1 MR. SEMENZA: Welcome to the
2 December 15th Old Forge Borough Council
3 meeting. I'd like to start the meeting with
4 the Pledge of Allegiance.

5 (The Pledge of Allegiance was
6 recited.)

7 MR. SEMENZA: Once again, welcome to
8 our December 15, 2020 Old Forge Borough
9 Council meeting. Bill, will you take roll
10 call.

11 ATTY. RINALDI: Ms. Avvisato is
12 absent. Mr. Febbo?

13 MR. FEBBO: Here.

14 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Hoover?

15 MR. HOOVER: Present.

16 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Lettieri?

17 MR. LETTIERI: Present.

18 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Notari?

19 MR. NOTARI: Present.

20 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Rinaldi?

21 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Here.

22 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Semenza?

23 MR. SEMENZA: Here. Once again,
24 welcome to the Old Forge Borough Council
25 meeting. I'm going to go through our

1 housekeeping items, public e-mail on the
2 page.

3 At this time the chair is going to
4 entertain a motion to approve the minutes.

5 MR. HOOVER: I'll make that motion.

6 MR. SEMENZA: By Councilman Hoover.

7 May I have a second?

8 MR. FEBBO: I'll second it.

9 MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by Councilman
10 Febbo. On the question? Public input?

11 Roll call, please.

12 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Febbo?

13 MR. FEBBO: Yes.

14 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Hoover?

15 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

16 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Lettieri?

17 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

18 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Notari?

22 Roll call, please.

23 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Febbo?

24 MR. FEBBO: Yes.

25 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Hoover?

1 MR. HOOVER: Yes.

2 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Lettieri?

3 MR. LETTIERI: Yes.

4 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Notari?

5 MR. NOTARI: Yes.

6 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Rinaldi?

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Yes.

8 ATTY. RINALDI: Mr. Semenza?

9 MR. SEMENZA: Yes. At this time the
10 chair is going to go to our department
11 heads. Paul Papi, zoning/code enforcement.
12 Everybody has Paul's report in their packet.
13 Paul, do you have anything to add to your
14 report?

15 MR. PAPI: No, I don't.

16 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any
17 questions for Paul?

18 MR. HOOVER: Paul, what did you find
19 out about that garage today?

20 MR. PAPI: I met with two young men
21 that were taking over for Ronnie Coles.
22 They don't have anything, so I want them to
23 come to the next planning commission meeting
24 that we have. They told me they'll clean up
25 the tires on the outside. I told them they

1 well. There's a trailer on East Mary
2 Street, by Flanagan auto detailing, with a
3 pile of junk in it. The chief went over and
4 talked to the guy. The guy collects scrap,
5 I guess. It's just a trailer that you can
6 hook up to the back of your car. I guess
7 the trailer is registered and everything to
8 be parked on the street. Is he allowed to
9 store scrap in the trailer on the road?

10 MR. SEMENZA: To be on honest with
11 you, Russell, we actually have an ordinance
12 on the books that you can't park an unhooked
13 trailer on the roadway. Correct me if I'm
14 wrong by saying that, Bill.

15 ATTY. RINALDI: I'm not sure. I can
16 look it up.

17 MR. SEMENZA: I'm almost positive.
18 Marylynn, do you remember that?

19 ATTY. RINALDI: It sounds familiar.

20 MR. LETTIERI: It's on the side of
21 GI's now. They moved it onto George.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Is this the
23 one that was parked close to Main Street?

24 MR. LETTIERI: The big black one.
25 It's on George Street now. I don't know if

1 they moved it to hide it. I'm not sure. It
2 looks like the same one.

3 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Here's the
4 reason why I ask. I'm not asking -- if the
5 guy has a scrap business and he's doing a
6 business, that's fine. I'm not trying to
7 hurt anyone's business. Last night, when I
8 drove by the wind was blowing like crazy.
9 He has a hood from a car in there.

10 MR. SEMENZA: I saw that.

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The hood came
12 flying out and there was metal all over the
13 road. Like, bits and pieces. Like, half of
14 a bumper. God forbid if something like that
15 should happen to fly out and hit somebody
16 walking, hit a car driving. That's the only
17 reason why I'm asking.

18 MR FEBBO: The load should be tied
19 down.

20 MR. PAPI: Does anybody know the
21 location of where he lives?

22 CHIEF DUBERNAS: He lives right
23 there in that apartment building on South
24 Main Street.

25 MR. PAPI: Across from Yaniello's

1 Market?

2 MR. SEMENZA: Yeah, across from
3 Yaniello's.

4 ATTY. RINALDI: I can tell you that
5 they're not allowed to park trailers in
6 residential districts. Any street in a
7 residential district.

8 MR. FEBBO: We had an episode like
9 that with Dunbar down on Orchard Street. An
10 unattached trailer sitting there.

11 MR. SEMENZA: I'm going to say that
12 ordinance was passed around 2010 or '11,
13 Bill.

14 MR. LETTIERI: Check George Street,
15 too. Like I said, I went by after my dad's
16 house and I took a left there and there's
17 one right on George Street filled up.

18 MR. PAPI: I think I can find the
19 owner.

20 CHIEF DUBERNAS: It has a big green
21 hood on it. He was using that as part of a
22 sideboard so he could put more stuff in it.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Paul, if you
24 could just take a look at that because, like
25 I said, especially with the wind. But

1 obviously if we have an ordinance on the
2 books and it's not allowed we're going to
3 have to notify him about that as well.

4 MR. PAPI: I'll go check on it
5 tomorrow.

6 MR. SEMENZA: I believe if it's not
7 hooked -- Chief, you might know this. If
8 it's not hooked to your vehicle it can't be
9 on a roadway. Correct? Is that what it
10 says?

11 CHIEF DUBERNAS: I'll have to look
12 into it.

13 ATTY. RINALDI: I don't have that
14 one.

15 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I see Marylynn
16 getting the big book out.

17 ATTY. RINALDI: I'm online. I have
18 it here. Other than prohibited in
19 residential neighborhoods, I don't see
20 anything otherwise. I know we talked about
21 trying to ban trailers.

22 MS. BARTOLETTI: I thought there was
23 something we actually did pass.

24 MR. SEMENZA: Definitely something
25 was passed. I'm 100 percent sure of it.

1 MS. BARTOLETTI: A while ago, too.

2 MR. SEMENZA: My father was adamant
3 about it. That's the only reason I know. I
4 wasn't on council when it was.

5 MS. BARTOLETTI: It had to do with
6 boats and trailers.

7 MR. FEBBO: It was on Orchard Street
8 with Dunbar. One of his residents had it
9 down there.

10 MS. BARTOLETTI: It was actually
11 near the dance studio first. It had to do
12 with an issue off Main Street where that
13 dance studio is. On Henderson, I believe.

14 ATTY. RINALDI: That would be
15 residential.

16 MR. SEMENZA: I believe in '10 or
17 '11 it was passed. Might have been '11.

18 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I remember the
19 boat one. I remember that ordinance. If it
20 falls under the same, then we did pass the
21 trailer one along with the boat one. As
22 Marylynn said, the one on Henderson, that
23 was the reason for the boat one because they
24 were parking them back there.

25 MR. SEMENZA: While we're waiting,

1 anything else for Paul?

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That's all I
3 have.

4 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else? Thanks,
5 Paul.

6 MR. NOTARI: Mr. Chairman, it looks
7 like code 328-36.

8 MR. SEMENZA: Do you want to read
9 that?

10 MR. NOTARI: I didn't open it. I
11 just looked for the number.

12 MS. BARTOLETTI: Three twenty-eight?

13 ATTY. RINALDI: Well, 328 -- which
14 one?

15 MR. NOTARI: Thirty-six.

16 ATTY. RINALDI: Thirty-six defines a
17 trailer, and then all unlawful acts are 37,
18 which says it's unlawful to park them in any
19 highway or street within a residential
20 district.

21 MR. PAPI: He lives in a commercial
22 district. If it's alongside Scott
23 Flanagan's, that's a commercial district.
24 All Main Street is commercial.

25 MS. BARTOLETTI: He has it parked on

1 Mary Street.

2 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: He has it
3 parked on Mary.

4 MR. PAPI: Mary is commercial for
5 the first block back.

6 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That's where
7 he has it parked. That's where I saw it
8 last night. If he has it where Mike said,
9 though -- Mike said there's now a trailer up
10 on George.

11 MR. SEMENZA: Wait a minute. That
12 is commercial one block back?

13 MR. PAPI: Yeah. All of Main
14 Street. Not one block back but one property
15 back.

16 ATTY. RINALDI: So if he's beyond
17 that, yes, he can't be parked there.

18 CHIEF DUBERNAS: He's right at the
19 corner, probably 25, 30 feet from the
20 corner.

21 ATTY. RINALDI: Of Main Street?

22 CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yes.

23 ATTY. RINALDI: Is that a sight
24 problem there, Chief?

25 MR. SEMENZA: No.

1 CHIEF DUBERNAS: No, it wasn't a
2 sight problem. It was just unattached.
3 Like I said, he had it loaded. The other
4 day when I sent Kimbal over there to see if
5 it was abandoned he had a hood on one side,
6 using it like a side board so he could load
7 more stuff on it. But tomorrow morning I'll
8 go and check and see if it's on George
9 Street.

10 MR. SEMENZA: All right. Anything
11 else for Paul? Anybody?

12 All right. Joe Lenceski, DPW
13 manager. Joe, do you have anything to add?
14 Joe Lenceski? We'll go on. We lost Joe.

15 I'm going to go to Dave Lopatka.
16 Everybody has Dave's report in their packet.
17 Dave, anything to add to your report?

18 MR. LOPATKA: I do not.

19 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any
20 questions for Dave?

21 MR. NOTARI: Dave, how about just an
22 update on our building progress.

23 MR. LOPATKA: I was down there,
24 actually, yesterday and today. I know that
25 we dropped the color board off with Marylynn

1 today that has all the colors on it for
2 three different schemes, plus we can still
3 kind of mix and match that a little bit,
4 depending on what you guys choose. I think
5 Marylynn and myself kind of went over it and
6 she had some recommendations as to what to
7 do with the colors.

8 Everything else -- there was a
9 couple RFIs we addressed today. I met with
10 Mark yesterday just to kind of go over that.
11 They're framing in the area where they just
12 poured the concrete to elevate the fire
13 department section up to the level of the
14 borough building. So they framed in there
15 today, at least half of it. They have to
16 finish it.

17 There was one question with regard
18 to Marylynn wanted the closets that were
19 framed into her office. We had one problem
20 in there that we've addressed. They have
21 that. I think for the most part we have all
22 their RFIs at this point addressed. We need
23 the colors. I guess the colors are the next
24 important thing so we can get the window
25 frames and everything ordered.

1 Other than that, they're
2 progressing. They poured the concrete floor
3 in the lower level where the police area is,
4 where the garage was. So they're actually
5 going to start building the cell walls in
6 the garage. They're going to start putting
7 that block up as well this week.

8 MR. NOTARI: Thanks, Dave.

9 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have anything
10 else for Dave?

11 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: One question.
12 Dave, I know we talked about it at the last
13 meeting. I know we're moving into the
14 winter now. Did we make any progress over
15 on Smith, Hoover and Taroli Street with the
16 water problem?

17 MR. LOPATKA: Was that that Lavan's
18 property?

19 MR. SEMENZA: Yes.

20 MR. LOPATKA: Pennsy went back and
21 fixed their driveway and fixed, actually,
22 the driveway of the adjoining property
23 owner, so that should be addressed. Haven't
24 heard anything on that. I did go by there
25 and they did do what we requested them to

1 do.

2 The other ones, no, we haven't -- I
3 mean, I know Joe was going to look into
4 whether or not it was a combined sewer and
5 if we can tie in to it on those other two
6 streets.

7 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I thought Joe
8 said or Bob -- I thought we couldn't tie in.
9 Correct?

10 MR. SEMENZA: It's my understanding
11 that you can't tie in to --

12 MR. LOPATKA: It's a combined
13 system.

14 MR. SEMENZA: You can't put storm
15 water into the sewer.

16 MR. LOPATKA: The only thing with
17 both of them is I think it ends up getting
18 there over land flow and through the street
19 flow. I don't think we can tie directly in
20 to it with a pipe. You're talking a new
21 inlet.

22 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I know we
23 brought up -- not at the last meeting, the
24 meeting before I know we brought up possibly
25 getting Pennsy there to grade it a different

1 way.

2 MR. FEBBO: That's Smith Street.

3 MS. BARTOLETTI: No, that was
4 Fallon.

5 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I thought we
6 were going to ask them to come back to shoot
7 the level, shoot the grade and have them
8 grade the street back. It was Orzalek,
9 Anastassi and the one on Fallon. I can't
10 remember who that's in front of.

11 MR. HOOVER: The one on Fallon
12 Street was the one we were going to take the
13 crest of the road out. Jamie's going to
14 give us a price to mill the middle of the
15 road down. Dave looked at that with myself.
16 He's going to give us a price -- obviously
17 we can't pave now. When the weather breaks
18 he's going to give us a price to mill -- I
19 think it's about two blocks.

20 MR. LOPATKA: It's about four inches
21 of mill off the center line of the street to
22 kind of knock the crown off of it.

23 MR. FEBBO: Did he say between
24 \$8,000 and \$10,000, rough quote?

25 MR. HOOVER: Yeah, somewhere

1 around -- it won't be any more than \$10,000.

2 MR. LOPATKA: It will be less than
3 ten. I just talked to him, actually, on
4 that. But until, you know, like I said, the
5 weather breaks there's probably not a lot we
6 can do with it. I know he did say he could
7 do it for under ten.

8 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: All right.
9 Maybe we can have -- would cutting the crown
10 on those other streets do the fix? Or no?

11 MR. LOPATKA: No, that's not the
12 issue there. The other streets, I think
13 when they were paved -- I think Taroli is
14 the one that -- I think TSE actually paved
15 that as part of the water project. I mean,
16 that one they basically tied in to the
17 existing driveways at grade. All they did,
18 really, was mill an inch and a half out and
19 put an inch and a half back. So it's a
20 relatively flat area. So for them to go
21 back they probably would have to shoot
22 something to get grades to work.

23 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Okay.

24 MR. SEMENZA: Anything else for
25 Dave? Anybody else? Thanks.

1 Joe Lenceski. Everybody has Joe's
2 report. Joe, do you have anything to add?

3 MR. LENCESKI: No, I don't.

4 MR. SEMENZA: Joe, are we ready for
5 the snow storm?

6 MR. LENCESKI: Yes, we are.

7 MR. SEMENZA: That's the biggest
8 concern. We have enough salt? We're good
9 on salt and everything?

10 MR. LENCESKI: We're great on salt.
11 The borough manager, Marylynn, ordered more.
12 We have subcontractors on standby. The
13 trucks have new tires on the ones that were
14 necessary to be changed. All the salt
15 spreaders have been greased, the boxes have
16 been greased. We have short shovels for the
17 trucks in case they get stuck or there's an
18 overflow of salt on the road. We're ready.

19 MR. SEMENZA: Good.

20 MR. FEBBO: Good job, Joe.

21 MR. SEMENZA: Good job is right.
22 Anybody have any questions for Joe?

23 MR. NOTARI: Just a question on the
24 sewer project off of Main Street and Dunn.
25 How are we progressing there?

1 MR. LENCESKI: We're progressing.
2 They had a little hick up. The line was
3 damaged by Main Street, so they needed to
4 fix that pipe so they could get back into
5 the hole and work on it.

6 MR. NOTARI: I noticed they were
7 working in the yard and then for two days
8 there was no work. So I was wondering what
9 happened.

10 MR. LOPATKA: I did talk to Matt the
11 other day because Marylyn had called me and
12 Jimmy had called me about that. That's kind
13 of what the issue was. The existing pipe
14 coming out of that manhole, once they opened
15 the hole up it kind of collapsed. So they
16 had to repair that pipe.

17 The reason they didn't continue with
18 the trench was they didn't want to cut
19 across that homeowner's driveway so that
20 they couldn't get to their garage. So they
21 were kind of waiting on that. Then they
22 were waiting on the weather to see what it
23 was going to do before they kind of opened
24 everything up.

25 MR. NOTARI: So is that going to be

1 an additional cost to us?

2 MR. LOPATKA: I don't know what
3 their overall quote was. They were kind of
4 in there doing what they needed to do to get
5 this fixed. I don't know what the cost was
6 with regard to that pipe. I think they just
7 kind of patched the pipe until they can get
8 the new pipe in and sewer flowing down the
9 new pipe.

10 MR. SEMENZA: Anything else for Joe?

11 MR. NOTARI: No. Good luck tonight
12 and tomorrow, Joe, and to the guys. I know
13 they're going to be working hard for
14 probably 24 straight hours.

15 MR. LENCESKI: I think we're
16 fortunate because of when the storm is
17 hitting us. It will be snowing through the
18 evening, which will keep the traffic down.
19 Then coming Thursday and Friday the
20 recycling is done, so we can concentrate on
21 opening the roads up further and any snow
22 removal we need to do.

23 MR. SEMENZA: What's the schedule
24 for tomorrow for the guys? Is it possible
25 to let them go home a little bit early

1 tomorrow and then come back in?

2 MR. FEBBO: I was thinking the same
3 thing.

4 MR. SEMENZA: Is that something --
5 good idea. Right, Lou?

6 MR. FEBBO: Absolutely. Let them go
7 home at noontime, come back as needed.

8 MR. SEMENZA: They're going to be
9 out for some hours. So maybe get some rest
10 and then go out. I don't know.

11 MR. LENCESKI: Sounds like a good
12 idea.

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: Yeah, that sounds
14 fine.

15 MR. LENCESKI: Paul and Marylynn
16 have been a big help throughout this for me.
17 It's my first storm and they've given me a
18 lot of advice.

19 MR. NOTARI: Sounds good.
20 Everybody's working as a team. That's what
21 we want.

22 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have any
23 questions for Joe? Thanks, Joe. Good luck
24 tomorrow.

25 Everybody has Bill's report.

1 Anybody have any questions? Bill, do you
2 have anything to add?

3 ATTY. RINALDI: Just under item
4 three, there is also a resolution that needs
5 to be passed after that. It's attached to
6 your packet.

7 And the only update I got was I did
8 finally hear -- me and Marylynn both heard
9 today from DCNR with respect to the Project
10 70 land. So we've got to put together a
11 little package there for that. They asked
12 for a detail on public comment on
13 disposition of the property, so I'll go over
14 it with her and see what we need to do to
15 meet that requirement.

16 MS. BARTOLETTI: I sent it out to
17 council, too, just so you guys could take a
18 look at it and know what we're dealing with.

19 MR. NOTARI: Is that something we
20 can talk about now or should we wait until
21 executive?

22 ATTY. RINALDI: We've just got to
23 comply with their requirements.

24 MR. NOTARI: Is one of those
25 requirements that we have to trade land? Is

1 that how I read that?

2 ATTY. RINALDI: Well, that's why I
3 want to go over it with her, because I think
4 that's one thing you can do, is trade land,
5 although we're going to trade projects.
6 That's what we did the last time we did it.
7 We used it on another park.

8 MR. NOTARI: I'm reading that
9 different, then. Okay.

10 MR. SEMENZA: Thank you, Bill.
11 Anybody have any questions for Bill?
12 Thanks, Bill. Marylynn?

13 MS. BARTOLETTI: The only thing that
14 I would like to talk about right now is the
15 budget that we're going to be passing during
16 new business. I don't know if anyone had a
17 chance to take a look at it or how much
18 detail you want me to go into right now, if
19 you just want totals.

20 Then once we're done with that, the
21 only other thing that I have is a few items
22 for executive after the meeting. Do you
23 want me to discuss the budget now or when
24 it's time to pass it?

25 MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any

1 questions? Any standouts on the budget to
2 anybody? Marylynn, you can just talk about
3 it when we pass it.

4 MS. BARTOLETTI: Perfect.

5 MR. SEMENZA: At this time,
6 Marylynn, is there anybody from the public
7 that wants to speak?

8 MS. BARTOLETTI: No e-mails.

9 MR. SEMENZA: Okay. At this time

3 one of our main industries in Old Forge, and
4 I alerted all of our pizza shops yesterday
5 about the program and I'm hoping they are
6 able to take part in it. So we thank the
7 commissioners for looking out for the small
8 businesses not only in the county, but
9 especially here in Old Forge.

10 MR. FEBBO: We really appreciate
11 having somebody from the county come down
12 here and listen to what we have to say.

13 MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Thanks,
14 Commissioner.

15 MR. CHERMAK: Thank you.

16 MR. SEMENZA: If there's nothing
17 else, the chair is going to entertain a
18 motion to adjourn and go into a brief
19 executive session.

20 MR. FEBBO: I'll make that motion.

21 MR. NOTARI: I'll second it.

22 MR. SEMENZA: Seconded by Councilman
23 Notari. All in favor?
