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MR. SEMENZA: Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. Welcome to the Old Forge Borough Council meeting. I'd like to start the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance.

(The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.)

MR. SEMENZA: Welcome to the March 3rd council meeting. The purpose of tonight's meeting is to set the agenda for our March 17th meeting. We'll hear from our department heads, see if they have anything for the agenda.

There's a public sign-in sheet if anybody would like to address council.

I'll go down the table, see if any council members have anything to address.

Marylynn, roll call.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?

MR. FEBBO: Here.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

MR. HOOVER: Here.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?

MR. NOTARI: Present.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman

Lettieri?

property?

MR. PAPI: Yes. They're going to come and talk to the planning commission. It's Thursday, 7:30.

MR. HOOVER: Did somebody try to do that before?

MR. PAPI: Yes.

MR. NOTARI: They came before us before.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Paul? Thank's, Paul. Joe, DPW street commissioner. How do you like your new job?

MR. LENCESKI: Great. I have a great time. Paul's incredible, Marylynn. If I knew what I know now I would have given them a bigger raise. It's going smooth. Paul's showing me the ropes. We did the recycling grant today. The DPW guys are great. Very helpful. They tell me what's going on. Just try to take advantage of Thursday and Friday right now because usually that's the picking up of yard waste. Right now with the lack of snow and no yard waste, just trying to prioritize everything

that we need to do.

MR. SEMENZA: With a light year like this, weather wise, have people been out cleaning their yards and do they put yard waste to the curb?

MR. PAPI: No.

MR. SEMENZA: Because they know we don't pick it up?

MS. BARTOLETTI: They call here.

MR. PAPI: Usually doesn't start until they cut the grass.

MR. SEMENZA: I'm saying like trees, branches, storms or whatever.

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$ PAPI: The guys pick up most of the stuff.

MR. SEMENZA: Well, Joe, you probably have nothing for the agenda.

Anybody have any questions for Joe?

MR. FEBBO: Just in general, did we ever get the lights fixed down there?

MR. LENCESKI: I spoke with Urban yesterday. He was in Florida. He's going to get back to me later in the week, he said.

MR. NOTARI: Welcome, Joe.

MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Joe. Dave Lopatka, anything?

MR. LOPATKA: Bill will have those ordinances, storm water ordinance and elicit discharge ordinance.

I actually passed along to you guys footprints. I don't know if you want to talk about it now or later.

MR. SEMENZA: I was going over it a little bit before with Marylynn. A few minor changes she's got on there. Where the doors are going to be, stuff like that.

MR. LOPATKA: I'll talk with her and get it straightened out. We'll get to work on it.

MR. SEMENZA: I think it looks great.

MR. LOPATKA: It was a little bit of a challenge with the police back in.

MR. SEMENZA: So we got this done here. What kind of time frame are we looking at?

MR. LOPATKA: We'll get that right in to engineering. I'm hoping within a couple weeks we can have drawings ready to

go out.

MR. HOOVER: Shouldn't half the drawings be done? It didn't change that much. We just added the firehouse?

MR. LOPATKA: A lot of it changed.

A lot of the interior walls changed. Most of it on this side didn't change that much.

MR. SEMENZA: For our April work session meeting could you have it ready to go out to bid if we call a special meeting?

MR. LOPATKA: Let me find out. If you guys are okay with that, whatever changes Marylynn has --

MR. SEMENZA: Does anybody have any questions for Dave? That will be five weeks.

MR. LOPATKA: That should give us enough time.

MR. PAPI: On the electrical end did they make provisions for the Christmas lights?

MR. LOPATKA: You guys tell us --

MR. NOTARI: My only question is the accessibility of the mayor's office to the public --

MS. BARTOLETTI: It's very accessible.

MR. NOTARI: However, the public is also accessible now to the council meeting room and the back of the council chambers.

MR. LOPATKA: Well, first of all, you're still going to be locked down on either door. People can't just come in. It will be locked down on the front door and the back door. So once somebody's buzzed, if you guys have a meeting there's access. They have to have access to the restrooms and what not on either side of the hallway. The borough office and the police area, the doors coming off of that main hallway coming into the borough office and that other hallway, that will be locked down.

MR. NOTARI: That's all secured, but the mayor's office and the council meeting room is not secured. It's secure for our staff in our office, but there's no security here to get to the mayor's office or here or here.

MR. SEMENZA: Do you want to have a secure door there?

MS. BARTOLETTI: The secure door is when you first come in in the main entrance.

MR. NOTARI: How about the elevator?

MR. LOPATKA: You have to get buzzed in to the elevator.

MS. BARTOLETTI: When you're in the elevator and you get to the top, then you're going to have to get buzzed in from there.

MR. HOOVER: It goes down that hallway.

MR. LOPATKA: The building overall is secure, and if somebody buzzes you in they'll know who they buzzed in.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Once you get in the elevator and the elevator opens into the building it's like a landing area, a vestibule.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else, Dave?

MR. LOPATKA: No.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else for Dave? Thanks, Dave. Chief, do you have anything for the agenda?

MR. SEMENZA: All right. Anybody

have any questions for Chief Dubernas?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I also have the K-9 handler.

MR. SEMENZA: Thank you, Chief. Bill, anything for the agenda?

ATTY. RINALDI: One ordinance that repeals and replaces the storm water management order under our SALDO, and another ordinance, illicit discharge into the storm water system. Two ordinances on the agenda.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Bill?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Who inquired about it?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Councilwoman Avvisato.

MR. SEMENZA: Guess what, there's no doubt people speed down that road and many other roads in Old Forge.

MR. PAPI: Never been an accident.

MR. SEMENZA: We asked you to do your job, you did it. Thanks for the findings. Anything else? Anybody have any questions for Bill Rinaldi? Thanks, Bill Marylynn, anything?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, just the building, I guess, and a couple things when we go to executive tonight.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Marylynn? Thanks, Marylynn. I'm going to have an executive session after the meeting. I'm going to ask all department heads to stay. Paul, Dave, Joe. All department heads stay after the meeting.

At this time we'll go to public comment. Chris?

MR. GOETZ: Just two questions.

ATTY. RINALDI: We can talk about it in executive.

MR. GUIDA: Hi, Council. I think some of you know why I'm here today.

There's a little levity to this story. My three year old Godson was asking his grandmother this morning when are they going to open up the park? So, you know, I'm kind of a little bit hung up on, like, the park being locked. The weather's changed, whether we agree on that or we disagree. The school district didn't have one single snow day this year.

want to get outside. The borough park is locked. So there's -- I found myself going down to Duryea, McDade. I realized this is so silly because I see a lot of Old Forge residents in Duryea and we have a wonderful park here in Old Forge. It just got me thinking coming from my position as a school guidance counselor. I know everybody unanimously at this table would agree that we want kids outside. We want kids having

the childhood that we had. Unfortunately, kids are spending tons of time on iPads, video games. ADHA, all kinds of things like that.

So I feel like, as I thought more about it, it's an inconvenience to go to Duryea, and I have a lot of pride in my town. This is really silly driving to Duryea, when half a block away I have a really great park to access. It's locked up.

What message are we sending to our youth? We always say that we want kids outside but the park is locked. It's a great park.

MR. SEMENZA: First, I will tell you we never open the parks before April 1st.

Forever. So as long as I can remember it's been April 1st. Our park maintenance does not start yet. Say broken glass falls and it's not cleaned up by anybody. I'm not saying it's going to happen, but stuff like that. The parks are not ready for public use yet. Do you understand what I'm saying?

We're going to start them earlier

this year. Hopefully it will be open a little bit before April 1st but I can't guarantee it. But that's been the protocol and that's always what we did.

MR. GUIDA: I just want to kind of get the conversation started tonight. I talked to Ricky, he said 20 years, he'd like to see it happen. What would it take?

MR. SEMENZA: Up until probably ten years ago, right now times are changing. So maybe it's time that it will open sooner. I mean, we can be under 16 inches of snow, like we were three years ago, in two weeks.

MR. PAPI: The water is shut off.

MR. SEMENZA: We have to winterize the parks.

MR. GUIDA: I guess my point is what would it take -- like, let's consider what the barriers are. The water, possible maintenance. Is that something that we'd have to consider the budget for?

MR. SEMENZA: It's not even the budget. The water is shut off. We turn the water on and we get zero degree temperatures for a week we're going to bust pipes.

MR. GUIDA: What would we need to turn the water on for?

MR. SEMENZA: Bathrooms.

MR. GUIDA: Pagnotti park is unlocked.

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{MR}}.$ SEMENZA: The water's not on there.

MR. GUIDA: I really don't think the barriers should, like, take 20 years. Is it a budgetary conversation --

MR. SEMENZA: It has nothing to do with the budget. It has to do with protocol, how we run it. Our park maintenance has not started yet. The park's not clean.

MR. GUIDA: It's not consistent.

MR. SEMENZA: For 20 years it's been April 1st. That's consistent.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Pagnotti's open because someone broke the lock off. It's not even technically supposed to be open.

MR. HOOVER: This is the first year that we've actually had a couple warm -- the weather's been good. The last two days it's been 50 degrees. We can get snow Friday.

Should it be open? Maybe. Like Bobby said, it has to be cleaned up before we open it.

MR. GUIDA: Maybe we can operate under different seasonal hours.

MR. SEMENZA: Our parks are maintained by our staff seasonal, and they're maintained from the end of March until, roughly, October. We don't have them during the winter months. We can't put it on the DPW because they have their own job to do.

MR. GUIDA: Well, I guess all I can ask you guys is at least have the conversation.

MR. SEMENZA: I don't believe Duryea closes their park.

MR. GUIDA: It was locked around the end of February. Get the kids out of the house.

MR. NOTARI: I'm going to bring it up at our next recreation committee meeting.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The park by the school is available, too.

MR. GUIDA: Thank all you guys for your time. I don't think we have to move a

mountain to get it done. Even change it to March 1st.

MR. SEMENZA: Thank you. At this time the chair is going to go down the table, see if anybody has anything to discuss.

MAYOR LEGG: I'd just like to welcome and congratulate Joe. Good kid. I'm sure he's going to do a great job. That's all.

MR. FEBBO: Nothing.

MR. NOTARI: Today in the classifieds I saw a CDBG meeting here for Tuesday, the 17th. That's going to happen before our regular meeting?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. They usually come before the meeting.

MR. NOTARI: It said public hearing.

MS. BARTOLETTI: They have to advertise it in case the public wants to come.

MR. NOTARI: That money, we have to come up with a project? Or do you have an idea?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Well, right now the

past money we're using for the elevator, and then we'll have to come up with a project going forward. That will eat up the old money.

MR. NOTARI: Welcome, Joe.

MR. HOOVER: Nothing.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm good.

MR. SEMENZA: All right. I'm going to have an executive session after the meeting.

At this time the chair is going to entertain a motion to adjourn.

MR. NOTARI: I'll make that motion.

MR. SEMENZA: By Councilman Notari.

All in favor?

(Unanimous. Meeting adjourned.)
