ability to participate by telecommunication devices at council meetings. I think the information we have in front of us, I think through past meetings, that past meeting that a past council member inquired about it. PAPI: If everybody read my 17 report. 18 MR. SEMENZA: Everybody has Paul's 19 report. Anybody have any questions? MR. PAPI: The only thing I have to 20 21 add, we helped the school salt a couple 22 times this winter. We helped the water 23 company also one day. They called, they had a water main break on West Grace Street. 24 25 was going down to Melmore and it was a mess,

so we took care of that.

We lent our boom truck to Taylor and Moosic. We do that, and if they need something they can help us. We've been using their trucks for years. That's all I wanted to add to my report.

MR. SEMENZA: Both of them give us enough in return.

MR. PAPI: Whatever we need we can always ask them and vise-versa.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Paul on anything on his report?

MR. NOTARI: Paul, did we help the school salt?

MR. PAPI: Yeah, we helped the school. After we had that terrible storm where it snowed and rained and then it went to three degrees JP called and said we can't touch it with our little truck with the little pellets. It needed road salt and it needed a big truck throwing it. So we sent one of the trucks up.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Also, the school contacted me to ask permission for it.

MR. NOTARI: Are we doing that gratis or are we going to charge them?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Well, since it was just that one time it was gratis.

MR. NOTARI: I have no problem with that. I'm just curious what the rest of council thinks and you think.

MR. SEMENZA: I'm fine with it.

MR. PAPI: I always call Marylynn and ask her before I go ahead and give the okay.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have any questions for Paul? Thanks, Paul. Steve, zoning code enforcement. Anybody have any questions for Steve? Everybody has Steve's report in their packet.

MR. NOTARI: The subdivision for Tom Chickey on Sibley, is that going to be new?

MR. BIERYLA: That's going to be cancelled. He came to planning again with -- he has four different lots up there, so one party was interested in buying everything, and he's going to be opening up a car lot next to the car lot that was there, and then the guy -- he's willing to

purchase the whole piece, so Tom held off on the subdivision right now.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Steve? Steve, do you have anything you need to add to the report or address council with?

MR. BIERYLA: Just kind of a quick update. The Curry Donuts, we're going to be getting a dentist office. They just got their permits for it.

Mary Lou's Pizza is doing a little expansion, as you can see in there. I had to stop them. They weren't aware of the structural criteria for BIU and to come in to planning for parking. I believe that's it.

MR. SEMENZA: Thank you, Steve.

MR. BIERYLA: And I didn't hear anything about the -- I did hear something about there is going to be a laundromat coming in down where the previous dry cleaners was.

MR. SEMENZA: One quick question.

Word Fellowship Church, what's the status on
that?

MR. BIERYLA: There is a zoning hearing for them on the appeal this Thursday at 7:30.

MR. SEMENZA: Perrone's down there, is there any status on that? Is it at a standstill? Have they been doing work on that? Is it over and done with?

MR. BIERYLA: That was one I really didn't check into.

MR. SEMENZA: Can you check into it before we get hit with --

MR. BIERYLA: Before spring comes.

We're at that stage where we need to take it a step further.

MR. SEMENZA: Thank you. Sewer department report. Everybody has Lucille's report in their packet. Does anybody have any questions for Lucille? Lucille, do you have anything you want to add?

MS. YEAGER: No, that's it.

MR. SEMENZA: Thank you. Dave -- everybody has Dave's report.

MR. LOPATKA: I didn't put a report in. I didn't have anything going on last month other than waiting to award bids on

those two projects.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Dave?

MR. FERRETT: I'm a little curious about what's really happening. We paved last year, a lot of streets are cracking. Paved this year, streets are cracking. Is there something with the type of material they use that's causing this? There's got to be some kind of reason behind all this.

From what I understand, PennDOT -- I think Mr. Goetz is here. Sibley Avenue, they said they used some kind of chips or something and it seems to be holding up better than the streets that we paved.

MR. SEMENZA: You want our streets tarred and chipped?

MR. FERRETT: I'm only asking the question, Bobby. All I'm saying is there's got to be something wrong. Why do the streets crack in a year? It's not even a year old.

MR. LOPATKA: I mean, they're using --

MR. FERRETT: You guys don't care.

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MR. LOPATKA: They're using nine millimeter. They're doing an inch and a half saw cut -- or a mill and they're overlaying it. We're not fixing drainage problems. You're not doing some of that stuff. Some of that stuff always comes into Unless you're actually fixing the plav. roads the way it needs to be fixed, the storm water and everything else, there's potential that it's going to crack. we check temperatures, we check everything when they come. We check the depth they're putting down. We have reports for all that stuff. It has to be a certain temperature when it goes down and it has to be a certain temperature when it goes in the hopper, has to be a certain depth when they put it down, when they roll it. All those things are inspected as the paving is going down. They're putting the paving down everybody is It's all nine millimeter top. using.

MR. FERRETT: We mill all the time.

Is there anything with a better system that

maybe we can just scratch the area so we

don't -- you're taking an inch and a half

off and maybe some areas are worse than other areas.

MR. LOPATKA: Well, like I said before, always when we look at it we look at the bad areas. We can box those bad areas out, overcut them, do base replacement in those areas and then they overlay it. You know, typically the way they're doing that is they overmill the areas that are bad. We actually mark them out, they overmill them, then they do put base back in. So the areas that are really bad they're actually overmilling by three inches, filling that back up, and then they put another inch and a half over the top of it.

Unfortunately, you're not going to -- with a paving program like that you're not going to fix every road, and unfortunately the cracks end up showing back through if you don't fix the crack the whole way down, and some of the roads -- most of the roads probably have cracks in them that go most of the way down the road.

Unfortunately, you can't -- well, you could cut all that out, but the amount of roads

and the cost to do that you're not going to nearly get the value out of it that you would doing the way you're doing it.

MR. FERRETT: In other words, what you're saying, in order to eliminate most of that problem, would I be correct in saying that -- I realize it's a very expensive way of doing things is by going to work and, before you put your final coat, redo the road over again?

MR. LOPATKA: You don't have to redo the whole road. You can cut out and do base replacement. You can do all the way down that crack, but the cost of it -- the saw cuts, dig it out, put it back, it's expensive. I know we talked about that over a year so far, and to do that you're going to reduce substantially what you can actually accomplish by just milling the roadway.

MR. HOOVER: Do they seal the cracks in the base before they top it?

MR. LOPATKA: They actually spray it, so they're sealing them as they put -- did they seal the cracks?

MR. HOOVER: I don't think they do.

MR. LOPATKA: I don't think anybody typically seals all the cracks in the base.

Not that I've seen, anyway.

MR. HOOVER: The cracks are in the same spot.

MR. LOPATKA: Typically it's always going to happen. Even if you seal them, maybe it will give you another year, but eventually those cracks reflect back through the asphalt. The only way to do it is to usually cut them out. But if you cut every crack out you're not going to be doing any roads. You're going to be really limited as to what you can do.

MR. FERRETT: Mr. Goetz, would you have any idea what PennDOT does?

MR. GOETZ: We do the same thing.

We mill and fill them and put an overlay,
and a year later some of those crack. But
the things that are lacking here is a crack
sealing program. If you go back through the
minutes to about June or July of last year I
didn't ask, I begged this council to please
fix drainage before you go doing mill and

overlays. There's water laying in places in this town three and four inches deep.

MR. SEMENZA: I agree 110 percent.

MR. GOETZ: If you don't do that, then you can pave all the roads you want and they're never going to stay. You're going to have cracks, you're going to have a lot of things.

MR. LOPATKA: It always goes back to drainage.

MR. GOETZ: Crack sealing and a maintenance program is the other thing. If you had a leak in your roof would you go up and put tar on it? It's the same exact thing. Inch and a half overlay is just the shingles on a ten- and 12-inch-thick road. So when you have a crack in that inch and a half overlay the water goes down in, we get nights that freeze, that explodes, then it goes down further and further and blows the road apart. Maintenance is the key to roads.

MR. LOPATKA: Unfortunately, this whole area is probably the worst with regards to freeze-thaw. That's what creates

the problem.

MR. GOETZ: Another problem is the material. I'll tell you that straight up.

Nine and a half millimeter superpave, superpave in general is a brittle material. There's not enough oil in it. We are now changing to warm mix --

MR. LOPATKA: Actually we used warm mix.

MR. GOETZ: You won't be getting hot mix material anymore. The warm mix is supposed to be a little bit better. Unless you really dig down or mill down four, five, six inches, which is expensive -- but the number one thing is drainage. If you don't get the water off the road it doesn't matter what you put down.

And as far as Sibley Avenue, that's oil and chip. I don't really think you're going to run around here putting oil and chip down in neighborhoods. You can put micro down but I don't like that.

MR. LOPATKA: I don't either.

MR. GOETZ: It's expensive and it doesn't really do a whole lot of work for

its value. You have to take care of the drainage.

MR. FERRETT: Mr. Chairman, based on what you're hearing here, I think it's quite understandable that in this coming year someone has to come up with a good maintenance program to see to it that all these streets that we've done in the last two, three years, that we preserve them before we start going into something --

MR. SEMENZA: Joe, me and you talked about it and me and you met with -- and talked about it.

Another thing is what Mr. Goetz said. Like I said when we were talking about Rosemount. I said we just did a million dollar paving project and there's water laying on all these new roads. We live in northeast Pennsylvania. It's going to thaw and freeze, it's going to impact the roads.

I think before we ever pave another road some kind of system should be done with drainage. We've talked about doing storm water separation in the borough. I mean, I

then they overlaid over that. But to fix a road, the first thing is always storm water.

MR. SEMENZA: I believe that's something council has to do, is go to work and put a maintenance program in. You got some good ideas, Joe. You're in charge.

There's cracks all over, but there's nothing you can do about it.

MR. LOPATKA: You can have cracks, but then you're going to have your real bad spots. Those are the ones you end up fixing. You can't fix every little crack in every road, and that's where the problem is. You can mill every year and repave.

Eventually those reflective cracks end up coming back.

MR. SEMENZA: Springtime is coming soon. Maybe our committee could go out and take a look at the streets and the newly paved streets and see where we have some issues, see if we want to at that point in time, before we get a maintenance program in order, hire out and get it taken care of, or go to work and just -- but I think it's going to take some training of some

employees before we do anything.

MR. FERRETT: The only problem I have with that is the fact that, being chairman of the committee, I have Mr. Hoover on my committee, which I'm very well pleased with. Mr. Rinaldi, I always have a tough time trying to get him to come out and work with us and try to get --

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?

MR. FERRETT: No, that's it.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any other questions for Dave? Anything else to address council with?

MR. LOPATKA: No, I'm good.

MR. SEMENZA: Thank you, Dave.

Everybody got Chief Dubernas' report.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: The only thing that's not on there, DARE will be starting March 5th. It will be on Mondays, not Fridays this year. I don't know why they changed it.

MR. SEMENZA: Did the school or did we change it?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: No, they have Devil's Pride Day on Friday. They were

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MR. NOTARI: Thank you.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: We're still paying for the last lab.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for the chief? Thank you, Chief. Everybody has Bill's report, I believe, in their packet. Anybody have any questions for Bill?

ATTY. RINALDI: We're going to own property in Ransom. There's going to be a parking lot for the Pagnotti field.

MR. NOTARI: It's not going to be a parking lot. Right? It's going to be a field?

ATTY. RINALDI: Okay. I'm going to leave with Marylynn a packet. These are all of the ordinances that require fees for the borough. Some are zoning, some are appeals board, some are planning. My suggestion that I put in my letter is you're allowed to charge for supplies, labor, whatever that --like, in terms of zoning, it would be Steve's salary, whatever stenographers he hires, supplies. So maybe each department could budget what they need and we can set the fees accordingly.

It's not a revenue generator. It's strictly to cover the cost of whatever the program is, whether it's zoning appeals, for licenses, planning. So it's a list of everywhere in the code book that says

council has to pass fees by resolution.

MR. NOTARI: Marylynn, can we have those numbers by the April work session?

MR. SEMENZA: Could each of us have a copy of that?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

MR. NOTARI: It should be up to the department heads and/or Marylynn to determine what those costs are going to be. The fees should set themselves.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Let me go through it, then I'll get back to you.

everybody two letters to consider. I mean, you can look at them and talk about them, bring them up again at the work session.

One had to do with the water runoff problem up in Rosemount, and the other letter was with regard to the real estate matter that we talked about in executive session a couple weeks ago.

The only other thing is on the Casper Street project. I need to get some meets and bounds descriptions for the easements.

MR. LOPATKA: Grace Street.

ATTY. RINALDI: Sorry, before they start that work you have to get your easements in place.

MR. LOPATKA: We were going to try to do it a different way, I guess.

ATTY. RINALDI: I need something that says where the width -- give me something. I have the map. I laid it all out going through this property, this property, this property, this property, but I've got to pinpoint in terms of so that we keep them off --

MR. LOPATKA: Is it a permanent easement?

ATTY. RINALDI: Yeah, for the storm sewer. The way I've described it was starting at a point -- I mean, you can just give me a straight line, center line. I have starting at a point on Main Street and Running on JCG Realty's property, then in a southeasterly direction across JCG's property, through Genell's property, over to --

MR. LOPATKA: The width varies on

each property.

ATTY. RINALDI: Right. I'm on two deeds on that. Through Genell's, over to Aulisio, then over to Revello, and the end point I put is through Stacchiotti's, and I put the end point David Alders.

MR. LOPATKA: How about the other line?

ATTY. RINALDI: I can't find it. If you want to map it out you can always do a new one there. I wasn't going to hold you up on that. I haven't found anything.

MR. NOTARI: Do we need to wait on those easements before we award the bid?

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, before they do the work. They don't have permission to go on the property until. Then I can record them. You're guaranteed to have them. We have them for other projects. The old ones are the tougher ones to find. I think that's all I wanted to bring up.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Bill?

MR. NOTARI: Bill, the two letters, do we need to officially act on those as a

council?

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, one I needed an amount on a real estate matter, and the other one -- actually if everybody's happy with it tell me, we'll send it out. I was going to have Steve send it out.

MR. NOTARI: Personally, I was happy with the Rosemount letter. The other letter, I thought you came up with an amount two work sessions ago.

ATTY. RINALDI: Nobody gave it to me.

MR. NOTARI: Or at the last regular meeting. Actually, it was the last regular meeting. We had an executive session after the meeting where I thought we came up with a number.

ATTY. RINALDI: I think the last meeting was the meeting with the real estate owner, then everybody was going to talk about it. I wasn't at the executive meeting.

MR. NOTARI: Can we have a brief executive after the meeting?

MR. SEMENZA: We can.

MR. NOTARI: That way we can give him a number.

MR. SEMENZA: Yes.

ATTY. RINALDI: I think you guys had a meeting, but nobody told me what you decided.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any other questions for Bill? Thanks, Bill.

Everybody has Marylynn's report. Does anybody have any questions for Marylynn?

Marylynn, do you have anything you want to add?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Well, something that would be in executive session, but I did want to tell everyone we are changing our accounting system for the garbage sticker system. For next month, when you see your financial report you'll be able to actually track -- under accounts receivable you'll be able to track the amount of money that's outstanding for garbage stickers, and then when you look on the profit and loss you'll be able to see what has come in.

Similar to how it is now, money coming in, but accounts receivable the structure will

be different. I'll go over it with you next month.

The website, I want to let everyone know the new website is up and running.

It's still under partial construction, but it's up and running with quite a bit of information. There are a few things that are still being added on, so we are still hooked with PSAB for the actual design. If anyone sees anything they still need added on or if you think I forgot anything let me know.

MR. SEMENZA: Mobile friendly?

MS. BARTOLETTI: There's still a glitch there but they're working that out. So when you pull it up on your phone it runs a little smoother. It sticks for some reason. The right-to-know portion is still not on that but it's being worked on. There's galleries of photos, there's the expansion of the police section. There's still a lot that's being added on, but the basis of it is there with all the information about the garbage stickers, collections. I know it's working because

against Scrap Enterprises, Incorporated, if there's been a court date.

ATTY. RINALDI: They were supposed to send a proposal to clean it up in the summer. I just got a signed verification they filed the complaint because they appealed the magistrate's. So we'll get it on the docket, see if I -- I'm actually pondering whether I should just ask for an injunction to get it really set up quick.

MR. GOETZ: Thank you.
