that, we're going to move forward into our department heads. Paul Papi, zoning officer. Everybody has his report. Anyone have any questions for Paul?

MR. PAPI: I'd like to inform you that Dave Chromey is stepping down from the planning commission.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Did he give a date?

MR. PAPI: No. He didn't show at the last meeting. He said he wasn't coming to planning any longer.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: He didn't show as of the last meeting so he's not going to show anymore. Correct?

MR. PAPI: Right.
MS. BARTOLETTI: He sent a message to the chairman of the planning commission. He sent a text message saying that he was going to step down, wouldn't be able to do it any longer, and to please accept that as his official notice.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay.
MR. NOTARI: Do we have standby or is that for zoning?

MS. BARTOLETTI: On planning we do, yes.

MR. NOTARI: We do have a standby person for planning?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes, Mr. Voyak.
MR. NOTARI: Okay. Should I make a nomination to make him the full time on planning?

ATTY. RINALDI: First you have to accept the resignation. I would have rather it in writing, but you got a text message. But it doesn't seem like Mr. Chromey wants to put it in writing. Did you get anything else, Marylynn?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, as of now we did not.

ATTY. RINALDI: Do you have a copy of that text message?

MS. BARTOLETTI: I do have a copy of the text, yes.

ATTY. RINALDI: Has he ever responded to you since you got it? Have you gotten any response from him? Were you able to contact him regarding it?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, I haven't heard
anything else.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bil1, can we use that as a formal resignation?

ATTY. RINALDI: Technically, no.
You got a text from a phone sent to the chairman. I ask that if he can just send an e-mail or letter saying he wants to resign.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Can I read this to you, exactly what it says, so its part of the record? It is Dave Chromey. "With all this Covid going on $I$ 'm back working full swing. I can't devote the time to holding a position on the planning commission. So please accept this as my formal resignation. Thank you. Sincerely, David Chromey."

ATTY. RINALDI: Where did it come from?

MS. BARTOLETTI: That was given to me by Bob Potosky, the chairman of planning.

ATTY. RINALDI: Does it have a stamp on it for a phone number or anything?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No.
MR. FEBBO: Bil1, do you feel more comfortable asking for a letter?

ATTY. RINALDI: Get something that
we can enter into the record and not a text on somebody's phone which was printed out. I'm not disputing it, but if somebody asks later where is his resignation.

MR. FEBBO: Could we have --
ATTY. RINALDI: Or ask somebody to call and say we can even type it up. It's very simple. I resign as a zoning board member. Just sign it.

MR. NOTARI: Why don't we do that, then. Why don't we have either the chairman of the planning commission reach out to him. MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

ATTY. RINALDI: He can even mail him something to sign. Put an enclosed, se1f-addressed envelope.

MR. NOTARI: I have a question for
Mr. Papi. I was contacted today by a resident of Mine Street inquiring about hooking up to UGI natural gas and he said he was denied a permit. I'm just wondering -he asked for an exemption -- if I could ask on his behalf. I just don't understand why -- what the process is that he was denied a permit.

MR. PAPI: Well, it actually was the gas company that was denied because the street was just paved, and I thought we had something new in the books if a street is freshly paved you can't cut it open, unless it's an emergency, for five years.

MR. FEBBO: That's correct.
MR. PAPI: So I figured if -- he was giving me all these different excuses. I said that would have to come from council. He'd have to make a plea to council.

MR. FEBBO: If you recal1, we went through all this with the gas company last year, and that was one of the reasons why we did not allow them to put their ine in, because we were going to pave the road and they would not guarantee us that they would repave it. So five or six potential customers to hook up. This is a good example. We have a paved road and these people are coming forward now. You'd have more cuts on there than anything.

MR. NOTARI: That's something different. They wanted to run a whole 1 ine on Sonny Drive. There's already a 1 ine on

Mine Street. He just wants to hook up to it.

MR. HOOVER: That was the Get Gas program where they had ten years to get on the gas line. We just did the water 1 ine, we paved it. Now, people knew that the road was being ripped up. Why didn't they go for gas then. They could have called me up and said we have a gas 1 ine to run. Okay, no problem.

MR. NOTARI: I'm sure they didn't think that far ahead, and he spoke with me today. He is a handicapped individual.

They have coal currently. They are starting to get up in age and they don't have a way to haul the coal into the house now. So they're trying to get hooked up to gas to make it easier on them.

ATTY. RINALDI: Does anybody know where they're hooking it up from?

MR. FEBBO: Mine Street has gas on it.

ATTY. RINALDI: Is it just a utility pave cut?

MR. NOTARI: I don't know, but
that's my guess.
MR. HOOVER: What's the address?
MR. NOTARI: 1165. It's Eddie
Benny.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Paul, would it be a utility pave cut only?

MR. PAPI: I believe so.
ATTY. RINALDI: They have a habit of not paving their pave cuts.

MR. PAPI: They just put a brand new 1ine in not long ago.

MR. HOOVER: Brand new 1 ine where?
MR. PAPI: I'm pretty sure the gas company put a new 1 ine in on Mine Street.

MR. HOOVER: The gas main is new.
MR. PAPI: The gas main. I'm not sure. I wasn't positive on this. That's why $I$ brought it to council.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Paul, under the other ordinance that we have, if they do go into the street without an emergency don't they just have to pave a certain portion of it? A big portion?

MR. PAPI: If they make three separate cuts within so many feet they have
to repave the road from curb to curb. More than 20 feet they have to pave the whole road from curb to curb.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So that's my question. Do we know how big the cut is?

MR. HOOVER: If the gas main's in the middle of the road you're probably going to have a three by five gas cut in the middle of the road, and then they'll have to get it to the curb line. Probably shoot the bullet underground, get it to the curb line. If it's rock they may have to trench it. I don't know. I could find out from the gas company tomorrow. I have a meeting with them at 9:00. I can find out some details about where the gas Main is.

ATTY. RINALDI: That's still one cut.

MR. HOOVER: One cut in the street but it could be, if they can't get through, a ten foot cut going towards the house. Like a trench.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So depending on how big the cut's going to be is going to determine how much pave you're going to
have. What portion you're going to have to pave.

MR. HOOVER: Right. Normally the gas company's going to go in and put a three by five cut. They're not going to pave the road curb to curb for ten feet on each side of that cut. They're going to come in and restore the cut. So you're going to have a new-paved road with a one foot cutback. Six by four cut in the middle.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Could you find out tomorrow exactly the dimension of what the cut's going to be?

MR. HOOVER: Yeah, I can get some information.

MR. SEMENZA: I don't have my packet here with me but $I$ want to be in the meeting.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bobby said he doesn't have his packet with him but he's on his phone. He wants to be in the meeting but he wants me to keep going with it.

MR. NOTARI: Can we ask everybody to go to mute unless they're going to speak? I can mute the video. I'm not sure if I can
mute the phone numbers - I could, actually.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: A11 right.
Anyway, Jimmy, if you want to find information out on that cut. Then we'11 see if we can get back to Rick and Paul and maybe get back to the neighbor and see what we can do about it.

MR. NOTARI: I'd appreciate that.
That's al1 I have. Thank you.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody else have any questions for Paul?

MR. LETTIERI: Paul (inaudible) make sure there was no leaking?

MR. PAPI: There was no leaking. We dye tested all the tanks. I went down the river three, four times and never had any dye come out into the river. So it was a false claim by someone.

MR. FEBBO: Pau1, 722-724, next door to Ellen and Leo, that house with the garbage, they had the police there today. Can we talk to the chief about that and Bil1, maybe get in touch with the 1 andlord and do something about the trash and the tenants there?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I got the phone number tonight. We were there for a call about 4:00. So we actually have the phone number. We're going to make contact with the gentleman tomorrow. They had a lot going on there.

MR. FEBBO: Because that's an ongoing problem. That's been going on for a long time and it's getting worse.

MR. SEMENZA: Who is the property owner?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: It's a gentleman from Moscow that owns the property. It's not the bed and breakfast, it's the one across -- between Mr. McAndrew and Leo McLane's house. I think they said the old house used to be a Salerno. An elderly 1ady.

MR. FEBBO: It's deplorable. I'11 let you handle that.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other questions for Paul? Paul, anything else?

MR. PAPI: No, that's all.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thank you. We're going to move to our DPW manager, Joe

Lenceski. Do you have anything to add?
MR. LENCESKI: No, I don't. I'm good.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have any questions for the DPW manager?

MR. NOTARI: I have one. It was mentioned to me last night at the park that a couple of the lights are out at the basketball court. I was wondering if Joe could take a look to see if they're replaceable, if they're not replaceable, if we have to move forward with new lighting or lighting. Joe, if you could take a look the next couple days to see if there's anything we can do I'd appreciate it.

MR. LENCESKI: I will. Actually, I did today. Marylynn let me know about them. I checked them out, and with the height and the access we might have to get a contractor in there to replace a light bulb, or maybe you want to think about replacing to LED to be more efficient. I also replaced the light bulb that's underneath the pavilion today.

MR. SEMENZA: Joe, get a contractor
down there and get a price on putting LEDs in. Also, for the time being, if needed, just put bulbs in there.

MR. LENCESKI: Definitely. I spoke with Marylynn today and we're looking up electrical contractors and we're going to move on that ASAP.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody else have anything for Joe? Thanks, Joe. We're going to go to our police chief, Chief Dubernas. Anything to add other than the report?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: The only thing is with Vine Street and Hill Street, the stop sign there, I'll have a complete report and I'll e-mail to all you guys so you can have it in your packet. But it's going to be denied because there's already a traffic control device there only with the intersection.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: That was on
Vine and Hill?
CHIEF DUBERNAS: Vine and Hill.
There's already a stop sign on Hill coming out.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay.
MR. SEMENZA: Russe11, 1ast meet I requested the chief to do a traffic study on that street. A resident --

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I was absent the last meeting. That's why I double-checked. Anything else, Chief?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I have nothing else.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: Anybody have any questions for the chief? Thanks, Chief. We'11 go to our engineer's report. Dave, anything to add?

MR. LOPATKA: I have nothing to add.
MR. SEMENZA: How are we doing with the bids?

MR. LOPATKA: They come in Thursday. We're just answering questions the last two weeks.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have any other questions for Dave?

MR. NOTARI: Dave, in our packet we got a letter from the Lackawanna County Conservation District, and I noticed in your report that was e-mailed to us regarding

Birchwood Estates -- have all these deficiencies been met, do you know?

MR. LOPATKA: Yes, their permit's been issued.

MR. NOTARI: Okay. That's all I wanted to know. Thank you.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Any other questions? Anyone else for Dave? Thanks, Dave. Bill, solicitor's report?

ATTY. RINALDI: Other than what's in my report, I sent a sample ordinance around for Marylynn to share with you on any issues with regards to fireworks, and for new business you have the amended preliminary plan for Birchwood. It's two units down in the area close to Villa, Rosemount Estates.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else?
ATTY. RINALDI: No.
MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: Anybody have any questions for Bill? Thanks, Bill. Marylynn, borough manager report?

MS. BARTOLETTI: First, you all have the financial reports. Does anyone have any questions?

MR. NOTARI: No, nothing.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Okay. The next thing that I wanted to bring up, on the agenda there's resolution No. 8 of 2020. It is for CDBG funding for the Coronavirus specifically. I just wondered if anyone had a chance to read through it today and see the details of what the funding actually is. Like, where it can and cannot be used. It's very specific, it's very limited.

Russ, if you have that you'd be able to read from it.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm going to go into it right now.

MS. BARTOLETTI: And if you don't I can always read it when we get to that point under new business.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay.
MR. NOTARI: Marylynn, that amount that's in the resolution, $\$ 72,270$, that is what we are applying for?

MS. BARTOLETTI: It is actually \$67,934, and then administrative costs that would go to Lackawanna County would be \$4,336.

And what it would be used for, since
it is very specific, Lackawanna County asked that anyone who is eligible for this funding would possibly put it into helping people who may need help with utilities or rent or things of that nature. It would all be handled by Lackawanna County, and any money that would be given out would be by Lackawanna County and paid directly to -whether it's a utility company or 1 andlord or anything. No money goes directly to the individuals.

MR. NOTARI: So they assign that amount to the borough of 01 l Forge?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.
MR. NOTARI: I thought this was something different.

MS. BARTOLETTI: There's other funding for Covid-19 that the borough gets directly, so any expenses that we have incurred up to this point, we've already sent all of our invoices in and we're hoping to get reimbursed for all of the amounts that we've already put in.

MR. NOTARI: That's what I thought this was.

MS. BARTOLETTI: We have not had to pass a resolution for that amount yet. Any questions on anything else? I guess that's it.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody have any questions? Thanks, Mare. All right, we'11 go down the computer screen to our council members, see if they have anything.

MR. SEMENZA: Do public input first.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anybody from the public? I know you said we had a couple sign in.

MR. SEMENZA: Marylynn, anybody e-mail you?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes, I do have one e-mail. Would you 1 ike to start with him first?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: He is signed on as AJ Savan, and he has concerns about water runoff where there was paving done on Smith Street. The paving was done in the fall of 2019 by the borough.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay.
MR. SAVAN: So in the fall a portion
of Smith Street in front of my house was paved. It seems that $I$ notice during these rains during the season all the water's coming down the street and pouring into my yard. I went and bought some cold patch. I built up a berm between me and my neighbor's yard. The water is running over the berm, into my yard, flooding my sprinkler system and running under my front sidewalk.

I brought this up to the paving company when they were here. They kind of blew me off and said we only pave curb to curb. That's not our problem. I talked to Joe Ferrett, Joe Ferrett didn't get re-elect, so that's something different.

But now with the heavy rain coming, the water runoff, $I$ have video and pictures of my yard being completely flooded. My front 1 awn. The way they paved the road, they pitched the road only to one side. My side.

MR. FEBBO: So what would be the fix?

MR. SAVAN: I don't know, Lou. I mean, $I$ have video $I$ could show anybody, if
they want, on my phone. The runoff is -I'm worried about my underground sprinkler system, I'm worried about my front sidewalk in the fall. The water is going to raise my sidewalk and it's going to raise my pipes to my sprinkler system.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Why don't we make arrangements to ask Dave to go down and see.

MR. LOPATKA: What's your address?
MR. SAVAN: 307 Smith.
MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: You have some video or photos show him and show him what the problem is.

MR. SAVAN: I even bought tube sand and put it in my neighbor's driveway, which is not fair to him. But $I$ built tube sand up to defer the water, but it's still going around the tube sand and into my lawn.

MR. FEBBO: Make arrangements to meet with Dave and show him the problem. He'll tell us what to do.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Give me your phone number, I'11 take care of it from there.

MR. SAVAN: One other item. I did
bring up to the paving company where my sidewalk meets the street $I$ got a ledge about this big. Poor Joe Ferrett almost broke his neck coming to my house last year because he tripped over it. The paving company -- again, the supervisor from the paving company at the time ignored me and said curb to curb. That's all he said and he walked away.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We're going to send Dave down there, and when Dave meets you just show him all the stuff. Once Dave looks at it Dave will figure out however we have to fix it.

MR. SAVAN: The water goes all to my side of the street, so when the rain comes al 1 the water runoff is, 1 ike, two feet wide from the curb out into the street.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We'11 have Dave take a look at it. He'11 get us the right stuff.

MR. SAVAN: Thank you.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thanks.
Marylynn, anybody else on the e-mail?
MS. BARTOLETTI: AJ was the only
one.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Rick, do you have anybody --

MR. NOTARI: My guess is the 267 number may be the gentleman from Mascaro. If he could unmute his line.

MR. AUGUSTINE: The first thing I was going to say is obviously JP Mascaro \& Sons greatly values your business. We have for many, many, many years. I want you to know that -- did you receive our letter from our president?

MS. AVVISATO: Yes.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes.
MR. AUGUSTINE: I want you to know that 2020, after March 16th, has been -obviously you're aware that it's been a very, very difficult year. I can tell you trash volumes -- and it said it in the letter -- are up some 20 to 30 percent, and indeed that's the case in Old Forge even though you have the limit. Because people are with the stay at home order you're not going out to restaurants, and if you do go out to a restaurant it's takeout, bringing
everything home. The volumes have been, again, about 20 to 30 percent higher. It's causing longer days. Our workers -- we did very, very well from March 16 th until about June 1st, but it has been a struggle. We do have enough workers in place.

We have 36 complaint calls over the last three months, three and a half months, but I know Marylynn has called me once or twice about sloppy pickups. And I think there was a sloppy pickup in the borough today, although nobody called us about it, so we weren't aware of the location.

But obviously we've had issues with long days, helpers, and we are working just as hard as we can. Of course, the heat hasn't helped. But $I$ want you to try to bear with us. I know things are going to get back to normal and hopefully in the next 30 days we'11 be back to normal. So if you have any questions I'm willing to take them.

MR. FEBBO: Why is it that they hit and miss? They catch a house, miss a house, catch a house, miss a house? Then they throw the garbage out of the containers,
onto the ground instead of into the truck?
MR. AUGUSTINE: In other words they're being sloppy?

MR. FEBBO: Absolutely, and missing a lot of containers.

MR. HOOVER: My name is Jimmy Hoover. I 1 ive in Forge Estates. It seems like they picked up one side of Winter Street and not the other. My garbage is stil1 in front --

MR. AUGUSTINE: Today?
MR. HOOVER: Yes, today. Winter Street. I 1 ive on Bubernak, which is off of Winter. It seems 1 ike they did every other house. Mine is gone, my neighbor's is gone, the guy across the street has his. Why would you go up the street and not get every house?

MR. AUGUSTINE: The only thing $I$ can think of, do you think all the houses had their trash out? What time in the morning do we come?

MR. HOOVER: You come at 4:00 in the afternoon. Everybody had it out this morning.

MR. AUGUSTINE: Then there's no reason and I don't know the reason, because if that's the case there is no reason. I would have to -- this is called Forge Estates? I'11 have somebody run by there tomorrow.

MR. HOOVER: Off of Dunn Avenue. There's about four streets there where people still have their garbage out.

MR. SEMENZA: Bob Semenza. I'm president of council. I've been off four months at work. I've witnessed over the last four months -- I've never called to complain to Mascaro. I've witnessed over the last four months blatant, blatant disregard for a community service. Blatantly dropping stuff on the ground and turning around, walking away and not picking it up. It's actually very unacceptable in my book. This has been going on for a long time. Trash not getting picked up. Notes on garbage cans, please take this can.

Three stickers on the can. They shouldn't need three stickers on a can. Empty garbage can. They won't take it.

MR. AUGUSTINE: You mean taking an empty garbage can?

MR. SEMENZA: I witnessed my can being thrown, bounced off the ground and into my truck. Unacceptable in my book, Sam. We pay Mascaro a lot of money to render the services in the borough of 01d Forge. We signed a contract with you guys figuring you guys would do a professional job. It's not being done. Sorry I'm upset about it, Sam, but it's got -- the way your employees work has got to stop in the borough of O1d Forge. It can't go on 1ike this. I have picture after picture of garbage on streets, and they turn around and walk away.

MS. AVVISAT0: Michel1e Avvisato. I was home at 1 unch today and I witnessed one of your employees -- they took my garbage but my neighbor's, he picked it up, and there was a sticker on it. He just threw it back in and threw the garbage can out on my driveway. So I ran around the back and ran up the street but they were already up the road. So I did e-mail them. I called

Marylynn and she did take care of it, which I thank her. They did come back and get it. Why did he pick it up and threw it back in when there's a sticker on it?

MR. AUGUSTINE: Again, what $I^{\prime} m$ going to do first thing tomorrow, we have -and I mean this. I mean this sincerely. I understand you're having calls. We have an excellent general manager, an excellent, excellent staff at our division. At this point we're overwhelmed from the standpoint that a lot of our supervisors are on trucks. So our supervision hasn't been as strong as it is.

Your problems sound 1 ike drivers that are not being watched and helpers not being watched and they're being careless. Whether they're not picking up trash, whether they're careless, the trash being thrown.

So tomorrow morning I'm going to talk to Mike Pilusko. I've already told Mike that he needs to meet with Marylynn about these problems, sooner the better. What I'm going to do is I'm going to make
sure that next week there's a supervisor in that town and we're going to have ongoing supervision in that town to make sure the pickups get back to what they should be. Because as $I$ understand it the drivers in 01d Forge are the normal drivers that come in that town. So I'm surprised that shoddy work is being done. I'm really surprised shoddy work is being done.

MR. FEBBO: We11, shoddy is an understatement right now.

MR. AUGUSTINE: A11 right. We've serviced your town for a long time. We're old-time Italians. We want to make sure you get served. We're not so big that we don't understands what service is about. So I'11 get right on it tomorrow and, you know, put this thing to bed.

MR. SEMENZA: Thank you, Sam. Sorry for being fired up.

MR. AUGUSTINE: That's quite all right. It comes with the turf. But I do want you to understand that this is a brutal year for us. It's worn us out. This Covid has worn us out.

MR. FEBBO: I think it's the same for everybody.

MR. AUGUSTINE: Anyway, we'11 get on it and you'11 see a big improvement.

MS. AVVISATO: Thank you.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thanks, Sam.
Anybody else?
MR. NOTARI: No, I think that's it.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Marylynn, any more e-mails?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, not at this time.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Before we go into new business I'11 go down the table. Councilman Hoover, anything?

MR. HOOVER: I'm good.
MR. FEBBO: No, I'm good.
MS. AVVISATO: I'm good, thank you.
MR. LETTIERI: Yeah. Bob, can I make a motion at this time?

MR. SEMENZA: Wait until new business.

MR. LETTIERI: Nothing at this time.
MR. NOTARI: I have nothing.
MR. SEMENZA: I have nothing myself.

I want to apologize for being late. The garbage issue is a major issue in my eyes.

At this time the chair is going to go into new business. Marylynn, I don't have the stuff in front of me. Can you read the resolution?

MR. NOTARI: Can I take Russell's two minutes and say that we need to figure out a way to go back to in-person meetings.

MR. SEMENZA: I would love to go back to in-person meetings. Anybody have any suggestions?

MR. NOTARI: I don't know if the school would let us use --

MR. SEMENZA: I already tried that. No public entrance to the school district.

MR. NOTARI: How about the basement of Saint Lawrence Church?

MR. FEBBO: I can ask Father about it.

MR. NOTARI: How about Eagle-McLure Hose Company?

MR. SEMENZA: It might be a little better place. Possibly even maybe we can ask Mark and Angelo Genell to use their
hal 1.
MR. FEBBO: They're not using it themselves.

MR. SEMENZA: We can reach out to Bil1 Stull?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yeah, I'11 check into it.

MR. SEMENZA: Russe11, do you have anything to address council with?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: It's sort of back and forth.

MR. SEMENZA: Marylynn, go to new business.

MS. BARTOLETTI: New business, one, resolution No. 8 of 2020. It is "a resolution of the borough of Old Forge, County of Lackawanna, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, authorizing the board of commissioners of Lackawanna County to submit an application to the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development for funding on behalf of 01d Forge Borough in the amount of $\$ 72,270$ through the Community Development Block Grand-Coronavirus program as part of the

Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Cures Act, and further certifying compliance with the requirements set thereof."

MR. SEMENZA: Can I have a motion for that resolution?

MR. HOOVER: I'll make the motion.
MR. SEMENZA: By Councilman Hoover.
MR. NOTARI: I'll second it.
MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by Councilman

Roll call, please.

Avvisato?
MS. AVVISATO: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?
MR. FEBBO: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?
MR. HOOVER: Yes.

MR. SEMENZA: The minimum appraisal amount of $\$ 348,000$. There's a motion on the floor. Is there a second?

MR. FEBBO: I'll second that motion. MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by Councilman Febbo. On the question? Public input? Roll call, please.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman

ATTY. RINALDI: What I can do, I'11 prepare the legislation and send it to the commonwealth legislature and see if they
wil1 - they have to enact a law to allow us to do it. Once they sign off, then we can hold an auction for that minimum bid.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have anything else? If nothing else, at this time the chair is going to entertain a motion to adjourn.

MR. FEBBO: I'11 make that motion.
MR. SEMENZA: By Councilman Febbo.
A11 in favor?
