them have anything they would like to see on the agenda for our regular meting, which we moved to May 25, 2021, Tuesday. Then at the end, if anyone from the public -- the chief has a sign-in sheet. If anyone would like to speak we'll give whoever from the public who wants time.

With that said, Dave, we're going to go right to you because the DPW manager isn't here. Do you have anything for the agenda?

MR. LOPATKA: I have nothing for the agenda.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Does anyone have any questions or anything for Dave?

MS. AVVISATO: I'd like to tell him that he did an unbelievable job on that inspection. Very good.

MR. NOTARI: Thanks, Dave.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Dave, anything else?

MR. LOPATKA: No.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone else?
Thanks, Dave. Chief Dubernas, anything for the agenda?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Nothing.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone have questions for the chief? Thanks, Chief.

Bill, anything from the solicitor?

ATTY. RINALDI: One item. Well, you're going to have some bids coming back on the May 25th meeting for the garbage and the zoning RFP. Also, I'd like to schedule for the regular meeting the public hearing on the zoning change because I need two weeks to run an ad. We didn't have enough time between the last meeting and this meeting.

So can everybody do it at -- well, the regular meeting is at 7:00. Can you do it at 6:00?

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: On the 25th. Correct?

ATTY. RINALDI: On the 25th.

MR. NOTARI: We have that CDBG meeting at 6:30. Is that going to be enough time?

MS. BARTOLETTI: We can do the CDBG at 7:00. They won't take long at all.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Bill, May

25th, 6 p.m., public zoning hearing.

ATTY. RINALDI: Chris, I'm going to tell you how to post the property. You need some stakes. I'll go over it with you and put it in a little plastic bag, get all that noticed.

I think that's all I have. I'll be in touch with council on a closing date for Saint Lawrence.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone have any questions for the solicitor?

MR. HOOVER: Are we doing everything we can on Stocki's property right now?

ATTY. RINALDI: His lawyer filed,
last week, a motion for reconsideration. I
actually answered it today. I don't see it
being a problem. I mean, he did it as a
matter of course. I still have -- well,
we're supposed to get a copy of the letter
from Lackawanna County Conservation
District. We did not get it yet, but I know
they've been over there and they've also
contacted DEP. I also got some more
information on the HOP which we'll be
dealing with, too.

MR. FEBBO: Bill, what about being illegally over there on Gilchrist's property? What did you do with Billy?

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, that's where

Jerry Styles from Lackawanna County -- he

was out there and he toured the site. I

think he was there on a Monday. Not this

past -- actually last Monday, and he

said I'd have a letter. I'm assuming I'd

have it the next day or two. I didn't get

it yet. He said he sent it to the borough

and cc'd me. Marylynn hasn't gotten it yet.

He also contacted DEP and said go up to the

site as well.

MR. FEBBO: So based on what Jerry Styles said he concurs with us?

ATTY. RINALDI: He's going to do whatever his office does.

MR. FEBBO: Because I think Paul
Papi said when he went up there and talked
to Jerry --

ATTY. RINALDI: I don't know if it's Gilchrist or another entity. He's got an office in Moosic. I don't know if it is Gilchrist. They use a similar name that

Gilchrist has. It's owned by Select Realty of NEPA.

MR. FEBBO: Well, one of those guys said they're in compliance with moving dirt because it's less than so many acres.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Two point two acres.

ATTY. RINALDI: I'm going to leave that up to them. They know how to do their job. I did get a response from somebody from Select that said we got your letter, we're looking into it.

MR. HOOVER: That Gilchrist property only goes back so far.

ATTY. RINALDI: Well, there's two zones. There's C-2 and then C-3 in the rear. The first 300 feet in line with -- the other street lots are C-2. After that it's C-3, which is more restrictive. I might have that reversed. I put that in the letter.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else?

Anyone else for Bill? Thanks, Bill.

ATTY. RINALDI: You also have a resolution -- we just got this Lackawanna

County 2021 hazard mitigation plan update that we'll be passing next meeting as well.

Marylynn, borough manager, anything?

MS. BARTOLETTI: Yes. For the next

meeting we will be reappointing Ted Giglio

for your LLVSA representative.

We're going to have the hearing at 6:00, we're going to change CDBG to 7:00. I think that's it.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone have any questions for Marylynn? Thanks, Mare. We'll go down the table. Mayor Legg?

MAYOR LEGG: Two things. One, I apologize for being late. I should know better than to answer the phone when I'm on my way out the door.

Second thing is, I think most you people are aware that Glynn Lunney died about a month ago. He was an Old Forge native. He was in charge of NASA, I think the Apollo moon situation. Being from Old Forge, I think we should do something. What that something is -- I know when I'm up in

Dunmore they have a monument there for Paul Richards, who was a Dunmore graduate, and he was an astronaut. It's really nice, but this guy was the head of NASA, and I really think we should do something.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I agree. Any idea? Or do you want to get together with us or --

MAYOR LEGG: Whatever. If council agrees we can get together and come up with something. They had something down the lower end of town for Joe Amato when he won the world drag racing championships.

Somebody smashed it. Like I said, if council agrees, I really do think we should do something.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I think it's a good idea.

MR. NOTARI: I think it's a good idea, too. I actually looked into a historical marker, the blue and gold markers you see around northeast Pennsylvania. In order to qualify you have to be passed for five years. So in five years hopefully either I'm still around or the historical

that done, and usually you try to find a place that he was -- that would relate to him and the borough. I believe they said he lived in Goose Alley, so I think that would probably be on Main Street either right where Goose Alley is or maybe across from Dunn Avenue, lower Dunn Avenue. Maybe that might be a good spot for such a historical marker when the time comes.

But we can certainly look into other things. I think that's something we can do, we should do.

MAYOR LEGG: John Haluska is looking into his background to see if he was a veteran. If he was, we're going to put up a banner for him.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Sounds like a great idea. Anything else, Mayor?

MAYOR LEGG: That's it. Thank you.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Councilman Febbo?

MR. FEBBO: Yes. I have a situation that was presented to me this past week by Rich Pettinato and Jimmy Forti up on Mine

Street, flooding. I guess there's a neighbor who's building a house on Mine Street and they must have hit a spring or something up there. But it's causing a tremendous amount of water. I have a video here of it coming down through Jimmy Forti's yard and to Rich Pettinato's yard. They don't know where to go with it. Since we don't have a zoning officer --

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We do now.

MR. FEBBO: I don't know what to tell him. But it is a regular stream, creek running through the yard.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Is it continuous, nonstop?

MR. FEBBO: All the time. I guess it was a bog, to begin with, back there where the house is being built, and when the excavators came in to dig the foundation they must have disturbed the underground spring from where it was going. Probably into the mines. It's similar to what we have on the other street, Franklin Street. It's unbelievable.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: I'm curious to

see it.

MR. FEBBO: There's four pictures, if you want to take a look at it. What do we do with it?

ATTY. RINALDI: They should call a lawyer because that's civil and it's that guy's problem. Now, if they diverted a stream that could be DEP. They control the waterways. They might want to touch base with them as well.

MR. FEBBO: I'll relate that to them.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So that water was there before that.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Years.

MR. FEBBO: I'll follow Bill's advice and tell him what to do. It's not a borough matter. That's all.

MR. NOTARI: I have nothing.

MR. LETTIERI: I'm good.

MR. HOOVER: I'm good.

MS. AVVISATO: I'm good.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: We'll go to public comment. Mr. Goetz?

MR. GOETZ: I first want to say that

obviously you know that I'm always one of the loudest and harshest critics about the issue that we have in our neighborhood, so I just want to say thank you for everyone's efforts, for a pretty solid ruling. I'm not sure a hundred percent where we go, but that's kind of why I'm here tonight.

I just want to say that -- and maybe Bill will be able to help us here -- what we do for -- you know, if we feel we're hearing things we shouldn't be hearing or what type of things should we be -- because I read here that, in No. 10, "defendant shall take all reasonable steps to substantially mitigate all noise, odors and debris emanating from the property onto the neighboring properties."

So it sounds like we shouldn't be hearing, really, anything going on or very little. I know that he has to do stuff, but it sounds to me like -- because, as you know, very close to us is where the major dismantling has been taking place for years. So does that mean that he should probably be moving that somewhere further away from us?

How do we interpret that?

ATTY. RINALDI: I'm kind of hoping that there's no dismantling going on. The chief kind of told me a lot of the noise he's seen is dumping into the containers. The chief also noted that we have parameters for when activity and noise can go on for construction. What are the hours? Is it up until 7:00 or 8:00 at night?

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Yeah, and then on Sunday it's later, 10:00 until 6:00.

ATTY. RINALDI: If it's outside those parameters, certainly that's an issue.

MR. GOETZ: If we see or hear torches or cutting, that's not supposed to be going on. Is that fair?

ATTY. RINALDI: If you see torching up there from your house I'd call the chief to document it. We've got a zoning guy now, but between that transition.

MR. GOETZ: That's kind of what the people in the neighborhood are asking. If it gets to be loud over there, machines are loud, that's noise emanating from the property.

ATTY. RINALDI: Right. Machines are going to operate because he's got to move stuff. Like I said, it's within the construction hours.

MR. GOETZ: But it's here he's supposed to take reasonable steps to substantially mitigate that noise. Again, I go back to the conversation I had even had with the chief. If you take that area that he's been working in all the time, even if he isn't putting pieces into dumpsters or trucks or whatever it is, that's where the big problem is for us and the machines running. What if No. 10 says he should be taking a process to maybe move that 400 feet, 500 feet up to the middle of the property where we would have some mitigation there.

ATTY. RINALDI: It's kind of going to depend on what he's doing. So if he's taking stuff that's laying on the ground close to your property and piling it in dumpsters and getting it out of there, thank God. If he's dragging another piece down and making noise with it, then, yeah, that's

unreasonable, I would say.

MR. FEBBO: Since we have a zoning officer now can we bring him up to snuff on that? And can he on a regular basis go over there and just inspect --

ATTY. RINALDI: Yes.

MR. FEBBO: Chris, we're happy to tell you what's going on or what to expect. We have a committee.

ATTY. RINALDI: We'll spend some time with you.

MR. FEBBO: Basically just oversee what's going on and work with Chris over here and what's going on over at Stocki's. Again, brainstorming, see what we can do, and help him along with it.

MR. GOETZ: Bill, earlier maybe

Jimmy brought it up or Lou, but Mr. Styles,
he has nothing to say about what's going on
on that back piece that's someone else's.

We won't say --

MR. GOETZ: But he's not -- I mean, it's one thing about the earth moving and

everything, but if there's equipment over there in that C-3 --

ATTY. RINALDI: What's there, if it's a business type of activity that's under our purview, and we've sent a letter on that, and also what are you doing there from a planning standpoint because you haven't come down. Also, he's got control over earth disturbance for the county, so can get him on it as well.

MR. GOETZ: So he actually looked at that piece as well for earth disturbance?

ATTY. RINALDI: Actually, it was specifically that piece because as soon as I heard he was trying to do something over there I contacted him.

MR. GOETZ: But I guess, as we spoke before, in a week from now when Chris takes over if there's equipment on that parcel, I mean, it's not like the front 350 feet. If it's in pristine condition it can't even been on that property. Am I right?

ATTY. RINALDI: Yes. If he's trying to operate something there, yes.

MR. FEBBO: He is.

MR. GOETZ: I'm pretty sure, as you said before, C-2 or C-3. That back piece is, like, office commercial, so unless you're there digging a hole to build a building equipment should not be even parked on that land, if I remember correctly.

ATTY. RINALDI: For sale, no.

MR. FEBBO: He's importing on a daily basis. It looks like it's operable machinery, but it's increasing. I go by there three, four times a day. He's expanding. But it does look like it operates.

MR. GOETZ: And from what I see, I'm guessing he's not taking all the equipment in through that Diamond Club driveway now.

Looks to be going on that property that was trailered off at one point.

ATTY. RINALDI: I can only see from the road. He was starting to pile up debris there.

MR. HOOVER: Right next to the
Diamond Club, on Gilchrist property, he's
got a road going up there. That's where
he's taking all -- getting machines that run

from here to here, I think.

ATTY. RINALDI: There's an easement there. Gilchrist had the easement put in there.

MR. GOETZ: It runs right along the side --

ATTY. RINALDI: Right along the property line of the Diamond Club.

MR. GOETZ: It looks like there's concrete blocks out front now. I guess when the stuff comes in, no matter what it is, is it all going into that driveway where the mounds now are?

MR. FEBBO: Yes. I've seen all operating machinery coming in there, yes. He has it all lined up like it's used machinery for sale or rent.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: The ground doesn't look -- like you just mentioned a few minutes ago, the ground doesn't look like it's come in through the Diamond Club anymore. The ground isn't dirty like it was, there's not trails.

MR. GOETZ: It appears they're coming into that driveway where the

tractor-trailers are parked. At one time they were set that way so you couldn't go in there.

MR. HOOVER: Who's dumping in there?

MR. FEBBO: Everybody.

MR. GOETZ: He must have put out that they were taking fill.

MR. HOOVER: In the back the other day he was leveling it off with a dozer.

MR. FEBBO: Jimmy's house, the Heights, all that mud, they were dumping that down there.

MR. GOETZ: I just want to be on the same page. I definitely don't want to be taking resources of the chief and the borough and the police department to be going up there when we shouldn't, but we definitely want to be involved and proactive when we believe he's in some violation. I guess we'll talk about that as a group in the future.

One last thing is -- and I'm not sure of the term, Bill, but I talked to somebody that worked at DEP and I talked to some other people, and I don't know where

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this thing is headed because I don't think anybody in this room believes that on June 30th it's going to be brought up to the judge's order.

But I think somehow in the next step, whatever that is, whether council asks you or you do it on your own, I think the only chance we have of seeing something happen there is we need the judge to do some kind of order where he liens the property or puts some kind of judgment kind of like DEP does that says if you didn't do it we're going to assess some kind of judgment against it and we're going to hire somebody, because I really don't see this stuff going I don't know what the judge's next awav. step would be. Maybe you know that. Maybe prison is the next step.

MR. NOTARI: Isn't it our responsibility to put a lien on the property if he doesn't comply?

ATTY. RINALDI: There's already a judgment and a lien on the property that DEP has. I'll try and see what I can have them do or we can do with it. I'm working on it.

MR. GOETZ: The fear is it's just going to keep -- we got 60 more days, we're going to go to September. It obviously doesn't scare him whatsoever, so I'm just saying maybe there's some other course that we can be requesting of the judge after June because I'm not real confident.

ATTY. RINALDI: I'm working on all avenues.

MR. FEBBO: Isn't that considered contempt?

ATTY. RINALDI: That would be another issue. Just by the terms the judge used I think he's lost his patience with everything that's going on there.

MR. HOOVER: June 15th comes, that date comes, I'm expecting to go up there and put a lock on something and he can't work there no more because he's been given nine months to do whatever has to be done. Extra time, extra time. On June 15th he's done. He doesn't have anything out of there we're going to hire somebody to do it and he's going to pay the bill.

MR. GOETZ: That's just all I'm

asking, Bill. Let's say he went to jail for three months, but does that solve all this stuff sitting over there and petroleum smell? That's all I'm saying. There has to be an end game here where okay, son, we gave you every opportunity. We're hiring a company from Texas, they're coming in, they're going to take it all out of here, and whatever the bill is it's going to be some kind of judgment against him or his company or whatever. That's all I'm asking.

MR. FEBBO: And the borough's going to get the money.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: You're welcome. Mr. Gatto?

MR. GATTO: I'm here for a couple items from the school district. First, with the senior class and their end of the year activities, graduation activities, I'm asking for permission to use some borough facilities.

The first one, normally the senior picnic is held at Francis Slocum State Park,

but because of Covid-19 and the restrictions we have in the district we're not having any field trips. So I want to have the picnic at the borough park next to the school. So they would use the grounds, play different sports, use the basketball court. But the one thing I would like to do is grill for them over at the park. So I think that would be the only thing that would be up in the air on whether we can do that or not. Certainly, if you have an issue with that I can certainly make it work on our property.

As for graduation ceremonies, the governor kind of threw a little wrench into things this afternoon for me. I thought I had things planned out. I was going to do everything that I could down the football field. I'm going to still do graduation as of right now down at the football field.

That's going to be on June 10th. I know Mr. DeStefano made the little league aware so they do not schedule anything that night.

What I would like to do, just like the little league does, block off Maxson

Drive by the park and park one car for each

graduate there so that we can have a parade afterwards. So I'm going to park them in that street in the blocked off area, and then I want, with your permission, to use the pavilion in the park for them to robe and get ready to walk over to the stadium and enter the stadium.

Then the last part of that is the parade itself. Just like last year, where we had a parade, it was a big hit. Before I was back in my office I already had juniors, now this year's seniors, e-mailing me and asking for a parade this year. So we are going to do that again.

MS. AVVISATO: Parade on the same date?

MR. GATTO: Right after graduation ceremony. We leave Maxson Drive, come around the stadium, go up Grace Street to Main Street, go up Main Street, then come down Moosic Road and back down First Street to the football field. So that's the plan I have for the parade.

The only other thing that I would like to use Miles Street Park for during the

ceremony is to light off fireworks. I would do that in the middle of the field, away from everything.

So I guess the three items are blocking off Maxson Drive, using the borough park on May 27th, and using the little league pavilion for June 10th. June 11th would be the rain date for graduation.

MR. HOOVER: What are you going to do about the tractor-trailers going in the mattress place?

MR. GATTO: I noticed that today.

MR. HOOVER: Lot of them come at

night, 8:30, 9:00.

MR. GATTO: I'll reach out to the company, let them know we're planning on doing it that night. In terms of moving them, I can ask them to move. I certainly can't make them move. It's their property.

MR. HOOVER: Maybe you can split the road, put cones down half the road. Give them enough room to turn in. They usually come from First Street straight down.

MR. FEBBO: Didn't we address that at one of the meetings? Do they own the

property there?

MR. HOOVER: He owns the property.

MR. NOTARI: My understanding is those trailers that are across the little league field are owned by King Coil. King Coil owns that property. He wanted to put a parking lot where the Brooks field is, but when he inquired to somebody, to Paul or just the neighbors, they told him you're going to have to go in front of planning to do that. You can't just go and do the work yourself. It has to be approved by the borough. He was, like, I'm not doing that. I'll just park them over -- so those trailers are King Coil trailers. He owns the Maxson.

MR. HOOVER: He's parking them over by Maxson.

MR. NOTARI: He owns the whole

Maxson plant. Would you need us to close

Miles Street Park that night?

MR. GATTO: I think it would be helpful if we could. I mean, it doesn't have to be the whole night. I would say 6:00 to 8:00.

MR. HOOVER: Then you're going to have the fireworks there. Leave the gait at First Street open.

ATTY. RINALDI: Can you just send a letter with the specifics to Marylynn so that they know what you're asking for at the next meeting so they can pass exactly what you need. What street you need closed, what times, everything you're looking for so that everybody's not trying to guess when we make a motion.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: So everything's documented.

MR. FEBBO: What about the liability insurance for all this?

ATTY. RINALDI: It's use of the park. You can get a certificate that names the borough, your activities and time frame so you're covering the borough property.

It's just an endorsement. Not a big deal.

CHIEF DUBERNAS: Are you going to block off the parking lot area, too, off Susquehanna? The whole triangle area you want to block?

ATTY. RINALDI: You might want to do

a diagram so the chief knows what you're looking for.

MR. GATTO: I'll get a letter to you this week. The only other item I have, it's not about graduation. It's about the park program. I know in the past the borough ran the park program in the month of July. I know it wasn't run last year because of Covid. I'm not sure what the thoughts were about running it this year.

The only thing I would say is that at the school, using the funding we're getting because of Covid, trying to recoup education lost over the last year, year and a half, we're planning on running summer programs -- educational summer programs in the building. We don't want to make it where the kids are in school in the middle of July all day. So our thought process was to try to incorporate in trying to do the park program in the borough park next to the school with our educational setting in the elementary.

We do have the Seamless Summer lunch option through the USDA that we are working

under this summer. So we would be able to provide, free of charge, breakfast and lunch through our cafeteria. What we would look for is still to have somebody in charge of the outside part of the -- the fun part outside and counselors like you'd normally have with the borough summer program. I know there's a cost sharing. We still would have to pay for the labor of the cafeteria department to provide those breakfasts and lunches.

So I don't know what the thought was of the borough council on continuing that program this year. I know we're still up in the air with Covid regulations.

MS. BARTOLETTI: I've been talking to some of the council members, and my plan is not to have the summer camp this year. So if that makes it easier for the school to go right ahead and plan on doing what you are doing. It's up to everyone here, but I thought that we were kind of in agreement that we weren't going to be having camp this year.

MR. NOTARI: I don't think it's in

our best interest as a borough to put our counselors in that position to, one, have to keep kids separated, if that's still the case, keep them masked, if that's still the case, and to deal with parents who think it's okay to just do whatever they want.

So I wouldn't be against suspending it for another year. I mean, offering the borough the Marion Street park as your recreation center during that, and maybe even that's something that your Covid funds could pay our counselors. But they'd be under your -- my opinion, they'd be under your observation.

MR. GATTO: I'll bring that back.

MS. BARTOLETTI: We don't actually have established counselors. It would be something starting up again, seeing that we didn't have the camp last year. So it's not that we have a standing list of counselors. We require 16 years old or above.

MR. GATTO: I'll bring it back to administration.

MR. LETTIERI: Last year when you did the parade and the graduation what was

different from this year? Did you do everything at the school and then parade down? So you want to change everything down?

MR. GATTO: So last year it was completely drive through. They drove the cars in, everything was on the screen, everybody stayed in their cars, then we paraded right out in front of the property and around town. Then they came back to the school and they got their diploma.

This years, where things are a little bit looser, and now, after today, even more so --

MR. LETTIERI: So you did it more for regulations, then. I was going to say it was a success, why change it.

MR. GATTO: Last year I went through hell because people didn't want to do what I was planning on doing, then afterwards everybody was. This year we don't need to have everybody in their own cars. It's more of a traditional ceremony but outside. People have been asking for years to have their graduation ceremonies down the

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football field.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else?

MR. GATTO: No.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anyone else from the public want to address council?

Now that we have a new MR. STULL: zoning officer, when Steve was around and Paul was around we did a letter. What it is, is the fire department wants to sign off on the occupancy permit before it's issued for commercials. Take care of any kind of commercial building. The reason being is we've been trying to get -- we've been behind the eight ball here for years, the fire department. Occupancy permits have been issued, the fire department gets there sometimes weeks later, months later, we find out that the knock box hasn't been installed where it needs to be, a life safety inspection has not been done. What BIU looks for and we look for are two different things.

So we need to get on board with both the zoning officer and the fire department and work together. I don't know if just

that will work, just to sign off, or if we have to make an ordinance on it, but it's something to really think about.

MR. RUSSEL RINALDI: Bill, do we have to make an ordinance?

MR. NOTARI: I have no problem giving it my support.

MR. STULL: This is a life safety inspection that we do, and it's just very general, what we look for. I know Joe Zupolski goes in and he looks at it from the building aspect for the codes, where, again, we don't. We look for the life safety. So we want to make sure that the knock box is installed. Just outlets on the wall. Make sure no open wires. We just gave a couple reports to Marylynn that we said we walked through. We have 30 days that we go back, we do inspection again to look at everything.

Everything that George Dunbar did
the last four, five years in his development
down there, it's amazing how much life
safety that man puts into his buildings. He
has no problem working with the fire

department.

MR. HOOVER: Is three a fee for this?

MR. STULL: We're just doing it to do it.

MR. HOOVER: I think it's a great idea.

MR. NOTARI: Bill and Mark, I hope you guys work hand in hand with Chris because I think it's going to be important.

MR. STULL: The last couple years we have.

MR. NOTARI: I think it's going to be important as we build our rental property data base and we start enforcing our rental property ordinance, where they need to come and get a certificate of occupancy and permission to rent out buildings, that you're going to be able to help him get inside to inspect as a fire department. Then he's going to be able to carry out his duties and follow the zoning code enforcement, whereas we can do that, we can't do that.

MR. TAGLIATERRA: We're not looking

to fine these people. We're looking for life safety. We'll give them 30 days to rectify the problem and then we'll go back in and reinspect.

ATTY. RINALDI: It's got to be covered by state ordinances that we follow under the building codes.

MR. NOTARI: Couple years ago I think Archbald gave their volunteer fire department ten percent or 20 percent tax credit or something of that nature. Would that help?

MR. TAGLIATERRA: It's been in our area. I haven't really read on it. It's far and few between around here. I think if you go to Jersey they offer pension plans for their volunteer -- that's the state offers that for their volunteer firefighters. It's out there. I haven't really read about it or talked to anybody about the ten percent off your local taxes or state taxes. I just don't know how that works.

Moosic now has a paid driver between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. because it's hard for them

to get a driver during those hours. They have a contingent of people on a per diem basis so not one person is on every day.

It's on a per diem basis.

MR. FEBBO: Thanks for your education.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: Anything else?

Appreciate it. Thank you very much. Anyone else before we adjourn?

All right. At this time the chair will make a motion to adjourn the work session.

MR. NOTARI: I'll make that motion.

MR. RUSSELL RINALDI: By Councilman Notari. All in favor?

(Unanimous. Meeting adjourned.)
