MR. SEMENZA: The chair would entertain a motion to prepare an ordinance for Lawrence Street to be a two-way street.

MR. NOTARI: We'll have to advertise this ordinance. Right?

ATTY. RINALDI: That's what I'm saying.

MR. NOTARI: We're going to spend money to advertise for an ordinance that the street's already two ways.

MS. BARTOLETTI: But it's not official.

MR. SEMENZA: The ordinance is one way. It would have to be done at one point in time anyway.

ATTY. RINALDI: Unless I know at the work session that you guys want to change the street you don't have enough days to get the ad in.

MR. SEMENZA: I'm putting it under new business.

MR. FEBBO: Is that what we want to do, make it a two-way street?

MR. SEMENZA: It's up to everybody. Either vote yes or no.

ATTY. RINALDI: You can think about it for two weeks until the next regular meeting because I have to put the ad in. You can even think about it for the work session. I'm not going to do an ad until the work session.

MR. FEBBO: We went from 2007 until now.

MR. NOTARI: Hold off a month, maybe we can talk to some people that live on that street or utilize the church, see what they think?

MR. FEBBO: I think that would be a wise idea. They're the ones coping with it.

MR. NOTARI: The chief will be back then, too.

MR. FEBBO: He had some input last time.

MR. NOTARI: I think he does want it to remain two ways. I'd like to hear it from him.

MR. FEBBO: I'd like to table that until next meeting.

MR. SEMENZA: That's fine. Anything else, Marylynn?

. .

MS. BARTOLETTI: No.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Marylynn?

MR. FEBBO: I'm a little confused over here because we just got the papers today. It says that the payment for Pennsy's application was \$818,000, and I understand that, according to Dave, they got a retainage of \$90,000. Am I to understand very clearly that the paving program was approximately \$910,000 or something of that nature?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

MR. FERRETT: Dave, I'm a little disappointed at you because of the fact that we're in charge of paving and you didn't even say nothing. We could have added on another five more streets.

MR. LOPATKA: You knew exactly what it was.

MS. BARTOLETTI: We discussed it.

He did say that we were going to be --

MR. LOPATKA: I said you had extra money. Nobody said they wanted more streets at that time. I said do you want to add

MR. FERRETT: What I'm saying is we were in charge -- me, Joe and what's his name -- and we reported to council and we knew nothing about this and everybody else

MR. LOPATKA: No, I brought it up at a meeting that you had extra money.

MR. LENCESKI: You just weren't

MR. FERRETT: I apologize.

MS. BARTOLETTI: We got the money anyway. We did receive the full million

Mare, any word MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: on the street lights?

MS. BARTOLETTI: On your invoices, on the invoice list tonight, I believe it's on here. The first invoice under PPL for \$4,260, that's the invoice. Once we get that paid we go right into the rotation to get in line to get the lights done.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That's the first one, right at the top?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. Usually

utilities get paid without going in front of council, but because this one is for something other than the actual use of the lighting I wanted it in front of council.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So once we pay that, then they will start?

 $\mbox{MS. BARTOLETTI:} \quad \mbox{Once they schedule} \\ \mbox{it.} \\$

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else for Marylynn? Thanks, Marylynn. At this time we'll go down the table, see if any councilmen have anything to report.

MR. NOTARI: I don't have anything to report but I'll have stuff for new business. I'll go. The children at play sign that was requested for the corner of Alicia and Grace by John Bartikowski, last time I drove by there -- I thought we said for Paul to go ahead and put one there.

MR. PAPI: I don't know anything about it. Was it at the last meeting? I was on vacation.

MS. BARTOLETTI: A couple meetings ago.

MR. PAPI: Right there on top of the

hill, on the right? Okay. Children at play?

MR. NOTARI: Children at play; slow, children at play; watch, children at play, whatever. Whatever we have.

MR. PAPI: Yellow or the high visual green?

MR. SEMENZA: Put the high visual green up, Paul. Paul, maybe we can take a look around the town and see which ones are up but starting to fade away.

MR. PAPI: Usually the ones that are worn out are the children are grown up and they're gone.

MR. NOTARI: Couple other things. I was in Moosic last week for work at a meeting and they brought up an ordinance regarding mini cell towers, that cell companies are applying to the PUC to be recognized as a public utility so they're able to put up these mini cell towers anywhere they want on telephone poles, including neighborhoods.

So Moosic was going to look to see if they would be able to come up with an

addendum to their cell tower ordinance to prevent that.

I don't know if that was something that we would want to look into as well to try to prevent that from happening. You know, so companies can't come in and put a mini cell tower anywhere they want. So that's something maybe we can think about. Bill, any recommendations on that?

MR. SEMENZA: Can you even take a look into --

ATTY. RINALDI: Are you saying they're attaching something to the utility pole standing?

MR. NOTARI: From what I took away from the meeting was that the cell companies are applying to become public utility companies, and when they're granted that right they're then allowed to place these mini cell towers on utility poles without any approval or go ahead from the municipalities, as opposed to a regular cell tower. It has to be in a certain zoned area and you need to get approved from planning and whatnot.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: They also save a ton of money because usually they go on private property and they pay the person.

If they put it on that pole they save a fortune and they make a fortune.

MR. PAPI: The pole belongs to PPL.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Well, PPL probably doesn't charge them like a landowner would. If you drive right up to Taylor, Gaughan Auto Store has them all over his building. So they pay him to put them on his building.

MR. PAPI: They're on this building, too, next to the borough building.

MR. NOTARI: That's something we can look into.

ATTY. RINALDI: I have to see if it conflicts with the federal -- I think there's a cell phone tower act that we went to court over in federal court which trumps a lot of that because the court -- it was Global. It never went up.

MR. PAPI: The zoning board denied the cell tower. They took us to court and beat us and they put it up on the top of

MR. SEMENZA: Their records are supposed to be public, aren't they? You can walk in there, request the records.

ATTY. RINALDI: They're supposed to be filed anyway with the state. Otherwise, you can't raise funds.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I think if you guys told them that this is what you want, even if you --

ATTY. RINALDI: You can only ask them what the status says.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I know you're very much entitled to ask them for an explanation of how the money that we give them was spent.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do we give that to them more or less out of donation? Are we required to give it to them?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No. What we are required to do is they're required -- because they are volunteer we are required to pay for their workman's comp insurance. We pay workman's comp insurance to protect them at the scene of a fire for all three companies. We also pay for insurance on all

ATTY. RINALDI: You can request that they provide an itemized listing of all expenditures of the funds before the borough considers budgeting additional funding to the organization. So you can say what did you use the money for last year --

MR. SEMENZA: Well, we're doing the budget right now, so we want to know.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Mare, let's say they don't provide it for us. We can't make -- could we make them provide it, Bill?

MS. BARTOLETTI: You can withhold the money.

ATTY. RINALDI: Just withhold the money.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That was going to be my question after that. I would say we definitely don't give them any money --

ATTY. RINALDI: I know we tried this once before.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I say we stick to our guns and don't give them nothing, then. If they're not going to give us a report --

MS. BARTOLETTI: The only reason why

it wasn't done that way is because it seemed like it was going to turn into a war, and they are volunteer. No one wanted to take any chances on leaving the people unprotected.

MR. NOTARI: I don't think we make that threat yet. I think we ask.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Two companies are going to be very cooperative, one company is absolutely not cooperative. I think sometimes you guys don't understand that for something that should be the easiest thing in the world is not. You saw the situation over a simple little changing of light fixtures that ended up costing \$15 each.

MR. BIERYLA: They came back and said they were a little bit more money. It was the wrong one. Still in all, \$22,000, it's \$30, \$40 for four of them.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Forty apiece dollars.

MS. BARTOLETTI: After that the whole deal was Steve went to the fire company to discuss this scenario of being a public safety issue, shortly after that I

was called by one of the members of that company insisting that he was going to be at the meeting tonight to make a big stink and to tell council basically what they thought of the fact that they were told that they must change those light fixtures there.

MR. FEBBO: Mare, on that factor with the firehouse, didn't we say we were going to check into the lease agreement with them?

MS. BARTOLETTI: At some point, yes.

MR. SEMENZA: Council Rinaldi?

 $\label{eq:mr.RUSSEL RINALDI: No, I don't} % \begin{center} \begi$

MR. FERRETT: The only thing I want to just bring to council's attention is the fact that I plan on getting together with the paving committee and the borough manager and see if we can sit down and come up with a plan and present it to council for the coming year because Dave said he doesn't have too much work.

MR. LENCESKI: Nothing at this time.

MR. FEBBO: I'd like to meet with the DPW committee -- Joe Lenceski, Joe

Ferrett and myself -- to get together there.

Mare, are you going to address that?

MS. BARTOLETTI: It's on the agenda.

MR. FEBBO: How about the Mariotti land? How are we going to approach that? We were at the planning meeting last night and Mariottis were here to donate a parcel of land for the Heritage Trail. They would like to expedite it and have it done by December 1st.

MR. BIERYLA: The only process they missed was getting it to Dave for any comment.

MR. FEBBO: That being said, Dave, did you have a chance to look at it or would you have any opposition to us voting on that this evening?

MR. LOPATKA: On what?

ATTY. RINALDI: It hasn't even gone through planning yet.

MR. LOPATKA: It's not approved through planning. It has to go back to planning on December 1st.

ATTY. RINALDI: The morning of the 2nd you're going to know if it's approved.

The president can call a meeting for -- you need a one-day notice, so you can have a special meeting before the work session on the 1st -- 6th.

MS. BARTOLETTI: You can turn the work session into the special meeting.

MR. FEBBO: Can we do that?

ATTY. RINALDI: Yes. Just wait and make sure planning --

MR. SEMENZA: Is time of the essence for this?

MR. FEBBO: Yeah.

MR. SEMENZA: Why is that?

MR. LOPATKA: They need to close by the end of the year on this piece of property.

MR. SEMENZA: Who?

MR. LOPATKA: The Mariottis are donating this piece of property to Rails to Trails, so I guess they had some kind of date stipulation on when they need to close it by.

MR. SEMENZA: Lackawanna County?

MR. FEBBO: Mariottis.

MR. LOPATKA: The agreement that

they have has to close by the end of the year.

 $\mbox{MS. BARTOLETTI: We're not holding} \label{eq:ms.bartoletti}$ them up.

MR. LOPATKA: This just came up last meeting. I said to them I never saw it.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?

MR. FEBBO: No.

MR. SEMENZA: I have nothing. We'll go to public comment. James Tagliaferri?

MR. TAGLIAFERRI: Good evening. I brought pictures on my phone. Basically, I was glad to hear Steve's looking at properties throughout the town. I didn't really know you guys were look at things as closely as youse are. I live on Oak Street and I've been there 25 years, 30 years. I can't take it anymore. The Chelland building is falling apart. You guys, I'm sure you've all driven by it, and you probably drive by it like this.

MR. SEMENZA: It's been a topic here, too.

MR. TAGLIAFERRI: I can't take it anymore. The other thing, too, across the

street is the Sambo's building. There's a hole in it, there was already a fire in there a few years back. Rodents, cats.

There's a window hanging there. Somebody walking by and that window is going to hit somebody. There was debris -- I think the reason why the last one got ripped down was because it was a public safety issue, and we're at that point.

I just wanted to pass my phone around. There's a few pictures. This one here you can see the windows up top.

They're already hanging out. I didn't take any of Sambo's. Just scroll through.

MR. SEMENZA: Steve, Sambo's, are you familiar with it?

MR. BIERYLA: Next on the list.

There's another one right next to the old

Febbo's and the garage. There's a garage

there coming up the alley. Those two are

next on the list.

MR. SEMENZA: That and Sambo's?
MR. BIERYLA: Yes.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: What can we do to it? Condemn it?

we have three within that area.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The second one down. You're not talking about Chelland's.

MR. BIERYLA: Not right now, no.

ATTY. RINALDI: What's dangerous about it?

MR. SEMENZA: The pane glass window in the front of Sambo's.

ATTY. RINALDI: So the window's got to be boarded up.

MR. SEMENZA: The building's tilted on this side.

ATTY. RINALDI: You have to have the engineer look at it. You can't just say it's dangerous because it looks dangerous.

You need somebody to say it's got to come down.

MR. SEMENZA: BIU?

ATTY. RINALDI: You can send BIU, you can send Dave. If the only thing you can do is tear the building down, then that's --

MR. BIERYLA: Let's forget about dangerous building and just go underneath the nuisance, because if it's a nuisance

to -- 229-4, if it's a nuisance to the neighbors and it's a nuisance to the neighborhood, then we can have him either repair it or --

MR. SEMENZA: If there are rats, possums, thing like that, that's a nuisance.

MR. BIERYLA: Go right to the nuisance, 229-4. That will set you right up that you don't have to have anybody look at it.

MR. TAGLIAFERRI: Can't we have it inspected anyway? Wouldn't it be better under dangerous buildings?

MR. BIERYLA: Either one. It all depends which --

MR. NOTARI: Can we address it with both? Why don't we start with nuisance, if he could, then let Dave take a look at it and go dangerous.

MR. SEMENZA: I know we've talked about Chelland's on numerous occasions, and I know there were some issues there why we couldn't really just even set foot on the property.

ATTY. RINALDI: I don't know about

that.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Who would do the inspection?

MR. LOPATKA: We have structural engineers.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Why don't we just do both? When can you do the inspection?

MR. LOPATKA: Anytime.

MR. PAPI: They guy next door wanted to buy it in the worst way, Wilchinski, and she just wouldn't sell it to him.

ATTY. RINALDI: Too many liens on it.

MR. TAGLIAFERRI: I offered her money for the corner lot years and years ago. I offered more than what she ended up selling it for. She told me no. She wanted a hundred-some thousand dollars. Out of her mind. Right now she's just being stubborn.

MR. PAPI: We condemned it because of health reasons, not structural. It was full of -- 40-some cats we got out of there.

MR. SEMENZA: At this point right now it is condemned?

1	MR. BIERYLA: It's unsafe. Somebody
2	took the sign down.
3	MR. SEMENZA: Could anybody access
4	that if it's being unsafe, like the
5	homeowner, the person who owns it? Can they
6	access the inside of that building.
7	MR. GRECO: They were going in and
8	feeding the cats.
9	MR. SEMENZA: I mean legally.
10	MR. BIERYLA: Legally it's unsafe.
11	Why is it unsafe? Because the structure on
12	the inside of it.
13	MR. SEMENZA: The person that owns
14	that, can they access that?
15	MR. BIERYLA: They shouldn't.
16	Nobody should be going in there.
17	MR. PAPI: There's no water, there's
18	no heat.
19	MR. SEMENZA: Then why is the
20	building still standing?
21	ATTY. RINALDI: Who unboarded it?
22	MR. PAPI: I think their son the
23	nephew. I saw him
24	MR. SEMENZA: How do we go to work
25	to get this building taken down?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Send Dave in there first.

MR. PAPI: We paid for it last time. It cost us \$19,000 and I think we recouped some money from Wilchinski. Nine grand, maybe.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I don't think the borough got any money back.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: I thought we got back nine or ten grand myself.

ATTY. RINALDI: That lien is still out there. He couldn't get enough even with -- there was still so much owed on it in taxes.

MS. BARTOLETTI: No matter what we did or anyone else did it was still way too expensive. So he was asking the borough to forgive the liens on that property.

ATTY. RINALDI: We might have waived some of the interest but kept the cost.

It's accruing interest.

MS. BARTOLETTI: But he wasn't able to purchase it.

MR. SEMENZA: How do we start?

Dave, can we send you guys there to take a

look?

MR. LOPATKA: Sure.

MR. SEMENZA: The other two

properties also.

ATTY. RINALDI: You can cite her for -- if she's not boarding up the windows, you're not going to get her to court for that. You can just fine her, fine her. She's never going to pay it. She doesn't have any money, so then it's going to ultimately come down to the borough making the decision to go forward with spending money, putting it out to bid, going through the legal process of them tearing it down, putting a lien on it. Go the cheap way and put the fines on her for now.

MR. STASSI: The reason I'm here tonight is for the CDBG money. If you pass the resolution you can use some of that money for demolition. It's not my expertise. I've been out on sites -- we have two houses in Mayfield that's going to come down under CDBG.

MR. NOTARI: You can definitely use it to get rid of blight. We would have to

own the property. You can use it to clean up blight. You definitely can. But we would have to own the property.

MR. STASSI: You do the demolition and you put a lien against the house. When the property's sold you get the money.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That's what we did on the Chelland property.

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, it's not. Different type of grant.

ATTY. RINALDI: We used the borough's money.

MS. BARTOLETTI: But there was a \$100,000 grant that the borough had sitting, and we were able to use a small amount of that grant money to pay for part of that.

That was not CDBG money.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: What I meant was if we were to knock this building down, go through all the steps and we pay to knock it down, if it cost \$20,000 we would put a \$20,000 lien on it. If the property ever got sold we would recoup our money.

MS. BARTOLETTI: You heard what Rick said. You have to own the property in order

to use CDBG money on it.

MR. NOTARI: You do. You can't use CDBG to purchase the property.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: If we took \$20,000 out of the landfill account and knocked it down we could use our own money, knock it down, put a lien on it, and if it ever gets sold, get our money back. Then we don't have to own anything. We can use our own money from the landfill account.

ATTY. RINALDI: If, you know -MR. SEMENZA: Why don't we start by

sending Dave in.

MR. TAGLIAFERRI: In the meantime -I know this all moves a little slow. In the
meantime we need the borough or somebody to
go and clean it. They got to clean the
sidewalks. You can't pass. My
father-in-law comes to visit me, he has to
walk in the street. And it's not only the
bushes. The weeds are this high in the
sidewalk. And it should be boarded. The
windows need to be taken down or do
something in the meantime because it will

take a long time to get this thing torn down. It's not going to happen overnight. But I'd like to see some type of repetitive care at least in front.

MR. FEBBO: Over the course of the summer, when it was all grown in, we talked about that, sending in the summer crew that Paul had working with him, but because of the legal ramifications we were not allowed to use them in there. We discussed that at length.

I think the only approach that we can take is what we're talking about this evening. Take those steps for both the weeds and the building.

MR. TAGLIAFERRI: What if somebody gets hurt?

ATTY. RINALDI: It's their property.

Private property. The only person that can
go on private property is the zoning officer
under the law. Anybody else we'd have to
get a warrant.

MR. TAGLIAFERRI: What if you were to get a letter from the owner allowing you to do that? She might be agreeable to that.

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- .

MR. SEMENZA: No.

ATTY. RINALDI: There was mortgages on those properties, too. Old Forge Bank had mortgages on those. You're putting a lien on it, you're not going to get the value out of it. I think that's what happened over there. It was the value on top of the mortgage.

MR. NOTARI: Who's paying the taxes on the property?

MR. GRECO: They're not being paid.

I don't think so.

MR. BIERYLA: They're not being paid within two years it would be up to the sheriff --

MR. PAPI: See Gary Propersi.

ATTY. RINALDI: That's why I think there's a mortgage, too. You buy it at tax sale, you still have to deal with the mortgage that's on the property, and she probably hasn't paid that in -- there was a mortgage there. That's why the other guy couldn't buy it.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?

MR. TAGLIAFERRI: No. I appreciate

your time.

MR. SEMENZA: At this time we'll go to new business. Mare, how do I state this first motion? 2016 community develop block grant, CDBG fund, \$89,780.

It's the resolution of the Borough of Old Forge authorizing the Board of Commissioners, Lackawanna County to submit an application for federal fiscal year 2015 Community Development Block Grant Program fund in the amount of \$89,780 on behalf of Old Forge Borough.

MR. NOTARI: I'll make that motion.

MR. SEMENZA: By Councilman Notari.

MR. FEBBO: I'll second that motion.

MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by Councilman Febbo. On the question?

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: Are we just receiving that money and putting it somewhere for now?

MR. SEMENZA: Right now we're putting it into --

MS. BARTOLETTI: They don't give it to us. They hold it until we come up with a suitable project.

MR. STASSI: Right now we're going to put it in rehab housing for you. It's going to be a holding place until you decide what youse want to do.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. Housing rehab is what you're approving now, but it's not going to stay there because we have a different plan. But because there isn't an actual plan in place it has to go somewhere.

MR. SEMENZA: That's standard until we find a qualifying project. Roll call, please.
