MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: When we come down the table tonight I have an idea I'm going to propose to council, so I'll take care of it then.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Today was the deadline to enroll us in the state contract for salt for next year, so because we hardly used any this year we're going to have a carryover. Normally I put us in for 800 tons, so what I did was put us in for 400 tons since we have a pile at the garage and we're going to have a carryover of 206 tons.

We have several vehicles hanging around. I'm going to put them out to bid. It will either be the April meeting or the may meeting so we can get rid of all this junk that's sitting around.

To those who don't know, all of our GPS devices in the vehicles were up. It was time to be upgraded. So they've all been updated. The DPW ones have to be calibrated. The police, all except for one, are up and ready. The last one is to be done Friday.

We've had some complaints about

equipment up at the school, park equipment. Some of it's in rough shape. The setups that we did receive from Lackawanna County. So since it's turned into a lot more than we initially planned, what I did is I contacted the company who we usually use to install. They're certified installers. Since so many of the slides have to be replaced and one ladder has to be replaced, one window has to be replaced, I just felt that it should be done by certified people rather than try to get Paul to do it. Three slides and lots of other smaller things.

So they're going to come up and give us an assessment of what it needs. And they will go through the whole thing. They'll check everything and whatever needs to be updated, and it's not very expensive at all.

This year's Great American Cleanup is going to be April 30th. So we'll be looking for lots of volunteers for that. I know a lot of you come every year. April 30th, Saturday morning, usually 9:00 until 12:00.

The fields, as Joe started to

mention to you, we made the decision that
we're going to do all of the fertilizing and
all the other stuff to maintain the fields.
We're going to attempt to do it inhouse this
year. Hopefully we'll have good luck with
it. Last year it became extremely
expensive, so our guys are very competent
and feel they can do a good job and I think
they can.

We'll start to get all the schedules in for the little league and high school to use the fields. Rick, I know that you're involved with that. If you can keep it going smooth that would be great. That's all I have.

MR. SEMENZA: One question. When they come to give us an assessment of the equipment, could we see maybe we can get, like, a variety pack of nuts and bolts just for the future if we lose some or some get loose.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Here's the problem. Whatever we purchased in the past we always go through the COSTARS program and we've purchased from the same company. So all of

our equipment at Miles Street and the yellow, blue and gold, red portion up at the school park is all from one company, but the other portion, the very large piece, that's from a completely different company, then the smaller piece is from a completely different company from them because we got those from Lackawanna County. So each company has different setups.

So what we'll do is we'll try to get a little from each company and keep them marked.

MR. LENCESKI: For the April 30th Great American Cleanup, is there any way possible we can try to get, like, a tire recycle --

MS. BARTOLETTI: We won't have one.

MR. PAPI: What normally happens is whatever tires that we pull to the side of the road the DPW guys pick them up, load them in the truck. Joe Iaccovazzi from Taylor calls me the next day and says he has a tractor-trailer and we run our tires up to Taylor and put them in the trailer.

MS. BARTOLETTI: What we usually try

to do is try to put our cleanup on the same day as Taylor and Moosic. What they called it this year, even thought it's through the Great American Cleanup, it's being called Sid Kavulich's Cleanup Day. So he is kind of taking control of the whole thing. So by having the three municipalities together he's going to try to get the tire situation under control again. Usually they still put the trailer at Taylor's DPW but we're entitled to be able to throw whatever we have in there.

He hasn't said anything about TVs or anything yet, and I know that's a very touchy subject right now with recycling. So I'm going to guess and say that that answer is going to be no but we'll check into it anyway. All the sudden it's very difficult to get rid of TVs whether it's the recycling center, any place like that. They've reached their allotments. Eventually there's going to have to be an answer to it but right now we don't have one.

MR. LENCESKI: Is Lackawanna County not taking TVs anymore?

MR. NOTARI: There was a problem last year. I'm not sure exactly what answer was come up with. They take them, then they're not taking them. It's a matter of the recycling center able to get rid of them. I'll check.

MR. FEBBO: The problem is the components in them. At one time they were recycling everything but now the market has slowed down on all that. They don't want it.

MR. PAPI: They told us to call the center before you go.

MR. NOTARI: Typically the county, once a year, holds a tire recycling event at the recycling center.

MR. FERRETT: Do you have any idea if you have any input or any information about when Old Forge might be getting their PennDOT roads paved?

MS. BARTOLETTI: They say we're supposed to be this year.

MR. FEBBO: I just talked to Chris
Thomas and I had him check with PennDOT.
We're on the docket to be paved next year.

This year they're going to put the curb cutouts in and so on. We are on the docket. Probably won't get the actual paving until next year.

MR. FERRETT: I thought last year Chairman Rinaldi said they talked to the representative and that they were supposed to be on the list for this year.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: They had that
Main Street in Taylor, where they stopped,
they stopped from Davis Street and then down
to around Agostini's Bakery. They said last
year that this year it was going to be on
the list.

About the curb cutouts, they said if we wanted them to be blue and gold we had to send a letter in. I don't know if we ever sent a letter in.

MR. SEMENZA: I believe the project is going to start 2016 but the paving won't be done until 2017 due to all the curb cuts.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?
Thanks, Mare. I'm going to go down the table.

MAYOR MULKERIN: Three things. The

Lions Club is having their Easter egg hunt this Saturday at 11:00 at the football field. They're also having their chicken dinner Sunday in the basement of Prince of Peace. I believe that's at 1:00 to 4:00.

Also, the historical society meets
the last Thursday of every month downstairs.
I believe there is a schedule for that.
That's it.

MR. BROWN: Nothing.

MS. CORDIANO: Nothing.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: First of all, let's set up a sewer committee meeting with me, Chairman Semenza and Councilwoman Cordiano. Whatever is good for you.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Wait until Lucille comes back.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Prior to the meeting you'll get with Councilman Ferrett and see exactly what type of reports he's looking for, what type of items, and if it requires special software, then we'll get with Marylynn and get you the correct software you need so you can do the same type of reports that she does in her office.

But we'll set the meeting up first. $I'll \ \ wait \ to \ hear \ from \ you.$

MR. FERRETT: The only thing I'd like to say is the bids are going to be opened up next Friday, and I would like to make a recommendation that we have a special meeting on Monday, the 21st, to award the bid so we can move this project forward. Would you prefer making the motion at this time or shall we wait until you have --

MR. SEMENZA: I'd put it in new business.

MR. FERRETT: Also, a few months ago we talked about a stop sign on the corner of Amity and Kohler Avenue. The street commissioner and the chief of police were supposed to look into this matter. My understanding is that the street commissioner had said that he found a way how the stop sign could be put in.

So I would like to put this on the agenda to make a motion that the stop sign be installed on the corner of Amity and Kohler Avenue.

MR. FEBBO: Should that not be a

study by the chief?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: A traffic study was never completed there due to all the issues.

MR. SEMENZA: That's what I thought.

I think we need to go ahead and finish the traffic study. There is a way we can put that in?

MR. PAPI: Yes.

MR. SEMENZA: Are there any other issues with the stop sign in that spot?

MR. PAPI: It just needs the traffic study.

ATTY. RINALDI: You need an ordinance.

MR. SEMENZA: Chief, will you finish the traffic study there, then at our next meeting you can update us.

Anything else, Joe?

MR. FERRETT: Yeah. The only thing
I was wondering, is it very possible that
when we're doing the paving project, since
it's going to be a million-dollar road
paving project, I was just wondering would
it not be a very good idea if we had someone
who is going to represent the borough and

see to it that everything is being done properly and to make sure that we get what we're actually asking for as far as the depth of the macadam and so forth? I was talking to Mr. Cicconne, who's been an old PennDOT man who is well versed on this, and he said he'd be just to glad to do this free of charge, but I told him I don't think that would make sense. But he said if he could get, like, a hundred dollars just for coffee and gas money he would be willing to help the borough out and so forth to keep that on the road to see that everything is done properly.

So I'm just asking council if they think it's a good idea, if they would like to go with this, or how they feel about the idea.

MR. SICCONE: I talked with Joe a few times about it. I would do it for nothing, I mean, just to make sure they're doing what they're supposed to be doing along with the borough engineer and his people. That's up to you guys.

MR. FEBBO: Would that be a conflict

ATTY. RINALDI: If he's volunteering to keep an eye out it doesn't require that.

MR. SEMENZA: We'll discuss it. Any other questions, Joe? Councilman Febbo?

MR. FEBBO: One thing. We met with our environmental protection group, our committee, over the weekend. Joe, myself and Jen. Joe informed us the purpose of the environmental protection committee originally was with the issues with the landfill. Supposedly since that doesn't exist that we don't know about it.

Anyway, what we're trying to do is create a new mission statement. There's a need for that committee to continue. A lot of environmental issues that we still have or foresee in the community here. I worked with Steve on some issues because he knows a lot of things going on with projects on Keyser Avenue that really have to be addressed, junkyards in the area. So there are a lot of environmental issues that we still have and the landfill is still here. It didn't go away.

One of the things that we did get

into, Steve and myself, was the issue on Saint John's Creek. It's not an environmental issue -- it is an environment issue, I should say, with the water running out. Carl addressed us that we have a problem up there with the water situation.

Steve had a suggestion for somebody to do a study on that or somebody that dealt with that. I'd ask you to present to us what you told me this morning.

MR. BIERYLA: Well, I talked with Mike Sands about that. He was down Valley Auto because of the conditions from the Lackawanna River with the dike being taken out. They were looking to possibly do something to stop the river from correlating and going around Panel Prints' old building and then flooding out everybody on the other end.

He was with his supervisor, so I asked him a couple questions about the creek up there, and he suggested that you get can somebody -- I dealt with a person in another town that did a study from Wilkes College -- to just have it delineated or have him come

up and look at it to see if delineation is required before anything is done to remove debris from the creek. So that was what I expressed to Councilman Febbo.

MR. SEMENZA: Remove debris, is what you're saying? I think there's a bigger issue all together. I think it's breaking through --

MR. FEBBO: There's a big pond up there.

MR. SEMENZA: I was sent out there from LLVSA. I let them know the concerns that this guy had. I was working and they said well, let's go. So I went up there with two other guys and we assessed it up there, and it's not an LLVSA problem because no sewer line is exposed, but there is ponding on the right hand side when you're walking in. That whole area is all ponded. We couldn't get back too far because of pickers and everything like that so I don't know where it's breaking through exactly.

MR. PAPI: I checked it out and there's obvious signs of beaver because the trees are cut down. They were bit and fell

out. I don't know if you're even allowed to touch that because once the beaver moves in like that they say environmentally you can't touch.

MR. FEBBO: That being said, we did move forward. We're trying to come up with -- we're going to be working on it.

Our committee is going to be active and we are going to keep it on board and deal with environmental issues.

MR. LENCESKI: I'd like to have a finance meeting Monday, maybe 3:30, or Tuesday at 7:00.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Just a thought, Monday the 21st Councilman Ferrett's requesting a special meeting.

MR. FERRETT: Right.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I can't be here on Monday nights.

MR. LENCESKI: Monday at 3:30. Okay, that's all.

MR. SEMENZA: The only thing I have is for Marylynn. I'd like to set up a meeting with the school district, possibly Danny Mozaleski and the rec board, let them

know what their role is there, that they need a person at the gate and stuff like that because it's got out of hand in the past. If you want to call the rec committee, myself, Councilman Febbo, Councilman Lenceski, you, Dan Mozaleski, maybe Chris Thomas. I don't know who they would want there. They said the school board would have nothing to do with it.

We'll go into public comment. Ann Kania?

MS. KANIA: I see some new faces on the board. You're worried about graffiti on houses and garage doors. How about the decay of houses and the renters? We spoke about this six months. I haven't been here in six months. The neighbor next to me, there was a report on the porch. The BIU guy, whoever he is, inspected the porch and said the porch is usable. Temporary repairs were made. Putting a piece of board on the top of this porch is not going to help this porch.

I have a couple pictures here. This porch is decaying, and this is what I have

to look at that disturbs me, not graffiti, every day that I have to live next door to. I don't know if Mr. Bieryla can get in touch with the owner of this house and get this porch repaired and the house repaired.

There's a couch in front of the -- she took the couch from up the street, she put it in her house for a couple months, now she put it on the curb.

MR. SEMENZA: Are there garbage stickers on it?

MS. KANIA: No. There's a bunch of junk on the porch again. Summer's coming, spring is here. I haven't been here in six months because I'm giving him the benefit of the doubt. Winter he can't do much repairs on the house or whatever, but he hasn't even been here. He put a piece of plywood on the porch. Now, as you see the decay -- and I know it's not a building but it's part of the building. In here it says under a code in the laws, it says "those which have become or so dilapidated, decayed and unsafe." I think that porch is unsafe.

Now, I don't know the BIU guy who

inspected it, but obviously he only looked on top of it. You saw the pictures. Do you agree with me?

MR. SEMENZA: Absolutely it is decaying.

MS. KANIA: I have to look at this every day and you're worried about graffiti? It's this whole town. Has anything been said since I've been here about the landlords? Has anything been said about registering? Giving Steve help to solve this problem in this town?

MR. FEBBO: Yeah, Ann, there is.

MS. KANIA: You're so worried about cutting out cutouts for safety, you have to get these landlords to do something about these houses that are decaying in front of our eyes.

MR. FEBBO: You said you haven't been here in six months. We've been here two months. There's a lot of things being done. Steve is really working -- we're working with Steve on -- you heard his report today. He's a busy man, as is Paul. It's not going to turn the ship around

overnight but we're working on it.

As far as that situation there, I see the porch. Can we take a look at that? Even with you, Paul, being from construction. I don't want to step out of my bounds here. Would you two guys take a look at that and determine whether you think it --

MR. BIERYLA: That's not the proper course. I'll get a hold of Joe, tell him Ms. Kania's concerns. I'll ask him to go down and do a re-inspection since the last time he was there. I'll go down there with him and I'll see what he --

MR. SEMENZA: Steve, when that temporary repair was made did they have a time frame on how long it took to repair?

MR. BIERYLA: No, he just made a temporary repair.

MS. KANIA: He hasn't been in the area. He lives in --

MR. BIERYLA: He said the question before was there was tape around, it wasn't usable. He made that repair. Joe inspected it, he said it was usable. I'll get him

down there once again for reinspection. MR. FEBBO: So you know what you have to do and you handle it, and deal with that couch outside that's there. MR. SEMENZA: Is that out there as MS. KANIA: Right now it's there. MR. BIERYLA: Tomorrow I'll take a MS. KANIA: This girl that lives in this house, she's a menace to the neighborhood. I'm just speaking of people that I've heard. She mooched a thousand

dollars out of another person going to their house and asking them for money. The dog is loose, it's going to the bathroom in the neighbor's across the street. I don't even know if the dog has a license. The lady -it's a nuisance house.

MR. FEBBO: There's a lot of them in

MS. KANIA: Exactly.

MR. FEBBO: But we're working on it. Steve can't put all his energy into one.

He's scattered all over the place. I've been with him and even with Paul, see what they do. It's a mammoth job. There's a lot to be done. Give him a little time. We're working together as a council, and hopefully we'll have some resolutions in the near future. But they will address your issue.

MS. KANIA: I've been going through this for the last four or five years with this guy next door. It's bringing down my property taxes, the value of my property, and it's on the street that you go to the school. Everybody sees that house every day dropping off their kids and I have to live next door to this.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: Was there a committee working on it? You said we've been working on it for two months. I didn't know anyone was working on it.

MR. FEBBO: Pardon me?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I didn't know anyone was working on it.

MS. CORDIANO: Doesn't that fall under long-range capital improvements?

MR. FEBBO: Yes. Steve is out

there, doesn't belong to any committee in here, the zoning officer.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm chairman of long-range capital improvements. I haven't heard one thing about it in months.

MS. KANIA: Has there been any talk about they were supposed to be registering the tenants?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm chairman with Councilman Brown and Councilman Febbo.

Is that what --

MR. BIERYLA: The two houses up from that house have been taken care of. Now we need to get back to her.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: I'm not saying nothing's been taken care of.

MR. BIERYLA: I'm just saying the two houses above her have been taken care of. Now we need to get back on her because she was good for a while and now she's getting out of hand.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: I understand that completely. He said you were working on it for two months and I didn't hear anything in four, five, six months about it.

That's all.

MR. FEBBO: Russ, let me clarify that. I've been talking with Steve since I got on board. I want to know exactly what he's doing -- not at him, I need to know. We need to know. We're new on board. I'm not going to come in here spreading bullets all over the place without knowing what I'm talking about or where we need to go. If I offended you by --

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: No, not at all. I thought there was something he was working on. That's all I asked. I wasn't aware of him working on anything.

MR. FEBBO: He's doing his job according to what we want him to do but it's overwhelming, so it's a priority list.

Again, we thought we had that problem resolved. What Steve has to do is go see the people we hired to do their job to make sure they're doing their job.

MS. KANIA: Who was the BIU guy that did that? Who was the inspector that did that?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: It would have

to be Supulski. Correct?

MR. FEBBO: Ann, again, for the sake of time, we hear you and we will deal with it.

MR. SEMENZA: We'll definitely have him look into it.

MR. BIERYLA: I'll contact Joe, tell him the concerns.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: I thought he took care of that issue.

MS. KANIA: The mailman won't go up. He put the mailbox on the bannister. The girl that lives there, when she's backing up or backing in she hits the porch with her car. So I'm hoping that the porch comes down. Then he's going to have to do something. There's a child in that house. And the dog keeps barking. Every morning at 6:00 the dog keeps barking. I guess I could call the police but by the time they get there, then she brings the dog in. It's just a menace.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I agree with you, I'm sure council agrees with you a hundred percent.

MAYOR MULKERIN: And it's a rental property. Right?

MS. KANIA: Yes. Jack Kelly owns it.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Ann, BIU took me to court last week because I constructed a brand new deck without the correct permit. I thought I had the correct permit when I got my permit to reconstruct my restaurant when we had the accident last year. My deck's brand new and they brought me to court because I didn't have the right permit. I can't believe they're taking this long with that property.

You're right. That porch is about to fall apart. That porch has been like that for years. Maybe the problem is BIU.

MR. LENCESKI: Mr. Chairman, what committee should be taking care of that?

MR. SEMENZA: Possibly public safety for the porch issue, either that or long-range capital improvement. Possibly public safety, too.

MR. FEBBO: Which is the reason why
I got involved with it, because where does

it fall?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bill, where would you say it falls?

ATTY. RINALDI: To me it sounds like a public safety issue of the building.

MR. BROWN: Are we talking about Ann's house specifically or the whole issue --

MR. SEMENZA: The neighbor's house.

MR. BROWN: The neighbor's house specifically or are you concerned with the overall dilapidated housing?

MS. KANIA: Of course I want the next-door neighbor, but this whole town needs to be helped. There are a lot of houses in town that are dilapidated.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: It doesn't even need to fall under a committee. That's why we have a zoning officer and a zoning department. So I don't think it needs to fall under any committee. He has the authority to do whatever means necessary to violate, fine. Correct? So I don't think it has to fall under any committee.

MS. CORDIANO: But I think how we

got on the committee is we're going to nuisance properties. What would nuisance properties fall under? We really don't have a defined --

MR. FEBBO: Again, which is why I took it upon myself to get proactive and get involved with Steve.

MAYOR MULKERIN: Wasn't there discussion last year or the past two years in forming a committee?

MR. RUSSICK: There are buildings falling down, garages falling down.

MR. BROWN: I took pictures of all the properties, I brought it to multiple council meetings.

MR. RUSSICK: I've been coming here since 1998. Subsequent to that I was told on several occasion we only enforce the code on complaint. I have your book. I went through that book several times. I could never find that paragraph. Could somebody tell me in what section I could find where you only enforce the code on complaint?

MR. SEMENZA: If we don't know about it how are we going to enforce it?

MR. RUSSICK: Everybody in here is a zoning officer to help him. If you see something out there you tell him. The police see something, chances are it's in his jurisdiction. We got to take pride in our town. You get somebody in here that's never been here before you'd be surprised how fast they pick up on these things.

MR. SEMENZA: Joe, it's not only Old Forge. There are towns across the United States that have issues. You're making it sound like you're embarrassed to bring people to Old Forge. It's not only Old Forge. It's every town across the country that has issues.

MR. RUSSICK: What you're saying is because everybody else is wrong we have to be wrong.

MR. SEMENZA: No, I'm not saying that. Absolutely I'm not saying that.

You're putting words in my mouth, Joe.

MR. RUSSICK: Why not take charge of our town?

MR. SEMENZA: BIU is inspecting -we retain a company called BIU. They do our
inspections for us. This gentleman went to
that place, inspected it. It met up with
the standards.

MS. KANIA: How can that --

MR. SEMENZA: Listen, I'm not the inspector. I'm sorry. I'm just saying that we pay an inspection company to do inspections for us. Listen, nobody more than me wants this town cleaned up from Dilapidated buildings or anything like that. I am not against that one bit. We hire a company to come up and inspect for us. Their inspection findings were that it was to code and it was all right.

MR. RUSSICK: Is it code now?

MS. KANIA: How did that get --

MR SEMENZA: Mr. Bieryla will contact them and send them out again.

MS. KANIA: That didn't happen overnight.

MR. SEMENZA: I can't answer that.

I don't know. I'm not an inspector.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Then we should

send the inspector back down again, as
Chairman Semenza stated and I stated and
Councilman Febbo. We did hire that company,
which has been hired with us for years.
They went down, they inspected it.

This is only my personal opinion.

By me looking at it, it doesn't look like it could pass inspection. But if the company we hired went down there, inspected it and said it's inspected to standard, well, then, we have to take their report on it. That's what we did. I'm agreeing. I don't think it would pass inspection.

MR. FEBBO: Let me jump in. Since, supposedly, Steve is out there on a raft by himself, doesn't belong to any committees, we're all saying where does he belong, where does he fall in. I'm going to ask

Mr. Semenza for permission to work with

Mr. Bieryla because I do -- and I've been answering to you, Bobby. I actually tell you everything we've been doing, keeping abreast. This complaint you're getting, we're hearing it tonight for the first time in six months. We thought it was resolved.

He's working on a lot of other issues. I guarantee you we'll make sure we work on that immediately to get some sort of solution or resolution.

MR. SEMENZA: We'll set up a committee and we'll go from there.

MR. LENCESKI: With the rec board, we have a committee on the rec board and it does very well. Mr. Semenza is the chairman of it, going on his third year. We have three council members. The problem a lot of times is that when I mention committees, we can't all meet together because of the Sunshine Act. Therefore, we can't discuss these problems. Yet, with the rec board we have three members of council and we have nine people who represent different organizations in the borough. We meet monthly, every month, discuss the problems that we have and we try to come up with solutions.

Is it possible to create a committee? Mr. Russick knows a lot about codes. Get people from Mrs. Kania, other people want to be involved and try to come

up with solutions because we all went to fix these problems. We don't want to argue. We put some money in the budget to get Steve help. We just need to sit down and work together. And that's the problem. Council can't sit down together unless it's at a meeting, then the meetings last too long and nothing ever gets done. We start bickering with each other and everybody leaves kind of upset.

MR. SEMENZA: So you're saying create a board?

MR. LENCESKI: Yeah, and let the community be involved. People that care.

The people that are here are the people who care. Like Joe said, we're all responsible.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I think that's a pretty good idea.

MR. SEMENZA: Why doesn't everybody think about it and at our next meeting we'll talk about it.

MR. QUINLAN: Bill Quinlan, 268

Drake. I think that's a fantastic idea.

Like Councilman Lenceski said, you guys can

only accomplish so much here in three hours.

You have other functions to do. If you get some other people around -- say everybody here wants to help. We can't do anything without your say so, but at least you'd at least have a little bit of a sounding board to help you organize your thoughts when meeting night comes.

MR. SEMENZA: We will definitely talk about that in the next coming meetings. Just one thing that would scare me about constructing a board -- and I'm not saying it would happen but I don't know. I would just be afraid that people would interfere too much with Steve's job.

MR. FEBBO: More like an advisory board.

MR. SEMENZA: I understand, but all too often things happen with people trying to take control and go and do things. I've seen it happen in the past. It would have to be the right people chosen to sit on the board. It's definitely a great idea.

MR. LENCESKI: But the rec board works.

MR. FEBBO: Let's start with three members of council willing to put the effort and time into it, then use a screening process to bring on people from the community that feel they could contribute in a worthwhile way, with the understanding that the ultimate decisions are made by council.

MR. SEMENZA: All right. Joe, you're up to the podium.

MR. RUSSICK: If you have an advisory board they have no power. It's just that, advisory. You're the people that have the power because you're delegated by code to protect the health, the safety and welfare and the environment of our citizens.

MR. SEMENZA: What I'm saying is somebody on that board is a little nutty and somebody calls him -- like Paul calls me, I'm on that board, he says Mr. Semenza, I know you're on the board for that committee and I know this house. All the sudden you got this guy down in somebody's back yard

taking pictures of their porch. We don't want stuff like that.

MR. RUSSICK: I'm very proud of my town. Insofar as Mr. Febbo's concerned, the environmental committee, that's a great thing because that's like a sleeping giant in this town. If you go on the EPA website you have Lehigh Electric with the PCBs.

There's hot spots down there.

MR. BIERYLA: That land is for sale and the county didn't tell anybody it's a super site.

MR. RUSSICK: Last meeting, if you remember, I asked about reports, and it's ironic it's in the Sunday paper. We had a website at one time.

MS. BARTOLETTI: It's just down because it's being rebuilt.

MR. RUSSICK: The bottom line is we need the information out there. That generates interest. You want them to know what you're doing down here in our town.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I just want it to be public. That report that was done in the paper, part of it was very deceiving because

they made it seem like they weren't offered anything. The minutes that the reporter named Pete Cameron, the minutes that he insisted on were minutes that council had not approved yet. Can't have those because they're not approved yet. He came, looked at everything else. We offered him any of the books we have. They're all in a big Look at any of it. Here's the agendas, here's everything that we have. But because we wouldn't let him see minutes that were not approved yet -- to be quite honest, we didn't even have them yet. because we wouldn't let him see minutes that council hadn't approved yet he became very annoyed.

See, that's part of why we're

very -- I, myself, am very leery about how I

treat the press because they have a very bad

habit of twisting whatever words they're

told and making it fit how they want it to

fit.

Another reason I want to tell. In December, when we were about to pass our budget, the newspaper kept calling. They

wanted to know about our budget, and I said it's going to be passed. Here's the meeting, you're welcome to come to it. No, send us the budget. Come to the meeting, you'll hear the whole thing. You'll hear the explanation. All we want to know is if there's a tax increase. We don't bother with the boroughs that aren't increasing taxes. That just tells you.

MR. RUSSICK: They have an agenda.

If we had a website you'd get on there and refute that.

MS. BARTOLETTI: We had people who congratulated us because they're so fed up with the media.

MR. RUSSICK: By the way, our borough engineer is doing an outstanding job. These are the best reports.

MR. CROSSIN: Michael Crossin. I'm here tonight, I've got an issue on the street that I live on. I addressed it with a number of people -- and I won't go into detail -- but it regards speeding. I live on East Morton Street. Unfortunately, there's no speeding signs up on the blocks

anymore. I don't know what happened to them. But they're traveling way in excess of 40, 50 miles an hour. You try to walk out in the street to get in your vehicle, cars come flying by you. You try to pull out or back into your driveway, you look, there's no car. Next time you look there's a vehicle right there waiting for you to get out of the way. You know, these cars are flying.

I've asked something be done. They don't even stop at the stop sign at Ann Street and Morton. They keep driving back past it. Years ago I guess there was another ingress and egress onto Taroli Street, off one of those side roads which was shut down, I understand. But it's the only way in and out. They don't care. Young kids, old, in between. Something has to be done.

MR. SEMENZA: Is there a certain time of the day it happens more often than not?

 $$\operatorname{MR.}$$ CROSSIN: It's all times of the day.

MAYOR MULKERIN: If you can get in touch with the chief.

MR. CROSSIN: First of all, you have to get signage back up.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: There used to be signs there because we used to calibrate our VASCAR machine on East Morton.

MR. CROSSIN: I think one blew down by Ann Street facing eastbound on Morton. I suggest that maybe if you make the intersection of Sue Court and Morton Street a three-way stop sign that would stop them racing.

MR. SEMENZA: I've been down there and I've seen it.

MR. CROSSIN: We need enforcement down there. We need to put a stop to it or slow them down.

MAYOR MULKERIN: I know you said it's any time of the day. We can send officers down there, but if you could give specific help because then we can have an officer down there a specific time. Taroli is bad between 3:00 and 5:00, 3:30 and 5:30. So we don't want to put an officer there at

1:00.

Unfortunately, a stop sign can't be used to control speed.

MR. CROSSIN: It certainly can.

MR. PAPI: No, it can't. One of the first things in the code about stop signs.

MR. CROSSIN: They don't stop at the stop sign at Ann Street so why are they going to stop at another stop sign. Is the police around? No. That's all I have to say.

MR. SEMENZA: Could we possibly do a study there and possibly put police presence in that area?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I'll take a ride tomorrow.

MR. SEMENZA: Mike, stay in touch with the chief, try and get some times.

MAYOR MULKERIN: We'll absolutely have an officer down there.

MR. SEMENZA: It's not only your street, it's every street.
