There's plenty of time to get the project in. 1 just the idea, what we're deciding on now is that the 2 alleyway that those people were complaining about, 3 asked to take a look at, we're thinking that, possibly, 4 we should take them off the list completely and just 5 have a small contractor put a bid out for the small 6 contractor. 7 In the event that something happens with 8 the total program we have, at least we can get these 9 done for the people so they don't come in complaining. 10 MR. FEBBO: Okay. 11 MR. FERRETT: So, hopefully, before the 12 next meeting, Dave will have everything worked out with 13 those things. 14 MS. BARTOLETTI: I think what he was 1.5 assuming was we were going to do better by having a 16 late summer project, late, late summer, early fall 17 18 project. MR. FEBBO: We're into July, engineering 19 bids and so on and then the contractor. 20 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yep. 21 MR. FEBBO: I'll come back to that. 22 MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari. 23 MR. NOTARI: I'd like to be put on the 24

MS. BARTOLETTI: Why don't we also talk about hiring the person or getting quotations from persons to do the seal cracking too?

MR. FERRETT: Well, we were thinking about that in the event that something goes wrong with the thing, that maybe we should go to work and do some seal cracking. And we can do that also.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Remember that's separate in the budget for you to be able to do that as well.

MR. FERRETT: Right. But the only thing I want to talk to the fellows and everything that my recommendation is the streets were done in '17 and '18 and everything, that we would look at those first to try to get those preserved so that they can last much longer before we start going in to any other sections.

That, I think, would be the best way to go, providing everybody agrees.

MR. FEBBO: So you see a lot of streets

out there, I know I see them myself, that can benefit by the seal cracking? You're traveling around all the streets, you know, I've seen a lot.

MR. FERRETT: I've seen quite a bit of the streets and everything. I wouldn't think that I went over every street.

There's a lot of streets we didn't do paving on that need crack sealing. But my interpretation is the streets that we paved, that we paid so much money for, if we go to work and preserve those streets first, in the long run, is going to pay more dividends than trying to -- unless Council wants to go to work and spend a little extra more money and go further on beside what we already have done. That's not a problem.

MR. FEBBO: What do you mean further beyond the budget?

MR. FERRETT: Well, originally, it was announced like a month or two ago, with all the rain we were having, contractors were worried about whether they're going to fulfill all the contracts they had and everything because I guess they were anticipating, if we get more rain and everything, how are they going to go to work and keep up with everything?

So, we're looking at it from the

standpoint, maybe we may get caught now that we don't 1 have our bid in, we may not be able to do anything. 2 the three of us were talking about, maybe we should 3 look at doing some crack sealing and everything. 4 MR. FEBBO: To buy us time. That's not a problem. MR. FERRETT: 6 can always put that out for bid any time you want. The 7 idea is to get somebody to really do it. But we can do that even if MR. NOTARI: 9 we're going to pave. 10 MR. FERRETT: Right. 11 That doesn't have to be a MR. NOTARI: 12 replacement for paving. That can be in addition to or 13 just something we do every year. 14 But my point is, MR. FERRETT: Yeah. 15 Rick, I believe, honestly, that when we spent 5 or 600 16 thousand dollars to pave streets, we should look after 17 these streets. 18 MR. NOTARI: Absolutely. 19 But when you go around town MR. FERRETT: 20 and look at some of the others, they're so terrible 21 that you say to yourself, they need attention just as 22 well. 23 MR. NOTARI: I agree with you. I would 24

start with the newest roads first.

Exactly. MR. FERRETT: 1 MR. FEBBO: I think you should start on 2 that now, Joe. We don't have to wait for paving. 3 on your roads that were just paved. 4 MR. FERRETT: I know. I can't make that 5 decision myself. I got two other guys. I don't want 6 anybody to think -- sometimes you can't get one guy and 7 the other guy is busy. So you got to --8 MR. NOTARI: Marylynn says she has it in 9 the budget, so why don't we just put it on the agenda 10 for the next meeting? 11 MS. BARTOLETTI: I can move forward with 12 that now. 13 We can do that, put that on MR. FERRETT: 14 By next week, I'm sure I'll meet with the the agenda. 1.5 other two guys. I want to talk with Dave about that 16 too and see what he thinks and what his opinion on the 17 whole matter is because there's a couple different ways 18 to do it. But I know the best way is put it out for 19 bid and everything. Just the idea that we have local 20 guys that do it. 21

And, actually, someone did put in a bid.

But when they found out it was a Super Fund site, the former Lehigh Electric property, they decided that they didn't want it and turned it back in.

Okay. So we recently put in a bid. The school board has voted for it. Okay. I have a map here to show you. This is listed as Joseph Menn Estate is the Lehigh Valley property.

Okay. This listed as J and B

Construction Incorporated is what was to be the Misty

Ridge Development.

And this here is property that the Lackawanna Valley Conservancy actually owns at this point. Okay?

We presently own this property here, which is this. And we have an easement coming in it from Bridge Street that follows the outline of the Menn's property, the former Lehigh Electric property.

With this -- by acquiring this property, we get a wider easement. This is an easement here that we have to where this property we actually own.

This easement is only 10-feet wide. But acquiring this property, we get the property plus we get a 20-foot easement instead of a 10 foot, which

allows more ease of access.

Now, our intent is recreational and conservation development of the property.

So, more specifically, but not overly specific because

we haven't drawn up any plans yet or anything like that.

We would be able to construct a trail that would be approximately a mile long and allow boats to land, people to have access for fishing or whatever other activities they may want. Okay?

And, you know, possibly even, as I was saying before, environmental studies for students from the local school, okay, to come down in a reasonably safe public access area.

Misty Ridge was a housing development plan which never actually got developed, although, I believe at the time, I believe it was permitted for development.

And working in conjunction with mitigation factors on this property and so forth, we acquired this piece of property, okay, so, and resulted in being able to obtain about \$800,000.00 in grants to work on this property.

Now, that was approximately ten years ago. Okay. So, we were always expecting that the

Misty Ridge would get developed and then we would work 1 further with the developer for access and maybe some 2 3 help with developing our sections. And if you want to, this is a little more 4 simplified maps of what we own, what we're hoping to 5 6 own. MS. BARTOLETTI: What is the deadline for 7 making a decision on the property? 8 MR. HOLLAND: I don't know if there's 9 exactly a deadline. I don't even know if it's on your 10 agenda yet. 11 I thought it might be coming, because in 12 the past couple weeks, it was on the school board 13 agenda and they passed it. 14 So, it just really came -- I wasn't able 15 to find if it was on the agenda and came to hopefully 16 explain it. So when it did come up, them people would 17 have a forum and have an idea what's going on and it 18 wasn't some sort of understanding of what was going on 19 with the properties, what the intentions are and so 20 forth. 21 MR. NOTARI: So, what do we have to 22 approve, that we wouldn't have to tax it? 23

MR. HOLLAND: Well, indirectly, yes.

But, directly, that because it is coming from the

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repository, that you're agreeing to let it be sold, for 1 2 one thing. Okay. And, yeah, it wouldn't be taxed 3 because we are a 501C corporation. Okay. But hoping 4 that it would enhance Old Forge, okay, by providing 5 recreational possibilities and perhaps even encouraging 6 development of what was called the Misty Ridge area and 7 possibly even further up. Who knows. 8 I'm curious why we'd have to 9 MR. NOTARI: 10 be involved? Typically, we would be MR. HOLLAND: 11 getting it for one dollar. Although, practically 12 speaking, between legal costs and so forth, the deed 13 registration fees and so forth, we do pay a transfer 14 tax on this. 15 With our legal fees and so forth, we may 16 be up to \$10,000.00 by now, as far as expenses. 17 we're not a wealthy organization. 18 MR. NOTARI: No, I understand. 19 MR. HOLLAND: To say the least. 20 MS. BARTOLETTI: Do you know -- Mr. 21 Ferrett said, about ten years ago, did someone else 22 want to put a walking trail in there but weren't able 23 to do it? 24

road down in to here.
             But, you know, that was one of the
several things that were talked about but not actually
legally established, I guess would be the best way to
say it.
             Whereas, this property, we did acquire.
And this easement, we did acquire as part of that work.
             You know, some of that is directly
connected, Mr. Rinaldi, that involves talking about
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this establishing a footprint on the Lackawanna, which might ultimately tie in with trails up and down the river or other activities along those lines.

So, you know, a little further up river,
Mariotti donated some land, for example. There's some
other things across the river that might be available
to us at some point.

But, you know, that's all -- and then we do work with the Heritage Valley, some of the already-constructed trails further up river is actually on land that we have granted easements to because Bernie was one of the first to recognize trying to acquire some of the old abandoned rail beds.

MR. FERRETT: What about flooding at times that may appear?

MR. HOLLAND: There are possibilities for flooding at times along this area. Okay. That could happen.

And, again, when Lonesome Road got washed out, I believe some of this area down in here did flood because there's all kinds of debris stuck in the fence that surrounds the Lehigh Electric development.

So, yes, there will be some flooding at times. But, for example, that doesn't necessarily stop you. That just means that, occasionally, you'd have to

be a little careful, you know what I mean, about people going down in there perhaps.

This past year, part of the Heritage

Valley Trial in Taylor flooded. And I don't know if

you're familiar with the Market Street in Wilkes-Barre,

how there's a trail there. This floods with some

regularity.

That usually floods at least once or twice a year, at least in my experience from working in Wilkes-Barre several years ago. Okay?

You know, the big thing is, it's pretty obvious when it does. You know, if there's water on this, you know.

MR. FERRETT: Is there any way that they can make a correction on that? Most of that all happens in the Lonesome area.

MR. HOLLAND: Probably not easily and certainly not economically, which, in part, is why we would like to acquire this and would be a good use for the property because, you know, I don't conceive that any commercial enterprise that would want property that periodically floods. Certainly wouldn't be of high value to them by any means.

MR. FERRETT: If I could recall, in the past, I remember talking to Councilman Kanjorski, the
