And 5 it's taken care of. 6 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: If somebody is not 7 taking care of their property and some is encroaching 8 on to your property, is there a violation there of any 9 sort? 10 MR. BIERYLA: Only on their property. 11 The violation that goes to the other property --12 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: That's what I mean. 13 MR. BIERYLA: -- is trespassing. 14 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: I had a call about 15 branches encroaching on a property. And sooner or 16 later, going to get to the power lines. The power 17 lines come in to the house, they're already starting to 18 get to that point. 19 MR. BIERYLA: That's a safety hazard. 20 Can call PPL and they'll take care of it. 21 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: PPL says it's not 2.2 their responsibility. I'll talk to you after the 23 meeting about it. Give you the address and go down. 24

Anybody else?

MR. FERRETT: One thing. Bill, from a legal standpoint of view, what he just said that they would be trespassing and you would be able to cut it down, I thought in the past we had to notify those people that, if they wouldn't do anything, then you would have the right to go and do it. You just can't

go to work and do anything on your own.

ATTORNEY RINALDI: That's if they're in our right-of-way. But if you have two neighbors and one neighbor's branches are going over the other neighbor's, the neighbor who has got the encroachment of branches an file a trespassing claim against the other neighbor.

MR. FERRETT: Right. You just got through saying, you got to file a complaint against the neighbor and everything. You just can't go to work and cut it and take it upon yourself.

ATTORNEY RINALDI: ell, that's up for them to decide how they want to handle it. They can cut it down.

MR. FERRETT: I thought --

ATTORNEY RINALDI: Let me finish. If somebody's trees are growing on your property, they're trespassing. You, at your own risk, you trim those branch.

If anything happens and it kills the tree 1 on the other guy's property, you're liable. That's why 2 Steve said, call a professional to come in and do it. 3 Anything else, Joe? CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: 4 MR. FERRETT: No, no. I just wanted 5 clarification. 6 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Anybody else? Thanks, 7 Steve. Dave, anything for the agenda? 8 MR. Milwaukee Avenue will be traveling south from the intersection of Keyser Avenue and Franklin Street to Seaman's Lane, Connell Street in the Borough of Old Forge. That's per the Chief.

Now, I think, really, the only issue is signage on the South Keyser Avenue, but we're going to make sure all of them are clear with the ordinance, so whoever needs to know it, will know it. But it has to be advertised because it's -- we don't have enough time to get that done.

And the other thing I have is limited access and release agreement. Anyone remembers, back in 2010, you did an agreement with the Lackawanna River Corridor Association so that they could use the property to conduct testing and install water testing equipment.

They're asking for us to renew that agreement. So, what I'll do is, go over that for the meeting and get a copy to everybody.

I spoke to him. He informed me that there were several houses, residences complaining the cats are, you know, pooping in the mulch, sitting on their patio furniture, all that.

I've been to a couple residences where people had complained and asked me to come take a look at the cat situation, where their neighbors are feeding feral cats and the cats are in their yard and such and such.

Okay. So, what I wanted to do, in order to try and help the situation, is maybe renting out the senior center for a day to have a community educational thing about feral cats and the TNR process.

I think there's a lot of people that are thinking they're doing a good thing, feeding these cats that all over the neighborhood. But they're not getting fixed and the problem is multiplying, you know.

That and I do have a paper here from a new place that just opened down in Plains. I'll give that to you guys. It's called No Nonsense Neutering. They do \$15.00 vouchers for spaying and neutering of feral cat.

They also vaccinate them against rabies, 1 distemper, things like that. I'm just looking kind of 2 for the Borough's support in trying to start some kind 3 of TNR program to get the public involved, educated, 4 first of all, because that's the most important thing 5 and then to help Steve with the issues that are going 6 7 on. CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Basically, what you're 8 9

looking to do is educate the public with the use of the Borough building.

There's things you can to. But 17 kind of educate the people, so. 18 That does work? CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: 19 Somebody told me cayenne around. 20 MS. HARDING: They don't like hot pepper. 21 Orange peels. And that's the whole point of the TNR. 22 MS. CENTRELLA: Familiar with TNR? Spay, 23 neuter and return. Nobody wants to pay for it. 24 and there's a lot of people in Old Forge that do it on

their own time. We can't do it for the whole community.

What they do is, trap the cats, get them fixed. And we bring them right back to where they came from.

And the point of it is, the population decreases because they're not breeding any more. And they do it in Scranton. They just passed it in Wilkes-Barre. They do it in Jenkins. They do it in Dalton.

CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: What are you looking for us to pass, what kind of -- what do they have, what kind of resolutions?

MS. HARDING: What they have is they have a program in place where -- I don't know what the other townships or anything are paying towards it.

That paper there that I gave you, they do a \$15.00 per cat spay, neuter, you know, and the rabies vaccination.

You can get vouchers and they're good.

You can get five at a time. I mean, the people here,

if I can educate them on this, they may be able to do

it on their own if they have the means.

But for those who don't, maybe we can help them out a little bit. Also, the people who feed

cats should not leave the food out at night because 1 that attracts every other animal, you know, to come. 2 So, there are some rules and some ways to 3 do it so that, you know, you can get along with your 4 neighbor and still be taking care of these cats. 5 Once you release them, you're kind of 6 taking care of them. They need to be taken to a vet, 7 take them to a vet, you know. 8 MS. CENTRELLA: We did go to the home of 9 the gentleman on Sibley Avenue, complaining about cats 10 all over, poop all over the yard and sidewalks. 11 We 'walked around the yard with him, and 12 we found possum poop, raccoon poop, no cats. No cat 13 poop. 14 The neighbors are leaving MS. HARDING: 15 food out. 16 MS. CENTRELLA: Neighbors leave the food 17 out and animals come at night. He assumed that the cat 18 was doing this because he doesn't see the animals at 19 night. Cats won't go on the sidewalk. 20 MS. HARDING: They'll go in mulch, 21 something they can cover up. 22 MS. CENTRELLA: They need to be educated 23 people. 24 CHAIRMAN SEMENZA: Yeah, definitely 25

wouldn't be opposed to --1 MS. CENTRELLA: We would like council's 2 blessing for what we do. Also the sewer committee meeting and, basically, Marylynn, we discussed the new building system.

She's actually going to try to do some research and see if we have what it takes to do that or if we need something else.

She's requested that we set up office hours that are more friendly to the public. So we can -- why don't we think about it for at least a week, and we can talk about that on Tuesday to see what we want to do there.

Marylynn says a couple days from 10 to 2, give the public an opportunity to get in and pay the sewer bill or if they have any questions.
