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Mark Wozniak Official Court Reporter MR. SEMENZA: Here. When Russell comes back on will you ask for his roll call, please.

Okay, welcome to the work session for the Old Forge Borough Council. The purpose of tonight's meeting is to set the agenda for our May 19th meeting. We'll hear from our department heads, go down the table, see if any council members have anything to address.

There's public comment that was sent to Marylynn's e-mail address. Marylynn, do we have any public input?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No.

MR. SEMENZA: Russell joined us.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm back. I got disconnected. I'm here.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Councilman Rinaldi is here.

MR. NOTARI: The mayor is absent. Right?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

MR. SEMENZA: Okay. At this time the chair is going to ask the department heads, Paul Papi, zoning code enforcement,

do you have anything for the agenda?

MR. PAPI: No, I don't, Bob.

Everything's quiet.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Paul?

MS. AVVISATO: I do. Paul, if someone lets their yard go, like, really bad, do we call you if I see it?

MR. SEMENZA: Call Marylynn, please.

Call the borough manager's office and let

them know just so it's -- you know, chain of

command goes that way.

MS. AVVISATO: Okay, thank you.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else? How is everything going, Paul? It's probably going to start getting a little busy for you now come up, the grass and everything, garbage and stuff.

MR. PAPI: Bob, I must have written about 12 letters so far.

MR. SEMENZA: Okay.

MR. PAPI: Everything -- I'm getting a response from everybody, though. It's working.

MR. SEMENZA: So obviously the

magistrate is closed down, so there's no hearing or nothing, Paul, on any of our ongoing stuff?

MR. PAPI: All our ongoing stuff has been cancelled and not re-agended yet. So I'm waiting to hear.

MR. SEMENZA: I have nothing else. Thanks, Paul.

MR. PAPI: You're welcome.

MR. SEMENZA: Joe Lenceski, DPW manager. Do you have anything for the agenda, Joe?

MR. LENCESKI: No, I don't, but I'd just like everyone to know that everything's going well with the Pittston recycling, to bring all the yard waste there.

I see they're milling Moosic Road or they're starting to do Oak Street and Moosic Road. They should be paving in a couple weeks.

MR. FEBBO: Joe, are you keeping up with the guys you have?

MR. LENCESKI: No. We definitely can use more help, but Marylynn's been on that and hopefully we can get some more

help.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Joe?

MR. NOTARI: Do we know where the millings are going from Oak Street?

MR. LENCESKI: I believe they're to the hairpin turn on Oak Street. I'm not sure of his name or the address.

MR. SEMENZA: Mike Mokay.

MR. NOTARI: That's on Oak Street?

MR. LENCESKI: Yes.

MR. SEMENZA: Nobody else has anything else for Joe I'm going to move on.

Dave Lopatka, engineer's report.

MR. NOTARI: I do have something else for Joe. The stairs that were falling up on North Main Street, across from the old magistrate's office --

MR. PAPI: I took care of that.

MR. NOTARI: I haven't driven by there in a week or so. Has everything been removed and --

MR. PAPI: Yes, everything that's been removed was what was knocked over.

What exists is the way it was for the last

80 years. And they're going to block the stairs off so they'll never be used again.

MR. NOTARI: Thanks, Paul.

MR. PAPI: All that debris was removed from there.

MR. NOTARI: Excellent.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else for Joe?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Bobby, before we go further I just wanted to jump in for a second. Rick, can you see that the mayor is trying to get in? Can you see anybody trying to get in?

MR. SEMENZA: Marylynn, ask him to go to the website and click on that way, maybe.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I'll figure it out.

MR. SEMENZA: Thank you, Joe. Dave Lopatka, engineer's report. Dave, do you have anything for the agenda coming up?

MR. LOPATKA: Maybe this is for Bill. Bill, are you advertising the storm water ordinance and the illicit discharge ordinance?

ATTY. RINALDI: I want to put the borough code and the (unintelligible.)

MR. LOPATKA: You can add that.

Other than that, I don't have anything. My report, if you have questions on it I'll answer.

MR. SEMENZA: Everybody's got Dave's report. Dave, the only thing, like I said earlier, is I'd like to change July 7th as a special meeting to approve bids.

MR. LOPATKA: I'll revise that and I'll get you an updated copy.

MR. SEMENZA: Marylynn, can we advertise for a special meeting for July 7th, please?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yeah.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Dave? Dave, the drawing looks real good. Everybody got two different books at the borough building, an A and a B. Did everybody see their e-mails?

MR. LOPATKA: What's the preference?

MR. SEMENZA: I like B.

MR. NOTARI: I like B.

MS. AVVISATO: B looks better.

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MR. SEMENZA: It's not much of a difference, but I just like the look of B.

MR. LOPATKA: I think those raised roofs make it look a lot nicer, and the windows.

MR. LETTIERI: A little more modern.

MR. NOTARI: That's what I thought too, Mike. B is more modern looking.

MR. LOPATKA: It needs to be dressed up a little bit if you're going to do this.

MS. AVVISATO: Definitely.

MR. LOPATKA: The only other thing -- and it's not for the agenda but it's all included in my report. I included a bunch of different programs that have to be vetted by the borough and approved by the Just public education and borough. outreach, public involvement, participation program, and then the illicit discharge program, which is structured for the borough If you guys want to read through itself. those and let me know if there's anything that you think I need to change in there. They've been submitted to DEP, though. There's a lot of information in there.

Those reports are all requirements for your MS4 permit. They're all submitted. I mean, they're under review. They can be modified.

anything for the agenda other than -- well, I do actually have something for the agenda, which would be the -- well, there's, like, 70 to 75 percent drawings for the May 19th council meeting which you guys need to approve of us bidding it then, at that meeting. I think you have to make a motion for us to put it out to bid. So it will go out to bid on June 30th.

MR. SEMENZA: Yeah.

MR. LOPATKA: I'd like to add that to the agenda. You need to make a motion to approve us to go out to bid.

MR. SEMENZA: Right. That will be on our May 19th meeting.

MR. LOPATKA: Yes.

MR. NOTARI: Dave, will you have a pre-bid meeting?

MR. LOPATKA: There will be a pre-bid. Right now we have to figure out how we need to do it with all this social

distancing and grouping up. I'll talk about that and we'll try and figure that out.

Hopefully I'll have an answer for you on the 19th.

MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Dave. Anybody have any questions for Dave on anything?

Thanks, Dave.

Chief Dubernas, police report. What do you have? Do you have anything for the agenda, Chief?

MR. LOPATKA: I have nothing for the agenda, but things are really starting to pick up. The last two days we were slammed with calls. I'm not sure exactly what's going on. I'm not sure if the little bit of openings put more people out on the streets, but we've been really, really busy the last two days.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Chief Dubernas?

MS. AVVISATO: Chief, how are the calls for the meth?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: We haven't hardly had any drugs calls at all because I think everybody's hibernating right now.

MS. AVVISATO: I was worried about that. When I saw the last report I got a little nervous.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: But the thefts are gone through the roof. We're having a pile of people cutting catalytic converters off of cars on car lots now. Now you're starting to see the effects of nobody working. Everybody's trying to make some type of money.

MS. AVVISATO: Sorry to hear that, Chief. Thank you.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else? Thank you, Chief.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Also, on Sunday nights you're going to see Eric Williams. He's going to be on the bike because it seems like we've been getting a lot of people walking around the parks in the evenings. At both parks. The Marion Street and the Miles Street park. They're not in the park but they're walking out and about with kids and everything. So Officer Williams has been on the bike on Sundays for that.

MR. FEBBO: That sounds good.

MS. AVVISATO: Thank you.

MR. SEMENZA: Chief, are we having any issues of social distancing?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: No.

MR. SEMENZA: You're not coming across any large parties or kids playing or whatever it may be?

We had was for a birthday party. We've been doing a lot of these birthday parties.

We're probably up to about 50. Only one that there was a whole group of them on the front lawn. But other than that, even with the parties, like families, they've been in their own cars and pretty much staying away from each other.

MS. AVVISATO: Good. Thank God.

MR. FEBBO: Jay, were you able to make contact on that car on Morton Street for me?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: No, I did not, but
I will take care of that first thing in the
morning. I got busy. We had a lead on a
person stealing the catalytic converters and

that's what we were doing all afternoon.

I'll take care of that first thing in the morning, as soon as I come in.

MR. FEBBO: Thanks, Chief.

MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Chief. Bill, do you have anything for the agenda?

ATTY. RINALDI: Yes. Everybody has the draft of the resolution with regards to extending the real estate tax deadline, Covid-19 pandemic. Everybody can review that and consider it at the next meeting.

Okay?

Also, the two ordinances Dave spoke with, they're probably 98 percent done. I'm just going to fill in who enforces it. It's going to be the borough engineer and code enforcement are on both. That's it unless anybody has anything for me on the Project 70 land. I don't know what they wanted to do.

MR. FEBBO: Bobby, did you and Rick meet at all?

MR. SEMENZA: No, we did not.

MR. NOTARI: We can meet this week on it, probably. Right?

MR. SEMENZA: Yeah, I'd like to meet this week, Rick. You set something up, whether it's via facetime or just meeting.

MR. NOTARI: Okay.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Bill? Anything else, Bill?

ATTY. RINALDI: No, that's it.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Bill?

MS. AVVISATO: I'm good.

MR. NOTARI: I have one thing. It could be for Bill, it could be for Marylynn. We talked about the paperwork for the fees for the rental property ordinances and the nuisance ordinances. Is that paperwork available at the borough building yet for me to go over and to look to see if we can come up with a schedule for fees?

ATTY. RINALDI: I believe we have it, Marylynn. Right? I know we talked about it.

MS. BARTOLETTI: There's an old one that's hanging in the office but, yeah, that was never updated. So it needs to be -- it definitely needs some work.

ATTY. RINALDI: I know I did a scan of the Old Forge Borough code. You can scan for fees (unintelligible) the whole code.

That's what I did.

MR. NOTARI: Thank you.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody else have any questions for Bill?

MR. LETTIERI: Bill, with the church thing and the rectory, what's the status on that? Did we move forward on anything with that?

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, you own the rectory, and until they supply us that they're closing the church (unintelligible.)

MR. LETTIERI: So they still didn't close on the church?

ATTY. RINALDI: No, it's not closed. They haven't provided us yet.

MR. FEBBO: I talked to Sal Luzio.

He said that the finance committee and all that have been talking to Father. As you said, Bill, nothing's going to happen at the diocese until -- I guess until this whole thing blows over and everybody gets back on their feet.

MR. LETTIERI: Thank you, Bill.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else?

MS. AVVISATO: Thanks, Bill. No,

good.

MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Bill.

Marylynn, borough manager. Do you have anything for the agenda, Mare?

MS. BARTOLETTI: I just have a couple things for tonight. The first is, I had a couple requests from the school. The first is to possibly close Marion Street on June 11th or June 12th for graduation.

The second request would be that they would like to have a parade, probably through Main Street. Like, through the regular parade route.

So I already talked to the chief about it and he's aware, but I just wanted to make everyone else aware of the request.

MR. NOTARI: I don't have an issue with either of them, but are they -- they're going to close Marion Street for graduation?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes.

MR. NOTARI: What are they going to do about parking? Or is it going to be

student graduation only?

MS. BARTOLETTI: I'm not sure. I think we're a little bit in the early stages of it, but I wanted to put it out to you guys as a request for now just so you know that there's a possibility of it.

MR. SEMENZA: Well, we have a few school board members on right now, I see.

If one of them wants to unmute and enlighten us if they have any information on what they're going to do for parking or whatever it may be. Alicia? Chris? Rob?

MS. AVVISATO: I have no idea what the plans are.

MR. THOMAS: Chris Gatto put them on the website. Graduation is June 11th. If social distancing guidelines will permit, Mr. Gatto wants to use the stadium. That's a Thursday, I believe. If social distancing guidance says no, then they're going to go up the Circle Drive-in, and then they want to come back home from that and parade through the town.

MR. SEMENZA: So why do they want Marion Street closed down, Chris?

MR. THOMAS: I'd have to ask

Mr. Gatto, but I didn't hear anything about
that.

MR. SEMENZA: Marylynn, do you want to let them know what was requested to you?

MR. THOMAS: I can call him and ask him to call in.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Council President,
I was contacted yesterday by Ms. Trotta
along with the fire chief. They're just
asking if we can do a parade and close
Marion Street like we do for the spring
olympics or athletic day or whatever that
is.

MR. SEMENZA: Okay.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: We're supposed to meet with them and work on some type of details of exactly what they're looking for or how they want to do it, whatever their plan is.

MR. SEMENZA: Chief, Marylynn, whoever it may be that's involved or any school board member, keep council up to date on what's going on with this, please.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yes.

MR. NOTARI: I don't have any problem with them doing that, but I think they need to have a plan. Otherwise, the neighborhood surrounding the school are going to be inundated with cars.

MR. SEMENZA: Right.

MR. NOTARI: Just to plan ahead.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Correct. I think
the way they're saying they want to block
it, they want to block it at Railroad Street
and West Grace like they do for field day or
whatever. I'm not positive. I have to get
more information. I was just contacted
yesterday with fire chief Tag.

MR. THOMAS: Jason, did he say what night they want to do that?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: June 11th is the priority, June 12th is the rain date.

Because my understanding was everything was going to be done at the stadium, and then I got contacted yesterday.

MR. THOMAS: I know the plans are online for Thursday, stadium, if social distancing is allowed, and the backup is we have the Circle Drive-in reserved for June

12th.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Okay.

MR. THOMAS: But I just sent

Mr. Gatto a text to keep you guys updated.

MR. SEMENZA: Thanks, Chris. Marylynn, do you have anything else?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. The other thing that Joe had mentioned earlier about the DPW employees, I did hire one person who just started and probably tomorrow we're hiring another one. I think having two extra people will be very helpful for the DPW right now.

This is something that I may have for the agenda. I'm in the process of setting up with a credit card payment company to be able to accept payments for whether it's sewer or garbage stickers or police reports or anything like that. So we may have to have something to be able to pass at the meeting in two weeks. That's all I have for tonight.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Marylynn?

MR. LETTIERI: You were just talking

about DPW help. I know last time we spoke we were talking about school signs.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Maybe that's something we can do in the next week.

MR. SEMENZA: I'm going to talk about that shortly. Chris Thomas, I think you're getting a lot of background noise.

MR. THOMAS: I wanted to ask a question of Marylynn. There was a car going by. For our borough taxes did we change our dates? Did we alter our dates? Or are following the dates that went out on the tax bill?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Bill Rinaldi brought that up just a couple minutes ago.

I think council is going to make a decision at the next meeting about extending.

MR. THOMAS: Okay.

MR. SEMENZA: Anybody have any questions for Marylynn?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Who did we hire for what or are we hiring somebody?

MR. SEMENZA: Temporary help we hired for DPW and she's going to hire another one.

Marylynn, do you want to step in here? MS. BARTOLETTI: We hired summer help for DPW named Michael Bernardi and probably tomorrow I'm going to be hiring another. It's just for seasonal help. MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: That's like we MR. SEMENZA: The 90 day temp guys. MS. BARTOLETTI: Not a 90-day temp, That kid's not going to be picking up recyclables and MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. Every summer we usually put two people on with DPW just MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: Okay. I didn't know they did that type of work. I thought they helped with the fields and stuff. MS. BARTOLETTI: That's a little bit MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So these kids 25

wanted to speak.

MR. SEMENZA: Did you e-mail anything to Marylynn, Chris?

MR. GOETZ: No, I didn't.

MR. SEMENZA: We'll let you go, but in the future we ask that you e-mail in your public comments and we'll address it that way. But go ahead.

MR. GOETZ: Okay. So I'm just wondering if there's been any action by the zoning office with regard to Trion Equipment or Scrap Enterprises being cited for operating a business without a permit in the borough?

MR. SEMENZA: Bill, do you want to step in on this and address Chris, please.

ATTY. RINALDI: The zoning officer hasn't done it. That's part of the contempt, that he's not zoned for it.

MS. GOETZ: Okay. My next question would be -- and maybe this is for Bill. I had a neighbor contact me regarding the hours and times of operation over there that he and his attorney agreed to at one of the hearings. Whether that's Monday through

Friday certain hours, Saturday and no Sundays or so on and so forth. I know at least two neighbors here called the police in the last week about the constant banging going on at quarter to 8, 8:00 at night. It somebody could look into that, Bill. That should be in the minutes of one of the hearings where his lawyer stated when they were going to do work and not going to do work.

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, I know our ordinance had hours of operation in it. I think, if I'm not mistaken, it's 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

MR. GOETZ: Okay, but it's on the record that he was only going to work certain hours. The ordinance -- I understand what you're saying, but now we can't say we have an ordinance where he can operate and then he doesn't need a permit because of a case. We need to follow one or the other here.

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, he has -- in both cases he needs to come into conformance. I mean, we can cite him.

There's no magistrate and we can't go back to the hearing until the judge gives us the okay. The virus has us kind of in limbo.

We were two hours away from finishing up.

MR. GOETZ: Right, and I was there.

I understand we're at the court's mercy, but if it was in the minutes from -- it may have been six months ago. I can't because all the hearings get mangled together. There's been so many of them. This thing is two months away from being two years after a six month deadline given.

But anyway, his lawyer stated that he was only going to work so many hours. The same thing about when he's going to cut with torches he was supposed to let the borough know. They're constantly over there cutting with torches and I know there's no firemen or nobody else over there watching them.

So if we're not going to hold him to this, then we need to go back to the borough ordinance of operating a business without a permit. He can be cited every single day that he's operating over there for the last

seven years.

MR. FEBBO: I agree with Chris. I think something should be done. Every day somebody should go over there. If it's not Paul, then the police. Every time that he's in violation of either time-wise or torches somebody should be over there to cite him. It should not continue.

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, I don't know what ordinance we have regarding torches. We have cited him when he starts fires. The other ordinance we have is noise, and if we can get equipment we can tackle that problem.

MR. HOOVER: The problem we have is that this goes on nightly.

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, he shouldn't be doing it after 8:00.

MR. HOOVER: How many citations has he been written out since our last meeting?

ATTY. RINALDI: They're coming up.

Let's see here. Rescheduled to June 16th.

MR. HOOVER: But between now and then, Bill, he should be cited. What do we have to do to get him cited? Who do we have

to send over there?

ATTY. RINALDI: We can send Paul.

He's got to cite him for doing something
wrong. If he's working, making noise after
8:00 there's -- if he's making noise beyond
the limit there's an ordinance for that. If
you want to cite some other business that
operates there without a permit, you know,
what permit does he need is what you look
at.

MR. FEBBO: He doesn't have any permits. He doesn't have an occupancy permit or anything.

MR. HOOVER: Between the phone call, whoever makes it, to the police department, by the time the police department gets there he's gone or the noise is stopped and we walk away and we're stuck again. Nothing ever happens. I don't think we've ever written a citation since we've been going to court over there. We have not written a citation, I'm going to say, in at least over a year. Chief, have we?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: I haven't personally written a citation to him over a

year because I was off, but there's been citations issued for him, equipment violations where he actually had one of his trucks towed. There was another one. I know we have hearings coming up in June, I think there's myself and a few other officers, from having citations issued to him for equipment violations, open burning, unsupervised burning, don't have the proper fire extinguisher, proper fire extinguisher agent. I'm not sure. There's a whole pile of them he's been issued.

MR. FEBBO: He's still not in compliance with it, and that's on a regular basis.

MR. HOOVER: Does Bill have a copy of all these violations?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Attorney Rinaldi is actually going to be at the hearings with us.

MR. HOOVER: He should have a copy so when we go to court or we have this virtual meeting Judge Munley knows about these. This is just -- I think it's ridiculous. He's doing what he wants up

there.

MR. FEBBO: He's growing, by the way.

MR. HOOVER: He's got more cars there than you can shake a stick at.

MR. FEBBO: I think it's time to have another drone fly over the place and take some pictures for us.

MR. GOETZ: I know you're saying about him working until 8:00, but if the court -- his lawyer made a statement on the record in court that he's going to work only certain hours, then that's what I believe we need to follow. So someone needs to get the court records and find out because you're saying we're tied up in court and we have to do what the court says. That's why we can't cite him for not having a permit to operate a business. It can't be both. It has to be one or the other. It can't be both.

ATTY. RINALDI: We've reviewed the (unintelligible) and not as open -- occupancy permits are for buildings and structures (unintelligible.) You've got to go by what our ordinances are. So whatever

we can cite him with we've been citing him with.

MR. FEBBO: Bill, to be in a business like he's in it's just like being in the car business, which I was in for 40 years. He needs to have permits from the state. He needs all sorts of licenses right down to a salesman's license to sell equipment, of which we've never asked him nor he's never presented, and I think we should go after that part of it, too.

ATTY. RINALDI: That would be a state issue for a car lot, and they're always on top of that.

MR. FEBBO: He doesn't even have a permit from the borough. He has no permits.

MR. GOETZ: You can't tell me that you can open a business in this town without a permit from the borough.

MR. FEBBO: You can't sell equipment or trucks without having a salesman's license.

MR. GOETZ: You can't sell candy.

MR. FEBBO: We stick our head in the sand all we want but it's not going away.

ATTY. RINALDI: Whatever we can cite him with we cite him with. If I can find an ordinance to cite (unintelligible.)

MR. GOETZ: Since December he should have been cited 50 times.

ATTY. RINALDI: He has been cited.

He's been cited by Taylor, Old Forge, state

police. (Unintelligible.)

MR. GOETZ: He's never been cited by the borough. He's in violation of the zoning ordinance for operating a business in a zone that does not allow that. And even if he was operating a business that was allowed in that zone, he still needs a permit to operate the business which he does not have and admitted that on the stand. That's then. That was in December. Neither zoning officer has cited him for operating a business without a permit.

ATTY. RINALDI: They cited him. He was cited for operating (unintelligible.)

It included that business that

(unintelligible.) You were in court. We ran through each of them.

MR. GOETZ: He hasn't been cited.

ATTY. RINALDI: Chris, the property owner gets the citation. He's been cited. He has cited him. Our case is against Stocki individually for operating or leasing any kind of business (unintelligible.) He's been cited and fined and he appealed it.

MR. GOETZ: Once.

ATTY. RINALDI: He only has to cite him once.

MR. GOETZ: He can be cited every single day he's open. Every day he's there is another violation.

ATTY. RINALDI: The fine that he got is a daily fine. He's appealing that.

MR. GOETZ: I'm not saying that. He can get another citation every day.

MR. FEBBO: Exactly.

MR. GOETZ: There's another company over there. It's a company called Trion Equipment that was not part of -- was never cited. Hasn't been cited ever.

ATTY. RINALDI: That's not the way the ordinance works.

MR. GOETZ: It was a made up company so he can come in and sell equipment.

ATTY. RINALDI: You cite the person for violating the ordinance. If they do not cease and desist or appeal with 30 days you go to the magistrate and the magistrate fines him. You also ask him to fine him for every day that that continues. You don't go down every day and recite him. That was done.

MR. GOETZ: I do hear what you're saying, but I have gotten other opinions that disagree with that, that he could be cited each day that he continues to operate. I'll leave it at that.

But I'm going to go back to my original point, Bill.

ATTY. RINALDI: I don't know how it (unintelligible.)

MR. FEBBO: Bobby, could we have some updated pictures? Have a drone fly over, get some pictures?

MR. SEMENZA: Do we have somebody with a drone?

ATTY. RINALDI: I have a person that does all my -- I have somebody that takes pictures from time to time. I'll contact

them.

MR. FEBBO: How about getting an update of the field over there, Bill, just to take a look at what we have as of today's date or tomorrow's date or this week.

ATTY. RINALDI: I'll get it before we go back.

MR. FEBBO: We've seen incoming, nothing going out. I just see stuff coming in.

MR. GOETZ: Well, it's going out in a dumpster. I'm hearing it being cut up every day.

ATTY. RINALDI: Are there dumpsters rolling out of there?

MR. GOETZ: Well, it's getting out of here somehow because they're cutting it up over here every single day of the week.

MR. FEBBO: He's in violation of that. He's not supposed to be using any torches until he's down to the last 20 percent and can't be moved by a truck. That's what -- he's supposed to have a permit with fire people there and somebody from our borough over there to oversee it as

he's doing it. He's never complied with that. He just does it when he wants to do it.

MR. GOETZ: I'm going to go back to the original question, Bill, and that is I would like to somehow -- if I have to request it of the borough. Someone needs to check the minutes of the hearing when his lawyer told the judge the days and the hours of the week that he was going to work, because if he said he wasn't going to work on Sunday he better not be working on Sunday.

ATTY. RINALDI: We have an ordinance that says he can't work on Sunday. I'll see if we can the equipment to find out where the noise violation is.

MR. GOETZ: Again, I'm going back to what his lawyer told the judge. His lawyer told the judge there were going to be certain hours and days he was going to work. So to me he has to follow that.

ATTY. RINALDI: Right,

(unintelligible.) That's what we're in the hearing over. That's our case. He's still

scrapping, period.

MR. GOETZ: I understand that's the case. What I'm telling you is back in December -- wasn't December. I don't know. It was one of the summertime hearings, August, whatever. He talked about with the fire. They talked about calling the borough when they were going to torch, when they were going to use torches. Louie was there, all these guys were there. His lawyer said we're going to work Monday through Friday from 7 to 5, Saturdays until 2 or 3, and we're not going to work Sunday. Then why is that not being followed?

ATTY. RINALDI: That was a conversation I don't think was on the record.

MR. GOETZ: That's all I want to know. Okay.

MR. SEMENZA: Anything else? Thank you.

MR. GOETZ: That's all I have.
Thank you for the time. That's it.

MR. SEMENZA: Marylynn, is there any comment put in? Anybody e-mail you comment

since the last?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, there's nothing.

MR. SEMENZA: Then at this time the chair is going to go down the table. Mayor, do you have anything to address? Okay, he's not answering. Councilwoman Avvisato, anything?

MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Febbo?

MR. FEBBO: Do we bring it up now
that Jimmy and myself met with --

MAYOR LEGG: I came back. I'm good.

MR. SEMENZA: Thank you, Mayor.

MR. FEBBO: He and I met with

Schuback yesterday to discuss the towing
issues. Do we want to discuss that now or
in executive?

MR. SEMENZA: You can bring it up if you want.

MR. FEBBO: Bill, I read everything that you sent out, which was quite lengthy, the three of those other municipalities.

You have good information, and I don't know

what Jimmy's opinion is on this, but I think after meeting with Mike and also Billy the borough should not get involved at all with the towing situation at all. We're going to open up a can of worms. The municipalities that we talked about in the issue, there, they more or less have their own person that deals with -- Scranton particularly. They have their own dispatcher that sends people out in a rotation method. Now, we have the odd/even with the two towing companies.

I think if we venture into that
we're going to get into some legal disputes
with it. I don't think we should involve
ourselves at all with towing. Let the
towers work it out themselves.

That being said, from what I read the chief of police in the three municipalities are the ones that designate the towing. Again, that being said, I think we just let our police officers dictate who they call for a tow job.

There's also other issues there about the permits, their equipment being acceptable, the kind of equipment that's

needed. If we're going to get involved we're going to have to hold everybody to that complaint.

So again, my feeling is that let's just sit down and let them work it out and let the police work it out. If a cop is on the scene he knows who to call -- who he should call based on the qualifications that they have. This third guy that comes in here, put his name on there. But if the police officers feel they're not comfortable working with him -- because personalities get involved there also.

MR. SEMENZA: Personalities all over the borough, Councilman Febbo. I disagree with that.

MS. AVVISATO: I disagree.

MR. SEMENZA: There are personalities all over the borough, not only the --

MR. FEBBO: I agree, but do we want to venture into that? Do we want to venture into making the calls and taking on towing as part of our responsibility?

MR. HOOVER: First of all, talking

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with the two of them it's very hard. Both of them have different prices for everything.

MR. FEBBO: That's the other part, pricing. The pricing is completely out of whack. Billy told me that he'll tow a car for somebody with a DUI and he'll normally charge one price for somebody. A lady will come up to him, she'll be crying, she has a family, she's a single parent, he'll say give me \$20, give me \$30. Mike does the same thing. There's not one set price between the two of them on what they charge each individual. It's up to the insurance departments a little bit. And for us to come up with a pay scale to say it's a certain amount of money to tow a car, to do this, to do that, a certain amount of money to store a car in your fenced-in area at your shop, it's things that I don't think we should get involved. I really don't. going to be a big headache for the borough.

And they only get -- neither one of them have towed a car in four weeks. They only get 40, 50 tows a year. It's not a lot

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But like Mike said -- Mike was of tows. perfectly honest with me. He said when he first started doing this seven or eight years ago he was on the bottom of the rung. He was on the bottom of the barrel. He had to work his way up. He had to get experience, he had to do this, he had to do He had to play the game. He let that. Billy -- Billy started calling him when he was busy, and that's kind of how he got where he is today, instead of somebody just jumping in and saying I want to be part of the towing contract and not even have the right stuff to do what he's doing. I told him we'd talk to them again about this. This is just the beginning. But talking to Lou, I think we should talk about this in executive session and really discussed what we want to do. It's a lot more involved.

MR. SEMENZA: Well, with all due respect, I don't want to leave it up to our police officers to make the decision who to call, who not to call. That's my opinion, my personal opinion.

Chief, I don't know how you feel

about that, but that's my --

MS. AVVISATO: Maybe we should meet in executive session:

MR. SEMENZA: Rick, would you stay on and block everybody off after this so we can do an executive after this?

MR. NOTARI: I think we can do that.

MR. SEMENZA: Let's stay on after this meeting, we'll go into executive.

Councilman Febbo, anything else?

MR. FEBBO: No, that's all, Bob.

MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Hoover?

MR. HOOVER: No. I just want to thank Paul for staying on those steps or Joe for staying on those steps on Main Avenue.

Bob, who's in charge of that area up there in relationship to the road and cleaning that area up? The weeds and all that stuff. It's a state road. Is that the state?

MR. SEMENZA: I don't know.

Marylynn, do you know who is in charge of that, the weeds and everything on side of the road?

MR. HOOVER: Just the garbage laying around.

MR. SEMENZA: I'm sure it would be the property owner. Somebody has to own that property.

MR. HOOVER: Both sides of the street it would look so much better if they'd just cut ten feet of those weeds away and just clean the edge of the road up because everybody just throws their stuff out there. It just looks horrible driving by.

MR. NOTARI: Can we have Joe call someone at PennDOT and see if it's their responsibility or if it's the borough's?

MR. SEMENZA: Maybe it would be Paul who would call. Right?

MR. NOTARI: I thought DPW.

MR. SEMENZA: Well, it's a garbage issue. Marylynn, who would call? It doesn't matter, really. Somebody call.

MR. LENCESKI: From what I understand in the past we've done that, but with the virus and everything that's going on with the yard waste and being behind because they shut down, our third-party vendor from NE Cartage, we haven't been able

to get it.

MR. FEBBO: So you're saying the borough does it, Joe?

MR. LENCESKI: From what I understand in the past we have. It's just the situation that we have with the yard waste and the manpower. We haven't been able to get to it yet to do it.

MR. SEMENZA: Okay, then we'll just stay status quo. Get to it when you can,

Joe. Anything else?

MR. HOOVER: No, that's it.

MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Lettieri?

MR. LETTIERI: The only question I have is in the beginning of the year we had a tentative committee list. Did we finalize that list of committees?

MR. SEMENZA: That is finalized.

MR. LETTIERI: Thank you, sir.

MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Notari?

MR. NOTARI: I have a few things.

I'd like to visit the park situation. Have we thought about whether we're going to or when we will reopen the parks officially?

MR. SEMENZA: I think, in my

opinion, they shouldn't open just yet. With the social distancing I think you're going to have groups of people coming around. I think it's going to be bad. If you look at somewhere like McDade or the other county parks, the difference with that is there's maintenance guys there. There's people around to -- our police can't be in our parks 24/7.

MR. NOTARI: So our plan is, then -what are we doing with our parks? We
haven't call them back yet?

MR. SEMENZA: Not as of yet.

MS. BARTOLETTI: We haven't called anyone back yet.

MR. NOTARI: And again, in that fact I am interested in having at least the golf nets and the tennis nets placed back up at the Marion Street park. I understand it is technically closed even though we can't close it. But personally, I'm looking to get the parks back open as soon as possible. So that's my first thing.

Second thing is have we discussed a paving project at all for this year?

MR. FEBBO: No, we haven't. Me and Jimmy touched on that yesterday. I think we said we're going to sit it out this year.

MR. HOOVER: I think we can get some streets down, but Dave's still on it. The bidding process is going to be a little hectic. I think everybody's going to be so busy that we're not -- I don't think we're going to be able to get any bidders, and if we do it's going to be high because they're not going to want it.

So I think if we really come down with a schedule this year and bid it out early next year, January, February, where nobody has any work to do, where they'll want it and we'll get a decent price on it.

MR. LOPATKA: That's a good idea.

MR. SEMENZA: I'd rather do a storm water project.

MR. LOPATKA: At some point with this MS4 stuff we're going to have to do a storm water project.

MR. SEMENZA: I'd rather do a storm water project rather than pave roads. First and foremost, if the water has nowhere to go

it's going to destroy the roads. You can pave all you want, you can do it as many times as you want. It's going to destroy the roads. Water destroys roads when it lays in this area.

MR. LOPATKA: There's going to be some requirements under this MS4 for you guys to do some work. Once we get that PRP plan done I can kind of give you a better idea of what some of those projects may need to be. So that should be done in about a month or two once we get surveyors out there, once they're available to go out there.

MR. FEBBO: So where we stand right now is we're foregoing the paving program for this year and putting our money into the other project that we need to get done?

MR. SEMENZA: I would like to see some kind of storm/sewer separation or storm water project. Something.

MR. LOPATKA: We'll have a much better idea once we get this PRP plan and map and everything done. Once we have that we could probably sit down and talk about

what you want to do.

MR. SEMENZA: Most of our town is a combined system.

MR. NOTARI: Let me ask these questions, then. I have no problem with putting it off a year as long as we're going to continue to do it, and I've been pushing for storm water management for the past four years. But don't we have a dedicated millage or don't we need to use liquid fuel taxes on road improvement?

MS. BARTOLETTI: There's other uses as well, Rick.

MR. NOTARI: And is storm water management one of them?

MS. BARTOLETTI: If you'd like I can send you the list after the meeting and then you can go over it.

MR. NOTARI: Okay, because I'm just saying we have to make sure that -- Bob's saying we can put the money toward storm water. I just want to make sure that that's allowable.

MS. BARTOLETTI: Another way that you can also do storm water is through CDBG

money. That's another option as well.

MR. NOTARI: That's correct, yes.

MR. SEMENZA: But I thought it

was --

MR. NOTARI: Might want to make sure that --

MR. SEMENZA: -- that we can use that for storm water or sewer.

MR. NOTARI: Liquid fuels?

MR. SEMENZA: Yeah, I thought it was. Maybe I'm wrong. Maybe I misunderstood.

MR. HOOVER: Maybe we can do both.

Maybe we can do something with both.

MR. SEMENZA: If we don't start putting storm basins in, something like that you're spinning your wheels paving roads.

You go look at the water laying on roads, puddles on the edge of the roads. I don't know. I think we are wasting money doing this time over time again.

MR. FEBBO: I agree with you and Dave. I think this year, anyway, that we should concentrate on the water runoff more so than roads. It is late in the year to go

looking for bids on roads and so on. Just forego that and go with your projection on the water runoff. Let Dave come up with his plan that is required by DEP.

MR. SEMENZA: Sounds like a plan.

Councilman Notari, anything else?

MR. NOTARI: I believe that's it for right now. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

MR. SEMENZA: Councilman Rinaldi?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: No items, Bob. I'm good. Thank you.

MR. SEMENZA: The only thing I have is I would like to set up interviews for the DPW workers on May 12th, Marylynn. Can we do that?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Sure.

MR. SEMENZA: You set it up or does Rick have to set it up for us? How does it go?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Maybe Rick can help set that up, yeah.

MR. NOTARI: It's not a problem if I set up. Then I can set up and then shut off. I just won't be at the meeting. I can set up the meeting and then I can leave the

the 19th. I'd like to put on the agenda hire a DPW worker for the agenda for the 19th.

MS. AVVISATO: This is full time. Right?

MR. SEMENZA: Full time, yes.

MR. NOTARI: How many are we hiring, one?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Just one.

MR. SEMENZA: How many applications do we have?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Two.

MR. NOTARI: Do we need more than one?

MS. BARTOLETTI: No, right now we have one opening and we have one person on workman's comp. So right now I think we'd be hiring just one person.

MR. NOTARI: Thank you.

MR. SEMENZA: That's all I have. If that's it, the chair is going to entertain a motion to adjourn.

MR. LENCESKI: Bob, I'd like to talk real quick. I think the DPW committee should sit down with me to discuss the

streets that might need to be paved. I'd like to sit down with the DPW committee about the streets that might need to be paved and the paving committee about the storm water or vise-versa because the DPW workers know the areas that are troublesome when there are storms and I'd like to address them.

MR. SEMENZA: That would be the paving and I'm going to say the sewer because it's a combined system. Probably 90 percent of our town is a combined system.

Correct?

MR. LENCESKI: I think so.

MR. LOPATKA: Does the borough have a sewer map from LLVSA or anybody that shows exactly what's combined?

MR. SEMENZA: Paul Papi, unmute yourself.

Dave, quite a bit is combined. I can contact LLVSA. I think they'll know.

But I think Paul would know, too. Marylynn, do you have any idea?

MS. BARTOLETTI: I think there's a map in the office.

MR. LENCESKI: I know we have a variety of maps in our office I didn't get the opportunity to look at right now, only being here a few months. But there are maps to go through. I just haven't had the opportunity to go through them.

MR. LOPATKA: If you want to get them to me or I can stop down there and just kind of leaf through them because it would be helpful for some of this MS4 stuff that we're putting together.

MR. LENCESKI: Definitely.

MR. LOPATKA: Joe, I'll give you a call.

MR. SEMENZA: Dave, like I say, 90 percent of the town is still a combined system.

MR. LOPATKA: We want to delineate that the best we can. That has to be part of this map that we put together. If I can at least get a map or at least get an idea of what it is it would help us kind of put that map together.

MR. FEBBO: Are they requiring us to do something, come up with immediately to

show that we are making some progress on that?

MR. LOPATKA: With regards to the first requirement, the biggest requirement as part of this PRP plan is for us to quantify an amount of sediment load that's required to be captured by the borough. So as part of that we're mapping in the area right now some of the basins that are in place. Some of them we can use, some we can't use. But once we have that map together it kind of gives us a plan so that we know where we can start and where we can start separating some stuff. Joe, I'll give you a call.

MR. SEMENZA: If nobody has anything else, the chair is going to entertain a motion to adjourn.

MR. NOTARI: I'll make that motion.

MR. SEMENZA: By Councilman Notari.

All in favor?

(Unanimous. Meeting adjourned.)
