MR. SEMENZA: Yes. At this time the chair is going to go to our department heads. Everybody has Paul Papi's report in their packet. Paul, anything to add?

MR. PAPI: No. We're just about all caught up on leaves and grass, so we'll be back on regular schedule this week.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Paul?

MR. NOTARI: Paul, will there be like a drop dead date for leaves?

MR. PAPI: No. It's weather related. Usually by December 1st everything is frozen in the can and they damage the cans trying to bang it out.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else?

Thank's, Paul. Steve Bieryla, zoning/code enforcement officer. Anything to add to your report?

MR. BIERYLA: Yes, I do. I apologize for not being at the last meeting. I know there were people here and you needed questions answered. One, Angeli's property has been posted as condemned. Bill advised me to do that so he could take action however he has to take action.

Two, Perone's hearing was continued for the garage roof.

Three, Scott, we had the hearing for Scott up on Wyalusing. He filed an appeal with the Lackawanna County courts. Prior to me going on vacation, because the date was changed because of elections, I filed with the magistrate for Mr. Coles. So we're waiting to get a date for it. I think they were the items that were up in question that nobody was here to answer, so I figured I'd let you know.

MR. SEMENZA: Everybody has Steve's report.

MR. NOTARI: Steve, what exactly did

you file against Mr. Coles?

MR. BIERYLA: Right-of-way parking.

MR. HOOVER: Can you do the same thing on the one on Oak Street? You got four cars parked alongside Oak and Albion.
One car says '17, two cars say '18, inspection stickers. I don't know the name of the garage on the corner of Oak and Albion.

MR. BIERYLA: Where the transmission place used to be.

MR. HOOVER: There's truck parks across the street. It gets very busy there. Check those, please.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else? Thanks, Steve. Dave, engineer's report. Do you have anything?

MR. LOPATKA: I don't other than we did get the bids. I'm just trying to compile bids for the police station. You guys know. I'm just trying to compile a breakdown of where each of the numbers came in. So I'll be getting that to Marylynn shortly.

MR. SEMENZA: Can we have them

anything else.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Bill? Thanks, Bill. At this time I'm going to go into public comment.

John Haluska?

MR. HALUSKA: I want to thank council for the opportunity to speak tonight on behalf of our veterans group in Old Forge. We're a little disappointed on council. You guys had a meeting here and you voted to take all the banners down, to my understanding.

MR. SEMENZA: That's not true, but go on.

MR. HALUSKA: Well, we're here tonight to voice our opinion on the banners in Old Forge. As a group we want to continue the banners and only take down the ones that interfere with the Christmas decorations. The reason for that is the cost factor involved with the borough putting in the correct position that they are now, and there's 18 or 20 banners that haven't even been put up yet.

The program ended officially in

October. I think it's been a big success.

It's been a plug for Old Forge to honor the veterans, who a group of us are here tonight.

Going forward, I don't know if the program will be continued. I think that's a fact that maybe we can discuss at future borough meetings, how to take it forward. Dickson City has a program where they take theirs all down and the borough puts them up back up. They're put in the exact location where they're taken down. Other boroughs it's up to the discretion of council.

Olyphant takes them down just where the decorations are in the way, so to speak.

I would just appreciate if council would consider the fact of what's involved in that. You have over 300 banners. If you take them all down for 80 or 90 Christmas decorations it doesn't make sense.

MR. SEMENZA: There's quite a few more than 80 or 90 decorations. But with all due respect, I'd like to thank all the veterans in here. No disrespect to any veterans in our decision when we said we'd

like to take them all down. One of our reasons was preserving over the winter months. Like Councilman Febbo stated, some of the ties are snapping off. They're brittle.

Another reason we discussed was, for instance, my grandfather's up on the pole.

If his was taken down and Mr. Lettieri's grandfather's wasn't, well, why was mine taken down. I just don't want to disrespect anybody in any way. So I thought of it as one or none.

Another reason is, from my understanding some of the brackets that are used on the veterans banners are ones that hold our Christmas banners --

MR. HALUSKA: They're mostly on Main Street.

MR. SEMENZA: Right. I'm glad you are here tonight. This is a great forum to speak about this. I'm glad we're face to face talking about this and we'll get settled tonight what's going to be done. I mean, ultimately you guys did all the work putting it together and getting them up. I

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don't think anybody at this table wants to disrespect anybody.

MR. HALUSKA: As an example, if you misplace one banner, trust me, you'll get a phone call.

MR. FEBBO: We do already.

MR. HALUSKA: I'm just trying to get a good feel for the best way to do it. If you take them all down it's going to take five to six working days with a lift truck.

MR. FEBBO: Mr. O'Hern, we've had several discussions. As of last night did we not come up with a tentative solution?

MR. O'HERN: It was a tentative solution. Our problem was when we took them down last year, the first year, we decided to take them down. When this thing was initiated the council was good enough to say we'll give you the guys, the borough trucks to put them up. We had no intentions of taking them down. They were going to stay They were still on Main Street. up. they would have had to take those down to put your Christmas decorations up. That is correct. That would have happened. We just

decided to take them down, and at that time
I'm going to say there was, like, 185
banners. That took a couple days. Then we
hauled them all the way upstairs. I'm old.
I just look good. It was a task between the
guys that can do it.

The problem I foresaw -- what I didn't foresee was it was only supposed to be open for those six months. Those 185 banners should have been all there ever was, but people called, can you put this up. All the sudden last year we get 140 more, and now I have 28 sitting in my car that never got up that you're going to get 28 phone calls how come my banner isn't up. I took pictures of every one of them so I could send to guys, they're made. I didn't go to Bermuda on your money. But 330 or 340 banners, that's a task.

When I talked to Mr. Febbo last night, he recommended maybe he can give us a place in the basement if the borough guys take them down and lay them in there, and we talked Mr. Gatto about maybe sending some kids down to wrap these 340 banners. But

there's a lot of work involved. It's not you just take them down. You just can't put them up. I got four phone calls from a lady because we missed her husband by a pole. Your borough guy went up, pulled it down, put the guy's there. But it's your guys that are doing the work. You're taking time from whatever else they do. I didn't expect it to be as big a project as it is. It's an enormous project for the DPW.

It's just that we can't do it. With the help from the school can we do it? Of course. Mr. Gatto said a lot of the clubs would be more than willing to help. It's a lot of time.

MR. SEMENZA: Definitely takes a couple days. I spoke with Brian Rubel. He said it would probably take the better part of two days to do it all. If it takes four days, five days, like I said before, we don't want to hurt anybody's feelings, disrespect any veterans. That's why we're talking about taking one or all down. I feel if you guys want them all down we'll do it. If you guys want to take the ones for

Christmas lights, do it.

MR. O'HERN: We thought leave them up except for the ones for the Christmas and they can call me. These things were only supposed to go up for two years.

MR. SEMENZA: Have you had any negative feedback on taking some down, they'd be a little upset?

MR. O'HERN: No, we didn't have any complaints on that. I think it would be easier for us if we just did the ones -- easier for the borough, easier on your workers if we just took the ones and left them up. We put it in the paper we have to take these down. We're using your brackets to put these folks up.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else on council have any input on this?

MR. FEBBO: The only concern we had here was the amount of phone calls the girls get in the office. Anything that happens in the borough they think it's we doing it. I picked up three in last week myself.

MR. LETTIERI: We're just saying because there is also calls, like, certain

people saying I don't want my guy to be down, my grandfather to be taken down. I feel like that's how everybody's going to feel about it. Like I said, we can direct the calls to you guys. Everybody's thinking it's our decision. It's not our decision, it's your decision. We had an opinion but we didn't make a decision.

MR. HOOVER: We thought we were preserving them for a longer period of time. That's what we thought was the right move.

MR. NOTARI: We didn't want to offend anybody either.

MR. FEBBO: We were willing to do whatever we could do.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?

MR. CIUFERRI: Rich Ciuferri, 514

Moosic Road. I have two banners up, and I heard they were taking them all down. So yesterday I took a ride through Moosic,

Duryea, Avoca and Dupont, and what they did was put the lights on the inside, towards the road, and left the banners alone. Now you're not offending anybody.

MR. SEMENZA: Some of the brackets

for our Christmas decorations are utilized by your banners.

MR. CIUFERRI: Do you have to put those up? Just let the banners on the outside, put the lights up. Those Christmas things don't light up.

MR. SEMENZA: But the borough spent a lot of money, taxpayer dollars.

MR. CIUFERRI: In two more years you put them back up.

MR. SEMENZA: I don't have a problem doing it the way you guys suggested. I wasn't worried about our DPW work force putting the time in to do it. If anybody doesn't have an objection to --

MR. FEBBO: Last night when we were discussing this I called Marylynn directly to see if we had room in the basement to store them. She said that's not a problem. Don't worry about the up and down storage.

MR. SEMENZA: You can make sure that happens. Right, Paul? When they take them down.

MR. PAPI: I never did that before. Brian knows the system.

MR. SEMENZA: Brian Rubel. Paul when do we plan on putting the Christmas lights up?

MR. PAPI: I think Thursday and Friday.

MR. SEMENZA: Are you available Thursday and Friday?

MR. O'HERN: I'll make myself available. He'll call me when they take them down. The question is how many.

MR. NOTARI: I have a few questions.

I feel like we have different opinions here
from different people of what exactly they
want to be done.

MR. O'HERN: What the committee said as we sat down, there's about eight or ten of us. Our consensus was just take the ones down that the Christmas decorations interfere with, leave the rest up. Explain it to the people in the paper.

MR. FEBBO: When do we take the Christmas decorations down?

MR. NOTARI: Depending on the weather.

MR. SEMENZA: Paul, how many

and not offending anybody in the group. I think a lot of us were thinking the same thing. But I'm glad you guys came and gave us your thoughts.

MR. SEMENZA: Rich?

MR. CIUFERRI: I want to commend
Steve Bieryla. Next to my grandmother's
house this guy thought it was a junkyard.
Of course, my grandmother's dead, my one
cousin lives in Chicago, and it was
ridiculous. So I got a hold of Steve -- and
this guy had a hard head. He didn't want to
move anything. We had to go to court. I
talked to Steve many times. I saw him on
the road one day and I stopped him, I talked
to him. But honest to God, he did a great
job.

Then the guy put some of the stuff in front of his house, which is more ridiculous. So he did a great job.

MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Steve.

MS. HALUSKA: I have been attending the committee meetings, being a secretary, but I have to tell you that these guys have worked so hard with these banners. Not only

my husband but Rich Melucci, John, Mike.
Ricky takes time off from work to go and hang banners with his own truck. Sometimes they get a lift truck. These guys have been faithfully doing it. I want to commend them. This has been a two-year project for them. And thanks to council for their support in getting this thing started and the DPW men. The mayor has been at every single meeting.

MR. CIUFERRI: One more thing. I don't think too many people really know what Richie Melucci does. My father-in-law's banner was bent, the tie was off. He went there put and put a tie on, now it's nice and straight. He does that a lot.

MR. SEMENZA: Like I said, if nobody has any objection of doing at the request of the veterans, you guys do what you have to do. Let the guys know that whatever they swap out to make sure you call John.

Thanks, guys. Angelo?

MR. NICOLETTO: Angelo Nicoletto.

I'd like to just address council. I'm kind

of representing my son. He lives at 507

VonBergen Street. Just recently, around Halloween, on the side of my son's house they just paved an alley. I believe Pennsy Supply did the job. That alley was presenting problems right along. Pennsy Supply come in, they paved the alley. I just can't believe -- I've been doing this work 45 years. I just can't believe, how big Pennsy Supply is, they didn't take no elevation shots in that alley or anything. They come in there slam, bam, thank you, ma'am, they paved that alley. Now there's going to be a water problem there because there always was a water problem.

MR. SEMENZA: Angelo, once again, the alley is between VonBergen and what?

MR. NICOLETTO: Go out to Philips and comes through VonBergen.

MR. PAPI: Parallel with Sibley Avenue.

MR. HOOVER: Between McClure and Dunn.

MR. NICOLETTO: Another thing, if I can address Mr. Ferrett.

MR. SEMENZA: Mr. Ferrett's not

here.

MR. NICOLETTO: Bob, I know we forget about a lot of things, but one thing I didn't forget is last August, 2018, we had six inches of rain. Everything was flooded. From Taylor right down through. That alley, me, my son and Corey from across the street built a hundred foot trench in that alley out to VonBergen to alleviate the water so he won't get water in his yard and basement.

Right now I'm a little skeptical and I'm a little afraid of that alley now.

Believe me when I tell you, Bob, something has to be done there. I know everybody wants to see the borough beautification and everything and I'm a hundred percent for that, but if the alley's not put in right it's not a good thing. I just can't understand why there was no site shots taken or elevations because when they paved that alley -- I was there on a Monday at 2:30, everybody was gone. I had my laser in the truck. That alley's as flat as a pancake.

Another thing, the people that live on West McClure Street, the back of their

homes run to this alley. Now, I was always taught everybody's responsible for their own water, pets, kids, their garbage, the whole nine yards. Where does all that water run? It runs down this alley. Where is it going to go?

MR. SEMENZA: Do they have leaders running right out into the alley?

MR. NICOLETTO: They're all facing the alley. They have their driveways there. Where my son's house is, all the way up to Philips Street there's no garages, no aprons, nothing. I would suggest a curb all the way through that alley, all the way up that way, because in the back of my son's property there's a so-called right-of-way there or something.

MR. PAPI: It's land left over by the developer.

MR. SEMENZA: That alley's land left over by the developer?

MR. PAPI: No.

MR. LOPATKA: It's a paper street.

It's perpendicular to the alley and goes

down to Sibley.

MR. PAPI: It cuts the block in half and goes all the way down to Dunn Avenue.

You'd have to dig a trench all the way down to Dunn, then turn right and go all the way to the development and then hook up into a storm.

MR. SEMENZA: Dave, that alley there were no site shots, no elevation shots?

MR. LOPATKA: We were out there and there were a couple discussions with how we can potentially handle it because there was a low spot in the middle of the alley. You can't get the water out of there without -- we talked about putting a tank or something in there. That was, I guess, not decided as to how we were going to finalize it.

MR. SEMENZA: Was this alley requested to be paved?

MR. LOPATKA: It was on Joe's list.

MR. NOTARI: We talked about this concern when the alley was on the list.

MR. HOOVER: Before it was done.

MR. SEMENZA: Did any residents

request this alley to be paved?

MR. NOTARI: I believe there was a

resident that requested it.

MR. NICOLETTO: Another thing, that underground tank, they call that a bladder system. Joe Ferrett was out there, he talked to my son. He told my son and Bobby about catch basins or bladder system. My son told me about it. I said that's good. I hope they do it right. Let's get it done once and for all.

It's a can of worms right now, as far as I'm concerned. Every time it rains hard, that six inches of rain, I get a little nervous about it. We don't want any water problems there. I got a lot of money tied up in this kid's house and a lot of work I did in that house. I mean a lot of money. I don't want any problems. I feel somebody dropped the ball a little bit.

MR. SEMENZA: Dave, could you go up there at your earliest convenience?

MR. LOPATKA: I'll get out there tomorrow.

MR. SEMENZA: Rectify this problem.

MR. LOPATKA: I will. I'll get out tomorrow and get back to you guys.

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MR. SEMENZA: Angelo, we'll do what we could.

MR. NICOLETTO: Two years ago they paved VonBergen Street. They put curbs on each side all the way down. They ran the curb right across that alley. That day we had the six inches of rain I had to chop out six inches of that curb and we trenched a hundred feet to get that water out of there.

MR. SEMENZA: Pennsy, they're not contracted to make decisions like that. They're told to go pave the road.

MR. PAPI: We don't have any storm drains up in that.

MR. SEMENZA: We'll have Dave go up. Anybody else from the audience?

ATTY. FRED RINALDI: Mr. Semenza. I'm here on behalf of George Dunbar. I was wondering if council considered anything on the Act 70 land. I know I've been here a few times. What's the borough's position?

MR. SEMENZA: Our Project 70 land off of Drake's Lane and Milwaukee Avenue, in that area? Did we ever get that surveyed or anything like that?

ATTY. RINALDI: Yes.

MR. SEMENZA: Did we get an estimate on what the property's worth?

ATTY. RINALDI: I didn't order one.

I was waiting to see what council wanted to
do.

MR. SEMENZA: Could you order an appraisal on the property? I mean, I don't know if anybody's willing to make a decision on anything until we get the appraisal, Fred.

ATTY. FRED RINALDI: He just wanted to inquire if there was any decision by council, if they wanted to move forward. He's willing to go the extra steps if necessary, but if council decides they don't want to move forward he just moves to a different project.

MR. FEBBO: I think we discussed getting it appraised and then deciding where we're to go with it.

MR. SEMENZA: Right. Does everybody want to get it appraised?

MR. HOOVER: I think we have to.

MR. SEMENZA: Bill, order an

to get to his property.

MR. FEBBO: Can you talk to George and see if he'll do something about the dust?

ATTY. FRED RINALDI: Yes.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else? The chair is going to go down the table, see if anybody has anything to address.

MAYOR LEGG: I have nothing.

MR. FEBBO: Yes, but I'll refer to Mr. Notari to bring it up.

MR. NOTARI: After walking through the building yesterday, the rectory, we had discussed putting heat in there at our work session. We walked through yesterday, a couple of us, and I'd like to know where we stand on that. I think we should move forward and put heat in that building and start making it our own. I think that's the first step.

MR. FEBBO: I agree with him. We own the building. I don't want to see it go through another winter. We did get a price of putting heat in there for \$8,500.

MR. SEMENZA: I think before you put

heat in you have to replace the roof and windows and insulate it. I think you're wasting money putting heat in a building that's not insulated, and the windows are old windows. The roof is not in the best shape. I just think that you're wasting taxpayer dollars.

MR. HOOVER: The third floor, the heat's going to go right to the roof. That third floor, the ceilings are a mess. It's cracked, all the laths that are there. I just think it's going to be a significant amount of money to pay the heating bill for the winter in that building right now the way it stands. It's sitting, right now, for three years -- six years?

MR. LOPATKA: I think six years.

MR. HOOVER: I can't understand what one more winter is going to do until we get in there and decide what we're actually going to do with the building. We can probably fix the third floor first. That has to be done first before you put the heat in because that heat's just going to go right through the building and it's going to

make a huge heating bill.

MR. FEBBO: That would have to be up to our engineer to decide where we start with it. Bottom line is we own the building. Let's not do nothing with it.

MR. HOOVER: I agree with you a hundred percent, but I don't agree -- I don't think we should rush into \$8,500. It's going to cost us \$20,000 or \$30,000 to get that stuff out of the ceiling of the third floor before we do anything. Plus there's asbestos in there. We have to watch what we do. We just can't go in a building and put heat in a building when there's asbestos in the basement and things like that that we have to get rid of first. He can't put a boiler in with the asbestos in the basement. You have to get rid of all that first.

MR. FEBBO: That's not true. Did you say, Dave, when we were there yesterday if you don't touch it it stays?

MR. LOPATKA: At some point if you're going to demo it or run something new, then you have to remove it.

MR. FEBBO: The same system that's in there now. Same heating system, radiators and pipe.

MR. LOPATKA: Right. If you don't disturb it you can kind of leave it, but at some point it has to be removed.

MR. FEBBO: Again, you're looking at long-term projects. You're not talking about something overnight, taking it over tomorrow or doing something tomorrow, but we need a starting point for that whole project. Our committee here or this whole council has been sandbagging that for the last two years. I believe everybody knows that the purpose -- my purpose, anyway, is to convert that whole project into a community center development, and unfortunately I'm fighting a losing battle here. No matter what we come up with it's not good enough.

That being said, if we don't do something with it we lose our potential to buy the church and you're losing a community center. We don't have a community center. We could never afford a community center.

We don't have the money to buy one. That fits the perfect need for our community, in my opinion. Strictly my opinion. But unless the rest of council gets on board with it it's going nowhere. It will revert back to the diocese and the parish, at which point it will be put up for sale. Then you'll have an empty spot in Old Forge again or you'll have God knows what on Main Street again.

So do we want to compromise the integrity of Main Street more than it already has been? That's up to council.

I'm one man and that's my opinion.

MR. NOTARI: So is it the majority decision to not move forward?

MR. LETTIERI: I kind of agree with Chairman Semenza, that you basically need some more upgrades before we start. Like he's saying, the roof, the windows. I mean, there's a lot of upgrades that I think we can push forward before we do the heating thing.

MR. NOTARI: Are we willing to start that process?

MR. HOOVER: The building is ours. They're not getting the building back. The building is ours. So another three months, four months isn't going to hurt us, but rushing to put a heating system in there and pay whatever the heating bill is going to be, \$400, \$500, \$600 --

MR. FEBBO: Okay, I'll agree with you on that point, but we've owned the building since the spring and we've done nothing --

MR. HOOVER: And all the sudden now you want to put \$8,500 in it.

MR. SEMENZA: When we bought the building we said we're not going to make any harsh -- you know, they were your words, Councilman Febbo.

MR. FEBBO: Other than put heat in it.

MR. HOOVER: We never said we were going to put heat in it.

MR. SEMENZA: That was day-one I said about the heat, you're wasting money putting heat in. You don't have insulated walls. The heat's going to go right out.

The place is a mess. The third floor is a mess. I know you're saying it's the attic, but still you have to do something with it.

MR. FEBBO: I just wish the rest of the public would get the opportunity to take a walk in there, see --

MR. SEMENZA: You can take anybody through it you want.

MR. FEBBO: The place is there for 108 years. They had heat in there all that while and the same system. It didn't break the church. I don't know how much it's going to break us. We're not going to keep the heat on 70 or 80. You're looking at minimal amount or heat in there.

MR. SEMENZA: But if nothing is going on in there you're wasting money. The place sat idle for six years with no heat, no nothing in there. Until we come to a decision in the next couple months I don't see us wasting money on a furnace to put in there.

MR. FEBBO: Well, let's sit down here and decide what our starting point is going to be.

MR. SEMENZA: We have an itemized cost estimate on the upgrade the rectory needs. Correct? So we can sit down and pinpoint where we want to start and where we want to finish, in my opinion. But I don't think we should just go jump in and put a furnace in when we need windows, we need a lot of stuff. There's a couple windows in there that are good, but them oversized windows are not. They're single pane.

They're old windows. The reason why they weren't changed is because they're definitely a special order and definitely a very expensive window.

MR. FEBBO: They can be modified.

So do we leave it up to our engineer to go
in there and --

MR. SEMENZA: He has a cost estimate on it already. You should have it.

MR. FEBBO: I do, but I also had somebody else take a look at it and that's 140-some thousand over what his projection is.

MR. NOTARI: He was \$140,000 under.

MR. FEBBO: He was \$140,000 over.

MR. LOPATKA: You have to put something together and actually get bid prices from contractor so that you can compare apples to apples.

MR. FEBBO: So that being said, can't we move forward with him taking a look at it, the engineer, and determine what the first steps should be --

MR. SEMENZA: Sure.

MR. FEBBO: -- to preserve the integrity of the building?

MR. LOPATKA: Before we get too far, I think there needs to be some kind of consensus with council and how we want to go about the whole process because it's not our decision to make. You guys need to make the decision as to what you want to actually do with the building. It needs a kitchen.

MR. HOOVER: We still don't know that. We don't know what we're going to do with the building.

MR. LOPATKA: So there's a lot of things that you guys need to relay to us.

MR. FEBBO: That brings us to another point, then, the use of the building. I brought it up many times that I'd like to see the historical society in there. They can't operate out of the basement of this building forever. That's what they're doing right now. What better organization or what better building can you get. It's like a match. Put them on the second floor.

That being said, let them come in, let's ask them what they need.

MR. SEMENZA: I disagree with you 100 percent because, like I said before, there's many non-profit organizations in this borough. You can't just say let them do it. That's not fair to anybody else.

MR. NOTARI: So why don't we invite them all in? What committee should do that?

MR. SEMENZA: What committee is taking care of it?

MR. NOTARI: Long range planning. Right?

MR. SEMENZA: Call the committee.

MR. FEBBO: What difference does it

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point, the roof down?

MR. FEBBO:

MR. LOPATKA: If you're going to put heat in it I think you want to do a roof, you want to do that upper level, insulate it, do your windows, then you put the heat in it.

To heat it right now, looking at what we looked at the other day, it doesn't look like that not being heated for over six years, it's not creating an issue for you. It's not deteriorating the building. structure of the building is perfectly fine. There's hardly any cracks in the walls.

So I think you want to start up there and do your windows, do your insulation before you start heating the building. I think at the same time once you do those items, then you want to make sure it's heated. Right now the water's shut There's a lot of other things you need off. I don't think the heating of it to do. creates the issue.

MR. NOTARI: Since I brought this up, if I may, can I ask that the long range

planning committee meet and come up with a plan for that building for the new year?

MR. SEMENZA: Absolutely.

MR. NOTARI: For the beginning of January. That way we can put this to bed tonight and have a plan for us to look at and study and go forward with in January. They don't have to decide on their own. If they have any questions for any of us, any of our ideas, we can give them input.

MR. FEBBO: Russell's the chairman of it, myself and Joe Ferrett. I don't know whether Mr. Ferrett wants to partake in any of it.

MR. SEMENZA: That's fine.

Absolutely can do that and come to council with your findings. Anything else?

MR. NOTARI: No, that's it.

MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Lettieri?

MR. LETTIERI: I'm fine.

MR. HOOVER: I'm good.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm good.

MR. SEMENZA: I had nothing myself.

Actually, the chair is going to entertain a

motion to advertise for bids for a roof,

windows, insulation. Dave, any other suggestions of what we may need for a heating system in there? To not waste money is basically what I'm looking for.

MR. LOPATKA: You're talking about putting a heating system in?

MR. SEMENZA: Heating that building. But we need roof, windows, insulate the building.

MR. LOPATKA: I'll get our mechanical, our electrical and plumbing guys to make a recommendation as to the type of heat and how to heat the building.

MR. SEMENZA: At that point we'll advertise bids. Bill, is that okay?

ATTY. RINALDI: That's okay.

MR. FEBBO: Before the motion, you're going to tell us what it is, where we are, what we're going to need there?

MR. LOPATKA: Yes.

ATTY. RINALDI: So it's not going to be bids, it's going to be estimates?
