It's attached. stay in place for a one-year period from the date the agreement is signed. This is the This covers any and all final one. anticipated repairs for the road, which is Mountain Road, while they use it to install the new electrical lines on the top of Ransom Mountain.

The roads were inspected by their engineer, our engineer and Mr. Ciuccio's engineer on site. Everybody agreed what were currently the damages and the amount of bond that would be in place to correct any

additional work.

They have 60 days to complete completion of those repairs after their use of the road ceases or one year, whichever is shorter.

The only reason we're a party to this agreement is because in the event we take over the roads between now and completing the work we're included here as also an owner so that that bond will cover and protect the borough if they do any damage to the road if we take it over from Mr. Ciuccio.

MR. FEBBO: This does not exonerate him from any of the work that is not completed --

ATTY. RINALDI: This has nothing to do with Louis. This is all PPL Utilities because they're using that road to go up and down that mountain. They're using heavy equipment and it was just done, so everybody wanted to make sure that they don't ruin it. So the bond will cover actually the total construction cost of the road if they have to redo it. It's what it actually cost to

do Mountain Road. So they posted that bond. That bond is in place with the agreement. Mr. Ciuccio has signed and Villa has signed and the borough will be asked to sign. I'm just asking for approval of the road use agreement for PPL Utilities between the borough and Villa, Inc. and Mr. Ciuccio. The original will be dropped off here for the president to sign and the secretary.

MR. LENCESKI: Since Bill just described that to us, at this time I'd like to entertain a motion to approve the road use agreement with PPL Electric Utilities.

I think they're next door to each other but they have different addresses. I filed an objection on the borough's behalf and actually today I received a copy of the order from the judge that our objections were sustained and both of those suits were dismissed. So those suits are over.

I haven't heard anything from the police union with regard to our last meeting several months ago, personnel committee and the attorney for the police union. They were supposed to get back to us with what

their counteroffer was to our offer on the contract. We're still waiting to hear from them. That's it.

MR. FEBBO: What about Fred Street you have in here? That is an issue that is outstanding for a while. Should we not act?

MS. BARTOLETTI: That was updated.

ATTY. RINALDI: I think Dave gave everybody some options.

MR. FEBBO: What's our next step?
We accepted the first option, I believe it
was?

ATTY. RINALDI: I don't think you picked an option.

MR. LOPATKA: I recommended one option. Option one.

MR. FEBBO: I thought we accepted that.

MR. LOPATKA: I don't recall.

MR. FEBBO: Should we move forward?

ATTY. RINALDI: Anytime is your pleasure. He reviewed the original options, he went out there and did the work. It needs to be done. I know it's more than the 30,000. I forget how much the cost estimate

was. It's something that can be done anytime. Sooner than later.

MR. FEBBO: Mare, any reason we should not bring it to the floor tonight?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, not as far as financing. One way or another we'll have to find the money to get it done. But is everyone on the same page as what Dave spoke about?

MR. FEBBO: Dave, can you briefly bring us up to snuff again on what the option was that we --

MR. LOPATKA: I actually don't have it with me tonight. I don't know if Bill does.

ATTY. RINALDI: I might have. One second.

MR. LOPATKA: I know there were three options. The one that we kind of recommended was -- two of them had an extreme amount of fill involved, which we really didn't feel as though it was necessary. It would create more of an issue for some of the existing lots that are there. So we recommended the lot with the

least amount of fill, basically.

MR. FEBBO: I believe it was to go with the grade that we have there and bring utilities down to that first lot only that that gentleman that was here looking for.

MR. LOPATKA: Yes, and actually it wouldn't require a grinder pump on whatever lot was built. With any of the options you'd still have to pump sewage back up.

ATTY. RINALDI: Option one is approximately three to four of fill with a curbed roadway, two inlets, a dry well.

That's the preferred option.

Two was consistent grade running to the end of the proposed cul-de-sac, approximately eight to nine feet of fill, concrete curb, catch basin, dry well and outfall.

Option three is similar to option two with regard to grades and eight to nine of fill, but instead of curbs storm water is collected in roadside swales and discharged into stone basin.

Option one would be the best option, do the smallest amount of fill required.

The roadway should have a cul-de-sac for turn arounds. There are three lots remaining to be developed and will require utilities to be extended to each. Sanitary sewer lines to these lots will have to be a low pressure system. Each lot is required to install a grinder pump. Other required utilities include gas, water, electric, telephone and cable.

MS. BARTOLETTI: If you plan on acting on that to do something on this, it's going to be a pretty high amount of money --

MR. LOPATKA: It's going to be over your requirement.

MS. BARTOLETTI: So I would suggest maybe working towards putting it out for bid.

MR. LOPATKA: We'd have to put a bid sheet together.

ATTY. RINALDI: If you wanted to move forward, instruct him to move forward --

MS. BARTOLETTI: I think it's the best way to go because it's going to be a process. It is going to have to be bid out.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Well, I'm all for that. I thought that we said at the beginning -- not we, I thought that I heard you say in the beginning that it would be between the resident and the contractor.

ATTY. RINALDI: Technically speaking because the contractor fixes his property, to restore the property that they upset in the construction.

MS. BARTOLETTI: With the borough staying involved. We're not going to just dump it on Mr. Mazzeo and say it's your responsibility. Dave stays involved to make sure that it gets done.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Correct. I'm all for our engineer telling Wentz that they

must go down there and fix that property if it was their fault.

MR. LENCESKI: Okay. Borough manager's report?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Let's start with the financial report. You all have them in front of you. The first thing I want to point out was liquid fuels, the balance sheet. On the bottom I have written invoice to be paid, and I just want to explain the Leeward Construction for \$9,938.70. That was for -- it's just one page by itself and it has handwriting on the bottom. That was for Connell Street, when the water company was doing paving and we joined in with paving because they were doing it at a special rate to be able to have the rest of the road paved.

Does anyone have any questions about any other reports? The profit and loss statement, balance sheet, unpaid bills?

Anybody have any questions?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I have one question on the finance report. It goes back to what we were talking about with

Mr. Bieryla.

In January didn't we put aside or you put aside -- I think you said the budget now had in it 20,000 for a part-time person if we decided to use it for.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Section 414.14, zoning code enforcement officer, the first column should be actual, second column is the budget. That includes -- when we did the budget we included that in there. So if there is a decision to hire someone else in that department, then, yes, it has been budgeted.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: For 20,000, is the number?

MS. BARTOLETTI: I believe that's what it was, yes. It's 15 or 20. I can't remember exactly. I can let you know that after the meeting.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I can remember that there was -- somewhere in that figure.

I remember in the one meeting we discussed it.

MS. BARTOLETTI: The official copy there is an asteric next to that line and it

tells exactly what we did about money to accommodate it.

The other state grant that we spoke about earlier, the one that Jason and I took care of for a police vehicle and to get some new equipment, I just want to point that that is a competitive grant. It's not something you just ask for and they take care of. It is competitive. A lot of times people get turned down. That's why we asked for 45 and we got 40. It is a very competitive scenario and I don't think that everyone realizes that.

On your agenda, one of the items that you're going to vote on tonight says change order and final payment for Chilewski. That is the contractor that did all the work at Miles Street. We finally have the final invoice which includes all the change orders for them, and it's \$129,053.89.

There is one thing that's still left that's not finished. It's one of the lamp posts that is not working.

Council has control to set what they want to do, and then they'd have to go back to the school district to make the school district conform.

MR. RUSSICK: It wasn't done according to the law. It wasn't done.

Mr. Rinaldi, read the law.

ATTY. RINALDI: I have the act here.

MR. RUSSICK: Read the law.

MR. PAPI: Right in my office, on the table.

MR. NOTARI: Steve had talked earlier about a property on George Street that a bank owns that we can't do anything about. Are we allowed to fine the bank?

ATTY. RINALDI: If they have the deed in their name. The sheriff would give them a deed and they would record it. A lot of times after the sheriff's sale it takes the sheriff, like, two, three months to issue a deed. Once they have the deed in their name, yes.

MR. NOTARI: Steve said we can't do anything when the bank owns the property.

ATTY. RINALDI: Once the bank owns it, then they're the registered owner. When they get that deed, then they file an eviction notice, which would clear everything out of the property.

MR. BIERYLA: We had that same problem with the property on Sussex Street where the rats were in the garage and there was a person in there, and then the bank was trying to get the person out of there. The

people were complaining about the rats, and just because of the situation we had Dominic Pest Service take care of it. It took them to get that lady out of there. We had the rats gone and the lady was still hovering because there was one wedding dress in that. They wouldn't go in until the wedding dress was gone.

MR. NOTARI: I understand they won't go in until everything's gone, but we do have the power to fine them even though -- as long as they own the property. Right?

MR. BIERYLA: Right. Once again,
like Mr. Rinaldi said, between that deed
process and getting in and coming back, that
was -- I believe it was almost, like, two
months.

MR. NOTARI: The engineer talked about the project on Dunn Avenue. That was water --

MR. LOPATKA: No, it's a K-Route project through PennDOT. Basically to put handicapped ramps and repave it.
