1 MR. SEMENZA: Good evening, ladies
2 and gentlemen. Welcome to the Old Forge
3 Borough Council meeting. I'd like to start
4 the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance.

5 (The Pledge of Allegiance was
6 recited.)

7 MR. SEMENZA: Roll call, please,
8 Bill.

9 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Febbo?

10 MR. FEBBO: Here.

11 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Notari?

12 MR. NOTARI: Present.

13 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Lettieri?

14 MR. LETTIERI: Present.

15 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Rinaldi is
16 absent. Mr. Hoover?

17 MR. HOOVER: Here.

18 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Ferrett?

19 MR. FERRETT: Here.

20 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Semenza?

21 MR. SEMENZA: Here.

22 ATTY. RINALDI: The mayor's here,
23 I'm here, and Marylynn will be in.

24 MR. SEMENZA: Once again, welcome to
25 the April 2nd work session for the Old Forge

1 Borough Council. The purpose of tonight's
2 meeting is to set the agenda for our April
3 16th regular council meeting. I'll go to
4 our department heads, see if they have
5 anything for the agenda. I'll go down the
6 table, see if counsel has anything to
7 address.

8 Paul Papi is not here tonight. At
9 this time I'll go to Steve. Steve, do you
10 have anything for the agenda?

11 MR. BIERYLA: I do not. We have a
12 planning meeting coming up, and I believe
13 Birchwood Estates is coming for a
14 subdivision plan. But other than that --

15 ATTY. RINALDI: They submitted?

16 MR. LOPATKA: That wasn't a formal
17 submission.

18 MR. SEMENZA: When is the planning
19 meeting?

20 MR. BIERYLA: This Thursday, if
21 council wanted to come to the meeting.

22 MR. SEMENZA: Anything else, Steve?

23 MR. BIERYLA: No.

24 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any
25 questions for Steve?

1 MR. NOTARI: Because of another
2 borough matter I took a drive down Foundry
3 Street today. At the end of Foundry there
4 seems to be a lot of construction equipment.
5 Can you take a look and see if it's -- I
6 mean, we're kind of attacking a lot of
7 issues in town regarding junkyards. So I
8 don't know if they're all licensed or
9 running or registered, but would you take a
10 look and see. I mean, if we're going to
11 attack other places in town we better be
12 thorough and be all over. Thank you.

13 MR. SEMENZA: Anything else,
14 Councilman?

15 MR. NOTARI: No.

16 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else? Steve,
17 it's getting to the time you're going to be
18 going nuts with --

19 MR. BIERLYA: My plate is getting
20 full already. I have to give Bill four
21 hearings with Mr. Seig, and there's probably
22 going to be in May, I would imagine, another
23 four with different letters that I sent out
24 for no compliance.

25 MR. SEMENZA: Any update on the

1 Perone property?

2 MR. BIERLYA: Well, 120 days. He's
3 good until June sometime. Somewhere in
4 June.

5 MR. SEMENZA: I don't have anything
6 else. Dave, engineer's report. Do you have
7 anything for the agenda?

8 MR. LOPATKA: I did mention to you
9 that I sent those plans out to get an actual
10 real cost for the community center drawing.
11 I should be getting that back any day. I'll
12 get that to you and Marylynn so everybody
13 can get it.

14 Bill, I got a set of drawings for
15 the church. You can get that signed and
16 finalized.

17 I met Joe up at Pride.

18 MR. SEMENZA: I met him also.

19 MR. LOPATKA: To me, just looking at
20 it grade-wise it looks like there's
21 definitely something you can do to alleviate
22 that problem in that one area, the swale
23 along the road.

24 MR. SEMENZA: I'm not sure how far
25 Pride Mobility's property goes, but it has

1 to go to that makeshift dirt road going
2 through there. Correct? People aren't
3 going to be able to drive to the swale if
4 they put a swale there. Correct?

5 MR. LOPATKA: No, the swale actually
6 was started before -- well, actually if
7 you're going up Wood, from here up Wood, it
8 would be just after it. You kind of want to
9 start it just beyond where that comes out.
10 I mean, all the water seems to accumulate
11 right there, and it gets to a certain point
12 height-wise and then it starts crossing the
13 road.

14 MR. SEMENZA: Could you reach out to
15 them, see if they'd still do it. They got
16 all the equipment there. All it is is
17 riprap.

18 MR. LOPATKA: Yeah.

19 MR. SEMENZA: This issue is it's
20 coming off their property. I don't see why
21 they wouldn't do it.

22 MR. LOPATKA: I'll look at the map.
23 I'll reach out to Reilly and have them talk
24 to them.

25 MR. SEMENZA: If anybody doesn't

1 know what we're talking about, Wood Street,
2 the Pride Mobility property across from Jim
3 Serino's house. He's getting some dirt
4 washing, water washing across the road,
5 making the road a mess there. Dave
6 suggested a swale.

7 MR. LOPATKA: Parallel with the
8 road. Their swale is deep enough on that
9 side of the building that you could easily
10 run the swale into it.

11 MR. FEBBO: Was this a problem in
12 existence before Pride?

13 MR. LOPATKA: I think there were
14 probably some issues. There's a low spot in
15 the road right there.

16 MR. SEMENZA: I don't think it was
17 as bad. I've never seen it like it's been
18 explained to me.

19 MR. LOPATKA: We went up there right
20 after it rained and there was a puddle
21 there. The water was starting to go across
22 the road.

23 MR. SEMENZA: They seem like they're
24 pretty good guys. Maybe they'll help. See
25 what they say, Dave. Anything else?

1 MR. LOPATKA: Marylynn, the plans.

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: I talked to them
3 yesterday. Showed the plans. Everyone here
4 except Joe and the mayor saw them. So far,
5 so good. I think everybody liked them
6 pretty much the way they are.

7 MR. LOPATKA: That should be it.

8 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any
9 questions for Dave?

10 MR. LETTIERI: Dave, we don't have
11 any plans for the building next door?

12 MR. LOPATKA: We don't. At this
13 point we're trying to solidify that plan,
14 and then we talked about that, to start
15 moving on to what's going to happen over
16 there. It would be better off --

17 MR. LETTIERI: We talked about
18 coordinating at the same time.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Remember from when
20 the police were going to move in the
21 basement? Jason had to do up a plan of a
22 centralized work area that he wanted and
23 everybody could work off that.

24 So what we want to do is take that
25 plan and put it into the upstairs of that

1 building. So we have to do some design work
2 on the lower floor, the main level, but the
3 upstairs plan is kind of there.

4 MR. LOPATKA: It's going to have to
5 be tweaked. I think the program to set it
6 up is similar to what was talked about for
7 downstairs. It would be worth it for you to
8 do them at the same time because you're
9 going to get a better price.

10 MR. SEMENZA: We have all the
11 cubicles for it?

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

13 MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?
14 Anybody else? Thanks, Dave. Bill,
15 solicitor. Do you have anything for the
16 agenda?

17 ATTY. RINALDI: Planning is going to
18 be presented with the final subdivision
19 plans for the church Thursday, so the final
20 approval by council will be at the next.

21 I'll do what we need to do to make a
22 determination on heart and lung benefits for
23 the chief at the next meeting.

24 I talked to Dave about surveying the
25 Project 70 land. That's all I have.

1 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any
2 questions for Bill? Thanks, Bill.

3 ATTY. RINALDI: It will be a final
4 approval and close the next day or the day
5 after, so I'll have everything in one
6 package at the next meeting. The 90 days
7 ran so we have to redo it.

8 MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Bill.
9 Marylynn?

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: I don't really have
11 anything for the agenda.

12 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any
13 questions for Marylynn?

14 MR. NOTARI: Are the parks open?

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: The parks are open.

16 MR. FEBBO: How did we make out with
17 help?

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: Right now Frank is
19 working and Larry is working. We have an
20 advertisement in the paper for more help.
21 One of the guys who worked a few hours last
22 year didn't come back this year. So for now
23 we have two working.

24 MR. FEBBO: Is Larry going to stay
25 with us?

1 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

2 MR. NOTARI: We're going to add a
3 third person?

4 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes, to replace
5 Ron, who worked last year.

6 MR. SEMENZA: I know last year we
7 got locks.

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: They're all ready
9 to go.

10 MR. SEMENZA: So we can kind of keep
11 control.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: We have them.

13 MR. NOTARI: For the parks?

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

15 MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?

16 Thanks, Marylynn. We'll go down the table
17 now. Mayor?

18 MAYOR LEGG: Mr. Chairman, the only
19 thing I have is the 27th of this month is
20 cleanup day, so I'd like to see if we can
21 get as many people as we can. I'm going to
22 see Mr. Gatto. Last year he promised the
23 Leo Club and cheerleaders and we had eight
24 people show up. Lou, myself and Russ.

25 MR SEMENZA: I'll be out of town

1 that day.

2 MR. LETTIERI: Me as well.

3 MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Febbo?

4 MR. FEBBO: Nothing.

5 MR. NOTARI: I have nothing.

6 MR. LETTIERI: Rick, scheduling with
7 the school board?

8 MR. NOTARI: I haven't been able to
9 get in touch with Brian Guida, who is the
10 new chairman of that committee, so I'm going
11 to reach out to Brian Rinaldi, see if he can
12 get us together.

13 MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Ferrett?

14 MR. FERRETT: Nothing.

15 MR. HOOVER: I have nothing.

16 MR. SEMENZA: Myself, last night we
17 had an executive session for real estate.
18 We spoke about the remodeling of the borough
19 building and Marylynn mentioned that we
20 might even use the LGI of the school or
21 something for some meetings. I did speak
22 with John Rushefski today. Marylynn is
23 going to take care of it from there.
24 Everything will be good.

25 Another thing is, I know in the past

1 we talked about tablets for counsel members.
2 Everybody still interested? Okay. I,
3 myself.

4 ATTY. RINALDI: Set up a borough
5 e-mail, because all e-mails are subject to
6 the right-to-know law.

7 MR. SEMENZA: It's going to be
8 borough use only. You'll have a borough
9 e-mail attached. Use it for borough
10 business only.

11 I spoke with a gentleman, I believe
12 his last name was Grande, and he wants to
13 use lower Pagnotti for a speed and
14 conditioning, like a three-day course down
15 there for speed conditioning. I kind of put
16 him off because I wanted to talk to Marylynn
17 before I said anything to him. But I just
18 wanted to let council know that it won't
19 interfere with any --

20 MR. FEBBO: Who's he representing?

21 MR. NOTARI: Himself. Probably
22 Charlie Grande.

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: Is this something
24 that's only open to Old Fore kids?

25 MR. SEMENZA: No, it will be open to

1 anyone. I guess it will be. They didn't
2 say no.

3 MS. BARTOLETTI: Normally the travel
4 teams I usually say no to everyone.

5 MR. SEMENZA: It's not a team. We
6 can limit it, then. We can tell him it can
7 only be for Old Forge.

8 MR. LETTIERI: When does he plan on
9 doing this?

10 MR. SEMENZA: He's working with
11 Schuback so it doesn't interfere with his
12 camp. He's going work around junior
13 football.

14 MR. FEBBO: Is there an age limit?

15 MR. SEMENZA: I didn't get too much
16 info on it because I didn't want to get into
17 a conversation with him. I wanted to speak
18 with Marylynn before. Obviously they need
19 proof of liability insurance and the whole
20 nine yards and he does that. I'm going to
21 put him in contact with her.

22 MR. NOTARI: Do our youth
23 organizations provide proof of insurance and
24 liability?

25 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes, everyone does.

1 Anyone who uses the field has to provide
2 insurance.

3 MR. NOTARI: If junior football is
4 involved, it would probably make more sense
5 for them to just sponsor the clinic.

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: I think this guy is
7 kind of doing it on his own.

8 MR. FEBBO: Do they have a fee?

9 MR. SEMENZA: I'm sure they do
10 charge for it.

11 MS. BARTOLETTI: Is it something
12 that he is charging for? Do we in turn
13 charge a fee for use of the field, or
14 besides having proof of insurance, provide a
15 certificate of insurance to us? We have to
16 have a certificate of insurance, but do we
17 charge a fee for something like that?
18 Usually when people use our fields and
19 everything it's always not for profit.

20 MR. FEBBO: You've got to be careful
21 with that. You don't want to open a can of
22 worms.

23 MR. SEMENZA: Marylynn, I'm going to
24 have him call you. You talk to him. Then
25 next meeting you can update everybody on the

1 information on it.

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: That's good. Maybe
3 he has a flyer or whatever that he's
4 planning on using.

5 MR. SEMENZA: Do you have anything?

6 MR. HOOVER: That water project
7 going on on Moosic Road, as we get closer to
8 Main Avenue it's going to get crazy.
9 Leeward is going to come here and ask if
10 they can have a police car somewhere maybe
11 help with the traffic. They'll pay for the
12 policeman. I'll pay for the policeman.
13 They're going to ask for a cop to be there
14 just to maybe direct traffic. We're going
15 to have to stop when it gets up to Main
16 Avenue and maybe ask the state if we can
17 close it down on a Sunday, do it on a
18 Sunday, something like that.

19 MR. SEMENZA: Could we just shut a
20 state road down?

21 MR. HOOVER: I can with the correct
22 detour signs. I have to make up a detour
23 plan for them. We may go out to Main Avenue
24 a little bit. It's about eight foot out in
25 the middle of the intersection.

1 MR. SEMENZA: Russ?

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: No, I'm good.

3 MR. SEMENZA: That's it. Chief
4 Dubernas isn't here. Mayor, anything to
5 report for the police?

6 MAYOR LEGG: I've been here after
7 work every day with Buggy and Kimbal, on the
8 phone with them and the chief constantly.
9 So we have it pretty much under control.
10 I'd rather have the chief back. In due
11 time.

12 MR. SEMENZA: I'll go to public
13 comment.

14 MR. JUROSKY: Can you tell me the
15 update? It's seems like it got a lot worse.

16 MR. HOOVER: I happened to drive by
17 Sunday. Sunday was really bad. It made me
18 turn around and drive up because you could
19 only get one car up. If a car was coming
20 down you wouldn't be able to fit two cars
21 there. Butler. He had actually four cars
22 parked in front of his place where you
23 couldn't get by, plus there's a Mercedes
24 sitting up around the corner for about a
25 week that I know of with smashed windows.

1 MR. JURISKY: That was dropped off.
2 Probably the last two months he rolled ten
3 cars down the hill. You guys told him not
4 to do it and he still does it. Then the
5 garbage packer had a tough time getting up
6 the street with that Mercedes there. It's
7 tough. A fire truck I'm not sure.

8 MR. HOOVER: Whose blue car is that
9 on the corner?

10 MR. JURISKY: I'm not sure.
11 Probably the apartment housing.

12 MR. HOOVER: Then you have that
13 Comcast van, then another car, Jeep, in
14 front of that.

15 MR. JURISKY: I must be a pain in
16 the ass and I do agree with you. My
17 son-in-law got in an accident at that corner
18 three weeks ago. I was hoping one of my
19 family would not get in an accident there
20 and he did. Myself, last year I saw four
21 accidents. I just pray there's not a bad
22 accident.

23 MR. HOOVER: The way it is right
24 now, if there was a fire up there I don't
25 believe you would be able to get a fire

1 truck around the corner. That blue car is
2 right there on the corner, the Mercedes is
3 in front of the other house.

4 MR. SEMENZA: What he's doing is
5 he's playing a chess game moving cars. You
6 know, I go up here one day and I see cars
7 there. I go up there the next day and the
8 cars are moved.

9 MR. JUROSKY: I gave the chief and
10 Steve a list of cars there about two months
11 ago. There's two cars at the stop sign, a
12 Volkswagon and a white SUV. They're parked
13 there on the road for four months. Okay?
14 You talk about junkyards. This is going to
15 end up a junkyard in a residential
16 neighborhood. There's two cars parked at
17 that stop sign at Butler and Main for four
18 months.

19 If he gets rid of those junks and
20 parked his vehicles there, not up on Garber,
21 on Butler, that's the only thing I'm saying.

22 And I tried to talk to this guy. We
23 almost got in a fight. I go please, just
24 work with us. You were told you're not
25 allowed to roll the cars down the hill. He

1 goes I don't care. So that's why I gave it
2 two months, to see if hopefully it worked
3 itself out, but it's getting worse. I heard
4 his son got denied at planning and now he's
5 taking it all out on us, the neighbors.

6 MR. NOTARI: Why can't we put permit
7 parking on those streets?

8 ATTY. RINALDI: I don't think you
9 really need permit parking. All you need to
10 do is he got his letter from the zoning
11 hearing officer. If he's still in violation
12 he goes to the magistrate and they fine him
13 for parking cars on the street for his
14 business.

15 MR. LETTIERI: Why is this not
16 happening, though?

17 ATTY. RINALDI: You have to wait.
18 He's got 30 days to appeal.

19 MR. SEMENZA: So he's going to
20 appeal it in 30 days.

21 ATTY. RINALDI: Well, he hasn't
22 appealed it.

23 MR. BIERYLA: That's gone.

24 MR. SEMENZA: What step are we in
25 now?

1 ATTY. RINALDI: You see a car there
2 go down and file one. He'll get the
3 message. It will start costing him money.

4 MR. BIERLYA: This is the first I'm
5 hearing this. I haven't heard any
6 complaints from anybody.

7 MR. SEMENZA: I've been up there a
8 few times, and it seems like when I was up
9 there he's playing a chess game with cars.
10 That's what it seemed like to me. Why don't
11 you start frequenting yourself up there,
12 please. I know you got a lot on your plate.

13 MR. BIERLYA: Would I make a letter
14 as to parking cars for service on the road?
15 Because to be there and to know what cars
16 are what is like everything else.

17 ATTY. RINALDI: I think you have
18 enough witnesses here to drag down and say
19 we saw it get dropped off, we saw it move on
20 the lot, we saw it move off the lot.
21 Doesn't belong to anybody on the lot.

22 MR. SEMENZA: Nick, when you're on
23 dayshift take a ride up, with the mayor's
24 permission. If you see a truck going off a
25 rollback, being parked on the road, let

1 Steve know.

2 MR. BIERLYA: What I would ask is
3 somebody call and at least let me know,
4 because then I know what I'm specifically
5 looking for. Then when I write the letter
6 or the citation for Mr. Seig I can address
7 the exact issue.

8 ATTY. RINALDI: If you look under
9 that section of the zoning ordinance it says
10 parking cars off premises for a -- whatever
11 the business is. All cars for the garages
12 have to be on site. I would just say
13 parking cars off site.

14 MR. SEMENZA: He's using the street
15 for his parking for his business. Can't do
16 it.

17 MR. NOTARI: Mr. Mayor, can you ask
18 Officer Kimbal to share that list with
19 Steve?

20 MAYOR LEGG: Absolutely.

21 MR. NOTARI: That was Steve will
22 know which cars at least we're
23 investigating, see what the story is. Can
24 you get an update for Officer Kimbal --

25 MAYOR LEGG: I'll give him a call

1 first thing in the morning.

2 MR. FEBBO: Do those cars have tags
3 on them?

4 MR. JUROSKY: Yes, but you can't
5 tell because the new law.

6 MR. FEBBO: What about inspection
7 stickers?

8 MR. JUROSKY: I think they are.

9 ATTY. RINALDI: If he says I'm not
10 working on that car, fine. Send the chief
11 and get it out of there. I'm sure he's not
12 going to tell the truth.

13 MR. BIERYLA: I'll write the letter
14 and forward it to you.

15 ATTY. RINALDI: Bring the neighbors
16 down.

17 MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Steve.

18 MR. LESCHINSKY: I come to this
19 meeting, I know you guys understand and
20 believe us and are trying everything you can
21 to help us. My neighbor told me a week or
22 two ago -- he was all frantic because
23 there's a car parked there right now that
24 you can't make a right onto Garber without
25 missing it. It was just dropped off a

1 rollback. A white Mercedes. There was
2 another Hyundai that was dropped there. You
3 can barely squeeze through. I don't know
4 how our garbage truck made it today. I was
5 waiting to see if there was going to be an
6 accident or our garbage didn't get picked
7 up.

8 I couldn't wait to come to the
9 meeting. I invited the whole town to come
10 to the meeting because you guys give us such
11 a great opportunity to talk to you. I know
12 that you guys are backing us. You're doing
13 everything you can.

14 But when I called the non-emergency
15 number for him and the chief came and said
16 he's not going to -- whose job is it?
17 Because if they don't want to do their job
18 I'll do it. If he doesn't want to write the
19 letter, I'll write the letter. If the chief
20 doesn't want to give the ticket I'll run for
21 chief.

22 From this point on you guys are
23 telling somebody to do something. They're
24 not doing it. It's going on seven months.

25 MR. JURISKY: They're doing it now.

1 MR. LESCHINSKY: The chief told him
2 I'm not writing this ticket because I don't
3 know. I drive up and down that street every
4 day. That's like slapping us in the face
5 like we're liars. We're doing this just for
6 fun. We got nothing better to do than come
7 down and interrupt a zoning meeting or
8 council meeting with this silly stuff and
9 this guy's going to continue to do this over
10 and over and over and over again.

11 So that was my thing today, to come
12 and find out whose job is it now. Is it
13 Mr. Bieryla's to write the letter or the
14 citation?

15 MR. SEMENZA: He's going to write
16 the letter to take him to Seig's. But since
17 we had him in the meeting a few months back
18 I kind of thought maybe he would have gotten
19 the idea and the picture, this is how it is
20 and this is what our ordinances are and
21 you've got to obey the ordinances of the
22 borough.

23 I don't know if you were here when
24 we said the 30 days are up and Steve is
25 going to go forward --

1 MR. LESCHINSKY: I knew he was going
2 to be cited.

3 MR. SEMENZA: He's going to take
4 care of it from that point on. As for the
5 traffic violations, you'd have to talk to
6 the mayor about that. That's under the
7 police.

8 MR. LESCHINSKY: It's turning into a
9 junkyard and I got cars parked on my corner
10 with the wheels sticking out in the road
11 where you could barely fit by with garbage
12 bags on the windows. It's going to get
13 worked on one of these days, so he's using
14 the roadways and the thoroughfares, which is
15 against the rules.

16 MR. JUROSKY: Sometimes he'll double
17 park a car by his garage with the hood up
18 and work in the middle of the street. He's
19 mad at all of us, so he's going to prove a
20 point now.

21 MR. LESCHINSKY: I have nothing
22 against a guy making a buck, but come and
23 talk to he neighbors. Give us a deal on
24 inspections. Come and plow our street.
25 Work with us. You're in the neighborhood.

1 That's the bad thing. He's in a residential
2 neighborhood. He don't care about letters,
3 about council meetings. I've talked to a
4 lawyer but I said council's on my side, on
5 our side. Just that you understand he's in
6 violation. He said there's other routes you
7 can take.

8 MR. SEMENZA: When he starts getting
9 hit in the pocket with violations maybe
10 he'll start cleaning up, I hope.

11 MR. LESCHINSKY: I appreciate it.

12 MR. NOTARI: Is it against the
13 ordinance for a tow truck to drop off a car
14 that can't run on a street, yes or no?

15 ATTY. RINALDI: It's against our
16 ordinance to have a garage and park the cars
17 you're work on out in the street. I don't
18 know about specific dropping --

19 MR. NOTARI: Can we ask the
20 neighbors, when they do see a drop off, send
21 it to the police or the zoning officer. Get
22 pictures. Even if you call and leave a
23 message on the machine, at least then
24 there's a record of when this is happening.

25 MR. SEMENZA: Okay. If nobody else

1 has anything, at this time the chair is
2 going to entertain a motion to adjourn.

3 MR. FEBBO: I'll make that motion.

4 MR. SEMENZA: By Councilman Febbo.
