They told me they'll clean up 25 the tires on the outside. I told them they

1 couldn't park in front of the building, on the street. They agreed to everything I 2 3 told them they needed to do. 4 MR. FEBBO: What kind of business is 5 it going to be? MR. PAPI: Just automotive. 6 MR. FEBBO: Repair? 7 Sales? 8 MR. PAPI: They were working on 9 engines. 10 MR. FEBBO: Thanks. 11 MR. PAPI: We'll get to know them 12 better when they come to planning. 13 MR. HOOVER: I just wanted to nip it 14 in the bud because I'm getting complaints. 15 It was good for a week and all the sudden 16 now I got two phone calls on it. I don't 17 have to tell you who called. 18 MR. PAPI: He calls me, too, on the 19 weekends. 20 MR. HOOVER: He's not going away. 21 MR. PAPI: I know. 22 MR. SEMENZA: Anything else for 23 Paul? 24 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I have one 25 question. I spoke with Chief Dubernas as

1 well. There's a trailer on East Mary Street, by Flanagan auto detailing, with a 2 3 pile of junk in it. The chief went over and talked to the guy. The guy collects scrap, 4 5 I guess. It's just a trailer that you can hook up to the back of your car. I guess 6 the trailer is registered and everything to 7 be parked on the street. Is he allowed to 8 9 store scrap in the trailer on the road? 10 To be on honest with MR. SEMENZA: 11 you, Russell, we actually have an ordinance 12 on the books that you can't park an unhooked 13 trailer on the roadway. Correct me if I'm 14 wrong by saying that, Bill. ATTY. RINALDI: I'm not sure. I can 15 16 look it up. 17 MR. SEMENZA: I'm almost positive. 18 Marylynn, do you remember that? 19 ATTY. RINALDI: It sounds familiar. 20 MR. LETTIERI: It's on the side of 21 GI's now. They moved it onto George. MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: 22 Is this the 23 one that was parked close to Main Street? 24 MR. LETTIERI: The big black one. 25 It's on George Street now. I don't know if

they moved it to hide it. I'm not sure. It looks like the same one.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Here's the reason why I ask. I'm not asking -- if the guy has a scrap business and he's doing a business, that's fine. I'm not trying to hurt anyone's business. Last night, when I drove by the wind was blowing like crazy. He has a hood from a car in there.

MR. SEMENZA: I saw that.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The hood came flying out and there was metal all over the road. Like, bits and pieces. Like, half of a bumper. God forbid if something like that should happen to fly out and hit somebody walking, hit a car driving. That's the only reason why I'm asking.

MR FEBBO: The load should be tied down.

MR. PAPI: Does anybody know the location of where he lives?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: He lives right there in that apartment building on South Main Street.

MR. PAPI: Across from Yaniello's

1 Market? MR. SEMENZA: Yeah, across from 2 3 Yaniello's. 4 ATTY. RINALDI: I can tell you that 5 they're not allowed to park trailers in residential districts. Any street in a 6 7 residential district. 8 MR. FEBBO: We had an episode like 9 that with Dunbar down on Orchard Street. An 10 unattached tailer sitting there. 11 MR. SEMENZA: I'm going to say that 12 ordinance was passed around 2010 or '11, 13 Bill. 14 MR. LETTIERI: Check George Street, 15 Like I said, I went by after my dad's 16 house and I took a left there and there's 17 one right on George Street filled up. 18 MR. PAPI: I think I can find the 19 owner. 20 CHIEF DUBERNAS: It has a big green 21 hood on it. He was using that as part of a 22 sideboard so he could put more stuff in it. 23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Paul, if you 24 could just take a look at that because, like 25 I said, especially with the wind.

1 obviously if we have an ordinance on the 2 books and it's not allowed we're going to 3 have to notify him about that as well. 4 MR. PAPI: I'll go check on it 5 tomorrow. MR. SEMENZA: I believe if it's not 6 7 hooked -- Chief, you might know this. If 8 it's not hooked to your vehicle it can't be 9 on a roadway. Correct? Is that what it 10 says? 11 CHIEF DUBERNAS: I'll have to look 12 into it. ATTY. RINALDI: I don't have that 13 14 one. 15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I see Marylynn 16 getting the big book out. 17 ATTY. RINALDI: I'm online. I have 18 it here. Other than prohibited in 19 residential neighborhoods, I don't see 20 anything otherwise. I know we talked about 21 trying to ban trailers. 22 MS. BARTOLETTI: I thought there was 23 something we actually did pass. 24 MR. SEMENZA: Definitely something 25 was passed. I'm 100 percent sure of it.

MS. BARTOLETTI: A while ago, too. 1 MR. SEMENZA: My father was adamant 2 3 about it. That's the only reason I know. wasn't on council when it was. 4 MS. BARTOLETTI: It had to do with 5 boats and trailers. 6 7 MR. FEBBO: It was on Orchard Street 8 with Dunbar. One of his residents had it 9 down there. 10 MS. BARTOLETTI: It was actually 11 near the dance studio first. It had to do 12 with an issue off Main Street where that 13 dance studio is. On Henderson, I believe. 14 ATTY. RINALDI: That would be 15 residential. 16 MR. SEMENZA: I believe in '10 or 17 '11 it was passed. Might have been '11. 18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I remember the boat one. I remember that ordinance. 19 20 falls under the same, then we did pass the trailer one along with the boat one. As 21 22 Marylynn said, the one on Henderson, that 23 was the reason for the boat one because they 24 were parking them back there. 25 MR. SEMENZA: While we're waiting,

23	Flanagan's, that's a commercial district.
24	All Main Street is commercial.
25	MS. BARTOLETTI: He has it parked on

3	parked on Mary.
4	MR. PAPI: Mary is commercial for
5	the first block back.
6	MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That's where
7	he has it parked. That's where I saw it

9	though Mike said there's now a trailer up
10	on George.
11	MR. SEMENZA: Wait a minute. That
12	is commercial one block back?
13	MR. PAPI: Yeah. All of Main
14	Street. Not one block back but one property
15	back.
16	ATTY. RINALDI: So if he's beyond
17	that, yes, he can't be parked there.
18	CHIEF DUBERNAS: He's right at the
19	corner, probably 25, 30 feet from the
20	corner.
21	ATTY. RINALDI: Of Main Street?
22	CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yes.
23	ATTY. RINALDI: Is that a sight
24	problem there, Chief?
25	MR. SEMENZA: No.
	11

CHIEF DUBERNAS: No, it wasn't a 1 sight problem. It was just unattached. 2 3 Like I said, he had it loaded. The other 4 day when I sent Kimbal over there to see if 5 it was abandoned he had a hood on one side, using it like a side board so he could load 6 7 more stuff on it. But tomorrow morning I'll 8 go and check and see if it's on George 9 Street. 10 MR. SEMENZA: All right. Anything 11 else for Paul? Anybody? 12 All right. Joe Lenceski, DPW 13 manager. Joe, do you have anything to add? 14 Joe Lenceski? We'll go on. We lost Joe. 15 I'm going to go to Dave Lopatka. 16 Everybody has Dave's report in their packet. 17 Dave, anything to add to your report? 18 MR. LOPATKA: I do not. 19 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Dave? 20 21 MR. NOTARI: Dave, how about just an 22 update on our building progress. 23 MR. LOPATKA: I was down there, 24 actually, yesterday and today. I know that 25 we dropped the color board off with Marylynn

today that has all the colors on it for three different schemes, plus we can still kind of mix and match that a little bit, depending on what you guys choose. I think Marylynn and myself kind of went over it and she had some recommendations as to what to do with the colors.

Everything else -- there was a couple RFIs we addressed today. I met with Mark yesterday just to kind of go over that. They're framing in the area where they just poured the concrete to elevate the fire department section up to the level of the borough building. So they framed in there today, at least half of it. They have to finish it.

There was one question with regard to Marylynn wanted the closets that were framed into her office. We had one prolem in there that we've addressed. They have that. I think for the most part we have all their RFIs at this point addressed. We need the colors. I guess the colors are the next important thing so we can get the window frames and everything ordered.

Other than that, they're progressing. They poured the concrete floor in the lower level where the police area is, where the garage was. So they're actually going to start building the cell walls in the garage. They're going to start putting

MR. NOTARI: Thanks, Dave.

that block up as well this week.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have anything else for Dave?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: One question.

Dave, I know we talked about it at the last meeting. I know we're moving into the winter now. Did we make any progress over on Smith, Hoover and Taroli Street with the water problem?

MR. LOPATKA: Was that that Lavan's property?

MR. SEMENZA: Yes.

MR. LOPATKA: Pennsy went back and fixed their driveway and fixed, actually, the driveway of the adjoining property owner, so that should be addressed. Haven't heard anything on that. I did go by there and they did do what we requested them to

do.

The other ones, no, we haven't -- I mean, I know Joe was going to look into whether or not it was a combined sewer and if we can tie in to it on those other two streets.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I thought Joe said or Bob -- I thought we couldn't tie in. Correct?

MR. SEMENZA: It's my understanding that you can't tie in to --

MR. LOPATKA: It's a combined system.

MR. SEMENZA: You can't put storm water into the sewer.

MR. LOPATKA: The only thing with both of them is I think it ends up getting there over land flow and through the street flow. I don't think we can tie directly in to it with a pipe. You're talking a new inlet.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I know we brought up -- not at the last meeting, the meting before I know we brought up possibly getting Pennsy there to grade it a different

1 way. MR. FEBBO: That's Smith Street. 2 3 MS. BARTOLETTI: No, that was 4 Fallon. 5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I thought we were going to ask them to come back to shoot 6 7 the level, shoot the grade and have them 8 grade the street back. It was Orzalek, 9 Anastassi and the one on Fallon. I can't 10 remember who that's in front of. 11 MR. HOOVER: The one on Fallon 12 Street was the one we were going to take the 13 crest of the road out. Jamie's going to 14 give us a price to mill the middle of the 15 road down. Dave looked at that with myself. 16 He's going to give us a price -- obviously 17 we can't pave now. When the weather breaks 18 he's going to give us a price to mill -- I 19 think it's about two blocks. 20 MR. LOPATKA: It's about four inches 21 of mill off the center line of the street to 22 kind of knock the crown off of it. 23 MR. FEBBO: Did he say between 24 \$8,000 and \$10,000, rough quote? 25 MR. HOOVER: Yeah, somewhere

around -- it won't be any more than \$10,000.

MR. LOPATKA: It will be less than ten. I just talked to him, actually, on that. But until, you know, like I said, the weather breaks there's probably not a lot we can do with it. I know he did say he could do it for under ten.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: All right.

Maybe we can have -- would cutting the crown on those other streets do the fix? Or no?

MR. LOPATKA: No, that's not the issue there. The other streets, I think when they were paved -- I think Taroli is the one that -- I think TSE actually paved that as part of the water project. I mean, that one they basically tied in to the existing driveways at grade. All they did, really, was mill an inch and a half out and put an inch and a half back. So it's a relatively flat area. So for them to go back they probably would have to shoot something to get grades to work.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else for Dave? Anybody else? Thanks.

report. Joe, do you have anything to add? 2 3 MR. LENCESKI: No, I don't. 4 MR. SEMENZA: Joe, are we ready for 5 the snow storm? MR. LENCESKI: Yes, we are. 6 7 MR. SEMENZA: That's the biggest 8 concern. We have enough salt? We're good 9 on salt and everything? 10 MR. LENCESKI: We're great on salt. 11 The borough manager, Marylynn, ordered more. 12 We have subcontractors on standby. 13 trucks have new tires on the ones that were 14 necessary to be changed. All the salt 15 spreaders have been greased, the boxes have 16 been greased. We have short shovels for the 17 trucks in case they get stuck or there's an 18 overflow of salt on the road. We're ready. 19 MR. SEMENZA: Good. 20 MR. FEBBO: Good job, Joe. MR. SEMENZA: 21 Good job is right. 22 Anybody have any questions for Joe? 23 MR. NOTARI: Just a question on the 24 sewer project off of Main Street and Dunn. 25 How are we progressing there?

Joe Lenceski. Everybody has Joe's

1

MR. LENCESKI: We're progressing. They had a little hick up. The line was damaged by Main Street, so they needed to fix that pipe so they could get back into the hole and work on it.

MR. NOTARI: I noticed they were working in the yard and then for two days there was no work. So I was wondering what happened.

MR. LOPATKA: I did talk to Matt the other day because Marylyn had called me and Jimmy had called me about that. That's kind of what the issue was. The existing pipe coming out of that manhole, once they opened the hole up it kind of collapsed. So they had to repair that pipe.

The reason they didn't continue with the trench was they didn't want to cut across that homeowner's driveway so that they couldn't get to their garage. So they were kind of waiting on that. Then they were waiting on the weather to see what it was going to do before they kind of opened everything up.

MR. NOTARI: So is that going to be

an additional cost to us?

MR. LOPATKA: I don't know what their overall quote was. They were kind of in there doing what they needed to do to get this fixed. I don't know what the cost was with regard to that pipe. I think they just kind of patched the pipe until they can get the new pipe in and sewer flowing down the new pipe.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else for Joe?

MR. NOTARI: No. Good luck tonight
and tomorrow, Joe, and to the guys. I know
they're going to be working hard for
probably 24 straight hours.

MR. LENCESKI: I think we're fortunate because of when the storm is hitting us. It will be snowing through the evening, which will keep the traffic down. Then coming Thursday and Friday the recycling is done, so we can concentrate on opening the roads up further and any snow removal we need to do.

MR. SEMENZA: What's the schedule for tomorrow for the guys? Is it possible to let them go home a little bit early

1	tomorrow and then come back in?
2	MR. FEBBO: I was thinking the same
3	thing.
4	MR. SEMENZA: Is that something
5	good idea. Right, Lou?
6	MR. FEBBO: Absolutely. Let them go
7	home at noontime, come back as needed.
8	MR. SEMENZA: They're going to be
9	out for some hours. So maybe get some rest
10	and then go out. I don't know.
11	MR. LENCESKI: Sounds like a good

13	MS. BARTOLETTI: Yeah, that sounds
14	fine.
15	MR. LENCESKI: Paul and Marylynn
16	have been a big help throughout this for me.
17	It's my first storm and they've given me a
18	lot of advice.
19	MR. NOTARI: Sounds good.
20	Everybody's working as a team. That's what
21	we want.
22	MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have any
23	questions for Joe? Thanks, Joe. Good luck
24	tomorrow.
25	Everybody has Bill's report.

Anybody have any questions? Bill, do you have anything to add?

ATTY. RINALDI: Just under item three, there is also a resolution that needs to be passed after that. It's attached to your packet.

And the only update I got was I did finally hear -- me and Marylynn both heard today from DCNR with respect to the Project 70 land. So we've got to put together a little package there for that. They asked for a detail on public comment on disposition of the property, so I'll go over it with her and see what we need to do to meet that requirement.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I sent it out to council, too, just so you guys could take a look at it and know what we're dealing with.

MR. NOTARI: Is that something we can talk about now or should we wait until executive?

ATTY. RINALDI: We've just got to comply with their requirements.

that how I read that?

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, that's why I want to go over it with her, because I think that's one thing you can do, is trade land, although we're going to trade projects.
