MR. SEMENZA: Yes. At this time the chair is going to go to our department heads. Paul Papi, zoning/code enforcement. Everybody has Paul's report in their packet. Does anybody have any questions for Paul?

MR. PAPI: I have a transient 1icense application in front of me. It says "dear members of the Old Forge Council, Cook's Wholesale Food Corporation has given Kim and Bill Rovinski, d/b/a Takes Time to Love Us, permission to operate their food truck on our property on McLure Avenue in 01d Forge. Sincerely, Gilbert Morgan, President."

I've been working on this transient 1icense for about three weeks with this gir1. She's staying in Florida but she's
coming back. She meets all the
requirements. She has an insurance card, a 1etter from the property owner. She meets the requirement of 150 feet towards each intersection. It's a 400 foot block. I measured everything today. She needs permission from council. I sent her a transcript of all the rules for transient merchants. So she's met all the requirements.

MR. SEMENZA: Paul, so this is basically a food truck. Right?

MR. PAPI: Food truck. She's going to park in the parking lot of Cook's Food. Also, they said they're going to be open for take-out orders only Monday through Friday from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. Three hours a day. The months are June, July and August.

MR. SEMENZA: Paul, this is not going to be a moving food truck, it's going to be one location and one location only?

MR. PAPI: Yes.
MR. SEMENZA: Is this something that has to go on the agenda for tonight?

MR. PAPI: Yes.

MR. SEMENZA: Okay, I'11 add that to the agenda now. Does anybody have any questions for Paul on this food truck for Cook's property?

MR. NOTARI: No question, but let me just say I've had some experience with Ms. Rovinski last year through work and the county fair. They have a business that typically goes from fair to fair all summer. They sell food and stuff of that nature. I'm assuming they're setting up shop in Old Forge this year because a lot of the fairs are probably cancelled with the current pandemic.

So dealing with her last year, they were real stand-up people. I believe either they have family or they 1 ive in Old Forge in the off season. So it's not necessarily somebody from out of town. It is residents here setting up shop.

MR. SEMENZA: I just want to make sure they meet all the requirements and it is going to be a stationary place. They're not going to drive from parking lot to parking lot trying to solicit their food.

MR. HOOVER: Is it going to be okay with parking over there?

MR. SEMENZA: Paul, do they meet all parking requirements?

MR. PAPI: Parking requires four parking spaces. They have over 20 . There's parking on both sides of the street. Cook's has two big parking lots.

MR. SEMENZA: Okay.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Paul on his report or on this food truck?

MR. NOTARI: Pau1, I don't know if it was your report or Joe's about the tires -- it's your report, Paul. The tires on Fred Street.

MR. PAPI: Yes.
MR. NOTARI: Are they allowed to be stacked there and covered?

MR. PAPI: For one year.
MR. NOTARI: Okay.
MR. PAPI: As long as they're
covered with a tarp so the water doesn't get inside for mosquitoes.

MR. SEMENZA: Pau1, contacted Walter

Stocki about the Hill Crest Drive property.
Are we talking about the bamboo and stuff like that?

MR. PAPI: The bamboo is in good shape. He's going to spray it again, and I was talking about up on top, where the building was, people have been dumping garbage there. I met with one of his employees and he's going to take care of it in a week to ten days.

MR. SEMENZA: All right. Anybody else have any questions for Paul?

MR. HOOVER: 234 Pine Street, take a look at the grass and vegetation in the back yard, the trees. It's very bad.

MR. PAPI: Okay.
MR. HOOVER: It goes right from Pine Street to the back street, First Street. It's a large lot. Take a peak at it.

MR. PAPI: Will do.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else?
MR. LETTIERI: Paul, I got a
complaint on 135 Albany Street. I think it's Majors' old house.

MR. PAPI: I was there today.

MR. LETTIERI: Good. What did you find?

MR. PAPI: I found an elderly woman who isn't in any shape to clean up her yard. She was crying. She told me that they decided that her son-in-1aw and her son was going to come down and clean up the yard. She has a swimming pool that has to be torn down and a tarpaulin and an old lawn mower and some junk. It's not human garbage, it's just junk in the yard.

MR. LETTIERI: Thank you, Paul.
MR. NOTARI: Is that the same problem -- we had some problems with the same address last year, on Albion?

MR. PAPI: I don't recall.
MR. SEMENZA: I don't think so.
MS. BARTOLETTI: No.

MR. SEMENZA: It was across the street, I think. Right?

MR. NOTARI: Same side but maybe next door.

MR. PAPI: I dropped many letters out this month and everybody complied except one.

MR. SEMENZA: Okay. Anybody else? Thanks, Paul. Street commissioner, Joe Lenceski, everybody has Joe's report in their packet. Joe, do you have anything to add?

MR. LENCESKI: No, I don't.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Joe on his report?

MR. NOTARI: I have a couple. Joe, I got a question about 36 Connell Street. Across the street is some overgrown vegetation. I don't know if it's our responsibility to take care of that or not. If you can take a look. They said across from Mac's Calf but I don't know if Connell goes down that far.

MR. SEMENZA: The street numbers are messed up on Connell.

MR. NOTARI: That should be Union Street, shouldn't it?

MR. SEMENZA: Connell comes out to Drake's Lane, then there's actually -- if you make a left going back towards Main Street, that might be Union there.

MS. AVVISATO: I think Union is near

Mac's.
MR. SEMENZA: That's actually Coxton Road, I believe.

MR. NOTARI: Where Popil lives.
CHIEF DUBERNAS: But they use it as Connell Street.

MR. SEMENZA: It is Coxton, though.
Right, Chief?
CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yeah.
MR. FEBBO: At one time everything in Connell's Patch was Connell Street.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: So when you come in off of Drake's Lane you get the high numbers. It's like 99, 98. Then you go to the other end it's 100, 101. Then in between it could be anything.

MR. FEBBO: Brook Street, Humphrey Street.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Brook Street and Humphrey Street and Foundry are the only three streets that have normal addresses on them.

MR. SEMENZA: Go ahead, Rick.
MR. NOTARI: Joe, how are the inspections going on the corrections of the
cuts in the road, pave cuts? Are we satisfied with the way they're being replaced, inspected?

MR. LENCESKI: I don't know about that, Rick, to be honest with you, but $I$ can say the inspections on the work that was done on Orchard with the sewer grates and everything that happened after the contractor left the area.

MR. NOTARI: Okay. I actually did get a few complaints about Orchard Street. I haven't been down there, so $I$ don't know exactly what the problem is. But $I$ got a few complaints about the paving there.

MR. LENCESKI: Just some problem on Stewart Street also.

MR. NOTARI: We11, keep an eye out for the pave cuts and let's make sure that things are being done the right way. If not, let us know. See if we can do anything about it.

Lastly, do we sweep the streets at
al1? Do we have a street sweeper come in?
MR. SEMENZA: No.
MR. NOTARI: No, we don't? Have we
in the past?
MR. SEMENZA: Not since I've been around, $I$ don't believe. I don't think I ever saw one in Old Forge except Main Street.

MR. NOTARI: But we wouldn't do Main Street. Right?

MR. SEMENZA: No, that would be the state. I don't think we ever had a street sweeper. Marylynn, could you correct me if I'm wrong on that?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Nothing that $I$ know of.

MR. NOTARI: I was just curious. Thank you.

MR. SEMENZA: Joe, I'd 1ike -- very detailed. Very good job so far. Anybody else have any questions for Joe?

MR. HOOVER: Joe, any issues you have on Orchard Street let me know.

MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Joe. Dave Lopatka. Everybody has Dave Lopatka's report. We had it for our last meeting, actually. Dave, do you have anything you want to add in the past two weeks?

MR. LOPATKA: Yes, just one thing. Marylynn actually got a letter from - I don't know if it was the county or whoever with regard to your floodplain ordinance. So we actually talked to this Les iie Rhodes from the state with regard to your ordinance. Your ordinance needs to be updated because they're updating the floodplain map.

So for you guys to fall in compliance with the new floodplain map so people can get flood insurance your floodplain ordinance would need to get updated. We actually have a draft copy. I believe it was sent to everyone.

MS. BARTOLETTI: We'11 be getting it for the work session to pass in two weeks.

MR. LOPATKA: The ordinance that we got from her is a draft ordinance that they're using around the state with the updated map. So we'11 basically have to repeal your existing floodplain ordinance and we'11 have to implement this new one. It's basically the same. There's not a lot of changes. But this one in particular
complies with the flood insurance requirements.

Other than that, I don't have any additions.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Dave? Dave, how are things with the borough building? Everything is --

MR. LOPATKA: Bob, I sent you and Marylynn an updated copy of the plans, so if there's anything on there once you get them out to everyone, if you want to bring that up. We're actually going to meet with Marylynn next week, myself and the architects, to go over the plans one final time. So if there's any changes that need to be made you guys can let us know and we'11 address them at that point.

MR. SEMENZA: Do you want to get all them out, e-mail them to everybody, please.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. Dave got them to me today, so probably tomorrow I'11 give them to everyone to take a look at. They're pretty detailed.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Dave?

MR. LOPATKA: So the other thing, Bob, just so you know, and Marylynn may have it on the meeting agenda. We'd like for you guys to approve tonight for us to go out to bid on June 9th.

MR. SEMENZA: That's on the agenda.
MR. LOPATKA: A11 right.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have any questions for Dave? Thank's, Dave. Chief Dubernas, police report. Everybody has the chief's report in their packet. Does anybody have any questions for Chief Dubernas?

Chief, do you have anything to add to your report?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: No.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions of Chief Dubernas?

MR. NOTARI: Chief, I saw that one of your officers was certified in medical marijuana. Do you want to explain that a little bit?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Actually there should be two of them now. With the medical marijuana you could still be charged with a

DUI. You're only prescribed so much. Just like pills and everything. Here in Pennsylvania there's a couple different ways that they test for it now. So I have two officers that are certified in it now. Both officers are also ARIDE certified.

MR. SEMENZA: Chief, would it be in our best interest to get all officers certified on it?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Most of it falls under the regular FSFT for standardized field sobriety tests. This is just for different signs of the marijuana. But the ones that are certified on the ARIDE could pick up on the medical marijuana because that's under the narcotic ARIDE one, too, where SFST is more towards alcohol.

MR. SEMENZA: What I'm asking is, is it something that the borough needs to do? Is it something that we need, all officers trained on this?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: No, because all my officers are SFST certified, which would cover that. More than half are ARIDE certified, too.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have questions for Chief Dubernas? Chief, thank you.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: The only thing is the birthdays are still going. We're probably at 50-plus for the kids now. So if you know anybody that wants to do them please reach out to me. I know there was some confusion this last Sunday because some were contacting the fire department, some were contacting us and they weren't speaking among us. So we had three different parties at three different times for the same person.

Myself and Captain Rukowski are the two that are going to handle everything now.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Jay, did you want to tell them anything about the parade that you're working on for the school?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I didn't know if you wanted to wait until Mr. Gatto spoke.

MR. SEMENZA: Chris Gatto, if you want to unmute also.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I spoke with Mr.
Gatto. A week or so ago he sent me a plan
for after graduation and we were going back and forth. As of right now $I$ have eight police officers signed for the night of graduation. That's going to probably start closing off Marion Street area probably, like, around 7:00 to get everybody into the detail to have graduation start promptly at 8:30. That's what Mr. Gatto was saying. He has to wait until it gets dark out.

MR. GATTO: I'll go through what we're planning on doing. We're having a drive-in ceremony on the school district property because of social distancing concerns. What I have planned is that the students will be in cars with their families, they'll line up around the school circle for 8:00, and then we're going to start bringing them into the grassy area. We're going to bring them down the access road, we're going to have a ramp that goes up into the grass area. We're going to line them up and start the presentation at 8:30.

As soon as that's over we're going to bring the cars out. There's an alley behind the high school gymnasium that goes
onto Josephine Street, so we're planning on having the cars go out that way and that's where we'll start the parade.

Chief, if you want to go through the parade route that I gave you last week.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yeah. It's going to come out out of Josephine, at that little parking lot there, travels down West Grace to Main. You're going to turn on from Main to Moosic Road. From Moosic Road you're going to go in on Maxson Drive and go along the back side of the Veterans Memorial Stadium, around East Grace Street, back in front of Veterans Memorial Stadium, all the way back to Moosic Road, Moosic Road to Oak Street, to Marion, back to the school.

MR. SEMENZA: Maybe Mr. Gatto can answer this question. Are you limiting to who could be in the parade and who can't? Is it only for the students and their families or is it for any residents that want to be involved with it?

MR. GATTO: What we're going to do is limit it to students and their families. I think what we're going to do is put it out
on our Facebook page probably the end of this week. I wanted to get through awards night tomorrow night first just so that the town knows what the route is and if they want to decorate their houses or put their lights on or be outside socially distanced they can be.

MR. SEMENZA: Great. Anything else?
MR. FEBBO: Chief, how about bringing us up to date with what you and Billy and Schuback have discussed as far as towing.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I haven't discussed anything except for what the last thing that was talked about, that you guys were supposed to meet with all three towers. I also spoke with the mayor, too, and he said that you guys were speaking with them. The last time $I$ knew they were -- Billy told me something about a book, some kind of agreement on a book. I didn't understand.

I said the easiest thing to do is to just get all the towers that we have used in 01d Forge, from AAA to our normal towers, and have the officers just use anybody
that's allowed to come to 01d Forge that we used in the past. Because, like, our heavy-duty sometimes we use RLE or Boots \& Hanks or Johnson's. So it could be anybody.

MR. FEBBO: Billy told me this afternoon that he spoke with you, that you agreed that using the book system and the police officers one after the other. In other words, if Schuback's on an accident and there's another accident the same night the next person in line would --

CHIEF DUBERNAS: That was the rotation, and $I$ said $I$ had no problem with that rotation. But the only thing I told him, I said who keeps that book.

MR. FEBBO: The duty police officer. Do you have somebody in charge each shift, an officer in charge each shift?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Well, it's the senior officer is in charge of each shift.

MR. FEBBO: He would be the one with the book. He said he worked it out with you and him and Schuback.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: We talked about it yesterday before a parade and that's what he
said he was talking about. I said $I$ have no issue with that. That's an agreement that they wanted to do. Something like Scranton was doing, he was telling me. If they got an accident at 9:00 this morning and Billy was the first one, so Billy would get towed.

Say I had a traffic stop at 11:00 and the car needed to be towed. The next person would be towed.

Then say at 5:00 I would have another accident and you need two towers, so number three on the 1 ist and number one would be called. So you would have to try and keep track of that resolving rotation.

MR. SEMENZA: Should be very easy to keep track of.

MR. FEBBO: If there's a book.
MR. SEMENZA: One book.
MR. FEBBO: The other point is if somebody comes in, Billy said, looking for a car, that my car was towed, and he didn't tow it he wouldn't know where to go. But if he came to the police station we should have that book and say exactly who towed what and when and where.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: The only time that would change is if we have a person that requests $A A A$ or their own tower.

MR. FEBBO: Again, the vehicle being towed should say -- the police officer should have that book with them and say okay, look at the book. Billy had the last one, it's Schuback. So give Schuback a cal 1.

MR. SEMENZA: You guys have your committee. Your committee is you, the chairman is Hoover, Michelle, yourself. You meet with the mayor and Chief Dubernas on this and get it straightened out, come up with a system on how you want to do it.

MR. HOOVER: I'11 set up the meeting Tuesday or Wednesday.

MR. SEMENZA: Mayor, are you okay?
MR. HOOVER: Can we met in the borough building?

MR. SEMENZA: You can meet wherever you want to meet. There's only a few of you. Marylynn, do you want them meeting at the borough building? It is closed down.

MS. BARTOLETTI: We're technically
closed until June 4 th.
MS. AVVISATO: Can we meet in my back yard or something?

MR. SEMENZA: You can meet wherever you want except for the borough building.

MR. FEBBO: Outside would be good, maintain the space.

MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, guys.
Councilman Febbo, do you have anything else for the chief?

MR. FEBBO: No, I'm good.
MR. SEMENZA: Chief Dubernas, do you have anything else to add to your report?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: No.
MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Chief. Bill, solicitor's report.

ATTY. RINALDI: There's two ordinances on for passage tonight. One is the storm water illicit discharge and the other is for storm water management. Both wi11 be enforced by the borough engineer and the code enforcement officer, but it gives the ability for the borough to nominate or designate some other firm if they need to in the future.

The other two resolutions on are an iPad usage policy for council, elected officials and employees dealing with their iPads that are issued by the borough manager.

Also, a resolution to extend the real estate tax deadline, and we're going to extend the discount period of two percent until the end of August of 2020.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else, Bill?
ATTY. RINALDI: That's it.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Bill Rinaldi? Thanks, Bill. Marylynn, borough manager's report.

MS. BARTOLETTI: First, everyone has my financial report. Does anyone have any questions for me?

MS. AVVISATO: No.
MR. NOTARI: I have a couple questions. On the unpaid bills list, I notice -- just questions on two entries. The $\$ 500$ to George Aulisio?

MS. BARTOLETTI: He built a new house, and that is his sewer -- the money that he gets back for the sewer hookup.

MR. NOTARI: And the $\$ 250$ to Reading \& Northern Railroad?

MS. BARTOLETTI: There are two invoices that the borough gets per year that are due to the Reading \& Northern Railroad because we have the sewer 1 ine that goes underneath their railroad tracks. So we have to pay them every year to be able to go under their tracks.

MR. NOTARI: That's all 1 have.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have any questions for Marylynn?

MR. LETTIERI: Mare, $I$ have a question on the budget with the sanitary 1andfil1. It seems 1 ike we're 50 percent over budget already.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Where is that at?
MR. LETTIERI: At 387.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Are you looking at the profit and loss?

MR. LETTIERI: Yes. The budget, actually right now we're over budget.

MS. BARTOLETTI: We11, that's a good thing because that's money coming in to the borough. We always budget both just in case
they have not such a good year. So right now they sent us quite a bit of money compared to what we actually budgeted. So that's a good place to be.

MR. LETTIERI: Thank you.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else?
MS. BARTOLETTI: The next thing I wanted to mention is about Municipay, which I sent out to everyone just to take a look at. Does anyone want me to explain anything about it? It's a service that would allow the borough to be able to take debit or credit card payments for sewer bills, it could be used for police reports or tickets, it could be used to pay for permits.

So $I$ put some information together to see what you guys thought. It's something I'd really like to go forward with.

MR. FEBBO: Does it make things easier for you?

MS. BARTOLETTI: It makes it easier for everyone because anyone who is used to using a debit card or a credit card for any type of bills, it would allow them to pay
their sewer bill right from their home. So I think it's definitely a couple steps in the right direction for us.

MR. FEBBO: Thank you.
MR. SEMENZA: I'm fine with it.
Like I said before, there's a lot out there and you did research them. Do we have to put that on the agenda tonight?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Bill, does that have to go on the agenda?

ATTY. RINALDI: Wasn't that packet that I saw through COSTARS? Council can approve it. You don't have to bid it. I thought that was a COSTARS program.

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, but it doesn't actually cost the borough anything. It's based on the fees that the person who uses the card would pay. It's a very minimal fee. But I'd like to have it as part of the record.

ATTY. RINALDI: You can get it approved tonight if you want to.

MR. SEMENZA: So are we approving the purchase of Municipay?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Approving joining

Municipay, yes.
MR. SEMENZA: Okay.
MS. BARTOLETTI: The other thing
that $I$ have tonight, and maybe I'11 just do it now, is just read a letter that was received from the county about the CDBG program. Basically what it is, usually they hold a public meeting, but since we've been having meetings 1 ike this they just send the information to us instead.

So what they would like us to know, it's anticipated on behalf of 01d Forge we'11 be allocated approximate1y $\$ 133,685$, which includes $\$ 24,063$ of administrative expense, in the fiscal year 2020 CDBG funds for projects.

So enclosed is this information that will be discussed in order to apply for the CDBG program funding, and they would like us to review our needs assessment and give them a three-year community development plan, and we have until June 26 th to get the plan back to them.

So if you'd 1 ike to have one of the committees get together on this we can put
together some ideas, but $I$ do want you to keep in mind that a portion of last year's money will be used for putting the elevator into the borough building during the remodeling.

MR. SEMENZA: What committee would meet on that? I'm going to say either finance and budget or long-range capital improvement.

MR. NOTARI: I would think long range, then it could come to finance.

MR. SEMENZA: That's fine with me. Long range, Michelle, you're the chair, Lou Febbo and Russe11. You guys want to get a meeting and talk about it? You can have Marylynn in the meeting also.

MS. AVVISATO: Sure. I can get a meeting together.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else, Marylynn?

MS. BARTOLETTI: One other thing. Since the sewer agency now is up and running on Quickbooks the way the rest of the borough is, when we do the agendas do you no longer want them separated or do you still
want them to be separated?
MR. SEMENZA: Still want them separated, my opinion. That's mine. What we're paying and that kind of stuff?

MS. BARTOLETTI: In the beginning when we go through the motions, the way we have --

MR. SEMENZA: Approve invoices for payment not to include sewer accounts?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.
MR. SEMENZA: I think we still separate them, but that's just my opinion.

MR. NOTARI: I say we keep them separate as well. Are you able to generate a report now, the kind that Mr. Ferret always wanted, from the sewer department with your Quickbooks?

MS. BARTOLETTI: For this meeting you received the unpaid bills list on Quickbooks, you received one of the financial reports. So next month you'11 receive a profit and lost as well from there. It's one that you're missing right now.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else,

Marylynn?
MS. BARTOLETTI: No, I'm finished.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Marylynn? Thanks, Marylynn. Do we have any public comment?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, we don't.
MR. SEMENZA: At this time the chair is going to go down the table. Mayor Legg, if you want to unmute. Do you have anything to address? I'll move on. Councilwoman Avvisato?

MS. AVVISATO: No, I'm good. I'm fine.

MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Febbo?
MR. FEBBO: I'm good.
MR. HOOVER: I'm good.
MR. LETTIERI: Nothing at this time, Chairman.

MR. NOTARI: Just one thing.
Marylynn, can you update us on the plan for the parks and have we brought workers in to begin getting ready?

MS. BARTOLETTI: I did bring four of our employees in on Monday to start doing the maintenance at the parks. They started
cutting the grass and all that type of stuff.

As far as anything to do with opening, nothing as of yet. The same thing with the summer camp. Nothing as of yet. I think for the most part we've been following the guidelines set by the governor, and he does treat -- the parks that we have are basically treated like playgrounds. So he has them all shut at this time.

MR. SEMENZA: In my opinion the summer camp this year, we should not go forward with it. That's my opinion, personal1y.

MR. NOTARI: I don't know if I disagree with you, but can we wait a couple more weeks to make that decision?

MR. SEMENZA: We don't have to make a decision on it right now. We can definitely wait. Marylynn, if you want to put out applications tentatively saying if we do have the camp --

MS. BARTOLETTI: They're already on our website. We already have them set up on our website that we'11 keep people notified
about the camp.
MR. SEMENZA: Did we have anybody reply back yet?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.
MR. SEMENZA: Good.
MR. NOTARI: One thing more on the parks so we're all aware and we have it in our minds. Depending on what the governor does and how he allows us to proceed here in Lackawanna County, the unit leagues, specifically little league and junior football, use our park facilities as their practice fields and, with little league, their play field. I think whether we have a rec board committee to let them know or whether we see them in the public, we all have friends that are among the leaders of those groups, to let them know that if our parks are closed they don't have a home.

MR. SEMENZA: Right. I've been in contact with a few people, one is Tony DiMattia, about our mens' softball league, which it's looking like that's not going to be played this year. I mean, you possibly could start July, but the weather and stuff,
that's a discussion that's ongoing. We're waiting to see when we go yellow here with the county, like you said. We'll have a better determination come June 4th, I guess.

MR. NOTARI: I mean, even if we go yellow, it seems to be that team sports aren't going to be allowed until we go green, and I've already seen announcements by the 01d Forge Little League that if all is well and good practice is going to start July 18th. I think the leaders of the little league need to realize that that decision's going to be made by the borough on whether our parks are open or not and not the little league.

Just something that maybe if we get a full rec board together we can talk about those things.

MR. SEMENZA: Do me a favor and get everybody's e-mail address off of Tony, unless you have them, and let's have a meeting. Set it up.

MR. NOTARI: I'11 do that. I'll ask him to find a date and we'll send an invite out.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else, Councilman?

MR. NOTARI: No, that's all.
MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Rinaldi?
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Just two
things. One, $I$ know we have a DPW hire on the agenda for this evening. I know we talked about possibly hiring two and we had some discussion that we weren't sure if we had the finances for two or not.

So what I'm going to ask is, as chairman of the finance committee, $I$ would like to put a motion to the floor to table the hire tonight and then meet with the finance committee and the borough manager to see if we do have the finances available, possibly, for the two hires, and then come back in a month with the same two people that applied. Then we can take it from there, whether we can hire the two of them then or we can hire one then.
But right now I'm going to put a motion to the floor to table the hire tonight for the DPW and ask that the finance committee meet with our borough manager to
discuss the possibility of financing for two DPWs .

MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Rinaldi put a motion to the floor to table the hire for the DPW worker. Is there a second?

MS. AVVISATO: I'll second that motion.

MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by Councilwoman Avvisato. On the question? Public input?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Not on the question, but $I$ just want it to be noted, the reason why $I$ asked for the table. I know we need the DPW hire, I know we're down two men right now. One could fill a position for one of our workers who went out on comp, one of them who is currently out on comp. So I know we do need the hire. I also know that Marylynn did hire -- well, we all know Marylynn did hire two part timers to help us until then.

So the only reason, again, why I'm asking for the table is to possibly meet, see how our finance is, see how our budget is, and then come back in a month, if we do
have the finances -- I'm not sure if we do. If we do have the finances, and then possibly ask to hire for two. If we don't, then we could just go ahead and hire the one. But that's the reason why I asked to table it. That's all I have.

MR. SEMENZA: Public input? Roll call, please.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
Avvisato?
MS. AVVISATO: Yes.

MR. NOTARI: I'11 make that motion.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thanks, guys. Good job.

MR. LETTIERI: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?
MR. NOTARI: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Semenza?
MR. SEMENZA: Yes. The next motion will be a motion, a name for nomination for hiring for the DPW full time employee.

MR. LETTIERI: At this time I'd 1 ike
to make a motion to hire Rory Finnegan.
MR. SEMENZA: Motion on the floor by
Councilman Lettieri to hire Rory Finnegan as
a full time DPW employee.
MR. NOTARI: I'11 second that motion.

MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by Councilman Notari. On the question?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: On the question, since the majority of council didn't want to meet for -- let finance meet for me to discuss the options $I$ guess we can have it right now.

Marylynn, looking at the budget are our finances in place for a second DPW worker?

MS. BARTOLETTI: I'm going to say no, and the reason for that is because it is not a budgeted item. It's not anything that we were planning for. One is in the budget, a second one is not.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: How much are we budgeted for a DPW worker?

MS. BARTOLETTI: We are budgeted enough for their salaries, their benefits --

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: What ine item can $I$ find that on?

MS. BARTOLETTI: It's in the budget but it's part of the entire DPW line. It's all one big 1 ine together.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: What ine would that be?

MR. SEMENZA: 430.13, I believe it is.

MS. BARTOLETTI: It is 430.13.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The 67--
MR. SEMENZA: No.
MS. BARTOLETTI: You're looking at the profit and loss.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The 202,752?
MR. SEMENZA: Yes.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So in that 202,752, that's the current five members or six members?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Okay. If you're looking at the one on the budget, the 202 , that is for six members.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: That includes pay and benefits?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, that strictly
is salary. Benefits are in a different part of the budget.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So their salaries are roughly -- I know they're different amounts. They're roughly \$30,000 to $\$ 34,000$ each?

MS. BARTOLETTI: I would say 30 to 40.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: And the benefit package is where?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Are you looking at the profit and loss or the budget?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Profit and loss.

MS. BARTOLETTI: So if you look back under section 42, number 487.01, 53,243, that is for January, February, March and April only. On April 1st it took a very large increase. It's not reflected in that.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So that 53,243, that's for al1 borough staff employees?

MS. BARTOLETTI: That's for all
staff who are on weekly.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So, then,
roughly if we were to higher a second DPW, just looking at it real quick, we'd have to come up with another 40,000.

MS. BARTOLETTI: You would have to come up with another -- the amount for heir salary, the amount of their benefits, the amount of their pension, and a few other odds and ends.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So at this time you can't find that we have it?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Not in the general fund, no. If we do have a finance committee meeting I'd like to go over some areas and discuss.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I did want to do that. They didn't want to. That's why I'm trying to have it now.

MR. SEMENZA: By all means definitely have a meeting, but the reason $I$ voted no for that, we've been having -- our last employee has been gone for quite some time and we've been pushing this hire off for a while. I'm not against hiring a second person if it's in the budget. By all means I'd definitely hire another person.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm not saying you are. We fist advertised this back in January. We pushed it off five months already. That's why $I$ was only saying one more month to see if we had the finances. To take the proper steps. Have the finance committee meeting, meet with the borough manager.

MR. SEMENZA: We've been down an employee for a year. I just think if we keep waiting it's going to get worse. That's my opinion

MR. FEBBO: We have a motion on the floor.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I think we should have did it in January. I agree, it is very long overdue.

MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Rinaldi has the floor. Anything else.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm good. If the borough manager doesn't feel that we have the money in the budget right now, and without us having -- I don't want to say a real finance meeting, but an actual finance meeting with the committee and her alone and
trying to have one public now it's a little tough. But if she feels that we don't have it, then $I$ 'm going to have to respect her judgment on the finances and I'm good, then.

MR. SEMENZA: We can set up a
finance meeting for this week, me, you, Rick and Marylynn, and go over them.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We can do that, yeah. That would be good.

MR. SEMENZA: Rick, you good this week sometime?

MR. NOTARI: I'm not good tomorrow.
I believe I'm good Thursday, if you wanted to meet Thursday.

MR. SEMENZA: Thursday or Monday. I'11 get back to you later.

Okay, on the question? Anybody else? Public input? Roll call, please.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman Avvisato?

MS. AVVISATO: No, and I'd like to give my reasons. Rory's a good kid. I know him. He is a hard worker as well. But I believe the other candidate has more experience and he's been working at the DPW.

Sorry.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?
MR. FEBBO: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?
MR. HOOVER: The same reasons
Michelle just pointed out. I think
experience has a little bit to do with it.
I spoke with the workers and the workers don't have a problem with the employee that was already there. So I'll vote no.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
Lettieri?
MR. LETTIERI: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?
MR. NOTARI: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm also voting no, but I'd also like to state my two reasons. My first reason would be in agreement with Councilwoman Avvisato and Councilman Hoover. Mr. Monticelli, he was our temp for 90 days -- was it 90 days, Marylynn?

MS. BARTOLETTI: He was 90 days, and then he was brought back for another -- at

1east another 45 days, yes.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I thought it was only 90 . He was actually there longer. So one of my reasons again would be because he was our first temp, he was there. I spoke with the previous DPW manager. He was a great worker. I'm sure Mr. Finnegan, if he gets the job he'll be a great worker as well. I know him as well. He's a great man as well.

My second reason would be because, like I said, I want to hire two, and we had two applicants. I would have put a motion to the floor for both gentlemen this evening if I could have. Mr. Lettieri put one already for Mr.Finnegan. I would have put one for Mr. Monticelli, but since we don't have the finances yet I guess I can't do that. So those would be my two reasons for voting no.

But I would like to state I'm sure Mr. Finnegan will be a great hire if he's the one to get the job. I think both candidates and applicants are fine men.

So with that said, though, I have to
vote no for Mr. Finnegan.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Semenza?
MR. SEMENZA: Yes. I just want to touch base on this. I respect everyone's -the way they vote, and $I$ just want to say that we had said back some time ago we're not going to set a precedent of a temp worker, that they were going to get the job because they were a temp worker. If an applicant was not involved in the borough in any aspect it wouldn't be held against them. I'm not saying anything bad about Mr. Monticel1i. I hope that in the near future, if finances are there and it works out and he's stil1 available to hire, by all means $I$ wouldn't mind adding him to the DPW. But at this time I'd just 1 ike to go forward with this.

Anything else on the agenda? We do. MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I have a question because $I$ know of a few. Marylynn probably can help us out. Marylynn, just because it was brought up, through past DPW temp workers how many of them were hired? How many were temps and then got hired?

MS. BARTOLETTI: It's hard for me to say that. I can do some investigating and get it to you later on or tomorrow.

MR. SEMENZA: Garrett was a temp. He was let go and then hired months after.

MS. BARTOLETTI: We have had temps that have been hired and we've had temps that have not been hired. It happens.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: No, I know we've had both. I'm trying to think of just how many in the past that we had. If you can get them to me sometime this week. I just want to know for my own.

MR. SEMENZA: I just want to state for the record this hiring for a DPW employee, they must pass a drug test, pass a physical, obtain a CDL license within six months of hiring. There's no exceptions to these rules. These are our guidelines for the hiring, and I want that to be noted for the record and to the new employee.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You bring up a great point with that and another question. One of our DPW workers now who is currently out on compensation, Garrett Gleason, does
he have a CDL yet?
MR. SEMENZA: I believe he has a permit.

MR. HOOVER: You believe? Nobody knows?

MR. FEBBO: He's waiting for the department of motor vehicles to open up.

MR. HOOVER: He had three years.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So let me ask a question. Are we allowing Mr. Garrett to come back without the CDL or are we requiring him to have the CDL when he comes back from compensation?

MR. SEMENZA: Bil1, do you want to step in on this one?

ATTY. RINALDI: I really don't want to address it at this time because $I$ don't know what the status of his worker's comp claim is other than he's applied, and that's on1y, I think, two weeks old. Right, Marylynn?

MS. BARTOLETTI: It's about three weeks, yes.

MR. SEMENZA: Let me ask you a question. We didn't find out about this
years after the fact, that he did not receive a CDL 1 icense, when the hiring stipulation was, in fact, to obtain a CDL license within six months of hiring, just like $I$ stated tonight. I have to be a 1ittle more emphasized on it, but it is three and a half years later.

ATTY. RINALDI: I don't know what extensions were given. I can look at everything. I know he's been talked about in the past. I just don't have all the notes in front of me on what extensions he was granted, if he is granted them officially or not.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Let me state this for the record. I hope that Mr. Gleason recovers. I hope that he comes back to work. I'm not saying let's not let him back to work. I'm saying, though, without this CDL -- are we requiring him to get the CDL to come back after compensation? Or if he doesn't have the CDL are we going to restrict him or require him to get the CDL? That's what I'm asking.

Bill, should he have the CDL when he
comes back after compensation or not?
MR. SEMENZA: You guys want to meet in executive session after this?

ATTY. RINALDI: Yeah. I don't know
all the issues and letters he was sent on when he was getting it, where he is in the process, so it's hard for me to say -- I mean, you hire workers, they have six months to get CDL licenses. Why he didn't get one in six months I don't know. Why it's been extended -- it obviously was extended. So I don't know what -- I just know now he's out on worker's compensation.

MR. HOOVER: What would happen if he wasn't on workman's compensation?

ATTY. RINALDI: If he wasn't on
worker's comp and he didn't have it and didn't have a good reason for why he didn't have it, then that's part of his hiring. Council could move to terminate him. If he's had the warnings, under the contract he could be terminated.

MR. SEMENZA: Bill, are there guidelines in their contract on how you have to address this, how you would have to
follow this procedure?
ATTY. RINALDI: I'm sure there is.
I can take a look at it.
MR. SEMENZA: Please do.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bob, the last thing I'11 end with -- and I'm sure none of us are, including myself. I'm not looking to terminate Mr. Gleason at all. All I'm saying is are we going to allow him back without the CDL or are we going to require him to get it? And if he needs time in getting it after this is over, whether it was due to Covid-19, which we were closed the past two months but he did have three years prior, then we can give him a month to get it once things are back to normal.

That's al1 I'm saying.
Again, $I$ 'm not looking to fire the guy. I don't want to get rid of him. He's a good worker. He's been a good employee of the borough. I've never heard any problems with him. I mean, Paul Papi, when he was the manager, always spoke highly of him, the workers spoke highly of him. So I'm not looking to do anything to the gentleman.

I'm just looking to --
ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Chairman, I
think we're getting too deep into a personnel matter at a public meeting. This should be talked about in executive session. MR. SEMENZA: Let's have an executive and talk about this.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That's all.
I'm good to talk about it anywhere, public or private. That's al1.

MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Russ.
Anything else on new business? Yes. The chair would entertain a motion to join Municipay.

MR. NOTARI: I'11 make that motion.
MR. SEMENZA: By Councilman Notari.
MR. FEBBO: I'11 second it.
MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by Councilman
Febbo. On the question? Public input?
Rol1 cal1, please.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman
Avvisato?
MS. AVVISATO: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?
MR. FEBBO: Yes.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?
MR. HOOVER: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
Lettieri?
MR. LETTIERI: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?
MR. NOTARI: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

MR. SEMENZA: Yes. I think that's it for new business. Correct?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.
ATTY. RINALDI: You have a transient license you have to vote on.

MR. SEMENZA: Okay. The chair is going to entertain a motion for a transient 1icense for Takes Time to Love Us food truck at Cook's. Paul Papi, do you want to step in and give us the address again.

MR. PAPI: It's McLure Avenue. 213
McLure Avenue.
MR. SEMENZA: Address is 213 McLure
Avenue. Paul Papi did all inspections.
They're good to go. Do I have a motion?

MS. AVVISAT0: I'11 make that motion.

MR. SEMENZA: By Councilwoman Avvisato.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'11 second it.

MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by Councilman Rinaldi. On the question? Roll call, please.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman Avvisato?

MS. AVVISATO: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?
MR. FEBBO: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?
MR. HOOVER: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
Lettieri?
MR. LETTIERI: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?
MR. NOTARI: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes, and the best of 1uck.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Semenza?

MR. SEMENZA: Yes. At this time, before we adjourn I'm going to let Chris Thomas talk about the little league.

MR. THOMAS: First of al1, I don't think council realizes how appreciative the 1ittle league is that we get to use the borough's fields, because when you look at the leagues that are around us, most of the other leagues own their own fields. We're fortunate. We don't own our field but the borough takes tremendous care. Lighting, water bill, those are all unseen donations to our kids. So that's first and foremost. We appreciate that.

The second thing is our situation, as you know, is fluid. We're not going to violate anybody's guidelines on when the parks are opened. However, we belong to a league that not all the fields are owned by governments.

So Ricky did say that you're going to make the decision whether or not we start. We're going to make the decision whether or not we start. We just may not be able to play at 01d Forge. We're just
trying to keep our parents abreast of where we are. The league meets weekly to get updates. Don't forget, we cover five counties, and three of them just went yellow. Unfortunately, I can give you inside information.

The Wilkes-Barre 1 eague, they voted last week unanimously to bag their regular season, but they're going to hold out hope for their fall ball.

The leagues in Scranton were holding out to the very end, as long as we can. So when you see that posted to the website, that we have a projected start date, that's only if we meet all the guidelines.

MR. SEMENZA: Chris, the Heritage League, what is the rock bottom last date that you're going to decide?

MR. THOMAS: I don't know, Bob, because Brian goes. But like I said, they meet every Tuesday or Wednesday night to see where we've progressed through the phases. Obviously we're still -- the majority of the league is still red. But they meet on a weekly basis and they adjust, and for the
regular season we'11 run into football with
all this coming down, who is going to participate. But the league is meeting.

They're going to put out a joint statement on whether or not we're -- when we are going to start, and we're also going to have a coordinated statement on registrations. And every league collects a different fee and every 1 eague collects it a different way. So it's not as easy as saying all right, we're going to refund everybody their money. It's fluid.

But honest to God, we appreciate everything, and we're not going to violate anybody's order about when we start. But we also may not end up playing in 01d Forge if some of the other places are green before we are. Our kids would just play on the road if that's the case.

MR. SEMENZA: Have Brian, weekly or whatever he wants to do -- he can reach out to me every day if he wants. But have him reach out to myself or Marylynn periodically and touch base, see if anything has changed. That's the best thing $I$ can give you right
now. I don't know when we're going to open. MR. NOTARI: Mr. Thomas, maybe I misspoke. I certainly didn't mean that the borough would dictate if the little league opens or not. Again, I'm not trying to be combative. I just want to make sure that everybody's on the same playing field, so to speak. And we can work together with this, because even if you don't play games in 01d Forge parks you use them to practice. So we're going to have to figure out a place or you're going to have to figure out a place to practice if, for whatever reason, the parks are still closed.

So my intention is just to make sure that we have good communication with each other.

MR. THOMAS: We don't even know where we stand with the different entities, and a lot of our kids, as you know, practice along Marion Street on the part next to -MR. NOTARI: The younger kids.

MR. THOMAS: Nobody's allowed to use the school for anything, so we're not even sure where that stands. But again, we get
guideline submissions on a weekly basis from 1ittle league on where you are. They al1 start off with you need to follow CDC guidelines, your state department of health, your local county and your municipality before you start anything. So we're not going to violate any of those things.

However, if our partners in the other counties are open the league may just play games in those places, like Wayne County. We have Wayne, Wyoming, Susquehanna, Pike and Lackawanna. Like I said, our friends to the south, they've bagged it for the regular season.

Again, you guys really don't understand or see how helpful that is to the league when we don't have to pay a water bill, we don't pay the 1 ight bill. We get field maintenance. I see these other leagues. Moosic owns their own field. Taylor owns their own field. It's great to own your own place but you're responsible for everything. So we're very, very fortunate. Even Scranton. The city may own their parks but they don't maintain them.

That's up to the leagues to do it.
So again, thanks, appreciate that, and I'11 reach out to Brian, and if you don't see it on our Facebook page I'11 send you an e-mail.

MR. SEMENZA: If there's nothing else at this time, the chair is going to entertain a motion to adjourn.

MR. NOTARI: I'11 make that motion.
