There was water gushing to our sewer line from around the sewer pipe. That I never saw before. That's why I called the water company and he has a few ideas where he thought it might have been either theirs or hers. He was going to shut off the valve, send a listening team.

MR. SEMENZA: When was the last time you spoke to them about this?

ATTY. RINALDI: I got three calls in since -- three or four calls in to their solicitor and left my cell phone number today, telling him it was urgent. I didn't get anything back yet.

MR. SEMENZA: Where do we go from here? It's a revolving circle. The borough residents have to deal with the potholes and

MR. NOTARI: Chief, successful drug

take back with CVS. Is there an amount of containers that are collected?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: It doesn't go by containers. They just give us boxes. We average -- they get two boxes the size of that podium. We filled two. Especially last October, when they started taking the pet pills. We get a lot of people. We get them all the time. If somebody passes away and they have a bunch of pills they'll bring them here. We just put them in our evidence until October. So we'll collect them all throughout the whole thing until October, and the end of October we'll do it again and start them with that. But it's been very successful.

The county does one, too, with Old Forge Pharmacy. I tried to talk to that girl, because she does it, like, two weeks after the national one. I told her if she can separate and do it in June or July, every three to four months. She said they don't get that many. We do ours in October. Every six months we do it. She said she's going to look into it.

MR. HOOVER: At the corner of Albion Street and Oak Street, the garage on the corner, do you have any complaints there about people?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: We had complaints there. We spoke to the guy. He was putting a car right on the corner and you couldn't see. Once we spoke to him we haven't had any issues.

MR. HOOVER: Cars and trucks. He puts them on both sides of the street.

Somebody's coming out of there and somebody's trying to come in it's very ---

MAYOR LEGG: I talked to that guy a month ago. He was very nice. I said try to do the best you can. People are having trouble. He said he would.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: It wasn't so much the parking on Albion Street. It's when you came to the stop sign at Oak and Albion and you went to look left you couldn't see.

MR. HOOVER: People tend to stay in the middle of the road there because there's cars on both sides. If there's a car coming in he has to stop, and now he can't see

my financial reports. Does anyone have any questions? Okay. I mentioned last meeting and I'll mention again summer camp starts July 2nd. We hired 23 counselors. We already had quite a few people come in and pick up applications.

Work at Miles Street, part of it was already done to fix some of the swings and that type of thing that had damage done to them. Marion Street will probably be done in the next couple weeks. Some of the parts are a little harder to get for the apparatus we got from the county. As soon as that comes in they'll come back and install that set up.

I have a quotation for security at Miles. We've been working back and forth on that. The one that's more difficult is Marion because we don't have power or anything at that park to be able to plug cameras in. So it's a little bit tough. The only way we can do it right now is if we hooked onto the school's garage that they have and ran electricity from there.

Otherwise, some other ideas that we can come

up with so we can be self-sufficient there.
But for now I'm pretty close to getting the
ball rolling at Miles.

MR. SEMENZA: Can we possibly look into putting a service at Marion Street?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yeah. I think if we did that it would make it a lot easier. I know we had talked about discussing if they would put lights up for us to try to light that up a little bit. Get the two items done at the same time.

MR. SEMENZA: Why don't we look into that. Make some phone calls, see what that's going to cost us.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I think we have to because that park is taking a beating again.

MR. FEBBO: No lights over there?
MS. BARTOLETTI: No.

MR. SEMENZA: No lights at all over there.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Some of the problems there actually happen in the daytime, but because it's set a little bit further back it's not noticeable.

MR. SEMENZA: If people know they're

on camera they might not be as destructive. 1 MR. FEBBO: Miles Street, we are 2 3 okay to go with that? MS. BARTOLETTI: I think so. 4 to tweak it a little bit. I just got the 5 quote today. There's a couple adjustments I 6 7 have to make. It's right around where I 8 thought it would be. I think it will work well. 9 10 MR. FEBBO: How about vandalism? 11 MS. BARTOLETTI: Just a small, little amount. I think we have that under 12 control. 13 14 MR. NOTARI: Do we have the restrooms open or closed? 15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Open. 16 MR. SEMENZA: Did we ever have any 17 kind of damage or anything done to the DPW 18 19 property? MR. PAPI: We don't have damage. 20 What we have is people coming in and 21 dumping. 22 MR. SEMENZA: We may want to put a 23 24 camera there also. 25 MR. FEBBO: We talked about that

also.

MR. SEMENZA: On the same program.

MR. PAPI: There's a pole right there, too.

MR. SEMENZA: See what happens.

MR. PAPI: They're dumping brush mixed with dirt and concrete. You go over there now you can see big slabs of concrete. Last month it was fence posts with concrete on the end of it. That's yard waste. We can't throw that in there. We'll get in trouble. We have to pick through it.

MR. FEBBO: Inside or outside the fence?

MR. PAPI: Inside and outside.

Sometimes they back up to the wall and throw it over. It depends if we have the gate open or not. A lot of times we leave the gate fake locked because we're waiting for the company to come and change the cans. We leave the gate on fake lock.

MR. SEMENZA: Look into that, too. Anything else?

MS. BARTOLETTI: I think I brought up at the last meeting about the person who

called complaining about the stop sign at the base of the hill that goes up to the park. They called again. The man asked the borough to put a stop sign there.

MR. SEMENZA: Coming out onto the dirt road going towards Connell Street.

MR. NOTARI: Isn't there a stop sign already there coming out of the park?

Didn't we used to have one there?

MR. SEMENZA: No.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I just wanted everybody to be aware that this person has been calling. Jason and I and Paul talked about it.

MR. NOTARI: Can we let the rec board know and let their leagues know that -- tell their parents and tell their participants to slow down and stop? Can we put a stop sign there? It's not our road.

MR. SEMENZA: What I think more the problem is there that that person is a little upset that there's traffic coming in and out of there, from my understanding, and he has come up to the park and made some trouble a time or two. I don't know if it's

Three years ago three cats wandered into my yard. Within weeks of one another they all brought kittens. All the sudden I had nine cats in the yard. I knew I had to do something. So my husband and I, we scratched our heads and we obviously came to the conclusion that we have to stop the breeding. So we grabbed as many as we could, we trapped those we couldn't, we had them all fixed. Nine cats are fixed, three kittens we found homes for. We were left with six cats.

Now, if we did nothing there could potentially be 300 cats in the yard, but three years later there are six cats in the yard.

Now, part of the process in keeping that population down after we spay and neuter them is that we need to care and feed them. They're not freeloaders, either. They have a job to do. In addition, of course, to keeping the rodent population down their job in my neighborhood is to keep other cats out, and they will. If they see another cat coming in it will be chased out.

This way my neighborhood's a wonderful place. My neighbors appreciate it except for one cat hater. But they really appreciate me. They offer me money to do this, which we don't want. They offer me food for the cats, which we don't want.

So my reason for being here, there's a lot of people in the town that do what we do. We don't make it public because we know it's frowned on, but we do it. We keep the population in our neighborhoods under control. There's many neighborhoods that are very, very pleasant. And I'm not saying for the neighborhoods that are horrendously overrun with cats. Possibly because no one does anything in those neighborhoods. But there's several of us who do it and our neighborhoods are quite pleasant.

The only thing is what does the borough do in response to us trying to help the community? Do they thank us? No. They send us threatening letters to stop feeding the cats or else, and the penalty if we don't cease and desist could be fines or jail time.

Now, there is no ordinance, per se, against feeding cats, but what they -- how they send that threat, they say there is an ordinance -- and I'm sure it dates back to the 1800s -- which says if you care for an animal it's considered yours and it has to stay on your property.

Now, that was fine when people had cows and pigs. You don't want them wandering the streets. But cats are free roaming. They always were and they always will be. They're wild animals just like possums and raccoons and birds. They cannot be confined. Now, I'm talking feral cats. Cats for the most part are wild animals.

So all I'm asking is that you'll allow us to continue doing what we're doing without repercussions, without threats to put this town in the right direction. We are trying to help you. Don't cut off your nose to spite your face.

And I do want to put a face on things just to give some perspective. These are a few of my cats. This is Goldie, one of my colony cats. She is the alpha cat in

my group. If another cat wanders into my yard she goes after him like crazy. She patrols my yard like a Doberman. These cats are Rosie and Patches. They're a bonded pair. When we had that awful blizzard last year they got separated. It took Patches three days to get back to her home. Cats have feelings. By the way, this picture made it to a national publication. It was in the 2018 cat calendar put out by Alley Cat Allies.

One more. This is Francis. Francis got his name because I prayed to Saint Francis. When he was little he was sick. We did get him to a vet and he recovered. Recently he didn't seem to be doing too well. Before I got a chance to get him help he stopped coming around. I haven't seen him in a week. I believe he went off somewhere to die, and it breaks my heart.

These cats are not monsters.

They're victims of irresponsible people who you should be going after. Their only crime is trying to survive.

I'd like to present a petition to

you. I put a petition out there just to see if there would be any interest in what you guys would do in this small town, in Old Forge. Much to my surprise there's almost 3,000 signatures from around the world. Everybody wants to know what Old Forge, Pennsylvania is going to do. I'd like to present that to you.

MR. SEMENZA: What were the letters from the borough and who issued them?

Steve, you?

MR. BIERYLA: Yes. It's the nuisance clause, where penalty is --

MR. SEMENZA: Everything is with our ordinance?

MR. BIERYLA: Right.

MR. SEMENZA: That ordinance, when was that made?

ATTY. RINALDI: 2001.

MR. SEMENZA: That dates from 2001.

Angela, I don't think anybody here is against what you guys are doing. I understand it, I get it. I talked to some people about it and I understand where the problem would occur if people didn't spay or

neuter cats. You would have a bunch. I live on Edith Street and I'll be sitting on the porch and one will come walking by. I have a problem in my neighborhood, but I don't have a problem of -- I see that cat every day and a couple other cats every day. Somebody in my neighborhood is obviously doing the same thing, but I have spoken to some people that their neighborhoods are overcome by cats.

MS. CENTRELLA: Nobody's doing anything in that neighborhood.

MR. SEMENZA: I don't think the borough is against what you're doing. I think it's just basically the ordinance.

Steve, you know the ordinance pretty well. Is there anything that could changed in the ordinance?

MR. BIERYLA: Here's the problem with even the T and R. The cat roams, and everybody has a nice mulched garden and some cat decides to make it his own private depository. That's where everybody complains. That's where most of the complaints come in. Then they complain that

the cats that hang around the yard -- like over on Sibley Avenue. A tremendous problem over there. The next-door neighbor says well, the cat goes on his lawn. The cat's doing their business on his lawn, the cat's peeing on his bushes, and he doesn't want it. He wants the cat to stay -- because it's a pet, put a leash on it and keep it on your property. That's why the nuisance clause comes in. If the cat stays on your property and doesn't bother anybody, fine.

MS. CENTRELLA: These are not pets. They're wild animals.

MR. BIERYLA: It stems from
Harrisburg. You get a leash law from
Harrisburg about a dog, all other animals.
There's nothing on the books about cats. So
your petition, I think, is great here. I
don't think we can change things too much
because of the nuisance clause. I think all
the townships need to bond together and go
to Harrisburg and let them come up with a
solution for us, because every town has
feral cats and every town has people that
feed them and every town has people that

and R and every town has people that don't.

The people that don't -- like you said.

Three is six, six is 18, 18 is 36, 42.

MS. CENTRELLA: It's education.

MR. BIERYLA: But the problem is you get people that just don't care. They put the food out and the cats go. What you're saying is that's correct. Education is worth it's weight in gold. But it's got to start at the top level. Harrisburg and everybody else has to be aware of everybody else's problem because everybody comes in to the small borough and says we have a problem and we want to do this and we want to do that.

Well, everybody writes something for some reason. It's up to them to write something so that we can follow because the only thing we have to follow is -- you guys are trying to do a great job. You have your cats, you're fond of cats. I'm not saying I'm against it, I'm just saying when somebody else calls me and says I'm sick and tired of these cats making my mulch garden their compost pit you have to do something.

I get pounded with that.

So the solution there for me is to try to tell somebody to stop feeding cats because they all congregate in one area.

MS. CENTRELLA: If we stop taking care of the cats on our properties you're not going to have six cats in the yard, you're going to have 106 cats. That's what people don't understand. People don't understand -- they don't like them eliminating in their yard. Fine. I have such a neighbor.

We have possum, we have skunk, raccoon, deer and an occasional bear pooping in the yard. But blame the cats because you can see the cats. They're there in the day. I don't think you need to go to Harrisburg. You can support us. Call the animal control office in Scranton. See what they're doing. Why are we not going along with this? I don't understand.

MR. BIERYLA: Here's something that you just said. You're paying for them.
Well, then, at the state level if they have

a grant for everybody that gets involved in 1 it, then it becomes a statewide level where 2 everybody's going to do it and then you're 3 not complaining. I'm taking the money out 4 of my pocket to satisfy my needs but 5 somebody else isn't. It's the state level. 6 MS. CENTRELLA: The state isn't 7 8 going to offer money for a spay/neuter program. 9 10 MR. SEMENZA: Were you fined? MS. CENTRELLA: I don't know. I'm 11 12 not aware. MR. SEMENZA: You said --13 MS. CENTRELLA: It says it in the 14 letter that you could be fined or 30 days in 15 16 jail. MR. SEMENZA: You haven't been? 17 MS. CENTRELLA: 18 No. 19 MR. BIERYLA: Nobody has. MR. NOTARI: Steve, you're just 20 acting on complaints. Correct? 21 MR. BIERYLA: Correct. 22 MR. FEBBO: Did you ever consider 23 organizing in the community for what you're 24 I don't 25 doing here to educate communities?

think that's our responsibility to --

MR. PARKER: There are a lot of rescue organizations around here that are willing to step in, but they can't do it unless the town supports them.

MR. FEBBO: Locally here what you're doing. If you could educate -- like Steve mentioned, Sibley Avenue. We have a horrendous problem there. If he can tell you where the problems are in town, you're group go over there and educate them.

MS. CENTRELLA: We would love to do that.

MR. SEMENZA: We're not saying that we're against anybody. We're for a solution of a problem that the borough has. An ordinance is put in place as a tool. It's a powerful tool, used the correct way. You take that ordinance away you can have major problems. Then you have no laws on anything. That ordinance isn't in place to hurt people that are trying to do good for the community.

MR. RUSSICK: When you have an ordinance or a law there's the letter of the

law or ordinance and there's the intent of that law. You always have to look at what is the intent. You don't license a cat.
You license a dog. Cat is considered a wild animal. It's education for the community.

MR. SEMENZA: We're not saying we're against it. I'm not personally. I understand the intent. Like I said, you take that ordinance away it can do more harm than good.

MS. CENTRELLA: We're not asking you to take the ordinance away. We're asking you to exempt us who do the right things for the community, trying to help.

MR. SEMENZA: We can't single people out either.

MR. BIERYLA: I have a terrific idea. I get a cat complaint I would gladly call any one of you, tell you who they are, and your group can go over and educate them and see exactly what the problem is.

MS. WILLIAMS: My name is Mary
Zaleski Williams. I'm no longer a resident
of Old Forge. I'm very curious, that I
believe this gentleman is the gentleman who

sent you the letter.

MR. SEMENZA: Our zoning officer.

MS. WILLIAMS: You get an anonymous letter with no signature on it and you send a letter that says stop, cease, quit feeding or you will face jail time?

MR. BIERYLA: I don't do that unless I go over and investigate it first. If there's numerous cat bowls and you see a lot of cats I look at the address and send a letter if nobody's home. If somebody's home I'll knock on the door.

MR. NOTARI: You're not signing the letter or it's not on borough letterhead?

MR. BIERYLA: Yeah, it's on borough letterhead.

MS. WILLIAMS: The person that complains sends an anonymous letter --

MS. BARTOLETTI: Excuse me one second. I am Steve's boss, and my office is where all phone calls come in. I have two administrative assistants who at times are bombarded with massive amounts of phone calls just in a week's time. Certain times of the year it gets very bad. They try to

assist Steve because so many calls come in. Most of the time people do leave their names, their phone numbers. They're not anonymous letters, they're phone calls that come in. And whether it's a cat problem or anything else, in our ordinance book Steve is responsible to follow up on those things and treat every ordinance in that book the same way. Whether it's nuisance cats or it's a car parked the wrong way or whatever the issue is. There's lots and lots of issues. If those calls continue to come in to the borough we need to address them.

I understand your part, but there's the opposite side with the people who feel they are being bothered or someone is doing something wrong. It's Steve's job to follow up with those things. I don't want anybody to make a point that he's not doing the right thing because he is.

MS. WILLIAMS: If push came to shove and you have to go to court and you have a letter that's signed anonymous --

MS. BARTOLETTI: We don't have letters, they're phone calls.

MS. WILLIAMS: This was a letter that was taken action upon, and I'm saying that the accuser -- she needs -- like, if you're complaining about her and you're acting on an anonymous letter and we go to court she has a right to know who her accuser is.

MR. SEMENZA: Our zoning code enforcement officer said he will not send a letter unless there's an investigation first. Obviously there was an investigation done and his findings were that he sent a letter in regards to what he sent. Like I said, we're not here to shut anybody down or tell you you can't do what you're doing. I understand what you're doing. I think it does help.

MS. CENTRELLA: All I'm asking is that we be allowed to do what we're doing. You talk about education, that's the best thing.

MR. SEMENZA: I think the best thing we can do right now is what Steve suggested.

When you get a call --

MS. HARDING: My name is Rachel

Harding. I just thought maybe if we can give you our names, our numbers maybe we can have, like, a little sign in our front yard that says colony cat caretaker or whatever. They know anybody can come here and say I need to speak with one of these girls. I have an issue with cats. We can have that for the people who are around us and see all the cats that hey, there's something going on there. We just want to be able to do what we're doing without -- I'm not saying get rid of the ordinance, but kind of let us do what we're doing.

MR. SEMENZA: Again, I get it.

MS. HARDING: My neighbor who revs his motorcycle at 10:00 at night is a nuisance.

MR. SEMENZA: But if you did he would get a letter sent to him whether he thought he was doing something wrong or not. He might be trying to fix it. Nobody looks at him and says why is he doing this. We're just following the letter of the law.

MS. HARDING: I'm not blaming him.

He's doing his job. But what we're trying

to do is get some leeway on trying to take care of the problem.

MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Febbo?

MR. FEBBO: We agree with you.

You're doing a great job. Where we can't help you -- I'm sure everyone on council will support you if you take out what you're doing. That being said, if you work with our zoning officer and our business manager, we have this list of people. He goes out there and checks out a nuisance area like, again, Sibley Avenue, and you're willing to go over there and help people over there with your neighbors and so on, leave a card or something telling them you will help them out, that would be a big asset to us on council.

MS. CENTRELLA: We're certainly willing to educate and tell them how to do things, what has to be done, but I think a lot of people in this town just want to complain and say get rid of them. Just get rid of them. They don't want to get involved.

MR. FEBBO: It's because they don't

know there's something that can be done.

All they're looking at is the cats are a nuisance. I agree with that because I have lawn furniture I had to throw away because of some cats. Once a cat gets in there it's done.

MS. CENTRELLA: If a cat is not neutered it's going to mark its territory.

It's going to spray.

MR. FEBBO: You're doing a great thing. Help us in town. The problem is people are doing the feeding aren't aware that they can do this in a proper manner. We can give you a list of people you can contact, that these people have a problem over there. Get in contact with them, we're willing to help you with your problem.

MR. NOTARI: Maybe we can even put their contact information on our website.

MR. SEMENZA: Do you have a group or an organization developed? I'm not telling you to start anything.

MR. FEBBO: You guys get organized and come back to us, we'll be more than happy to work with you.

MR SEMENZA: You say most of Old Forge. I think you're hearing more the haters than the people that are silent.

MS. CENTRELLA: The rest of us, we lay low.

MR. SEMENZA: People chirping how they hates cats.

MS. CENTRELLA: I want to present a letter to you that was written and e-mailed to Mayor Legg. It is from the president and founder of Community Cats United. They're a group of 23,000 in a hundred countries. She has stepped in and offered to help this community. She's offered an attorney free of charge also to rewrite ordinances. But for somebody of that level to offer help, I mean, people care what goes on in this town.

MR. FEBBO: We're always looking for help. We're looking for grant money, anything we can get our hands on.

MS. CENTRELLA: We are helping you out.

MR. FEBBO: Well, take the lead.

MS. CENTRELLA: We're getting threatened for it.

MR. NOTARI: How would we designate your cats as community cats as opposed to cats that --

MS. CENTRELLA: When they're spayed and neutered they clip their ears.

MR. NOTARI: I don't know anything about that. That's not going to help me. You're talking about rewriting the borough code. I'm not sure how you would differentiate that code as to what it's there for, to prevent nuisance. Maybe not from your perspective, but maybe from other people's perspective, as said about the motorcycle, that it can easily be bobcats on my property. Well, it's a nuisance to me. I don't want the cats on my property. He doesn't think it's a big deal.

MS. CENTRELLA: But if you spay and neuter the cats the population would be under control. You wouldn't have a constant barrage of more and more and more.

MR. NOTARI: But I don't think that's the problem right now. The problem is that there's cats doing their business on other people's property.

 $\mbox{MS. CENTRELLA: Well, other animals} \label{eq:ms.centrella} \mbox{do that.}$

MS. HARDING: The reason why the cats are out there is because people abandon them. Moved out of their apartment, let them loose. Now they're wild.

MR. NOTARI: As you said, education needs to be -- I have squirrels in my yard but I'm not feeding them. I'm not taking care of them. They're a wild animal.

MR. FEBBO: We hear you. We will support you. You people need to take the lead. I'm sure we will follow.

MR. BIERYLA: There's a license for dogs. There's no license for cats. So it becomes a nuisance to the person that doesn't want other animals on their property. It becomes a nuisance when somebody has ten kids and they're always running over their property. So if they don't get any satisfaction from the neighbor what do they do? They throw a fence up. Now the kid can't go there.

Well, it's kind of, like, I got to go by the letter of the law. I'm lenient.

I investigate, I look. I just don't go out there and pound things out. But like Councilman Febbo said, we're willing to work with you, you work with us, because that is an overwhelming complaint that I get for cats. Then the big thing is people that have high grass and don't take care of it.

So there are some fixes out there, but if you're willing to help us with that fix I'm all in for it because I get crushed.

MR. BOYLE: I own Pride Personal Training. We're all going to go through a little workout today. Wow, my love for Old Forge is incredible. I just want to kind of give you a little background. I want to first thank you for your time to let me speak on my friend Angela's behalf with the cats.

But Old Forge, right now we train three federal judges, 12 police officers.

We're on a three-month wait list. We train 13 professional fighters. The reason why we're successful in Old Forge is because we're a microcosm of Old Forge. We're about community. We're involved in anti-bullying

programs. We do all these things in the community. Anywhere I go -- we're at the Mohegan Sun next month. Big venue. Banners everywhere.

The reason why we're successful is we're about community. We are Old Forge. There's nothing more consistent with it being community and benevolent than with Angela and cats, helping helpless animals. We're talking about when we were kids. never heard of these ordinances for cats. We get too hung up on red tape. Ι understand there's two sides of the street. But we're talking about a spay and neuter program to maintain population. I love the idea of maybe creating a committee to drive this, but it's so important that we look at the helpless animal. That's so consistent with what the pride in Old Forge is about. It's helping something that can't help These animals are itself. Right? abandoned. Many of them are going to starve and die. I don't think anyone here is interested in that. Are we?

Now, I understand there's two sides

to this. We need to focus on education with spay and neutering programs. We're going to rally, make sure we organize. Angela spent \$1,300 of her own money to spay and neuter animals. So this is helping the problem.

I understand the letter, that procedure, based on a complaint, but to have a letter sent to you that you can potentially wind up in prison for someone who spent \$1,300 of their own money to help feed helpless animals, that's not consistent with what I tell everyone in Old Forge about everywhere I go, that it's important we stay true to who we are. This cause is consistent with the ethics of this community. Don't let these helpless animals go down this way. That's not right. We have to focus on community and education. What's important is we stand with the cats.

MR. FEBBO: Excuse me. We resolved that already. You're talking about pride. Every single councilman sitting at this table is sitting here because we have pride in Old Forge. We can be a lot of other places tonight. As a matter of fact, some

of our councilmen had the necessity to be away from here. We volunteer to do what's best for this community. We go by codes that we have here, we try to enforce it for the community. Every single one of us here at this table are involved in a lot of organizations for the community. We want to make Old Forge a better place.

Based on what you're saying we hear you, and I believe we said that to the lady. We're willing to cooperate. You're being redundant --

MR. BOYLE: It was my understanding

I had an opportunity on --

MR. FEBBO: You do. We're glad to have you here. I know your place up the road, here. That's great. That's what we want to do, keep Old Forge Old Forge. We always look at it as the jewel of the valley.

MR. BOYLE: I don't think anything I said was redundant. I'm allowed as a member of the community to speak on my behalf. I think it's important to reiterate some of the important points of helpless animals.

MR. FEBBO: We did agree on that.

We agree to do everything we can to help you out with that problem.

MR. BOYLE: I just want to reiterate that this is something that is a benevolent cause, is consistent with our values and ethics, and it's something we have to rally around. We're going to do everything we can on our parts.

MR. FEBBO: We agree. That's one problem that is overwhelming for Steve as one person, to be the good guy and the bad guy in the same situation. So any help we can get from your organization would help.

MR. BOYLE: What would be the next steps?

MR. SEMENZA: You guys organize some kind of committee, organization somehow.

Can you guys leave your contact with Steve?

Steve, if you have any questions for them or people that have questions to help out in this situation refer to them.

I think I'd rather have you call

Steve directly than Marylynn's office

because he's code enforcement. Her office

gets swamped with calls that should be for Steve and they're trying to play double duty in that office. This will help him out tremendously.

MR. FEBBO: Come up with a mission statement.

MR. BOYLE: There's so much passion behind the animal lovers in this community just firsthand in dealing with people every single day. There's a lot of passion for animals. I'm just telling you that from ground zero.

MR. SEMENZA: Nobody here wants to be against what everybody's doing. I actually think it will help and is helping. I don't know the numbers that would be if people didn't spay and neuter, but I know it's greater than what it is now. Thank you for what you're doing.

MR. FEBBO: Mare, your grant writer, does she know anything about grants?

MS. BARTOLETTI: I would say if she knew anyplace to get money she would have it because she has approximately 40 cats with her on her property.

MR. FEBBO: Could you ask her where we're going here?

Thank you. All right, MR. SEMENZA: that's all for public input. The chair is going to go down the table, see if any council members or the mayor have anything.

MAYOR LEGG: Two things. I sent information for 12 tiles in Wisconsin. that to rest. Hometown Heros, the target was 50 flags hung by Flag Day, June 14th, and we hung 50 by June 14th. We had another 50 in May and we got another 25 applications. It's not slowing down.

MR. SEMENZA: It's a great thing.

MAYOR LEGG: We were supposed to interview three part-time police officers. I don't know what happened. That's on the back burner until next week. Other than that, that's all.

MR. SEMENZA: Going back to the interviews, I'm on the personnel committee. I had a prior engagement.

Councilman Febbo, what do you have for us, anything?

> MR. FEBBO: No.

MR. NOTARI: Just two things. Both job related. Lackawanna County commissioners are holding their first family fun day on Saturday at McDade Park from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. It's also in conjunction with the county bike fair. Free bicycle helmets to all children under 12 years old.

Also, Sunday is the annual Field of Dreams baseball all star game starts at 1:30. Representatives from the Old Forge team will play at 1:30. That's all.

MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Ferrett?
MR. FERRETT: Nothing.

MR. HOOVER: Two things. Chief, that stop sign down at First and Susquehanna, by the park, we should put a car on that Susquehanna side. There must have been ten cars cruised right through that stop sign. With those kids running around that park I don't understand how somebody hasn't gotten hurt yet. It's a bad spot. If you park on Susquehanna Avenue you'll grab them all the time.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Sit by Hoover Street.

MR. HOOVER: It's a bad area.

What's our ordinance, Steve, for a utility
water leak or gas leak on a new paved road?

MR. SEMENZA: Five years unless it'

MR. SEMENZA: Five years unless it's an emergency fix.

MR. BIERYLA: Yes.

MR. HOOVER: If it's an emergency fix what do they have to do, just restore the road the way it is?

MR. BIERYLA: Restore plus pave it.

MR. LOPATKA: I think it's 50 feet.

I have to look. Depending on how many cuts.

Some, if they have two cuts they have to pave the whole block.

MR. SEMENZA: We did something like that quite some time back.

ATTY. RINALDI: It's updated again.

MR. HOOVER: That's all.

MR. SEMENZA: And I have nothing.

At this time the chair would go into new business. I'm going to ask for a motion to remove Tom Scarnatto from the LLVSA board.

I'm going to give you a little history. Mr. Scarnatto is the borough-appointed LLVSA board member. He's been there quite some

time. Mr. Scarnatto, I believe, is in his early 90s and he has not been at a meeting since October 24th. LLVSA's rules and regulations state that they follow the Pa. Municipalities Act, which in the Pa. Municipalities Act it states that removal of a board member, once they miss three consecutive meetings they can be removed by the municipality itself or they have to be removed by the municipality itself.

The reason why I bring this to the table is because LLVSA is a pretty big thing, and it's not like a recreation board or whatever. I think the borough needs representation down there, and we haven't had any in nine months. Before that, there's been some meetings missed here and there.

I'm going to ask for a motion to remove Tom Scarnatto from the LLVSA board.

MR. HOOVER: How long has Mr. Scarnatto been on this board?

MR. SEMENZA: He has probably been there 25 years. Somewhere along the lines of that.

MR. FERRETT: Somewhere around there. I'm not quite sure.

MR. SEMENZA: He is sickly, but if you are sickly and you cannot fulfill your position there for the borough itself you should step down. I made a phone call and asked him if he would and got really nowhere.

Jobs in this borough -- at the LLVSA are from people that live in the five boroughs that LLVSA is owned by and we're one of them. Old Forge is the biggest town. We have the most rent payers of the five boroughs. If a job comes up and it's Old Forge's turn and we don't have representation on there we're not going to get a shot at a job. Not saying we have a choice right here at this table, but our board member might. I'm just looking out for the best interest of our town.

MR. FERRETT: Bob, my opinion only, being that this is the first that I heard about it -- and I'm probably sure most other councilmen heard about it. And I understand what you're saying about the regulations and

how things should work. There's no question or doubt about it that we should be represented because not being represented we're left in the dark about everything what goes on.

I'm just not convinced at the present time that there's not everything on the table whatsoever. Maybe it might be in the best interest --

MR. SEMENZA: Joe, what's not on the table? What do you want to know? All I know is there has been no representation for nine months.

MR. FERRETT: Well, let me put it this way, you have the chief of police here and he has X number of people working for him. Should anyone do something wrong what do we do? Do we fire the person? Do we have a hearing? Do we give the man a chance to speak and give us his opinion before we go to work and make a final decision?

MR. SEMENZA: I gave him a chance to speak.

MR. FERRETT: You gave him a chance.

I didn't hear nothing, he didn't hear

nothing, he didn't hear nothing, he didn't hear nothing. So why not appoint one or two guys, get everything and let's have a meeting next week.

MR. SEMENZA: A meeting for what,

MR. FERRETT: To get rid of him or not get rid of him.

MR. SEMENZA: Do you want to call him?

MR. FERRETT: No, not me. I don't know what somebody's going to say. Let whoever else might be interested. Put all the facts on the table.

MR. SEMENZA: Joe, the facts on the table are that it's nine months and he hasn't represented the borough once. Joe, you made a commitment to this board right here as a councilman that you would be at every meeting with an occasion of sickness or something. Everybody misses. But you haven't missed nine meetings in a row.

There's no excuse for that in my book. No excuse for that in my book. Either do the right thing by saying I can't fulfill my

agreement to be a board member and step down or do what you're doing. Just don't show up. And you know what? Screw the town that you're representing. That's basically what's happening here. So if you want to let it continue and let Old Forge get screwed by a board member down there, so be it.

I'm asking council for a motion to remove Tom Scarnatto from the LLVSA board.

May I have a motion?

MR. FEBBO: Mr. Chairman, since it seems apparent that no one is going to put that on the floor, I'd like to say that let's table this until --

MR. SEMENZA: No, not tabling nothing. I don't know what everybody is thinking here. It's been nine months.

MR. HOOVER: I just think the gentleman's here 25 years --

MR. SEMENZA: I understand that. I called him and I gave him the option to walk out. I told him we would honor your years of service and everything and I got yelled at. Do you know what he said halfway

through the meeting? I conferred with the solicitor about this. Halfway through the conversation he asked who this was. Tom Scarnatto for a long time. Who this So there's obviously a problem there. was. We are unrepresented for LLVSA. We own a portion of that. If that gets sold next week, if they decide to sell that next week, quess what? Old Forge does not have a say in it. All I'm looking to do is the right thing here. Rules and regulations say -they follow Pa Municipalities Authority Act. It's cut and dry. Nine months and no representation.

MR. RUSSICK: You got to do the right thing. Follow the regulations.

MR. SEMENZA: My kid had a baseball game tonight and I'm the head coach of the team. Guess what? I made a commitment to this borough. Look where I'm at.

MR. NOTARI: I have a question. The rules and regulations that Mr. Semenza gave us, removal, which is highlighted, do you have these in front of you? "Unless excused by the board, a member of the board who

fails to attend three consecutive meetings of the board may be removed by the appointing municipality up to 60 days after the date of the third meeting of the board which the member failed to attend." What does that mean, "up to 60 days"? Does that mean we only have 60 days after the third absence?

ATTY. RINALDI: Right.

MR. NOTARI: Then what happens? We've passed that date.

ATTY. RINALDI: The last meeting was when?

MR. SEMENZA: Last night.

ATTY. RINALDI: I mean, you have 60 days from tonight to remove him. If he misses the next meeting you have 60 days from that one.

MR. NOTARI: It says after the date of the third meeting of the board.

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, he's over three in a row, so you can start that clock running after that third meeting, 60 days. Then the next meeting another 60 days, if you want to look at it that way. He's

beyond that 60 days.

MR. NOTARI: So it's not like after 60 days after the third missed meeting that he's just off the board and we have to reappoint somebody new?

ATTY. RINALDI: No.

MR. SEMENZA: Don't get me wrong.

I'm not here looking to throw anybody off
anything. I'm just looking to have
representation for the borough. I had asked
at times -- there's two letters in that
thing I gave everybody. There's two letters
here from me sent to Mr. Scarnatto, asking
him to show up at an Old Forge Council
meeting to update us on what goes on at the
LLVSA, and nothing. We have received no
confirmation at all.

MAYOR LEGG: I see what you're trying to say, and everybody knows Tom Scarnatto. I'll even volunteer to go with a group or somebody else. I'll go see if he's ill, what his problem is, if it's a mental illness or a physical ailment, maybe next week have a meeting and come back. It just hit me out of the clear blue sky. One thing

we don't want to do is make an irrational decision. I'll volunteer to go with anybody, one or two other people. Call a meeting for next week and we'll go from there. This way we'll have a handle on exactly what's going on.

MR. SEMENZA: I know what the problem is. He missed nine meetings in a row, Mayor. It doesn't matter if he's sick or not. If he's sick, do the right thing.

Call somebody and step down. You know what?

Nothing.

MAYOR LEGG: That's what we want to find out.

MR. SEMENZA: I know he's sick.

Doesn't matter. He can still make meetings.

He still goes down for coffee and this, that and the other thing with people. I see it.

I'm not a stupid person. I know what goes on.

MAYOR LEGG: Again, my proposal is --

MR. SEMENZA: I know what it is. I have a motion. Nobody seconds the motion, the motion will fail. Nobody else makes the

motion, the motion will fail. That's all.

There's no reason to do it. I don't know what the investigation is here for. I mean, there's nine meetings in a row missed.

There's going to be a job coming up for Old Forge, probably. They will have to hire.

Do you think if Old Forge is not represented down there Old Forge is going to get a shot at that job? Absolutely not.

MAYOR LEGG: If we have a meeting next week and we --

MR. SEMENZA: I won't be here next week.

MAYOR LEGG: In the interim somebody can come up -- or there might be an alternative or somebody might have someone in mind.

MR. SEMENZA: I have someone in mind, and I think everybody is pleased with it.

MR. FEBBO: I don't have a problem with that, the person in mind and what we want to do here. I think perhaps maybe a little professional courtesy. Again, 25 years and all that.

MR. SEMENZA: I called him to give him the professional courtesy, Councilman.

MR. FEBBO: I know you did, and I know you did inform me about it today. I feel like my position, I would go along with that, but somewhere along the line I think professional courtesy has to enter there.

Not only for him but also for the other members that are just being informed of this issue this evening. That's why I'm asking you consider tabling it.

MR. SEMENZA: I'm not tabling it. The motion will fail.

MR. HOOVER: If the motion fails we can't bring it up?

MR. SEMENZA: I don't know.

ATTY. RINALDI: Somebody can always make a motion at another meeting.

MR. HOOVER: When is the next sewer authority meeting?

MR. NOTARI: The third Monday of the month, according to these letters.

MR. SEMENZA: You know what will happen? He's going to go to the next meeting and then it's going to be over with.

Then he's not going to show up for another couple meetings. Then it's going be another -- I don't even want to get into it.

MR. HOOVER: I was talking to him yesterday. He had to know he missed all those meetings.

MR. SEMENZA: There's no disrespect to anybody. The gentleman is 93 years old, he has some health issues, he cannot make meetings. I don't know if it's because of health issues or because he lost the power down there which he had. I don't know what it is. Frankly, I don't care. All I know is Old Forge Borough is not represented, and if something happens down there and Old Forge needs a say in the matter we do not.

MR. HOOVER: I'll make the motion.

MR. SEMENZA: Motion by Councilman Hoover to remove Tom Scarnatto from the LLVSA board. May I have a second?

MR. FEBBO: Reluctantly, I second that motion.

MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by Councilman Febbo. On the question? Public input?
Roll call, please.
