MR. PAPI: No. Everything is running smooth.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Paul? Paul, is the grass slowing down a little bit?

MR. PAPI: Hopefully. Mine is.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody?

MR. PAPI: It's been tough. We can only send a container down when they can bring us one. I beg them every week to send

MR. BIERYLA: Just that some of the grass issues have died down from the numerous ones that we've had. But we still have a few out there, people that have not complied.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Steve?

MR. NOTARI: I see in your report that the problems with Wyalusing Street and Orchard Street have been both extended 90 days. They're leaving that happen?

MR. BIERYLA: The progress on Wyalusing has been steady. It's a big undertaking for one person. That would be his son.

The other problem on Orchard Street was that the defendant didn't show up, so he gave him 90 more days. I think after that, that's the end of it.

MR. NOTARI: One question about our code. In-ground pools require a five-foot fence. Is that correct?

MR. BIERYLA: Four.

fence?

MR. NOTARI: It does require a

MR. SEMENZA: Correct.

MR. NOTARI: Only in-ground pools or all pools?

MR. BIERYLA: All pools. The reason for that would be if your ground is lower than 48 inches it requires a fence or a barrier above that 48 inches. companies went to 52. So when you get an above-ground pool, if your ground is pretty level they're giving you six inches to play with not requiring the issue of a fence. But you need the 48. If you do not meet that you have to have a fence around it. Then they have the locking gate which you put in the pool. The ladder has to go up and has to lock. So if you are above the 48-inch requirement and the requirement of the 48-inch -- the locking gate the fence requirement isn't really there because the pool is above the requirement.

MR. NOTARI: So when a resident comes in and applies for an in-ground pool permit to put a pool in, do you then go back and check to make sure --

MR. BIERYLA: BIU does. They make

sure they're above that 48-inch level at all areas of the pool. That's a UCC requirement. It's also in our code. That's a UCC requirement that it has to be above 48 inches.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else? Thanks, Steve. Dave?

MR. LOPATKA: I have updated paving numbers. We have gone out -- I was away for the work session. So I do have updated sheets. I added those alleys that we talked about, we went and looked at. I'll pass those out afterwards. Basically we added -- there's an alley off Quarry Road, then an alley off of Center Street. So the overall estimate is 526.

MR. FEBBO: Do we own Milwaukee Avenue, Preate's hill?

MR. PAPI: We patch it.

MR. SEMENZA: Coming from Preate Winery. That's a good question because we collect liquid fuels on that road.

MR. FEBBO: Joe, do we own Milwaukee Avenue from Preate's hill?

MR. FERRETT: No.

MR. FERRETT: How did we get to own 1 it? 2 MR. PAPI: I don't know. I'd love 3 not to take care of it, but this is what I 4 was told. 5 MR. FEBBO: Whoever owns it or is 6 7 responsible, that's got to be taken care of. MR. SEMENZA: Marylynn's going to 8 look into it. It is a mess. 9 MR. PAPI: We pothole patched it 10 last week. How many times are you going to 11 do it? We've been doing it for ten years. 12 MR. FEBBO: Band-aid on top of 13 band-aid on top of band-aid. 14 MR. PAPI: It all has to be milled 15 16 up. MR. FEBBO: Can we check into that? 17 18 MR. SEMENZA: Marylynn is checking into it. 19 MR. LOPATKA: So we have them 20 measured, everything is --21 MR. SEMENZA: So 13 streets at a 22 23 total of \$526,395. MR. LOPATKA: Yeah, that's the 24 25 estimate. You guys have to let me know how

you want to proceed.

Another topic, you asked me about Pride putting that swale in.

MR. SEMENZA: They already put a fence up, so I don't know if it's long gone by now.

MR. LOPATKA: Bob Aulisio, I was going back and forth with him. He went back to ownership. He left me a message, a voice mail last week that said, first, they weren't paying for it. Second, that it was recommended by their engineer that no additional water is added to the pond. That was the final answer.

MR. SEMENZA: I can tell you one thing, the first time we get flooded out down there -- you know, we're supposed to be good neighbors. If they don't want to be a good neighbor and help us out with the runoff across the road off of their property, we'll handle it then.

MR. LOPATKA: We went over it. They actually got a price to do the work. The price was, like, 4,200 bucks or something.

Then they said well, are you guys going to

install that.

MR. SEMENZA: Since that project started them residents over there suffered numerous events with rain, problems with rain.

MR. LOPATKA: Especially in the beginning. So that was the final outcome on that.

The borough building plans are a little bit behind. I actually stopped at their office today and talked to them. I said we need to get back on schedule. I'll have an updated schedule from them hopefully tomorrow.

MR. FEBBO: Do we have those plans drawn up already?

MR. LOPATKA: The plans are drawn. What we need to do now is I need to get -- and I talked to the MEPs about coming out and doing final surveys on the building so we can get the final MEPs. I will have them out here either by the end of the week or early next week so we can get the plans finalized and get it out to bid.

So the schedule was to have it out

to bid, I think, by the end of this month.

Probably going to be more like the end of

next month. It will be ready and be out to

bid. It's about three or four weeks behind.

MR. SEMENZA: Lot more than three or four weeks behind.

MR. FEBBO: We're a month behind.

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$  LOPATKA: I will continue to push them on that.

MR. NOTARI: Mention that there's council members talking about hiring a new firm.

MR. LOPATKA: I told them. I said I know they're not happy.

MR. SEMENZA: We wanted to start this in the spring initially.

MR. LOPATKA: Well, they were waiting on the police station. Once we purchased that they measured that. I will continue to stay on them. I'll contact the MEPs and make sure they're doing what they need to do.

Bill had wanted a map that showed -I actually just got this preliminary map.

It's for the survey for that piece of

property off of Milwaukee Avenue. Villa

Drive. I'll send Bill a PDF of it. There's
a cemetery in the middle of that property.

MR. FEBBO: Is this the potential access here to that property?

MR. LOPATKA: Potentially. It's a state road. On that corner might be a tough spot.

MR. NOTARI: I see this map and I see it on that program. Every time I drive there I think where is this space at.

MR. LOPATKA: I think he actually got mapping from Pagnotti. The mine maps. This map will be finalized within the next couple days. We had a hard time finding corners.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Dave? Thanks, Dave.

Marylynn, did you find out if we owned that road?

MS. BARTOLETTI: I'm not sure.

MR. SEMENZA: Everybody has Bill's report. Obviously Bill's not here. I'm going to ask if you have any questions on it?

MR. FEBBO: Can we discuss something? The Stocki property. We're in the middle of July and he's still bringing that material in there.

MR. SEMENZA: When is his hundred days up?

MR. FEBBO: He said by July there's supposed to be an auction.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I did speak to Bill today. He said when he's back in the office tomorrow -- he had a bit of an emergency. He had planned on contacting the judge and trying to rush, to change dates or whatever, ask the judge to either come back in and see the property again or handle it in a different way.

MR. FEBBO: Steve, do you want to tell them what you found over there?

MR. BIERYLA: Well, it's basically back to the same condition it was before the meeting with the judge. When the judge came he cleaned it up, kind of looked pristine.

Now he's back to cutting, not notifying anybody. Neighbors are complaining. So the judge needs to see what he is doing, because

the order was the 30 days, the biggest of the material that he couldn't get out he would -- or if he needed 40 days or whatever that he would be cutting. He's continuously cutting, he's continuously bringing in other material that he's cutting. He's not supposed to be bringing in any material to be cut up. He's supposed to be removing them and he's just not doing it.

MR. FEBBO: Also he has been taking in machinery that does run. I saw three or four pieces going in. My fear is that his lawyer is going to come back and say -- he's going to have these first two or three rows of running material and come back and say look, there's no junkyard. He cleaned the junkyard up. But sales and service, he wants to maintain that.

MR. SEMENZA: When was he supposed to have that auction?

MR. BIERYLA: Sometime in July.

There wasn't a date. Weather permitting.

MR. FEBBO: The weather is going to be very favorable.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?

MR. NOTARI: A little bit about that, I think we need to -- when Bill is available I think we need to have an executive meeting with him and try to figure out what kind of plan of attack we can have with that and what our options are, because the options we've used so far are not working. There has to be something else that we can do.

I realize it's in the judge's hands, but are we allowed to ask for a new judge?

I don't know what that law is. Are we going to offend people? We are. However, our residents are being offended. We have to figure something out.

So I'd like, Chairman, to schedule an executive with Bill just in regards to that. Even if it's just for 20 minutes.

MR. SEMENZA: Do you want to see when everybody can be available? Marylynn, do you want to call everybody tomorrow and see when they can be available?

MS. BARTOLETTI: We'll check if Bill is back in town and send a text to everybody.

MR. SEMENZA: There's only four of us here.

MR. NOTARI: Everybody should be involved. The other thing about Bill's report, he outlines some stuff about the school police issues. When we met -- just so Mr. Ferrett knows and it's on the record. MR. BIERYLA: I haven't had a complaint or a report from a police officer.

MR. JUROSKY: Can you tell us the history of the last three or four months of what you did?

Yeah. I sent him a MR. BIERYLA: couple letters, then Bill gave me the formal letter. He didn't appeal it. That date was two weeks ago. So the last meeting you were here at, if there was an issue I said please report it to the police so I'll have a complaint. Don't know if you did or you didn't. Seemed like you were kind of irritated when you walked out. But I haven't had any complaints. I drove up and down the street two or three different times over the past ten days. I mean, I'm not a babysitter to that street, but you are the residents on the street. If you have a complaint kindly call so they can take a complaint.

MR. JUROSKY: Can we contact you instead of the police?

MR. BIERYLA: If it's during the

day. But in the evening, no. Call the borough building.

MR. JUROSKY: Now, my next question, like, he has a car right now he's ready to roll down the hill that the wrecker dropped off on Friday. He's in a pissing match with us, which is fine. How about that second job the son was doing?

MR. BIERYLA: They're gone. They're out of the building.

MR. JUROSKY: The next question, how about the junkyard? He has eight junk cars parked on his lot. Isn't that a junkyard? Is that allowed? He has nine, ten junk cars with no tags on them, not inspected. A few's been there for two years, a few's been there for a year. Is that allowed? That's why I'm curious.

MR. SEMENZA: No, and here we go with the same thing that goes on, that we're talking about illegal junkyards, even though it's on a smaller scale.

MR. JUROSKY: It's a residential neighborhood.

MR. SEMENZA: The one thing I want

to ask you to do, if it is a parking violation or something like that don't contact Steve, contact the police, because Steve's going to come up there and call the cops anyway. You call him, too, but I'm saying just don't call him alone if you think it's a parking violation or something.

MR. JUROSKY: I really don't want to get the police. They have more important issues than for parking. Ron parks his vehicles on the wrong side of the road. He's right next to the stop sign. The reason I'm saying this, somebody's going to get hurt bad.

MR. NOTARI: If he's on the wrong side of the road and he's right next to a stop sign it is a police matter. That is the breaking of a state law. Steve can't do anything about a car parked next to a stop sign or a car parked on the wrong side of the road.

MR. JUROSKY: Steve told us we have to make a history so he can get more involved. I'm doing a history so we can get more involved. I'm not calling the cops

because the car is parked on the wrong side of the street.

My main concern is that car rolling down the hill with no brakes.

MR. SEMENZA: I agree.

MR. JUROSKY: And the junkyard. He has ten junk cars on his lot. He can use his lot as his business. God forbid he goes down the avenue with no brakes.

MR. SEMENZA: Chris?

MR. GOETZ: Not to beat a dead horse here, but I just want to follow up with what was talked about before with Stocki.

Obviously he's been given a hundred days from May 2nd, which was the day of the hearing, and it is in the hands of the judge, but I did see some equipment on a low boy going in there. I was there when the judge said he was not to do any of that. I don't know what went on with the meeting with Bill and what he was allowed to bring in or how many, but I do know I did see some pieces on low boys.

The smell is still -- the smell of petroleum will make your eyes burn. A day

like today with the wind we've had it's still there. I know you're doing all you can and I'm not here to complain. I'm just here to keep the torch burning, and I know that you are as well. We're not dealing with somebody that's willing to abide by the rules and the laws. I just wanted to get an update and I did get that earlier. Again, I know the judge -- what happens in however many days are left I don't know, but I certainly was in that courtroom the day he gave him the hundred days and I was afraid, and I wasn't even the defendant. We'll see what happens.

Second thing is just a suggestion.

I know I suggested this before, but I come to the meetings and you guys are talking about the road paving and all that stuff.

We're at the end of July, so I'm assuming that there's numbers and everybody has to go over them, and they're not out to bid. Is that correct? So now we're going to have to advertise, and when we go out to bid it's going to be the end of August and we have to approve it at a meeting. These guys are

loaded with work, so in order to get that job this year they're going to hit you with a high number.

Right now what should be happening in the borough, paving should be wrapping up. Okay? Right now you should be looking at next year's paving project and it should be going out to bid in January and February. I know I made this specific example a couple years ago about Scranton. In fact, Dave was the engineer on the project. It went out to bid in September on the project and the price came in pretty high, and they tabled the bids and they went out in January and they saved \$350,000.

So my suggestion is that in July we should be talking about how good the project is coming and how it's wrapping up and then starting to look at next year's roads, for no other reason than if you can save \$30,000 or \$40,000 that's four or five blocks in this borough of paving. So that's just a suggestion as a taxpayer with my experience in the paving world. I see a much better price in January and February and March than

 you do -- not only that, it goes out to bid, you get the contractor in here, number one, they come in September and October, school is in. If they pave from June to the end of July or beginning of August school's out.

No effect on buses.

So just to save a lot of money and help us out, get more bang for your buck.

Thank you.

MR. SEMENZA: Nobody else is on public comment. At this time I'm going to go down the table. Mayor?

MAYOR LEGG: I'd also like to congratulate Marylynn on the great job she did at the farmers' market. I also have to say Councilman Febbo's been saying for months that that would be a money maker and be the success it was. I got around to all the vendors and the comments were all positive. Great job. That's all.
