MR. SEMENZA: Yes. At this time the chair is going to go to our department heads. Paut Papi, zoning/code enforcement. Everybody has Paul's report in their packet. Paul, do you have anything to add to your report?

MR. PAPI: No, I don't.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Paul?

MR. HOOVER: Paul, what did you find out about that garage today?

MR. PAPI: I met with two young men that were taking over for Ronnie Coles. They don't have anything, so $I$ want them to come to the next planning commission meeting that we have. They told me they'11 clean up the tires on the outside. I told them they
couldn't park in front of the building, on the street. They agreed to everything I told them they needed to do.

MR. FEBBO: What kind of business is it going to be?

MR. PAPI: Just automotive.
MR. FEBBO: Repair? Sales?
MR. PAPI: They were working on engines.

MR. FEBBO: Thanks.
MR. PAPI: We'11 get to know them better when they come to planning.

MR. HOOVER: I just wanted to nip it in the bud because I'm getting complaints. It was good for a week and all the sudden now $I$ got two phone calls on it. I don't have to tell you who called.

MR. PAPI: He calls me, too, on the weekends.

MR. HOOVER: He's not going away.
MR. PAPI: I know.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else for
Pau1?
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I have one question. I spoke with Chief Dubernas as
wel1. There's a trailer on East Mary Street, by Flanagan auto detailing, with a pile of junk in it. The chief went over and talked to the guy. The guy collects scrap, I guess. It's just a trailer that you can hook up to the back of your car. I guess the trailer is registered and everything to be parked on the street. Is he allowed to store scrap in the trailer on the road?

MR. SEMENZA: To be on honest with you, Russel1, we actually have an ordinance on the books that you can't park an unhooked trailer on the roadway. Correct me if $I^{\prime} m$ wrong by saying that, Bill.

ATTY. RINALDI: I'm not sure. I can look it up.

MR. SEMENZA: I'm almost positive. Marylynn, do you remember that?

ATTY. RINALDI: It sounds familiar.
MR. LETTIERI: It's on the side of GI's now. They moved it onto George.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Is this the one that was parked close to Main Street?

MR. LETTIERI: The big black one. It's on George Street now. I don't know if
they moved it to hide it. I'm not sure. It looks like the same one.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Here's the reason why $I$ ask. I'm not asking -- if the guy has a scrap business and he's doing a business, that's fine. I'm not trying to hurt anyone's business. Last night, when $I$ drove by the wind was blowing like crazy. He has a hood from a car in there.

MR. SEMENZA: I saw that.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The hood came flying out and there was metal all over the road. Like, bits and pieces. Like, half of a bumper. God forbid if something 1 ike that should happen to fly out and hit somebody walking, hit a car driving. That's the only reason why I'm asking.

MR FEBBO: The load should be tied down.

MR. PAPI: Does anybody know the location of where he 1 ives?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: He 1 ives right there in that apartment building on South Main Street.

MR. PAPI: Across from Yaniello's

Market?
MR. SEMENZA: Yeah, across from Yaniello's.

ATTY. RINALDI: I can tell you that they're not allowed to park trailers in residential districts. Any street in a residential district.

MR. FEBBO: We had an episode like that with Dunbar down on Orchard Street. An unattached tailer sitting there.

MR. SEMENZA: I'm going to say that ordinance was passed around 2010 or '11, Bill.

MR. LETTIERI: Check George Street, too. Like I said, I went by after my dad's house and I took a left there and there's one right on George Street filled up.

MR. PAPI: I think $I$ can find the owner.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: It has a big green hood on it. He was using that as part of a sideboard so he could put more stuff in it.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Paul, if you could just take a look at that because, like I said, especially with the wind. But
obviously if we have an ordinance on the books and it's not allowed we're going to have to notify him about that as well.

MR. PAPI: I'11 go check on it tomorrow.

MR. SEMENZA: I believe if it's not hooked -- Chief, you might know this. If it's not hooked to your vehicle it can't be on a roadway. Correct? Is that what it says?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I'11 have to look into it.

ATTY. RINALDI: I don't have that one.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I see Marylynn getting the big book out.

ATTY. RINALDI: I'm online. I have it here. Other than prohibited in residential neighborhoods, I don't see anything otherwise. I know we talked about trying to ban trailers.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I thought there was something we actually did pass.

MR. SEMENZA: Definitely something was passed. I'm 100 percent sure of it.

MS. BARTOLETTI: A while ago, too.
MR. SEMENZA: My father was adamant about it. That's the only reason $I$ know. I wasn't on council when it was.

MS. BARTOLETTI: It had to do with boats and trailers.

MR. FEBBO: It was on Orchard Street with Dunbar. One of his residents had it down there.

MS. BARTOLETTI: It was actually near the dance studio first. It had to do with an issue off Main Street where that dance studio is. On Henderson, I believe.

ATTY. RINALDI: That would be residential.

MR. SEMENZA: I believe in '10 or '11 it was passed. Might have been '11.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I remember the boat one. I remember that ordinance. If it falls under the same, then we did pass the trailer one along with the boat one. As Marylynn said, the one on Henderson, that was the reason for the boat one because they were parking them back there.

MR. SEMENZA: While we're waiting,
anything else for Paul?
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That's al1 I have.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else? Thanks, Paul.

MR. NOTARI: Mr. Chairman, it looks 1ike code 328-36.

MR. SEMENZA: Do you want to read that?

MR. NOTARI: I didn't open it. I just looked for the number.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Three twenty-eight?
ATTY. RINALDI: We11, 328 -- which
one?
MR. NOTARI: Thirty-six.
ATTY. RINALDI: Thirty-six defines a trailer, and then all unlawful acts are 37, which says it's unlawful to park them in any highway or street within a residential district.

MR. PAPI: He 1 ives in a commercial district. If it's alongside Scott Flanagan's, that's a commercial district. A11 Main Street is commercial.

MS. BARTOLETTI: He has it parked on

Mary Street.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: He has it parked on Mary.

MR. PAPI: Mary is commercial for the first block back.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That's where he has it parked. That's where I saw it last night. If he has it where Mike said, though -- Mike said there's now a trailer up on George.

MR. SEMENZA: Wait a minute. That is commercial one block back?

MR. PAPI: Yeah. A11 of Main
Street. Not one block back but one property back.

ATTY. RINALDI: So if he's beyond that, yes, he can't be parked there.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: He's right at the corner, probably 25, 30 feet from the corner.

ATTY. RINALDI: Of Main Street?
CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yes.
ATTY. RINALDI: Is that a sight problem there, Chief?

MR. SEMENZA: No.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: No, it wasn't a sight problem. It was just unattached. Like I said, he had it loaded. The other day when $I$ sent Kimbal over there to see if it was abandoned he had a hood on one side, using it like a side board so he could load more stuff on it. But tomorrow morning I'11 go and check and see if it's on George Street.

MR. SEMENZA: A11 right. Anything else for Paul? Anybody?

Al1 right. Joe Lenceski, DPW manager. Joe, do you have anything to add? Joe Lenceski? We'11 go on. We lost Joe.

I'm going to go to Dave Lopatka.
Everybody has Dave's report in their packet. Dave, anything to add to your report?

MR. LOPATKA: I do not.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any
questions for Dave?
MR. NOTARI: Dave, how about just an update on our building progress.

MR. LOPATKA: I was down there, actually, yesterday and today. I know that we dropped the color board off with Marylynn
today that has all the colors on it for three different schemes, plus we can still kind of mix and match that a ittle bit, depending on what you guys choose. I think Marylynn and myself kind of went over it and she had some recommendations as to what to do with the colors.

Everything else -- there was a couple RFIs we addressed today. I met with Mark yesterday just to kind of go over that. They're framing in the area where they just poured the concrete to elevate the fire department section up to the level of the borough building. So they framed in there today, at least half of it. They have to finish it.

There was one question with regard to Marylynn wanted the closets that were framed into her office. We had one prolem in there that we've addressed. They have that. I think for the most part we have all their RFIs at this point addressed. We need the colors. I guess the colors are the next important thing so we can get the window frames and everything ordered.

Other than that, they're progressing. They poured the concrete floor in the lower level where the police area is, where the garage was. So they're actually going to start building the cell walls in the garage. They're going to start putting that block up as well this week.

MR. NOTARI: Thanks, Dave.
MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have anything else for Dave?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: One question. Dave, I know we talked about it at the last meeting. I know we're moving into the winter now. Did we make any progress over on Smith, Hoover and Taroli Street with the water problem?

MR. LOPATKA: Was that that Lavan's property?

MR. SEMENZA: Yes.
MR. LOPATKA: Pennsy went back and fixed their driveway and fixed, actually, the driveway of the adjoining property owner, so that should be addressed. Haven't heard anything on that. I did go by there and they did do what we requested them to
do.
The other ones, no, we haven't -- I mean, $I$ know Joe was going to look into whether or not it was a combined sewer and if we can tie in to it on those other two streets.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I thought Joe said or Bob -- I thought we couldn't tie in. Correct?

MR. SEMENZA: It's my understanding that you can't tie in to --

MR. LOPATKA: It's a combined system.

MR. SEMENZA: You can't put storm water into the sewer.

MR. LOPATKA: The only thing with both of them is $I$ think it ends up getting there over 1 and flow and through the street flow. I don't think we can tie directly in to it with a pipe. You're talking a new in1et.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I know we brought up -- not at the last meeting, the meting before $I$ know we brought up possibly getting Pennsy there to grade it a different
way.
MR. FEBBO: That's Smith Street.
MS. BARTOLETTI: No, that was
Fallon.
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I thought we were going to ask them to come back to shoot the level, shoot the grade and have them grade the street back. It was Orzalek, Anastassi and the one on Fallon. I can't remember who that's in front of.

MR. HOOVER: The one on Fallon Street was the one we were going to take the crest of the road out. Jamie's going to give us a price to mill the middle of the road down. Dave looked at that with myself. He's going to give us a price -- obviously we can't pave now. When the weather breaks he's going to give us a price to mill -- I think it's about two blocks.

MR. LOPATKA: It's about four inches of mill off the center line of the street to kind of knock the crown off of it.

MR. FEBBO: Did he say between $\$ 8,000$ and $\$ 10,000$, rough quote?

MR. HOOVER: Yeah, somewhere
around -- it won't be any more than $\$ 10,000$.
MR. LOPATKA: It will be less than
ten. I just talked to him, actually, on
that. But until, you know, like I said, the weather breaks there's probably not a lot we can do with it. I know he did say he could do it for under ten.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: All right.
Maybe we can have -- would cutting the crown on those other streets do the fix? Or no?

MR. LOPATKA: No, that's not the issue there. The other streets, I think when they were paved -- I think Taroli is the one that -- I think TSE actually paved that as part of the water project. I mean, that one they basically tied in to the existing driveways at grade. All they did, really, was mill an inch and a half out and put an inch and a half back. So it's a relatively flat area. So for them to go back they probably would have to shoot something to get grades to work.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay.
MR. SEMENZA: Anything else for Dave? Anybody else? Thanks.

Joe Lenceski. Everybody has Joe's report. Joe, do you have anything to add?

MR. LENCESKI: No, I don't.
MR. SEMENZA: Joe, are we ready for the snow storm?

MR. LENCESKI: Yes, we are.
MR. SEMENZA: That's the biggest concern. We have enough salt? We're good on salt and everything?

MR. LENCESKI: We're great on salt.
The borough manager, Marylynn, ordered more. We have subcontractors on standby. The trucks have new tires on the ones that were necessary to be changed. All the salt spreaders have been greased, the boxes have been greased. We have short shovels for the trucks in case they get stuck or there's an overflow of salt on the road. We're ready.

MR. SEMENZA: Good.
MR. FEBBO: Good job, Joe.
MR. SEMENZA: Good job is right.
Anybody have any questions for Joe?
MR. NOTARI: Just a question on the sewer project off of Main Street and Dunn. How are we progressing there?

MR. LENCESKI: We're progressing. They had a little hick up. The line was damaged by Main Street, so they needed to fix that pipe so they could get back into the hole and work on it.

MR. NOTARI: I noticed they were working in the yard and then for two days there was no work. So $I$ was wondering what happened.

MR. LOPATKA: I did talk to Matt the other day because Marylyn had called me and Jimmy had called me about that. That's kind of what the issue was. The existing pipe coming out of that manhole, once they opened the hole up it kind of collapsed. So they had to repair that pipe.

The reason they didn't continue with the trench was they didn't want to cut across that homeowner's driveway so that they couldn't get to their garage. So they were kind of waiting on that. Then they were waiting on the weather to see what it was going to do before they kind of opened everything up.

MR. NOTARI: So is that going to be
an additional cost to us?
MR. LOPATKA: I don't know what their overall quote was. They were kind of in there doing what they needed to do to get this fixed. I don't know what the cost was with regard to that pipe. I think they just kind of patched the pipe until they can get the new pipe in and sewer flowing down the new pipe.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else for Joe?
MR. NOTARI: No. Good luck tonight and tomorrow, Joe, and to the guys. I know they're going to be working hard for probably 24 straight hours.

MR. LENCESKI: I think we're fortunate because of when the storm is hitting us. It will be snowing through the evening, which will keep the traffic down. Then coming Thursday and Friday the recycling is done, so we can concentrate on opening the roads up further and any snow removal we need to do.

MR. SEMENZA: What's the schedule for tomorrow for the guys? Is it possible to let them go home a little bit early
tomorrow and then come back in?
MR. FEBBO: I was thinking the same thing.

MR. SEMENZA: Is that something -good idea. Right, Lou?

MR. FEBBO: Absolutely. Let them go home at noontime, come back as needed.

MR. SEMENZA: They're going to be out for some hours. So maybe get some rest and then go out. I don't know.

MR. LENCESKI: Sounds like a good idea.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yeah, that sounds fine.

MR. LENCESKI: Paul and Marylynn have been a big help throughout this for me. It's my first storm and they've given me a lot of advice.

MR. NOTARI: Sounds good.
Everybody's working as a team. That's what we want.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have any questions for Joe? Thanks, Joe. Good luck tomorrow.

Everybody has Bil1's report.

Anybody have any questions? Bill, do you have anything to add?

ATTY. RINALDI: Just under item three, there is also a resolution that needs to be passed after that. It's attached to your packet.

And the only update I got was I did finally hear -- me and Marylynn both heard today from DCNR with respect to the Project 70 1and. So we've got to put together a little package there for that. They asked for a detail on public comment on disposition of the property, so I'll go over it with her and see what we need to do to meet that requirement.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I sent it out to council, too, just so you guys could take a look at it and know what we're dealing with.

MR. NOTARI: Is that something we can talk about now or should we wait until executive?

ATTY. RINALDI: We've just got to comply with their requirements.

MR. NOTARI: Is one of those requirements that we have to trade land? Is
that how I read that?
ATTY. RINALDI: Well, that's why I want to go over it with her, because I think that's one thing you can do, is trade land, although we're going to trade projects. That's what we did the last time we did it. We used it on another park.

MR. NOTARI: I'm reading that different, then. Okay.

MR. SEMENZA: Thank you, Bil1.
Anybody have any questions for Bil1?
Thanks, Bill. Marylynn?
MS. BARTOLETTI: The only thing that I would like to talk about right now is the budget that we're going to be passing during new business. I don't know if anyone had a chance to take a look at it or how much detail you want me to go into right now, if you just want totals.

Then once we're done with that, the only other thing that $I$ have is a few items for executive after the meeting. Do you want me to discuss the budget now or when it's time to pass it?

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any
questions? Any standouts on the budget to anybody? Marylynn, you can just talk about it when we pass it.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Perfect.
MR. SEMENZA: At this time, Marylynn, is there anybody from the public that wants to speak?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No e-mails.
MR. SEMENZA: Okay. At this time the chair is going to go down the table, see if any council members have anything to address first. Councilman Hoover?

MR. HOOVER: No, I'm good, Bob.
MR. NOTARI: I'm good.
MR. LETTIERI: Nothing at this time, Robert.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm good, Mr. Chairman.

MR. FEBBO: We're good.
MR. SEMENZA: At this time I'm going to go to public comment. I'm having an issue getting back and forth into this screen, so, Marylynn, could you go into new business for me and I'11 ask for the motions?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. So the first item that we have is going to be ordinance No. 7, and that is going to be an ordinance of the Borough of O1d Forge, Lackawanna County, Pennsylvania adopting the comprehensive budget for the calendar 2021, appropriating specific sums estimated to be required for the specific purposes of the municipal government hereinafter set forth during the calendar year of 2021.

MR. SEMENZA: Can $I$ have a motion for that?

MR. FEBBO: I'11 make that motion.
MR. SEMENZA: By Councilman Febbo.
MR. HOOVER: I'11 second it.
MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by Councilman Hoover. On the question? Public input? Roll call, please.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Febbo?
MR. FEBBO: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Hoover?

MR. HOOVER: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman
Lettieri?
MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Notari?
MR. NOTARI: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi?
MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Semenza?
MR. SEMENZA: Yes.
MS. BARTOLETTI: So the next item is ordinance No. 8 of 2020, an ordinance of the borough of 01d Forge, Lackawanna County, Pennsylvania fixing and levying a tax for general borough purposes for the calendar year of 2021, and for the purpose of creating and maintaining a special fund to be used by the borough for making permanent street improvements, to pay contract prices for paving and other permanent street improvements.

MR. SEMENZA: May I have a motion for ordinance No. 8 of 2020?

MR. NOTARI: I'11 make that motion.
