motorcycle repairs, including major repairs; building material yards, roofing, carpentry, including custom woodworking, custom furniture; making commercial recreation entertainment establishments; concrete batch plants; drive-in establishments; so on and so forth. You all can look at the book, but not anywhere in that spot does it say a junkyard is permitted.

Special exception uses: Auto body shop, golf course, driving ranges, country clubs, outdoor advertising, mobile home parks, nurseries, nursing homes, places of worship, public and parochial schools, public utilities. Nowhere in that section does it say a junkyard is permitted. Okay?

So, I'll turn back to the back of the book, under I-1, industrial zone principal permitted uses: Automobile and metal appliance manufacturing and assembly, structural steel, fabricating shops, machine shops, forges and foundries, bakeries, junkyards. I-1 zone, okay?

So, I don't want to waste anybody's time. We all know this is before a Judge, and I understand that the Judge, we all know, has

the ultimate say, okay, but I am here on behalf of all the residents that are here who some have -- one has a six-month-old child, we have some teenagers and so on and so forth, with the smell, when it rains, it's horrendous.

The noise is just crazy. Your backyard can't be used on weekends because you're listening to machines run and cutting metal, drop metal, smash metal. The machines don't have mufflers on them, so on and so forth.

What I'm saying tonight is we want it to end. So, we want the Borough to either direct their solicitor to either get an injunction, have it stopped, do whatever. The stuff is there, it is a junkyard, the Judge himself deemed it that in the order. He's had eight months to conform to a six month time frame, okay, and we're still at the same spot. All right?

So, we would like it to stop, okay?

Let him find a piece of property, even if it's in the Borough, if it's in an industrial zone, it's legal to do it, haul the stuff there and

cut it up there and make the millions of dollars that he's making, just in a legal area.

He is permitted there to sell equipment that runs, that is fully functional, okay? He's not even permitted to work on that equipment on that property outside of a building. If he wanted to do repairs to that stuff, it would have to be in a building. If you go to Powell Sales and Service, go to the CAT dealer in Dupont, they all have buildings. They all have equipment and it's all outside, but they don't work on it outside. They put it in a building and they fix it there.

So, these are the things that are being brought up to the Judge, okay? So, summer is coming, people's windows are open, their doors are open, it's completely out of control. It's been going on for years. It really shouldn't have gone on at all. So, we're asking, some way, some how, that either an injunction, a stop order, whatever it takes, it needs to stop.

MR. SEMENZA: Bill, what could we do?

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, like he said,

up.

MR. NOTARI: Who is supposed to enforce that?

ATTY. RINALDI: We do. Every month when we go in, he checks the status. So, he's saying, I'm cleaning it up, I'm cutting stuff up and moving it off the property. That's his excuse to cut up, because he can't move it off the trailer.

MR. NOTARI: Yeah, but how do we enforce cease and desist on a daily basis? I mean, to me, cease and desist means stop.

ATTY. RINALDI: No, no.

MR. NOTARI: No? Am I wrong?

ATTY. RINALDI: He's got to clean it

CHRIS GOETZ: Right, but --

MR. NOTARI: Clean it up means put it on the trailer and get it out of there.

CHRIS GOETZ: Well, his attorney's claim was he can't, bah, bah, bah. Okay? The bottom line is, the other day I watched him with a monster loader pick up a trailer and carry it around.

MR. NOTARI: I don't know if Steve's up there every day, but I know he's up there

once or twice a week.

CHRIS GOETZ: Yeah.

 $$\operatorname{MR.}$$  NOTARI: And I know we've had the police up there.

CHRIS GOETZ: And we've had the police there.

MR. NOTARI: You know, we are trying our best.

CHRIS GOETZ: What we're saying is he's had his time.

MR. SEMENZA: I agree.

I understand, I've been at every hearing, I know what the Judge is saying, what I'm asking is that we make sure that we drive home that it needs to stop and he needs to come up with a plan to remove the stuff in whole pieces and either take it to the scrap yard or move it to a location where it can then be cut up, okay?

If they're not working over there cutting it up, it's very quiet, okay, it's like it used to be, but when they're grabbing chunks of steel three times the size of that table and dropping them and cutting them and throwing them into more piles, it's loud. It's beyond

loud. There's residents that live two blocks away that are here.

MR. NOTARI: I'm with you, and I think everybody at this table is with you, but we're going through the court process.

CHRIS GOETZ: Right.

MR. FEBBO: Chris, the unfortunate thing is Judge Munley, if he had come down when he was supposed to a couple months ago he would have seen exactly what we saw, but for him sitting there, and Stocki's lawyer is really painting a pretty picture for him that this kid is an innocent kid doing his best, and excuse my language, it's a shit house over there. We were over there, you're up to your knees in grease and oil.

CHRIS GOETZ: I'm with you. But I also listened to his lawyer and himself lie to the Judge six times --

MR. SEMENZA: And he believes it.

CHRIS GOETZ: -- in front of his bench.

MR. FEBBO: But the Judge is drinking the kool aid that he's giving him.

MR. SEMENZA: My issue is he's not

an innocent kid. He's been a repeated offender in this Borough, breaking ordinances and everything.

CHRIS GOETZ: Absolutely. Maybe we need to bring that up.

MR. SEMENZA: The Judge knows and is very well aware of it, but I do not know how he keeps getting away with this time over and time again. I mean, we have people in this Borough, contractors, mechanics, people that run things, equipment or whatever, equipment sales or whatever it may be, that follow the rules, along with everybody else in this room, and that's what I can't understand, why he keeps getting more time and more time and more time.

MR. HOOVER: When I go there, I get that the Judge kind of believes him, that he thinks that if that machine's sitting there and it runs, it's a good machine, he doesn't have to get rid of it. Right, Chris?

CHRIS GOETZ: And that's what they're falling back on.

MR. HOOVER: And that's what they're falling back on.

ATTY. RINALDI: If it runs. If it

runs.

MR. HOOVER: All those machines up there, if they run, but he takes stuff off of them and it's junk.

CHRIS GOETZ: Yeah. But there's hundreds of pieces of equipment.

> MR. FEBBO: Thousands.

CHRIS GOETZ: Thousands.

ATTY. RINALDI: Which is why the Judge is coming out there.

CHRIS GOETZ: Right.

ATTY. RINALDI: And he said, I'm going to look at each piece of equipment and see what it does.

MR. SEMENZA: But you know what, not for nothing, that's like me coming in your office and saying I want to look at all your cases and give you my opinion on it, which I know nothing about law. You know what I'm What's he know about equipment, you saying? know? I don't know, I don't want to go there.

CHRIS GOETZ: We'll have to paint the picture, but the point is --

ATTY. RINALDI: There's a lot of stuff there that's easy to --

CHRIS GOETZ: What I would ask is that, and Solicitor Rinaldi, it'll be his job to do it, is, listen, it's we're now allowing him to operate an operation that's not zoned for that area as to say clean up. Now, he was given the six months, and he -- I don't know, did he sign this, Bill?

ATTY. RINALDI: Yeah. Actually, no, the Judge made it an order. It's an order.

CHRIS GOETZ: So, he was given a time and he agreed to it, okay, and here we are. During the winter you can tolerate it to a certain extent, okay, but now it's time to be eating dinner on your back patio at 4:30 or 5:00 not listening to a D190 screaming as loud as it can for hours on end, and that's what needs to be presented to the Judge. It needs to come to a stop.

DEP fined him \$92,000 for what he's done to the soil. Now, he's appealed that, everybody's entitled to that, but Steve maybe can give you more information, that's not the first time he was cited. He's been cited four or five times, but that's the largest one.

So, it's becoming a public nuisance

with the odor, the noise. There's noise ordinances in this Borough. So, there's a lot of things that we need to look at, but I'm just asking that whether you can, you know, you can direct Solicitor Rinaldi or you can suggest, but we're looking for it to stop.

And I know the Judge is in charge, but maybe that's the case that needs to be presented to the Judge is it needs to stop immediately until a plan is put in place. The time to clean up is over. The time to clean up is over.

MR. FEBBO: He's gonna say there is a plan in place. Bill, is there anything that we can do?

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, the Judge says anybody who wants to show up, show up, so the more neighbors the better, in my opinion.

MR. SEMENZA: May 2nd on site, anybody can show up?

ATTY. RINALDI: Yes.

CHRIS GOETZ: Yeah. The tough part is, you know, people work. I'm taking leave from my job to go to these hearings and basically you walk out of there, you know,

slapped, really. I mean, that's where we're at at this point unfortunately.

MR. NOTARI: Some of us have done that, too.

CHRIS GOETZ: And you've done that and Jimmy's there and these guys are there, but that's the tough part. The problem I have with the situation on May 2nd is, one, it's 30 more days; two, you told him the day you're coming. You need to show up there when he doesn't know you're coming, okay, with the noise and the machines. I could tell you, when Judge Munley comes, you will be able to hear a pin drop over there. There's no doubt about it.

MR. NOTARI: Have you thought about having the neighbors write letters to Judge
Munley or to call individually if you can't make it to the hearing?

MR. HOOVER: That's what I thought, just to call and complain.

CHRIS GOETZ: Well, we could try to do that, yeah.

MR. HOOVER: Just to call his office and complain.

MR. NOTARI: I mean, you're here

venting to us, and I hope you realize, I feel the same way you do.

CHRIS GOETZ: I know you do.

MR. NOTARI: Obviously, I don't live there so I don't have to put up with it every day, but I'm as frustrated with the process, because I'm like you, I don't know how it's not stopped. You know?

CHRIS GOETZ: Yep. It should be finished.

MR. NOTARI: And as the people, the neighbors know, when the winter comes, he didn't do anything over the winter until he had two weeks left to meet the deadline, and then he started moving stuff.

told the Judge that the snow slowed him down.

However, in the middle of the snowstorms and the blizzards and the rainstorms, they're still working. They're better than the postal service, trust me. I mean, it's incredible.

So, that was the case I wanted to bring on behalf of all of our neighbors over there. Not all of them could make it tonight but they're all as frustrated as I am, and some

of them aren't even as close to it as I am but they're still feeling it a block away, two blocks away. And it doesn't look good for the town. Mr. Dunbar's attorney's gonna speak, I mean, he's invested millions of dollars up and down Keyser Avenue and then that's what you're coming on.

We're all in it for the system, but our ask is that the next step be stop it and come up with a plan and get it out. Not cut it up, because we're just continuing to allow him not only to do it illegally, he's profiting millions of dollars.

He told the Judge five months ago there was 270 million pounds of metal over there, steel. I called the scrap yard the morning of one of the hearings, they told me 10 cents a pound. Do the math, folks. That's the problem. Thank you for your time.

MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Chris. Mike?

ATTY. GALLAGHER: Good evening,

gentlemen. My name is Mike Gallagher, and I do

represent Mr. Dunbar whom I think as many of

you know is a resident of Old Forge, he's been

here a long time. He does live over on Amity

Avenue, and he has invested literally tens of millions of dollars in the community. He's very involved with community activities.

He's happy to be a resident of Old Forge, but I just have to kind of echo what Mr. Goetz was saying in relation to what's going on over there.

It is coming into the summer months now, the weather is getting nicer, and Mr. Dunbar and his family and his neighbors and everyone, they can't go outside at night, they can't enjoy a weekend, they can't have a backyard barbecue, they can't have parties, they can't have guests over and have them outside because this has been going on since last summer. And it's to the point where literally their property values are going to be decreasing if they haven't already. Their quality of life has been diminished to a large extent because of what's going on.

And we understand and we appreciate that the Borough has taken some action on this, but the one thing that we want to see is if when Judge Munley does come out on May 2nd, I doubt it is going to be cleaned up by that

point in time, that at least there is some request from the Borough to put restrictions on his cleaning this up so that it's not going on on Saturday afternoons and Sunday mornings and 5:30 at night when people are coming home and want to go out and have dinners on their patios and on their back decks and enjoy the weather.

So, that was the one suggestion we were going to make is if it isn't cleaned up by then, which very seriously I doubt that it will be, that there could be some restrictions put on that. We just wanted to, again, just echo Mr. Goetz's comments of, you know, we want to make sure the Borough is pursuing this aggressively.

And the one thing, too, is this has been going on for quite some time. We're not quite sure how it got to this point, but we want to kind of make sure that this doesn't happen again in the community.

Mr. Dunbar is a developer, he has people who come into town and they come and they look at his apartments, they come from all over the place, they come from outside this area, many of them are professionals, he's

renting higher end properties to professionals, and when they come into town and they drive down Keyser Avenue or they come in Lonesome Road or they come in a certain way and they see something like that, he has literally had people who have literally driven up, seen the town and said, Change my mind, don't want to live in this community.

So, we're wondering if, given the fact that this has happened, is there something in place to kind of nip this in the bud a little sooner in the future to prevent this from happening again to the point where it gets to someone drives into town and they see something like this and they don't even want to live here.

It's bad for Mr. Dunbar, it's bad for the community, the community loses tax revenue, the businesses suffer because they lose people moving into the community. And we're just kind of curious, is there something in place to kind of make sure that this doesn't happen again?

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, I could tell that he had permission from planning to sell

used equipment. He started to turn that into a scrap yard, he got a notice of zoning violation, he appealed that zoning violation.

We went to court, we filed a complaint and an injunction, our injunction was granted, and the remedy was he's got to clean up the site. So, the Judge deemed it a junkyard, not allowed in a C2 zone, what are you going to do about it.

MR. SEMENZA: The Borough never gave him permission to do what he did.

ATTY. RINALDI: Right.

MR. SEMENZA: A lot of those vehicles he brought in at night.

ATTY. RINALDI: So, if you noticed, he cleaned up first the lot next door, then he cleaned up the encroachments, then he's been moving stuff off the property. And, yes, the Judge is giving him time.

ATTY. GALLAGHER: Yeah.

ATTY. RINALDI: We went in at the last hearing, This is it, we're done.

ATTY. GALLAGHER: I understand, you're bound, Bill. As a fellow attorney, I understand, you're bound by the Judge. There's

nothing you can do right now until May 2nd.

ATTY. RINALDI: And DEP is all over him, but, once again, he's appealing those, too. I mean, he's fined so much with DEP it's not even funny.

MR. FEBBO: The unfortunate thing is that the wheels of democracy turn slowly. He gets appeals and appeals and extensions and appeals. You should be on this side of the table, talk about being frustrated, and you're going to court with all that. Every time that we think that we have him, that he's either going to go to jail or the Judge is going to fine him severely, he gets a slap on the wrist and we get mud on our face.

ATTY. RINALDI: And, quite honestly, I put the schedule in because I didn't want to say, Okay, it will be cleaned up in six months and I come back and nothing be done. So, I wanted the Judge on him every 30 days to say, What have you done in the last 30 days? What have you done?

So, he has done things except for one snow period, but for the most, yes, he got off the one property, he got off the

encroachments. He was supposedly supposed to sign an agreement; he didn't. We brought that up with the Judge. He has moved stuff off.

You know, we have photos every 30 days.

ATTY. GALLAGHER: And that was the other question, you know, is the Borough --

ATTY. RINALDI: Every 30 days we have flyover photos and --

MR. SEMENZA: He basically did what he wanted to do and that was it.

ATTY. GALLAGHER: Right.

MR. SEMENZA: Like Chris had stated before, the zoning book, he had said the zones of the Borough, and we have regulations of what you can do in each zone, we're not giving people permission to put stuff like that. So, you're saying nip it in the bud, he shouldn't have did it in the first place. He got away with it. He pulled a fast one on the Borough, basically.

ATTY. GALLAGHER: I understand. It just seems like it has gotten to the point where there's so much there, that's what my client and I think some of the residents are having a difficulty understanding.

MR. SEMENZA: And like I had said before, he's a repeated offender in the Borough. He does what he wants to do and there's no repercussions for him, and I can't understand how or why this happens.

ATTY. RINALDI: He's got state police violations for moving the stuff out on illegal trailers. I mean, I could tell you, he's got -- there's more citations against him that he's appealing than you can shake a stick at.

MR. SEMENZA: This goes on for years and years and years on every project that he does.

ATTY. GALLAGHER: Oh, I trust you -MR. FEBBO: The Judge is tooling you
with it. It's been over -- tooling you, and
because he gets away with it all, I mean, he
chuckles at us and slides out the door again.

MR. NOTARI: Mr. Gallagher?
ATTY. GALLAGHER: Yes.

MR. NOTARI: I think since this has happened, I think our code enforcement officer has been more diligent in keeping an eye on properties around town so that this does not

happen again. That's kind of what you're leaning to.

ATTY. GALLAGHER: That's what we're looking for because --

MR. NOTARI: Unfortunately, I think some of our entrances into town are zoned in ways that allow businesses -- like you said, Lonesome Road, well, there's not much we could do with the zoning there.

We continually are on property
owners to keep things clean and we do our best
to do that, and I know Steve works hard at
that, and I think that's what you were alluding
to. And I think since this has happened to us,
I think we are more vigilant in paying
attention to that kind of stuff.

ATTY. GALLAGHER: And that's all we're asking. It's a great community, my wife is from here actually, she lived here and grew up in this area.

MR. NOTARI: I'm hoping Mr. Dunbar buys those properties eventually on Keyser and does --

ATTY. GALLAGHER: And, you know,

Mr. Dunbar is interested in keeping it a good

community, keeping it looking nice, keeping it so that when people come in they go, This is the kind of place that I want to live. I want to bring all of my tax money here, all of my business here, and eat at the restaurants and shop at the local stores, and this is where I want to raise my family and have them grow up here and live here in the future.

So, that's really what we want to accomplish and hope that the Borough is working towards that. But in the meantime, if there is going to be future activity, at least make it so that the residents can enjoy some of this summer and not have this going on continuously while they're outside trying to enjoy the weather.

MR. FEBBO: Mr. Gallagher, I believe that all seven of us here, that's one topic that we all agree about. We all agree that we need to go ahead -- it's a blight in the community and the eyesores that we do see. If anything else that we disagree on, I think that's one thing that we're doing the best that we can.

ATTY. GALLAGHER: Thank you very

much. We do appreciate that and we're always happy to give support in that regard if we can. Thank you.

MR. SEMENZA: You didn't sign in, but you want to speak?

MR. SCHECTMAN: I didn't sign in.

MR. SEMENZA: I'll let you go this
time.

MR. SCHECTMAN: Thank you. Jay
Schectman from the Lackawanna County community
relations, formerly with the economic
development, and usually I speak over projects
such as paving and storm water and so on, and
now I -- hopefully I can do as good a job as
Councilman Notari, who has been promoted in the
county.

MR. NOTARI: He's my replacement.
