1 MR. SEMENZA: Good evening, ladies
2 and gentlemen. Welcome to the August 6th
3 work session for Old Forge Borough Council.
4 The purpose of tonight's meeting is to set
5 the agenda for the August 20th council
6 meeting. We'll hear from our department
7 heads, see if they have anything for the
8 agenda. We'll go down the table, see if
9 council has anything to address.

10 There's a public sign-in sheet if
11 anybody would like to address council. Roll
12 call, please.

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?

14 MR. FEBBO: Present.

15 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?

16 MR. NOTARI: Present.

17 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
18 Lettieri?

19 MR. LETTIERI: Present.

20 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Ferrett?

21 MR. FERRETT: Present.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Here.

24 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Semenza?

25 MR. SEMENZA: Here. Paul, the DPW,

1 anything for the agenda?

2 MR. PAPI: No.

3 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any
4 questions for Paul? Thank you, Paul.

5 Steve, zoning/code enforcement, do
6 you have anything for the agenda?

7 MR. BIERLYA: Pride Mobility, when
8 we had the last heavy rains, that storm
9 drain that we were asking them to put in and
10 include, Mr. Serino sent me a picture and I
11 sent it to Dave. It's flooding worse now
12 than it had been before. I don't know where
13 that stands with them with the drain and
14 with us.

15 MR. SEMENZA: Can we set up a
16 meeting with their engineer and Pride
17 Mobility?

18 MR. BIERLYA: I think Dave took care
19 of that. He talked to their engineer.

20 MR. LOPATKA: I met them out there.
21 I told you. I met them and then I talked to
22 Bob Aulisio, and he met with Pride's people
23 and their engineer. I told you last meeting
24 they're not doing anything.

25 MR. SEMENZA: I want to have a

1 meeting with them. Steve, can you present
2 those pictures for that meeting? Bill, I'd
3 like you at that meeting also. I guess it's
4 getting flooded worse. Their engineer for
5 that project, their contractor. I don't
6 know who else we have. I knew this was
7 going to happen from day one.

8 MR. LOPATKA: We said it. We
9 commented on it. They said no discharge.

10 MR. SEMENZA: They said there was
11 going to be nothing, we weren't going to
12 have a problem, it's going to be less than
13 what it was. Here we are today talking
14 about how it flooded. It's a shame.

15 MR. FERRETT: Dave, correct me if
16 I'm wrong, did you not tell me that they
17 notified you that they didn't want us
18 putting water into their dam --

19 MR. LOPATKA: That's what we talked
20 about last meeting.

21 MR. FERRETT: I don't understand.
22 We try to be good fellows to them, allow
23 this thing to come and everything, and what
24 I see up there now definitely, without any
25 question or doubt, I would never vote for

1 this project from my standpoint of view. I
2 would tell them go to the other side, from
3 the other side, and let them go to work and
4 put the thing over there.

5 You know what's going to happen now?
6 If you go up there and take a look at this
7 situation you're going to have a truck
8 problem on Wood Street. Believe me when I
9 tell you this. They're going to be sneaking
10 down, coming down through Old Forge trying
11 to go out through Moosic and all different
12 kind of ways unless we take the ball by the
13 horns.

14 I'm going to tell you something.
15 You better start thinking about looking at
16 the ordinances and come with an ordinance,
17 if we don't have one, about truck traffic on
18 that street and do something now, because
19 these people are not reliable. When we have
20 a water problem that's coming from their
21 property onto our property and they tell us
22 we don't want no water going into their dam,
23 that's to me doesn't make sense whatsoever.
24 Because you know what? They should be a
25 good neighbor just like we were to them.

1 MR. SEMENZA: That's the last word
2 they said to us, we want to be good
3 neighbors. Dave, set it up with Marylynn
4 and them and the contractor, engineer, Pride
5 Mobility.

6 MR. LOPATKA: I have a meeting with
7 Pride's engineer and contractor and you
8 guys.

9 MR. SEMENZA: Have the people come.
10 We said from day one it wasn't going to
11 work. We stood in the woods and said
12 there's going to be an issue.

13 MR. PAPI: I was up there after a
14 major storm and that area that we checked
15 out was perfect. What he's talking about is
16 up above.

17 MR. SEMENZA: I know where he's
18 talking about. We're getting water and I
19 knew water was going to be somewhere.

20 MR. PAPI: Everything at that area
21 was fine.

22 MR. SEMENZA: Anything else, Steve?

23 MR. BIERYLA: I just want to make
24 council aware at 345 Sussex I had made the
25 one half of the house uninhabitable due to

1 the animals and the ammonia smell. I was
2 with Laura from Griffen Pond today. They
3 removed an emaciated dog, nine live cats,
4 four dead cats. She's coming back tomorrow
5 to check out the ammonia level in the house,
6 and there's cockroaches. When she does that
7 I'm going to have her test the other side,
8 because if they're in one side they're in
9 the other side, and see if CYS could do
10 something. That side is almost as bad as
11 the left-hand side. It was supposed to get
12 cleaned up and taken care of. I'm going to
13 make that unfit for habitation, too. You
14 can't live in that.

15 MR. SEMENZA: Nope. Anything else?

16 MR. BIERYLA: No.

17 MR. SEMENZA: Last meeting an older
18 lady came in and asked about the Mariotti
19 property.

20 MR. BIERYLA: I went down and seen
21 the secretary at Mariotti's. I know he did
22 clean up over here. They requested that he
23 clean up everything in front of her house.

24 MR. SEMENZA: On that corner, as of
25 a couple days ago.

1 MR. BIERLYA: I also stickered all
2 the couches and mattresses that were on the
3 left-hand side.

4 MR. PAPI: Marion and Railroad? I
5 called Mariotti, too. There was silt all
6 over the road, too. She said Louis was
7 away. As soon as he comes back.

8 MR. BIERLYA: I'll reach out
9 tomorrow.

10 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else?

11 MR. NOTARI: Steve, the vegetation
12 at Ray's --

13 MR. BIERLYA: I spoke with him
14 today. I got a hold of Melissa on Monday.
15 He called me today. He said he would get on
16 it. I also told him about the truck that
17 was in there running all night long, using
18 it for a sleeping spot, and the vagrant that
19 the police had chased out of the lot. I
20 made Officer Buggy aware and I told Marylynn
21 about it.

22 Also the property down at 706 South
23 Main Street. They cut the grass but never
24 trim around the trees. I made him aware of
25 that.

1 MR. NOTARI: On the corner of
2 Henderson and Main?

3 MR. BIERLYA: The next one over.

4 MR. PAPI: They did trim the hedges
5 on that corner.

6 MR. NOTARI: There is a backhoe on
7 First Street across from Earl Talerico's
8 house. Doesn't look like it was moved in
9 weeks. Can you find out if it's part of the
10 Moosic Road construction project or if it's
11 privately owned and somebody has it parked
12 there? I mean, it's like a brand new --

13 MR. PAPI: It's part of the project.
14 I saw it working there.

15 MR. NOTARI: If it's somebody
16 that -- privately owned and they're parking
17 it there, is that legal? It's not like it
18 has any tags on it or anything.

19 MR. PAPI: I'll ask the contractors
20 tomorrow if it's their machine.

21 MR. NOTARI: We have to draw the
22 line somewhere. Old Forge is becoming Junk
23 Forge.

24 MR. SEMENZA: I believe it is part
25 of the paving project, if I'm not mistaken.

1 MR. NOTARI: You drive around town
2 it's just like -- it's got to stop. We've
3 had a nice residential community for such a
4 long time and it's just -- we just can't let
5 people park stuff, junk in their yards, on
6 the street, wherever they want. That's it.

7 MAYOR LEGG: Steve, I got a call
8 about a property on West Grace Street, 534,
9 Angeli.

10 MR. BIERYLA: Yes.

11 MAYOR LEGG: He called me and said
12 you had been down to see him. The roof is
13 buckled in. He doesn't think he can do any
14 repairs or a roof. He thinks it's going to
15 have to be torn down. I don't know why he
16 called me. He's crying poverty. Does the
17 borough do anything?

18 MR. BIERYLA: It's a dangerous
19 building. It's private property. The
20 reason I gave it to him, the house is into a
21 V and the children next door, if that
22 roof buckles the glass windows are going to
23 come out like a rocket. God forbid they're
24 walking down the sidewalk.

25 MR. SEMENZA: Have them call Steve

1 so it's not interpreted the wrong way.

2 MR. BIERYLA: He was in here and I
3 told him get a contractor and get a price,
4 see if they can shore it up or support it
5 for right now so it doesn't buckle until you
6 do something about it. Right now it's a
7 dangerous situation.

8 MAYOR LEGG: I'll tell him give you
9 a call.

10 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else? Thanks,
11 Steve. Dave?

12 MR. LOPATKA: I don't have anything
13 for the agenda. Just discussion on the
14 housing project, paving project. We did
15 inspect that last week, we walked it.
16 Everything was basically installed per plan,
17 per ordinance.

18 MR. SEMENZA: The last storm drain
19 on the corner of Eisenhower going down
20 towards Drakes Lane, there, that storm drain
21 is a dead storm drain. It doesn't go
22 anywhere.

23 MR. LOPATKA: We were looking at
24 paving.

25 MR. SEMENZA: They installed that

1 storm drain.

2 MR. PAPI: It ties into a manhole
3 right on the corner.

4 MR. SEMENZA: We couldn't find any
5 outlet in that storm drain.

6 MR. PAPI: It goes nowhere. It's
7 dead. That's the way they did the project
8 30 years ago. They never completed it
9 because they didn't know where to go with
10 it. The only place to go is down to Drake's
11 Lane but they didn't want to add more, but
12 it all goes there anyway. We don't have any
13 storm drains on Drake's Lane. We have a
14 sewer line.

15 They called me about that ten years
16 ago. We walked through the bamboo and there
17 was the lid popped off. I had Mike Ford
18 come down and he said it's a dead manhole.

19 MR. SEMENZA: You have a storm drain
20 system that goes absolutely nowhere. We
21 might as well not even put one in.

22 MR. PAPI: If we ever do anything
23 with Drake's Lane we'll tie it in.

24 MR. SEMENZA: Could that be one of
25 our issues for Drake's Lane there?

1 MR. PAPI: Absolutely. It just adds
2 to the whole street.

3 MR. SEMENZA: Anything else, Dave?

4 MR. LOPATKA: We'll be meeting
5 weekly with the architect, mechanical,
6 electric, plumbing, structure. We have a
7 meeting tomorrow morning at 9:30. We're
8 going to have one every week until the end
9 of the month.

10 MR. SEMENZA: Where are we at? What
11 are we looking at for time frame? Are we on
12 schedule?

13 MR. LOPATKA: At the end of the
14 month is what I told all them. That's why
15 we are having weekly meetings.

16 MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?

17 MR. LOPATKA: No.

18 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any
19 questions for Dave?

20 MR. NOTARI: Just on top of that,
21 we're looking for a plan by the end of the
22 month and then we'll put it out to bid to
23 approve it? So probably not anytime before
24 October.

25 MR. LOPATKA: Around there.

1 MR. NOTARI: That's if everything
2 goes as planned, that we can agree on cost.
3 Okay.

4 MR. FEBBO: DPW runoff over at the
5 garage, where are we at with that?

6 MR. LOPATKA: We're waiting for the
7 bids. I sent it out, two people I haven't
8 heard back from. I'll send it out again. I
9 think we have one bid.

10 MR. FEBBO: How long ago?

11 MR. LOPATKA: After the last
12 meeting. Everybody is busy now. Nobody
13 gets back to me. I'll have them within the
14 next week.

15 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any
16 questions for Dave? Thanks, Dave. Bill, do
17 you have anything for the agenda?

18 ATTY. RINALDI: The CDBG agreement
19 we are going to do at the next meeting.
20 Allocation of money. Marylynn will fill you
21 in. Basically our share and what goes to
22 us. Right now they have \$269,219, and
23 \$129,964 for fiscal year 2018 CDBG fund. So
24 the county gets \$269,219 and the borough
25 gets \$129,964, which is pretty much on par

1 with what we usually get.

2 I just need a brief executive
3 meeting to go over some litigation stuff and
4 a real estate matter.

5 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any
6 questions for Bill?

7 MR. FERRETT: You were spoused to
8 check into Angela Drive with Ciuccio.

9 ATTY. RINALDI: I did. I called his
10 attorney. He hasn't called back. I suspect
11 there's a reason for that. We may hear
12 about it tonight. I asked him if he would
13 be willing to dedicate the roads. I have a
14 feeling he probably hasn't called his
15 attorney back because he's got some issues
16 down the street here with a job, with Steve.

17 MR. SEMENZA: What's going on there?

18 MR. BIERYLA: A cigar store they
19 started.

20 ATTY. RINALDI: They started without
21 a permit or a plan.

22 MR. BIERYLA: Next to Billy G's,
23 where Wansacz's office was. They start
24 ripping it apart and they're putting a cigar
25 store in there. I shut them down. I put a

1 stop work order. The contractor came over
2 with the workers. I told him you can't work
3 in here unless you've got three sets of
4 architectural plans. It's got to go through
5 Joe, you have to come to planning. The
6 sticker's still there and they're not
7 working on that side that I know of.

8 ATTY. RINALDI: I talked to his
9 attorney twice. I can follow up again. I
10 haven't heard back from him.

11 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have anything
12 else for Bill?

13 MR. FEBBO: Bill, do you want to
14 touch base with the Stocki deal?

15 ATTY. RINALDI: I was going to do
16 that in executive session.

17 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else? Thanks,
18 Bill. Marylynn?

19 MS. BARTOLETTI: One thing I wanted
20 to bring up, since there's so much talk
21 about the paving, Joe and I were discussing
22 that -- do you want to talk about crack
23 sealing?

24 MR. FERRETT: I'm not going to talk
25 about it, I'm just going to bring it up to

1 put it on the agenda.

2 MS. BARTOLETTI: I had told you how
3 much we had budgeted. We budgeted \$50,000
4 for crack sealing for roads.

5 There's two other things. They're
6 not agenda items. LLVSA has given the
7 borough a check for \$20,000. So we received
8 that last week, I believe.

9 I have a meeting set up on August
10 30th at 10:30 a.m. to meet with Senator
11 Blake and Representative Kosierowski to
12 discuss with them future grants that I'm
13 applying for and asking them to come to our
14 property so we show them firsthand what
15 we're planning on doing as far as remodeling
16 the borough building and eventually
17 remodeling the Main Street. They can see
18 firsthand what we really need here and why
19 we're asking them for money. So if any of
20 you are available it's August 30th, 10:30.

21 The other things I have are for
22 executive session. That's all I have.

23 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any
24 questions for Marylynn?

25 MAYOR LEGG: I know you worked very

1 hard applying for grants and what have you.
2 The school just got a half-million dollar
3 grant. Great for them. I'm happy for them,
4 but what gives?

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: I'm not sure. But
6 that's why -- I had this set up actually for
7 about two months already. I figure by
8 having them come here to look at the borough
9 building and see how -- I'm going to use the
10 word dilapidated and antiquated. That's why
11 I want them to come and personally see the
12 crumbling part of the front of the building
13 and everything and see what we're asking for
14 money for so when they say other projects
15 are better they will know that's not the
16 case.

17 MR. FEBBO: They agreed to come?

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

19 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else? Thanks,
20 Marylynn. At this time the chair is going
21 to go into public input. Anybody want to
22 speak?

23 MR. GENOVESE: Bill Genovese, 112
24 South Main Street, Old Forge. Billy G's.
25 I'm here to -- we're going to open a cigar

1 bar next door. Steve came over and we were
2 cleaning the place out. The only
3 construction in there is going to be putting
4 two smoke eaters in. Besides that there's
5 actually no physical construction going on.
6 We're not adding to it. We're putting in a
7 humidor. The only construction part is the
8 air vent.

9 So I'm here to find out what I have
10 to do to get this ball rolling.

11 MR. BIERLYA: Actually, you were to
12 be here last Thursday for the planning
13 meeting.

14 MR. GENOVESE: I was here last
15 Wednesday. They told me the wrong day.

16 MR. BIERLYA: Because I had you on
17 the agenda for the planning meeting.
18 Basically you just have to get the approval,
19 get plans from BIU. Once you get the plans,
20 come back to planning for the approval, that
21 will be the first Thursday of September.
22 Then explain to them, and by that time you
23 should have your plans and know exactly what
24 your building aspect is. Whether you have
25 to have handicapped bathrooms or not. Then

1 we'll go from there.

2 MR. SEMENZA: John?

3 MR. JUROSKY: We talked about
4 junkyard. I'll show you pictures. You
5 guys -- I've talked about it.

6 MR. SEMENZA: I mean, I'm looking at
7 this here and I see a million different
8 violations. Blocking a sidewalk.

9 MR. JUROSKY: My main concern is he
10 rolls that car down the hill, the first car
11 by itself. The car on Main and Butler, he
12 has a rock holding the car back. If some
13 kids knock the rock out someone's going to
14 get hurt.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: They're all
16 the same pictures.

17 MR. JUROSKY: If he got rid of those
18 junk cars there would be no problem.

19 MR. SEMENZA: On that one you need
20 three feet for a handicapped person to go
21 through the sidewalk. I know for a long
22 time what you're talking about.

23 MR. BIERYLA: Officer Buggy and
24 Officer --

25 MR. SEMENZA: I know these are all

1 legitimate violations, police violations.

2 MR. BIERLYA: Officer Buggy and
3 Officer Kimbal went over there, I want to
4 say Thursday or Friday. They ran eight cars
5 parked on the road. Seven of them were
6 people in the neighborhood. That was it.
7 Seven out of the eight were people in the
8 neighborhood that lived there. That was
9 last week. I know Officer Kimbal was going
10 to call the state police and find out the
11 rules and regulations for cars, service
12 stations. I believe he was going to ask a
13 state inspector to come down and review the
14 station. That was last Thursday or Friday.
15 You'd have to really talk to Officer Davies
16 or Kimbal. They came back and told me they
17 had it reported.

18 MR. FEBBO: So what we're doing is
19 taking it to the next level.

20 MR. NOTARI: I just want to add
21 something to Mr. Jurosky's evidence, I
22 guess. Within the last week I was looking
23 to make a short cut, so I left Turkey Hill
24 and I made a right up Main Street. I was
25 going to go around the block and go down at

1 Center. When I went to turn onto Butler
2 Street there was a Snap tool truck in the
3 middle of the road. There was nowhere to
4 park because of all these cars. The big
5 truck was parked in the middle of the road,
6 nobody in it. There was a car coming down
7 and was on the wrong side of the road as I
8 turned and then had to swerve out of the way
9 to let that car now come through. Then she
10 could barely get up the street because now
11 there's a car on the corner to go to Garber.

12 If these cars aren't there and that
13 truck is parked to the side of the road
14 there's enough for anybody to get through.
15 There could have easily been an accident, an
16 emergency there.

17 I mean, I don't know. There has to
18 be something we can do. There has to be.
19 Because it's not only a nuisance to the
20 neighbors up there but now it's a safety
21 hazard. I don't know. The only reason that
22 truck is parked in the mile of the road is
23 because they were doing service to that
24 business.

25 MR. SEMENZA: I'm going to go to

1 what he said one more time, that he's using
2 the public roadway for his parking lot for
3 his business. And I know what you're
4 saying, that seven of the eight cars were --
5 that might have been that day, but there's a
6 lot of times -- I see three or four cars
7 right here, Steve, that definitely are for
8 his business.

9 MR. BIERLYA: I know Dave was going
10 to look into the statute of what a garage
11 can and can't do as far as public street
12 parking. So what I'm telling you is some of
13 those are state laws that would supersede
14 our regulations but he's going to get back
15 to me on it.

16 MR. JUROSKY: There's cars with no
17 tags. That's a junkyard. They're there for
18 months or two years. This is a residential
19 neighborhood.

20 MR. FEBBO: Can you cite him for a
21 nuisance property?

22 MAYOR LEGG: I'm going to sit with
23 Mr. Kimbal and Officer Davies, see when the
24 state police are coming down. In two weeks
25 I'll report back to you how we're making

1 out.

2 MR. JURISKY: Since Thursday or
3 Friday he has tried to straighten up a
4 little bit but he's nowhere near where he
5 should be.

6 MR. SEMENZA: I wish we could
7 physically go up there and remove them
8 ourselves, but unfortunately -- it's
9 not that we don't want to do something for
10 you.

11 MR. JURISKY: If I give up it will
12 be forgotten about. That's why I'm here.

13 MR. SEMENZA: Nobody else? At this
14 time the chair is going to go down the
15 table, see if anybody has anything to add.

16 MAYOR LEGG: Paul, I got a call
17 before I came here. Where Diane's place is,
18 she cuts dog hair, on Sundays, usually,
19 people from church are blocking the driveway
20 and she can't get her car out. She has
21 asked me about a no parking, driveway or
22 something sign. I talked to the chief
23 before, he recommended I ask you. Is that
24 feasible? Is that something we can do? Or
25 is there anything we can do?

1 MR. PAPI: It's up to council. They
2 can put signs wherever they want. I'll have
3 to order a sign and put it up.

4 MR. SEMENZA: When you have calls
5 like that refer them to Marylynn's office so
6 she can note it and bring it to council's
7 attention. Councilman Febbo?

8 MR. FEBBO: I'm good.

9 MR. NOTARI: Being we're into August
10 and we're going to be talking budget soon,
11 I'd like to seriously consider thinking
12 about hiring a parks and rec director. I
13 think that position is in the budget and I
14 think it is something that we should discuss
15 and talk about filling. Discuss in
16 executive.

17 Also, a part-time position for the
18 code enforcement/sewer department to give us
19 an extra hand. Steve is overwhelmed with
20 things, I believe, just from sitting here the
21 last year and a half, two years.

22 MR. SEMENZA: We have that
23 allocated, too, I think.

24 MR. NOTARI: Not to take away from
25 the job that Steve's doing. Not at all. I

1 just think that with some help I think he
2 could do a better job just because it would
3 give him more time to do the actual
4 enforcement of the codes and not necessarily
5 paperwork and things of that nature.

6 So I'd like to consider that as we
7 move forward with the budget. That's all I
8 have.

9 MR. LETTIERI: The only thing, when
10 I was looking at the packet from Bill
11 Rinaldi about the school police officer,
12 what are we doing with that? Because
13 there's all these options on here. Have we
14 decided what we're going to do over there?

15 MAYOR LEGG: We can't do anything
16 without the chief here. We're down three
17 cops. We have nothing in the pool as far as
18 hiring part-timers, so until the chief gets
19 back we may be able to pop over. We're
20 going to be over there in the mornings when
21 the kids are going in, and we'll be there
22 when they're coming out. But we don't have
23 the manpower to put somebody in there.

24 MR. LETTIERI: What about speaking
25 to the school? Because there's some options

1 here for --

2 MR. NOTARI: When we met with them
3 last time -- I don't think you were here.
4 When we met with them we gave them our
5 thoughts about them hiring their own police
6 officer. We told them where we were
7 staffing wise. We let them know we would
8 not be able to have somebody in the building
9 during the entire day at this point. So
10 they were going to look into what they had
11 to do. We have not heard anything different
12 from them.

13 So as the mayor said, that's the
14 plan right now going forward. We'll have
15 somebody there in the beginning and at the
16 end of the day. Obviously we're right here
17 if something were to happen.

18 MR. SEMENZA: Could you set up
19 another meeting before school starts?

20 MR. NOTARI: Sure.

21 MR. SEMENZA: With all this stuff
22 going on it makes me nervous. I'd like to
23 see something happen even if we have to push
24 them into it or whatever.

25 MR. NOTARI: I have no problem

1 meeting with them, but are we going to push
2 them into something they can't afford, too.
3 They're going to try to probably do the same
4 thing to us.

5 MAYOR LEGG: They got \$500,000. I
6 think I saw something in there about putting
7 up some kind of thing in front of the
8 school.

9 MR. SEMENZA: A vestibule.

10 MR. NOTARI: My discussions with the
11 board president, they were still looking
12 into what they could do with the money.
13 Obviously, our first suggestion is would you
14 hire an officer. But they were looking to
15 see if they could use that for salary. I'll
16 set up another meeting.

17 MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?

18 MR. LETTIERI: No.

19 MR. FERRETT: The only thing I want
20 to bring to council's attention is that we
21 talked the last time about crack sealing.
22 I'd like to put for the next meeting on the
23 agenda that we approve a program that we're
24 going to present. The paving committee is
25 going to be looking at some roads in town

1 with Marylynn. There's a couple different
2 ways that Marylynn said we can look at this.

3 The only thing I want to bring to
4 council's attention is be aware of one
5 thing, that any crack sealing that we're
6 going to recommend is going to be the
7 streets that we paved in 2015 and 2017.
8 They're going to have priority.

9 MR. SEMENZA: I agree with you.

10 MR. NOTARI: He reminded me of
11 something.

12 MR. FERRETT: That's all.

13 MR. NOTARI: Paul, can you stop at
14 Jason O'Hern's house in Rosemount, the
15 corner of Edgewood and --

16 MR. PAPI: I know where he lives.

17 MR. NOTARI: He's having a problem
18 with water, since the pave, going into his
19 garage.

20 MR. PAPI: I believe it's all down
21 hill.

22 MR. NOTARI: He said all he's asking
23 for is a little bituminous curb.

24 MR. PAPI: I'll go meet with him.

25 MR. NOTARI: He said he thinks it's

1 an easy fix. That's all.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: No items,
3 Mr. Chairman.

4 MR. SEMENZA: I don't think I have
5 anything. The only thing I want to do is
6 tip my hat to Paul and the DPW, fire
7 department, police, and Marylynn for the
8 last storm. Everybody was out. Paul
9 especially. I mean, he had some water
10 issues in his house and he came out when we
11 called for him. They did a great job.

12 MR. PAPI: So you guys know, I sent
13 all the guys to get the trucks and the
14 rakes. When they got to the garage they had
15 no power. They couldn't open the doors. So
16 they were in their own vehicles. They just
17 grabbed tools and ran.

18 MS. BARTOLETTI: That's a first.

19 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Do you need a
20 generator over at the garage?

21 MR. PAPI: In 25 years it happened
22 once.

23 MR. SEMENZA: Don't we have any
24 manual pull for the doors?

25 MR. PAPI: But they're three or four

1 hundred pounds.

2 MR. SEMENZA: Do you get a flyer of
3 the state surplus stuff? Maybe a generator
4 is something that comes through.

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: Haven't seen
6 anything recently.

7 MR. SEMENZA: Do we have backup on
8 this building? Anybody have anything else?
9 At this time the chair is going to entertain
10 a motion to adjourn.


11 MR. NOTARI: I'll make that motion.

12 MR. SEMENZA: By Councilman Notari.
13 All in favor?

14 (Unanimous. Meeting adjourned.)
