MR. SEMENZA: Yes. At this time the chair is going to go to our department heads. Paul Papi. Everybody has Paul's zoning code enforcement report. Anybody have any questions for Paul? Paul, do you have anything to add to your report?

MR. PAPI: Just that I issued approximately 75 permits so far. Over 20
swimming pools.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Paul?

MR. NOTARI: My only question is your second thing on your report, nuisance ordinance, any detail on that?

MR. PAPI: Every time the cops come back with a situation $I$ send out a nuisance report in case we make a file of it. When it's three times, then we take them to the magistrate.

MR. NOTARI: Thanks, Paul.
MS. AVVISATO: I have something.
Paul, you did a great job typing this report up, buddy. Good job.

MR. PAPI: Is was a struggle. It's going to get better, though.

MR. SEMENZA: Paul, is that Semenza Rose Semenza?

MR. PAPI: Yes.
MR. SEMENZA: Where is that? What address is that?

MR. PAPI: That's on Quarry Road on the corner of --

MR. SEMENZA: That's what I thought
it was. Anybody else have any questions? MR. LETTIERI: Paul, do we have an update on the food truck over there at Cook's?

MR. PAPI: They're there and they're open two hours a day, only a couple days a week. I really don't understand it.

MR. FEBBO: Paul, couple things.
The magistrate, where are we with Scott's issue down there?

MR. PAPI: I'm waiting to hear from the court system. They kept prolonging it, prolonging it. I'm sure any day now I'll be getting a call.

MR. FEBBO: Where are we with Jeff Cardos over on Vine street, there?

MR. PAPI: I have no idea.
MR. FEBBO: How about checking that out. He was on board there. We were on the verge of taking him to the magistrate.

Maybe it even went to the magistrate.
MR. SEMENZA: I believe that's Maple Street.

MR. PAPI: I know where it is.
MR. FEBBO: Junk cars in the yard,
garbage, and between his building and Billy Rinaldi it's a hazard.

MR. SEMENZA: Chief, do you know where he's speaking of?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yes. It's Maple Street. It's right next to the complex. The house next door.

MR. SEMENZA: If Paul needs you to show him where it's at will you show him?

MR. PAPI: I know where it is.
MR. SEMENZA: Good.
MR. FEBBO: He has gotten three or four warnings, and $I$ believe Steve did file with George Seig. I'm not sure. Follow up on that, will you, please?

MR. PAPI: Sure thing, Lou.
MR. SEMENZA: Paul, one more that we're following up on that Steve was doing, and $I$ don't know where it's at right now. Tom Perone. Does anybody remember that property there on --

MS. AVVISATO: It's right behind my house.

MR. SEMENZA: I don't know where we stopped at that. Take a look. Do you know
where we're talking about, Paul?
MR. PAPI: Yeah, I walk by there often with my wife. The building is completely cleaned out and the roof is gone, and the only thing left is blocks and bricks. I'm assuming that he's just going to push them into the hole, but he just stopped at that point. He has no trespassing signs up.

MR. SEMENZA: It was in the magistrate's hands, if I'm not mistaken. Somebody correct me if I'm wrong.

ATTY. RINALDI: Is that the garage without a roof?

MR. SEMENZA: Yes.

ATTY. RINALDI: We were at the magistrate.

MR. SEMENZA: What happened with that?

ATTY. RINALDI: That's a good question. I don't have the notes from that. I don't know if he cited him finally or if he gave him another extension to make the repairs. I can check my notes.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have
anything for Paul?
MR. PAPI: Check your notes, Bill, and let me know.

MR. HOOVER: Pau1, what about that Caputo off of Moosic Road? Where all the cars are. Is it Caputo? Maxson Drive. I went by there the other day and I counted between -- in the street, both sides of the street and in the back yard of his house I counted 16 cars.

MR. PAPI: And they're nice cars. They're expensive.

MR. HOOVER: I don't care what they are. I know Scavo was in a while ago trying to do something about that. I don't know whatever happened about that. But that's a mess down there.

MR. PAPI: He actually called me about building a garage there or he was going to buy land somewhere else. But he's very sickly. He told me he would get back to me. That was a couple days ago that he cal1ed me.

MR. FEBBO: We had a problem there last year. Ended up putting up a fence.

MR. PAPI: He did.
MR. FEBBO: But he was in compliance with everything that was required of him then.

MR. SEMENZA: He was.
MR. PAPI: They're not junk cars. They're not junks.

MR. FEBBO: But is he in compliance with the amount of cars? Are they inspected? Are they tagged? Are they on the street?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I know Officer Kimbal was there for abandoned vehicles. There was two or three that were out of compliance. He got them in compliance. Then $I$ remember he was selling one or two of them. There were for sale signs on them. There was a jeep there he was selling and a little sporty-looking car. Like an older sports car that he was selling there.

MR. FEBBO: Chief, do a drive by or have your officers check it out.

MR. SEMENZA: Is there an ordinance that states how many vehicles you can have on your property, so on and so forth? I'm
not aware of this. We're coming down on a guy like Ronnie Coles or even Stocki, on a bigger matter, but I'm saying about vehicles on pieces of property. If this guy falls in the same category he should be held to the same standards.

MR. FEBBO: Bobby, I recal 1 when Teddy had the same problem down there where he lives. He had about five or six cars on his property. And I think Steve said with code, if you check it, that as long as they're off the road and on his property they're in compliance. If they are on the road they have to have --

MR. SEMENZA: So there's not a number of cars you can have? Your whole yard can be filled with cars as long as they're licensed?

MR. FEBBO: I'm not sure. I have to check the code on that one.

ATTY. RINALDI: You might want to check with the state, too. The state 1icenses car dealers. They might have a plan that he submitted.

MR. PAPI: I never saw anything in
the book about the number of cars.
ATTY. RINALDI: I think the state might handle that, Paul. I know the car dealerships, they have to register with the state where they're going to be, where the cars are going to be. You might be able to find that out from the state directly or even the chief might be able to find that out.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I only know about if they're on the roadway they have to have inspection and registration. I'm not sure about property.

MR. SEMENZA: I believe on your property --

ATTY. RINALDI: Car dealerships always have to go through a process with the state.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have anything for Paul?

MR. NOTARI: Just on that note, Bob, in terms of our zoning, if it's a residential zoning, maybe that's a way you can look to see can you just park your cars in your yard. I mean, you can fit as many
cars in a yard as possible. Is that
allowed? Like zoning, is there a setback or, you know, whatever. I think that might be a way to look at it, too.

ATTY. RINALDI: If you're
residential you can't have a business. So
if he's non-conforming use he can't expand it, the non-conforming use, without coming back to zoning to ask for an expansion. So whatever the original size of the lot is, he's stuck with that original size.

MR. NOTARI: This problem probably occurs ten to 20 times if you drive through town. I mean, right on Corcoran Street there's two RVs parked in a yard. My grandmother complains to me every time I take her home. You can go all over. Down the street, across from the cemetery, here, there's a house that has multiple cars parked in their yard, driveway. Two blocks away.

MR. SEMENZA: But 16 vehicles is excessive. If somebody has 16 vehicles on their property -- it's a business, Jimmy?

ATTY. RINALDI: If he's a business
it would be another issue.
MR. HOOVER: It looks like a residential house to me.

MR. PAPI: He's not a business. I just spoke with him.

ATTY. RINALDI: He owns 16 cars on his own?

MR. FEBBO: They're older cars, classic cars.

ATTY. RINALDI: If they're al1 tagged --

MR. HOOVER: He's got four or five on his property that are covered over. They have car covers over them. I'm sure they're antique cars. But it's just the point. It's 16 cars in a residential area. It's nuts.

ATTY. RINALDI: I mean, you can only have -- our ordinance, we cite people if they have a car on their property that doesn't have a plate and insurance and inspection. Right?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: That's if it's on the roadway. They have to have it insured, registered and inspected for the roadway.

ATTY. RINALDI: So even under our -because that's where the big hullabaloo with Joe Russick came. I'11 look at the ordinance. Your cars on your property, you have to have -- I'11 try and dig up the code section.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I know the ones that were on the property zoning always handled.

MR. FEBBO: Do they qualify as nuisance?

MR. PAPI: If they're considered junk.

MR. FEBBO: If there's multiple cars wil1 it fall under the nuisance?

ATTY. RINALDI: Not if they all operate, run and they have tags.

MR. LETTIERI: What if he restores cars for a hobby? I mean, we're going to cite him for that? I know a lot of people who restore cars that don't have --

MR. PAPI: He didn't restore anything. He's very sickly. Very sickly.

ATTY. RINALDI: Because I remember somebody had to move his car in the garage.

He passed away. Revello. He had a car that he didn't have a license and he had to move it in the garage at the time. Let me see if it's under -- I didn't find it yet. I'11 dig it up. I know years ago they passed an ordinance that restricted how many cars you can park in your -- I have to find what section it's under. It might take me a while to scroll through this ordinance.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have anything for Paul? Thank you, Paul. Joe Lenceski, DPW report. Everybody has Joe's report. Joe, do you have anything to add?

MR. LENCESKI: No, I don't.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Joe?

MR. NOTARI: In your report, Joe, miliary containers down at the DPW. What exactly is that?

MR. LENCESKI: I believe they're containers that were made in Tobyhanna. They look like a small container. They were loaded with a lot of garbage for a long time, and $I$ went threw them all, figured out what was good, what was not, and we filled
all the dumpsters up in town with garbage. MR. SEMENZA: They've been there forever. They're actually blocking the property.

MR. NOTARI: It's like a storage container?

MR. FEBBO: Zupon put them there. He was in the 109th. They've been there forever. Like Joe said, just junk.

MR. NOTARI: Can we use them for storage?

MR. LENCESKI: They're useless. I'm hoping we can maybe sell them or scrap them.

MR. SEMENZA: Somebody will buy them if we put them for auction.

MR. NOTARI: Another question, Joe. I got a few complaints, and maybe, Jimmy, this is for you as the water company. Orchard Street, the pave is coming up near driveway entrances at Morowski's, Furcon's and McCarry's.

MR. HOOVER: Do you have addresses?
MR. NOTARI: I'm not sure. It's across from -- up from 214. So maybe 215 or 217. It's right next to the Perone
property, where that roofless garage is. It was like the pavement on the road is coming up at the driveway entrances.

MR. HOOVER: I'11 take a look at it.
MR. NOTARI: Appreciate that.
MR. HOOVER: That's the first I
heard of it. I'11 take a look at it. We should definitely take a look at our third-party inspector.

MR. NOTARI: Is that who gives the final on those type of deals? I know this was a water company project.

MR. SEMENZA: Our third-party
inspector is only for compaction testing. They wouldn't test for something like that. But $I$ do think we should call Geoscience in and sit down and go over the terms that we agreed on with them going forward. I apologize to whoever I cut off.

MR. HOOVER: Did have a Reilly paving inspector on that job because $I$ knew how critical it was just because I'm a member of the board. But $I$ made sure somebody was there to watch them. Some of the driveways $I$ know were a problem because
of the pitch. When they did the approaches of the driveways they changed them a ittle bit without damaging the stuff on the property owner's side. But I'11 check and find out. Without having a severe drop on them. You know.

MR. NOTARI: Thanks, Jimmy.
MR. HOOVER: And I called Bobby this afternoon. We have a blocked sewer -- I called Joe also this morning. We have a blocked sewer at Stewart Street and Vine. We had to dig it up in the street. But we' 11 overlay that portion.

MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Jimmy.
MR. NOTARI: Lastiy, for Joe, I
notice in his report about the tree layout. I think the trees are going to look great once they're grown. Joe, Marylynn, whoever planned putting them together for where the trees are going, I think it's going to enclose that park nicely without a fence. Good work.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Thanks, Rick. I just wanted to mention something about the trees. Some of you who've been around a
while, you know that one of my goals is to eventually try to get to be a Tree City, USA, and that's one of the big steps toward it. So I want to thank Joe for really taking care of all those trees. It was a little shock when they suddenly showed up in the middle of the pandemic. It's a big undertaking. Thanks, Joe.

MR. LENCESKI: You're welcome.
MR. FEBBO: Also for all the extra time you put in without clocking us.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else?
MR. LETTIERI: Joe, just to clarify, in your report you put, for the multiple stop signs that you put up, are we replacing them or just putting extra stop signs all over?

MR. LENCESKI: I have a list of them. We just replaced them because they were faded or weren't reflective anymore.

MR. LETTIERI: That's all I wanted to know.

MR. SEMENZA: Any stop sign that is put up the police have to do a traffic study and voted on by council. Myself, Joe, I
want to thank you for the job you're doing for the borough. I see it first hand.

Thank you. Anybody else have anything for Joe? Thanks, Joe.

Chief, everybody has Chief Dubernas' report. Chief, anything to add to your report?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Nothing.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Chief Dubernas?

MR. LETTIERI: Chief, I'm stil1 getting a lot of complaints about Conne11, noise. They said it's more noise if you go on Humphrey Street. I think it's that 1ittle alley going towards --

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I spoke with Paul today. He came to us. I guess the lady called him. He told us exactly where it is at. I let my guys know to especially check it over the weekend. The house is actually on Connell Street.

MR. LETTIERI: She said it's more in the back, off Humphrey.

MR. SEMENZA: It's a back yard.
They have a big back yard there. I drove by
the other day and saw a big party there. MR. NOTARI: Chief, can you have Officer Kimbal check a vehicle on Tioga Court? It's a black four-door vehicle. It looks like -- I don't know if it's abandoned. It just seems that it hasn't moved in a month, maybe longer.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Is it a Ford Taurus?

MR. NOTARI: It may be.
CHIEF DUBERNAS: I think he's in the process of -- the gentleman that 1 ived across the street from where the car is at is the owner of it.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have anything for Chief Dubernas? Thanks, Chief.

Dave, engineer's report. Everybody has Dave's report in their packet. Dave, do you have anything to add?

MR. LOPATKA: I do not.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Dave?

MR. HOOVER: I'11 cal1 you tomorrow.
MR. SEMENZA: Dave, we talked earlier about either stucco or Dryvit. Was
it stucco or Dryvit?
MR. LOPATKA: The walls are Dryvit.
MR. SEMENZA: I know lots of people had some questions. Possible didn't like the Dryvit look. Maybe Stucco. Is there a possible way we can go with stucco?

MR. LOPATKA: The plans are going out on Thursday. I could probably get something changed, if we need to, by then.

MR. NOTARI: How much more expensive is stucco? Lots?

MR. LOPATKA: It's lots.
MR. HOOVER: What's better durability, Dave?

MR. LOPATKA: Stucco, probably, because Dryvit just has a piece of foam under it and it's a thin layer. Stucco is actually a 1 ittle heavier.

MR. SEMENZA: Drive by Rite Aid, towards Insalaco's market. Kids threw rocks at the wall. They stick in it.

MR. LOPATKA: It doesn't take a lot to beat up Dryvit. It's a nice look, but I can see what we can do there.

MR. SEMENZA: It's a real thin coat
over foam board. Anybody else have anything for Dave? Dave, everything's going as planned with this building so far?

MR. LOPATKA: Yes. The bids go out -- it's been advertised 1 ast Thursday and Sunday and the plans and specs go out on Thursday. Just so you know, right now I have probably about 15 different bidders.

MR. SEMENZA: Good.
MR. LOPATKA: Or people asking for plans. I don't know how many are going to bid. It's quite a bit.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have questions for Dave? Thanks, Dave.

Bil1. Everybody has Bill's report.
Bill, do you anything to add?
ATTY. RINALDI: Let me go back to the vehicle question. Chief, if you go under 1894(a)(1)(a), "the storage or maintenance in the open of any more or one of the following: Unlicensed vehicles." Okay? That's where it is. On your property.

Then getting back to my report, there's a floodplain ordinance for adoption
tonight, so what we're going to do is repeal the old chapter 175 and replace it with the new chapter 175, and it's going to be enforced by an administrator, which would be the code enforcement officer and any agency that may be hired such as the borough mentioned or anybody that needs any extra specialties as directed by our engineer. In the absence of a code enforcement officer the president of council would have the ability to higher that person.

So $I$ know it's lengthy, but this is all to bring us in compliance with -- Dave, jump in here.

MR. LOPATKA: They're wasn't a lot of -- there's some change to what you had existing, but this is to bring us up into compliance with the new floodplain requirements.

ATTY. RINALDI: That's so people can get flood insurance when required. We get covered as well.

MS. BARTOLETTI: We were told by the county that we had to do it.

MR. LOPATKA: Actually the new flood
maps will be coming out shortly with that.
ATTY. RINALDI: Secondly, the towing ordinance, I tried to get everybody copies last week so if there was anything anybody wanted to change. Not saying you can't make a change tonight at the meeting. Before enactment it can be amended. I believe that's it $I$ wanted to point out on my report.

MR. SEMENZA: One thing I want to -and I meant to call you, Bill. I apologize I didn't. On that ordinance, why is Lokuta's towing on there?

ATTY. RINALDI: Lokuta is there because my understanding is Lokuta tows within the borough for AAA. So your ordinance is authorizing who can tow in the borough, so we put them on there just because they come into the borough.

MR. FEBBO: We want them to be in compliance with our ordinance.

MR. SEMENZA: Absolutely. I get
that. I was just curious why that was on there.

ATTY. RINALDI: That's pretty much
what I was told. That's correct, Chief?
That's who does the towing for AAA in the borough?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yes. We call AAA.
Lokuta's the one that shows up because under AAA guidelines we're classified as Luzerne County. I'm not sure why. But Lokuta comes out for us.

MR. SEMENZA: So Billy, Mike or --
ATTY. RINALDI: That may change when AAA changes who their tower is, and they just have to come in and we can amend that list.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions on either of these ordinances?

MR. NOTARI: I have a question for Bill regarding something else. Bill, our emergency declaration, do we have to end it? Do we have to vote to end that?

ATTY. RINALDI: It ends when the governor repeals his.

MR. SEMENZA: We don't have to act on any kind of state emergency.

ATTY. RINALDI: So it's authorized by the governor, and when he rescinds it
automatically dies with it.
MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?
Anybody have any questions for Bill?
Thanks, Bill.
Marylynn, borough manager's report.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Okay. First, does anyone have any questions on any of the financial reports of the borough?

MR. SEMENZA: I want to know why the X is through that one piece of --

MS. BARTOLETTI: That's under the sewer department. I know exactly what part you're talking about. I put an $X$ through it just to let you know that that particular portion is a work in progress. Those are figures put in by the auditors. But everything else is perfect and exactly up to date.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else?
MS. BARTOLETTI: Just to follow up from last meeting when we talked about the Municipay, we're supposed to have that up and running, and as soon as it is complete, that's when the sewer bills are going to be mailed out.

MR. SEMENZA: Did we receive the device yet?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, not yet. It's probably shipped to us, but they're working right now on getting the programming done so we can post it on our website.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?
MS. BARTOLETTI: No.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Marylynn?

MR. NOTARI: So let's start with that. Do you have a date where you want to mail the sewer bills out by?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yeah, it was Apri1.
MR. NOTARI: So we really don't know when this thing is going to show up?

MS. BARTOLETTI: I'm hoping within two weeks they'11 be in the mail. The envelopes are ready, everything's ready to rol 1.

MR. NOTARI: We're going green on Friday. Are we going to open the parks?

MR. SEMENZA: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: On Friday they're going to be ready to be opened.

MS. BARTOLETTI: And we're going to open the playgrounds as well?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.
MR. NOTARI: Perfect. That answers that question.

MR. SEMENZA: Joe Lenceski, I'd still like you to sanitize first thing in the morning.

MS. BARTOLETTI: We have it all planned out to be sanitized. Joe and I have a schedule set up. Then also hand sanitizers in all the parks as well.

MR. NOTARI: Fantastic. My last question, Mare, have we sprayed for bugs in the past? The junior football and the little league asked if we could spray the fields for gnats. Have we done that before? MS. AVVISATO: My ex-husband used to do it. Right?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, that's
something totally different. He does the rodents. The only time would be when the county sprays for the mosquitoes in general.

I don't know that we've actually --
MR. SEMENZA: Rick, reach out to

Rocco and see if he can come down with his fogger and fog the area. Rocco Genovese. He's the West Nile Virus guy.

MR. NOTARI: Junior football has actually offered to do it themselves if we couldn't do it. So if that's not a problem I'11 tell them go ahead. Spray for bugs, is what they told me.

MR. SEMENZA: What are they spraying? Is it hazardous to anybody that lives in the neighborhood?

MR. NOTARI: Well, I would hope they wouldn't spray anything hazardous if they're going to have a hundred kids there practicing.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm not on the board anymore but I was last year. I remember Joe Dominic either contacted or he tried to contact you last year, Marylynn, because they were going to do it last year.

I don't think they did it because nobody gave them permission. But they said what they were spraying would have been completely safe because they knew kids are down there, there's wildilfe, neighbors. I
don't think they did it last year but I think they inquired about it. I told them, since I was on their board and our board, I said $I$ would contact the borough office first, inquire, ask questions, because you're definitely going to need permission from the borough before you go ahead. They said because we'll do it on our own expense. I said call them and ask them.

I think it ran too late in the season and just didn't do it last year, but I know at one of their board meetings last year they said the chemical they were using was going to be completely safe. They were getting a professional service in there and everything. I think they would probably be using the same person or the same material for sure.

MR. SEMENZA: What I would like to do, actually, and I know that they do set traps down at Pagnotti Park, test for the West Nile Virus. Maybe, Marylynn, if you want to reach out to Lackawanna County and see if they do test. If there's an abundance of them they will come down and
spray. They spray areas.
MR. LETTIERI: If they do have a chemical, Joe or whoever is getting it, all they have to do is just basically come up with an MSDS sheet and that basically contains everything. If it's hazardous or if it's not. But they should have to hand that to us.

MR. SEMENZA: What I'm saying is when he sets traps and he gets mosquitoes he knows the right amount of spray to spray out. This is a countywide thing that's done here. He'11 know if it contained West Nile Virus or not. If they go spray on their own they're not going to know all these things. How much product to put down. That's my opinion.

MR. NOTARI: We11, they're not going to do it on their own. They're going to hire somebody to do it. They're worried about the gnats. You know what it's like down there on a muggy night. Those gnats are all over the place. They were going to hire somebody. They weren't going to go find a product and spray it themselves.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I'11 talk to Lou Dominic and find out.

MR. NOTARI: Thank you.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else? Thanks, Marylynn. At this time the chair is going to go down the table, see if anybody has anything to address. Councilman Febbo?

MR. FEBBO: No, I'm good.
MR. NOTARI: No, I'm good.
MR. HOOVER: No, I'm good. Just that $I$ want to keep on until we get that situation that we had today straightened out. I don't want to forget about it. I apologize the way $I$ voted, but $I$ voted on the kid's background. It disturbed me today when $I$ saw that. We'11 get it taken care of.

MR. LETTIERI: The only thing $I$ have is actually piggybacking off of Rick with the parks. For the fields, are they able to do maintenance now or do we have to wait until we go green?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, our staff has been working.

MR. LETTIERI: I've been approached
by a couple guys with the little league and softball if they can go and work on the fields now or do we have to wait.

MR. SEMENZA: Tell them to contact Marylynn.

MS. BARTOLETTI: As soon as Friday hits everything will be pretty much back to normal as far as working on the fields and everything. But our staff that we employ, they've been working, doing all the general needs.

MR. LETTIERI: So nobody else could do it except our staff?

MS. BARTOLETTI: We11, Friday they can start. It's only three more days.

MR. LETTIERI: That's it.
MS. AVVISATO: We had a long-range committee meeting last night, and Marylynn also joined us because she's the brains of the borough. We discussed the CDBG funding money and what projects we'd 1 ike to get done. Do you want me to discuss them?

MR. SEMENZA: Yes.
MS. AVVISATO: Well, part of the money will be used for the elevator in the
borough building.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.
MS. AVVISATO: She mentioned the AC and heating unit in the senior citizens center, upstairs and downstairs?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.
MS. AVVISATO: We would like to put a few windows in the downstairs center. There's only one window, and Mr. Febbo and myself and Marylynn were claustrophobic last night walking through it. So we believe that we need some windows down there.

Also, we thought we could do the lighting system at the Pagnotti and Marion Street parks for the walking trails. We're going to look into that. And Saint Lawrence's complex and sewer separation in some locations.

MR. SEMENZA: You mean storm-sewer separation. Right?

MS. AVVISATO: Couple ideas that we would like to proceed with.

MR. NOTARI: All sounds good.
MR. SEMENZA: I like the lights idea, too.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Part of the reason why we met is we need to supply Lackawanna County with our needs assessment. It needs to be updated. So what we are going to do is completely disregard the old needs assessment, because it's probably at least 16 years old, and we're going to add all these items in basically as a wish iist.

So what will happen is once we use our elevator money, then we still have resource availability plus the 2020 money coming in. So they 1 ike to know the game plan going forward.

MS. AVVISATO: Does that sound good?
MR. SEMENZA: Yes, fantastic. They need 1 ights around the parks. Did you say Miles Street also? Lights at the Miles Street park?

MS. AVVISATO: Marion. That's it.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: No items, Mr.
Chairman. I'm fine tonight. Thank you.
MR. SEMENZA: I have nothing myself.
Marylynn, is there any public input?
MS. BARTOLETTI: No.
MR. SEMENZA: Okay. At this time
the chair is going a go to new business. Ordinance No. 4 of 2020, an ordinance requiring all persons, partnerships, businesses and corporations obtain a permit for any construction or development providing for the issuance for such permits setting forth certain minimum requirements for new construction and development within the areas of 01d Forge Borough which are subject to flooding, establishing penalties for any persons who fail or refuse to comply within the requirements or provisions of the ordinance, replacing any ordinance in conflict herewith, and replacing chapter 175 code of the borough of 01d Forge with said ordinance.

MR. NOTARI: I'11 make that motion. MR. SEMENZA: By Councilman Notari. May I have a second?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'll second it.

MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by Councilman Rinaldi. On the question? Public input? Roll call, please. MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilwoman

Avvisato?
MS. AVVISATO: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?
MR. FEBBO: Yes.

It's an ordinance authorizing the 01d Forge Borough Police Department to remove, impound and tow vehicles within the borough of Old Forge, requiring towers to meet certain qualifications and regulations for towing within the borough of 01d Forge and penalties for any person who fails or refuses to comply with the requirements or provisions of this ordinance.

MR. FEBBO: I'11 make that motion.
MR. SEMENZA: By Councilman Febbo.
MR. HOOVER: I'11 second it.
MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by Councilman Hoover. On the question? Bill, on the question, do $I$ have to state the towers that are in this?

ATTY. RINALDI: If you want to you can add them.

MR. SEMENZA: The tower's are Billy's from 01d Forge Gulf, Lokuta's Towing, Mike Schuback Towing, and Pneumatic Towing. Lokuta's Towing is a AAA member. They're the only AAA that does the borough of 01d Forge.

ATTY. RINALDI: So should it pass, what $I$ would do is send a copy of the ordinance to each of those towers or maybe have the chief deliver it. It's up to you.

MR. SEMENZA: Chief, I'd like you to actually hand deliver it, and if they have any questions on the ordinance you'11 be there to answer it. Paul, if you go with Chief Dubernas to deliver them.

MR. PAPI: Absolutely.

MR. SEMENZA: Motion on the floor. On the question? Public input? Roll call, please.
