ATTORNEY RINALDI: So now you have a 1 contract for these roads, which they can't do. 2 MR. LOPATKA: First ones they do in the 3 Spring. 4 MR. FERRETT: I understand that. 5 whenever you put a contract out for \$600,000.00, and, 6 unfortunately, the roads that you put out there, you're 7 anticipating -- your engineers is anticipating this is 8 what \$600,000.00 is going to come in at. 9 Being that the prices are something we 10 don't control, it came in at \$443,000.00. 11 MS. BARTOLETTI: So that became the 12 13 contract. Just a minute. Which MR. FERRETT: No. 14 means you still have a right to go ahead and spend that 15 other \$150,000.00 to put out what you originally put 16 out of \$600,000.00. You have a right to do that. 17 MS. BARTOLETTI: On our side, yeah. 18 their contract, they looked at a \$447,000.00 contract, 19 because that's where their bid came in. 2.0 ATTORNEY RINALDI: And you are. But 21 there's no more work under that contract for them to do 22 until you submitted this change order. 23 MS. BARTOLETTI: But the good thing, Joe, 24 is they're going to do it at the same price. 25

ATTORNEY RINALDI: You can't just say 1 there's \$600,000.00 worth of work to do, come and do 2 It wasn't in the bid documents. Those streets 3 weren't included. We included them now as part of it. MR. FERRETT: I understand that. But I'm telling you, when you put out -- when you vote on a 6 contract, I'm talking about the Council, to do 7 \$600,000.00 paving, and when you go to work and put 8 this bid out, you think those rules that you put out 9 10 that come in \$600,000.00 and you get the price that comes in by Pennsy at 443, that means you have a right 11 to go ahead and put a change order in to make up the 12 difference under the same -- under the same document 13 that this Council voted on. 14 MR. NOTARI: We're doing that, Joe. 15 But not until next year. MR. FERRETT: 16 I'm talking about now. 17 ATTORNEY RINALDI: But you didn't give 18 19 them the change order until --MR. LOPATKA: Under the same contract. 20 The contract is --21 They don't know the fact MS. BARTOLETTI: 22 that we were thinking \$600,000.00. So, for us, it was 23 a gift that it came in at 450. 24

So, you're saying 600,000. But you put

it out for bid, anticipating a really good price. So we got lucky and got a really good price at 450.

So, they look at the contract being 450,000 and that's it. So, now if we want to add to it and they're honoring those prices and everything, it's good they're keeping it until next year. I even spoke to our representative.

MR. LOPATKA: Even if it goes up, it doesn't change your numbers.

ATTORNEY RINALDI: You don't bid out the contract and say put in the bid, hey, we got \$600,000.00 of roads to bid. No. You give them the bid with the specs for the roads you want to pave. And they come in and give you a number, which they did.

MR: LOPATKA: When we do paving anymore, what we'll do is, we'll put each road and all the roads we'll put on there. We'll put a bunch of them on this, as alternate. Then we can always do an alternate when you do your contract.

Then if you have a base bid and it came back at 450, which we didn't anticipate and we had those five roads already in there as alternates, then we would have had numbers for them already. And we could have tacked it on.
