Tonight we have an ordinance for establishing the names and boundaries of certain streets in the borough of Old Forge, Lackawanna County, Pennsylvania, which the names of the streets are North Keyser Avenue. The direction of travel is north from the intersection of Keyser Avenue and Oak Street to the border of Old Forge and Taylor boroughs.

Two is South Keyser Avenue. The direction of travel is south from the intersection of Keyser Avenue and Oak Street to Franklin Street in the borough of Old Forge.

Three, the travel direction is south from the intersection of South Keyser Avenue and Franklin Street to Seaman Lane and Connell Street in the borough of Old Forge.

MR. NOTARI: Excellent. Thank you.

MR. SEMENZA: Public input? Roll call, please.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?

MR. FEBBO: Yes.

MR. PAPI: We had a couple blocked sewers this week. They were loaded with wipes. If there's any way we can educate the public to stop using these flushable wipes that aren't flushable. There had to be thousands of them inside the manhole on the end of Edith Street.

MR. SEMENZA: Didn't we at one point in time -- at the end of my street? Going which way?

MR. PAPI: To Lenape. The last two manholes. Between manholes six feet apart. In the middle it was blocked. It was full right to the top.

MR. SEMENZA: Where do we have children?

MR. PAPI: They're towels, cloth.

They don't melt. You can't break them.

MR. SEMENZA: Didn't we at one point in time send mail out?

MR. PAPI: We did that down at the bottom of Orchard Street. We've been doing pretty good down there since. We gave them letters. But how do you give the whole --

MR. HOOVER: You don't know where

one call system? They continually ask us for things. If doesn't reach everybody but it's a start. Maybe those are the people that are using these wipes, school-age parents. Just throwing that out there.

MR. SEMENZA: Let's start with printing it on the bill. Anything else, Paul?

MR. PAPI: No.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Paul?

MR. FEBBO: Paul, did you backtrack that from manhole to manhole to see where it's coming from?

MR. PAPI: It was a weird situation because there was two manholes and they were only 20 feet apart. When we broke the first one open it filled the second one and that one blocked. So we had to go to the third one way down Lenape Street.

MR. FEBBO: How about coming the other way?

MR. PAPI: You can't go backwards.

But we opened it up. It's all clean.

MR. FEBBO: Did you pull the lid off

to see if there's anything in the manhole?

MR. PAPI: There were three in a
row. Two were blocked. The first two. We got everything.

MR. FEBBO: I'm talking about to see if there's any wipes in the other ones.

MR. PAPI: No. The only time you'll find the wipes is if they're blocked.

ATTY. RINALDI: Under the ordinance you do have any substance that may cause obstructions of flow in the sewer or other interference, and it gives examples such as tissues, things like that. So you can reference that if you want.

MR. PAPI: The reason why Orchard Street is something to keep an eye on is because there's a pump station there. The last couple times the pump went down was because of these wipes. They get jammed in the motor, sometimes the motor burns out. It's like a thousand dollars.

ATTY. RINALDI: If you put them on notice under your code that these things cause that problem, then you can go back after it.

MR. PAPI: How do you find the culprit.

MR. NOTARI: But you can make it part of the announcement when it goes out with the sewer bills. It is part of the code.

MR. PAPI: You can say it's only going to cause the sewer bill to go up because of all the extra work to keep the lines open. Then they might think about not using them anymore.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have any questions for Paul? Thanks, Paul. Steve, zoning code enforcement? Everybody has Steve's report in their packet. Steve, anything to add?

MR. BIERYLA: No, other than getting inundated with high grass calls, garbage calls.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Steve? Steve, I see on your permits here, I was looking through them the other day and I see -- the only reason I'm going to ask this is because it was a topic at one point in time. 115 Apache Drive,

few things. I met Paul out on Grace Street to look at -- I guess the sewer was backing up on one property down at the intersection near the field.

MR. SEMENZA: Elio Ghigiarelli Drive. LLVSA manhole.

MR. LOPATKA: We didn't look in their manhole. We did afterwards. We looked in the one manhole the storm ties in from the parking lot. That pipe ties in there. In the manhole there is a pipe that runs through it that has the top cut off. It looks like storm water coming in there. It's probably backed up because the second time we went and looked we pulled the LLVSA manhole, and that goes from a big pipe that's dumping in storm water to the first manhole. The second manhole, it all goes to, like, an eight-inch pipe. So it backed up.

So in that second manhole there's a trough, and they actually have a baffle there, so when it overflows enough it blows the baffle. But that may be enough that it's backing up into that first house.

the trough, where the sewer is. We covered the top so it goes to a bigger pipe. But when we opened the manhole below the bigger pipe goes into an eight-inch pipe. So the real fix is to separate that storm line since there is a dedicated storm line.

MR. SEMENZA: We talked about this when it was coming through that property from behind Rinaldi's.

MR. LOPATKA: I believe our design at the time was to separate it at that intersection.

MR. PAPI: It would have cost more money.

MR. SEMENZA: Lot more.

MR. LOPATKA: The eight-inch pipe can't handle the volume of the sanitary. It's only about six houses, but when the storm is dumping in there I'm sure it can't handle it, that eight-inch pipe. It's coming out of a 24 inch.

MR. PAPI: We put a cover on it about four or five days ago, and with all the rain we had today she hasn't called me. Drake's Lane flooded.

MR. SEMENZA: There's no baffle in that.

MR. LOPATKA: The other item is

Apollo. I did go down there. They weren't

working. It was a day that was raining. I

had received a call from Pat, who is the

director of the housing authority. What I

asked him to send me was the original bid

and their change order to dig the whole

thing out and do it the right way. So he's

supposed to be sending me that.

I also talked to the engineer who is supposed to be sending me photographs of each section on what they're installing there. I did meet with them out there. They were only going to scrape the top off and try to pave over it, and I said that's not going to work. So they put a change order together, sent it to them. So I asked him to send me all the information on it.

MR. SEMENZA: Six inches of modified, four inches of pave?

MR. LOPATKA: The whole paving structure.

MR. SEMENZA: Will they send a

picture as they're laying it so we know it's four inches and they're not just saying it's four inches?

MR. LOPATKA: That's what they're supposed to be sending me. If it came down to it, we can have them core it if we have to.

MR. HOOVER: If it's not there don't take the streets over.

MR. SEMENZA: All right. Anything else, Dave?

MR. FEBBO: I have a question.

Angela Drive, we spoke about that at our
last meeting and at our work session, about
a catch basin and new pipe across the road.

MR. LOPATKA: I think you were going to bring it up here on the agenda.

MR. FEBBO: I'd like to have him go up there and look at the intersection between Angela Drive. There's a tremendous amount of water coming down there that the homemade basin and pipe going across can't handle it.

That being said, I know it's not our road, but the first thing we have to do is

take care of the problem.

The other thing is, moving forward, see if we can get that road ordained so we can get the same services. There are nine houses up there and a lot of runoff.

MR. SEMENZA: Why was that road never ordained, Marylynn?

ATTY. RINALDI: That was laid out way back in the fifties, maybe.

MR. SEMENZA: It's owned by Ciuccio.

ATTY. RINALDI: He bought it in a tax sale from Iacovazzi. Iacovazzi had it laid out, sold the lots around that and left those pieces there for his streets.

MR. SEMENZA: It's still owned by the developer --

ATTY. RINALDI: He picked them up in the tax sale.

MR. SEMENZA: Pittston Avenue is not owned by us either?

ATTY. RINALDI: There's two or three. I remember from the map it was all strips.

MR. SEMENZA: So what do we do to get these streets ordained?

MR. LOPATKA: I know the police station was kind of a late add. I'll make sure they get moving on it.

MR. SEMENZA: We were in limbo for a while. Anything else?

MR. LOPATKA: No.

MR. FERRETT: What about Wood

Street? Did you get anything about the swale or about the water coming across the road? The engineer was supposed to call you whether they were going to do the work.

MR. SEMENZA: We talked about putting that rock swale in along Wood Street.

MR. LOPATKA: I actually met them down there one day when it was raining and I showed them what the issue was, and actually the contractor was supposed to get me a price. This was about a week and a half ago. The contractor is Leeward. Champion Builders is the overall GM but I think it was Leeward.

MR. SEMENZA: We spoke with him from Leeward?

MR. LOPATKA: He's supposed to get

me a price, and then he was going to bring it back to Pride because I actually met their -- Bobby Aulisio. He is supposed to go back to his people.

MR. SEMENZA: It can't cost them that much.

MR. LOPATKA: I said it's a simple fix. They're supposed to get me a price.

I'll check tomorrow.

MR. FERRETT: That's a no-brainer for them. They have a place to put the water and everything.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?
Thanks, Dave. Bill, solicitor's report,
please.

ATTY. RINALDI: You passed the Keyser Avenue ordinance. I did a draft ordinance for the alternates, whenever you're ready to do those. I don't have anything other than what's in my report, unless somebody has a question.

MR. FEBBO: Bill, Stocki, did we get a date for that auction?

ATTY. RINALDI: Not yet. He's supposed to notify the judge with the date.

He's probably waiting for the ground to dry.

That's the biggest issue. As soon as it

heats up they're going to contact the judge.

The judge is going to send me the order.

MR. FEBBO: How about, Steve, did you get a report that he's hauling a lot of equipment in there? Wasn't there a certain amount, limited, that he can take in?

MR. BIERYLA: I didn't see anything.

ATTY. RINALDI: That's supposed to be part of that order, too. The week before the auction --

MR. FEBBO: He's been moving equipment in there.

MR. HOOVER: He was supposed to bring eight machines in, seven or eight machines for the auction only.

MR. FEBBO: It will be 80 by the time he's done. We need to have a count on that. Go up there and see what he has taken and what he's going to take in.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else? Do we have any names for the alternates, Marylynn?

MS. BARTOLETTI: One. We did advertise in the paper. Only one responded.

MR. SEMENZA: Marylynn, borough manager's report, please.

MS. BARTOLETTI: This is going to go partially with what Rick had asked before about the transfers. So the transfers so far have been made from the sewer department of 500,000, and if you look at the balance sheet you'll see that there's a new line. Line 1032, the ASL account. In there is 700,000. That's what's been transferred out so far. Do you have any questions?

MR. NOTARI: Marylynn, does that mean you took 200,000 from 1031 and put it into 1032?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Seven hundred thousand came out of 1031 and is now in 1032. What you see right there is exactly how it is now.

MR. NOTARI: So the 500 from the sewer account is -- you put it into 1031 and then took that and the 200,000 from the ASL.

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, it has nothing to do with -- it's completely separated.

It's going to be on -- if you go to Lucille's report that she gives you, where

she has the balances she added a line that says PLIGIT. That is actually up to 500 now from where the 200 is. So the checking account is different, the savings account is different. So the next meeting it will be a little clearer because it's still kind of new, but it gives you an idea of where things are at.

MR. NOTARI: Thanks.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Any other questions on any of the profit and loss or balance sheet or any of that kind of stuff?

Just a couple other little things. We received two PEMA reimbursements so far. The first one is for \$9,720, the second one is \$5,107.

Just so you guys know, we had been invited to meet on Kohler Avenue with some of the representatives of the county because the project is completed. So I was there along with the engineer representative and the people from CDBG, and everyone was happy with the outcome of the road and that's considered complete now.

July 1st the camp opens up at Miles

Street park, and July 11th the farmer's market opens.

Just one other thing. We received a letter from Lackawanna County tax claim. I sent it to Bill so he can take a look at it before you guys had to make any decisions. It's Bernie McGurl from the Lackawanna River Corridor Association looking to buy a small piece of property along Howard Street. Their bid is one dollar. So once we're able to take a look at it you'll be able to give me more information on that.

MR. SEMENZA: I met with Joe
Holland. I stopped on my lunch break --

ATTY. RINALDI: It was owned by -- I don't have the map -- a Joseph Minn.

MR. SEMENZA: It's like a triangle, almost. About four acres?

ATTY. RINALDI: It says 5.3. I think it's down somewhere between where the bridge is and the bank there. I don't have it on the tax map, so I can't tell you exactly.

MR. SEMENZA: There's another sliver they own that runs out to the railroad

tracks. Eventually they want to try to hit the Heritage Trail, from what I understand. They want to, like, if they clean up the river, beach there down by the river, scenic area, walk, whatever. It's nice. I think he's going to call you, Marylynn, for our work session give us a little presentation on it. Anything else?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Marylynn?

MR. NOTARI: The PEMA reimbursement, is that from a certain incident or --

MS. BARTOLETTI: That's from the flooding that took place last August, and in the past meetings I have been giving you guys some information about the several meetings with PEMA and FEMA and Paul. We've been trying to get all this put together. So far we have PEMA, but we have not received a FEMA reimbursement.

MR. NOTARI: Any money coming in is good. Thanks for the work.

The farmers' market, has Aging called you at all?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No.

MR. NOTARI: They have mentioned to me that through their senior citizens voucher program they will be having someone come down to give out vouchers. They're working on a date still. But they were excited that we're doing something. I'll make sure they get in touch with you. That's all.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?
Thanks, Marylynn. At this time, Mayor, do
you have anything?

MAYOR LEGG: I have nothing.

MR. SEMENZA: At this time we'll go into public comment. Michael?

MR. HODANICH: I'm just here seeking approval for the Hillcrest subdivision.

MR. SEMENZA: That is on our new business. When it comes to new business I'll call you.

Bill?

MR. NOCERA: Bill Nocera. The alleyway between 406 and 408 Center Street, the last four or five years it's eroding really bad where the street, every time it

rains -- this morning was a great example -the whole road gets covered with gravel on
both sides of the road. Two or three houses
that live on that alley, that is their only
access in and out, so it is traveled. I do
have pictures that I can present.

I don't know if there's money in the budget or a paving plan to get it paved. If not paved, to get it tarred and stoned, if possible. But every time it rains the whole street gets -- I mean, I have to sweep it.

MR. HOOVER: Is this Kennedy Street?

MR. NOCERA: Center Street between

406, my house, and 408 Center Street.

MR. NOTARI: How far back does it go?

MR. NOCERA: It goes to where Pride is. Probably about 70 yards, hundred yards. It comes out to Wood Street. From where the alley is to the road it's dropped down probably about nine, ten inches. I'm putting stone and rocks in there. It just became a mess. The last three years every time it rains more than 20 minutes the whole road gets covered with sand. It was done

probably 20 years ago. 1 MR. LETTIERI: It was paved? 2 MR. NOCERA: Crushed stone and they 3 tarred it. 4 MR. SEMENZA: Who did that, the 5 borough? 6 MR. NOCERA: The borough did, yeah. 7 8 Maybe 25 years ago. MR. SEMENZA: Joe, do you know where 9 this street is? 10 MR FERRETT: Yeah. Do you want to 11 take a look at it? 12 MR. SEMENZA: We'll take a look at 13 Take Dave. We'll have Joe go up and 14 it. 15 I'll meet you up there one day. MR. HOOVER: I'll go up with you. 16 17 MR. SEMENZA: Thank you. Andrew Pisko? 18 MR. PISKO: I own a business on Oak 19 Street, state inspection. I'm trying to 20 find out about the towing rotation -- and I 21 understand with Jason being out. Is there 22 an ordinance or just kind of the same two 23 companies grandfathered in forever? 24 MR. SEMENZA: They weren't 25

grandfathered forever.

MR. PISKO: Every borough is different. Like, some companies get exclusive --

MR. SEMENZA: To be honest with you I'm going to refer to our solicitor or borough manager for that answer. How do they get paid. That's a police thing.

MS. BARTOLETTI: What happens is, right now there are two. They switch off certain days if there happens to be towing work for that day. I did get to speak to the chief because he was here earlier, and he said what he looks for is a secured facility that has cameras and a place to secure vehicles that's locked up.

MR. PISKO: The fence is going up this weekend. I have paperwork with me. I have the cameras.

MS. BARTOLETTI: What he had said was he would like to talk to you and go over everything.

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$  PISKO: By the end of the month the fence will be up.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Once you meet with

Jason and he goes over everything, makes sure the way that it's supposed to be -- obviously you know what that is -- then we would be able to work with him to try to -- right now there's only two and they have certain days. You can get added into that. I'm sure he'll come up with a specific way.

As far as the rates and everything I really don't know because there's nothing that comes through us. It's either through an insurance company or through a person being towed away.

MR. PISKO: With the impound, if you had a DUI and I impound it, \$125, and then the person obviously got a DUI. They're going to be calling down here saying this guy's charging me \$125 to get my car back. You weren't aware of that. I'm familiar with it.

MR. FEBBO: Where is your location?

MR. PISKO: I'm right on Oak Street.

MR. SEMENZA: Are you on your own there? Is that your business?

MR. PISKO: I have a business partner.

MR. SEMENZA: You don't want to reveal your business partner's name?

MR. PISKO: You know him.

MS. BARTOLETTI: We haven't had to make a decision like this.

MR. PISKO: He told me go by the police scanner, start showing up at accidents. I won't mention any names, but there's a certain older gentleman that's been doing it forever. I tried speaking with him face to face, man to man. It was more of -- it felt like an entitlement.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I have your number and everything, I have your e-mail. As soon as we're able to figure it out I will get back to you. I'll talk to the chief as well.

MR. SEMENZA: Did we talk about this in January? Did we have -- I was mistaken then that it was a year contract with them?

MS. BARTOLETTI: You don't have contracts with anyone.

MR. SEMENZA: Why did I think we went year to year with them?

MR. PISKO: So they can just charge

whatever they want?

MR. SEMENZA: I believe there's rates, isn't there? We'll look into it.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I don't know that anything actually --

MR. SEMENZA: Is written in stone?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

MR. PISKO: Thank you very much.

MR. SEMENZA: Matthew Kukla?

MR. KUKLA: I don't know if I'm on the agenda.

MR. SEMENZA: You're on the agenda.

MR. LESCHINSKI: Happy Father's Day, everyone. MR. SEMENZA: Destroyed totally?

MR. PAPI: Shattered.

MR. SEMENZA: Can we get rid of it?

At this time the chair is going to go down
the table, see if anybody has anything to

MAYOR LEGG: Nothing.

MR. FEBBO: I'm good.

MR. NOTARI: No, I have nothing.

MR. LETTIERI: The only thing, like I brought up in executive, with that baseball field, with the dugout thing. I know it's a borough field and I know the school uses it, and they're going back and forth who does it. But I'm getting a lot of complaints from people to fix the dugout and they don't know where to go. If they come to us, if they go to the school, since the school uses that field. But it is a borough field. Correct?

MR. SEMENZA: Correct.

MS. BARTOLETTI: The school took down the roof on the dugout because they started to cave in. When the school took them down they said they would replace them, since we do allow them to use them.
