MR. PAPI: It looks like it's going So this week. I told them when the weather breaks. So you think My other question is at the end of Smith and First streets there are responsibility? Is that the property owner's responsibility to clean? MR. PAPI: Property owner's. MR. NOTARI: Steve, can you contact or -- it's the big slope that goes up to The end of Smith and First there's MR. BIERYLA: All right. MR. NOTARI: Right at the stop sign there's some trees sticking out and one fell MR. SEMENZA: Are they on the MR. NOTARI: I want to say the one tree that's fallen is probably close to, if

was terrible. But I had marked all our lines and they did all the work right on top of our lines. The water company was there. They did a couple of cuts also.

When we went to flush it we couldn't get through. It was all gravel from the fresh cut. As we were flushing it down we could see the ground dropping ahead of us. So I called Steve Ozalinski. They had to come and replace their line because it was contaminated with sewage. So they did everything. Earthworks was there the day before opening the line because it was backing up into the lady who lives on the corner. It went into her basement. So about three, four inches of sewage she had in her basement.

MR. FEBBO: Who is responsible for that?

MR. HOOVER: We cleaned it up, the water company.

MR. PAPI: My job is to get that sewer open ASAP. We dug it open and let it flow, then the water company said we're on

have to go down to the magistrate's. MR. SEMENZA: I think we'll move MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any

questions for Steve?

MR. NOTARI: I have one question.

Steve, there's a letter in our packet regarding Panel Prints, DEP.

MR. BIERYLA: They're building an explosion-proof room down there, so DEP has to go down and do their inspections for contaminants within the building.

MR. NOTARI: So it's just all part of the process? It's nothing we have to worry about?

MR. BIERYLA: Correct, because that's DEP getting involved to do step one, and then they have a building permit in to BIU for the room itself.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have anything for Steve? Thanks, Steve. Dave, engineer's report?

MR. LOPATKA: I just had one -well, two things. One was the DPW. At the
last meeting you guys requested that I send
out the plans to three contractors. A.R.
Linde that's doing Corcoran Street; TSE, who
was going to do Grace Street; and to
Earthworks. I only received one bid back.

The bid was from Earthworks for \$16,000. I did e-mail it to Marylynn. I'm not sure if you guys require three quotes or solicitation of three quotes for it to --

MS. BARTOLETTI: I think even though we asked and people didn't respond, we have one, Bill. Do we still have to try to get two others?

ATTY. RINALDI: That's what I have to look up.

MR. LOPATKA: I can send it out right away. We got one back. We didn't get them from the other two. I can send it out tomorrow to a couple other contractors.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I would feel more comfortable.

MR. LOPATKA: The church, I was talking with Bill and he asked me if we can get a survey, boundary survey done of the church property, and I got a number together to do that survey. It was \$2,665. That's the complete boundary, a map and a subdivision plan. You have to combine the lots and then resubdivide them.

ATTY. RINALDI: Separate them and

combine.

MR. LOPATKA: That includes setting whatever corners are missing, the complete boundary and mapping. That's all I have.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Dave?

MR. HOOVER: We did two jobs on Brook Street and Oak Street last year, the water company. They're paved. There's a small problem down on Brook Street we're going to take care of when the weather breaks. Corcoran Street is still up in the air.

MR. FERRETT: Dave, I believe
Russell brought it up at the last meeting or something about the roads that were supposed to be paved last year that were pushed off for this year. Where do we stand on this thing? Everybody's asking about the project down on Eisenhower Drive and everything like that, what's going on. Are they -- the county giving us money before we get started?

MR. SEMENZA: That's a question towards Bill.

ATTY. RINALDI: I actually talked to the chairman on Friday who, I found out, isn't their chairman anymore. Paul Walker was the chairman. He just got fired.

That's why I didn't get any answer Friday.

MR. SEMENZA: Who is the new one now?

ATTY. RINALDI: He told me. I don't know.

MR. LOPATKA: We just need to coordinate with them because there was an agreement between you and their solicitor as to how it was going to happen. Pennsy actually called me and asked me if that was going to take place and when it was going to take place. Until the housing authority tells or Bill finds out how it's going to be paid --

ATTY. RINALDI: Just cut the check.

Do it that way. We'll get it paid. The contract's going to be our change order anyway.

MR. LOPATKA: It has to be a change order.

MR. FERRETT: Wait a while. Let me

understand this correctly. Are we going to get the money before we get involved in this thing?

ATTY. RINALDI: That's what I just said, tell them to cut the check.

MR. FERRETT: Well, make sure we're not cutting our check.

MR. LOPATKA: I'll call Pennsy and we'll coordinate it with them.

MR. FERRETT: Mr. Chairman, I'm just wondering at this point whether it might be in our interest, the remaining hundred-some thousand dollars that we were involved in doing these additional streets, that we postpone that until next year when we do paving and we can do a match. I'm not too crazy getting involved with our extension of this project along with the county and so forth like this. We're only doing --

MR. SEMENZA: So what do you want to do, another paving project?

MR. FERRETT: Next year? It's up to you guys. I can only recommend.

MR. SEMENZA: I think we should look into a storm water project before we start

doing any more paving projects.

MS. BARTOLETTI: What Joe is saying is the part that the borough --

MR SEMENZA: I got you.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Based on last year's contract, to not do that this year. Wait until next year.

MR. LOPATKA: You guys have to wait to see if you can carry that contract. I don't think you can carry that contract to another year.

MR. SEMENZA: So we have to do that now?

MR. LOPATKA: Well, if you want to do you -- if you had planned on adding you can do it or you can take it off. We can do a change order to remove it. I mean, Pennsy's not going to carry the contract for another year.

MR. FERRETT: I'm not interested in extending the contract for another year.

All I'm merely saying is being that we didn't do the project last year, when we were supposed to do it, we extended it for this year. Being that we had extended that,

the county wanted to jump in with us to try
to get -- all I'm merely saying is let the
county go ahead and do the project as
directed. I'm saying that we should back
away with it, and then next year when we do
a project we'll post those streets on the
project, whatever the cost --

MR. LOPATKA: We'll do the change order for that, do that work, then close the contract out.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

MR. FERRETT: That's up to the council if they want to do that. That's only what I'm recommending.

MR. SEMENZA: That's your recommendation?

MR. FERRETT: That's what I'm recommending, because rather than doing five little streets, we're better off doing a big project, do \$500,000 or \$600,000, and do volume. You get a better price.

MR. SEMENZA: All right.

MS. BARTOLETTI: You're better off doing it that way because usually we like to use our liquid fuels money to pay for the

paving, and because that -- the amount of streets that you were going to add on is over ten percent of the cost of the entire project we wouldn't be able to use liquid fuels funds. You would have to use borough money. So if you start over again and have a new contract next year you'll be able to use the whole thing from liquid fuels. So it's definitely a better way to go.

MR. FERRETT: I'm just more interested in getting away from the county. I don't trust the county.

MR. NOTARI: So last year we did the paving project. Right? It came in way under bid. Right? When it came in way under bid you suggested that we add streets to make up the difference in the money that we were saving.

MR. FERRETT: That's correct.

MR. NOTARI: So now you're saying let's save the money and not do the streets?

MR. FERRETT: Right.

MR. NOTARI: Okay, that's fine.

MR. HOOVER: What streets are we supposed to pave?

MR. LOPATKA: I have to go back.

I'll get you the information in the contract, what was added and what wasn't, get back to you guys.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: There were six streets. Right?

MR. LOPATKA: I believe. I'll pull that out, get it for you. If we added them we can just do a change order and take them out and do a change order to add the ones once we get their information.

MR. NOTARI: Dave, Corcoran, do we have a start time on that yet?

MR. LOPATKA: I don't. I noted the contractor had contacted me. We sent him a letter -- I think we sent him a notice to proceed letter. So I'm waiting for him to get shots back to me. I'll call him, see where they're at. I know that they were looking to get started and the last two weeks I didn't hear from them.

MR. NOTARI: And Kohler, the meeting is tomorrow, Marylynn?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Kohler is tomorrow at 3:00. It's a preconstruction meeting,

and if the weather is good it's on Kohler Avenue. If the weather is not good it's here.

MR. FEBBO: Is Soden still the contractor on that?

MR. LOPATKA: Yes.

MR. NOTARI: There's a pave cut on Hoover Street between Susquehanna and Moosic Road, right next to Marmo's house. In that area. It hasn't been paved. It looks like it needs to be paved. Jason Evans, maybe, in front of his house.

MR. BIERYLA: But I have a Francelli. They were going to be in town, and I guess they started and the weather changed on them. But they were doing all the reclaim of all the pave cuts. I believe, if I'm saying this right, there was 42 of them. I don't know exactly where they were, but there was 42 reclaims for final finish. I'll check the file.

MR. NOTARI: Attorney Rinaldi, Chris Patrick is the new chairman of the housing authority.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?

MR. NOTARI: No. Thank you.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have any questions for Dave?

MR. BIERYLA: What I'd like to add, being that Pride Mobility is doing that massive project, and they were here at the planning meeting in April, they're coming back in May. So that would be May 3rd, 7:30. If all of the council members were there, because it is going to be a big project, so you're aware of exactly -- the residents. We had a map -- we had more people in here than you had at the voting because of the project.

MR. LOPATKA: We're in the process of reviewing it now.

MR. BIERYLA: So you'll understand exactly where they stand and where the residents stand question-wise and what they're actually doing for the residents just so everybody could know when it comes in front of you for the plan approval.

MR. SEMENZA: Can we get council all the information, Dave, as we go forward?

MR. LOPATKA: I'll review it and

I'll send it to Marylynn and I can have her copy you guys.

MR. SEMENZA: Just so if anybody wants to look anything over before that meeting.

MR. NOTARI: It was at the last planning meeting. If you can get to it to listen to what's going on. It's a pretty big project and some of the residents were upset that --

MR. HOOVER: Very.

MR. NOTARI: -- they're going to lose some of their quality of life. There's nothing we can do as long as they follow the rules of the borough.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have anything for Dave? Thanks, David. Chief, what have you got?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: You guys have my report, you have my traffic study for Butler Street. Any questions on that? In between the driveway, Cedar Lane and Garber Street, the short distances. Then with the parking, offset of 15 feet for each one, maybe get one to two cars on the right hand side. So

from North Main to Garber make it no parking because it will be all chopped up. You're going to allow one car to park there. You have a house there. They're saying it's vacant now, but if it becomes occupied you're going to block the people's driveway.

Then Cedar Lane comes out behind the church, Turkey Hill, and then the intersection of Garber Street. At the widest it's 24 feet there.

MR. SEMENZA: Bill, did you look into any ordinances that would come into play here for having cars in the street with a business like that? Do you understand what I'm saying?

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, if they're customers --

MR. SEMENZA: Well, one ordinance I did see in our code book was a vehicle parked on the road for 72 hours or more -- correct me if I'm wrong, somebody -- is against our code.

ATTY. RINALDI: I think that's a ticket that the chief hands out.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: We can give tickets

for cars parked in certain areas, but if a car is parked in front of your house for more than 72 hours, you're a resident there. But if it's abandoned, then you have to go by the abandoned vehicle code.

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$ SEMENZA: I'll pull up the code after the meeting.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: We have to follow with the abandon vehicles through PennDOT. We have to send certified letters and all that.

MR. SEMENZA: We have codes in this borough for a reason.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: But you're taking somebody's property. That's why we go through PennDOT.

MR. SEMENZA: I'm not saying take the car, I'm saying ticket the car. It's illegally parked if it's more than 72 hours and it's not a resident.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: If you ticket somebody that's at a garage nobody's going to pay it. Then we'd be trying to get a warrant --

MR. HOOVER: Are you going to ticket

the garage owner or the guy who owns the car?

MR. NOTARI: Is there any way -- and my concern, I agree. I like your -- thanks for doing this, and I think we should have a motion later to restrict parking on Butler Street.

ATTY. RINALDI: You need an ordinance.

MR. NOTARI: Well, we can start that process, hopefully, later tonight. But my question is Garber Street. Because Garber Street doesn't border a commercial zone, is it possible for us to put permit parking or make that residential parking only on Garber Street? I mean, I drove by the other day and there was a van -- and I'm sure it's the van Mr. Jurosky's been talking about -- right on the corner with no license plate on it.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: No, there's a little Subaru hatchback on the corner when I was there.

MR. NOTARI: When I drove by there was a van on the corner of Garber parked the

wrong way with no license plate.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: That's up a little further. That one's under process with abandon vehicle. There's a Subaru that's being processed and there's another car.

There's three of them.

MR. NOTARI: Is there any way we can make that side of Garber Street -- both sides of Garber Street residential parking only?

MR. FEBBO: Are all three cars there related to the garage?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I'm not sure.

MR. SEMENZA: What do you mean by residential?

MR. NOTARI: You have to live in that house to park there.

MR. SEMENZA: I really don't know if we want to get involved in something like that because then everybody will be saying I want it for my house. I'd want it for my house.

MR. NOTARI: But everybody living on your street lives there. Everybody parking on your street lives there.

MR. SEMENZA: I get what you're saying. I really do.

MR. NOTARI: We have a business owner -- I don't want to say circumventing the rules, but kind of pushing the limit.

MR. FEBBO: I agree with that. I don't think that's commercial space up there so he can be allowed to park his vehicles on a resident street even for repairs. He should find a place.

MR. NOTARI: Let them park on Main Street. Main Street is commercial. The front of his business faces on Main Street.

MR. FEBBO: So are we working towards a solution on that?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I gave you my solution as per the ordinance.

MR. NOTARI: So we're basically saying there's nothing we can do for Garber Street.

ATTY. RINALDI: I thought his no parking was -- you don't want to do that one? He's in the process of towing the cars that are there.

MR. SEMENZA: That's just going to

solve this problem just this once. What about next year when it happens again and the year after that and so on and so forth?

ATTY. RINALDI: If he's putting abandoned vehicles out there and you keep picking them up it's going to cost him money to pull it out of the impound.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: And if they don't respond by a certain time and we impound it, if they don't take it from the impound lot -- our salvage is Anthracite -- they send to PennDOT for a certificate of title and they become owners of it after so long. That's why there's a whole process that we have to follow.

MR. BIERYLA: I kind of have an idea. I spoke to the mayor about it. When the police go out and they do their job and run the license plate and they go through the process of certified letters, and people -- if a person just happen to move he doesn't get the certified letter. He doesn't even know that his car is involved in anything.

MR. SEMENZA: That's what I'm saying about this ordinance about 72 hours. If we do something like that. You're illegally parked, 72 hours, tag the car. If they don't move it you tow it.

MR. FEBBO: Courtesy warning.

MR. SEMENZA: Tow it to Billy's or Schuback's. I don't think anybody here wants to hurt anybody in business, but I think we're all in a tough situation with the residents having problems with line of sight onto Main Street. I get what you're saying. But is it going to pile cars up all

on the other side now?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Well, the other side you can only put maybe four cars.

There's already a sign there that says no parking.

MR. SEMENZA: It's going to pile them up up the street in front of all the residents' houses.

MAYOR LEGG: Can we solve one problem at a time? The big problem with the gentlemen that came to the last two meetings is they can't get up that road or they can't get down the road safely. So I think it would be a good idea to worry about one problem at a time. If we have to pass an ordinance, pass an ordinance, no parking on that side of the street. That eliminates one problem right out of the chute.

As far as the abandon cars, that's something we can talk about another day, or if you want to ticket them or put red dots of whatever.

MR. SEMENZA: I think abandoned cars are one of their main issues.

ATTY. RINALDI: I think the one

you're asking about is under 328.17: "It's unlawful for any person to have a motor vehicle or any part of the same to remain upon any of the public streets or highways of the borough for a period of 72 hours if the motor vehicle or a part thereof does not have a valid registration, license plate or valid certificate of inspection which would permit the motor vehicle to travel legally on the highways."

MR. SEMENZA: So if it doesn't have a valid registration or inspection and it's there 72 hours it can be towed. Correct?

ATTY. RINALDI: I don't know if it can be towed, but it can be --

MR. SEMENZA: Why can't we tow it off the road?

ATTY. RINALDI: Actually it's a fine. You cite them.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Issue them a parking ticket.

ATTY. RINALDI: Just keep issuing them and let them build up. They'll get tired of paying them all.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I guess you

would be the one I should ask. You've been living there how long?

MR. JUROSKY: Thirty-some years.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: It seems to me the past two months it really became an issue, or has it been an issue? This is the first time we've ever heard about it.

MR. JUROSKY: It has always been an issue. He bought this place in October and it has gotten worse. We tried talking to him, he wouldn't -- I talked to him last week and he got the three vehicles moved. He could move them so fast if he cleaned his lot up and he parking some vehicles in his lot.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I noticed that. I drove up a couple times.

MR. JUROSKY: Because we made a little noise. I think the mayor is right. If you put no parking on that side I think that solves the problem. He'll be mad.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Was it like this when Mr. Williams was alive and he operated this?

MR. JUROSKY: Not as bad.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Was he more responsive to the neighbors if you said something to him? Did you guys ever go down there and talk to him?

MR. JUROSKY: Yes.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: And say Roy, this car is blocking the sight, my wife can't get in, the other neighbors --

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: I was up there a few times.

MR. JUROSKY: He snickered at us.

The only thing, we made a little noise and now he's abiding by it. I talked to him, he goes I will try to work with the neighbors.

But I think if you put no parking on that side of the street, I think it will solve a lot of problems.

I finally got a hold -- it's a company called Gift Bricks out of Wisconsin. They still have the same bricks that are out there. There's 60 left. I got the prices and the information. I stopped in to see Marylynn, and I'm going to take out an ad in the Triboro, anyone is interested in purchasing one. It's not going to be a project that the borough has to pay. It's going to be if somebody wants a brick it's \$35. Louis Mancuso said he would install the bricks.

MR. SEMENZA: What do the bricks

cost apiece?

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MAYOR LEGG: Thirty-five dollars.

I'm going to round it off to \$35 to help

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with the shipping and handling.

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MR. SEMENZA: How many available

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MAYOR LEGG: I'm not sure.

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MR. SEMENZA: If there's 60

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available spots --

spots do we have?

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MAYOR LEGG: There's not 60 spots.

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It's going to be on a first come, first

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served basis. I'll put it in for, like,

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maybe two issues. There's going to be a

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beginning and an ending time. Maybe May

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15th. At the end of that time it's going to

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be closed and we go from there.

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MR. SEMENZA: Ask Marylynn to put it

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on the website.

MAYOR LEGG: The second thing is why

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these gentlemen are here. About two months

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ago I was approached by some people that

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were interested in the Hometown Heros thing.

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So I did some checking, and when I found out

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the price of the flags and I relayed that

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information they kind of got turned off.

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Couple weeks ago John Haluska called me, and him and a whole mess of his friends -- this is part of them -- they are interested in it. John did a lot of research from Dunmore, Olyphant. It's something that's not going to cost the borough any money. I ran it by Marylynn and I went out with Paul to the poles. Some of the poles have outlets for Christmas decorations and they have things for the flags for Memorial Day, Labor Day, what have you. We're not going to touch those. There's a lot of poles that don't have anything on them.

So this is a project that if anyone wants one of these flags they purchase it.

Jaworski, I think, was one of the companies.

He's got a lot of information for you. They will be installed by the group. It's not going to cost the borough any money or any manpower. But John wanted to expound a little bit. He had a handout for everyone.

MR. HALUSKA: This is Muhlenburg

Township. Thank you for the opportunity to

present this to council. Thank you for the

veterans who came here tonight. Old Forge Borough, we're a little late in this program, but that doesn't mean we can't do it, with council's approval.

I traveled across the area. I noticed every community around us has this going on, and the American Legion in some instances took it to the forefront. I took it, along with Rich Melucci. We got some veterans here, and we want council to help us to get this program into Old Forge so we can honor our veterans. It's about \$180 to \$200 for the actual banners. They can put one picture on both sides of the veteran.

There are stipulations. We'll have to get our committee together. You can put up to four pictures, you can split them.

Naturally they're small. The veteran has to be in uniform, honorably discharged. That's what we would want as a veterans organization.

Council could help us with maybe spreading the word out there that you're behind us, and I just want to put Old Forge on the map now to get veterans recognition.

This is active veterans, former veterans, deceased veterans. Jaworski will supply the hardware for the poles.

As far as the businesses in town, we'll solicit the businesses to see what they can help us with maybe to defray the costs.

I also saw one community, there was no veteran available -- they couldn't find the picture they wanted to honor a grandfather maybe from World War II. You can put the logo of the Marine Corps, US Army, Coast Guard, Navy, whatever they served in, to honor that individual with a name underneath if there's not a photo. But we would prefer photos because it takes those bricks, which I happened to have my name on that years ago, to put our images out there and to let the youth see what the veterans are all about.

I'll keep it short. I just want to thank the veterans that are here tonight.

MR. SEMENZA: What can we do for you to help you guys? Spread the word? What else do you need? What kind of funding do

you need to get this off the ground?

MR. HALUSKA: It's going to cost -each individual will have to pay for the
banner itself. So the borough can help us
if we can have the actual money sent to the
borough, some type of a committee. If you
look at the individual -- the monies are
sent to the borough.

MR. SEMENZA: So basically a borough-run project with -- how would we go about doing this?

MAYOR LEGG: What I'm doing with the bricks -- Marylynn and I talked about it.

They're going to come and I'm going to give them a three by five card, they're going to make the check out to the Old Forge Borough, and I'm going to hold on to them until the deadline comes. I'm going to tally it up, I'm going to call the lady in Wisconsin, find out what the total is including shipping and handling. She's going to put that in a general fund and then just write a check. There's no borough money involved.

MR. SEMENZA: Can we do the same thing with this, Marylynn?
