tonight's meeting is to set the agenda for our September 22nd meeting. We'll hear from our department heads, see if they have anything for the agenda. There's a public sign-in sheet if anybody would like to address council. We'll go town the table, see if any council members have anything to address.

At this time I'm going to go to our department heads. Paul Papi, zoning code enforcement. Do you have anything for the agenda?

MR. PAPI: At the moment I don't, but after Thursday's planning commission meeting I might. I'll let you know.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Paul? Thanks, Paul.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Joe? Joe, how is everything going?

24	Chief Dubernas, anything for the
25	agenda?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Just Matt Brown. I finally got clarification. I spoke to the chief legal assistant out of Pennsylvania Parole and DOC. I got a letter that clarified everything.

The only other thing, I'm not sure if it's for the agenda or not. Chris Coyne reached out to me about blocking the alley from Oak Street. He couldn't be here so Mark is here. It's no issue on our end. It's not a state road. You guys make the decision. That's it.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Chief Dubernas? Chief, the last meeting I asked for a cop to be in the park. Did we do that?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: They've been there.

MR. SEMENZA: They have not.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Nick told me he was there every night.

MR. SEMENZA: They have not. I asked for one specific officer four hours a day when things go on. I made an issue to talk to the coaches, people that work the stand, people there. They did not see cops

there at all. They see them drive around the park. The cops do not get out and go in that park.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I'll address it.

MR. SEMENZA: Chief --

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Because I have a second second-shifter on.

MR. SEMENZA: Well, there's nobody in the park. I was down there today at my kid's game from 5:30 to 6:30. I did not see one cop in there. Fifty people in the park. I mean, I don't know. I don't think I'm asking much here. Especially when it was approved by council to do it. I don't see where the issue is. That's all I have.

Dave, engineer's report.

MR. LOPATKA: I don't have anything for the agenda. You'll get my report before the meeting. I don't have anything for the agenda.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Dave? Thanks, Dave.

Bill, anything for the agenda?

ATTY. RINALDI: So you're going to have an ordinance authorizing the issuance

1 of a government obligation note of 2020 for \$2 million with the Old Forge Bank. They're 2 3 going to approve it next week at their 4 meeting. They have all the information. 5 Besides that, there is a request to -- and we can talk about it in executive 6 session, a request from the school district 7 8 to split the cost of another appraisal for 9 the tax appeal. 10 The school district MR. SEMENZA: 11 wants us to split the cost of an appraisal for what? 12 13 ATTY. RINALDI: Do an appraisal with 14 regards to a tax appeal. MR. SEMENZA: Where? 15 16 ATTY. RINALDI: Panel Prints. 17 they made a request of myself and --18 MR. SEMENZA: What's the cost to 19 appraise it? 20 ATTY. RINALDI: It's \$2,500. 21 can't give you more information on it 22 because the county hasn't signed off on it 23 yet either. 24 MR. SEMENZA: So is it going to be a

three-way split?

25

ATTY. RINALDI: They're asking for a three way -- well, that's what everybody wants, a three-way split. In other words, they asked to split the cost, and the solicitor for the assessment office for the county asked to do a third each. So it's gone to the assessor's to make a determination from the assessor's solicitor, and we got the same request from the school district solicitor. It's \$2,500 to do the appraisal, then it goes to court. It's \$750 a day to pay for -- it's their witness. It's not the county, it's more the school district.

I was just doing a calculation on millage. I think I calculated it right. The difference between what the county wants and where it's currently assessed at is \$185,000, which is for the borough -- if I calculated right it's \$3,745 in revenue for the borough. That's what they're arguing about, that difference.

MR. SEMENZA: That's the whole, what it's going to be for the three taxing bodies. So how much for us?

.

ATTY. RINALDI: Well --

MS. BARTOLETTI: That's the difference of what they want.

ATTY. RINALDI: In other words, the county looked at the issue, went to the property and came up with a number that they would agree to reduce it to. That would lower our share 3,400-some dollars. I didn't calculate the amount. But they're significantly higher than us.

MR. SEMENZA: We're the lowest.

ATTY. RINALDI: We're the lowest taxing body. Correct?

ATTY. RINALDI: Right, we're the lowest. We get the least. The assessor and the county board went through the whole building and looked at comparables and that's where they came up with their number. The assessor's office came up with the adjustment to lower it. That does not seem to meet the satisfaction of the school district. It met the satisfaction of the taxpayer and the assessor's office, but not the school district. We haven't chimed in because we're waiting for the school

district to agree.

So actually on Monday they had a pretrial, and now the school district -- if they're going to trial they need an appraisal, and they're asking to split the cost with the assessor's and us. A three-way split.

Now, the assessor's office can say no, you're the one complaining. We're not going to spend the money. I haven't heard back from them. It's up to us. Then it would be a two-way split. I mean, we can answer on the one-third split, see what happens.

MR. FEBBO: Do they want us to split the cost of going to court in this case?

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, they want us to split the cost of the appraisal. They can get it appraised, the assessor's office, and say we don't agree with your appraisal. We're not going lower. So we would be siding with the school district, saying okay, we'll agree with your appraiser if it's to our benefit.

MR. SEMENZA: It's still not going

1 to guarantee anything. 2 ATTY. RINALDI: No, they go to a 3 hearing or they negotiate it out. I know 4 the last I heard was they were trying to 5 reconsider that stipulation on a lower amount, but I guess it didn't go anywhere if 6 Then 7 they're looking to do an appraisal. 8 again, has the school board had any official 9 meetings yet? 10 MR. SEMENZA: I don't believe so. 11 MR. NOTARI: They've been meeting. 12 Not this month. ATTY. RINALDI: When was their last 13 14 meeting? 15 MR. NOTARI: The fourth Wednesday. 16 Just last week, I think. The fourth 17 Wednesday of the month. 18 ATTY. RINALDI: Evidently they 19 didn't agree to the stipulation, so they 20 want to appraise it. I just got this on the 21 25th. 22 MR. SEMENZA: All right. I guess we 23 wait and see what they do. Right? 24 ATTY. RINALDI: A third is \$833. 25 That much money I guess we can say yeah,

I'm

1 we'll split it three ways. We have in the 2 past. 3 MR. SEMENZA: This has happened in 4 the past? 5 ATTY. RINALDI: Well, we just split the appraisals on the tax appeals for 6 Dunbar's property. There's four of them. 7 8 But I think that was at the assessor's 9 office's suggestion because they didn't have 10 an appraisal. 11 MR. SEMENZA: Anything else? 12 ATTY. RINALDI: That's it. 13 waiting to hear back from the state reps on 14 my language. I added the language about the 15 Project 70 land. That's it. If they 16 approve it, then we can approve the official 17 resolution or they take it from there. 18 Either way. 19 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any 20 questions for Bill? 21 MR. FEBBO: To comment on your 22 information, Father Gus said that -- he's on 23 the committee with the diocese to close the 24 church, and they're going to move forward 25 with that in September. We should hear

1 something from them. 2 ATTY. RINALDI: Well, they have to 3 notify us in writing. That's in the 4 language. As soon as we get that we have 90 5 days. MR. HOOVER: Anything on Stocki? 6 7 Supposedly I was ATTY. RINALDI: 8 supposed to get records Friday and Monday. 9 I talked to the judge's office Friday and 10 today we're supposed to get them. 11 MR. HOOVER: You still didn't get them? 12 13 ATTY. RINALDI: Still didn't get 14 The check is there to drop off. them. 15 MR. FEBBO: I went by there today 16 three different times. Three different 17 times three different pieces of equipment 18 are coming in. Unbelievable. I happened to 19 see three different --20 ATTY. RINALDI: Were they all 21 together? 22 No, separate. MR. FEBBO: Three 23 different times of the day. Everything 24 incoming. 25 MR. HOOVER: He still didn't set a

1 date for the last hearing. ATTY. RINALDI: No, there's no more 2 3 hearings. It's just me submitting my brief. MR. FEBBO: I don't know where he's 4 5 putting everything. I can't imagine where he's fitting all that stuff. 6 7 MR. PAPI: I called him the other 8 day and I had him cut all the bamboo that 9 was growing onto Church Street. 10 MR. SEMENZA: Hill Crest Shades? 11 MR. PAPI: Yes. 12 MR. SEMENZA: Anything else? 13 Anybody else? Thanks, Bill. Marylynn? 14 MS. BARTOLETTI: For the agenda we 15 will have a couple of CDBG resolutions for 16 the county. Other than the ones we already 17 passed, of course. 18 Just to let everybody know, the 19 sewer bills are finally mailed out, and if 20 we could have an executive tonight I have a 21 couple things for council. 22 MR. SEMENZA: Okay. I'd ask to have 23 an executive with all department heads after 24 the meeting.

MR. NOTARI: Mare, has anybody paid

25

yet online?

MS. BARTOLETTI: The bills just went out, so I'm figuring the people -- probably the first ones will get them tomorrow, and we'll go from there. Someone called last week and they knew that they owed a balance, and we referred them to it and they did it without problems.

MR. NOTARI: Good.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else?

MR. HOOVER: Did Gary Propersi --

MS. BARTOLETTI: Well, he was supposed to move on Friday and he's not packed, so I don't know. I figured he wouldn't be here tonight. I didn't know if there was something that I missed, if there was a change of plans.

MR. SEMENZA: You were ready to go on Friday. Right? It wasn't our DPW that wasn't ready to do anything?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No. So what they did instead is they worked on the senior center. So both sections are cleaned out. They did a great job on that. Today they moved some of the furniture out of the

23	speak. Do you want to address council?
24	MR. MATYLEWICZ: Mark Matylewicz, 1
25	Stone Hill Drive. It's in reference to a

1 request made by Dooley's Pub & Eatery to have a boxing venue in our parking lot and a 2 3 request by the owners of Dooley's for 4 council to consider closing down the 5 alleyway, which would be --MR. PAPI: Meade. 6 MR. MATYLEWICZ: From the hours of 7 8 6:00 in the morning until 9:00 in the 9 evening on the date specified. 10 MR. SEMENZA: Chief, would we open 11 it up at 9:00 at night or wait? 12 CHIEF DUBERNAS: That would be up to 13 them guys. Once the ring is gone we'll 14 remove the horses. 15 MR. SEMENZA: It will be down in no 16 time. 17 MR. MATYLEWICZ: It will be done 18 because it will be back to business as 19 usual. 20 MR. SEMENZA: Do you have the 21 sketches? 22 MR. MATYLEWICZ: I was told he gave 23 them to you. 24 MR. SEMENZA: I didn't take them. 25 MR. FEBBO: What's the time factor?

1 MR. MATYLEWICZ: It will be a late afternoon match, and he'll still have to put 2 3 the card together. I have nothing to do 4 with Northeast Boxing. I'm just the venue 5 with Dooley's. But he should have it done and cleaned up before or right around the 6 time of normal business hours, which would 7 8 probably be between 5:00 and 7:00. 9 The ring will be where, MR. FEBBO: 10 right in the alley? 11 MR. MATYLEWICZ: No, the ring is 12 going to be in our parking lot. So if 13 you're going down Oak Street heading toward 14 Main you take a right into Dooley's. have that small section of lot there. 15 16 shouldn't effect parking. 17 MR. FEBBO: What do you expect for 18 attendance? 19 MR. MATYLEWICZ: That's always 20 tough, since it's not my venue. You're 21 probably looking at 300, 400 people. 22 MR. SEMENZA: You can't go over 250. 23 MR. FEBBO: Seating? 24 MR. MATYLEWICZ: There's ring 25 seating, and then I guess it would be

considered VIP seating, which would be in the restaurant portion of it. If somebody wanted to come in and have a meal they would be able to sit on our upper and lower decks. So it's still an outside venue and socially safe.

MR. FEBBO: Tickets are going to be sold for the exact amount?

MR. MATYLEWICZ: Yes.

MR. SEMENZA: He told me he's going to have three different tickets, colors.

One will be for the lower deck, one for the outside, one for the upper deck.

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$ FEBB0: Will it be in compliance with the governor --

MR. MATYLEWICZ: Correct.

MR. SEMENZA: One thing I ask is that you guys would have some kind of -- not security so much, but somebody at the corners saying the street's closed in case somebody tries to turn down quick, and at the other end, too. Just in case. We don't need our cops babysitting there all night. He does have his own security.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I told him we have

1 some horses and special event signs. 2 block the street off for him. 3 MR. SEMENZA: Pretty much it. Не 4 runs a pretty good show, so you don't have 5 anything to worry about. Like I said to him, we can't do anything until the 22nd of 6 7 September just because it is a voting 8 meeting. 9 MR. FEBBO: What's the date? 10 MR. SEMENZA: Bill, do we have to 11 vote to close a street down? 12 ATTY. RINALDI: That's a traffic 13 issue. You guys can decide. When is the 14 event? MR. MATYLEWICZ: October 3rd. 15 16 ATTY. RINALDI: You can tell him 17 we're going to vote on it next week, but it 18 appears everything's in order. 19 MR. SEMENZA: Appears everything's 20 in order. 21 MR. FEBBO: Can we give a tentative 22 approval? 23 MR. SEMENZA: We can do that. 24 MR. NOTARI: I don't even know why 25 we have to vote, to be honest with you.
