DPW REPORT

MR. PAPI: Good evening, everybody. A brief description of some of the things we've done for the month of May.

I responded to 103 Pennsylvania One calls for the month of May. That's the most ever. Big number.

I was called to the corner of Luther and Nicholas to do repair a storm drain that was collapsing.

We recycled approximately 40 tires that were acquired during the spring clean-up. I met with the resident on the corner of Hoover and Madison and had a sewer backup during a violent storm. We flushed our line to make sure there was no obstructions.

We cleaned storm drains overnight all over the town, after a rain event. We replaced the catch basin on Keyser Avenue across from LLVSA that was ready to collapse.

I met with a resident on 318 Sussex

Street to discuss storm water problem. I met with the resident on Dodge Street to discuss the storm water problems he was having.

We brought the Borough backhoe down and 1 cleaned out an old runoff ditch and seemed to do the 2 trick. 3 We repaired a sewer line manhole on First Street that was caving in. It was causing a subsidence 5 in the street. Called Earthworks and they repaired it. 6 Met with Attorney Riff for a deposition 7 on May 11th, and I believe everything went well. I sent two guys with a chain saw to Atherton Street to 9 remove a tree that had fallen overnight and was 10 blocking the street. 11 Was called out at 8:30 or 8:20 a.m. on 12 May 16th to Keyser Avenue to mark an emergency gas 13 leak. 1 4 I was called out at 8:40 p.m., Tuesday, 15 May 16th on our pumping station on Orchard Street that 16 was sounding off and was blocked with cloth wipes. 17 I called Mefco. They pulled the pumps 18 and fixed the problem. I was called to Hill Street for 19 a blocked sewer, met with the resident there. 20 I pulled the lids above and below her 21 house and showed her that our line was flowing and it 22 was her lateral that was the problem. 23 And on the back page is all the mileage 24

I believe it's 117 East Grace Street, a fellow property where water comes down through -there's two large parking lots there. The water kind of continues through the backyards there, until it gets to the point, actually, where the whole ground is stained so the water is actually sitting there, almost pooling there.

I did provide a sketch. Now, the sketch in color. I don't know if it came out all that well. is after I printed it, today run out here, some of it is hard to read.

I'll clarify that, but let me just read first what I think the issue is and then we can kind of go over what potential fix maybe.

Washout was viewed along a vegetated area to the northwest corner of said property. It appears stormwater flows along the rear of the property line with an ultimate low point in the yard is 125 Grace Street where stormwater appears to pond.

According to Paul and meeting with him 1 out there, there is a 24-inch storm line, dedicated 2 storm line, actually discharges into a sanitary line. 3 It goes from the trucking facility to the north, back behind the baseball field, runs through a couple yards and comes out at the corner of East Grace Street and 6 First Street into an inlet, with that inlet ultimately 7 discharging into the sanitary sewer. 8 While we were out there, Paul made a call 9 to LVSA who happen to be in the area and kind of 10 reviewed that with them. 11 There's two manholes in the middle of the 12 intersection. 13 other one is actually a combined system. 14

It kind of dumps down and then runs along the back of those property lines. And, ultimately, it comes to the yard. I guess it's looking at this, a large concrete patio there.

And there's a low spot in that yard where the water accumulates. So, I mean, to kind of alleviate that issue, probably have to add those in with that, a couple manholes tie in to that storm pipe.

To actually fix the overall problem, which would be to dedicate it totally to storm water, would be to eliminate that lateral from that storm line, tie that into the road on Grace Street.

And then down in that corner where the inlet is, where it ultimately discharges, instead of discharging that pipe into the sanitary line, discharge

it into the dedicated storm main that's next to it. 1 And, at that point, you know, you're 2 eliminating, you know, quite a bit of water from the 3 sanitary sewer line, which LVSA would like. I do believe Dave said, while they were 5 there, we're going to do something potentially to take 6 it if they could help a little bit with the costs, 7 especially in the road, maybe not so much with the 8 pipes coming from those parking lots, but maybe from 9 the connection from that existing inlet to the existing 10 dedicated storm manhole. 11 I mean, that's -- just looking at it, 12 that's kind of what the thought is as to how to 13 14 alleviate that. We were very successful. We wrote 116 citations. And we had six drug arrests and three DUI arrests, under the time frame, with a majority of it has to be done in the evening from 6 at night until 4 in the morning.

The other thing, if you guys didn't notice, we were on the range. And I was dragging around a little black trailer. We had a trailer donated to us for our range stuff by a trailer corner, up on Keyser Avenue.

Used to be in Old Forge. They donated a 6 and a half by 12 enclosed trailer that now we keep all of our firearms stuff in it. We just hook up to it and take that to the range.

Moving on. Traffic study I did on Sussex

Street and Pan Court. It don't meet the criteria for a stop sign in the middle of an intersection.

Under PennDOT regulations, due to its main thoroughfare, with two roadways already have traffic control devices intersect with the stop sign either side of Pan Court. And we haven't had an accident there since 2007, when I went back to our accidents.
