, but we can  
25 bring it to his attention. Certainly we



1 inspect the job, so if there's a complaint  
2 and we know about it we'll make them aware  
3 about it and then he would address it with  
4 the resident.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Then maybe I  
6 misunderstood in the beginning.

7 ATTY. RINALDI: It is going to be  
8 the contractor's job, if it was their fault,  
9 to fix it.

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Well, I'm all  
11 for that. I thought that we said at the  
12 beginning -- not we, I thought that I heard  
13 you say in the beginning that it would be  
14 between the resident and the contractor.

15 ATTY. RINALDI: Technically speaking  
16 because the contractor fixes his property,  
17 to restore the property that they upset in  
18 the construction.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: With the borough  
20 staying involved. We're not going to just  
21 dump it on Mr. Mazzeo and say it's your  
22 responsibility. Dave stays involved to make  
23 sure that it gets done.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Correct. I'm  
25 all for our engineer telling Wentz that they

1 must go down there and fix that property if  
2 it was their fault.

3 MR. LENCESKI: Okay. Borough  
4 manager's report?

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: Let's start with  
6 the financial report. You all have them in  
7 front of you. The first thing I want to  
8 point out was liquid fuels, the balance  
9 sheet. On the bottom I have written invoice  
10 to be paid, and I just want to explain the  
11 Leeward Construction for \$9,938.70. That  
12 was for -- it's just one page by itself and  
13 it has handwriting on the bottom. That was  
14 for Connell Street, when the water company  
15 was doing paving and we joined in with  
16 paving because they were doing it at a  
17 special rate to be able to have the rest of  
18 the road paved.

19 Does anyone have any questions about  
20 any other reports? The profit and loss  
21 statement, balance sheet, unpaid bills?  
22 Anybody have any questions?

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I have one  
24 question on the finance report. It goes  
25 back to what we were talking about with

1 Mr. Bieryla.

2 In January didn't we put aside or  
3 you put aside -- I think you said the budget  
4 now had in it 20,000 for a part-time person  
5 if we decided to use it for.

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: Section 414.14,  
7 zoning code enforcement officer, the first  
8 column should be actual, second column is  
9 the budget. That includes -- when we did  
10 the budget we included that in there. So if  
11 there is a decision to hire someone else in  
12 that department, then, yes, it has been  
13 budgeted.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: For 20,000, is  
15 the number?

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: I believe that's  
17 what it was, yes. It's 15 or 20. I can't  
18 remember exactly. I can let you know that  
19 after the meeting.

20 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I can remember  
21 that there was -- somewhere in that figure.  
22 I remember in the one meeting we discussed  
23 it.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: The official copy  
25 there is an asteric next to that line and it

1 tells exactly what we did about money to  
2 accommodate it.

3 The other state grant that we spoke  
4 about earlier, the one that Jason and I took  
5 care of for a police vehicle and to get some  
6 new equipment, I just want to point that  
7 that is a competitive grant. It's not  
8 something you just ask for and they take  
9 care of. It is competitive. A lot of times  
10 people get turned down. That's why we asked  
11 for 45 and we got 40. It is a very  
12 competitive scenario and I don't think that  
13 everyone realizes that.

14 On your agenda, one of the items  
15 that you're going to vote on tonight says  
16 change order and final payment for  
17 Chilewski. That is the contractor that did  
18 all the work at Miles Street. We finally  
19 have the final invoice which includes all  
20 the change orders for them, and it's  
21 \$129,053.89.

22 There is one thing that's still left  
23 that's not finished. It's one of the lamp  
24 posts that is not working.

25 MR. PAPI: Called me today. He's

1 going to take care of it next week.

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: So once that's  
3 finished that entire job is completed.

4 Our camp was averaging 150 kids per  
5 day. It was just fantastic. It's so  
6 exciting to see every day. When you drive  
7 by and look you say wow, it doesn't look  
8 like there's that many kids, but because the  
9 area is so big that they can just spread out  
10 they're not crowded or falling all over each  
11 other. Even in the days that we've had 90  
12 degrees and everything they still come. It  
13 amazes me that they all keep coming. It's  
14 going very well. I'm very pleased with it  
15 this year. The last day is next Friday, the  
16 29th. So we only have eight days left. So  
17 far, so good.

18 I did speak to Sandra from CDBG and  
19 we did give them information about Kohler  
20 Avenue and redoing the heating and air  
21 conditioning. They're doing what they need  
22 to do with that. So far, so good with that  
23 as well.

24 One thing that I think is a problem,  
25 our park on Marion Street doesn't have any

1 water, and what I want to do is look into  
2 what we can do to get water run. When we  
3 had done all the grading and some of the  
4 work that was put in I know that there's  
5 pipes run and there's a meter pit somewhere,  
6 but there's no actual water. So we can  
7 plant grass and do what we want but  
8 nothing's going to grow until we have water.

9 So what I'd like to do is possibly  
10 meet with the rec committee and try and see  
11 what we can do to rectify the problem that  
12 we have.

13 MR. LENCESKI: Bobby's the chairman  
14 of it.

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Maybe we can have a  
16 meeting sometime in the near future to  
17 discuss that because that's an ongoing  
18 problem. I don't think we can go further  
19 with anything until we have water there.

20 The last thing is when we did the  
21 budget we did put in for another police car  
22 this year. I'd like to go forward with  
23 starting the process of ordering the parts  
24 for the police car because it's going to  
25 take some time to come in.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Are we looking  
2 to get a truck or a car? The SUV?

3 CHIEF DUBERNAS: No, a sedan.

4 MR. PAPI: One last thing. That  
5 paving project that we finished at the top  
6 of Connell Street, the contractor from  
7 Leeward gave us a quote of \$15,000 to finish  
8 the road. We thought it was a fair price.  
9 The actual price that came in was a little  
10 over \$9,000.

11 MS. BARTOLETTI: It's \$9,900.

12 MR. PAPI: So he really took care of  
13 us there. It worked out really good for us.

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: That's all I have.  
15 Anybody have any questions for me?

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I guess I'll  
17 ask either the chief now or you. I'm not  
18 sure. Why would you be in favor of getting  
19 a sedan instead of an SUV?

20 CHIEF DUBERNAS: They're both the  
21 same. They're all-wheel drive just like a  
22 SUV.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Not because  
24 they're basically standard, but I guess they  
25 are basically comparable to each other.

1 CHIEF DUBERNAS: The SUVs are  
2 actually on a car frame.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Is there a  
4 price difference?

5 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Cars are cheaper.  
6 Right around \$8,000.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: How about as  
8 far as, you know, capability, room?

9 CHIEF DUBERNAS: They're pretty much  
10 the same. The new cars are totally  
11 different than the old cars. The insides of  
12 the cars are like the old Crown Vics we used  
13 to have. They redesigned everything.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I would be in  
15 favor of more of an SUV, but again, you're  
16 the chief of police. I'll take your word  
17 and recommendation on it.

18 CHIEF DUBERNAS: It's also hard to  
19 get SUVs. They told me four to six weeks  
20 before they'd even attempt to build one.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Marylynn, any  
22 word back yet on the curb cutouts from  
23 PennDOT? Did we get the blue and gold?

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: It's going to be  
25 specifically gold. They're not going to be



1 blue. I answered that one on my own because  
2 they sent me a sample of the blue and it  
3 looked like turquoise.

4 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I talked to a  
5 woman who works in the department. They  
6 said they have about four different color  
7 blues, if you want to contact them.

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: Well, we already  
9 signed the contract with the company that's  
10 doing it, and when this came up, which was  
11 months ago when we sent the initial letter  
12 in, they said that it's not true that  
13 there's other color blues. This is the  
14 only. That's why they sent it here. It was  
15 a big, huge box. It was turquoise.

16 CHIEF DUBERNAS: It's like baby  
17 blue.

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: We needed to let  
19 them know then so that they were able to do  
20 what they needed to do, and they said that  
21 is the only color blue that they offer. So  
22 I went with the gold because I figured the  
23 gold would be really nice. But the blue  
24 would not have gone well.

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Would council

1 mind if I had the lady contact Marylynn  
2 tomorrow to give her -- if they could change  
3 to a couple samples of a different blue? Or  
4 would you like to just go with gold?

5 MR. FEBBO: The gold is already  
6 ordered?

7 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. They had said  
8 when we ordered them that that was going to  
9 be it and there was no --

10 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I don't know  
11 if there was any option. I'm just saying if  
12 council would be in agreement to have the  
13 woman who was in charge of it contact you.

14 MR. FEBBO: As long as it wouldn't  
15 tie up the time factor in there.

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Of course.

17 MS. BARTOLETTI: Do you really want  
18 to do that?

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Me,  
20 personally, I would love blue and gold, but  
21 I don't know what the other members feel.  
22 That's why I'm asking. It's up to the  
23 majority. So should I contact her or no?

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: If you have the  
25 number, just tell me who it is and I can

1 contact them.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mrs. Hallock,  
3 April.

4 MS. BARTOLETTI: That was after even  
5 speaking to James May. He said doesn't get  
6 too much involved in that and he referred to  
7 the company that's going to be doing the  
8 work. They're the ones who said that's it.  
9 That's the blue. The reason why they sent  
10 the color is to make sure we knew what we  
11 were getting into.

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Everyone okay  
13 with it?

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: If there's an issue  
15 I'll let you know. If it's staying gold I'm  
16 not going to make a big deal of it.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Last, I know  
18 that we discussed it a few months ago and  
19 now I seen that Taylor did it. The street  
20 lights, the new LCDs. Those are  
21 unbelievable.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: I already put in  
23 for them.

24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Safety-wise,  
25 seeing-wise it's just so much better. So my

1 question would be how do we do that?

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: It's already done.

3 MR. LENCESKI: At this time I would  
4 like to entertain a motion to approve the  
5 final payment for Chilewski of \$129,053.89  
6 for the work done at Miles Street Park.

7 MS. CORDIANO: I'll make that  
8 motion.

9 MR. LENCESKI: By Councilwoman  
10 Cordiano. Can I get a second?

11 MR. FEBBO: I'll second that.

12 MR. LENCESKI: Seconded by  
13 Councilman Febbo. Public input?

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: On the  
15 question, Mr. Lopatka, engineering, your  
16 recommendation to pay it? The work's  
17 complete, everything is good to go?

18 MR. LOPATKA: Everything other than  
19 that one thing. We actually did a  
20 walk-through punch list.

21 MR. LENCESKI: Roll call.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Brown?

23 MR. BROWN: Yes.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman  
25 Cordiano?

1 MS. CORDIANO: Yes.

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?

3 MR. FEBBO: Yes.

4 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes.

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman

7 Lenceski?

8 MR. LENCESKI: Yes. Anyone else  
9 have any questions for Marylynn? The  
10 Cherundolo subdivision?

11 MR. SENAPEDIS: William Senapedis.  
12 I'm a professional land surveyor  
13 representing Mr. and Mrs. George Mamara.  
14 They own property at 209 Monroe Street in  
15 the borough. They built a home 30-some  
16 years ago, and in doing so they didn't  
17 realize that the pool that was installed in  
18 the rear of the property was over the  
19 property line.

20 Since then, Mr. Dave Cherundolo, who  
21 owns the vacant lot behind the Mamaras,  
22 struck an agreement with Mr. and Mrs. Mamara  
23 and said he would sell them 14 feet of his  
24 property to take the pool out of overlap, I  
25 guess, and I'm here to finalize the lot line

1 adjustment between the Mameras and the  
2 Cherundolos. It's gone through the zoning  
3 and was approved two months ago, and it's  
4 gone through the planning commission,  
5 reviewed by Mr. Lopatka, and the planning  
6 commission approved it. I'm here to get the  
7 final signatures on the maps, if I may show  
8 you the maps.

9 We needed a variance for the  
10 sidewalks. They have struck an agreement.  
11 If you look at the second sheet, it's going  
12 to be a 14-foot strip, which is going to  
13 take the wall and the sidewalk out of  
14 contention here. The remaining lot on  
15 Locklee Street is owned by Cherundolo. It's  
16 currently vacant. But it does meet zoning  
17 requirements.

18 So I'm here to get signatures to  
19 finalize this, get them out of -- Mr. and  
20 Mrs. Mamara want to sell the home, and they  
21 can't do that until they get this  
22 accomplished.

23 MR. LENCESKI: At this time I'd like  
24 to entertain a motion to approve the  
25 Mamara/Cherundolo subdivision.

1 MR. FEBBO: I'll make that motion.

2 MR. LENCESKI: By Mr. Febbo. Anyone  
3 want to second?

4 MS. CORDIANO: I'll second that.

5 MR. LENCESKI: Second by  
6 Councilwoman Cordiano. Public input? On  
7 the question? Roll call, please.

8 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Brown?

9 MR. BROWN: Yes.

10 ATTY. RINALDI: Ms. Cordiano?

11 MS. CORDIANO: Yes.

12 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Febbo?

13 MR. FEBBO: Yes.

14 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Rinaldi?

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes.

16 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Lenceski?

17 MR. LENCESKI: Yes. Public comment.

18 Joe Russick?

19 MR. RUSSICK: Joe Russick, 642 Clark  
20 Street. Russell took my first comment in  
21 reference to the LED lights. You can see  
22 the difference.

23 I just want to share with you --  
24 these are the guidelines for LERTA and I  
25 know last month at the council meeting LERTA

1 was awarded to one of the developers in  
2 town. I just want to go on record saying I  
3 support that. Mr. Febbo did research on it.  
4 I liked his presentation. There's other  
5 people, too, made comment on it. It's good  
6 for the borough.

7 There's another tract of land I'd  
8 like to see developed somewhere down the  
9 pike, and that's down by Lehigh, where  
10 Mr. Giambra developed. It is beautiful down  
11 there.

12 In saying that, last month at the  
13 council meeting there was an award for LERTA  
14 program to the developer. I support it.  
15 The question I asked that night was did we  
16 have a public meeting, and I really didn't  
17 get an answer other than the gentleman from  
18 the county sat there and he said yeah, there  
19 should be a public meeting.

20 Now, if you look at page three it  
21 says there shall. Shall is mandatory,  
22 should is non-mandatory. There was a  
23 spirited conversation between council and a  
24 member of the school board here. Nobody  
25 knew what was going on from either side.



1 That's the feeling I got. So I went back  
2 and I did some research. If you look at the  
3 comment, here, "at least one public hearing  
4 shall be held by the municipal governing  
5 body for the purpose of determining the  
6 deteriorated area of boundaries."

7 It goes on "at the public hearing  
8 local taxing authorities" -- which is you  
9 and the school board -- "the planning  
10 commission and the redevelopment authority  
11 and other public and private agencies and  
12 individuals knowledgeable and interested in  
13 the improvement of the deteriorated areas  
14 shall be given the opportunity to present  
15 their recommendations concerning the  
16 location of the boundaries of the  
17 deteriorated area or areas."

18 So my question was that night did we  
19 have a hearing? I never got my answer. So  
20 I ask the question tonight. Did we conform  
21 to the law? Did we have a hearing on that?

22 MAYOR MULKERIN: No, that night when  
23 you asked that George Kelly was sitting next  
24 to you, and I asked him when the planning  
25 deemed it's blighted, does that meet the

1 requirements of the public hearing.

2 ATTY. RINALDI: We had a meeting  
3 after that.

4 MR. RUSSICK: It doesn't say that.  
5 It says a public governing body -- or  
6 municipal governing body, which is --

7 ATTY. RINALDI: I think that was in  
8 the fall that we had a meeting on --

9 MR. RUSSICK: Was it a public  
10 meeting? Was it knowledgeable to the  
11 public?

12 ATTY. RINALDI: Yes. There was one  
13 at the planning and there was one --  
14 planning recommended it to council and then  
15 council -- and this was before, when they  
16 were going for the TIF. So they had to have  
17 that meeting for that. We didn't have the  
18 meeting on the TIF, we had the meeting on --  
19 before they could even ask for the TIF  
20 council had to rule on whether it was  
21 deteriorated property, which George Kelly  
22 came down and he testified, I think George  
23 Dunbar had people come down and speak that  
24 said it was old coal lands.

25 MAYOR MULKERIN: When I asked

1 Mr. Kelly that night, the first part of that  
2 is almost what he said verbatim, which  
3 sounded -- and I said that sounds like when  
4 they deemed it a blighted area, does it fall  
5 under the plan --

6 MR. RUSSICK: They said the  
7 municipal governing body. The planning  
8 commission is not the governing body.

9 ATTY. RINALDI: Well, the planning  
10 commission also did it. They went to the  
11 planning and council. So council passed a  
12 resolution deeming it blighted.

13 MR. RUSSICK: Council was supposed  
14 to do that, according to the law. That's my  
15 point. In other words, there's a procedure  
16 here. If you had a public hearing based on  
17 the guidelines here there wouldn't have been  
18 that conversation going back and forth, how  
19 much money should we allow the tax break to  
20 be, et cetera, et cetera. It seemed like  
21 nobody knew what was going on. It was a  
22 terrible feeling. Like something going out  
23 of control. Then all the sudden it was  
24 granted. I don't think anybody was happy.

25 But if we follow the guidelines of

1 the law we don't have confusion. It's my  
2 opinion that we didn't have a hearing.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do you mean by  
4 public hearing or public meeting, however  
5 it's worded, would we have to  
6 specifically -- are you saying we'd have to  
7 specifically advertise for that and that  
8 only?

9 MR. RUSSICK: That's why you have a  
10 solicitor. My opinion is yes.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Is that how  
12 that's worded?

13 MR. RUSSICK: It says public  
14 hearing.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mr. Dunbar  
16 came here six times to public meetings --

17 MR. RUSSICK: I'm just reading what  
18 it says.

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mr. Rinaldi,  
20 the meetings that he addressed this in --

21 ATTY. RINALDI: We had a meeting  
22 blighting it, and that we had last year.

23 MAYOR MULKERIN: That was through  
24 planning.

25 ATTY. RINALDI: Council voted on it,

1 too.

2 MAYOR MULKERIN: I don't think  
3 council has to vote on that.

4 MR. LENCESKI: We voted on it.

5 ATTY. RINALDI: We had a vote on it.

6 MR. LOPATKA: I do remember them  
7 going to the planning commission and then  
8 coming to council.

9 ATTY. RINALDI: The confusion,  
10 Mr. Russick, was between -- because there's  
11 three different bodies involved they chose  
12 to come here last, and the confusion was --

13 MAYOR MULKERIN: That's not true.  
14 The county just passed it last week.

15 ATTY. RINALDI: They went to the  
16 county last. But they went to the school  
17 district first and got an agreement.

18 MR. RUSSICK: That's not the way the  
19 law states it should be done.

20 ATTY. RINALDI: I'm just telling you  
21 where the confusion was. The confusion was  
22 because they had to deal with the school  
23 district -- can I finish, Joe, please? They  
24 made an agreement with the district, then  
25 they came to council and asked for that same

1 deal. Now, council didn't have to vote on  
2 that same deal. They had the right to do  
3 whatever they wanted to. The confusion was  
4 they weren't sure, least in my mind, how the  
5 school could agree to that. Council has  
6 control to set what they want to do, and  
7 then they'd have to go back to the school  
8 district to make the school district  
9 conform.

10 MR. RUSSICK: It wasn't done  
11 according to the law. It wasn't done.  
12 Mr. Rinaldi, read the law.

13 ATTY. RINALDI: I have the act here.

14 MR. RUSSICK: Read the law.

15 ATTY. RINALDI: I have the act here.  
16 Okay? It's the municipality.

17 MR. RUSSICK: I could read and I  
18 understand exactly. It wasn't done  
19 according to the law. My point is we're  
20 trying to do a lot of things here but we're  
21 not following what is written. We're not  
22 following it. We only discussed various  
23 inspection processes here tonight and we  
24 keep on going around in circles because  
25 there's answers out here. Grasp the answer,

1 the guidelines, and follow them. Listen, I  
2 live in this town. I want it right.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: What the  
4 solicitor is saying is we did it the correct  
5 way.

6 MR. RUSSICK: Well, I'm saying it  
7 wasn't. That's my opinion. You guys can  
8 read. You read it and you tell me.

9 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You're  
10 entitled to your opinion, Joe. I'm just  
11 saying I'm listening to the advice.

12 MR. RUSSICK: I'm just following the  
13 law and we're not.

14 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: According to  
15 him we are.

16 MR. NOTARI: Rick Notari, 13 Lincoln  
17 Street. First question, pave cut at Moosic  
18 Road and Hoover Street, our responsibility  
19 or PennDOT's responsibility?

20 MR. PAPI: PennDOT.

21 MR. NOTARI: Can we try --

22 MR. PAPI: They already recut it.  
23 They're waiting for them to dig it out now.  
24 Actually it's a gas company cut. If you  
25 look at it you'll see where it was all saw

1 cut. They're going to redo it. When, I  
2 don't know. I called them about it and  
3 three days later he had it saw cut. It  
4 hasn't been fixed yet.

5 MR. NOTARI: I know last year at  
6 some point people were complaining about  
7 Main Street in Taylor was getting paved,  
8 Main Street in West Scranton was getting  
9 paved, Main Street in Duryea was getting  
10 paved, and we were told -- I believe you  
11 were told we were next on the list.

12 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: They said  
13 2017.

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: They said if they  
15 don't get to us this year it will be early  
16 next.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: They have to  
18 do the handicapped first.

19 MR. NOTARI: Paving project, did you  
20 say six streets or 36?

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thirty-six.

22 MR. NOTARI: Is there a list of  
23 those 36 streets?

24 MR. LOPATKA: There's a set of plans  
25 here in the borough.



1 MR. PAPI: Right in my office, on  
2 the table.

3 MR. NOTARI: Steve had talked  
4 earlier about a property on George Street  
5 that a bank owns that we can't do anything  
6 about. Are we allowed to fine the bank?

7 ATTY. RINALDI: If they have the  
8 deed in their name. The sheriff would give  
9 them a deed and they would record it. A lot  
10 of times after the sheriff's sale it takes  
11 the sheriff, like, two, three months to  
12 issue a deed. Once they have the deed in  
13 their name, yes.

14 MR. NOTARI: Steve said we can't do  
15 anything when the bank owns the property.

16 ATTY. RINALDI: Once the bank owns  
17 it, then they're the registered owner. When  
18 they get that deed, then they file an  
19 eviction notice, which would clear  
20 everything out of the property.

21 MR. BIERLYA: We had that same  
22 problem with the property on Sussex Street  
23 where the rats were in the garage and there  
24 was a person in there, and then the bank was  
25 trying to get the person out of there. The

1 people were complaining about the rats, and  
2 just because of the situation we had Dominic  
3 Pest Service take care of it. It took them  
4 to get that lady out of there. We had the  
5 rats gone and the lady was still hovering  
6 because there was one wedding dress in that.  
7 They wouldn't go in until the wedding dress  
8 was gone.

9 MR. NOTARI: I understand they won't  
10 go in until everything's gone, but we do  
11 have the power to fine them even though --  
12 as long as they own the property. Right?

13 MR. BIERLYA: Right. Once again,  
14 like Mr. Rinaldi said, between that deed  
15 process and getting in and coming back, that  
16 was -- I believe it was almost, like, two  
17 months.

18 MR. NOTARI: The engineer talked  
19 about the project on Dunn Avenue. That was  
20 water --

21 MR. LOPATKA: No, it's a K-Route  
22 project through PennDOT. Basically to put  
23 handicapped ramps and repave it.

24 MR. NOTARI: So Dunn is getting  
25 repaved?

1 MR. LOPATKA: Three or four blocks,  
2 from Main Street --

3 MR. PAPI: Where Tony Pero lived.

4 MR. LOPATKA: Actually it's about  
5 three blocks.

6 MR. NOTARI: I had a discussion,  
7 disagreement with one of my friends who  
8 lives in the Shawnee Hills section about  
9 tree trimming along the sidewalks. Is that  
10 the borough's responsibility? The trees on  
11 the sidewalk end of the street.

12 MR. PAPI: Everybody who owns  
13 property that abuts any street or alley in  
14 the borough has to maintain their property  
15 right up to the curb.

16 MR. LENCESKI: Thanks, Mr. Notari.  
17 At this time we'll hear from our councilmen  
18 and councilwoman.

19 MR. BROWN: Nothing.

20 MS. CORDIANO: Nothing.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: No more items.

22 MR. FEBBO: I have a couple items.  
23 The environmental protection committee,  
24 Connell's Patch bridge, that was enormous.  
25 The bridge was actually falling into the

1 creek. Within seven days Paul had managed  
2 to get the county to not only look at it but  
3 to replace it.

4 Also, Stockey's property up on  
5 Keyser Avenue, Steve and I were up there  
6 Friday. We gave him 14 days to start  
7 showing improvement with cleaning up and  
8 organizing it and he is doing it. There's a  
9 zoning issue we're facing up there but he's  
10 working on that also.

11 Wyalusing Avenue, there's a house  
12 down there that's terribly blighted. Steve  
13 had given them 60 days, I believe -- 90 days  
14 to start doing some work on it.

15 MR. BIERLYLA: They didn't completed  
16 it. I actually gave them an extra two weeks  
17 and that has expired, so it's down at  
18 Teddy's.

19 MR. FEBBO: It's probably one of the  
20 worst blighted houses you've ever seen.

21 Another thing we've been getting  
22 into is cars parked legally. There's a  
23 whole bunch of them throughout the town.  
24 We've been working with the police, Officer  
25 Kimball, and he's been ticketing cars on the

1 street and Steve's been doing a good job of  
2 finding homeowners with cars in the yard and  
3 getting them out of there.

4 Buildings and grounds committee,  
5 summer help has been painting the rails on  
6 the way in. We're waiting for Marylynn to  
7 find funding for the front of the building  
8 where we want to replace the sidewalks,  
9 steps, planters, brick repair, pressure wash  
10 it, and do the rear porch where the police  
11 station is.

12 Rec committee, Paul has been doing  
13 everything with the rec committee. We need  
14 to get him off the rec committee and have  
15 him replaced with someone else in the  
16 interim of Joe McAndrew being out. He's  
17 really overloaded. Not that he's not doing  
18 his job, but I don't think he sleeps.

19 Larry Rossi would be a good fit for  
20 that position. I talked with Frank today.  
21 He's not interested, but he said he can work  
22 with Larry in terms of overseeing it. I  
23 think we should consider, again, removing  
24 Paul from the parks, especially this time of  
25 the year with so much going on and him being

1 real busy with the paving project, streets  
2 and sewers.

3 That's another problem. I think the  
4 sewer committee should meet and get that  
5 problem straightened out there and give them  
6 some help. We talked about that committee  
7 working with Lucille and getting that  
8 revitalized. I think Joe Ferrett was on  
9 that.

10 Joe Ferrett was home and he had to  
11 go back to the hospital. He has an  
12 infection in his leg. So hopefully it's not  
13 severe. That's all I have.

14 MR. LENCESKI: The only thing I have  
15 is would the rec board like to meet with us?

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

17 MR. LENCESKI: Maybe also have a  
18 finance meeting. Would next Tuesday be a  
19 possibility?

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: Can I call you on  
21 that?

22 MR. LENCESKI: Sure. With that, I'd  
23 like to have a motion to adjourn the  
24 meeting.

25 MR. FEBBO: I'll make the motion.

1 MR. LENCESKI: All in favor?

2 (Unanimous. Meeting adjourned.)
