

1 MR. LOPATKA: No, because I know the
2 one time they asked me. We did do the
3 report one time, and they wanted to know who
4 hooked up during that year, what type of
5 businesses or whatever were hooking up
6 during that year.

7 So we went back. Now, typically,
8 they should have a lot of that information,
9 because any time someone is going to hook up
10 to the sewer, supposed to file a postcard
11 with them, for an exemption, hook into the
12 sewer.

13 But they did ask, like, right when I
14 first started working with you guys, we put
15 together a report that stated that. I'll
16 look back and find out what that report was
17 too. I have it. I'll check it out.

18 It's not something they ask for all
19 the time though.

20 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: I thought they
21 asked for a yearly something. Tell me that
22 Harold did it yearly and we didn't. I
23 thought it was -- whatever. I'll find out.

24 MR. LOPATKA: I'll look it up too.
25 Find out and let me know if it's something

1 we need to do there.

2 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Anybody have any
3 more questions for Dave? Thanks, Dave.
4 Chief, you're up..What you got?

5 CHIEF OF POLICE REPORT

6 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Good evening. First
7 I want to say thanks for coming a little
8 early to meet with us, the guy for Sprint
9 regarding the body cameras.

10 The text message I spoke about
11 earlier, there's another company that I want
12 to look into. And actually integrates right
13 with our computers that we actually run
14 right in our car now. It's a sister
15 company, a parole PC, called the Watch
16 Guard.

17 Actually the cameras that the
18 Pennsylvania State Police use in their cars.
19 So, I want to have them come and do a demo
20 try to do a teeny on them.

21 Moving along, Officer Caralone, he
22 has now completed the checkpoint for the
23 seat belt. He certifies to allow three
24 people doing seat belt check, along with
25 officers in Taylor.

1 I believe we're going to try to do
2 one right before Christmas or right between
3 Christmas and New Year's at CVS. We couldn't
4 do one on the day of the take back. That
5 was two weeks ago at the CVS.

6 Also, we conducted -- I'm not sure
7 if you noticed any of our police cars
8 following buses around.

9 We conducted an operation safe stop.
10 Been having people complaining about cars
11 not stopping for buses, running the red
12 light, going through just when they turn
13 yellow. We had no issues with that.

14 The only thing we did have, we had
15 to move to bus stops, one on Sibley Avenue
16 is now on the middle of Keyser Avenue and
17 one on Oak Street is brought back from
18 around the bend. It is in front of the Gertz
19 now, Saint Stevens Lane.

20 The one that was on Sibley Avenue,
21 was more in the area of Flower Street.
22 Complaining that the cars were not stopping
23 when the bus was stopping on Sibley Avenue.

24 We sat there. You would never even
25 know that a bus was stopped on Sibley

1 Avenue, because it was that far back.

2 So, with the stop, we actually moved
3 the bus to actually right in the middle of
4 Keyser Avenue.

5 So, now, when the bus comes up, it
6 actually blocks both lanes and Sibley
7 Avenue, so that the children can go any way
8 they want and there's no traffic in any
9 direction.

10 Also, I have the quotes and I
11 actually have a new quote, because YIS
12 Cowden came out with Enradd system, when he
13 gave a quote last year, it was for one unit
14 to run in one car. They gave us a new quote
15 for four car unit because we told them we
16 have five cars and five Vascar units.

17 Pass them along to you. See the two
18 different prices. And this is actually the
19 unit, what it looks like. It's all
20 wireless.

21 MR. NOTARI: Two separate?

22 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Two different
23 quotes. One is for one unit, go in one car.
24 We could move it around from car to car to
25 car.

1 Or for four cars. That's what we
2 have right now. We have four Vascar units.
3 Car 5 is the only car that we don't have a
4 Vascar unit in.

5 MAYOR MULKERIN: Chief, the Caz
6 system, they just have the one unit or --

7 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yes, they have one.
8 Most of the people have only the one unit,
9 but he sent me the quotes for --

10 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Same thing we
11 looked at?

12 CHIEF DUBERNAS: They just gave me a
13 different quote because people are
14 purchasing more things, sell it in one or
15 four.

16 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: So, we going to
17 get better or worse price?

18 CHIEF DUBERNAS: It's 4,000 for the
19 first one, and then like 7500 for four. So,
20 I think it's a little cheaper the more you
21 buy.

22 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Gave you a price
23 for four?

24 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Um-hum.

25 MR. NOTARI: Chief, do we have it

1 budgeted for this year?

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: That was actually
3 budgeted for this year that we're in right
4 now. So, we had it --

5 CHIEF DUBERNAS: For one unit.

6 MR. NOTARI: We can purchase it
7 tonight or make a decision tonight.

8 MR. FEBBO: How much trouble going
9 from one car to another with that portable
10 unit?

11 MR. LOPATKA: Not much.

12 MR. FEBBO: They can plug it in?

13 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Not with that.
14 That's all wireless. With the Vascar unit,
15 you could do it in stationary mode or roving
16 mode.

17 And it has to be in a car, because
18 it has to be calibrated to the vehicle's
19 transmission.

20 So, every sixty days, they come in
21 and calibrate it back to 59 days. They'll
22 take it to Taylor, have a quarter-mile
23 course. And it would recalibrate it.

24 It has to be plus or minus 2,500 for
25 the quarter mile for it to match the car.

1 Because, if the car's tires are low or if
2 there's heat in the tires, it will always be
3 plus or minus. It has to be calibrated
4 every 59 days.

5 Our one SUV is already gone to be
6 serviced for the winter. Has snow tires on
7 it. And our second SUV will be gone. And
8 all of our cars went through tires and oil
9 changes except for the one.

10 The last thing, I'm not sure. The
11 Civil Service list is up, been posted. Six
12 full-time officers are there. If anybody
13 wants to see their copy of it.

14 MAYOR MULKERIN: That process is
15 complete.

16 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Receiving complete
17 on it. If you want to hire, you can hire the
18 first three people. Hire one and move down
19 and hire more after that.

20 MAYOR MULKERIN: Reshuffle after the
21 first --

22 CHIEF DUBERNAS: I hear you. Want to
23 hire 3, 4? That's it. Any other questions?

24 MR. NOTARI: I have two questions for
25 you. The vehicle report that you gave us,

1 you gave us for September and October. 1500
2 less miles in October than in September.
3 Any reason?

4 CHIEF DUBERNAS: What car?

5 MR. NOTARI: Total miles.

6 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: 1520 or 50.

7 MR. NOTARI: Something about that.
8 Looks like the 2016 Interceptor has more
9 mileage. Very other Car has less mileage.

10 CHIEF DUBERNAS: One of the cars was
11 gone because it was smashed. That was car
12 one.

13 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: 2015 Ford
14 Intérceptor, 932?

15 CHIEF DUBERNAS: No. 931.

16 MR. NOTARI: 931 has more miles in
17 October than September. Every other car has
18 less miles.

19 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: 932 has --

20 CHIEF DUBERNAS: The way the cars are
21 rotated, car one -- hang on. Let me think.
22 Car one is used twice a day. It would be
23 first and third shift. Car 3 is on first
24 shift and second shift, if I'm not in.

25 If there's a second 2 to 10 person,

1 car three is out. And car four is used on
2 first shift, and as a split car. And then
3 car 5, if somebody comes in from 9 to 5 is
4 used and also used as the 5 to 1. All
5 depends on the rotation.

6 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Seems like that's
7 almost used the most. 500 less miles. Car
8 5 is 500 less miles than it was last month.

9 Even car 4, 350, 400 miles less.
10 Car 3, almost 700. Car 2, almost 550. Car
11 one is the only one that had more on it this
12 month.

13 MR. FEBBO: Saying, overall what
14 we're getting is less patrols out there.

15 MR. NOTARI: That's what it seems
16 like.

17 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: I never noticed
18 because we never had two months in our
19 packet.

20 CHIEF DUBERNAS: I don't know. I
21 can't answer that.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Bikes.

23 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Could be the
24 rotation of the cars.

25 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: 1500 miles in one

1 month.

2 MR. NOTARI: Just have to save these
3 and look at next month's and see.

4 My other question is, in next year's
5 budget, Marylynn has a new car, a new chief
6 of police car.

7 And my question was, and I've talked
8 to her, discussed this a little bit, is,
9 have we looked into and tell me maybe we
10 can't do it, CNG, compressed natural gas
11 cars, since we have a station at Verastro's.
12 Is that something that's done with police
13 cars? Is it not looked upon --

14 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Never heard of it in
15 a police car or any kind of emergency
16 vehicle, because, you know what I mean,
17 here's the only reasoning, you know what I
18 mean, if we're on a scene for a long period
19 of time and the car is idling, if it runs
20 out of gas, you can always call a fuel place
21 to come and fuel the car.

22 How do you call a CNG car? But I
23 never saw it on an emergency because I've
24 been on fire scenes where I actually seen
25 come and fuel fire trucks before. But never

1 natural gas.

2 MR. NOTARI: I'm going to look into
3 it a little more and see if there's anywhere
4 around the country that they do that.

5 I've talked it over with Marylynn.
6 But we have access that nobody else would
7 have. And I'm sure there's grants out there
8 for clean energy in terms of municipalities
9 and things of that nature.

10 So, all right. I was just looking to
11 your idea on it. Thank you.

12 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Anything else?

13 MR. FEBBO: You're volunteering to
14 give us the information on that?

15 MR. NOTARI: I'm going to do some
16 research.

17 MR. PAPI: The mechanics I talked to
18 said, let them have time to work all the
19 bugs out.

20 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Give you my
21 knowledge on CNG, liquid gas, whatever you
22 want to call it. UPS, first they went to
23 liquid, now they're compressed.

24 They're all going back to diesel,
25 because they're having nothing but issues.

1 MR. PAPI: That's what the
2 mechanical --

3 MR. FEBBO: From the mechanical
4 point of view, you have to change a lot of
5 the carburetor and so on.

6 And even though they may run
7 cleaner, to get the service done on them,
8 you're going to have a problem.

9 CHIEF DUBERNAS: To the best of my
10 knowledge, like I said, they spent all this
11 money to go to liquid. That lasted maybe
12 six months and they then went to compressed.

13 I know that's what LT Verastro runs
14 is compressed. Now UPS is getting rid of
15 liquid and compressed and going back to
16 diesel.

17 MR. NOTARI: Thank you, chief.

18 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Anybody else?

19 MR. LENCESKI: Jason, the Enradd
20 System, do we need this for the Borough?

21 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yes, with that, we
22 don't need a sight distance. Remember, Mr.
23 Muniac complaining, we don't have a 150
24 feet.

25 With that, you could put that on any

1 street anywhere. It's wireless. I only
2 need a hundred feet or 50 feet with that,
3 that can be put anywhere.

4 MAYOR MULKERIN: One thing I'll say,
5 Councilman Lenceski, is that the complaints
6 we get the most are car's speed, cars go.
7 And we're limited to where Vas-car can be
8 put. We're not limited where that could be
9 put. And Moosic has the same system. And
10 they use it quite well.

11 So, if someone comes in and
12 complains about speed on the street, you can
13 put it on any point of any street, collect
14 all the data and, you know, then we have
15 kind of the times to sit cars there.

16 You know, it's a useful tool
17 elsewhere.

18 MR. LENCESKI: Thank you.

19 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Thank you, Chief.
20 Bill, solicitor's report, please.

21 SOLICITOR'S REPORT

22 ATTORNEY RINALDI: I'll just go
23 over, PA American Water Company, basically,
24 if want to move forward, I need some prices
25 on what the damages are. And then that's

1 something maybe you want to work out with
2 Jim Hoover. I just kept it on the list in
3 case Council wanted to do something.

4 Saint Lawrence Church, if you
5 remember, we approved an agreement of sale
6 for the rectory, with the option to purchase
7 the church at a price to be determined and
8 also to subdivide the property to our
9 liking.

10 They signed it, and is now back in
11 our hands. So, I'm asking for a motion to
12 approve the president and secretary to sign
13 that agreement, even though we already got
14 the ball rolling in terms of the title
15 search. At least it will be official.

16 We can hire the inspector to go out
17 and look at the rectory and see what kind of
18 dollars it is to put in and what kind of
19 shape.

20 The other item I have is a
21 memorandum of understanding for pavement of
22 the roads at Eisenhower and Apollo.

23 There was two changes that I made
24 today with regards to that. Everybody has a
25 copy. I added two sentences.

1 I added that the cooperation of the
2 Borough or HACL shall enter into a contract
3 with Pennsy Inc. for paving work described
4 in the agreement.

5 This way, it had flexibility,
6 because Pennsy wasn't sure whether they
7 wanted to contract directly with the Housing
8 Authority or with us and then get payment
9 from the Housing Authority.

10 And then the no liability section we
11 changed to no liability will arise or be
12 assumed between the parties as a result of
13 the memorandum, except for payment by the
14 Housing Authority for the paving work
15 described in the agreement.

16 So, basically, the agreement is just
17 saying, we're cooperating. The Housing
18 Authority is using our bid documents so that
19 they can comply with spending the money with
20 HUD. So they used our HUD employee
21 documents, payment bond, certificate of
22 insurance.

23 They are going to pave the roads,
24 looks like now in the springtime, when they
25 do come back to do our job. They will pay

1 for the paving, either to pay directly to us
2 if we're invoiced or pay directly to Pennsy,
3 if Pennsy contracts with them directly. And
4 we will accept dedication of the two roads,
5 which is Apollo and Eisenhower.

6 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: That's not going
7 to take off from our adding roads to our --

8 ATTORNEY RINALDI: No, no, no.

9 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Want to make sure
10 of that.

11 ATTORNEY RINALDI: They're separate.
12 No. This has nothing to do with -- no.
13 That's totally separate.

14 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: They're going to
15 pay Pennsy or pay us?

16 ATTORNEY RINALDI: They're still
17 trying to figure it out.

18 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Listen. I don't
19 trust the Housing Authority whatsoever. I
20 think they should be on their own and pay
21 them.

22 ATTORNEY RINALDI: That's the way I
23 left it.

24 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: I think we're
25 gonna get screwed in the long run.

1 ATTORNEY RINALDI: I think it's more
2 like Pennsy wants to --

3 MR. LOPATKA: Pennsy has -- they
4 have some potential issues with contracting
5 with them.

6 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Obviously, they
7 must --

8 MR. LOPATKA: Not because of that,
9 because the contract for the roads is with
10 you guys.

11 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: I get it.

12 MR. LOPATKA: Not with them.

13 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Pave these roads.
14 Mark my words and we're going to have an
15 issue getting paid.

16 MR. LOPATKA: I wouldn't pay them
17 until you get pavement.

18 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Anybody agree or
19 disagree?

20 MR. FEBBO: I agree. Pay forward.

21 MR. LOPATKA: Agree with you. But I
22 got a call from Pennsy and they have some
23 concerns.

24 MR. FERRETT: Both the Housing
25 Authority and the Borough has the same

1 documents, signed by both?

2 ATTORNEY RINALDI: They're gonna
3 sign it because we just got it. They have
4 more hoops to jump through with HUD. That's
5 what took so long.

6 HUD kept asking for additional
7 information.

8 MR. FERRETT: I understand that.
9 But, if you recall a few months back, the
10 discussion was, they wanted us to pay, they
11 would pay us, and blah, blah, blah and get
12 it --

13 ATTORNEY RINALDI: No. They worked
14 it out with HUD. However they worked it
15 out, they worked it out with HUD.

16 MR. FERRETT: Make sure one thing,
17 before I say yes on this and everything,
18 that they're going to pay for their own
19 roads. And we have nothing to do with
20 their paving, nothing to do with getting
21 reimbursed. None of our money is going that
22 way.

23 ATTORNEY RINALDI: They're paying
24 for the roads.

25 MR. FEBBO: Complete, Bill, a

1 hundred percent? One time it was 80 percent
2 and do the top coat.

3 ATTORNEY RINALDI: That's the
4 agreement.

5 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: I think we should
6 get payment upfront before we get any roads
7 paved in there. I will not vote for it. I
8 won't even put the motion to the floor, to
9 be honest.

10 ATTORNEY RINALDI: Do we have the
11 bill? Do we know how much it is?

12 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: You know what
13 happened with meetings with them. It's your
14 roads, our road. Okay. It's Housing
15 Authority road.

16 Before you know it, Housing
17 Authority road. A week later, they're
18 telling us, no, we're not paving them.
19 They're not your roads.

20 MR. FERRETT: That's why it's a bad
21 situation that we're getting involved that
22 we're giving our authority to them to go
23 ahead and do this.

24 And then after a while, they're
25 going to say, this belongs to you people.

1 You people pay for this and we're going to
2 be back in the same boat again.

3 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Payment upfront if
4 they want use our contractor.

5 MR. FERRETT: It should be
6 everything.

7 MR. FEBBO: Could we put that in the
8 motion, Bill?

9 ATTORNEY RINALDI: You can do
10 whatever you want. Everybody wanted to get
11 resolved. We had a paver here on-site. And
12 we got a good price. And that's how we
13 negotiated this.

14 MR. FEBBO: I don't have anything
15 against that price, the pricing and all
16 that. Just the matter of the payment part.

17 ATTORNEY RINALDI: It would take them
18 a year and a half or two years to bid this
19 project out. So, the way we expedited this,
20 is they got permission from HUD to say that
21 they could use our bid project to fund it.
22 So, that's how we got to here.

23 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: That's fine.

24 ATTORNEY RINALDI: If you want to
25 wait, they can go through the procedure.

1 MR. FEBBO: It's the money part.

2 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: I don't care if
3 they use our contractor. I just want to get
4 paid.

5 ATTORNEY RINALDI: They're saying
6 their paying for it. Period. End of story.

7 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: They said a lot of
8 things over the past couple years.

9 MAYOR MULKERIN: That's in writing,
10 right?

11 ATTORNEY RINALDI: Yeah, that's in
12 the agreement. They pay.

13 MR. NOTARI: Let me ask this
14 question, we already passed the memorandum
15 of understanding.

16 ATTORNEY RINALDI: Right, but we
17 needed a new one because that one didn't
18 work.

19 MR. NOTARI: Didn't work on their
20 end or our end?

21 ATTORNEY RINALDI: HUD wanted more
22 information.

23 MR. NOTARI: On their end.

24 ATTORNEY RINALDI: If you see the
25 last paragraph, HUD wanted all that

1 information in there. Okay. The
2 documentation part.

3 MAYOR MULKERIN: Documentation
4 section.

5 ATTORNEY RINALDI: Right.

6 MR. FERRETT: What happens in a case
7 like this that this is our project and
8 everything, and we're allowing them to come
9 hand in hand with us, and what happens if
10 the Housing Authority doesn't pay or fails
11 to pay, are we liable for this, because this
12 was our project and we're letting them come
13 in on this?

14 ATTORNEY RINALDI: No. And it's not
15 -- those roads aren't our project.

16 MR. FERRETT: I didn't ask you that.
17 I'm talking about the job done about, will
18 we be liable for this?

19 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Sure. Pennsy is
20 going to want their money.

21 ATTORNEY RINALDI: Pennsy is going
22 to want to get paid.

23 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: It's under our
24 contract. If they don't pay us, we got to
25 pay Pennsy no matter what.

1 MR. FERRETT: That's why I'm asking
2 that question. Are we liable?

3 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Sure, we're
4 liable, Joe.

5 MR. NOTARI: They're not our roads.

6 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: But it's our
7 contract that we're paving. Could we even
8 legally do that, Bill? Pave something that's
9 not ours, under a contract that's ours,
10 that's under Old Forge Borough?

11 ATTORNEY RINALDI: We're not going
12 to pay for it. They're going to pay for it.

13 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: We are paying for
14 it., They're just reimbursing us.

15 MR. NOTARI: No, no. We're not paying
16 for it. Why would we pay for it?

17 ATTORNEY RINALDI: We're going to
18 give them the bill, because Pennsy wants a
19 contract with us, because it's our bid.
20 Okay?

21 Everybody has their own parts. We're
22 just trying to get to the same place to get
23 it done.

24 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Bill, correct me
25 if I'm wrong, the check is coming from Old

1 Forge Borough for that project, not
2 Lackawanna County Housing Authority?

3 ATTORNEY RINALDI: No. The check is
4 coming from the Housing Authority.

5 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Going to Pennsy?

6 ATTORNEY RINALDI: They're going to
7 pay Pennsy, yes. Yes.

8 MR. GRECO: John Greco. Before they
9 even start the project, they should come up
10 with some good faith money.

11 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Right, right. I
12 agree with you.

13 ATTORNEY RINALDI: However you guys
14 want to do it.

15 MR. FEBBO: Will Pennsy move without
16 getting some sort of money?

17 MR. LOPATKA: I'm sure they'll move.
18 But, at this point, from my understanding on
19 the Pennsy side, is that they don't want to
20 sign the contract with the Housing
21 Authority, because their original contract
22 was with you guys.

23 So, not to say that the Housing
24 Authority can't pay them --

25 ATTORNEY RINALDI: The Housing.

1 Authority was going to enter into the
2 contract with them solely, but Pennsy
3 doesn't want to do it solely.

4 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Okay. If, for some
5 reason, the Housing Authority does not pay
6 Pennsy, we're liable for that money,
7 correct?

8 MR. LOPATKA: No. Pennsy won't pave
9 the roads.

10 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Only get payment
11 up front?

12 MR. LOPATKA: I mean, they could work
13 that out however they want to. Typically, it
14 would be after. I mean, putting an agreement
15 in place to ensure that the Housing
16 Authority is paying the bill.

17 ATTORNEY RINALDI: They're using our
18 bid documents and they're, in turn, going to
19 make payment.

20 MR. NOTARI: I mean, it's in the
21 memorandum of understanding. And, Bob, I
22 understand what you're saying.

23 The way things have gone, you don't
24 know what they're going to do. But it does
25 say, HACL shall be responsible for the

1 payment of the payment of those specific
2 roads. And no cost for paving of the
3 aforesaid roads shall be borne by the
4 borough.

5 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: I want to know
6 whose liable if they don't pay.

7 ATTORNEY RINALDI: Originally, they
8 were going to contract directly with Pennsy.
9 Pennsy it will not contract with them
10 directly.

11 They want a contract through us. So
12 then we need to adjust the memorandum of
13 understanding so that we make sure that
14 payment is either comes through us to Pennsy
15 or gets paid directly from Pennsy -- from
16 the Housing Authority to Pennsy.

17 MR. FEBBO: Could we put a time
18 factor in there to get paid from them?

19 ATTORNEY RINALDI: Yeah, we could. I
20 mean --

21 MR. FEBBO: Within so many days or
22 whatever.

23 MR. NOTARI: Why would we have to?
24 We're not the ones paving the roads.

25 MR. LOPATKA: A lot of that from

1 Pennsy's perspective goes back to the change
2 order or something that goes into the
3 contract. And that's how they track
4 everything is based off the AIA documents
5 that has the price on it.

6 Now you guys adding roads, so we
7 have a change order for this amount that
8 goes on that same contract.

9 If they're going to add more, they
10 need to somehow track how that change order
11 is being added to the contract.

12 So, a lot of it has to do with how
13 they do their accounting. Their whole deal
14 is, they're a publicly-traded company. They
15 have to do everything according to the
16 books.

17 So, to do that, the agreement os
18 with you guys, not with the Housing
19 Authority.

20 ATTORNEY RINALDI: So we can, I
21 mean, we got time now, right?

22 MR. LOPATKA: Yeah, we got time now.
23 There's no doubt.

24 ATTORNEY RINALDI: So, I mean, we
25 can play with this to say -- I can ask them

1 to put anything in. 30 days before. If we
2 knew the amount, the money has got to be
3 posted.

4 MR. LOPATKA: I can get the amount.
5 All he gave me at the time was the square
6 yard number, based on a paving section that
7 we gave him.

8 ATTORNEY RINALDI: So, if we have
9 the change order and the amount, put in here
10 the money needs to be deposited ex-number of
11 days before the project begins.

12 MR. LOPATKA: Right.

13 MR. NOTARI: My general concern is
14 that, in five years that we've had this
15 problem, at least five years that I've been
16 hearing about it and talking about it, both
17 through my job and now as a member of
18 Council, that we've never gotten this far.
19 We've never gotten this close to actually
20 getting these roads paved.

21 And I just fear that if we delay it
22 any more or ask for any more and I know what
23 the other Councilmen are talking about and I
24 know Attorney Rinaldi is talking about, I
25 just feel like -- I just feel like any more

1 that we delay an agreement is a time that
2 they can back out of it, is a time that this
3 could all go away and we can be back to
4 square one.

5 MR. LOPATKA: I think what Bill said
6 is to add that little bit of language saying
7 that prior to Pennsy beginning work on your
8 roads and on anything that they're going to
9 do, they need to deposit the money by a
10 certain date.

11 If they don't deposit the money,
12 they don't get the roads paved, under your
13 contract.

14 MR. NOTARI: My question would be
15 then, if we do add that into the
16 stipulation, Bill, and you present that to
17 them and they say, no, we can't do that,
18 where are we at then?

19 ATTORNEY RINALDI: Well, I'll ask
20 them if they can do it that way. If they
21 can't do it that way, they can't do it that
22 way.

23 MR. FERRETT: Is there any possible
24 way that they can come up with some funds
25 and put it in escrow somewhere, somehow?

1 ATTORNEY RINALDI: That's what we're
2 going to ask.

3 MR. FERRETT: You to find out,
4 because, you know what, up in the other
5 housing project, what did they do, a
6 half-million dollars project up there, all
7 the sidewalks and all that things in the
8 other thing, and they can't pave the roads
9 down here. That's all HUD.

10 Do it in one place but they can't do
11 it in another place. But they want us to
12 take the responsibility.

13 ATTORNEY RINALDI: They are doing
14 it. It was a timing issue because we wanted
15 it done ASAP. So, this was the ASAP way to
16 do it, which was, piggyback -- we already
17 bid it.

18 They weren't going to bid this for
19 another year and a half. We were speeding
20 it up.

21 MR. FERRETT: I understand that,
22 saving money by doing all this. We
23 understand that. But they're on our
24 shoulders by doing this.

25 Because, without us, they can't do

1 nothing. And the fact is, when somebody is
2 on your shoulders, you know as well as
3 anybody else, the liability lies on that
4 person whose shoulders you're carrying
5 everybody.

6 That was a big argument we had here
7 all the time. Why doesn't the Borough pay
8 and we'll reimburse the Borough?

9 Now, everything is black and white,
10 that they're going to pay. That's fine. Let
11 them put some money up front in escrow that
12 they got the money to go ahead and do the
13 work.

14 ATTORNEY RINALDI: They were
15 supposed to pave it. That was the last
16 meeting.

17 MR. FERRETT: Everything on paper is
18 one thing. Paying is another thing.

19 ATTORNEY RINALDI: Never anything on
20 paper with that. That came to a meeting and
21 said, we'll pave it this year. Don't worry
22 about it. You said -- you were here.

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yep.

24 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Before that we
25 had, they went back and forth with us. I

1 just don't trust them. I don't. I mean, I
2 don't know.

3 Were either of you guys in either of
4 those meetings? Do you know what I mean?
5 One meeting they're telling us that we're
6 going to pave them. They're our roads.

7 The next week later, getting a phone
8 call saying, nope, not doing nothing.
9 They're not ours. They're yours.

10 ATTORNEY RINALDI: We can ask them,
11 tell them we need the money on hand,
12 somewhere in escrow.

13 MR. FEBBO: Not going to do until
14 the spring. If we come forward and request
15 that now, get them plenty of time.

16 ATTORNEY RINALDI: Got time to ask.
17 It's not a problem. It was a rush job, but
18 we missed the season, because they had to
19 get their stuff in order. And just the way
20 it is.

21 Kept pushing them and then kept more
22 requirements from HUD.

23 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: More comfortable
24 where we want it.

25 MR. LENCESKI: Bill, you wrote the

1 memorandum of understanding or they wrote
2 it?

3 ATTORNEY RINALDI: They wrote it and
4 I changed it twice, I think.

5 MR. LENCESKI: Do you really think
6 it's necessary that we go through all this
7 right now or should we --

8 ATTORNEY RINALDI: We can put it off
9 another month. They're not going to pave.
10 They didn't tell me we needed it to do it.

11 MR. LENCESKI: Do you think it's
12 necessary?

13 ATTORNEY RINALDI: I don't see
14 another 30 days is going to hurt anything.
15 If it's a rush --

16 MR. LOPATKA: I don't think that's
17 necessary. I think the final product is
18 necessary for actually to get paid or for
19 Pennsy so get paid.

20 MR. FEBBO: Saying money forward.
21 Give them time from now until the spring.
22 If Bills puts that in there, they can review
23 it now.

24 ATTORNEY RINALDI: I'm sure they can
25 use the old one to get approval from HUD.

1 HUD probably said get us this one with this
2 language. So, we'll do it.

3 MR. LOPATKA: Some of that language
4 was added because I got a phone call from
5 Pennsy saying we can't contract with them
6 because we're using your bid documents.

7 MS. BARTOLETTI: Not because they
8 don't want to. Not because they don't want
9 to.

10 MR. NOTARI: Because our bid document
11 is a better price.

12 MR. LOPATKA: No.

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: The contract is with
14 us.

15 MR. LOPATKA: No. The bid
16 document -- the price they're getting is --
17 I mean, yeah, at the time, I guess maybe
18 it's a better price. I don't know.

19 But it was your bid price,
20 basically, the numbers they got. I mean, in
21 the same respect, Pennsy has agreed to
22 compare their price.

23 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: That's fine.

24 ATTORNEY RINALDI: The County was
25 going to sign the contract, but Pennsy said

1 no, we don't want the County to sign.

2 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: That's fine. Work
3 off hours. As long as not touching our
4 money or going off of what we're doing for
5 that change order, I don't care if they're
6 on the same contract or not. But I want to
7 get paid.

8 I don't want to be stuck with the
9 bill for them two roads.

10 MR. LOPATKA: No. It's a
11 substantial amount of money.

12 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: I don't know about
13 you, Joe.

14 MR. LOPATKA: Good amount of money,
15 probably a 150 grand or.

16 ATTORNEY RINALDI: All right. So ask
17 them to make that change.

18 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Thanks, Bill.
19 Anything else?

20 ATTORNEY RINALDI: Yeah. There was
21 something else. Okay. The real estate. You
22 have to just adopt a proposed budget tonight
23 just so you can get it out and advertised
24 for ten days so we can pass it in our
25 regular meeting in December.

1 And that has to be run as soon as
2 you say, this is our tentative budget.

3 If you want to talk five minutes,
4 just five minutes, I'll ask for an executive
5 session on the police contract. Won't take
6 long at all.

7 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Anybody have any
8 questions for Bill? Thanks, Bill. Marylynn.
9 Borough manager's report, please.

10 BOROUGH MANAGER'S REPORT

11 MS. BARTOLETTI: I'm going to send
12 everyone an updated copy of the budget to
13 look at while we talk.

14 MR. FERRETT: Updated?

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Just a couple little
16 changes from what you had. Everyone had one
17 over the past couple days. Bob, it's the
18 same one you just got, Bob Mulkerin, not
19 you.

20 MR. FERRETT: A lot of changes made?

21 MS. BARTOLETTI: No, just a couple.
22 I put names on them.

23 MR. FERRETT: Want to ask you one
24 question. I looked at the old one and
25 everything. And I'm a little confused Over

1 here, because I have a little concern with
2 everything.

3 It says 2017, \$80,000.00, were we
4 supposed to get a new truck this year?

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes, we're in the
6 process of working on that now.

7 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: What number is
8 that?

9 MS. BARTOLETTI: It's there, so it
10 will just carry into 2018.

11 MR. FERRETT: Next year.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: I'll just move the
13 figures over, yeah. That's the way at the
14 end, so maybe start at the very beginning.

15 Go back page 1. So, if you look at
16 page 1, it gives you -- this is the general
17 portions, so it gives you our revenues.

18 A lot of those are, you know, very
19 similar to previous years. They just change
20 a little bit.

21 They carry into page 2. And you'll
22 see a total on the top of page 3. So, the
23 revenues for the budget for 2018 general is
24 \$2,828,054.00. Okay?

25 ATTORNEY RINALDI: Marylynn, that's

1 approximately \$260,000.00 more than --

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yeah.

3 ATTORNEY RINALDI: -- than the
4 actual of last year?

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: Here's why, because
6 we still have a month to go. So, these
7 actual figures, in 2017, will continue to
8 change until we finalize this budget.

9 Because, whether we have a payroll,
10 whether I pay invoices, this changes
11 constantly. When deposits come in, for
12 example, if we get a tax check from Gary or
13 if we get an LST tax, anything like that, it
14 will up -- we'll update this and I change it
15 every single day. Okay?

16 So, your 2017 actual will continue
17 to change, like I said, until we pass this
18 budget. When we pass it, I stop updating.

19 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Only budgeted
20 16,000 more than what you budgeted in '17.

21 MS. BARTOLETTI: Basically, yes.

22 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Okay.

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: So far so good?
24 Okay with that? So now we'll go into the
25 expense section. Okay?

1 And a lot of the things in here,
2 they stay the same year after year. Salaries
3 for you know all guys, for example.
4 Anything that's highlighted is something
5 that has not been changed yet.

6 So, for example, there's a couple
7 people who may not be part of unions and
8 their salaries have not been changed yet.

9 MR. LENCESKI: They're bold.

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

11 MR. FERRETT: Any consideration for
12 Borough Council?

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: That's up to you
14 guys. You can't just change it though,
15 right, Bill? You have to make some
16 adjustments.

17 ATTORNEY RINALDI: Change it this
18 year for the next election.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Has to be for
20 following. You missed it.

21 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: What are the max?

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Do you have that
23 with you? They're not at the max. Pretty
24 low, actually.

25 MR. FEBBO: 180 isn't it, a month?

1 MS. BARTOLETTI: Bill is going to
2 look that part up.

3 MR. FERRETT: We only get 150.

4 MR. LENCESKI: Take it from other
5 peoples' salaries.

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: If you look at 403,
7 the tax collector. I don't know if you guys
8 remember, but it was approved that you were
9 going to up the salary of the tax collector.
10 But that was done over a year ago.

11 And it was based on, you know,
12 whoever would win the election and start for
13 January of 2018, so that's been reflected on
14 here.

15 Let's see what else you need to
16 look at. There are some change, as you go
17 through. I don't want to just generally
18 point things out.

19 If you go to page 5, you'll see the
20 whole section of the police department.
21 There's a section that Rick brought up about
22 a possibility of a new vehicle for the
23 chief.

24 I put the total amount in. So, right
25 now, out bottom line is a little bit -- it's

1 a little bit to the negative. But it's
2 because I have the whole amount, which is
3 51,200. If we decide to finance that, of
4 course we would only show one year's worth
5 of financing, which would probably be about
6 10,500 per year.

7 Or we could possibly, you know, do
8 something with the A.S.L. money. We've done
9 that twice before with vehicles in the past,
10 because they're capital purchases.

11 ATTORNEY RINALDI: Mary, before you
12 go on.

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

14 MR. NOTARI: Is this a car only you
15 will use?

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes, the chief
17 vehicle.

18 MR. NOTARI: No other Officer will
19 use it?

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: No. It stays with
21 him constantly.

22 CHIEF DUBERNAS: The new vehicle I
23 have now will go to Steve.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Pass that down to
25 Steve. What we will be doing is --

1 MR. PAPI: The one that doesn't lock
2 itself?

3 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yeah. What we would
4 be doing is putting Steve's up for sale and
5 the one that's in the back now that's
6 retired, the unmarked vehicle. Those two
7 would be up for sale.

8 And that's reflected as a revenue,
9 of course, the sale of Borough equipment is
10 listed in the revenue section.

11 MR. NOTARI: If we financed that
12 vehicle, how much more would it cost us over
13 the -- have you done that research yet?

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yeah. It's not a
15 whole lot. It's probably maybe like a
16 thousand dollars, \$1,500.00, somewhere
17 around in.

18 Excuse me. We usually have a very,
19 very, very good interest rate when we
20 finance. You know, it just a matter of how
21 we decide to do it, but.

22 MR. NOTARI: Obviously, if we finance
23 it, it would help you balance the budget.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Absolutely. Or if we
25 pay for it through A.S.L., it just gets

1 moved to a different part of the budget all
2 together.

3 So, either way, when you -- we get
4 to the bottom line of the general, you'll
5 see that's where the difference is going to
6 be right now, so.

7 MR. NOTARI: Does the finance
8 committee have any recommendation on that or
9 thoughts on that?

10 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: We talked about
11 it.

12 MR. NOTARI: Whether we finance or
13 take it out of the A.S.L.

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: What I would figure
15 we would do is bass it tonight the way it is
16 and then, you know, we'll have it worked out
17 when it's time for the final passage.

18 I would like to have more definitive
19 figures on financing. But, you know, as
20 long as everyone is in agreement that we are
21 going to purchase the vehicle, then I'll do
22 more work on it. Okay?

23 ATTORNEY RINALDI: Between 5 and
24 \$10,000.00, it's up to \$2,500.00 a year
25 population-wise.

1 MR. FERRETT: The salary?

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: 2,500 a year per
3 person. And you guys get --

4 MR. FERRETT: 1900.

5 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Go for max, Joe.
6 Make a motion.

7 ATTORNEY RINALDI: Population between
8 5 and 10,000.

9 MR. FERRETT: What about the
10 insurance and benefits and everything, could
11 we get that? After 15 years, you're
12 entitled to it. I'm here 17 years. I can
13 file for it.

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: My budget doesn't
15 include that.

16 MR. FERRETT: Wait a while. This is
17 only the tentative budget.

18 Wait. The recommendation didn't go
19 in yet. I didn't get a chance to talk yet.

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: Let's move on to
21 the next section.

22 MR. FERRETT: I'm here 15 years. I
23 want those benefits.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Finish the police
25 department now. Go to emergency services,

1 which is pretty much -- that's money that we
2 give to the fire company and, you know, that
3 type of stuff.

4 Zoning, I had a couple questions on
5 the zoning section on why these numbers are
6 so high.

7 If you look at the actual, it's
8 54,775, that number is going to basically
9 match in the money coming in and the money
10 going out.

11 So, don't get too hung up on that.
12 That's why I budget the same amount
13 basically every year because, whatever comes
14 in, goes right back out. And it's basically
15 a wash.

16 MR. NOTARI: Pass-thru.

17 MS. BARTOLETTI: Exactly. Right now,
18 the numbers are high because of Mr. Dunbar's
19 project and things like that.

20 MAYOR MULKERIN: Just for that, you
21 budgeted 30,000 --

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

23 MAYOR MULKERIN: -- this current
24 year.

25 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

1 MAYOR MULKERIN: But then on the
2 expense or the revenue side, you budgeted
3 for 30,000.

4 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

5 MAYOR MULKERIN: Actually, we had
6 more coming in so far than going out, right?
7 So far. There may be some things in motion.

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yeah, because,
9 usually, end up right about the same place.

10 MAYOR MULKERIN: So you budgeted
11 revenue 30,000 coming in but 30,000 going
12 out to them.

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: Exactly. Exactly.
14 And the actual figures, you know, they
15 change a little bit, because the Borough
16 does keep some of the money.

17 But, and then it catches up as I
18 paid the invoices as well. So, it ends up
19 all in the same place.

20 The next one is sanitation. That's
21 basically our Mascaro contract. That's what
22 we pay out.

23 So, the amount that I put in for the
24 budget is our exact contracted amount. The
25 contract goes from July 1st to June 30th.

1 So, it's half and half, so we just split it
2 up. And that's the number we come up with.

3 The next section is the street
4 department. I don't know if anybody has any
5 questions on DPW sections. It's pretty much
6 black and white.

7 MR. NOTARI: I have a question.

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: Go right ahead.

9 MR. NOTARI: 430.13, DPW staff. You
10 have a budgeted number for '17 at 227 and
11 change for '18, it's 204 and change.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

13 MR. NOTARI: Yet, the actual for '17
14 is a lot less.

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Because we have guy
16 on comp right now.

17 MR. NOTARI: Seems like it's lot less
18 every year.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Because we always
20 seem to have someone out on comp. So, what I
21 do is, when I do the budget, based on the
22 entire team being there.

23 So, when we have someone out on
24 comp, obviously, we're not the paying them.
25 They're being paid by our insurance company.

1 And we have had an awful lot of that lately.

2 And then the other thing is, we used
3 to carry one more employee. And it was
4 decided that we were not going to replace
5 the one employee, so that's why the budgeted
6 figure for this year is less than last year
7 was the difference there. And it's one
8 person's salary.

9 MR. NOTARI: Currently have one
10 person --

11 MS. BARTOLETTI: Still have one
12 person on comp, who has an appointment
13 tomorrow. So keep our fingers crossed that
14 he's coming back.

15 MR. NOTARI: Okay. Go ahead.

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: All right. Any other
17 questions for the DPW section? No. Okay.

18 Go over to the next page.
19 Everything is pretty much explanatory, until
20 we get to insurances.

21 As we discussed in the previous
22 meeting about our workmen's comp. Insurance,
23 since back to workmen's comp, since we've
24 had, so many claims, we had to go back to
25 State Workers' Insurance Fund.

1 So, our insurance for comp. is much
2 higher than we've been paying. But there's
3 nothing we can do about that for now. We
4 have to hang out with them for at least a
5 year or so.

6 We're in the process of doing some --
7 setting up some training and stuff like that
8 to try to lower claims, lower our insurance
9 rates, you know, the whole bit just to see
10 if there's anything we can change.

11 I do have faith that we have a lot
12 of different people now in DPW, and we
13 shouldn't be seeing as much as the accidents
14 and things like that that we've had in the
15 future or had in the past.

16 MAYOR MULKERIN: Where are you Mary,
17 in what section?

18 MR. NOTARI: 489. 482, page 8. Mary,
19 at the top of the page, snow removal.
20 430.10, salt.

21 MS. BARTOLETTI: What I did with the
22 salt, I took the road salts and put it for
23 this year in the liquid fuel section because
24 it's one of the main expenses that you're
25 allow to claim with liquid fuels.

1 So, since we do have a bit of money
2 extra in our liquid fuels portion and our
3 general fund was really tight, what I did
4 was I transferred the road salt from the
5 general to liquid fuels.

6 Now, if we have a mild winter, we
7 won't spend anywhere near \$30,000.00. So, I
8 all put that to the highest amount.

9 But it's something that I felt we
10 had to do this year. And I think it's a
11 fair way.

12 In the past, it always came from the
13 liquid fuels section. And then as we
14 started to get a little more comfortable
15 with the general, we moved it over.

16 So, for now, you know, even if every
17 other year we change it back and forth, but
18 I think it's a fair place to have it right
19 now.

20 If you go to the next page, page 9,
21 this is basically miscellaneous. You know,
22 it's part of the payroll taxes section, the
23 pension section. There's not a whole lot
24 that changes in there.

25 The miscellaneous expense number

1 489.00, which is rather high, that is a
2 catch are that we put things that don't have
3 another home. And one of the reasons that
4 that's actually high, we discussed in the
5 previous meeting about a check that we had
6 to deposit for the fire on Oak Street, which
7 was \$65,000.00.

8 So, went into general and came right
9 back out of the general, because we had to
10 give it to the property owners.

11 So, other than that, it's just, you
12 know, small little thing is in there. But,
13 when you get to the bottom line, it tells
14 you that we have, at this point, a negative
15 \$42,051.00 for our budget.

16 And like I said, once we figure out
17 what we're going to do with the chief's
18 vehicle, you'll see that that will go right
19 into place.

20 We also will be carrying forward
21 some excess money in the general fund that
22 gives us a cushion.

23 MR. NOTARI: Unemployment
24 compensation, 485.00.

25 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. That's a

1 payroll tax.

2 MR. NOTARI: Payroll tax?

3 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

4 MR. NOTARI: So, I'm hooking at
5 what you had budgeted for 2017 and what the
6 actual is. Are we going to lose that
7 \$20,000.00 in the next six weeks?

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: Nope. I overbudgeted
9 on that, which is good. Sometimes you just
10 -- what I do is I take everything to the max
11 on what possibly may happen, you know,
12 between having the couple people that didn't
13 work and having the contracts.

14 Next section, page 10, A.S.L. This
15 would be our sanitary landfill money,
16 Alliance money.

17 So, if you look at the 2018 budget
18 line, the first 1.3 million is what we will
19 be carrying in to 2018.

20 The next \$250,000.00 is the amount
21 that we anticipate receiving from the
22 landfill, the \$1.20 per ton fee.

23 MR. NOTARI: During 2018?

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: During 2018. So,
25 what I anticipated in that account is 1.6

1 million, basically.

2 MR. NOTARI: At the end of the year,
3 if we didn't touch it?

4 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. Now, if we go
5 to the expenditure section, these are just
6 some things that we sometimes put in there.

7 The 15,000 that you see is a salary
8 for an inspector, that, at any time, the
9 Borough can have an inspector that we would
10 pay to go up there and hang out in and
11 inspect what they're doing.

12 It's something that you have --
13 you're entitled to do if you want to do.
14 We've never -- over the years, never opted
15 to do it. But I keep it there just in case.

16 Okay. So, the next items, as you go
17 down the budgeted section, flags, 3,000 for
18 Christmas lights, that's a just in case.
19 Sometimes we have to change bulbs and things
20 like that and they get expensive.

21 The capital purchase for the police,
22 the \$20,000.00, as you'll see, that carried
23 over from the 2017 budget column, which is
24 the items that Jason was talking about
25 tonight.

1 And then transfer to general. I
2 always put that transfer to general, 30,000,
3 in case we need it. But we never use it.
4 We never take it.

5 You'll see the DPW truck, I carried
6 forward, because we haven't actually made
7 that purchase yet.

8 There's a zero in the park section,
9 capital purchase that I have highlighted,
10 that's because we were discussing the
11 possibility of doing some work at upper
12 Pagnotti Park. And I don't have a figure
13 for it yet.

14 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Did you make any
15 phone calls for --

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: I did. Working on
17 that. But because I don't have an actual
18 figure yet, it doesn't impact our actual
19 budget. That's why I have the zero there
20 and something we can plug in we decide to do
21 it.

22 Okay. Next page, page 11. This is
