3 MR. SEMENZA: Just a reminder to
4 everyone, tonight's virtual meeting is being
5 recorded. Everything that's viewed and said
6 will be placed in a public record. This
7 meeting will be available on the Old Forge

9 call, please, Marylynn.

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
11 Avvisato?

12 MS. AVVISATO: Here.

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?

14 MR. FEBBO: Present.

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

16 MR. HOOVER: Here.

17 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
18 Lettieri?

19 MR. LETTIERI: Present.

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?

21 MR. NOTARI: Present.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Virtually
24 present.

25 MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Semenza?

1 MR. SEMENZA: Here. Before we get
2 started here I'm going to ask for a motion
3 to pass a resolution providing to conduct
4 meetings, proceedings and other business
5 during the state of emergency due to the
6 Covid-19 pandemic, and repealing resolution
7 No. 4 of 2020 previously adopted.

8 MR. NOTARI: Mr. Chairman, I'll make
9 that motion.

10 MR. SEMENZA: By Councilman Notari.
11 Can I have a second?

12 MS. AVVISATO: I'll second it.

13 MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by
14 Councilwoman Avvisato. On the question?
15 Public input? Roll call, please.

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
17 Avvisato?

18 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?

20 MR. FEBBO: Yes.

2 everybody turn down all background noise.

7 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman

11 made a comment like that?

12 ATTY. RINALDI: If he's going to
13 make inappropriate comments, yes. Just
14 block his comments.

15 MR. NOTARI: I don't think I can
16 block his. I can block him from the
17 meeting.

18 ATTY. RINALDI: Can you send him a
19 message saying you're blocked, if you have a
20 question e-mail it to Marylynn?

21 MR. SEMENZA: If he tries to get
22 back in, let him in and I'll address it when
23 he comes back in.

24 The next motion is a motion to
25 approve sewer department financial reports.

1 MR. FEBBO: I'll make that motion.

2 MR. SEMENZA: By Councilman Febbo.

3 MR. LETTIERI: I'll second it.

4 MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by Councilman
5 Lettieri. On the question? Public input?
6 Roll call, please.

7 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
8 Avvisato?

9 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

9 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?

10 MR. FEBBO: Yes.

11 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

12 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
14 Lettieri?

15 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?

17 MR. NOTARI: Yes.

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes.

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Semenza?

21 MR. SEMENZA: Yes. At this time the
22 chair is going to go to our department
23 heads. Everybody has Paul Papi's zoning
24 report in their packets. Does anybody have
25 any questions for Paul? I mean, it was a

1 slow month. There wasn't much there.

2 Anybody have any questions for Paul?

3 MR. NOTARI: No.

4 MS. AVVISATO: No, I don't have any.

5 MR. SEMENZA: Paul, do you have
6 anything to add to your report?

7 MR. PAPI: I have a transient
8 license application in Marylynn's hand that
9 council has to vote on for the Varsity
10 Center. That's all I have for council.

11 MR. SEMENZA: Thank you, Paul.
12 Nothing has changed down there with that
13 transient license. They're there every
14 year. We know this. Everything's good to
15 go with them?

16 MR. PAPI: Yes.

17 MR. SEMENZA: Thank you, Paul. Next
18 up is our street commissioner, Joe Lencieski.
19 Everybody has Joe's report in their packets.
20 Joe, do you have anything to add to your
21 report?

22 MR. LENCESKI: No, I don't.

23 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any
24 questions for Joe?

25 MS. AVVISATO: No, I don't have any.

1 MR. SEMENZA: Lot of good feedback,
2 Joe. I'm pleased with the job you're doing.
3 I think everybody is. Keep up the good
4 work.

5 MR. FEBBO: I like your format here.
6 It lays everything out in detail.

7 MR. SEMENZA: Okay. Next up is
8 Chief Dubernas. Everybody has the chief's
9 report in their packet. Chief, do you have
10 anything to add to your report? Does
11 anybody have any questions for the chief?

12 CHIEF DUBERNAS: The only thing, the
13 last meeting we had was the issues going on
14 with the guns. I have some more
15 information. After doing all the
16 calculations, we're going to return the guns
17 and everything and it's going to cost the
18 borough maybe around a thousand dollars,
19 maybe a little bit more.

20 MR. FEBBO: That's a complete
21 switch, Chief?

22 CHIEF DUBERNAS: That's a complete
23 switch with everything. Correct, Mr. Febbo.

24 MR. FEBBO: Good job.

25 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have any

1 questions for Chief Dubernas?

2 MR. LETTIERI: Chief, I'm looking at
3 your report, and I haven't seen it on your
4 report before about the meth and heroin
5 arrests. There was 22 since February. Is
6 that becoming a problem? Are we seeing a
7 rise in that?

8 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Well, it was a real
9 problem. There wouldn't be a week that
10 would go by that we didn't deal with a half
11 a dozen people, but with the pandemic going
12 on it slowed down extremely. Like, we have
13 hardly any contact with anybody that's been
14 on it. So we don't if they're just staying
15 in and using it and not running around the
16 streets or what. We had the naked guy last
17 week, but that wasn't nothing to do with
18 drugs. That was all alcohol based. So I'm
19 not sure what's going to go. Is there going
20 to be a mass explosion once everything is
21 lifted or what.

22 MR. LETTIERI: Is it a concern to us
23 as a borough? Do you think this is going to
24 be a problem?

25 CHIEF DUBERNAS: I don't know.

1 We're very active with it, with us and the
2 county task force. I think we were doing a
3 pretty good job getting ahead of it, and
4 then all the sudden everything else shut
5 down. So I'm not sure if they're just
6 laying low and listening to the governor and
7 the staying at home order or they moved on
8 because they seen that we were pro-active
9 for the month of February and half of March.
10 But I don't have any answer for that.

11 MR. LETTIERI: Thank's, Chief.

12 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else? Thanks,
13 Chief. Dave Lopatka, Ruether-Bowen.
14 Everybody has Dave's report. Dave, do you
15 have anything to add to your report before
16 we get started?

17 MR. LOPATKA: I don't have anything
18 to add unless you guys have questions.

19 MR. SEMENZA: Okay, I do have a
20 couple. The borough building, we're moving
21 forward. Right? Nothing holding us back on
22 that?

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: In your packet, if
24 you see there's a proposal from the DMG,
25 Design Management Group, which is to do the

1 mechanical, electrical and plumbing for our
2 new project. Dave may be able to put some
3 insight on that report.

4 MR. LOPATKA: Basically that's just
5 their proposal to move forward with their
6 final design for the borough building
7 project. I just wanted you guys to sign off
8 on it prior to me signing and getting it off
9 to them.

10 MR. SEMENZA: Bill, did you read
11 through this yet?

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: Bill probably
13 hasn't seen it yet.

14 MR. SEMENZA: Dave, everything is
15 good?

16 MR. LOPATKA: Yeah. Based off of
17 the sheet they're providing. We've already
18 done some work. They have some work already
19 done. So what they have is in order.

20 MR. SEMENZA: So this will keep us
21 moving forward? We have no holdups
22 otherwise, anything?

23 MR. LOPATKA: No. I actually have a
24 preliminary set of drawings I got late today
25 that I'll forward on to Marylynn and on to

1 you, Bob. That's for the architectural
2 portion, which they typically need to do
3 first anyway. So if you guys are good with
4 DMG's report I can get that forwarded on to
5 them and get them going on the MEP.

6 MR. SEMENZA: Okay, sounds good.
7 Thank you, Dave. Anybody have any questions
8 for Dave on his report?

9 MR. FEBBO: No. I just want to say
10 this. Dave, I want to compliment you. I'm
11 going back to your report, here. It's a
12 real pleasure to be able to read something
13 in detail and know what's going on
14 throughout the borough and what you're doing
15 as opposed to going to a meeting and not
16 knowing what's happening.

17 MR. LOPATKA: I'll forward that
18 every month now.

19 MR. FEBBO: I appreciate that.
20 That's very professional and very detailed.
21 Thank you.

22 MR. LOPATKA: Just before I finish I
23 just want to go over just a couple things
24 with regard to this MS4 information. They
25 had forwarded a bunch of information to

1 Marylynn, and I'm going to have to come down
2 and probably sit down with Marylynn. We
3 need to get a good portion of what I have
4 for you, Bob, onto your website. That's one
5 of the MS4. I also put together a public
6 education and outreach program in addition
7 to a public involvement program and
8 participation program. Those are some of
9 the requirements of the MS4.

10 In addition, as part of that also
11 we'll have to start to put in once a year a
12 storm water meeting we have to have, and I'm
13 thinking June or July we can probably have
14 that one. It's once a year, just the
15 updated storm water information, if they
16 have any questions, any comments that we can
17 include in our annual report for next year.

18 MR. SEMENZA: So when do you want to
19 have that set for?

20 MR. LOPATKA: Either June or July.
21 We just have to document it. It has to be
22 advertised and we have to have an agenda and
23 we have to have a sign-in sheet.

24 MR. FEBBO: This will bring us up to
25 date on everything?

1 MR. LOPATKA: Well, we're working on
2 the PRP plan, which there's a lot of
3 information we have to provide them on that.
4 But we're still on schedule to get that
5 taken care of.

6 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have any
7 questions for Dave? Thanks, Dave.

8 Bill. Everybody has Bill's report
9 in their packet. Bill, do you have anything
10 to add?

11 ATTY. RINALDI: If anybody has any
12 questions, we're just approving the MOU
13 requirement, guns only, for the police
14 department. As Marylynn and the chief said,
15 we're replacing their guns. The ordinances
16 that were advertised for passed in March.
17 We're going to re-advertise those for
18 passage next month.

19 Of course, all the hearings are
20 postponed in the courthouse until now,
21 extended until the end of April. That is
22 unless anybody has any questions.

23 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any
24 questions for attorney Rinaldi?

25 MR. FEBBO: Bill, couple questions.

1 The Project 70 land, I see -- Mr. Chairman,
2 do we have any indication as to where we go
3 with this next?

4 MR. SEMENZA: I didn't hear what you
5 said.

6 MR. FEBBO: That project 70 land, we
7 got the \$384,000. Did we determine as to
8 what our next step is with that other than
9 knowing the value of it?

10 MR. SEMENZA: The land between Villa
11 Drive and Connell Street. I haven't talked
12 about that in a while. Bill, what would be
13 the steps that would be taken to --

14 ATTY. RINALDI: If the borough
15 wanted to sell it, it would be done at a
16 public sale and the proceeds would be used
17 for other recreational projects in the
18 borough. But before we can go forward with
19 that we have to put together what our
20 proposal is, send it to the legislature for
21 their approval. They have to approve it
22 because it's Project 70. Only the state
23 legislature in Harrisburg can remove that
24 Project 70 designation and allow us to sell
25 it. The last two times we did it we went

1 through DCED, and it took anywhere from nine
2 months to a little over nine months to get
3 the legislature to act on it. So that's
4 something we can put forward.

5 What I would need is just to say
6 what we're going to do with the proceeds of
7 the property and what the minimum bid we'd
8 accept would be.

9 MR. SEMENZA: It has to be used for
10 recreation. Correct?

11 ATTY. RINALDI: Yes. The last one
12 we sold was small, and the money was used
13 for, I believe, the park up by the school
14 district.

15 MR. SEMENZA: Right.

16 MR. FEBBO: What about if the
17 long-range planning committee gets together
18 and comes up with some suggestions for it
19 and then gets back to council and see where
20 we go from there?

21 MR. SEMENZA: Okay.

22 MR. NOTARI: I don't have a problem
23 with that, but I think our recreation board
24 should meet as well.

25 MR. FEBBO: That's the borough

1 recreation board?

2 MR. NOTARI: Yes, or our rec
3 committee.

4 MR. SEMENZA: The rec committee.
5 That's what I was assuming you were talking
6 about.

7 MR. FEBBO: This teleconference
8 meeting that's been on here, can we get
9 something done with that, Bill? We got a
10 resolution, but since we're already hooked
11 up here with iPads and all that, does that
12 equate to being viable and acceptable?

13 ATTY. RINALDI: Well, the one we're
14 under right now is under the Pennsylvania
15 Emergency Planning Act, so it's good for so
16 long as Governor Wolf -- and actually the
17 legislation is only good for the Covid-19
18 epidemic. So if we wanted to do something
19 else we would go back to what is already
20 there under the borough code and council
21 would have to determine what the parameters
22 are.

23 In other words, if somebody were
24 sick, if they're going to allow it. Same
25 thing we discussed before. I still have a

1 draft of it. I can recirculate that to
2 everybody.

3 But what we're under today is only
4 good for the declaration of the emergency
5 under Covid-19. After that we can't do it.

6 MR. FEBBO: I see Pittston Avenue,
7 Angela Drive. Bobby, you and Jimmy were
8 supposed to talk to Mr. Ciuccio about that.
9 Any progress with that?

10 MR. SEMENZA: I spoke with Lou
11 Ciuccio a few months back. He told me he
12 was going to get back to me and I've yet to
13 talk to him. I'll reach out to him. I'm
14 going to write it down right now, reach out
15 to him again.

16 MR. FEBBO: Okay. Bill, Fred
17 street. I see where Dave is doing a study
18 on that. The only reason I'm asking is that
19 there's something that's been on here for
20 five years, since I've been on council, that
21 we just haven't acted on it. If we get some
22 of the things on Bill's report --

23 ATTY. RINALDI: So Fred Street is
24 money that we've been holding under our -- I
25 believe it's the road budget because we were

1 awarded \$30,000 probably 15 years ago to
2 complete that development. I know Dave had
3 done the last proposal on what needed to be
4 done there to do that project. And that was
5 probably a year ago that Dave did it,
6 because part of it is, I think, fill, sewer,
7 utility, and then paving the road.

8 MR. FEBBO: So there's really
9 nothing pressing that makes us have to get
10 this done now?

11 ATTY. RINALDI: There was somebody
12 that wanted to build there, but that fell
13 through, I believe. So that was what was
14 pressing two years ago.

15 MR. FEBBO: I guess you'll just keep
16 that on your report until we deal with it.
17 All right. That's all for Bill. Thank you.

18 MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Councilman
19 Febbo. Anybody else have any questions for
20 solicitor Rinaldi? Thanks, Bill.

21 Marylynn, borough manager's report.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Okay. Everyone has
23 my financial report. Does anyone have any
24 questions?

25 MR. SEMENZA: I do not.

1 MS. AVVISATO: No.

2 MR. NOTARI: No.

3 MS. BARTOLETTI: Also, you saw the
4 additional invoices that were sent out
5 today. Correct?

6 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

7 MR. NOTARI: Yes.

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: The only thing that
9 I do want to discuss was the recycling
10 options that were put in your packet for
11 today. If you'd rather have a chance to
12 read them or would you like to discuss them?

13 MR. SEMENZA: I think they're kind
14 of self-explanatory, but if anybody has any
15 questions feel free.

16 MR. NOTARI: I'm good.

17 MS. AVVISATO: I'm good with it.

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: The only other
19 thing is just take note of the report for
20 the sewer invoices.

21 MR. NOTARI: Good work, Mare.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: That's it. That's
23 all I have for tonight.

24 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any
25 questions for Marylynn?

1 MR. HOOVER: Marylynn, this All
2 American Rooter, all those invoices, are
3 they for any of these water projects that I
4 was doing?

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: Not that I know of,
6 but I can go over them with you tomorrow, if
7 you'd like, to be sure before I pay them.

8 MR. HOOVER: I would like to go
9 through them because if they're on a project
10 I did -- I'm doing a lot in town. I just
11 want to make sure that we're not paying a
12 bill that should be ours.

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: Absolutely.

14 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have any
15 questions for Marylynn?

16 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I have no
17 questions. The only thing is I can't find
18 the recycling stuff in my packet.

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: It's in the one
20 from today.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I see it.
22 Okay.

23 MR. FEBBO: Are we going to go with
24 Duryea and that group?

25 MR. SEMENZA: That looks like it's

1 the cheapest, Councilman Febbo.

2 MR. FEBBO: Is that accepted? Do we
3 have to vote on it?

4 MR. SEMENZA: We'll have to vote on
5 that. I'll put that in new business.

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: I think it's the
7 best option for us right now.

8 MR. FEBBO: Absolutely. Ironically
9 enough, I haven't gotten a call on that
10 now -- I got two calls about picking up
11 grass and so on.

12 MR. NOTARI: Seems to be the hot
13 topic.

14 MR. SEMENZA: Okay. Moving forward,
15 Marylynn, public comments, do you want to
16 read what you have and we can address it.

17 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. So it's from
18 Steven Glynn, who says "we are at a
19 statewide stay at home order, essential
20 travel only by order of the governor. Why
21 are we told we must go out and buy garbage
22 stickers, which are often sold out at
23 multiple locations, just to have the garbage
24 dumped in our town"? And the rest I'm not
25 going to read because I don't think it's

1 suitable for this meeting.

2 MR. SEMENZA: I'd like you to e-mail
3 that, Marylynn, that thing.

4 MS. BARTOLETTI: A portion of it I
5 already answered just to let him know that
6 where the stickers are available and that
7 garbage was not dumped in Old Forge, but
8 anything else that you would like to add
9 would be great.

10 MR. SEMENZA: Rick, I believe I saw
11 a Glynn light come on. If you want to
12 unmute him and we can address that.

13 MR. NOTARI: He has to -- they have
14 to unmute themselves.

15 MR. SEMENZA: Steve, do you want to
16 unmute? Can you hear me? Maybe they don't
17 want to. But there is no shortage of
18 stickers. The borough --

19 MR. GLYNN: I'm here. I can hear
20 you. There absolutely is. Ace Hardware was
21 sold out last week and Turkey Hill was sold
22 out as well. Why am I driving to two
23 different locations to find a garbage
24 sticker?

25 MR. SEMENZA: Steve, it's not -- the

1 borough doesn't own these places. They come
2 and buy them off us. We don't have a
3 shortage. They might not come in to buy
4 them off us. I don't know the reason. I'm
5 not there.

6 MR. GLYNN: Again, that's not my
7 problem. That sounds like your fault.

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: The stickers are at
9 the (unintelligible) right now except Turkey
10 Hill and --

11 MR. SEMENZA: I never have a problem
12 getting stickers. So there is Turkey Hill,
13 they don't have them. Ace Hardware has
14 them, Gerrity's Supermarket has them, Ari's
15 has them.

16 MS. AVVISATO: Convenient has them.

17 MR. SEMENZA: You know --

18 MR. GLYNN: And I shouldn't have to
19 drive with the stay at home order. The
20 state liquor store has a drop off and pick
21 up. Go to the grocery store and they can
22 pick up items at the curb. How come I can't
23 go to the borough building and get garbage
24 stickers? How come I have to go to
25 multiple, different locations?

1 MR. SEMENZA: I understand what
2 you're saying, but the borough still does
3 not pay for the removal of garbage. We
4 still have to pay our garbage company.

5 MR. GLYNN: You understanding what
6 I'm saying and you doing something about it
7 are two very different things. I'm a
8 taxpayer in this town and I wake up every
9 single day and I see the garbage dump, and
10 you're saying I understand what you're
11 saying but I can't see what you're doing.
12 But you're right. You can't know what Ace
13 Hardware, Turkey Hill and Gerrity's are
14 doing. You can sell them at the borough
15 building, you can pass them out, or you can
16 front the bill for us.

17 MR. SEMENZA: Which we did for the
18 past three weeks for two bags of garbage for
19 people that couldn't get out.

20 MR. GLYNN: And the CDC changed
21 their guidelines and the governor changed
22 his order, so how come after three weeks you
23 decided you have done enough when the
24 governor nor the CDC has changed their
25 guidelines. As far as I'm concerned we are

1 still under the same order we've been for
2 the last two weeks. That hasn't changed.

3 MR. SEMENZA: I understand, but
4 stores are still open, grocery stores are
5 still open, mini-marts are still open. It's
6 a stay at home order but you can go to a
7 store and pick up groceries and so on and so
8 forth. Essential stuff. Garbage is
9 essential.

10 MR. GLYNN: But we are told not to
11 do so unless we absolutely need to. So I
12 could not leave to go to do that unless I
13 absolutely need to do it. So you can front
14 the bill for this. We're all taxpayers of
15 this town. If I don't need groceries I
16 shouldn't have to go to a grocery store just
17 to get my garbage stickers.

18 MR. SEMENZA: What I do is when I
19 need groceries I pick up garbage stickers.
20 It's a suggestion.

21 MR. GLYNN: I don't need groceries
22 because I'm under a stay at home order. But
23 we still need our garbage removed and we're
24 taxpayers in this town. We shouldn't have
25 to go out to stores, let alone two to three

1 different stores, to try and locate these
2 things. I shouldn't have to interact with
3 12 different people to get my garbage
4 removed. You are the council of this town.

5 MR. SEMENZA: Absolutely, I agree.

6 MS. BARTOLETTI: Can I just add
7 something? Anyone who has been calling the
8 borough building about concerns about going
9 out, what we've been telling people is
10 anyone could send a check to the borough
11 building and we'll mail stickers right to
12 their house, or we have a large mailbox
13 outside. They can drop a check in there
14 with an address on an envelope and we will
15 drop off or mail it right to their home.

16 MR. GLYNN: Fantastic. I'm so happy
17 to hear that someone within the government
18 in our town is working to solve this issue.
19 Thanks so much for offering that. I really
20 appreciate that someone is doing something.

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bob, I'm not
22 sure if this would work, but during a time
23 like this -- this might sound funny, but if
24 there was some type of vending machine that
25 we could load garbage stickers into. Put

1 the money in, there's a lot of those vending
2 machines that spin around and drop stuff
3 out. What if we set something up like that?
4 If we had a vending machine on borough
5 property they can walk up to, put \$2 in, hit
6 the button, wait two seconds, it spins down
7 and drops. I know something like that might
8 be good during this, and we can get a
9 vending machine within two days, if that.

10 MR. FEBBO: You still have to come
11 out to go to the vending machine. I think
12 Marylynn's suggestion that they go to the
13 borough building -- or mail it in, rather,
14 they don't have to leave their house. Give
15 it to the mailman, then she'll send it back
16 to the house without anybody coming or going
17 out of their homes.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Well, I
19 understand that, and that's probably the
20 most safest way and I'm fine with that. I
21 was saying just for the people who are out
22 of their homes or they do decide to --
23 because we can't tell people to stay home or
24 not. That's up to them.

25 MR. GLYNN: They don't have to

1 interact with any other people if they're
2 going to a vending machine. Having to go
3 into a store, having to walk into Gerrity's,
4 go through, interact with people, then go up
5 to a customer service representative is much
6 different than walking to a vending machine.
7 I agree, purchasing out of a mailbox or
8 getting something mailed to us is
9 significantly better than having to walk
10 into a store.

11 MR. FEBBO: Steve, you're okay
12 with --

13 MR. GLYNN: Yeah, I'm happy. I
14 think that's the solution.

15 MR. FEBBO: I think so myself. I
16 think council may agree with that. The
17 simplest way to go about it. Mr. Chairman,
18 I think that's the way we should go.

19 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have anything
20 to add on that?

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm good.

22 MR. SEMENZA: Okay. Marylynn, is
23 there any other public comment?

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: No, that's all.

25 MR. SEMENZA: Okay.

1 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: One quick
2 question. How do we sell the garbage
3 stickers? Do they come in rolls?

4 MS. BARTOLETTI: They're rolls of
5 1,000.

6 MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: So 2,000 a
7 roll?

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: They're \$2,000 a
9 roll. Under normal circumstances, when the
10 borough building is not closed down, we sell
11 them to people who come here. Under the
12 circumstances now they'll have to stay
13 outside and just kind of slip them to them
14 through the door or else doing it through
15 the mail, like I said before, which is
16 working very well.

17 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: All right,
18 thank you.

19 MR. SEMENZA: Okay. I'm going to go
20 down the table, see if any council members
21 have anything to address. Councilwoman
22 Avvisato?

23 MS. AVVISATO: No, I have nothing at
24 this time. Thank you.

25 MR. FEBBO: No, I'm good.

1 MR. HOOVER: Two things. I'd like
2 to have -- did you go over and look at those
3 steps on South Main Street?

4 MR. SEMENZA: Yeah, I drove by.
5 They're almost in the road. Paul, on North
6 Main Street, the steps falling into the road
7 there. Do you know where we're talking
8 about?

9 MR. PAPI: Yes. It looks like
10 somebody worked on it over the weekend.
11 They put two new cones there and they cut
12 the railing off.

13 MR. SEMENZA: So it is a work in
14 progress, you think?

15 MR. PAPI: Yeah. I remember talking
16 to Steve about it and he said the contractor
17 was going to do it after the winter was
18 over. I can stop and see him about it and
19 I'll let you know.

20 MR. SEMENZA: Yes, stop and see him
21 about it. That's in a bad spot there.
22 Jimmy, anything else?

23 MR. HOOVER: 504 VonBergen, take a
24 peek at that guy's back yard up there. It
25 is a disaster.

1 MR. PAPI: I'll write it down.

2 MR. HOOVER: That's all.

3 MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Jimmy.

4 Councilman Lettieri?

5 MR. LETTIERI: Two things. Are we
6 moving forward with the position of the DPW
7 with full time? I know we briefly spoke
8 about the job a while back. Are we going to
9 start an interview process and move forward
10 with that?

11 MR. SEMENZA: Marylynn, did you
12 reach out to the applicants we have and see
13 if they can virtually meet?

14 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

15 MR. SEMENZA: If they have the
16 capability of virtually meeting and we'll go
17 from that point on. What else?

18 MR. LETTIERI: Then with the rec
19 meeting, we were talking about the selling
20 of that property that we own, recreational,
21 like Lou was saying, to get that in motion,
22 how soon can we get that moving?

23 MR. SEMENZA: The rec board meeting?

24 MR. LETTIERI: Rick suggested we
25 speak at the rec meeting, which I agree.

1 MR. SEMENZA: Well, before we --
2 Bill, correct me if I'm wrong, but before we
3 could talk about selling we have to put it
4 in a motion to go to congress, Bill, for the
5 okay to sell it?

6 ATTY. RINALDI: Part of the
7 legislation is we have to tell them what
8 we're going to do with the proceeds. How
9 we're going to use that in compliance with
10 the act. So that usually goes right in the
11 legislation I send them for passage. It
12 tells them the price we're going to sell it
13 for.

14 The last time we knew the exact
15 price. I could probably do a not below a
16 certain price, a minimum price. If you give
17 me that information I can put that in. Then
18 it would be just an auction that the borough
19 would conduct.

20 MR. SEMENZA: So does that have to
21 go to the table, Bill?

22 ATTY. RINALDI: Why don't you come
23 up with all the parameters on minimum price
24 in your committee meetings and what you want
25 to do with the proceeds. Then I can draft

1 something and you can approve that for
2 submission to the legislature.

3 MR. SEMENZA: Will do. The chair
4 for those two committees, get together with
5 your committees and get some information and
6 then we'll meet in the future. Anything
7 else, Councilman Lettieri?

8 MR. LETTIERI: That's all, Chairman.
9 Thank you.

10 MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Notari?

11 MR. NOTARI: I have a couple things.
12 Let's start with I have a few residents in
13 the Shawnee Hills area, Seneca Drive, Tioga
14 Court, looking for Children at Play signs.
15 There's a lot of young kids in that
16 neighborhood. Of course, with the pandemic
17 going on they're out and about riding
18 bicycles and playing in the street. They're
19 looking for some help with trying to slow
20 some drivers down. I wondered how we go
21 about that and, if we can, two signs placed
22 in different spots.

23 MR. SEMENZA: Joe, do we have any
24 Children at Play signs? I know you just
25 generated a list.

1 MR. LENCESKI: We do. We can put
2 them up.

3 MR. SEMENZA: Why don't you call
4 Rick, why don't you get with Marylynn and
5 let her know where the people want them. I
6 don't know if Jason should be involved in
7 this, but whoever needs to be, then send Joe
8 to do the job.

9 MR. LENCESKI: Will do.

10 MR. NOTARI: I'm guessing that the
11 park's maintenance have not been working.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: Correct.

13 MR. NOTARI: A couple weeks ago I
14 was over walking at the Marion Street park
15 and had a few concerns. There's dog waste
16 all over the place. I was hoping that maybe
17 we can get some of those recyclable -- I
18 don't know if they're recyclable containers
19 but waste containers like we have near Miles
20 Street and maybe put up at the park. Maybe
21 DPW can even do that if we have them.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Sure, absolutely.

23 MR. SEMENZA: Joe, do you want to
24 step in on this?

25 MR. LENCESKI: Yes. Paul and I did

1 I believe it was last Wednesday or Thursday,
2 and there's about five receptacle cans there
3 for garbage.

4 MR. NOTARI: Well, thank you, then.
5 I'm sure we can't -- it's not like we can
6 spy on everybody that's over there, but I'd
7 appreciate that.

8 The other thing, Paul, you had told
9 me the Sussex Avenue problem, the camper
10 parked at the Maxson lot.

11 MR. PAPI: Yes, Rick. We ran the
12 plates and it's legal. What he was really
13 upset about was the tarp that had holes and
14 it was flapping. So I contacted the owner
15 and he came right over and took the tarp
16 down. But it's a legal vehicle parked
17 legally. There's nothing we can do about
18 it. It's not in that bad of shape. It
19 looks pretty good, actually.

20 MR. NOTARI: Have you reached out to
21 the resident that was -- okay.

22 MR. PAPI: Yes. I spoke with him
23 twice. He was happy that we got the tarp
24 removed, at least.

25 MR. NOTARI: Thank you. I

1 appreciate that.

2 MR. PAPI: Sure thing.

3 MR. NOTARI: Lastly, I've have
4 people inquire how to go about and get a
5 parade, Chief Dubernas, for their child's
6 birthday. Should they just call the
7 non-emergency number?

8 CHIEF DUBERNAS: No. We probably
9 did over 30 of them so far. Either they
10 message us on our Facebook page, the Old
11 Forge Police, or they're reaching out to
12 Captain Murkowski from the ladder company.
13 I just want to let you know if you're going
14 to do it during the week we can get more
15 cars involved. The sheriff's department had
16 the whole group of people that are doing it.
17 The weekends it's just pretty much us. So
18 if you know anybody that's interested let us
19 know, but during the week we can get more
20 cars involved.

21 MR. NOTARI: Thank you, Chief.
22 Mr. Chairman, that's all I have tonight.

23 MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Councilman
24 Notari. Councilman Rinaldi?

25 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: No, I'm good.

1 MR. SEMENZA: Okay. Before we go
2 into new business I have a couple of things.
3 Bill, I want to talk about towing in the
4 borough of Old Forge. We talked about this
5 sometime back. We have to come up with --
6 what do we have to come up with to put this
7 in order?

8 ATTY. RINALDI: So there's a couple
9 of them that I've looked at, but I did look
10 at Scranton's because you did send me
11 Scranton's. Scranton has an ordinance and
12 then a terms and conditions contract sets
13 the parameters. If somebody wants to tow
14 they have to do it under the terms that the
15 borough sets. In other words, what
16 insurance they have to have, how much they
17 can charge people, how they can do
18 increases, that they can assign it. That's
19 one way of doing it. I did see a couple
20 others.

21 Then they do a rotating list of
22 anybody that wants to be involved in it.
23 That's the rotation.

24 I also got a copy of Glen Alden,
25 Pa.'s ordinance, and they don't dictate so

1 much. They just say what they have to do in
2 terms of stowing, towing, et cetera. But
3 there's no rotation schedule in there. It's
4 more just to regulate towers in that city.

5 So depending on how the borough
6 wants to go about it, there's different ways
7 to do it. Reading did an RFP for towers to
8 do it that way. Scranton did it by setting
9 the parameters, then anybody who would sign
10 up and follow those parameters was allowed
11 to tow in the city. So there's different
12 ways to do it. It depends on how council
13 wants to do it.

14 MR. SEMENZA: What do you think the
15 best way to do it is, Bill?

16 ATTY. RINALDI: The simplest might
17 be just to do it the way the city did it.
18 You can pick out, try and set the fees or
19 have them come to -- since there's only
20 three towers we have in the borough, maybe
21 somebody can meet with them and come up with
22 a coordinated effort on the fees. Then you
23 can just limit -- set what kind of insurance
24 you want them to have and they indemnify the
25 borough and that would be it. Then as long

1 as they want to participate in the program
2 and abide by those terms they can be on a
3 list that would be placed on the rotation.

4 MR. SEMENZA: Bill, let me ask you a
5 question. Are the fee schedules around the
6 area pretty much all around the same?

7 ATTY. RINALDI: So far the only one
8 I found was Scranton's that had a fee
9 schedule posted, and there was one for --
10 well, Reading's a pretty huge city. They
11 were anywhere from service calls -- they put
12 down service calls, illegal parking, \$65.
13 Open locked vehicle, \$13. Drop off and hook
14 up, \$15. Dolly tows, \$56. They had a day
15 and a night charge on that. Rollbacks,
16 \$125. So they look like they're pretty much
17 similar in terms of what people charge.

18 I think Scranton has -- compared to
19 Reading, Scranton's fees are -- first of
20 all, they pay the city of Scranton \$20,000
21 to be able to tow in the city of Scranton.
22 So I don't know if that's something that
23 they want to do. Then they have, like,
24 \$25 -- \$150 per towing, \$25 increase every
25 three years, \$50 winching, \$65 per extra

1 man. The criteria seems to change.

2 But the way Scranton is, you had to
3 buy into their program and agree to the
4 terms versus it's free to sign up. They did
5 it as a licensing revenue generator.

6 MR. SEMENZA: What I'm going to do
7 is public safety committee, Jimmy, you're
8 the chairman of that committee. You and
9 Councilman Febbo, Councilman Notari, along
10 with Mayor Legg, will you get together and
11 try to figure out a fee schedule for that
12 and send it to council?

13 MR. FEBBO: All right, Bobby. Yeah.

14 ATTY. RINALDI: I can send you the
15 samples that I have. I don't know if you
16 want -- it doesn't have to be as detailed as
17 some borough's have it. I'll give you some
18 ideas for it.

19 MR. FEBBO: What about if we talk to
20 Schuback and Billy and find out from them
21 exactly what they charge for various tow
22 jobs and so on and give us an idea as to
23 where we can go with setting that up with
24 the public safety committee. In other
25 words, get input from the doers who do the

1 job. That way they'll be satisfied, and
2 then we have something to present to all
3 three of them, if that's the case. Give us
4 a scale, in other words.

5 MR. SEMENZA: We can do that.

6 MR. HOOVER: I was wondering if they
7 even knew -- I mean, I know they know, but
8 about the third tower.

9 MR. FEBBO: Oh, yes, they do.

10 MR. HOOVER: But I think it would be
11 a good idea to get together with them.
12 Let's go meet them one at a time or
13 something, let them know that we want to do
14 this.

15 MR. SEMENZA: Well, that's your
16 committees. You guys figure it out, get
17 back to us. You, Lou, Rick and the mayor.

18 ATTY. RINALDI: I'll send that
19 information to Marylynn and have her send it
20 to you guys.

21 MR. SEMENZA: Thank you, Bill. I
22 don't have anything else. At this time the
23 chair is going to go into new business. The
24 chair is going to entertain a motion for
25 Varsity Garden Center, a transient license

1 approval.

2 MR. NOTARI: I'll make that motion.

3 MR. SEMENZA: By Councilman Notari.

4 MR. FEBBO: I'll second it.

5 MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by Councilman
6 Febbo. On the question? Public input?

7 Roll call, please.

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
9 Avvisato?

10 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

11 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?

12 MR. FEBBO: Yes.

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

14 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
16 Lettieri?

17 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?

19 MR. NOTARI: Yes.

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Semenza?

23 MR. SEMENZA: Yes. Okay, the next
24 motion is a resolution approving a
25 memorandum of understanding to the

1 collective bargaining agreement by and
2 between the Borough of Old Forge and the Old
3 Forge Police Officers Association for the
4 borough of Old Forge, Lackawanna County,
5 Pennsylvania. It is an amendment to the
6 collective bargaining agreement unit article
7 15, clothing allowance, subsection F,
8 handguns.

9 MR. FEBBO: I'll make that motion.

10 MR. SEMENZA: Motion by Councilman
11 Febbo.

12 MS. AVVISATO: I'll second that.

13 MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by
14 Councilwoman Avvisato. On the question?
15 Public input? Roll call, please.

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: Ms. Avvisato?

17 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: Mr. Febbo?

19 MR. FEBBO: Yes.

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: Mr. Hoover?

21 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Mr. Lettieri?

23 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Mr. Notari?

25 MR. NOTARI: Yes.

1 MS. BARTOLETTI: Mr. Rinaldi?

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes.

3 MS. BARTOLETTI: Mr. Semenza?

4 MR. SEMENZA: Yes. The next motion
5 is a sewer balance for 134-136 North Main
6 Street. Everyone has the documents in their
7 packet. Is everybody familiar with what I'm
8 speaking about?

9 MR. FEBBO: Yes.

10 MR. NOTARI: Yes.

11 MR. SEMENZA: Does anybody want to
12 make -- Rick, what was the number we
13 talked -- Mare, do we have to state the
14 number? Do you want to state the number we
15 have to come with? Rick?

16 MR. NOTARI: The number that the
17 sewer committee talked about was \$3,000.

18 MR. SEMENZA: So the chair is going
19 to entertain a motion for a \$3,000 payoff
20 balance for 134-136 North Main Street.

21 MR. NOTARI: I'll make that motion.

22 MR. SEMENZA: By Councilman Notari.

23 MS. AVVISATO: I'll second that.

24 MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by
25 Councilwoman Avvisato. On the question?

1 MR. NOTARI: On the question, Mr.
2 Chairman, just so everybody is aware, there
3 was the known number that the owner of the
4 address owed. He asked for some help with
5 that number. So what we did is we removed
6 late payments and time of vacancy of that
7 apartment, of that complex. That's where we
8 came up with that \$3,000 number.

9 MR. SEMENZA: The apartment building
10 had been vacant for a couple years. The
11 building has been sold at this point, I
12 believe, already. The money is in escrow
13 waiting to get paid off what we need to come
14 up with. Roll call, please.

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
16 Avvisato?

17 MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?

19 MR. FEBBO: Yes.

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

21 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
23 Lettieri?

24 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

25 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?

1 MR. NOTARI: Yes.

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes.

4 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Semenza?

5 MR. SEMENZA: Yes. The next motion
6 is a motion having Old Forge Borough join in
7 on the Greater Pittston compost facility.
8 The cost will be \$2,500 per year with
9 unlimited grass, leaves, branches smaller
10 than six inches in diameter.

11 MR. NOTARI: I'll make that motion.

12 MR. SEMENZA: Motion by Councilman
13 Notari.

14 MR. FEBBO: I'll second it.

15 MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by Councilman
16 Febbo. On the question?

17 MR. NOTARI: On the question, we
18 will begin picking up yard waste next week?

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: Next week. We'll
20 be all ready to go next week, yes.

21 MR. NOTARI: Approximately April
22 29th?

23 MS. BARTOLETTI: It will be the week
24 of -- yes, it will be the week of the 29th.
