belong to the borough and they're telling people to contact the borough building, and between myself and Ann Marie and Sandy I can't tell you the abuse that we're taking from these people. Threatening. It's out of control.

MR. FERRETT: I agree with you as far as abuse, but the understanding is, from what I understand from years back, after X number years, 35 years, something like that, the borough would have the right to take over these projects. We're not in that kind of business to go into real estate, but somehow some entity can take this over and we can get something out of this. We're not doing nothing.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Here's what we were told when we meet with them. Same situation as in Old Forge was in Olyphant -- Archbald, and they had the same argument as Old Forge Borough and they ended up taking them to court, and Lackawanna County won and Archbald ended up having to pay to get all the roads done. It was the exact same scenario. The last item that was supposed

to get done and was never finished.

So what they're trying to say is the way Archbald lost in court, Old Forge would also lose in court because they have the same exact issues. That's where it's --

MR. FEBBO: At the end of the day we are going to eventually end up taking over the paving?

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, you're plowing them now.

MR. FERRETT: You don't know this.

You're only guessing at the idea that this is what's going to happen. Don't try to convince things that this could happen, this can't happen. Get the document, read the document, see what it says, then make a decision or have something to say about it.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Are liquid fuels being collected on that road?

MR. SEMENZA: Yeah.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Why? We're collecting liquid fuels? Have we always collected them?

ATTY. RINALDI: I have no idea and I don't know why.

They proposed naming those streets Apollo and Eisenhower and the borough signed off.

There's no deed saying here's the roads. No deed on file, no dedication saying here's the roads, the borough accepts the roads.

The only thing the borough did was name them, for whatever reason. I don't know why it was done that way.

MR. FERRETT: Also in the deed it stipulates the fact that --

ATTY. RINALDI: There is no deed.

MR. FERRETT: No, that the county would give the borough X number of dollars for the people that live on those roads to get stickers so the borough would pick up the garbage and the borough would get some slight benefit out of this whole situation. That's been taken away from us by the county.

ATTY. RINALDI: We don't pick up the garbage. It doesn't cost us anything. It really doesn't cost us anything. We just never got the roads to incorporate within the borough.

MR. FERRETT: I'm sorry, let me

retract my statement. In the resolution was the fact that the county would give every family X number of stickers so that they would be able to put on for whoever was picking up the garbage.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Why would you want that? We don't make any money on those stickers, so why would you want that?

ATTY. RINALDI: I haven't seen that.

That's not in the agreement. We don't pick up the garbage anyway.

MR. SEMENZA: Joe, we don't even plow the roads at Eisenhower and Apollo.

MR. FERRETT: So why do we want to take the roads over, then? Why would you want to take the roads over if you just got finished saying you're not plowing or doing anything?

MR. SEMENZA: We're collecting liquid fuels money on it.

MR. FERRETT: No matter what you say, we should go to work and give all those people that live on all those streets, we should give them whatever services they want, but don't worry about the people in

Old Forge? Is that what you're trying to say, that we should do this now when we're not plowing the streets?

MR. SEMENZA: We just did a million dollar paving project for the people in Old Forge. Three more streets. I mean, I don't know.

BARTOLETTI: Joe, I think everybody agrees with you that ultimately no one wanted to take over the roads, but Lackawanna County Housing refuses to do The threat has been that they anvthing. would take the borough to court to prove we are the owners of the streets, and I think that several months ago, when council decided to have Bill work toward taking over these roads, it was just to come to a final That the roads will get done once and end. for all. The money that would pay for it would be the county money, the CDBG money, which is for low income anyway. So it was basically finding a good project to use that money for.

MR. SEMENZA: Joe, even though them people live in Lackawanna County housing and

we don't get money out of it, we don't get cash money or anything, they're still people in our community and they still spend money in our community. They still live in our community, Joe, and I think they're basically entitled to have roads paved where they live. I mean, that's my personal opinion.

MR. FERRETT: The regulation is,
Bobby, if you don't own the road, you don't
pave the road.

MR. SEMENZA: Right.

MR. FERRETT: Just because people live on the road doesn't necessarily mean that they have to get their roads paved. They're not taxpayers.

MR. SEMENZA: Right. That's why it hasn't been paved to this point, Joe.

ATTY. RINALDI: We're not paving it unless we own it.

MR. FERRETT: I understand that, but my point to you is why are you going after the idea that you want to take these roads over? You guys do whatever you want. I'm only one vote.

agreement says after they build it they will dedicate the roads and improvements to the borough. Now, they never did and they should have done it in the 1970's. So even if we went to court it's going to be well, sorry, Judge. We didn't deed it over. We're going to give them the deed now. Case over.

MR. FERRETT: No, we just got finished with a situation up at Rosemount. The borough went to work and said they were going to take over these roads, but because the solicitor at that time didn't go to court and because the owner of Rosemount didn't dedicate these roads to Old Forge, and what happens?

ATTY. RINALDI: I'll go the other way for you. I don't have a problem with it, but it's what you want to -- the problem was we had CDGB money. We'll take the roads and we'll pave them with that money. It wasn't costing the borough anything. I can say we're not going to use the CDBG money and go pave them yourself and dedicate them

later.

MR. FEBBO: That's one of the few things we can do with that money.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Right, because it's low income.

MR. FERRETT: It's not one of the few things because in the past we always used CDBG money for the separation of storm water from sanitary. We done a great job in this town with all the areas that we done, and there's another area that has to be done. You're going to find out that sooner or later it's going to be mandatory that you separate the storm water from sanitary water, and there's one area down on Drake's Lane that hasn't been done yet.

MR. BARTOLETTI: You don't know if that fits into the scenario because it has to be low income. They would still have to come in and do all of their surveys. But I think the bottom line of the paving is that everyone at this table for the most part felt that that is still part of the town. And if it is true what Bill is saying, that eventually we're going to be forced to take

over those roads, why would you want such eyesores? They're eyesores and they're not passable. And Kohler Avenue especially, and we're getting that one done. But that's a connector road to other roads.

ATTY. RINALDI: The county is saying listen, pave them before we take them over because they're terrible. You can lobby them for that. I don't think they're going to get it from you, personally, but you can try.

MR. FERRETT: Okay, based on what you just got finished saying, that if everybody sitting at this table seems to be in full agreement with it, then you know what? Do what you have to do and there will only be one out of seven that's going to disagree and you have nothing to worry about. That's not a problem.

But I'll tell you what, when something happens, people look in the book, they're going to say one guy did have something to say. You people do what youse want. I'm not telling youse what to do.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I'm just trying to

explain.

MR. FERRETT: I understand, but I know how things have been in this town all the while. We don't pave nothing unless we take it over. What is the reason why you want to take over something that the county owns that's getting all the benefits? We don't even have one person working in that town -- working for that -- for the town hall -- yeah, I know. All right. I'm one person. We got one person.

MR. NOTARI: The housing is an authority.

MR. FERRETT: Whatever youse want to do is okay. I'm just telling you you're making a big mistake.

authority came here with their solicitor and said we own it, we'll pave the roads. That changed last year. So how you want to resolve it -- my suggestion, I said first of all, you better do a deed. If you think we own these you better do a deed and then give them to us because we don't own them. So if you want go down there and say we're still

not going to do it --

MR. FEBBO: Did they agree to give us a deed of dedication?

ATTY. RINALDI: Yes. They don't want them and they don't want to pave them, even though they were saying they were going to pave them. Two years ago they were going to pave them. On the list to be paved.

They said don't worry about it, we'll take care of it. They'll be paved, the issue is done. I was here.

MR. NOTARI: I was here, too.

You're not making that up.

ATTY. RINALDI: All the sudden they turned around and oh, we're not paving them.

MR. SEMENZA: Marylynn, how is this motion to be stated? 2016 CDBG --

ATTY. RINALDI: It's a resolution of the Borough of Old Forge authorizing the Board of Commissioners of Lackawanna County to submit an application for federal fiscal year 2016 Community Development Block Grant program funds in the amount of \$89,780 on behalf of the borough. It's resolving that that money is for the activity listed as

rehab single unit residentials borough-wide at a cost of \$73,620, and administration, County of Lackawanna, \$16,160.

MS. BARTOLETTI: So what that is, they consider that to be their holding spot. When you say you're going to put it in the housing rehab, that holds it until we come up with a plan.

MR. SEMENZA: So we're going to put \$89,780 into housing rehab, a resolution.

ATTY. RINALDI: I didn't talk to them about it. I remember with last year's issues they tried to do the same thing and we put it in the project that we used it for.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I transferred it all to -- all the back money and anything that we had stockpiled, we transferred all of that down to deposit for Kohler Avenue. So this is just one year's worth of money.

ATTY. RINALDI: I think we even put it in sidewalks, and we only put \$30,000 into single unit.

MS. BARTOLETTI: At the time that was all we had that was considered needing a

project.

ATTY. RINALDI: It was more than 30, I remember.

MS. BARTOLETTI: We had told them that all they can use for housing rehab at that time was \$30,000, but that was the end of it. They used different money for housing rehab. They didn't use any borough money at that point.

ATTY. RINALDI: And I don't remember who makes the decision.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Do you want to hold it until the next meeting?

MR. FERRETT: I think one of the biggest problems you have here is the fact that we get CDBG money every year. If you recall, the last two or three years we haven't earmarked any of that money for any specific project. So the county is taking the responsibility on themselves --

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, they're not,

Joe. I talk to them about this all the

time. All the money that we have left, all

the back money is over 200-some thousand.

Dave can attest to this. It's all transferred right now to pave Kohler Avenue because the Kohler Avenue paving isn't just paving. You have to put the basins in and all that stuff. The price is over \$200,000. All our old money right now is put into that project. Whatever is left will be moved back into us for the next project.

MR. LOPATKA: That was just a cost estimate, though. The money will be decided once it's actually designed and bid, what the cost is going to be. That's just an estimate.

ATTY. RINALDI: We never used to do rehab. We always listed the projects.

MR. LOPATKA: A lot of times that money is just sitting there until you come up with a project.

MS. BARTOLETTI: They said they need to have a name to deposit the money temporarily.

MR. NOTARI: They want it to be designated for something.

ATTY. RINALDI: As long as it

doesn't evaporate. I know for three years you put it in Casper Street.

MR. SEMENZA: Then we put it into housing rehab and the county actually funded it itself. They gave it back to us.

MS. BARTOLETTI: We approved \$30,000 to go into housing rehab, but then they used their own money. So that money stayed in our account.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?

MS. BARTOLETTI: I just have all my reports. Anybody have any questions on any of the financial stuff?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any word about the street lights? Did they get back to us?

MS. BARTOLETTI: It's in the final stage. What's holding it up is because we put in to use the decorative lighting and the ones that weren't ten years old. You know how we decide to do it all as one project? So the old stuff is ready to go. They're just held up with some of the new stuff. But they said probably by the end of October everything will be ready. So I don't know how long it will take them to

start actually doing the lights but all the paperwork will be finished.

MR. FERRETT: Where do we stand on the borough building, what they're going to do? Is that a question I ask Dave?

MS. BARTOLETTI: He's going to have an architect come in to meet with me so that we can point out some of the things that really need to be changed and then we'll come up with a plan.

MR. FERRETT: Is that for the whole building?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Well, the facade of the building, the front, some of the offices because if we do take the police department and move them downstairs nothing else is ready for anyone else to use, so they'll need some updating. The bathrooms will need some updating, the entranceway needs updating. So there's quite a few areas.

MR. LOPATKA: We're going to put a master plan together where you can pick projects off of a list. So you don't have to do it all at once.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Maybe we can

separate it into -- if it's large we can separate into possibly two phases or even three phases or something like that and then start looking towards grants to try to get money to help finance it.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Marylynn?

MR. NOTARI: Mare, can we have an update on the status of the website?

MS. BARTOLETTI: It's just sitting right now.

MR. NOTARI: Is it possible we can get it done by the beginning of the year?

MS. BARTOLETTI: I'm hoping it will be done before that, yes. Couple weeks out.

MR. SEMENZA: Anyone else? Thanks, Marylynn. Go down the table. Mayor?

MAYOR MULKERIN: Yesterday I was at a PTA meeting. They're doing a trunk or treat October 30th at the high school parking lot. All that is is people who register their vehicles in the high school parking lot, they would open their trunk and have candy. You supply the candy. Then they would have the kids go around to each

trunk to get some candy. That's replacing the PTA Halloween party on Saturday afternoons. So trunk or treat, October 30th.

MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Brown?
MR. BROWN: Nothing.

MR. NOTARI: Couple things. If you didn't see the article in the newspaper the other day, Saint Michael's Orthodox Church has opened a food pantry for anyone who is in need. I believe it's two days a week they're open. I want to say Tuesday and Saturday. I'll get all the details for the next meeting just to let everybody know. If they know anybody that's in need for the tri-borough area. There's nothing down this way in terms of that.

I was at Pero Park for soccer this week and there's two new benches down there.

I don't know if it's true or not, but I was told --

MR. PAPI: Four.

MR. NOTARI: Mr. Rossi found them somewhere?

MS. BARTOLETTI: We had them. We

knew they were there. One of or grants had a little bit of extra money so I bought benches, knowing that at some point we'll be able to use them at all of our parks.

MR. NOTARI: They're great. So thank you, everybody, for raving about them.

Councilman Ferrett brought it up at the last meeting about people trying to get around permits. I drive through other communities and I see signs that say they're zoned communities and that permits are required. It wouldn't solve the problem, but will it deter people, possibly, if we ordered some nice borough signs for entranceways at each part of the town? Maybe we can get some of the businesses to sponsor them, even, with advertisement. They would say Old Forge Borough, zoned community, permits required.

MR. SEMENZA: Something to think about.

MR. NOTARI: Maybe it's something that helps. Maybe it will help in the long run. People just coming in, thinking they can do any kind of work.

. .

MS. BARTOLETTI: We can get that made.

MR. NOTARI: Just off the top of my head I thought of five spots: Main Street, down in Babylon?? Bridge Street, up the top of Lawrenceville; Main Street, Rendham -- I don't know where we're going to find a spot there, though -- at the Taylor/OldForge border; Keyser Avenue at the Taylor/Old Forge Border; then on Moosic Road somewhere, down the bottom of Moosic Road. I don't know if there's any other spots. Maybe Lonesome Road. Just a thought.

Are you going to do old business, talk about the recyclables in the alleys picking up? Remember we talked at the work session about getting off of Moosic Road, getting off of Main Street, pick up recyclables in the alleys. I know we had talked about that.

Just off the top of my head I thought Moosic Road, from Hoover to First Street, those two alleys. One is Duce's Alley, the other one is Vender's Alley. What's the alley behind where Chase lives

going to -- wherever that alley is as well.

We talked about safety, getting off Moosic

Road. Oak Street from Dooley's to Doctor

Duney's, and Main Street you can go Goose

Alley, Cappy Court, and then --

MS. BARTOLETTI: What was the decision about --

MR. NOTARI: There wasn't a decision, but I know we talked about at the work session did we want to keep them picking up recyclables on Moosic Road or do we want to use the alleys?

MR. LENCESKI: It was the opposite.

They want to get off the alleys that were newly paved and force them to go to Moosic Road.

ATTY. RINALDI: The ordinance says it has to be on a borough, in front on a borough street.

MR. SEMENZA: So we can't even legally put it on Moosic Road.

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, no, borough street. Not alley.

MS. BARTOLETTI: But Joe's problem was he felt that it was a safety issue.

That's why you wanted to keep them on th4 alleys, because of the safety issue.

MR. NOTARI: So they currently pick up in the alleys?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Both.

MR. NOTARI: Why don't both when we can do one where those alleys are?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Either all in the alley or all on the main road was the question back and forth.

MR. FERRETT: You know what? It's a good idea because that way you can go to work and only have one person on a truck and one driver going down and coming back up the other end. But that's not what's happening, there's no plans being done by the committee that runs DPW to sit down and discuss this. That's one reason why I disagree with a lot of these things.

MS, BARTOLETTI: I think it was brought up at the last meeting, like Mr.

Notari said, and you guys discussed it, but there was no final decision as to where it was going to be. But that was the first time it was brought up at a meeting to talk

about how you wanted it to be done.

MR. FERRETT: Exactly. That's the reason why you have committees, to come up with these ideas and to try to explain this out and make recommendations to council.

MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Febbo, did you discuss that in your DPW committee?

MR. FEBBO: We did. I felt that, the conclusion of the committee, except Mr. Ferret, who was not here, was that we stay on Moosic Road and stay out of the alleys because of the damage the trucks would be doing.

MR. SEMENZA: In your next DPW meeting could you sit and talk with Councilman Ferrett and you guys comes to --

MR. FEBBO: As soon as this meeting is over with.

MR. SEMENZA: Joe, you guys will meet and discuss it and and then come to council, give a recommendation to council?

MR. FERRETT: I certainly would like to no question whatsoever because it's just a cost-saving idea. It's an efficient way of doing things.

MR. FEBBO: Joe, you're saying you got to knock a guy off a truck and just have one guy do it --

MR. FERRETT: I didn't say that. I said it's only a recommendation. You do whatever you want. You have a street commissioner to sit down and talk about these things, is it good or bad. It's not what I say.

MR. SEMENZA: You guys talk about that at your committee meeting.

MR. NOTARI: Lastly, department reports and planning reports, is it possible for us to get them so they're, like, up to date? Like Steve and Paul are presenting reports for September. It's October 18th tonight. Can't we get that report at the October work session so that way we're not waiting three weeks to see what happens a month before?

MS. BARTOLETTI: They're basically right now ending their reports at the previous month to give you a full month.

You don't want it that way? You'd rather have it up to --

MR. NOTARI: Well, no, but, I mean, if our work session is October 4th we would still have the full report to September 30th. Right? So that way we're not waiting three weeks to see what's going on.

Same thing, like, with -- and maybe it has to do with the notes. I mean, the planning report said September 1st and I received it on a Friday, which was October 13th. So it's six weeks old. Like, I could see a week or two. Like, wouldn't we get those reports the start of the month?

ATTY. RINALDI: Because you're only having one meeting a month. The work sessions aren't meetings. Work sessions are just -- you don't vote at them. Council decides to have them because they want to anticipate what's going on at the meeting. So a regular meeting every month is the official meeting. I guess you can have the reports coming in but they're not going to be official until you make them official at the regular meeting.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I don't think
Councilman Notari is talking about making

them official, he's talking about having them.

MR. NOTARI: Why wouldn't we have a report for September --

MS. BARTOLETTI: Being my reports are, for example, up until Friday, close them on Friday --

MR. NOTARI: Right. We're getting a report that's three weeks old. Right?

MAYOR MULKERIN: Honestly, to

Councilman Notari's point, a lot of the

stuff in Steve's report we discussed at the

work session.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I have no problem with that. The problem is the way the meetings fall. If we have a work session on the 1st, then you're here before the 15th, the next meeting. But even if you say cut off halfway, maybe you'll have to cut off that Wednesday before the meeting.

MR. SEMENZA: It's always been the prior month.

MR. NOTARI: And I understand that, but I just think for us to run more efficiently --

MAYOR MULKERIN: In your job you go to other boroughs. How do they --

MR. NOTARI: To be honest with you, they don't present the reports at other boroughs. This is the only place that we get the DPW report, the engineer's report.

MS. BARTOLETTI: So our guys are trying to keep everyone up to date with giving you the information on what they're doing.

MR. NOTARI: Here's my scenario. We get the reports at the work session, they talk about them if they want or if they don't want. We look them over for two weeks. If we have any questions for Mare or Steve or anybody we have those two weeks to study to see what we need to do for the meeting. That's just my thought. Just so we're more prepared.

MR. LENCESKI: I think that's a good idea. Is that possible, to pick them up the day of the meeting, work session? Can you guys have those by then?

MR. PAPI: I don't know. We'll do whatever you guys want.

MR. NOTARI: I would say just the department heads. Even your report for the month of September.

MS. BARTOLETTI: My financial report that you get is right up until Friday.

We're here on Tuesday and I close out on Friday.

MR. NOTARI: Maybe not financial.

Maybe anything else you have.

MR. PAPI: October 31st is Monday, so Tuesday is November 1st and we have a meeting. So you're giving us one day to do our reports.

MR. SEMENZA: Now, you don't have to give until the day before but a closer update of what you've done in the past.

MR. PAPI: So you just want them for the work session?

MR. NOTARI: That's my thought.

MS. BARTOLETTI: The whole packet, in other words, for the work session rather than for the public meeting?

MR. NOTARI: I would think so because there's nothing in the packet that's not dated to this point.

MS. BARTOLETTI: But the way it's done is everything is put aside until Friday before the meeting and put in the envelopes and given to you people. If you want it different, just say it. I'm only following what was here in the past and how --

MR. NOTARI: That's up to the entire council or the chairman, I guess. So you're saying you have the reports October 1st and you just wait until --

MS. BARTOLETTI: Anything that comes in the mail. What happens is, as stuff comes in the mail I say Ann Marie, put that aside for council, copy that for council, and then it becomes a pile. Then that pile is divvied up on the Friday before the meeting and then it's delivered to everyone's houses. That's how it's done. It depends on when the stuff comes in the mail. We go up until basically the Friday before the meeting. The stuff that comes in the mail that day I deem important enough for council to see we will put in the packets.

MR. NOTARI: In terms of mail and

correspondence I think that's fine, but I think reports that we're being given, personally I wouldn't see why -- if September 30th is a Wednesday and our meeting is October whatever why we don't have September's report in that for that first October work session. That's all.

MR. SEMENZA: Thank you, Councilman Notari. Councilman Rinaldi?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I don't have anything.

MR. FERRETT: I don't have nothing.
MR. FEBBO: No.

MR. LENCESKI: Just a couple to go off what Rick said before about people -- putting the signs up about we're a zoned community. Do any officers ever come to you and say -- or stop any construction going on that visibly they don't see any permits? Do they ever pull over, do anything like that?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Not really. I know the other day we stopped a group of girls on Grace Street that were going around.

Something about energy.

MAYOR MULKERIN: You mean permits or

solicitation?

MR. LENCESKI: Permits. For the police officers just to have their eye out if they see something going on, a construction crew or someone doing work, that maybe they can stop by and ask them if they have a permit. Introduce themselves --

CHIEF DUBERNAS: New home construction we see permits out and everything.

MR. LENCESKI: Can we do that, ask the police officers if he sees something going on to stop?

MAYOR MULKERIN: They're on their patrols. If they see somebody working on a roof it's not hard to see if there's a permit.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Is that something that they're trained to do or is that something you're just asking them to do now?

MAYOR MULKERIN: If they're supposed to do it on the weekends, then they should be able to do it on the weekdays.

MS. BARTOLETTI: My question is is that an assumed thing? We have so many --

CHIEF DUBERNAS: If we get called there. Any report we get I forward to Steve and Steve follows up on it. All we do is report on it and it goes under Steve's door.

MR. LENCESKI: I'm not asking for them to go out of their way. I'm just saying if they're driving by they can notice the address and just call Steve.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Frankly, that's something that needs to be discussed with them because I don't think any police officer is assuming that that's their responsibility.

MR. LENCESKI: The DPW workers who are around town all the time --

MR. SEMENZA: Wait, time out. If there's an ordinance in the borough of Old Forge, isn't it the responsibility of a police officer to follow that ordinance?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Do they realize that? I'm not doubting it. Do they know that's their responsibility?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: To investigate it?

MAYOR DUBERNAS: What we can do is

communicate to the officers just to be on

the lookout and ask them do they know what they're looking for. Maybe we can get Steve in to tell them. It's just something quick, but in their travels they should be able to keep an eye open.

MS. BARTOLETTI: But I guarantee you, you ask ten police officers right now when you're out do you look for permits in windows I guarantee they'll say no, what are you talking about, because I don't think they realize that that's something that you're expecting them to do.

MR. SEMENZA: Shouldn't that be in the FOP?

MS. BARTOLETTI: It has all the ordinances of the borough, but do they realize what that actually is? They're the ones who are out.

MR. LENCESKI: Just keep their eyes open.

MAYOR MULKERIN: We'll make them aware and we'll --

MR. LENCESKI: Just like the DPW.

They're in back alleys, they're all over the place. They have their eyes on the town,

and if they see something going on that looks shady they notify --

MS. BARTOLETTI: I think that it's just another one of those things that is being assumed but they have no clue that they're supposed to be doing that. Maybe it's just not pointed out.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Our guys notify myself or I'll notify Steve.

MR. LENCESKI: The point of this is everyone says Steve, you didn't see that, you didn't see that, and we have other employees in the borough and they're driving around more than Steve is. I think they can be accountable.

MAYOR MULKERIN: I agree. Eyes and ears. They're around. I think it's a great suggestion.

MR. LENCESKI: Not that they're responsible for it, but it's like whistle blowing. If they see something going on they notify Steve or Paul and Paul can notify Steve or Marylynn.
